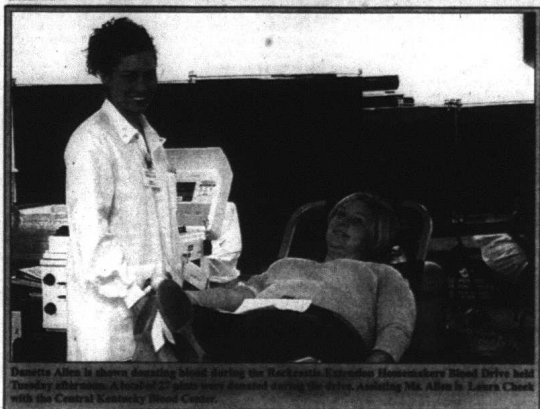

## Stumbo nixes complaint against Judge Lambert

Kentucky's State Attorney General Greg Stumbo has declined to investigate a complaint filed by the Concerned Citizens for a Better Family Court against Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln Family Court Circuit Judge Debra Lambert of Mt. Vernon.

Cory Bellamy, a spokesperson for Stumbo, said Friday "the attorney general's office is not the proper venue for these types of allegations. Bellamy said a letter was sent to the Concerned Citizens Group referencing it to the Judicial Conduct Commission.

Earlier this year the group held protests against Lambert on the courthouse lawns of the three counties where the judge presides.

While Stumbo's office seemingly passed the buck, it's clear that his dismissal of the complaint is a clear victory for Judge Lambert in her

never-ending quest to defend herself against the Concerned Citizens group's allegations of wrong doing.

"I love my work as a family court judge and have been blessed by the support of so many people during the years and especially during recent months," Lambert said this week.

"I want to thank everyone for the calls, cards and personal comments of support," Lambert added.

Locally, support from those who work with her on a daily basis have never had anything but praise for the judge.

"It is a very hard job to do what Debbie does, ruling custody cases and parents who are no longer together and in many cases parents who care more about themselves, than about the children," said local attorney Wilks Coffey.

"I know of no cases where Judge Lambert has not been fair," he said.

Rockcastle County School's Director of Pupil Personnel Rose Brown had nothing but praise for Judge Lambert.

Mrs. Brown has worked with Judge Lambert on many, many cases and said Wednesday that Judge Lambert, "Devotes time to all her cases and reviews each case individually - she is a fair judge and she cares about the children."

"Each Tuesday she works with truancy problems in our schools, something she doesn't have to do - it is simply a community service from a person who cares about children," Mrs. Brown said.

Larry Warren, a retired assistant director of pupil personnel for the Palaski County Schools system, called the claims against Lambert, "outrageous and false."

"For nearly six years I worked closely with Judge Lambert in my role with Palaski County Schools," Warren said. "She is a tireless worker who treats everyone with respect and patience, always staying focused on the kids. I have been in her courtroom and have seen her handle thousands of cases over the years."

"These outrageous and false claims made by a few malcontents infuriate me as a tax-paying citizen," Warren continued.

"I had no doubt that the attorney general would dismiss their crazy complaints," Warren added.

As for the Concerned Citizens' assertions, Lambert said: "I know that our community is full of decent people who know better. But what means so much to me is the hugs I

## Fiscal Court votes to end fee pooling with Sheriff

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court voted Tuesday to discontinue fee pooling with the sheriff's department as of September 30th. The action came at a special called meeting at which County Treasurer Joe Clontz presented the court with a summary of receipts and expenditures by the sheriff's department for the past two fiscal years.

According to Clontz's report, actual figures for the two periods show that the sheriff's department overspent their budget by \$98,700.42 in 03-04 fiscal year and by \$93,319.34 in the latest fiscal year ending June 30, 2005.

The deficit for 03-04 fiscal year does not take into consideration the \$117,907 of the total \$210,773.96 in revenue was actually excess fees paid to the county by former Sheriff Shirley Smith. Since the funds would have gone to the general fund anyway, the \$117,907 brings the actual deficit to \$105,700 for 03-04.

The \$93,319.34 deficit for 04-05 does not include approximately \$27,000 that will, at some point, have to be repaid by the county to the Rockcastle County School System for an overpayment of tax commissions by them to the sheriff's department. It also does not take into consideration about \$9,600 due the general fund for the last quarter of 04-05 from federal payroll for two sheriff's deputies detailed to UNITE and the DEA Task Force. Including the two figures would raise the deficit for the 04-05 fiscal year to \$110,719.96. Of course, this figure does not include matching social security, medicare, workmen's compensation, retirement, health insurance, liability insurance, workers' insurance, etc., all costs absorbed by the general fund.

Clontz also told the court that since July 1, 2005, through six payroll periods about \$9,600 has been expended for the sheriff's department and \$44,133.20 had been received as of the end of the fiscal year.

refunding of deputies paid through federal programs, with reimbursements to be made to the general fund. The motion, which will be reviewed in three months, passed unanimously.

## Employee Health Insurance

In other action, the court approved a different health insurance program for county employees. The premium for their present coverage with CHA would have increased to \$288.43 from \$213.82 for single coverage on October 1st or a 35% increase.

In an effort to keep costs down somewhat, the court decided to go with a different policy offered by CHA with a higher deductible (\$1,000 single/\$2,000 family from \$500/\$1,000), a higher (\$15 from \$20) cost an office visit and a higher yearly maximum out-of-pocket.

## Mt. Vernon Council votes to increase water/sewer rates

Customers of Mt. Vernon Water Works will have to budget more for their water bills, possibly as soon as November, if all goes according to plan.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to accept the recommendation of a rate study compiled for the city by the Kentucky Rural Water Association.

It will affect the budget of most customers very little - causing an increase in the total minimum bill of \$1.90, from \$20.76 to \$22.66. However, big users will see a hefty increase with customers using 25,000 gallons a month going from a combined bill of \$142.36 to \$181.77, an increase of \$39.41 a month.

Wholesale customers' rate (Western and Eastern Water Districts) will see an increase from \$2 per thousand to \$2.16. This is the only increase which might cause a delay in imposition of the new rates. Wholesale customers have 30 days to ask for a rate study.

Caryn Lee, who compiled the study for Kentucky Rural Water, said that the city's debt would be about \$83,000 a year on the new rate system and, under the old system, this

would cause the city to operate at a loss of \$142,956 a year. "It's (the increase) rather insignificant increase except for wholesale customers and those who have been getting a break but it's time for them to step up to plate and pay their share" Lee told the council. Lee also said the city's rates, even with the increase, were "very reasonable on a statewide average."

Mayor Clarke Kirby pointed out that in the last increase (in 1999), sewer rates were not raised. "Even if we didn't raise water rates, sewer rates would have to be increased," he said. Kirby went on to say, "It's tough to raise rates and hard for people to accept but we can't keep selling water at a loss."

The intake system project will be financed with a \$1 million dollar grant from the state and the city will secure interim financing from Kentucky Rural Water of \$950,000 to complete the project. Permanent financing of \$950,000 will, hopefully, be secured from Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA).

The council also set tax rates for real and personal property of \$1.74 per \$100 of assessed value and a \$1.67 vehicle tax rate.

## 19 indictments are returned

Nineteen indictments were handed down on Friday by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury for numerous crimes including sexual abuse and illegal drug manufacturing.

Matthew Polly, 42, of Hummel and Tamara Estes, 26, named in a fourteen count indictment for the sexual abuse of three juveniles.

Polly was arrested in July for sodomy in the second degree, sodomy in the third degree and unlawful transaction with a minor, second degree.

At the time of his arrest, Estes was not arrested and has not been arrested as of press time Wednesday.

Estes is accused of complicity to the sex crimes and helping to promote with counseling to the boys all under the age of sixteen. No bond will be set for her until she is in the custody of the court.

The two were also indicted on charges accusing them of giving the juveniles marijuana and alcohol to help cause the alleged crime to take place.

Polly is being held on a \$100,000 cash bond in the Rockcastle Detention Center and will be arraigned on October 14th.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds, who wrote the initial arrest warrant for Polly, said

## Kendrick pleads guilty

The Western Rockcastle Water Association has won a victory in their battle to keep former customers from stealing water.

Last Monday, Jeff Kendrick, 32, of Conway Road, pled guilty to theft of services over \$300, after his arrest on Wednesday, September 7th by deputy sheriff Ronald Brantley.

Western Water President Denver Burton had notified former customers whose water meters were pulled because of non-payment that they would be prosecuted for theft, if caught using a straight line pipe to steal water.

They made good on their promise, after Burton swore out a warrant for Kendrick.

Kendrick was the first caught by Western employees since news \$870 in restitution after he pled guilty. He also pled guilty to writing cold

## Donations to Red Cross exceed \$60,000 in area

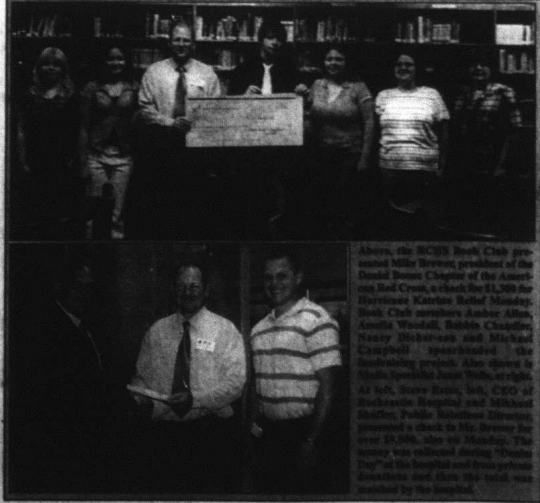
According to Debbie Bellairs, a Public Relations Coordinator for the Daniel Boone Chapter American Red Cross, over \$60,000 has been raised in the seven county area served by the Daniel Boone Chapter for the National American Red Cross Disaster Relief Fund. "This is the greatest national disaster response we have ever had," Ms. Bellairs said Tuesday.

Also, over 200 individuals have signed on as volunteers and many businesses have made in-kind con-

tributions to local relief efforts. Banks, churches, schools and other organizations are serving as collection points for financial donations or are collecting clothing, bedding, water and personal care items to aid in disaster relief. Many individuals have offered to open their homes to disaster victims.

## There is a limited supply of flu vaccine

The Rockcastle County Health Department announced this week that they have a very limited supply of flu vaccine.

Health department officials said it was unclear at this time if they will experience a shortage of vaccine as they have in previous years and they are uncertain if they will receive more vaccine later in the flu season.

In an effort to immunize the highest risk population the health department is following guidelines set forth by the Center For Disease Control, Beginning October 4th and run-

ning until the 6th, only persons age 65 or older who have a chronic health condition such as high blood pressure, lung disease, kidney disease, cancer, etc., will be eligible for a vaccine shot.

Healthy adults who are 65 and older will not receive the vaccine until the following week.

Children six months through 23 months who have chronic health conditions may also get the vaccine the same week.

### Issue taken with story...

Dear Editor,

Last week's Signal reported that the Sheriff's Department is in the "red," a term very loosely applied by the Signal reporter to imply that the Sheriff's Department had, in some way, violated the law or has failed to pay its debts.

Nothing could be further from the truth. The Sheriff's Department only owes the fiscal court a residual of \$20,000 for police cruisers purchased. This amount was accepted by the fiscal court to be carried over into their 2005-2006 budget, to be repaid in some time prior to June 30, 2006 and had final approval on the last meeting of the

fiscal year.

For years, the fiscal court functioned successfully without fee pooling. However, with rising costs, including increasing spending by the road department and the jail, the fiscal court has found it very useful to participate in fee pooling to offset these budget issues when it is most needed, in the latter part of the fiscal year.

The fee pooling arrangement - Sheriff's fees deposited into the fiscal court coffers assist the county in presenting an acceptable budget at the end of their fiscal year on June 30. The Sheriff's Department benefits from the arrangement by the county assuming certain costs, including payroll, gas, office expenses, etc.

Without fee pooling, the county would run a greater risk of showing real deficits at the end of their fiscal year, not just continuing expenses. When fee pooling was agreed upon by my office and the fiscal court, at no time was there any agreement that this would be a "wash," (meaning fees would equal fiscal court expenditures for the Sheriff's Department).

While that would be ideal, the reality of law enforcement is that it is not a profit-making scheme. This was understood by the fiscal court at the time of the agreement.

Law enforcement expenditures for law enforcement are a sound investment. The typical drug addict buys at least \$50 of drugs per day. This amount comes either from the stealing of property, forging your checks or welfare, or a salary taken from the money from their family. A drug dealer sells to a minimum of ten people per week (conservative). That means that the minimum cost to society of one drug addict is \$500 per week, or \$2,600 per month. At \$182,000. Again, this is a conservative.

### Last week, if you'll remember, I was to the point of elaborating about the life of Christ from age twelve through thirty from a recent lecture I had heard. I'm not asking anybody to change their views or beliefs in any way, nor am I attempting to teach. I am merely passing along a few tidbits of information I had learned, and hope that you will find, if nothing else, at least interesting.

The subject of Christ's "lost" eighteen years has always fascinated me, and has always been a great mystery since the Holy Scriptures give no account of this time frame. As I have also noted, there are ancient accounts, authentic historical accounts, written by such historians as Augustines and articles or comments by Pope Gregory I very good hidden away from the general public in the Vatican archives and the British National Library and Archives. These places are virtually inaccessible, and one must have the proper credentials even to get the slightest glimpse of these centuries-old, fragile, manuscripts and writings.

Fortunately, the lecturer I heard, a theologian and teacher at the collegiate level had such credentials. He has traveled extensively, and has put forth several years studying the Bible and its history. He spoke in a very heavy British accent, and covered his material rather hurriedly, especially for someone taking notes, such as myself. Unfortunately, I was unable to take down all of his information, and I hope that which I have written is accurate to the best of my ability. I'll attempt to condense the material as much as possible, and give it to you "in a nutshell" so to speak.

Joseph of Arimathea (Matthew 27: Mark 15:43, Luke 23:50, and John 19:38) was a very wealthy man with a lot of clout and influence. He was noted in Scripture as a good man, and a follower of Jesus Christ.

Joseph of Arimathea was a member of the Sanhedrin, which was the government in that area under Roman authority. The Sanhedrin was against Christ and His teachings, and plotted to have Him killed, which is exactly what happened, although Joseph wasn't a willing participant. He had washed his hands of the plot, and was expelled from his position.

Being such an affluent individual, he had easy access to Pilate, the Roman governor of the area, and asked for Christ's body for burial after the crucifixion. He was granted his wish, and Christ's body was put into the tomb of this rich man.

As it turns out, this Joseph of Arimathea, was Jesus Christ's very own great-uncle, the uncle of His mother, Mary. He assumed responsibility of the family after Joseph, Mary's husband, died which was shortly after the account of Jesus' teaching in the temple at age twelve.

Joseph of Arimathea became what we would call a guardian for the young Christ, who was probably around thirteen or fourteen years old. Joseph of Arimathea had gained his wealth through owning a fleet of ships, and being a tin merchant. He taught Jesus the trade (other than His prior knowledge of carpentry). He said this fleet of ships over a wide area, and thus Jesus learned much about geography, astronomy (necessary for sailing), how to mine and smelt tin ore, was fluent in several languages, knew several cultures, and had even learned music. They traveled to India, Latin America, and all over the British Isles. Jesus even personally built a house in what is now Westbury, England and on the island of Avalon, near England. It has been reported that He visited Gloucester and Somerset, England frequently (where they're located today). British is often referred to as "Mary's Dowry". Joseph of Arimathea and Jesus (possibly Mary and the rest of the family) had made friends with the "king" of England at the time, and he gave them one hundred and sixty acres of land, which remained tax-free to this day (I'm not sure which ruler this was, nor was his title "king" as England wasn't incorporated until 120 AD. Meanwhile, Joseph of Arimathea was found to be a traitor, and the Sanhedrin caused him to flee to modern-day France in 37 AD.

There are ancient scriptures of Jesus being in the British Isles as a youth and young adult as several ancient castles have an anchor and a lamb carving in the masonry. There is also an old folk song that has been lost for many, many centuries about "Joseph the Tin Merchant". According to accounts, Christ promised to return to the people in the British Isles and the other places He went on His travels. Could this be the white god of the American Indians and other cultures knew about and expected to see, and was known about through centuries of oral history? Could these other cultures be

## VIEW FROM THE BENCH

### The Bankruptcy Reform Act

With the implementation of the Bankruptcy Abuse Prevention and Consumer Protection Act looming, the public should anticipate significant changes in personal bankruptcy procedures. These changes may discourage the filing of bankruptcy, alter the type of bankruptcy proceeding sought, or make it more difficult to find an attorney who can assist in obtaining the bankruptcy.

The new Act imposes a test which determines whether a debtor can obtain a discharge of all debts or must now repay certain types of creditors. The intent of the Act is compel repayment of a portion of an obligation where the debtor has at least some means to do so - a laudable goal.

The dischargeability of certain types of debts is also affected by the new law. State and local tax debts, debts arising from DUI related liability, and certain types of domestic debts such as child support and alimony are non-dischargeable.

The Act also imposes new procedural hurdles. Some of the procedures may, however, have the effect of making it more difficult to locate an attorney willing to handle a bankruptcy or may discourage the frequency of filing. Under the new law, debtors:

-Must undergo credit counseling

-Must submit more documentation after filing for bankruptcy;

-Must submit management information that previously required, including tax returns and other documents;

-Must provide effective notice of the bankruptcy filing to creditors;

-Are prohibited from discharging debts more often than once every eight years rather than once every six years as the law formerly provided.

Attorneys who represent debtors are obligated to conduct reasonable inquiries to verify that the information submitted by a debtor to the bankruptcy court are well grounded. Attorneys who fail to do so, or who do so in an inadequate manner, are subject to penalties. In a recent American Bar Association article, attorney Terry Carter warned that "it won't be enough to take a client's word for it" anymore. More preparation by lawyers means higher fees, and presumably more malpractice exposure. Moreover, little if any credit counseling is available locally. Thus, some advocates fear that many casual practitioners may no longer accept bankruptcy cases. Potentially, this may lead more individuals to attempt to navigate the bankruptcy waters without an experienced attorney.

Thus, potential filers may be restricted to a few large firms that specialize in bankruptcies. And, if the goal of the law is to reduce abuse of the bankruptcy remedy - and presumably make bankruptcies faster and more efficient - the courts may soon be inundated with filers who are unprepared and unrepresented, thereby slowing the entire process. Only time will tell if the new requirements actually streamline the process and reduce bankruptcy fraud.

## Men Can Do Self-Exams Too

For many years, women have been taught to do self-exams of their breasts for cancer. This has helped find lumps at an earlier stage when treatment is easier and cure rates are higher.

But self-exams are not just for women. Men are also encouraged to do self-exams of the testicles, and both men and women should check the skin and other areas for signs of cancer on a routine basis.

A cancer of the testicle is usually curable when it is found at an early stage. Unfortunately, these cancers cause little pain and no symptoms, so they are seldom discovered early unless a man checks his testicles on a regular basis.

It is a tumor of young men - primarily between ages 15 and 35. In fact, it is second only to accidents as a cause of death in men aged 20 to 35. The risk of cancer developing in a testicle is increased if a testicle was slow to descend into the scrotum after birth or if it has never descended.

The testicles should be examined each month by palpating each testicle for any lumps or changes. The best time to do the exam is during a bath or shower. Each testicle is gently rolled between the fingers and thumb checking for any lump or area of thickening. The cords above the testicles should also be checked during the exam.

The lumps are usually found on the sides or in front of the testicle, but any lumps in the cords and vessels above the testicles should also be reported to your doctor.

Ask your doctor if you have any questions on how to do the exam or if you find any lumps that concern you.

truck tire, and, in fact, tasted much like burning rubber smells. I'm not sure where my newly developed soft heartedness comes from. The opening days of hunting season, name a game animal, were anticipated much like Christmas Morning when I was growing up. From late summer until early winter wild game, especially squirrel and rabbit, the occasional grouse, or a brace of quail provided a wonderful alternative to salt pork when it came to putting meat on the table before the weather became cold enough to butcher domestic livestock.

We raised so many chickens that I swear to you, I have taken chicken sandwiches to school in my lunch box and swapped them for biology or peanut butter and jelly. Only recently have developed a taste for the occasional egg sandwich.

All of which to say is that hunting was not just a hobby, but we ate everything we shot and enjoyed every morsel. The stalking part of the sport was secondary but it was, indeed, fun. The last time I went deer hunting, a stunningly beautiful 8 point buck trotted around the hill and stopped no more than fifty yards from my tree stand. It would have been the perfect shot, but I put the cross hairs on his ribcage and could not pull the trigger. He stood there, perfectly still until finally I yelled, "GHI!" at which point he bounded off into the forest.

I unloaded my rifle, climbed out of the tree stand, and a few weeks later gave it to a nephew for Christmas. Squirrels and rabbits, quail too, for that matter, are so tame and profuse that they are often a nuisance in my lawn and garden these days. Only yesterday, we had 4 big does calmly grazing in broad daylight within fifty feet of the house.

We also have a herd of black angus steers that are fat, sleek, tame and market ready grazing all about. I don't believe that I could slaughter one of them either but that doesn't keep me from ordering a rib eye or a t-bone steak, Pittsburgh rare, if you please when we go out to eat. In the meantime, if you get a deer, call me up. I'll help you get it in the freezer for a good meal of prime venison. Just don't ask me to go out and shoot one.

the "other sheep not of this fold" (John 10:16) Christ was concerned about? ### Respectfully disagree...

Dear Editor,

I write regarding the recent tragic deaths of two Rockcastle County children as well as in response to Miss Jessica McWhorter's recent commentaries. Before I begin, I wish to extend my condolences to the friends and loved ones of the children involved. The death of a child this young, under any circumstance, is truly a tragedy.

I have read several of Ms. McWhorter's commentaries and I find her willingness to speak and her honesty refreshing. At the same time,

I must respectfully disagree with her conclusion on this issue.

I have had limited responsibility for the care and guardianship of children. Most of this was as the president of a college student group that took children from the South Bend Center for the Homeless out on week ends. However, even from these experiences, the one thing I feel sure about is that no child is 100% safe 100% of the time.

One instant you're standing right next to a child at the zoo, look at the bears. You watch the bear for a second and one of the kinds is beyond the fence trying to get over the retaining wall. One second you're in a group visiting Santa, the next a child has wandered off.

The reality is that parents don't have eyes in the backs of their heads and, like everyone else, require sleep and have losses in attention.

I think of early today at the booths at Livingston's homecoming, the child's guardian was looking at merchandise and the young girl wandered out beyond the white line onto the road. Fortunately, she was greeted with a "cut" "hey" "hey" from me and a cautious driver. If she had been killed, would we now be prosecuting her guardian? I also think of a fellow faculty member who has had two children maulled by dogs. If either of his children had been killed, would you have been "criminally negligent"?

But, you say, the Rockcastle County cases were "different" because the parents were asleep. All cases are different in some detail.

But we also all sleep. Do we lock our children to their beds while we sleep? What guarantees that any child doesn't get up in the middle of the night and wander away? Should the father of Jessica Lunsford, the young Florida girl kidnapped from her trailer by child molester John Cooney,

be tried for reckless endangerment? After all, didn't he fail to prevent harm to his daughter?

I ask you to address the proposed prosecution of Mrs. Looney by the office of prosecutor William Reynolds. Does this really serve the interests of justice? If we are going to prosecute her, why not the Brodhead boy's mother? Do you believe that a jury of 12 peers will convict a grieving mother? Do either of these parents deserve up to 15 years in jail?

And for those who may claim that Mrs. Looney's blood alcohol content was twice the "legal limit," I have to ask what legal limit? Was the mother, driving when the child died? Is there a law against an adult drinking in one's residence? Do we otherwise take children away from parents because they are drunk?

If there is proof that Ms. Looney was driving drunk, or taking drugs, or running an illegal meth lab that accidentally falling asleep and setting your residence on fire is not an offense we should put parents in jail for.

The parents of both Rockcastle County children have been punished enough -- in ways that someone who has not lost a child may have a hard time understanding. And, of course, they will second guess themselves always.

The harsh reality is that they could have done things differently. As in any tragedy, it is easy to look at what could have been done differently and second guess. But, an equally important reality, is that no parent can keep their child 100% safe 100% of the time.

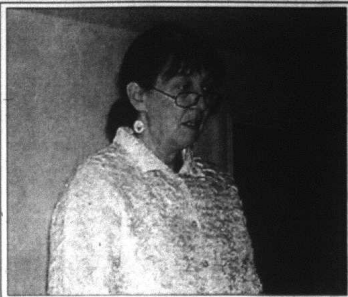

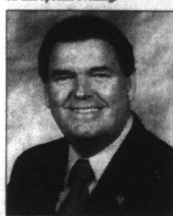

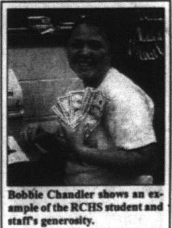

### "What Saith The Scriptures"

When our Lord was crucified at Calvary, two thieves were also crucified with him, one on his right, and one on his left, Mt. 27:38. Both of them railed on him, Mt. 27:44, but later one repented. As we read in Lk. 23:39-43, "And one of the malefactors which were hanged railed on him, saying, If thou be Christ, save thyself and us. But the other answering rebuked him, saying, Dost not thou fear God, seeing thou art in the same condemnation? And we indeed justly, for we receive the due reward of our deeds; but his man hath done nothing amiss. And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom. And Jesus said unto him, verily I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with me in Paradise." Thus this man feared God, believed in Christ & his kingdom and repented; and from what has been stated and necessarily implied.

Now many people cite this case to try to prove that one does not have to be baptized to be saved. Let us make two observations. #1. How do you know he was not baptized sometime earlier in his life? #2. In Heb. 9:15-17, the writer points out to us that a testament or person's will, is not in effect till the death of the testator. The thief was given salvation before the commands of the Great Commission were given. Read Mt. 28:18-20, Mk. 16:14-16, Lk. 24:46-48; Jesus said, (not me, friends) those who believe in the death, burial and resurrection, who repent, and are baptized shall be saved. Our Lord placed baptism as a condition of salvation, just like repentance and faith are conditions of salvation. The thief on the cross did not live when Jesus gave the Great Commission, but we do! So we better follow what Jesus said for us to do, in order to be saved, and not lean upon vain reasoning to deliver us.

Mulching trees and planting beds does much more good than just the good groomed looks it provides to your landscape.

There are lots of materials one could use as mulch, some being better than others.

Local availability usually means better pricing, so keep that in mind. So, what do we hope to accomplish by mulching? Is it a groomed look? Is it to keep down weeds? Is it to conserve moisture?

How about the cost initial cost is one item, but how long between when one needs to refresh the mulch with some more mulch material is also part of the overall cost of mulching planting beds or naturalized areas or more formal areas.

Organic mulches such as hardwood mulch, pine bark, pine needles, pine straw, salt marsh hay, and other locally available industrial or farm-

## September 18-25 Proclaimed Constitution Week

September 17, 2005 marked the two hundred eighteenth anniversary of the drafting of the Constitution of the United States of America by the Constitutional Convention. poCKET expense (\$3,000 single/ \$6,000 family from \$2000-\$4000). The premium will increase from \$213.82 for single coverage to \$256.51 but the court voted to absorb the increase for the 40 county employees participating at an additional cost of \$20,640 year. The county will pay \$178 per month per participating employee for a total yearly expenditure of approximately \$85,440 for health insurance.

### Dump Sites Clean-Up

Judge Carlotto also presented to the court an Environmental and Public Protection Cabinet Memorandum of Agreement for their approval. The agreement covers the clean up of 12 dump sites in the county at a total cost of just over \$40,000.

Of the 12 sites, the two most expensive scheduled for clean up are on the Old Sigmon Road and Parks Cemetery Road, both at a cost of \$8,000 each. One at Boone Gap will cost \$5,884.56, a total of \$6,000 for two on Christian Church Camp Road and two on Northern Road Turnoff will cost \$8,183.20. Other dumps will be cleaned up on Boone Cromer Road, Charlie Smith Road, Stephens Road and Upper Pinesy Branch Road.

The county will have to front clean-up expenses and invoice the state on completion.

### Cemetery Preservation Grant

The court also accepted a Cemetery Preservation Fund Grant, in the amount of \$21,500 for improvements to the Buckeye Cemetery, Chestnut Cemetery on Pleasant Valley Road and the Sibley Cemetery (United States Colored Infantry). The county will have to match the \$21,500 with cash or in-kind contribution and will also have to front the expenses for this project and invoice the state when completed.

The Chestnut Cemetery is scheduled for the most improvements including: initial cleanup, construction of a walkway, stone fence and entrance, the erection of a sign and a flagpole and a wrought iron fence around graves for an estimated total cost of \$24,000.

### Two Hired

As a last item of business, the court approved the hiring of two secretaries for the judge's office. Patricia Martin was hired as office manager at a pay of \$9 per hour and Amanda Fay Rader Owens was hired as an assistant office manager at \$8 per hour. The hirings were subject to a 30 day probation period.

Durham and Derek Danzell, of

Liberty Avenue, Berea were also indicted on charges of theft by unlawful taking. They are accused of taking property from Rose's One Stop in Brodhead, which had a value of over \$300. Durham was also indicted on a charge of being a persistent felony offender for crimes he was convicted of Madison County in 2003 and 2004.

Robert Earl Newcomb and Geraldine Stone, both 52, of Livingston, were indicted on charges of cultivating marijuana.

Mark D. Proctor, 25, of Lovell Lane, Mt. Vernon and Mark E. Bradley, 20, of Brodhead, were indicted for theft by unlawful taking for an alleged incident on June 30.

Michael J. Crooner, 22, of Mt. Vernon, was indicted on two counts, involving illegal drug possession, after being arrested during a traffic stop on June 25th.

Steve A. Napier, of Little Creek, Mt. Vernon was indicted along with Jerel David Smith, 18, of Buffalo Road, on charges of receiving stolen property by knowingly having in their possession property of the city of Somerset.

The incident allegedly happened on June 3rd.

David Durham, 26, of Livingston was indicted for the August 14th armed robbery of Movie Warehouse in Mt. Vernon.

Harlan B. Lawson, 30, of Sand Hill, was indicted on a charge of cultivating marijuana over five plants.

Terry Fultz, 54, of Rose Hill Mt. Vernon, was indicted on a charge of trafficking in a controlled substance, and selling the Oxycodone to a confidential informant. He is being held on a full \$10,000 cash bond.

Danny Hicks, 33, of Locust Street, Mt. Vernon was indicted on charges of manufacturing methamphetamine and Robert Irvine Rose, 25, of Lawrence Lane Mt. Vernon, was indicted for allegedly helping Hicks make the meth. The incident occurred in March.

Joshua D. Bradley, 19, of Mt. Vernon, was charged with second degree rape for having sexual intercourse with a person less than fourteen years of age.

Second degree rape is considered a Class C felony which carries a sentence of five to ten years in prison. Victims under 16 cannot give consent to sexual intercourse, under Kentucky Law.

David Hood, 38, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on five counts involving a traffic stop in Mt. Vernon on July 23rd.

All charges have to do with illegal drugs and Hood being a persistent felony offender.

Aaron Lowell Blackburn, 28, of Livingston was indicted for burglary and theft by unlawful taking, besides being a persistent felony offender.

Newton Steve Clinton, 45, of Mt. Vernon was indicted for possession of methamphetamine.

Jefferson D. Smith, 23, of Livingston, was indicted on charges of receiving stolen property.

He is accused of having in his possession stolen property from the county garage.

All nineteen will be arraigned on either this Friday or October 14th.

Of the 176 school districts in the state of Kentucky, Rockcastle is ranked number 18, according to test results released this week.

The local school system had the seventh best scores among public schools in the state last year, after being 15th overall a year ago.

"All Rockcastle County Schools are on target for reaching 2006 achievement goals except for the high school" said school Superintendent Larry Hammond.

Brodhead Elementary had the best index score of 100, which is highest for the county and fifth in the state of 476 elementary schools.

The Rockcastle Middle School had the most improved score with a 3.6 gain from a year ago.

They also had the 36th best scores for middle schools for the state's 218 middle schools.

Referring back to the high school, Hammond said, "The high school has earned an accountability index of 77.1 for 2005 and the school will need to meet or exceed an accountability index of 81.1 in 2006 to meet their goal of 79.1 for the biennium" Hammond said.

"I am satisfied that with hard work and good planning, they will make their target goal," he said.

"All Rockcastle County Schools are above the state average and the schools continue to do well. There are areas as always we need to focus on and we will," he said.

Mt. Vernon Elementary School ranked 104th of 746 elementary schools in the state. Roundstone Elementary ranked 83rd and the high school was 78th of 234 schools.

Rockcastle ranked higher than any other school district in our area besides Corbin, which ranked 10th.

## LIHEAP program begins November 1

As winter approaches, the Daniel Boone Development Council will begin the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) November 1, 2005. It will run through December 9, 2005 in an effort to assist low-income residents with high utility bills. LIHEAP is a statewide initiative, sponsored by the Kentucky Association of Community Action in partnership with the Cabinet for Health and Family Services.

Last year, over 985 residents of Rockcastle County received financial assistance and emergency services from the LIHEAP Subsidy component. Applications will be taken in alphabetical order with specific days assigned on the calendar. Applicants must present the following:

- 1) Most recent heating bill or verification that heating expenses are included in rent (i.e. lease agreements);
- 2) Social Security card or official documentation (medical card) with social security numbers for each member of the household;
- 3) Proof of all household income for the prior month;
- 4) Proof of housing type (lease, Section 8 certification, Housing Authority statement, deed or rent receipt) and;
- 5) Picture ID.

Applications will be taken Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at Ashlee's House, 105 East Main St., Mt. Vernon, 606-256-5315.

The benefit amount each household receives will be based on its level of poverty and the type of fuel used for heating. All eligible households will receive a benefit. Benefits will be made payable to the household's primary or secondary heating fuel vendor.

get from kids I run into at Wal-Mart or a football game...the kids have been especially sweet to me," she said on Tuesday.

The Pulaski County-based Concerned Citizens for a Better Family Court filed an 80-page report with the public corruption office of the attorney general last month.

They have also written letters to the editor to each county newspaper, including the Signal in recent weeks.

The documents included descriptions of "numerous cases in which unnecessary trauma has been inflicted on people, especially children, who have been in Lambert's court-room."

The Concerned Citizens group has made it a mission to oust Lambert, because it insists she has violated judicial conduct rules and made decisions that harm families, rather than help them.

Lambert counters that the Concerned Citizens was organized by a small group of people upset over decisions that did not go their way.

"There will always be people who don't like being required to follow the law...and when those same people are attention seeking, this is the unfortunate result," Lambert said.

"Clearly, I am pleased that the attorney has dismissed their complaint," Lambert added.

In April Judge Lambert was awarded the prestigious Betty Lewis Children's Service Award for her work with the children of Rockcastle County.

Judge Lambert is up for re-election next year.

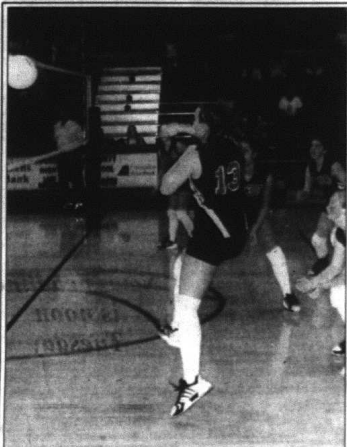

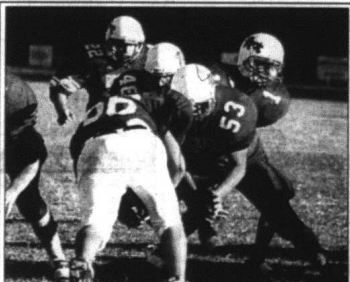

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## Reducing energy consumption

With skyrocketing fuel prices, finding ways to minimize winter heating bills by winterizing a home can reduce energy consumption and reduce costs.

A good way to decrease home heating costs is to reduce energy losses by sealing duct leaks, caulking and weather stripping. No-cost or minimal-cost ways to lower heating bills are to have a home energy audit done, regularly clean or replace air filters and lower heating system and hot water heater thermostats.

Other ways to lower home heating expenses are to install a programmable thermostat, have a professional inspect the heating system annually, add more insulation and buy energy-efficient models when appliances must be replaced.

Inspect ducts for sections that should be joined, but have separated,

and for obvious holes. Leaking ducts reduce the efficiency of a forced-air furnace or heat pump by 20 percent, causing equipment to work harder than necessary and leading to early repairs or replacement. A properly installed duct system can save up to \$140 annually in energy costs.

Air leaks caused by gaps and cracks and insufficient insulation contribute to high energy bills. Properly sealing a home can reduce energy bills by up to 10 percent. Caulk and weather strip windows and door frames that leak air. Seal holes, cracks and penetrations between the home interior and attic, exterior walls and floors over an unheated basement or crawl space. Install weather stripping gaskets on all electrical outlets, including those on interior walls.

Because caulk and weather stripping reduce indoor-outdoor circula-

tion, assess indoor air quality before applying these materials. Some homes contain dust, harmful gases, mold and other indoor air contaminants, and sealing air leaks without proper ventilation could seal in these air pollutants. Always look at your home's ventilation needs before undertaking practices to tighten air circulation.

Most major utility companies will conduct an energy audit to identify problem areas and suggest corrective actions. This audit often is free or at a nominal charge.

Dirt and neglect are a major cause of system failures. Regularly clean or replace filters so the system will more efficiently operate. Write the filter clean or replace date on a calendar as a reminder.

New water heaters may have higher-than-necessary temperature settings, or you may find a lower hot water temperature is sufficient for the household. A temperature setting of

115 to 120 degrees provides comfortable hot water for most uses, unless 140 degrees is needed for dishwashing. Review the dishwasher owner's manual, because the appliance may not require this high temperature.

Lowering the heating system thermostat to 70 degrees Fahrenheit or lower is another practice to reduce energy use. Going from 72 degrees F to 68 degrees can save 15 percent or more on your gas bill, and programmable thermostats can save even more.

A programmable thermostat automatically adjusts your home's temperature setting to save energy when you are asleep or not at home. Regulating the home temperature with four programmable settings can save about \$100 on annual energy costs. This thermostat will pay for itself in energy savings within a few years.

Have a licensed professional routinely inspect the heating and cooling system. Just as a car tune-up can improve gas mileage, a seasonal

check-up of your system can ensure that it is operating efficiently and safely to maximize efficiency and comfort. A check-up can identify any problems early. Before embarking on a major heating system overhaul, find an experienced, licensed contractor whose technicians are certified by North American Technician Excellence.

Compact fluorescent lighting is an energy saver. A CFL bulb uses about one-fourth as much energy as an incandescent bulb with the same light quality and lasts 10 times as long. CFL is especially good for often-used lights and those in hard-to-reach locations.

Installing high-performance windows is another way to reduce home heating costs. These windows are better insulated and more air tight reducing heating energy consumption and resulting in lower utility bills.

Appliances more than 10 years old consume much more energy than today's more efficient models. When it is necessary to replace an appli-

cance, remember there are two price tags - the price you pay and monthly operational costs during the appliance's lifetime.

Look for the ENERGY STAR label and the bright yellow and black Energy Guide label when buying an appliance. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Department of Energy have identified ENERGY STAR appliances as the most energy-efficient products in their classes. They usually substantially exceed minimum federal standards. These appliances may reduce home energy costs by 10 to 50 percent, compared to conventional models and even more compared to older models. The Energy Guide lists the annual energy consumption and operating costs so buyers can compare appliances.

The ENERGY STAR label also appears on windows, light bulbs and fixtures, and many other home products. Some homes also have the ENERGY STAR certification, meaning that they have met and exceeded the minimum federal standards for energy efficiency.

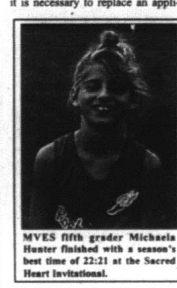

It also does not include the \$1,300 also presented by the RCHS Book Club to Mr. Campbell on Monday. That money was raised from students at the high school and Chris Frith's home room raised the most funds during the drive.

During the Tsunami Relief Fund drive, the chapter raised a total of \$19,000.

The Daniel Boone Chapter is currently providing services in the Richmond area to families from Louisiana and Mississippi who have evacuated to this area. The chapter, which serves Madison, Garrard, Lincoln, Jackson, Lee, Owsley and Rockcastle counties, has been requested by the

National American Red Cross to prepare to provide shelter care for over 200 victims who have been displaced by Hurricane Katrina. When this occurs, local restaurant, restorers and grocery stores will be needed to help feed shelter victims. Please call the chapter office if you wish to provide this service. In addition, volunteers are being sought from the seven county area to be trained in introduction to Disaster, Mass Care and Shelter Operations by the Daniel Boone Chapter. Individuals are also being utilized in the chapter office. Persons who wish to volunteer should call at 623-1336 for further information.

healthly adults, 65 and older, persons or children two through 64 who have chronic health conditions, healthy children six months through 23 months and pregnant women will be eligible for a vaccine.

The next week, October 17-21, health care personnel, caregivers and household contacts of children less than six months, healthy persons 50-64 years old and healthy children under the age of 18 will be eligible.

After October 24th and thereafter, if the health department has the flu vaccine anyone who wants a shot can get it.

Officials said it should be noted that persons should go to the health department in the county where they live, because the local health department will not give vaccines to people who do not live in Rockcastle County.

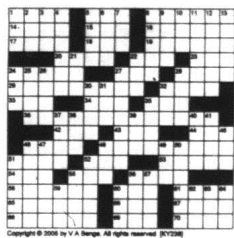

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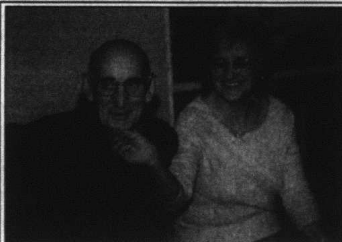

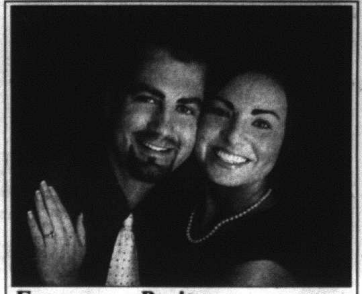

# Local FFA Chapter attends State Fair

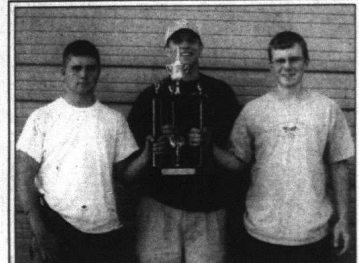

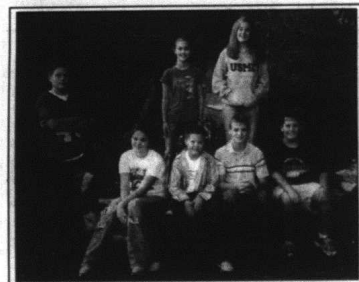

On Monday, RCMS 8th graders visited the Renfro Valley Kentucky Music Hall of Fame Museum to view the performance of the Juggernaut

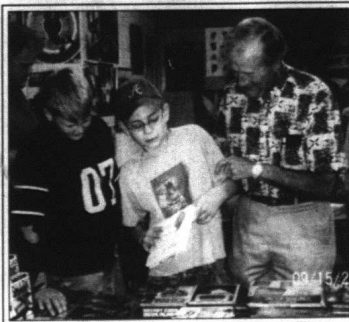
Jug Band. Thanks to Gear-Up and the Hall of Fame for providing that opportunity for our students.
