

Last week's Signal reported that
e Sheriff's Department is in the Last week's Signal reported that the Sheriff's Department is in the "red," a term very loosely applied by the Signal reporter to imply that the Sheriff's Department had, in some way, violated the law or has failed to bey sits debts. Nothing could be further from the truth. The Sheriff's Department only owes the fiscal court a residual of \$20,000 for police cruisers purchased. This amount was accepted by the fiscal court to be carried over into their 2005-2006 budget, to be repaid at some time prior to June 30, 2006 and had final approval on the last meeting of the

fiscal year.

When fee pooling was agreed upon by my office and the fiscal court, at no time was there any agreement that so would be a "wash." The Bankruptcy Reform Act

With the implementation of the Bankruptcy Abuse Prevention Consumer Protection Act looming, the public should anticipate significant changes in personal bankruptcy procdures. These changes may discourage the filing of bankruptcy, after the



age the filing of bankruptcy, after the type of bankruptcy broceeding sought, or make it more difficult to find an attorney who can assist in obtaining the bankruptcy.

The new Act imposes a test which determines whether a debtor can obtain a distinct of the determines whether a debtor can obtain a distinct of the determines. The intent of the Act is compel repayment of a portion of an obligation where the debtor has at least some means to do so- a laudable

means to do so- a laudable

goal.

The dischargeability of certain types of debts is also affected by the

types of debts is also affected by the new law. State and local tax debts, debts arising from DUI related hisbit, and certain types of domestic debts such as child support and alimony are non-dischargeable.

The Act also imposes new procedural hurdles. Some of the procedurals may, however, have the effect of making it more difficult to locate an attorney willing to handle a bank-rapty or may discourage the frequency of filing. Under the new law, debtors:

Attorneys who represent debtors are obligated to conduct reasonable
inquiries to verify that the information submitted by a debtor to the

do so in an inadequate manner, as
subject to penalties. In a recent

Potentially, this may lead more individuals to at-tempt to navigate the bankruptcy waters without an experienced attor-

ney.
Thus, potential filers may be re-stricted to a few largel firms that spe-cialize in bankrupticies. And, if the goal of the law is to reduce abuse of the bankrupticy remody—and presum-ably make bankrupticies faster and more efficient—the courts may soon be inundated with filers who are un-resonanced and unrepresented, thereby be inundated with filers who are un-prepared and unrepresented, thereby slowing the entire process. Only time will tell if the new requirements ac-tually streamline the process and re-duce bankruptcy fraud.
