

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

#### New motor vehicle insurance laws close loopholes

loophole in Kentucky law that has allowed uninsured drivers off with-out penalty, according to Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds,

County Attoriey Billy Reynolds, who prosecutes motor which can who prosecutes motor which can who proceed the wide and the strict court. "The new law specifically probabits all drivers from driving in an unsured websic," Reynolds said. "Before this law passed, Kentucky law prohibited only the owner from driving without proof of insurance." Reynolds said this is an important step in protecting Kentucky drivers. Without this amended law, non-owners of uninsured vehicles could cause accidents and damage to other vehicles without criminal penalties. Furthermore, because the driver of the uninsured vehicle had no insurance overage, the victim, whose car the uninsured vehicle had no insur-ance coverage, the victim, whose car is damaged in a crash, might have to pay for repairs from his or her own pocket, insurance company or by su-ing the owner/operator of the vehicle.

Under the new law, those driving uninsured vehicle can face the fol-

\*Those convicted of driving another's car without proof of insur-ance can be fined \$500 to \$1,000 and/ or sentenced to up to 90 days in after for the first offense. Subsequent of-fenses within a five-year period,

If the owner of an uninsured ve-hicle pennis another person to drive the vehicle, the owner could be fined the vehicle, the owner could be fined to the control of the could be the theory of the could be fined up to 90 days in jail for the first of-fense. In addition, the registration of the vehicle can be revoked and the license plate suspended for up to one year. Subsequent offenses within a five-year period could result in the owner having his/her operator's li-cense revoked with possible sentenc-ing to up to 180 days in jail and fines from \$1,000 to \$2,500. "An owner who drives his or her own uninsured vehicle can be sub-ject to both sets of penalties outlined above.

Reynolds recommended that all drivers verify insurance before driv-ing someone else's car and ask for a copy of the insurance card before leaving with the car. Reynolds men-tioned that, for years, Kentpicky law has, requised crivers to have proof of insurance, in their possession before

driving a vehicle.

"The new law will save honest, hard working Kentuckians a lot of money and time in the long run,"
Reynolds added. "When we all pay
our own way and follow the law, everyone benefits."
