The night of Tuesday, January 3, and the early morning hours of Wednesday, the 4th will be imbedded in my memory for as long as I live. Unfortunately, when I do recall the horrors of that 12 hour span, I will feel sorrow, anger, despair, and literally sickening disputs ally sickening disgust.

As a result of a tremendous meth-

As a result of a tremendous methan explosion, thirteen miners had been trapped more than two miles underground in the Sago mine near Tallmansville, West Virgina for nearly 40 hours when I tuned in to live coverage of the rescue efforts by CNN. I had, read the morning paper heard hourly radio news broad-casts all day and watched the evening news on all three traditional network television stations to try and stay television stations to try and stay abreast of the situation.

abreast of the situation.

But the news at that point was cursory, best. Simply stating that the miners, were in fact remped, that rescue efforts were not going well and that, as time went by the chances of them surviving were slim to none.

Normally I don't trust or pay much attention to CNN. Most of the commentators there are so conservatively narrow-minded that they make Rush Limbaugh look like a liberal. In fact, one commentator was already in fact, one commentator was already

In fact, one commentator was already talking about how awful it would be if any of the victims even thought about suing the coal company. "Just another burden on the tax payers," he

Anyway, Anderson Cooper, the only reporter at CNN for whom I have the slightest bit of respect, was anchoring on the scene along with a couple of other reporters and several camera crews. A steady stream of family members and friends of the trapped miners were being interviewed. News conferences were being broadcast live every hour or so and both the West Virginia Governor and top mine officials were telling families that there was little hope for survival. "Only a miracle," they kept saving.

I happen to believe in miracles. My father was a coal miner for 35 years and even though mine explosions and roof falls were far more sions and root falls were far more frequent in his day and were most often fatal, there are also stories of miraculous rescues and survivals.

I found myself glued to the television. I will say this much; Anderson Cooper and his news crew were

son Cooper and his news crew wedden doing a tremendous job of capturing the drama and emotion on the scene just the way it was playing out. Su-perb, factual, unbiased and straight-forward, reporting. A credit to their profession. I doubt that actually be-ing there would have been as infor-mative.

Sometime just after 9:00 PM, Sometime just after 9:00 PM, word came that one miner had been found dead but that the other 12 were not in the vicinity of his body. Moreover, the transport car in which they had been riding was unharmed and their dinner buckets were also gone. They had obviously escaped the blast and sought some place in the mine where the air was clean and free of and sought some place in the mine where the air was clean and free of carbon monoxide. I could actually feel the hope of the hundreds of friends and family members when that news was an time I was totally involved m and emotionally and my heart was literally pounding. I sat on the couch and prayed out loud for a miracle. Shortly after 11:00 PM someone

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

came rushing up through the reporters yelling, "They're alive, They're alive. When word reached the church where all the family members had been keeping vigil, the most joyous cheer I have ever heard went up.

The rejoicing was so powerful that I still find it indescribable. I can't recall the last time I felt such relief or sense of jubilation. I sat there on my couch, 200 miles from the mine site; and wept for joy with the fami-lies. Even the news crew was having lies. Even the news crew was having trouble containing their emotions. I yelled YESSSSSSSSSS so loud that it woke Loretta and I excitedly and emotionally shared the news with her. My wife told me that she'd been

praying too.
Within thirty minutes word came that the miners would be brought out of the mine and that they would be allowed to visit family in the church

the governor and several mine offi-cials drove up to the church. Within minutes terrifying, bone chilling wails and screams erupted from the church. A woman and two adole children came running down the hill. She had no family members trapped

the elation. Meanwhile, more than a dozen other ambulances were seen dozen other ambulances were seen parked near the mine's entrance por-

She had no family members trapped but she had gotten her kids out of bed to come and join the celebration. She was so emotionally distraught that she literally choked as she told Anderson that none of the miners other than the one who had passed but in the ampliance were alive and by in the ambulance were alive and that even he was in very critical con-

dition.

The absolute height of relief and jubilation were shattered in a moment. An atmosphere of joy was instantly charged into one of shock, disbelief, grief, sorrow and anger beyond description.

As it turned out, both the Governor and mine officials knew with minutes of the initial announcement

minutes of the initial announceme that the survival story was patently false. Within half an hour they knew that there was only one survivor. Yet they let the celebration continue for more than three hours without letting they let the celebration continue for more than three hours without letting the families know what was going on. Grief géunselors had been inter-viewed as they left the scene. Many people who had been up for more than forty bours had gone home to get some sleep and would not hear the horrible news until they got up the next morning. Millions of Ameri-cans who had been glued to their tele-vations had also retired to be a filter visions had also retired to bed after visions had also retired to bed after hearing the survival story. Hundreds of papers across the country and around the world ran the mistaken story of the miracle on Wednesday

morning.

That twelve miners died is hor-

rible enough. That a governor and mine officials let untold thousands of mine officials let untold thousands of people and especially family members and close friends celebrate their survival for over three hours when they knew they had no reason, is easily the most incompetent, most irresponsible, most sickening and disgusting thing that I have ever writenessed. If this wasn't actually criminal it certainly should be. There are absoluted to a generable express. absolutely no acceptable excuses

Nobody knows how many people will suffer mental disturbat emotional scars for the rest of their emotional scars for the rest of their lives as a result their experience on this unwanted and unwarranted roller coaster ride.

The Chicken House

(This column will appear periodically to offer my memories on selected topics.)

A few days ago I was thinking about my job, and it reminded me of how blessed I have been for the past 45 years with the many different types of jobs that I have lowed. I am hankfull that I have always had the physical and mental ability to work. Wy parents and grandparents taught me to work hard and be self sufficient. I started as a very voum bow. me to work hard and be self sutnient. I started as a very young boy mowing the lawn, and my grandfather would give me 50 cents an hour to do this choire. It was good training. I wanted the grass to grow faster so I could earn more spending

money.

The other night my wife and I were watching TV, and a commercial came on showing the inside of a chicken house. Immediately, my thoughts returned to my high school days when I worked for my father (Hobe Griffin) in tending his chickens. Now let me tell you, I have loved almost every tob I ever had; but I

almost every job I ever had; but I
hated working in a chicken house.

Dad had 13,000 chickens housed in three different buildings. A meat
packing plant would deliver the baby
chicks and we fed them for 9 weeks.

It was my duty each morning to feed
those nasty animals. Chickens are
very dusty because of their feathers
and the sawdust they walk on, not to
mention that they fill the floor with
their droppings. Each day I would
darry bags of feed throughout these
houses and dump it into feeders hanging from the roof. Back and forth I
would go until all 13,000 were fed.
When finished, I was covered with
feathers, dust, and worst of all,
chicken manure. I was a sight to behold. I couldn't wait to get home and
soak in the shower before heading out
to school. Because my mother felt
sorry for me, she would have a feast
on the table when I got out of the on the table when I got out of the shower.

After about nine weeks, my father would tell me to hire about a dozen high school boys and meet him at the chicken houses at dark. This meant that it was time to ship the chickens to the meat packing plant.

We were instructed to put 9 chickens in each coop and load them on the truck. After giving us our orders,

After giving us our orders, le would tim off all the lights, You see, the birds had never seen dark-ness because we wanted them to eat 24 hours-4-24, As soon as the lights went out, the chickens would flop down on the floor as if they had died. It was very strange. We would walk through the houses picking up three chickens in each hand and take them to the constraint of the chickens in each hand and take them chickens in each hand and take them to the coops. You know, as I write this, I can remember that horrible smell so clearly. After you filled a coop, you would take it to a tractor trailer and hoist it up to the driver. He had weighed the truck before we filled it with chickens, and he would weigh it again when it was full. At





Legislative Update

Session kicks off with kev issues facing Kentucky

As the first week of the 2006 General Assembly began with the

January 3, the 140th Regular Session

January 3, the 140th Regular Session of the Kentucky General Assembly began to take shape.

In the first week alone, almost 300 bills have been filled for consideration this session and countless others have been requested to be draftled. Over the next few weeks the General Assembly's committees will meet to debate the merits of these measures and hear testimony from bill spondard and the restriction of the first of t and hear testimony from bill spon

and hear testimony from bill sporsors, industry experts and constitu-ents with interest in specific topics.

The budget will no doubt be the most important bill before us this ses-sion since the state spending plan in-cludes funding for education, road projects, and the various state agen-tice that Levik entitless state owers. cies that keep Kentucky state govern ment in business. However, we face veral other critical issues if we are several other critical issues it we are indeed to move our state forward. After all, our work will not be fin-ished until we have done everything possible to advance our schools, make health care more affordable and bring better paying jobs to our com-munities.

The second day of session, the governor announced that state agen cies had been able to trim another \$120 million from their budgets, in addition to the \$214 million that was

left over at the end of the fiscal year that ended on June 30. This surplus will be helpful as we address the up-coming budget and issues like teacher pay, state employee health insurance and Medicaid.

As we joined the rest of the na-As we joined the rest of the na-tion in watching as the tragedy in the-West Virginia coal mine unfolded, in Frankfort we had the opportunity to take part in a press conference to an-nounce a \$170.000 grant investment in Kentucky's coal workforce. This investment represents yet another important investment in the future of Kentucky's coal industry and is vi-Kentucky's coal industry and is vitally important to both keeping coal miners working and lowering our heating prices.

Over the next three months we will also encounter calls to strengthen state laws as they relate to convicted sex offenders, drivers licensing and standardized testing in Kentucky school

The General Assembly currently has several bills addressing the way Kentucky not only punishes con-victed sex offenders, but also how the victed sex offenders, but also how the state deals with registered sex offenders when they are released from prison back into our communities. The measures include provisions that, among other things, would require certain sex offenders to be placed on lifetime parole require eleplaced on lifetime parole, require glo-bal positioning (GPS) monitoring of sex offenders and prohibit pretrial

robation, shock probation

diversion, probation, shock probation and other forms of nonimposition of sentence for certain sex offenders. We will most likely be debating; the merits of HB 90, the graduated drivers licensing bill. Under this bill, a 16-year-old would have to go through a few more levels of experience and qualification before we put them out on the road by themselves. Another bill we will consider this session, HB 211, is a self-defense measure that provides all Kentuckians with the ability to defend their homes, their families and their lives. HB 211 simply says that if a crimial breaks into your home or your car HB 211 simply says that if a crimi-and breaks into your home or your car while you are in it, you can assume that he is there to cause harm to you and you may use any force against him. This bill simply gives power back to law abiding citizens like you and me and similar measures have passed in Florida and other states, with the support of the National Rifle Association. I look forward to debat-ing it here in Kentucky. ing it here in Kentucky. As teachers across the Common-

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
