Three more file for Primary

As of Wednesday, three more Rockcastle Countians have filed for the May Primary Election, with still just two county-wide office holders being opposed.
Incumbent Sheriff Darrell Dean has another opponent. Fourth District Constable Roger G. Figg, 52, of the Conway area filed his wage, against the sitting sheriff. Other opponents of Dean are Cecil Rucker, Billy Rice and Mike Peters, who is a former deputy sheriff.
The longest current countywide

office holder, Coroner Bill Dowell, has opposition for the first time since 1969.
James E. Winchester, 40, of Castle Village Apartments, has filed to try and unseat the Coroner. Dowell was first elected in 1965.
Another new filing is in the district four constable's race. Republican Jackie Huff has filed for the seat.
In Mt. Vernon, there is also a race for the Mayor's seat. Betty Carter Bussell, a two term council member filed for the seat last week. She is the only opponent to file against current Mayor Clarice Kirby.
The Mt. Vernon Mayor's office is now a full-time job with a \$3,000 a month salary, health benefits and an expense account.
Currently, those who have officially filed their election papers in the County Clerk's office are:
for County Judge/Executive, incumbent Buzz Carlotto, William K. Bullen and Angie Stillworth. All are Republicans.
County Attorney William D. "Billy" Reynolds is unopposed as of now. He is also a Republican.
Another Republican and longtime county clerk, Norma Houk is also unopposed.
Republican Jaier James E. Miller is unopposed.
Republican Teresa Vanzant is also unopposed for Circuit Court Clerk.
Margaret Offutt, a Republican, is unopposed for Property Valuation Administrator.

didates. Emanuel Miller, 67, has filed for the seat as Democrat. (This is a correction from last week. Miller was listed as 72.)
District five magistrate Ralph Allen remains the only magistrate without opposition.
In the district one constable's race, Dale McFerron has opposition from Charles York, 34. (This is also a correction from last week. York was listed as 74.) Incumbent Randall Stevens has not filed.
District two constable Delno McClure has opposition from Jack Navarre and Steve Griffin. All are Republicans.
In the district three constable's race, incumbent Stanley Payne has opposition from former long-time Broadhead Police Chief Joe Bissell, James W. Kidwell and Rodney Adams.
In the district four constable's race, along with Huff - William Kidwell, Leonard Dale Miller and Donnie Cope have filed.
In the district five constable's race Raymond Kirby has filed against David Mason.

Indictments handed down on Friday

Nine Rockcastle Countians were indicted recently on a variety of charges, including drug charges, receiving stolen property and non-support.
There were three co-indictments handed down:
Dennis R. Brown, 41, of Water Tank Hill Road in Broadhead and James M. Clark, 37 of U.S. 25N, Mt. Vernon were both named in an indictment for receiving stolen property, with a value of over \$300.
James Ray Wynn, 21, of Rt. 1, Orlando and Mary M. McCormick, 22, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon were also named in the same indictment.
Wynn was indicted on two counts: Receiving Stolen Property, with a value over \$300 and Theft of Motor Registration Decal. McCormick was (Cont. to A8)

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County gets first snowfall

Rockcastle County students got only the second day of the year off on Wednesday, when school was called off because of bad weather.
Rockcastle County's official weatherman, Bud Cox, said Wednesday that the 1.75 inches of rain turned to snow and ice formed, creating slick conditions.
Wednesday night's snowfall was only the second recorded snowfall of the winter season. The other recorded snowfall was on Saturday, when two inches of the white stuff blanketed the county.
The low recorded temperature so far this year has been 20 and the high, has been 66.
The high temperature in January was 66 on the third day, when the temperature has been in the 60s six times in January.
In 2005, Cox recorded only 44 inches of precipitation at his weather station, calling 2005 "an extremely dry year." In 2005 the high recorded temperature was 95 on August 15th and (Cont. to A8)

Doan does not attend court meeting Still not a budget for Sheriff's office

Impasse might be the best word to describe the current state of affairs between the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department, especially after the sheriff, or a representative of his office, failed to appear at a meeting Tuesday, called primarily in an attempt to get a budget acceptable to the fiscal court.
At last week's regular meeting of the court, Chief Deputy Nathaniel Price presented the sheriff department's budget for calendar year 2006. At that time the court, on the recommendation of County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotto, declined to approve the budget because the revenue figures were not "realistic," according to Carlotto. The main revenue item, questioned by Carlotto, was \$125,000 included as estimated revenue from forfeiture funds, i.e., money received from federal and state seizure of property and cash following drug convictions.
Carlotto's problem with this item was that, in 2005, the department received only \$30,000 in state forfeiture funds. Only state forfeiture funds can be used for general operating expenses. The balance received, \$129,000 was in federal forfeiture funds, which are restricted to the purchase of equipment, vehicles, property, etc. It was Price explained that the \$125,000 figure was based on research of outstanding forfeitures. Carlotto was adamant that only revenues the department was realistically certain of receiving be included in the budget.
According to Carlotto, the budget needed to be reworked because:
1) If the court approves the sheriff's budget and estimated revenues do not materialize, then the court is responsible for making up the difference from the general fund, thereby straining that fund's resources and jeopardizing other needed programs and
2) In every election year, the fiscal court is required, by law, to retain 35% of the budgeted funds in all county accounts so that a possibly new fiscal court had operating revenues when they take office the next January. If this is not done, Carlotto noted, fines

can be levied by the state against the fiscal court, as a body and personally. "I think this is an unfair thing to ask of the court," Carlotto told Price.
Budget Breakdown
According to the budget presented, total estimated receipts for 2006 are \$346,419, including the questioned \$125,000. \$190,125 has been budgeted for deputies gross salaries, \$34,320 for other gross salaries and \$15,500 for KLEFFP pay for a total of \$239,945, not including the sheriff's salary of \$65,547.19 for a total of \$305,592.19. Of course this does not include over \$118,000 paid from the general fund for fringe benefits including retirement, worker's compensation, employer's share of Social Security and medicare, etc.
To offset part of the payroll expense, the department will receive \$62,596 from the High Impact Drug Trafficking Area program (HIDTA) for deputy Barry Adams' salary; \$29,315 from the state for the three bailiffs who provide security when courts are in session and \$15,500 KLEFFP from the state.
Other expense items budgeted by the Sheriff's department include \$30,000 for gas, \$4,900 for office and cell phone expense and \$6,500 for office materials and supplies.
In the receipts column, besides the disputed \$125,000 and the state and federal reimbursements for positions within the department of \$107,400, the departments expects to receive \$87,000 for commissions on taxes collected and other \$44,000 from various other sources including serv-

ing papers, fines and fees, court ordered payments, auto inspections, etc.
Tuesday's Meeting
At Tuesday's called meeting, the court took care of some routine items of business and then asked County Treasurer Joe Cloitz to go to the Sheriff's office to remind them of the meeting, since there was not a representative present.
Clontz returned and told the court that he had spoken with Chief Deputy Nathaniel Price who had told him (Clontz) that he had been advised "not to go."
The court then began discussion of the budget on their own with Carlotto telling the court that there were several problems with the Sheriff's budget, including the fact that there was no order presented, for the court's approval, setting the maximum amount of total salaries for deputies, a requirement before a budget can be approved.
Carlotto once again pointed out that if the court approved the budget as presented, then they would assume liability for expenses not covered by revenue. Carlotto gave the court a run down of some of the Sheriff's expenses for 2005 which included long distance service \$7,138, compared to \$2,400 for the jail and \$552 for the road department for the entire year, and \$38,212 for gas through October of last year.

After a year of service Army Specialist Falin is home

Another Rockcastle County soldier is home safely after a year long tour in Iraq.
23-year-old Amber Falin, a specialist with the United States Army, arrived in Cincinnati on Monday, January 10th, after an 18 hour flight, which included a stop in Ireland to refuel.
The 2001 RCHS graduate was called up through her National Guard unit which was stationed, originally in Richmond, and then moved to Walton.
Amber was pulled from school at Eastern Kentucky University, where she is majoring in Elementary Education, to serve her country. That was in November of 2004. Amber received a military release for all her classes.
On January 20, 2005, "Boots hit the ground in Iraq," the former Lady Rocket returned home.
When she came home, she arrived in Cincinnati where she was greeted by her entire family including dad,
Amber said.
When asked if she was afraid while in Iraq, she said, "Of course you are afraid. But you still have a job to do. I was most afraid for my family who were worried about me." Amber talked to her mother every day, via Internet phone on the bases.
"I think my tour of duty was harder on them then it was on me."
While in Iraq Amber worked at three different military bases - Camp (Cont. to A8)

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UNITE cases send three from county to prison

Three drug cases, brought before the court by Operation UNITE officers, have resulted in prison terms for Rockcastle Countians, according to Eddy F. Montgomery, Commonwealth Attorney for Pulaski, Lincoln and Rockcastle.
According to David L. Dalton, UNITE/HIDTA Prosecutor, Terry Fultz, 54, Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to 10 years for the offense of Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, first degree.
Dalton said operatives from UNITE and the U.S. Forestry Service purchased Oxycodone in January, 2005 from Fultz. In addition, Fultz was apprehended with Oxycodone in his possession in June, 2004 by the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Office.

Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley prosecuted the June, 2004 trafficking charge.
Judge Jeffrey T. Burdette overruled a defense request for probation and sentenced Fultz to 10 years imprisonment.
Willie Thomas McClure, 36, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to five years imprisonment for Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, first offense and Cultivation of Marijuana, second offense. Dalton noted that in August, 2004, operatives from Operation UNITE purchased Oxycodone from McClure and, six days later, UNITE operatives discovered a marijuana patch at McClure's residence while serving a search warrant.

Our Readers Write

Only one side of story was published...

Dear Editor,
This is in response to a news article in your paper dated January 12, 2006 concerning our son who was hit by a school bus, driven by Linda Mays, while walking home from school on January 5. It's evident that basic journalism procedures were not followed in this article, because no attempt was made to contact the family or other witnesses and only one side of the story was published.

We are highly upset and deeply offended that so much praise was given and printed from a school official to the school bus driver that hit our son, or any child, before all the "facts" are known. Mr. Parsons may have witnessed the incident from inside his vehicle sitting in a line of traffic behind a school bus, but there are other witnesses that had a broader and more direct view from the roadside without the restrictions of a vehicle. His "veteran educator" status does not make him a more credible witness than the residents of Rockcastle Villa Apartments.

Two sets of dual tire skid marks - 20 to 30 feet long, on a dry road in a 25 mph school zone... What the stopping distance for a loaded school bus at 25 mph once the brakes are applied? How long does it take the school bus to stop? How long does it take a 12-year-old boy to walk 10 feet across one lane of the road?

Witnesses say it was the right side of the bus that struck our son. How much distance was there between the skid marks on the road and the center line that the driver could have used in an attempt to avoid hitting our son without endangering others?

When I was a young boy, my favorite pastime was playing in the woods on our hilltop farm in Rockcastle County. On one corner of the woods, our property joined another farm that had recreational attractions not found on my grandfather's (Eugene Stokes) land. My adventures there began when I was very young.

My brother Al, who was ten years older than I was, took me into those woods for the first time when I was about six. We entered the woods from the back side and had to scale down a cliff in order to reach our destination. I well remember him holding me over the cliff and dropping me into the arms of his friend because I was too young to climb down by myself. That excitement was very scary, but the excitement of it gave me a love for the area that lasted. I looked and hefted more like a bulldozer blade with a handle on it. "Too much hoe for me," I told him and handed it back. "What do you think about this weather, Shade?" Shade is in his late eighties and moved from Bell County to Madison several years ago to live with his granddaughter. He once told me that he doesn't have a worry in the world after shutting down the distillery he used to run in an old coal bank up near the Clay County line.

He slid the hoe handle into the crook of his right arm the way old timers carry shot guns, pulled off his fedora with his left hand and scratched his head with three fingers.

"Well now this thunder and light-

Spying Lawsuit Needed

As predicted, President Bush's authority to order the National Security Agency (NSA) to eavesdrop on U.S. citizens' telephone conversations has reached the courts. The ACLU, joined by groups which include the Counsel on American-Islamic Relations, the National Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers, and Greenpeace, has filed suit in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Michigan, seeking a court order to stop the administration's domestic spying program.

The ACLU challenges the constitutionality of the spying program which provides for electronic eavesdropping without prior court approval as required by the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) and the federal criminal wiretapping laws. In their suit, the ACLU contends that its members who include attorneys, journalists, and other citizens who regularly communicate with people in the Middle-East, believe their calls are being monitored by the NSA program.

At issue, as discussed previously in this column, is whether the President can authorize domestic spying as part of the Congressional authorization to wage the war on terror or whether he is bound by federal laws which require prior court approval of electronic surveillance.

Two provisions of federal law authorize wire taps. The first, Title III of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (Title III), is the general federal authorization for wire tapping in criminal investigations.

In order to obtain an order authorizing electronic surveillance under Title III, the government must convince a court that probable cause to believe that the suspect is committing or about to commit certain federal crimes and that normal investigative methods are insufficient or too dangerous. Only in very rare circumstances does Title III permit the emergency use of a wiretap without court approval.

ity is once again squarely before the courts. A single U.S. District Judge in eastern Michigan will make the preliminary determination of whether President Bush has violated the Constitutional right to privacy and freedom of speech and whether he also violated the provisions of Title III and FISA. Regardless of the outcome, appeals are a near certainty. Nor is this issue of presidential authority likely to be resolved quickly. And certainly no guarantee exists that the administration's claims will prevail as former President Nixon's claims

Chewing Tobacco Can Cause Cancer

Tobacco companies are targeting teenage males. Chewing tobacco has become more popular among school-aged athletes in recent years. Its use has increased considerably in young males as well as adult men. Professional athletes are often seen with a big chew in their check, free samples are given away, and advertisements promoting its use are seen in sports magazines and in stadiums.

The nicotine in chewing tobacco is absorbed quickly and the amount a person gets is equal to smoking cigarettes. Although this nicotine may have a stimulant effect, it has not been shown to improve the skills of athletes.

Another reason for its popularity is that it has not acquired the stigma of causing cancer that cigarettes have. Yet it is known to be associated with a number of different forms of cancer, including cancers of the mouth, throat, larynx and esophagus. The chances of developing oral cancer are many times higher in men who chew compared to men who don't. There are also reports that it is associated with cancer of the colon and bladder.

The risk of cancer is a big concern with so many people using it at younger ages—half of the users are under 19—and it is usually harder to kick the habit of chewing than to quit smoking.

Using alcohol along with the tobacco will further increase the chance of developing cancers in the mouth and esophagus. For cancer of the esophagus, the combined use of alcohol and tobacco increases the risk many-fold.

Chewing tobacco does cause cancer and even great athletes are not immune. Babe Ruth died of oral cancer.

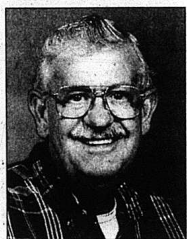
Besides Mrs. Gatliff and her husband, Barry, Mrs. Bowman is sur-

of executive privilege illustrates. Some critics will, without any doubt, call into question the motives and patriotism of this lawsuit. Some will invariably suggest that if members of these organizations have done nothing wrong they need not be concerned about their conversations being intercepted. Yet these comments miss the mark.

The relevant question is simply whether the telephone call believed to be private can be intercepted by the government without prior Court approval. The unwavering answer since 1967 is that it can't.

The filing of the lawsuit itself is a good thing regardless of the identity of those who initiated it. The face of war has changed since 9/11 and perhaps our laws need to adjust accordingly given that no apparent justification exists in our current laws. These issues cannot be resolved by popular opinion and thankfully cannot be settled by executive fiat. Only our courts can determine the legality of this program. Time will tell.

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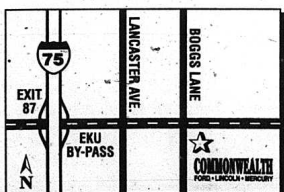

about six feet by the school bus onto the road then was assisted to the side of the road by witnesses. He did not try to leave the scene but failed to realize the seriousness of what had just happened to him and didn't want to go to the hospital.

As for the treatment received at Rockcastle Hospital, x-rays were made of his left hip and spine, which is the side that hit the road on impact and was scraped and bruised. They did not x-ray his right hip, which is the side the bus hit. We count our blessings that no bones were broken and no internal organs were seriously injured. However, a full spine x-ray, which included the hip/pelvic areas, by Sipple's Chiropractic on January 9, reveals that vertebra in our son's lower spine was shifted and his right hip was shifted 13 cm (more than 5 inches) by the impact of the school bus.

The circumstances present on January 5, 2006 that resulted in this accident are repeated twice a day, every school day, by children walking to and from school, crossing a major road with heavy traffic and no crossing controls. Statistics dictate that this will not be the last time a child is hit by a vehicle at this location. Before this happens again, our local and state officials need to take effective action immediately to improve the safety for children in high risk areas such as this. The next time a child may be more seriously injured or killed, who will be involved and when no one knows.

off this huge room were several small tunnels, one of which was quite long and contained a stream filled with fish and white crickets that were both blind. Of course, there were always lots of hair hanging from the roof of the main room or along the walls of the tunnels.

Occasionally, we found scat of larger animals that had sought refuge inside the cave. One unforgettable day, we frightened a wildcat in a tunnel—or maybe it would be more accurate to say that he frightened us! He dashed out of the cave in a flash, leaving us dead in our tracks with chests pounding. Another spine-tingling time was when our flashlight ran out of batteries and we had to use matches to find our way back to the opening. There isn't anything much scarier than being inside the blackness of a cave without a source of light.

But the best part of the cave took some exploring to uncover. In the large room at the entrance of the cave was a straight wall with an opening about eight feet from the floor. This opening was about four feet wide and led to a long crawl space just big enough for a relatively small person to travel on hands and knees. If you crawled for several minutes, you entered another room, about 20 feet square. That room was completely sealed on all sides and made the perfect "secret place" that is so essential to a boy's youth. We burned our names on the walls with carbide lamps and left messages for cavers who were yet to discover this splendid hideaway at some unknown time in the future.

When we became teenagers, we camped at the mouth of the cave,

spending the day exploring and the night just inside the opening. We built huge fires and roasted hot dogs and ate baked beans out of the can. Our menu may not have been fancy, but it sure tasted good to us. I'm certain the flavors were enhanced by the fact that we were "on our own." We sat by the fire, telling ghost stories and taking turns sleeping—while one of us stood guard for wildcats, bears, or other wild and imaginable beasts.

Years ago, when my boys were about eight and fifteen, I decided it was time for them and my wife to visit Big Field Cave. I invited several of my family members and friends to join us for a final visit to a favorite spot that had been such a large part of my youth. I was wonderfully surprised to learn that the cave itself had changed very little. Although we investigated many areas of the cave, I was disappointed to learn that I had gained enough weight to prevent me from going into the small room that I loved so much as a boy. All in all, it was a great full day of sharing memories and making memories with my family. I re-visit with great affection.

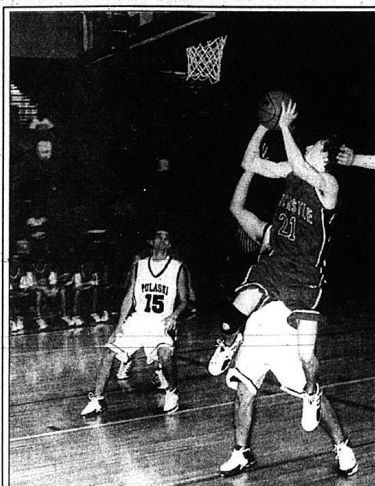
Freshmen lose three

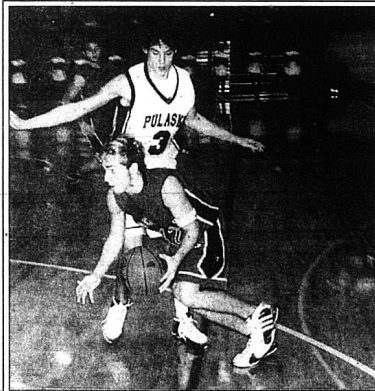

Freshman starts every game Johnna Abney makes impact at Middle Tennessee State University

She might not be big, but Johnna Abney has some big shoes to fill at MTSU. The 5-foot-4 freshman point guard from Mt. Vernon, Ky., has faced the task of replacing Patrice Holmes, who helped MTSU win two straight Sun Belt tournament titles and advance to the second round of the NCAA tournament during consecutive seasons.

And Abney didn't have long to think about the task at hand. In fact, she immediately took the starting spot in the season opener against Chattanooga and has started every game this season for MTSU (7-6).

"My thoughts were how in the world was I going to replace Patrice Holmes," Abney says. "I was a little nervous (at first), but it's worked out."

Abney's averaging 6.2 points per game while dishing out 22 assists and adding 15 steals on the season. She's the leading 3-point shooter on the team, hitting 23-of-65 attempts for 37 percent. Only fellow freshman LaCondra Mason has a better 3-point percentage at 1,000, but she's attempted — and made — only one trey this season.

Abney's the only player other than Mason whose 3-point percentage exceeds 22 percent.

"Lots of practice," Abney says of hitting 3-pointers. "I've spent many hours in gyms."

Everything is going well for Abney, but everything wasn't always so easy for her. She was a two-time all-state performer at Rockcastle High School in Mt. Vernon, Ky., in 2004 and 2005, and she earned 13th Region Player of the Year honors in 2005 while becoming the school's all-time leading scorer with 2,051 points.

But an injury scoured schools. As a junior she tore an ACL. Many schools ignored Abney after her injury, but MTSU showed interest, and Abney noticed.

"They came along after I tore my ACL my junior year," says Abney, who led Kentucky in free-throw percentage at 88.2 and is 6-of-6 from the line this season. "The facilities are

nice (at MTSU). I couldn't ask for anything better."

Abney signed with MTSU, but former coach Stephany Smith left for Alabama, and Rick Insell, longtime coach at Shelbyville Central High School, was named the new Lady Raiders' head coach.

"I really had no expectations," Insell says of Abney. "I didn't know anything about her. We didn't get to look at her until school started back."

Insell was soon sold on her. "I'm extremely positive and happy," Insell says. "For a freshman to come in and contribute in Division I basketball (is good). She's what I like in a point guard. She's hard-nosed. She plays good defense."

She's worked hard to improve, and the results are showing. Abney had a career night against Austin Peay 28, scoring a career-high 14 points while hitting a career-best four 3-pointers. She also added a career-high four assists. On two occasions she's gone an entire game without committing a turnover.

"I'm like coach Insell is on the sidelines," Abney says of her play. "I just coach them (on the floor)."

Abney knew she had to win over her teammates if she was going to be successful, and her goal is coming to fruition.

"I think she's done a tremendous job," says MTSU junior guard Chrissy Givens, who leads the Lady Raiders with 19.8 points per game.

"Against Austin Peay she attacked and hit big shots."

"She's not going to be bossy," Givens adds. "She lets you know in a good way (if there's something wrong). She can handle the pressure."

This season hasn't exactly been without pressure. Not only is Abney starting at point guard, she's done so against solid competition. MTSU's faced No. 17 Georgia, as well as Virginia of the ACC and Penn State of the Big Ten.

"That's what a non-conference schedule should do," Insell says of how a tough schedule has helped Abney. "Our non-conference schedule is tough."

Now, MTSU faces the meat of its schedule as Western Kentucky looms Sunday at Murphy Center. Abney, however, thinks she'll be ready.

"We're pretty fired up," Abney says of opening Sun Belt play. "This is our gym."

Givens also thinks Abney will be ready for the stretch run.

"The way she's had to fill Trice's shoes, I think she's done a great job," Givens says. She's filling the shoes and hopes to pick up where Holmes left off for the Lady Raiders.

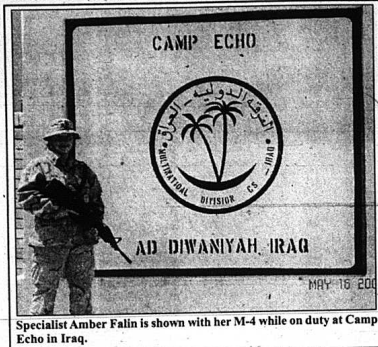

lars. The budget Bray presented does not include grants for the system of \$3 million.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education gets approximately 30 continuing grants from state and federal funds for items such as professional development for employees, student textbooks, pre-school, Title One and Special Education...

The Rockcastle County Board of Education has over 500 employees, and of \$23 million dollar budget, \$15 million is spent on salaries.

The school system is also currently working on plans for a new Kentucky Technology Center, at a cost of \$8 million, which will be attached to the Rockcastle County High School, according to Bray. The new technology center will replace the current vocational school, which is across from the Rockcastle County Middle School.

is against drug trafficking in our county, it destroys families." He went on to say that "We the county and sheriff's office drug enforcement officers could be on duty by funding 100% of the salaries for these officers, including DARE officer Mike Bryant, before reimbursement. We provided overtime money and gasoline expenses. I don't think to ever hear that this court is not 100% committed to enforcing drug laws in our county."

Carlotifis went on to point out that the Sheriff's department had not presented claims for \$4,700 which the court had approved for gasoline and phone expense for the last three months of the year, after the court ended fee pooling September 30, 2005. And, he also pointed out that the Sheriff's Department had not provided another deputy to work with Operating UNITE after Bo Harris transferred in mid-2005, even though this salary is fully reimbursed by the federal government.

"If the Sheriff had come in today and asked us to work with him, we might have been able to work something out," Carlotifis said. In an exchange of the magistrates about providing some gas expense money and upfront funding for reimbursable salaries but could not discuss this with the Sheriff since no one was present at the meeting.

Carlotifis then asked if there was a motion from any magistrate to approve the sheriff's budget as presented. No motion was made and then Carlotifis asked if anyone wanted to make a motion to approve any help. There was also no response to this question.

County Treasurer Joe Clontz asked Carlotifis if he knew the consequences of the Sheriff's budget not being approved. Carlotifis responded that he was not sure but he had contacted the Department of Local Government and he didn't think the Sheriff's department would be allowed to make any expenditures without an approved budget.

Carlotifis went on to say that the Fiscal Court has a "fiduciary responsibility to see that the county's money is expended in a wise manner and, particularly, that not more than 65% be expended by December 31, 2006."

At Tuesday's meeting, Magistrates William Denny, who had to be in Louisville and David Gibbs, who is a school bus driver, were not in attendance.

Sheriff's Response

When contacted after the meeting Tuesday, Sheriff Darrell Doan told this reporter that he "didn't think

there was any problem. All it is just a fuss between us and them." When asked why he or a representative did not attend the meeting, Doan said "I'm not going to go over there and argue with them."

Doan did dispute that he would not be able to make any expenditures without an approved budget. He said he had also contacted the Department of Local Government and he understood that he would be able to make expenditures.

When told that the court was willing to help with expense money for gas and to front salaries, Doan said he had also contacted the Department of Local Government and he understood that he would be able to make expenditures.

Doan went on to say: "They (the court) want me to lay off all my deputies and the people of this county are going to suffer for police protection." He added, "We have give all we can give and stay afloat."

Doan also said that his department had submitted claims for gas reimbursement for the last three months of September but had been told by Carlotifis' secretary that the court was not paying claims after January 1st. However, Patricia Martin, secretary to Carlotifis, said Wednesday that she had just received the \$2,000 claim (Wednesday) and only for one month, December. Martin said there had never been a claim made for the \$2,000 allowance for October.

Carlotifis' Statement

Wednesday morning, the Signal office received, by fax, the following

ing statement from Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotifis:

"The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court's magistrates and county judge/executive have a fiduciary obligation - by law - to oversee the taxpayer's resources in a manner consistent with responsible management.

In order to help those offices (in this instance, the Sheriff's Department) that have routine cash-flow shortages, the magistrates and county judge/executive have paid, and are still paying, from the county general fund the \$118,800/year which is paid from the county's General Fund. Also, when the present sheriff came into office, a number of new federal and state programs were initiated, among them the drug enforcement deputies assigned to the local sheriff that are reimbursed by the federal government. In order to assure that the local sheriff's department could pay these deputies, in a timely manner, the fiscal court elected to pre-pay those salaries that were reimbursable by both the state and federal governments.

Our fiscal court is still willing to provide that funding for those deputies."

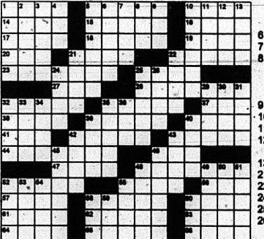

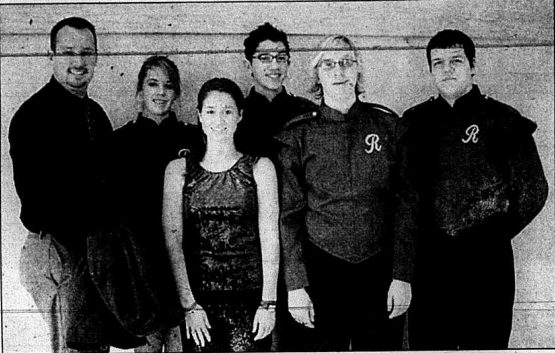
