The letter want on to say that: "Should a county fiscal court pass an imbalanced fee office budget, the county fiscal court would be required to mikke certain that the remaining county budget leaves enough of a surplus to counter the deficit in the fee office budget." This obstern the court's contention that they would be responsible for overexpenditures in the budget which would put a strain on the general fund, possibly endan-gering the 35% of funds in all ac-counts that must be available for a possible new administration January 1, 2007. 1 2007

The letter went on to say "Should the fee officer be unwilling to amend the fee officer's proposed budget, the county would be within its rights to draft and pass a balanced budget for that fee officer."
According to the letter, the county possesses the power to impose a fee office budget on a fee officer though their Home Rule powers. "These powers allow the county fiscal court to 'Regulate and control the (Cont. 10.4).

Four guilty pleas accepted in Rockcastle Circuit Court

Four Rockcastle County men have pled guilty in Circuit Court in the last

pled guilty in Circuit Court in the last week.

Billy Joe DeBoard, 27, of Hwy 70 Brodhead was indicted in November of 2005 for the offense of promoting contraband into the Rockcastle County Detention Center last June. He also received a one year sentence for receiving stolen groperty. Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley recommended a sentence of six years in the state penitentiary on both charges. Rockcastle Memories

Last Friday afternoon while driving home from work, I heard on the
radio a tribute to Buddy Holly,
Richie Valens, and The Big Bopper
(J.R. Richardson). It was 47 years ago
on February 3, 1959, that the fatal
plane crash occurred just outside
Clear Lake, but 1959.
I remember the following morning well. At that time, one of my
friends from high school, Jim Barton
Nunnelley, had a paper route and
occasionally asked me ride with him
on his Mopod scooter to help deliver
the Courier Journal in Mt. Vernon.
That morning the shock of the headline was overwhelming. When we
picked up the papers, we learned that
the three had been killed the night
before.

Buddy was such a huge part of our lives at that time. We searched the radio for each of his recordings.

Buddy Holly and the Crickets first record, "That "IB the Day," (1957) had sold over a million copies. Two other recordings, "Peggy Suc and "Early In The Morning," were also chart toppers. At the time of his dehalf with Holly (22) had produced three albums.

Over the years, that fatal day has been referred to as The Day The Music Died. Don McLean's 1971 song, "American Pie" contains many references to this day, including the phrase itself. The entire song is a tribute to Buddy Holly and a commen-tary on how rock and roll changed in the years following his death. "American Pie" reached number one "American Pie" reached number one on the music charts in the US in 1972.

Coping With Colic

Having a colicty baby can take much of the fun out of being a new feedings and flails his arms and legs about is a trying experience. Nothing seems to calm the baby for more than a few minutes. Dozens of possible causes have been suggested, but no single cause is well-accepted. Everything from allergies to colon spasms and family tension to faulty feeding techniques has been blamed. It is difficult for the new parents, who begin to doubt their ability as parents and feel like failures. Also, the physical and mental exhaustion can be a real stress on the family. Fortunately, colic is self-limited and will improve with time no matter what you do. These babies are often good feeders who grow well. They are plump and healthy and there are no long-term, effects or health problems for these babies are often good feeders who grow well. They are plump and healthy and there are no long-term, effects or health problems for these babies. There is no medical cure for colic, although many physicians will prescribe antispasmodics or sedatives to help the symptoms. An exam is always important to make sure that there is not another cause for the crying, such as bernias, thrush, or infections.

It is useful to try feeding the baby more slowly and in an upright position with frequent burping. Giving smaller feedings is often helpful. Breast feeding mothers should deliminate milk products from their dets and formula fed babies may try a soy formula.

If efforts to comfort the baby do not help in 30 minutes, leave the baby alone for 20-30 minutes. Remember, the most important treatment is giving the baby time to develop—the colic will eventually go away.

Low-fat diets may be misleading...

Dear Editor,

I wanted to express my concern I wanted to express my concern regarding media rejorts on a recent major study on low-fat diets that may be misleading the public because they suggest that current advice to reduce the risk of heart disease and cancer are wrong. In fact, the study, tested diet advice that is 10-20 years

tested duet advice has its 10-20 years out of date.

The Women's Health Initiative (WHI), which randomly assigned almost 50,000 women to eat either a low-fat diet or their typical diet, found no significant difference between the groups' risks of breast cancer, colorectal cancer, or cardiovascular disease. However, health autorities including the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences, the American Heart As-

Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences, the American Heart Association, the American Cancer Society, and the Departments of Health and Human Services and Agriculture have not recommended a low-fat diet for at least a decade, if at all. Since that time, heard disease experts have recommended replacing bad fats (saturated, and trans) with good fats (polyunsaturated and monounsaturated). In the WHI, women who were told to eat a low-fat diet cut back only modestly on all fats, so they did not benefit from an

increase in good fats. Furthermore, women on the low-fat diet were eating only slightly less bad fat than the women who were told to eat their usual diets, reducing the odds that researchers would see a difference in the groups' heart disease rates. The American Cancer Society's current guidelines recommend eating more fruits and vegetables, choosing whole zarian over refined grains and

whole grains over refined grains and sugars, limiting the consumption of red meats, limiting alcohol, maintain-ing a healthful weight, and staying

physically active.

Unfortunately, many farty foods in the average American diet are high in bud fat. Those foods include highfat meat, pizza, pies, pastries, frostedaces, full-flat tice cream, butter, stick margarine, doughnuts, and most commercially fried foods (chicken, fish, and French fries). So people who mistakenly conclude that they needn't watch their fat intake are likely to eat more bad fat.

Media reports also downplayed an intriguing result in the study on breast cancer. The data suggest that a low-fat diet may reduce the risk of breast tumors that respond to estrogen but not progesterone. Future research may clarify whether diet reduces the risk of some tumors but not others. Sincerely,

Conservation District Cost Share program announced

The Rockeastle County Conserva-tion District began accepting requests for cost share funding under the Ken-ucky Soil Erosion and Water Ouil-ity Cost Share Program February 1 and extending through February 28, 2006.

The Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program was created in 1994 created by the Kentucky General Assembly to help agricultural and silviculture opera-tions protect the soil and water re-

tions protect the soil and water re-sources of the Commonwealth. This financial and technical assistance financial and technical assistance program assists individual agriculture producers in the development and implementation of their agriculture water quality plans, which are required under state law. Any person engaged in agricultural or stivicultural operations is eligible to apply through the local conservation district, which oversees the installation of best management practices.

The State Cost Share program gives a high priority to animal waste related problems and agricultural dis-trict participants where pollution problems have been identified.

problems have been identified.
The best management practices approved through the State Cost Share program help reduce animal waste nutrents, prevent the loss of topsoil and minimize sediment and other pollutants to Kentucky's streams, rivers, lakes and groundwa-

ter supplies.

Among the eighteen practices eligible under this program, some of the most frequently installed practices are Agricultural Waste Control Facility, Heavy Use Area Protection, Rotational Grazing System Establishment, Stream Crössing and Streambank Stabilization.

other practices. In the first eleven years of this program, the Division of Conserva-tion has received 19,105 applications seeking \$197 million in cost share assistance. Based on the available funds to the program in each of these years, 6,263 of these applications

years, 6,269 of these applications have been approved for a total of \$71.2 million.

Finding for practices will be approved by the Soil and Water Conservation Commission and the Kentucky Division of Conservation, located in Frankfort, as funds are available. Approved applicants will be notified in July of 2006 and they will have 12 months to complete their have 12 months to complete their

practice.

Acts 15 shows us that the Bible teaches us in 3 basic ways: First by express statement or command. Secondly by approved "examples. Thirdly by necessary inference or implication. In vs.7–11 we see Peter relating what happen at the house of Cornelius. If God gave them the Holy Spirit, and purified their hearts by faith, thus they were accepted by God without circumcision, it was a necessary implication, for other conclusion could be drawn from what happened. In vs.12 Paul and Barnabas described how that God worked many miracles and wonders among the Gentiles on their 1" preaching tour. So by this example the matter of not being circumcised was proven. Then in vs.13-19 James sights the expressed words of the prophets to prove by express statement, that the Gentiles do not have to be circumcised to, be saved. Thus all 3 ways of establishing truth were used at this meeting. This is the way we will establish Bible Authority.

Another lesson, on authority can be gleaned from this chapter, is in vs.2.4. We read of some who taught "Pe must be circumcised, and keep the law: to whom we gave no such commandment." We learn that the silence of God is prohibitive and not permissive. Many think that if God does not give a specific 'Thou shall-not' that this authorizes one to act on God's silence, such is no true!





Legislative Update

House turns attention to funerals, mine safety and teen drivers

Early last week I joined my colleagues in the House in approving BH 333, legislation that prevents protestors and demonstrators from discripting finerals and memorial services - including military funerals and memorial services - including military funerals and memorial services - including of demonstrating within 300 feet of a funeral or memorial service of a funeral or memorial service and class A misdemeanor. House Bill 333 also applies the 300-foot buffer account of the funeral home, cemetery and procession. Sadly, the bill has become necessary as protesters across the nation have targetted military funerals and burials as a way to get publicity for their cause. Since HB 333 can not apply to federal property, we fiso approved a House Concurrent Resolution - HCR 142 - that urges the United States Congress to pass similar legislation that would criminalize the disruption of military funerals and memorial services, on federal property including Fort Knox and Fort Campbell here in Kentucky.

We also passed a bill to make absentee voting more convenient by implementing the use of fax machines. House Bill 464 would allow

county clerks to fax absentee ballots and absentee ballot applications to qualified voters. Absentee voters include residents of Kentucky who are members of the Armed Forces, dependents of members of the Armed Forces, and citizens residing overseas as well as students who temporarily reside outside the county of their residence and other voters who temporarily dence and other voters who tempo-rarily reside outside the state but who

rarly reside outside the state but who rea till eligible to vote in this state. Another measure that received unanimous approval by the Kentucky State House of Representatives this week was HB 503, legislation aimed at improving coal mine safety. House Bill 503 includes requirements for mine rescue teams, more self-con-tained self-rescuer equipment, mine

safety inspections, and electronic tracking and communications devices. The bill's provisions also require coal mine operators to report to federal and state, authorities any accidents involving serious injury or loss of life with 15 minutes of the accident or after communications become available, or risk being fined between \$1000 and \$100,000. The measure would also prohibit anyone from aftering a mine accident scene. Mine operators would be required to post emergency, toll-free hotline tele-

phone numbers for reporting acci-dents or unsafe working conditions. House Bill 503 would also increase dents or unsafe working conditions. House Bill 303 would also increase the frequency of state inspections of mines for safety compliance to a quarterly inspection of each mine. The mine safety legislation would also established nine-member panel, to review and recommend wireless communications and tracking devices for designation by the state commissioner as approved, required mine safety equipment for use in Kentucky mines, as well as to require that miners with approved wireless tracking and communications devices The bill would also require that each underground eval mine in the state have a commissioner-approved plan in place that provides additional self-contained safety and rescue devices and luminescent directional signs for locating oxygen.

self-contained sately and rescue ofvices and luminescent directional signs for locating oxyga and We also passed HB 90, legislation that creates a six-month interim driv-ers license for teenage drivers be-tween the six-month learner's permit and a full licenses was passed by the House on Monday by a vote of 89-3. The proposed bill requires at least 60 hours of supervised bill requires at least 60 hours of supervised bill requires at least 60 hours of supervised hours at night, with a fully licensed driver who is at least 21 yeans of age, before the teen driver can apply for a full license. Driving would be prohibited between the hours of 12 midnight and 6 am. for an interim license holder, who would also be prohibited from words an interim license holder, who would also be prohibited from viving at any time with more than one passenger time with more than one passenger under the age of 20.
