VIEW FROM THE BENCH

Public Dominion of Kentucky Waterways

The right of the public to access Kentucky waterways is historically guaranteed and crucial to the continued use and enjoyment by future gerations. From time-to-time, groups or private entities seek to restrict the availability of waters in contravention of public interests.

The "public interests doctrine" arose from the English common law concept that lands flowed by tidal waters were held by the King for the benefit of the fight on. During the formation of the United States,



the United States. title to soils under

tide waters were reserved to the states' where they were located. Courts called upon to interpret these common law notions have repeatedly held that the States, upon entry into the Union, received ownership of all land under waters subject to the ebb and flow of the tide.

As the United States developed, so to did the concept of the public trust doctrine develop. By the later mid-1800's, courts came to recognize

mid-1800's, courts came to recognize as "the settled law of like county" that the lands under navigable freshwater lakes and rivers were within the public trust given to the States. The concept underlying this dottine is that the States bears the responsibility of preserving the historical right of the public to navigation upon the waterways within its own geographical borders.

In Kentucky, like most other states, courts have held that while landowners may own to the middle lender of the lot adjacent/alseshores, those injuriant in plant as the substantial to adjacent/alseshores, those injuriant in plant as quantified to the landowners may be used to the substantial to riparian rights are subordinate to the public's right to the use of navigable

waters.

A 1985 Kentucky case determined that the "public right of navigation" includes travel upon the waterways but also the "right to use the public waterways for recreational





Legislative Update

State House acts to protect Kentuckians

Legislators moved quickly last week to keep up to date on the issues before us this session as several key bills passed either legislative committees or the full House.
One of the first bills we passed this week was HB 256, a measure that protects the jobs of volunteer friefighters and other first responders injured in the line of duty passed the State House today. In addition to firefighters, the bill also protects other first responders, including rescue squad members, emergency medical technicians, peace officers and members of an emergency management agency. House Bill 256 would require an employer to keep to be pen for up to 12 months but allow them to request a written statement from a doctor detailing the in-

juries and when the volunteer can return to work. The bill passed on a vote of 98-0. 



When his family went out for a meal, he was mobbed by well-wishers. A neighborhood boy came by to get a bascheall autographed.

McElwain, 5-foot-6, was considered too small to make the junior varsity, so he signed on as team manager. He took up the same role with the varsity, doing anything to stay mear the sport he loves. Coach Jim Johnson was impressed with his dedication, and thought about suiting up cation, and thought about suiting up McElwain for the home finale. His performance was jaw-dropping: 20 points in four minutes, making 6-of-

The State House also passed HB 44. legislation that requires law en forcement officers request to perform breath, blood, and urine tests on all drivers involved in a fatal motor vehicle accident within two hours of the accident. The bill is aimed at providaccident. The bill is aimed at provid-ing our law enforcement officers with another tool in their efforts to inves-tigate accidents as well as a way to identify when substance abuse has led to an automobile accident that resulted in death.

resulted in death.

Substance abuse also received attention when we passed HB 67, legislation that would require the State
Medical Examiner's Office to report the total number of deaths related to illegal drugs - those where illegal drugs - those where illegal drugs can be detected in the body. The bill would also require tracking of deaths caused by inappropriate use of prescription drugs, when indicated by history or autopsy. House Bill 67, which passed 97-0, also includes a section that requires the State Medical Examiner's Office to provide annual report to the Justice Cabinet Secretary, including detailed information. the total number of deaths related to

Secretary, including detailed information.

The House Judiciary Committee passed one bill aimed at two very big goals - preventing identity theft and enforcing child support payments. House Bill 111 would delete a current state law that requires that Social Security numbers be included on marriage license and a section that requires county clerks to store Social. Security numbers. Social Security numbers, as well as other forms of identification, would still be required to apply for a marriage license and at that time the number will be forwarded to an agency responsible for enforcing child support.

Members of the House Banking and Insurance passed SB 49, consumer protection legislation that targets the retail and redti gift cards that have grown in popularity over the bast five years. These gift cards pro-

sumer protection legisation that air gest the retail and credit gift cards that have grown in popularity over the past five years. These gift cards provide convenience and an opportunity for recipients to choose what they would like. However, several companies have attached expiration dates, service charges and fees that can actually reduce the value of the gift card dramatically. Senate Bill 49 sets minimum lengths of time for the expiration of gift cards issued by businesses or charitable organizations, as well as limits on the service charges or fees. The bill also mandates that a gift card sold without an expiration date is valid until redeemed or replaced. med or replaced.





Tax refund scams

Rockcastle County Extension Office Taxpayers need to be aware of the refund seams. A page on the IRS Web site says, "The Internal Revenue Ser-vice recently issued a consumer alert about an Internet seam in which con-sumers receive an e-mail informing them of a tax refund. The e-mail, which claims to be from the IRS, di-rects the consumer to a link that re-quests personal information, such as Social Security number and credit card information. "This scheme is an attempt to trick the e-mail recipients into disclosing their personal and financial data. The practice is called 'phishing for in-formation." The purpose of the seam is to steal your identity. According to Sophos, an antivirus software protection company, the

According to Sopnos, an antivirus software protection company, the problem is caused by a security configuration error on the IRS site that figuration error on the IRS site that enables criminals to divert you to their site. 





Social Security officials warn public of new email scam

Jo Anne Barnhart, Commissioner of Social Security, and Patrick O'Carroll, Jr., Inspector General of Social Security, issued a warning to-day about a new email scam that has

Social Security, issued a warning today about a new mail scam that has surfaced recently.

The Agency has received several reports of an email message being circulates addressed to "Dear Social Security Number And Card owner" and purporting to be from the Social Security Number and Card owner" and purporting to be from the Social Security Administration. The message informs the reader "that someone illegally is using your Social Security and directs the reader to a website designed to look like Social Security in the reader to a website designed to look like Social Security in the standard. "I have asked the Inspector General to use all the resources at his command to find and prosecute whoever is perpetuting this fraud."

Once directed to the phony website, the individual is asked to confirm their identity with "Social Security and bank information."

Specific information about the individual's credit card number, extended and PIN number is then requested. "Whether on our online wheshis to by hone, Social Security will never ask you for your credit card information or your PIN number," Commissioner Barnhart said. Inspector General O'Carroll Tecommends people always take precuments become the security outpersonal information. "You should never provide your Social Security number or other personal information over the Internet or by telephone unless you are extremely confident of the source to whom you are proyeding the in-

are extremely confident of the source to whom you are providing the information," O'Carroll said.
