

Chief Justice Joseph Lambert elected to third term as the Chief Justice of Kentucky

The justices of the Supreme Court of Kentucky voted Monday to elect Chief Justice Joseph E. Lambert to a third four-year term as Chief Justice, which will begin Oct. 2, 2006. The Kentucky Constitution provides that the justices of the Supreme Court shall elect one of their number to serve as Chief Justice for a term of am grateful for the continued

"I am grateful for the continued confidence of my colleagues," said Chief Justice Lambert. "I appreciate the opportunity to follow through on the important initiatives being carried out by the Kentucky Court of Jus-

the important initiatives being carned out by the Kentucky Court of Justice."

Chief Justice Lamber joined Supreme Court in 1987 after being elected by the citizens of the 3rd Supreme Court District, which is comprised of 27 counties in Southcentral Kentucky. He was named Kentucky's fourth chief justice in 1998 by a vote of this Supreme Court Colleagues. The justices voted again on April 15, 2002, to elect him to a second term

which began Oct. 2 of that year. Chief Justice Lambert's current eight-year term as a justice of the Supreme Court runs through 2010.

During his tenure, Chief Justice Lambert has focused on implementing cutting-edge programs in teghnology, court records, judicial education, justice facilities, pretrial services, promotion of women, and Family and Drug courts. As a result, the Ken-

And the Truth Shall Set You Free: Kentucky's Polygraph Prohibition

It may come as no surprise to most that Kentucky continues to ban the use of polygraph evidence during tri-als, but a surprising number of op-ponents to this rule frequently com-plain about trial judges enforcing this



Kentucky is one of many jurisdictions which imposes a "per se" ban on the use of polygraph test results. The Kentucky Supreme Court has determined "that the results of not results of poly-

results of poly-graph examina-able and are therefore inadmissable in evidence". Moreover, our courts have gone even further and generally forbid even the mention of the tak-

ing of a polygraph examination, though some latitude is given where the mention is merely in passing and the trial court directs the jury to discrept the properties of these rulings are family or friends of a crime victim involving cases of

of these rulings are family of friends of a crime victim involving cases of questionable strength. Obviously, testimony that a defendant failed a polygraph exam or refused to submit to a requested exam could greatly bolster the prosecution. Understandably concerned with the outcome of the trial, critics perceive an injustice by permitting an offender to go free upon a mere "technicality".

The converse of the same argument receives less attention—where a defendant seeks to admit a polygraph examination, usually arranged

I firmly believe that with the recent events of courtroom violence, courtroom security is becoming an even greater area of concern for citizens. Court security in Rockcastle County has been greatly improved under my administration and will continue to be improved as new technologies and techniques are incorporated into our plan. You, the people of Rockcastle County, should feel safe when serving as jurors or while attending court, and as long as I am sheriff, I will ensure the transit deliver the initial telliper the initial court. that we will deliver the highest level of service and security to your courts. This week, I want to talk with you about some of the most important duties of the sheriff, patrolling roads and investigating major crimes.

Another Promise Kept....

I promised four years ago that if elected sheriff, I would see that the roads of Rockcastle County were patrolled and that major crimes such as homicide, robbery, burglary, and thefts would be investigated thoroughly and that those who commit these crimes would be brought to justice. The year before I took office, in 2002, there were only 26 arrests for these major crimes. Last year, we made 122 arrests for these major crimes, an increase over the 2002 results of 369%. These were arrests made of those who broke into your homes, stole your property, or assaulted your loved ones. I believe that no one should have to suffer as a result of crime not being investigated. I was the first sheriff to appoint a full-time detective to investigate major crimes. Last year, my office made arrests for major crimes more than all the other county agencies *combined*, including the state police.

As your sheriff, I think it is important to have full-time, academy-trained deputies patrolling the roads and investigating these crimes. I promised four years ago that my road deputies and detectives would be academy-trained and competent to perform their duties. I have also kept this promise – every road deputy or detective that I have employed is academy certified and professional. I believe that you the people of Rockcastle County deserve this level of service, and if re-elected, I will continue to select that his poly these deputies are to select and hire only those deputies who are qualified to serve you.

Thank you again to all of you who have already shown support to me and my family. I believe that together, we can continue to make Rockcastle County a better place for us and our children.

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



"Memories"

On weekends, we could go skating in Berea or visit the local Vernon
Thera. We never had fear for our
lives. We were safe. The only dangerous thing that we did ocasionally
was drag racing. And even then, we
always chose a long straight stretch
of road and used care not to race if
another car was coming. Drig racing meant that we would see who
could get to 60 miles an hour first, or
mark the road for a quarter of a mile
mark the road for a quarter of a mile mark the road for a quarter of a mile and see who could reach that point first. Believe it or not, we were quite

careful.

Some evenings we gathered our cars at the dam (water reservoir), turned up the volume on our car radios, and listened to Dack Biondi from WLS in Chicago. He was our source of the newest rock and roll music. We feltfree and safe to be out. with no fear of being attacked or bused. It was just a time to enjoy our friendships. There was a feeling of security and well-being that I fear many youngsters of today do not ex-

perience.

Dick Fain and I were talking a few months ago about how safe we felt then. None of us had air conditioning in our homes, and we just left the screen doors open. Windows also had screens in them -- without fear of anyone trying to break in. We sim-ply attended school, played sports, worked for our expenses, went to church, listened to our music, and

drove around in our cars. What a cool way to grow up!

We led full lives that were enhanced by our friends and our families and our involvement with the community. It isn't that there weren't times of trouble or sadness, there were of course. But when they came, we were close enough to one another survive in relative comfort. Fear did not reign in our lives. In the words of Paul Simon: "Time it was, what a time it was

The bable could seat twenty-eight without any extension, as sometimes were used. Dinner was served promptly at eight, and each guest was pampered like royalty. Each guest had an assigned servant to cater to every need. This included keeping up with various changes of clothing that was needed during the typical day. There was the morning attire, afternoon attire, dresses for tea, and of course, everyone was to be suitably dressed for dinner. The Vanderbilts employed a household staff alone of a little over liftly people. That doesn't include farm workers, grounds-keepers, stable-people, and a variety of others that kept this estate going. It was also a self-sustaining farm that had its own vegetable gardens, various orchards, a dairy, and here dis of cattle, pigs, and the like for the Vanderbilt's dining pleasure. ing pleas

doling pleasure.

Also on the first floor was a less formal, but yet very grand, dining room that was used for breakfast. The walls were entirely covered by handworked Spanish leather. Then there was a satting room where there was a small table with a chess-board laid out in the wood off the tabletop. It had come from Napoleon's palace at the Creatilles. It seems that upon his death, his heart was extracted from his body, and set in a silver chalicon this very table for several days. Go figure.

Behind the sitting room, and running about half the length of a foot-ball field, was an outside terrace where you could sit at your leisure and view the vast, rolling landscape, gardens, and a man-made lake, all within the Vanderbilt's own back yard. George owned thousands of acrees of land, too. I told Stanley that this would be the ideal place to have

our first barbecue. We could pop a few burgers on the grill, and invite a few firends and neighbors. Studiely said that people would think that rednecks had invided the Bilmore. I thought that it would be a good way to show the social elite what a real neighborty cookout could be. Of course, we intended to drink our powers with our little pinkies up so they wouldn't think we were too crude. By wouldn't think we were too crude. By this time, I was pointing out where I would change this and that and paint such-and-such a different color.

Stanley said that I was probably the first person in history to start finding fault with the Biltmore House. What could I say? I was looking to buy.

The music room housed many magnificent pieces of art including porcelain figurines of the twelve apostles, and of course, a grand pi-no. During World War II, Washington used this room to house some of the nations' most prized pieces of art incase of an attack. The tour of the first floor ended in the library. The Valderbilts had collected very rare books from all over the world. Over ten thousand volumes filled their library, which was two stories tall. Quite a few of the books were in for-incipal negatives. music room housed many eign languages, as George Vanderbilt was fluent in nine languages. Before getting to the library, was a long sit-ting room with over four-hundredyear-old one of a kind tanestries

year-old, one of a kind, tapestries where they entertained their guests.

On the second floor were most of the bedrooms, including two master suites, those of Mr. and Mrs. Vanderbilt, as well as many gorgeous guest rooms, each decorated in the finest of furniture and rare pieces of all. There were more user to come of were more guest rooms on the third floor equally as nice. Even the servants' rooms on the fourth

floor were quality accommodations,

floor were quality accommodations, considering their position.

The first three floors were connected by a massive, free-standing, stone staircase. The basement and the fourth floor had separate staircases. The basement was a maze of novelties that included three kitchens, a launder flora con-bled when their staircases. laundry, floral room, bake shop, varilaundry, floral room, bake shop, vari-tious pantries, walk-in refrigerators, a bowling alley, gym. a full-sized heated swimming pool, and more servant's quartes. Biltmore had a stable connected to the house that had been converted to a restaurant where we ate lunch. Of course, we got a few gifts at the gift shop. The self-contained estate

had a winery, which we toured, a farm village, riding trails, and many beautiful gardens other than the two hurdred and fifty room-house. All of this made for quite a sight. Now that our tour of the Biltmore

estate has come to a close, we'll ven-ture on to Charlotte, and Fairmont, the hometown of the Oxendine clan.

I have a half-brother whom I have never met, and he may or may not know that I exist. I have been trying to sontact him for years, and this may be that once-in-a-lifetime opportu-nity. Will I meet him, or will I not? Tune in next week-same bat-time, same bat-channel

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

"If you suspect a child is being armed or is at risk of harm, contact the local Department for Community Based Services office or the police. It's the law," said Lisa Durbin, manager of the department's Child Safety Branch in the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services.

The cabinet is emphasizing this message during April, which Governor Ernie Fletcher has proclaimed Child Abuse Prevention Month. "One of the most important things people can do to keep kids safe is to report abuse when they suspect it," Durbin said. "It's easy, and it's confidential."

The state's toll-free, 24-hour abuse reporting hot line is (800) 752-6200. Kentuckians may also report to their county DCBS office, or if a child is in imminent danger, to local

child is in imminent danger, to local police or 911 operators.

Last year, the cabinet received reports of more than 67,000 children being abused or neglected. About 31,000 were accepted for investigation, and 9,966 of those were substantiated.

tiated.

Some reports aren't accepted if
they don't meet criteria to warrant an
investigation.

"If there is a question about
whether a particular situation is abuse
or neglect, we always prefer the person make the call and talk over what
has come to their attention," Durbin said. "Our social workers are trained

said. "Our social workers are trained to help callers sort things out. They collect very thorough information that allows us to know whether a specific incident can be investigated per statute or regulation."

Durbin said vital information to have when reporting abuse and neglect includes the child's name, approximate age, address, parents names and where the child is located at the time the call is made. Specific names and where the child is located at the time the call is made. Specific information about why you believe the child is being abused or neglected and by whom, as well as the names and phone numbers of other people who might have information, about

the reported abuse or neglect, is also important.

While the cabinet's first priority is to protect children, another goal is to strengthen the families involved in abuse allegations.

"In many cases, the cabinet works with families to overcome the barriers that prevent parents from caring for their children and keeping them safe," Durbin recommended some simple things to help children, such as spending time with a stressed parent and offering to listen, giving parents a break by watching their kids for an hour, or offering words of encouragement to neighborhood kids.

"The protection of children is everyone's business," she said. "We cannot do it alone. It ruly does take a village to rise a child."

Child Abuse Prevention Strategies
Childhelp USA, a national, nonprofit child abuse prevention group. offers these tips for preventing and recognizing possible child abuse:

Never discipline a child when your anger is out of control.

Participate in your child's activities and get to know your child's friends.

Never leave your child unattended, especially in a car.



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

If the contract was enrolled an or before February 8, 2006 producers may request up to 50% for the direct advance payment and if the contract was enrolled after February 8th producers may request up to 40% for the direct advance payment.

All owners, operation at tenants who share in the DCP payment on the farm must sign the CCC-509.

Forms with signatures obtained af-ter June 1 but before September 30, 2006 will be accepted, but the farm will be assessed a late-file sign-up fee

will be assessed a late-file sign-up fee of \$100.00. The form FSA-578, Crop Certification, must be filed before final payments can be issued. Farm producers must apply for DCP each year and can cancel for any year if they so choose either by visiting the FSA office or on-line. (CRP) Sign-Up 33 USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will hold a Conservation Re-serve Program (CRP) general sign-up from March 27 to April 14, 2006.

up from March 27 to April 14, 2006. CRP is a voluntary program that helps agricultural producers safeguard environmentally sensitive land. Producers enrolled in CRP plant. long-term, resource-conserving cov-ers to control soil erosion, improve water and air quality, and enhance wildlife habitat. In return, FSA pro-vides participants with rental pay-ments and cost-share assistance. Contract duration is between 10 to 15 years.

Contract duration is between 10 to 15 years. Land that is not currently enrolled in CRP may be offered for enrollment during CRP sign-up 33. In addition, CRP participants with contracts ex-piring on Sept. 30, 2006, may sub-mit offers.

To submit CRP offers, producers must visit their local FSA office. FSA will accept offers only during the sign-up period (March 27 to April 14,

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
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






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
