Projects may still be funded

County loses three projects through governor's veto

Rockcastle County was one of the losers in the recent vetoes by Kentucky Governor Emie Fletcher.
According to State Representative Damy's Ford, Rockcastle lost three projects, which the General Assembly had included in next fissal year's budget, because the governor vetoed the single county coal severance dollars which would have been used to

fund the projects.

The governor's-veto of the single county coal money means those funds will now go into the Department of Load Government. Ford said the county's fiscal court will now have to make application to record funding for the three projects which includes: \$242,000 for improvements to the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame

and Museum: \$40,000 for reconstruction of the sidewalk on Lovell Lane in Mt. Vernon and \$17,500 for rice departments in the county. Of course, the decision on these projects will then be made by the state Department of Local Government. Still receiving funding, Ford said, is the \$1.1 million for the sewer line project around Lake Linville; \$1.5 million for the Rockastle County Vocational and Technical Center and \$100,000 for the Rockastle Industrial Authority to purchase the Jones building on Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

These projects were funded under the multi-county coal severance dol-lars fund which was left intact in the budget.

Fate of water system at Livingston discussed

The Livingston City Commissioners met with water customers Friday night, in a special meeting, to discuss the best way to deal with a financially-failing water system.

Joe Burns, project coordinator for Rural Water Assn., was present to explain the commissioner's options for dealing with the crisis. Those on-

reural water Assat, was present or explain the commissioner's options for dealing with the crisis. Those op-tions boiled down to raising water and sewer rates drastically or selling the system to the town's present wa-ter supplier, Woods Creek.

The city's financial problems with the water system were brought to a head after a hefty increase was ap-proved by the Public Service Com-mission for Woods Creek and which went into effect in January of this year. That increase, from \$1.23 to \$2.32 per thousand gallens, has caused the city to be \$10,500 in ar-rears since it increased their monthly

bill from around \$1,800 to \$3200-\$3500 per month.

At the commission's last regular meeting, there was the first reading

Act to Commissions t asst regular of an ordinance increasing water rates from \$17.30, for a minimum of 2500 gallons to \$25.50 for a minimum of 2500 gallons. Also, under the new rate structure, the sewer usage charge will be increased to a minimum of \$17.50 for 2000 gallons from \$14 from 2500 gallons.

According to Burns, and City Commissioner Katha Carpenter, the increased rates would help to offset Woods Creek's increase, provide funds to pay off the system's indebt-increased many commissions of the system's for repairs and maintenance of the system.

The other option Burns outlined
was that of selling the system to
Woods Creek and becoming a water

district. The city would receive no cash from the sale but would have the \$10,500 outstanding debt to Woods Creek and approximately \$80,000 owed to Runal Development absorbed by Woods Creek. Woods Creek would also receive the proceeds from a one million grant, already approved for Livingston for the water and sever department. Of the total grant, \$500,000 sho been funded but, Burns said, is now at the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority and,

he added, there is no time line for he added, there is no time line for funding of the second half of the grant. The money is for repairs and replacement of the system's lines but, "It could be five years before the city actually receives this money," Burns

While growing up, I had my own personal "Charlie Brown." He was one of my favorite uncles and the coolest guy I knew. Charles David Brown was the husband of my mother's sister, Ruth, and my mom named me after him. I think because my mother and I lived with her par-

Later in his life, Uncle Charles owned the Brown Monument Works on Walton Avenue in Lexington. During the summer, I occasionally got to visit my aunt and uncle, and he to visit my aunt and uncle, and he would let me go to work with him. It was so fascinating to watch him take a huge piece of polished marble, atch a piece of rubber to the face of the stone, and draw letters by hand on the rubber. Next, he used a razor knife to remove the letters. Then he cranked up the sand blaster, and I would watch the names on the grave-tone annex as they were cut into the stone appear as they were cut into the huge slab of marble. To a young im-pressionable boy, this constituted a miracle. He could actually carve

names in stone!

I loved it when Aunt Ruth and Uncle Charles came to visit us in Mt. Venno. He spent time talking to me and doing special things with me. Baby Talk is Important

Babies babble. They all babble, whether they have impaired hearing or normal hearing. It is a normal step in the development of speech. It begins as early as three months and peaks six months later. However, children who are deaf or have impaired hearing do not progress normally after the babbling stage. In fact, they may stop babbling earlier and fail to attain other milestones of speech development.

The following milestones should be observed in your child to make sure his hearing and speech development are progressing well.

The babbling peaks, just before a year of age and then in the 10-15 month age group, children begin to say their first real words. And they already know how to make their flathers proud—"dada" is usually their first word. Similar repetitive words, like mama and baba, should also come early.

By 18 months, the child should be saying many words—perhaps 50 to

repetitive words, like mama and baba, should also come early. By 18 months, the child should be saying many words—perhaps 50 to 100, and understanding many more. At age two, a child will be putting words together into phrases.

There are several warning signs to watch for in the first two years. These include a child who does not respond to his name by nime months, a child who has stopped babbling or has not started babbling at 12 months, a child who does not understand and respond to the words "no" and "byebye" at 15 months, only saying "mama" and "dada" at 18 months, and not putting words together by two years.

Baby talk is important. Listen to your child.

A Parents Unwanted Love: The Casey Wethington Act

Casey Wethington died at age 23 from a heroin overdose. At the time of his death, no laws permitted Kentucky parents to intercede in the inevitable downward spiral that accompanies serious drug addiction. Since Casey's death, and the unnecessary deaths of many other Kentucky

other Kentucky youth, courts have struggled with new legisla-tion designed to permit parents to compel the involuntary treatment of their adult chil-

dren.
This statute,
informally known as Casey's Law, has now been in effect for almost two years. The

law addresses an old problem cloaked in this era's most daunting social crisis . . . drug addiction-how can you help those who will not help themselves?. In the well known book, A River

In the well known book, A River Runs Through It, author Norman McClane chronicled his younger brother's battle with alcohol and chronic gambling which ultimately lead to his death. During one of his last sermons, McClane's father—a Methodist minister—described his own inability to help his son in words which remain true:

Each one of us here today will, during our own lives look upon a loved one in need, and ask the same question. We are willing to help Lord, but what, if anything, is needed. For its true we can seldom needed. For its true we can seldom

Lord, but what, it anything, is needed. For it is true we can seldom help those closest to us . . . either we do not know what part of our-selves to give, or more often than not, the part that we have to give is not

wanted.
Casey's Law permits almost anyone, but usually parents, to seek court
ordered long-term residential treatment for drug abusers whose lives are
seriously endangered. Upon the filing of a petition in the District Court,
the addict is evaluated and if sufficient proof is presented, the court
may order involuntary residential

Though well intentioned, the expected positive effects of this statute have not been immediately forthcoming. The biggest drawback of the statute is the expense of treatment. 

By the late 1940s, the Martins were tired of living out of suitcases and not being able to depend on sponsors. Seeing that concerts featuring only one or two groups were drawonly one or two groups were draw-ing crowds away from the old counvariety shows, they decided to tle in Rockcastle County.

Mr. Martin ran a service station Mr. Martin ran a service station in Renfro Valley with his brother, Curtis, and worked for Hysinger Care in Mr. Vermon. On Saturday nights for many years, Emory Martin performed at the Renfro Valley Barn Dance in Rockcastle County. A couple of years ago, Mr. Martin was featured in a segment of a TNT network Liars and Legends show about Renfro Valley entertainment.



Why would a 30-year-old man, with a wife and two sons volunteer to serve in a combat zone? In a word "duty," Jay said. His sense of "patriotism" and "loyalty" to his unit would not allow him to stay home when his buddies were going to war,

he said.

Jay gave up his work as a tile and hardwood installer and got back in uniform. By August, he was training at Fort Dix, NJ. In November, his unit arrived in Kuwait and, the next mooth, they were in Iraq, stationed.

The Blackhawk helicopter, is a versatile machine that can engage in combat air assault as well as deliver troops and supplies, Jay explained. The Blackhawk, with a crew of four, can transport 12 passengers or "quite a bit" of cargo, he said. "We try to move as much through the air as possible," Jay said. Improvised explosive devices, buried in or along roadways and suicide vehicle attacks on convoys, remain among the military's biggest problems in Iraq.



Calling Drug Court an extremely successful initiative to help substance-addicted persons, Congress-man Harold "Hal" Rogers presented Kentucky Supreme Court Chief Justice Joseph Lambert a \$2 million check from Operation UNITE to continue programs in the Fifth Congressional District.

Lambert accepted the check on

Lambert accepted the check on behalf of the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) during an appreciation dinner held at the Manchester Baptist Church on Monday, April 17. The AOC administers Kentucky's Drug Court programs and contracts with UNITE to provide services in southern and eastern Kentucky. The \$2 million will be used to any for drug treatment, drug testing and staff.

"Kentucky's crippling drug prob-Lambert accepted the check on

"Kentucky's crippling drug prob-lems cannot be solved through law lems cannot be solved through law enforcement alone," Rogers said. "Certainly there are habitual offend-ers who purposefully push drugs for aprofit, without regard for the health and welfare of others, but many people innocently become snared in the cycle of addiction. Drug Court provides assistance to those people."
"We've Carping for you heroes."

"We're clapping for you heroes here tonight," Rogers told those at-tending the dinner. "It's not easy work that you do. You're all about round live."

A Drug Court is a special court

supervision and treatment program Drug Court takes a non-adversarial team approach to criminal behavior

team approach to criminal behavior resulting from drug addiction.

"These Drug Courts, of all the efforts that we're doing, no other program touches the lives of the casual user more than this one." Rogers said. "You're the tough-lover."

Lambert is considered the architect and leading proponent of Kentucky's Drug Court, which has been recognized nationally as a model for excellence.

"This year we commencate the 10th anniversary of the state's Drug Court," Lambert said. "What began as a specially court experiment in

as a specialty court experiment in Fayette County in 1996 has now ex-panded to 53 programs serving 77

counties. Nearly one-third of that growth is the direct result of Opera-tion UNITE and the vision of Con-

Lambert also noted that the Ken-tucky General Assembly has pro-vided funding in the current budget

vided undring in the current budget to expand across the commonwealth. There are three types of Drug Court programs: Adult Circuit, Adult District and Juvenile. Not every county has each type of program, and

some Drug Court programs serve multiple countries. Before Operation UNITE was launched in April 2003 there were five Drug Court programs serving 10 counties in Rogers' district. Since February 2004, UNITE has now pro-vided \$5.2 million to fund 17 new

Drug Court programs that serve 20 counties. Combined, there are 20 Drug Court programs that serve 25 counties in the Fifth Congressional District.

"As we celebrate a decade of Kentucky Drug Court, our role has never been so important," Lambert stated.
"Since the mid-1980s, court dockets have exploded with drug cases, leaving fewer resources for serious, vio-lent offenders. Kentucky's drug-relent offenders. In addition, only 20.2 percent of Drug Court graduates were convicted of a new felony offense in the two years after they graduated, versus



Thus, in a very real sense, the prac-tice of having disputes resolved by a jury has become a right - a right of the people, by the people and for the neonle.

Jury trials also serve the all-important purpose of handling conflicts in a peaceful manner. Prior to jury trials, "justice" was held at the hands trials, "justice" was held at the hands of a mob, or through other self-help means that, often times, resulted in great public unrest, violence and riot. The right to a jury trial lies not only with an accused or a person who

has been civilly wronged, it lies most strongly with us, the people of the community. It is there to ensure an community. It is there to ensure an orderly resolution of conflict. It allows for disputes to be decided by the community in a uniform, peaceful setting where the heat of the moment can be put aside and no utcome determined by a neutral group of citizens devoid of a personal interest in the outcome. Without such a system, one must question whether life, as we presently know; it, would exist.

Much thanks and appreciation must be extended to those of you who have served as jurors. To those who have served as jurors, and

are currently serving as jurors, and those who are beginning your term of jury service, most sincere thanks and appreciation to you as well. It is and appreciation to you as well. It is a great compliment to our commu-nity, our state and our nation to see you accept and appreciate this civic duty and continue to validate the principles set forth in our Constitu-tion. To those yet to be called upon, your turn will ome. Please think of your service as an honor as opposed to a burden. The pay you receive is, truthfully, minimal but the rewards are priceless. The case you sit on may are priceless. The case you sit on may not seem overly important but, as a that no other person in our country may do. The honor of being a juror may do. The honor of being a juro knows, no higher civic calling. The verdict you render may seem insignate but, in the end, a verdict speaks the truth. The truth regarding a conflict within our community. 

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

She knows where the door is. To the instructors credit he did not allow this opinion to pass unchallenged. Two months ago I spoke to a group about domestic violence. One an was amazed that this was still a problem. With everything on tele-vision and movies about abuse, she asked, why would any woman stay and put up with this? I can under-

stand in the old days that a woman had no place to go, but in this day and time with abuse shelters avail-

and time with abuse shelters available, why doesn the just leave?

There are many reasons why women stay in abusive relationships: fear, a desire to keep the family together and lack of money are just a few, but one very important reason why women stay is because they are to the ones who abuse them.

This is hard for some to understand. How can you love someone who his you? they ask. To understand these feelings one must understand how she sweet who his you?

If abusers did hit on the first date, few women, if any, would stay around for the second visit. Abusers around for the second visit. Abusers are usually very good con men. They could sell snow in Alaska. The first months of the relationship are often joyous times for the victim. Many victims have said, I had never been treated that good in my whole life. Flowers, candy, love, kisses and riowers, candy, love, kisses and words of praise are heaped upon po-tential victims by the abusers. They continually tell victims how beauti-ful they are, how smart they are and how much they are loved. Victims feel as if they are floating on a cloud of love.

The abuse coes not begin until the abuser has drawn the victim into the relationship so completely that it is very difficult for her to untangle her-self emotionally. The first incident of abuse may be very slight a shove during an argument and he may apologize afterwards. She accepts his apology and believes him when

during an argument and he may apologize afterwards. She accepts his apology and believes him when the says it will hever happen again. Even though the abuse gradually becomes more severe, he continues to believe his apologies and promises. He has her hooked and she will have a difficult time getting away. It is like the old story about the frog and boiling water. If a frog is dropped in a pot of boiling water, the will immediately jump out. But if a frog is put in a pot of cold water and the temperature is gradually increased to the boiling point, the frog will stay in that water-until he is boiled alive. The immersion of the victim into an abusive relationship is almost always a very gradual process. It happens before she even realizes

it.

In twenty years as a counselor I have only met one woman who left an abusive relationship the first met she was hit. It usually takes time for the victim to realize what is hapening and then more time to get away from the abuse. Once the abuse as a victim, he will hang on as long as he can. An abuser will go to grate lengths to intimidate, control and search ber into stavine.




