Bustle pleads guilty to drug trafficking

Kenneth E. Bustle, 26, of Mt. Vernon, has entered a guilty plea to one count of trafficking in a controlled substance in or near a school.

In April 2005, a confidential witness with Operation UNITE purchased 10 Xanax pills from Bustle at a residence in Mt. Vernon. This residence was within 1000 yards of Mt. Vernon Elementary School.

UNITE Prosecutor David L. Dalton indicated he would recommend a sentence of five years imprisonment for this trafficking conviction.

In addition, at the time of this offense, Bustle was on probation for a 2003 burglary charge. Dalton stated that the new trafficking conviction would run consecutive with Bustle's prior burglary case for a total of 10 years imprisonment.

Bustle's attorney requested that Rockcastle Circuit Judge David A. Tapp allow his client to remain free pending final sentencing. Judge Tapp, noting the (Cont. to A10)

Last week, Owens had the honor of placing a marker at the grave of his great, great, great, great, great grandfather, David Owens. The deceased Owens is buried at the Owens-Lovell Cemetery. He was a member of the North Carolina Militia in the Revolutionary War and it is thought that he received a land grant in this area for his services.

Owens also got to place a marker at the grave of his great, great, great, great grandfather Allen Owens, the elder David's son, who was a veteran of the War of 1812. Allen was a member of Dysart's Company, the 11th Ky. Mounted Volunteers which was an all Rockcastle regiment. Allen fought in the Battle of Thames (now Detroit).

Last Thursday, Owens and work release prisoners placed markers at the graves of veterans in three cemeteries in the county - Newcomb Cemetery on Richmond Street, the Old Presbyterian Church Cemetery on West Main Street and the Owens-Lovell Cemetery at Burr.

Owens, who deployed Tuesday and will be sent to Iraq in about six months, said that a marker for John Carmichael, a Baptist Minister, was placed at the Old Presbyterian Church cemetery. Carmichael was a Baptist minister and a Corporal in the 3rd Ky. Infantry, another all Rockcastle Company, during the Civil

The company was commanded by Captain Milton Frazier, a doctor/dentist in Mt. Vernon and a graduate of Transylvania University. Frazier's company, which included the three black soldiers buried at Newcomb Cemetery, met at Spout Springs in Mt. Vernon and walked to Camp Dick Robinson in Garrard County

for training. At one time there was a Grand Army Republic (GAR) Civil War veterans group which met in the present Hiatt's 5&10 building. The post number was 112 but was also named the Captain Frazier Post.

The Newcomb Cemetery on Richmond Street is named for Walker Newcomb, a former slave who bought his freedom from Milton P. Newcomb and then bought his wife's freedom from Peasley Hiatt.

Rockcastle Memories

When I was 25 years old, my love of back-road travels enticed me to purchase my first motorcycle, a 1969 Honda CB350 Super Sport. The 350 was comfortable, quick, and agile enough to elicit excitement on meandering, scenic country roads. It delivered 36 horsepower and asked for little fuel. It had duel carburetors that produced a steady flow of power. The bike was designed for the road with two tail pipes that created a "throaty" sound.

Since this was my first experience with riding motorcycles, I found myself consistently amazed with the smells of nature that I experienced. Who wouldn't love the aroma that permeates the air as you drive through winding country roads? Honeysuckle, pine, and the smell of freshly cut hay fill your head as you concentrate on the road ahead. Even in the summertime, temperature fluctuations are always a surprise. It may be 80 degrees, but suddenly you can move through an area that is 70 degrees. That always shocked me.

When I first began to ride, I tried all kinds of roads, including interstate highways. It soon became evident that only back

have been ignored.

roads were for me. I decided that interstate travel was just too treacherous, especially at the speed that I preferred. I was totally satisfied while riding at a maximum of 50 mph on country roads.

My first Saturday ride took me to Lexington via US 60. I rode around the city and eventually drove out Tates Creek Road, stopping at the bank of the Kentucky River. There I pushed my cycle onto the Valley View Ferry and crossed into Jessamine County. I ended up at Shaker Village before returning home late that afternoon. It felt as if I had experienced a major excursion on my new set of wheels. I was hooked on the idea of motorcycle travel.

My second weekend ride took me through Renfro Valley, down US 25 and eventually to Levi Jackson State Park. This adventure caused me to think that camping on a cycle could be a real treat. I purchased the needed gear and started riding with some friends that I had made while riding. One of those friends was a youngster called Bubby, and we rode our bikes together almost every weekend for a while. We camped at Natu-

Between the efforts of Billy Hale and myself. I have managed to build up the soil in my little 50'x50' garden so that a tiller will go through it almost effortlessly.

It has taken eight years, probably 250 heavy bags of composted cow manure, countless bales of straw, truck loads of peat moss; a ton or so of sand and as much very fine limestone gravel to make the original clay surrender into tillable soil.

Billy has dutifully turned it under every spring with his tractor and then run his big tiller, which operates on the power take off on his tractor, through it so many times that a plow wasn't necessary this year. He did the original tractor tilling in a matter of minutes and it worked up like a lettuce bed.

So I planted peas, cabbage, brussel sprouts, onions, several varieties of lettuce, radishes, spinach, etc in early April and they took off like Olympian athletes. In the meantime I started several varieties of tomatoes in peat pots with full intentions of setting them out in

But it rained and rained and rained. When the garden was dry enough to plow I was on the road, but somewhere along the line I managed to plant two rows of beans and three rows of sweet corn. I also got several varieties of eggplant and peppers transplanted, then came more rain and with it weeds and morning glories in abundance.

My corn came up to maybe six inches tall and my beans were making leaves before wet weather got the best of them. Apparently they developed liver disease. At least they turned bright yellow and commenced rotting off at the ground. I decided that the only thing to do was till them under and start

That task would have taken me several hours with the Troybilt so I called Billy back into action. He did the same job in less than twenty minutes with his tractor, so now I have started

Most other gardeners hereabouts are eating golden crookneck and zucchini squash. Mine are two weeks away from blooming. Ditto for cucumbers, Roma beans, blue lakes, beets and all the other stuff that should be coming in right now. I used to pride myself by having a ripe tomato by July 4th. This year I'll be lucky to have a bloom on one of the 40 plants I have set.

Hopefully, before sunset today, I will have my corn replanted along with my main crop half runners and Bufford Caudill fall beans. It has not seriously rained here in three days now and I believe my tiller will crawl out of the mud in which it has been mired for nearly two weeks.

In the meantime, I have to drive by Billy Hale's garden two or three times a day. His corn is tasseling and he has two more long rows right behind. I slow down enough to check out his tomato plants but so far I haven't seen a ripe one. His beans have long vines and are perfectly trellised.

His garden, which lies on a well drained slope, is lushly green and so full of veggies that a weed wouldn't have a chance. It's also twice a big is mine.

I know that envy is a sin but I do it anyway.

I"ve had good luck with peas, lettuce, spinach, green onions and radishes.

Sprains and Strains

We all sprain an ankle at one time or another. Usually we can just ignore it and the pain and swelling goes away over a few

Sprains can, however, be more troublesome than most people think. A person may easily re-sprain the ankle once there has been a bad sprain, especially if proper rehabilitative exercises

Sprains vary from mild ones, where there is just a minor stretching of the ligaments, to severe sprains where the ligaments on the outside of the ankle are completely torn.

When the ligaments are completely torn, the ankle joint is unstable and needs to be given time to heal. Since ligaments heal as slowly as bones, treatment must be continued for six weeks or more. If the tear does not heal well, an unstable ankle joint is apt to cause further problems with "weak ankles," recurrent sprains and eventually

When you sprain your ankle, there are three things to do to help speed recovery. These are applying ice immediately to keep the swelling down, elevating the leg, and using an elastic wrap to compress the swelling. Resting the joint used to be included but it is now considered better to use the ankle to the point of inducing mild pain.

These days, early rehabilitation is a part of therapy. An air splint is often used. This allows the foot to flex up and down while preventing the unwanted side to side movement.

A person is advised to keep the ankle healthy by gentle exercises to stimulate the nerves that sense ankle motion and control muscle balance. This is done by "writing the alphabet" with the great toe several times a day.

fusal to hear an appeal from Washington state case which implicated the custody and visitation rights of

same-sex couples.

You may recall that the issue involved whether a "de facto" parent, that is an adult who has exercised the role of parent, could successfully maintain an action for visitation after separating from the same-sex biological parent. Since de facto parents have the same rights as biological parents under most state's laws, a de facto parent would be entitled to visitation over the objection of the biological parent.

While the U.S. Supreme Court refused to become involved in this dispute, the Kentucky Supreme Court addressed a very similar issue. In facts similar to the Washington case, the Kentucky case pitted members of a Louisville same-sex couple against each other. For



they desired to adopt a child. Due to uncertainty about Kentucky adoption law and its application to same-sex couples, only T.D. was named as the adoptive parent. The parties raised the child for six years before the couple split up. Predictably, B.F. sued for custody and visitation rights as a "de facto" custodian.

Kentucky law provides that a de facto custodian is one who shows by clear and convincing evidence to have been the primary caregiver for, and financial supporter of, a child who has resided with the person for a period of one year or more if the child is three years old or

The trial court found that B.F. was the primary financial supporter for the child but that T.D.--the adoptive parent--was the primary caregiver. This distinction was crucial because Kentucky law emphasizes the role of caretaker more than that of economic supporter. Accordingly, since B.F. was not the primary caregiver, no standing existed to pursue a custody claim.

The Kentucky court distinguished the Louisville case from the Washington decision by noting that Washington has no statutes defining and granting de facto custodians any rights. Instead, the Washington court utilized its common law and equitable powers to grant standing to seek custody and visitation rights.

This unanimous case is significant because of the emphasis placed on one traditional role (the caregiver) versus another traditional parenting role (the economic provider). The case leaves for another day the issue of whether two co-equal members of a same-sex relationship will qualify as de facto custodians under Kentucky law. Inevitably, this issue will be addressed by the U.S. Supreme Court as the states struggle with divisive same-sex issues.

In March of 1969, a television show called, "Then Came Bronson" hit the small screen on NBC. The pilot show revolved

My heart was singing Roll, roll me away, I'm gonna roll me away tonight...



July 17th final date to file crop reports

Farmers who participate in USDA programs through the Farm Service Agency should file a crop acreage report annually to retain program eligibility. The deadline to report spring and summer seeded crops and avoid a late reporting fee is July 17, 2006.

A complete crop acreage report is required for farms participating in the Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) some call the "corn program", Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) or request a commodity loan or Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP). Producers are required to provide the planting dates for all crops that are reported.

Farmers who plant tobacco are urged to report tobacco acreage for history and informational purposes.

County Committee nominations open

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) is soliciting candidates for the County FSA Committee (COC) from June 15 through

August 1, 2006. Nominations for candidates to run for the Farm Service Agency county committee election representing producers in Local Administrative Are (LAA) 2 will be accepted during this time period. LAA's are election areas. Elections are held each year to elect or reelect a member(s) whose term will expire.

Rockcastle County will be holding an election for a person to represent LAA 2 beginning January 1, 2007. That position is currently held by Darrell Wayne Whitaker. LAA2 includes the southeast section of the county bound by Laurel and Pulaski County. Highway boundaries are Hwy 70, Hwy 150 and Hwy 25.

Nomination forms will be mailed to all eligible voters registered with the FSA and must be postmarked or returned to the Rockcastle County FSA Office not later than August 1, 2006.

TTPP transfers

Transfer of Tobacco Transition Program Payments may be issued under one of the following: transfer to family members, transfer due to a death or transfer of a contract to a party who had purchased a tobacco marketing quota and placed the quota on a farm with the owner's consent prior to Oct. 22, 2004.

To transfer a contract a producers must file a CCC-971 followed by the CCC-955 or CCC-956 as applicable.

Sales and purchases of land

Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership.

Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address and bank account changes.

REMEMBER: FSA's records are only as current as

producers provide. Spousal signatures

A husband and wife may sign FSA and CCC documents on behalf of each other UN-LESS written notification is on file in the FSA office denying a spouse this authority. Spouses may sign most documents, except promissory notes, CRP easements, and certain security agreements.

Account changes

If you make any changes in your bank account or change banks notify FSA immediately to ensure payments reach your account timely.

This is very important to those receiving TTPP payments as payments can be delayed if we are not aware of changes to your account or routing numbers.



Lights of Love Brighten the Night



In High Jump at NCAA Championships

Bowman earns All-American Honors

University of Louisville high jumper Kelley Bowman reached new heights on Friday, June 9 when she earned All-American honors with a school record performance on the third day of competition at the NCAA Outdoor Championships at A.G. Spanos Sports Complex on the campus of Sacramento State in California.

Bowman, a senior from Mt. Vernon and the daughter of Carol and Lynn Abrams of Mt. Vernon and Edward Bowman of Berea, cleared a school record height of six feet, 1.25 inches in the women's high jump to break her previous top mark of 6-00.00 set earlier this season when she captured first place in the BIG EAST Championship and became the highest finisher in school history, male or female, at the national championships. Bowman, the 2006 BIG EAST champion in the high jump, becomes the second U of L women's All-American in program history, and the first since Michelle Borgert first earned the honor in the 10,000 meter run in 1995. The third place finish by Bowman also scored six points for U of L, the first time in school history the Cardinal women have scored at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. With these six points, the

women's team tied for 37th place, while Auburn captured the title with 57 points.

"It's an amazing feeling to earn this type of finish and I still can't really believe it," said Bowman after the event. "I really didn't expect to finish as high as third because my main goal was to be in the top eight and earn All-American honors, but I'll definitely take this."

Though this NCAA Outdoor Championship closed out Bowman's 2006 collegiate season, as well as her collegiate eligibility, she will compete at the USA Track & Field National Championships on June 21-25 in Indianapolis, Ind. in an attempt to advance to the IAAF World Junior Championships in Beijing, China in August.

Bowman, a 2001 Berea Community High School graduate, holds the Kentucky all-class high school high jump record of 5-10.5. A 2006 graduate of the University of Louisville, she also holds both the indoor (5-10) and outdoor (6.125) high jump record at Louisville. She is currently ranked 5th nationally behind such greats as Olympians Amy Acuff and Chaunte Howard and is currently ranked 53rd in the



What is a RODEO?

It probably started something like this. Two old boys named J. Bubba and James Edward, got to arguing about who could break a bronc better and faster. First thing you know, they went and got a horse to settle it right there. Then a few other cowboys drifted over to watch, and there we had the West's first ro-

The first rodeos were pure tests of cowboy job skills out on the range. Then, cowboys and

cowgirls started gathering in towns for organized competitions and, before the turn of the century, they moved under the lights in Fort Worth for the first indoor rodeo. The setting has changed, but the testing of human and animal is still the same.

What do I wear?

Comfortable and country. Jeans, boots, cowboy hats, big belt buckles. Sneakers are OK if you don't have boots. Penny loafers are questionable. Wingtips might start a fight. No madras shirts, wool suits, or punk hair. Wear something that can get dirty, because if you sit near the action, you're going to get brown stuff kicked on you. (Try to look cool when it happens. If you're lucky, it'll be

Who are those guys?

Think of the rodeo clowns and pickup men as safety gear. Clowns only look funny. They earn their money when a bull rider is down or "hung up" meaning he cannot free his hand from the bull rope. The clown's job is to get in close and help free the cowboy or lead the bull away so the thrown rider can scramble to safety.

The pickup men ride in to help the cowboy off the horse (assuming he is still on) and

clear the arena of wild stock after each round. In "rough stock" events, a "flank" strap encircles the animal behind the curve of its belly – a very sensitive area. It does not cause pain, but since it is a foreign object, it spooks the animal and makes it buck harder. The pickup men release the flank strap and chase the animal back to the pens.

What is Saddle Bronc

Saddle bronc riding is rodeo's classic event, both a complement and contrast to the wilder spectacles of bareback riding and bull riding. This event requires strength to be sure but the event also demands style, grace, and precise timing.

Saddle bronc riding evolved from the task of breaking and training horses to work the cattle ranches of the Old West. Many cowboys claim riding saddle broncs is the toughest rodeo event to master because of the technical skills necessary for

Every move the bronc rider makes must be synchronized with the movement of the horse. The cowboy's objective is a fluid ride somewhat in contrast to the wilder and less controlled rides of bareback riders.

One of the similarities shared by saddle bronc and bareback riding is the rule that riders in both events must mark out their horses on the first jump from the

chute. To properly mark out his horse the saddle bronc rider must have both heels touching the animal above the shoulder of the horse. As the bronc bucks, the rider pulls his knees up, rolling his dull spurs up on the horse's shoulder. As the horse descends, the cowboy straightens his legs, returning his spurs over the point of the horse's shoulder in anticipation of the next jump. Making a qualified ride and earning a money-winning score requires more then just strength and an eight second ride. The dependency of a cowboy has on his rein makes the difference between a good and a championship rider. A man, who is not dependent on the rein alone but can rely on balance, will get a higher mark for his full arc strokes. Equally important is the fact that some horses which the judges also score on how hard they buck, will "turn on" better if this passenger isn't hanging on the rein with brute force. The rider is down graded by the judge if he loses control. Cowboys call it "getting into a storm," and if this happens, the saddle makes recovery more difficult. The cantle of the saddle, and the swells in front, get under a man and knocks him out of it. The possibility of hanging up in a stirrup is always in the back of the rider's mind and is a great hazard to saddle bronc riding. Saddle bronc riding has less competition than any other event in professional rodeo. There's a reason, the instinctive reactions required to keep their feet in the stirrups, sense what a horse will do next, and the rhythm required, because there is nothing solid to hang onto

Gear Up

Education helps to strengthen Democracy

Democracy. We learn about it in history and civics classes. We celebrate it on July 4. As citizens of the United States we pledge to defend and uphold it. And when we support public education, furthering our own learning, and ensuring that others do the same we are taking a necessary step in strengthening democracy.

"Public schools are intricately important for our democracy," says Trey Grayson, Kentucky Secretary of State. He points out two of the ways a good public education is connected with the continuation of a strong democracy.

First, students gain knowledge from school. Students not only practice critical thinking skills that help them make decisions, but they also learn how a democratic government operates. Grayson says a good public education helps young people prepare to actively participate in a democracy.

Secondly, he points out, "Public education is critically important because it becomes a base in our community that people rally around." Schools bring people together to interact with and learn about one another.

"One of the struggles we have in our society is an 'us versus them attitude'," Grayson says. We're often not very familiar or comfortable with people who are different from us. In the school setting, children and adults from various backgrounds come together to learn from each other therefore breaking down some of the barriers that have a tendency to divide.

Those relationships, Grayson says, are especially important when

we are asked to make sacrifices – like paying taxes – that might help fund programs that seem to benefit some people but not us directly. "It's helpful to know why you're making sacrifices and who we're making them for," he says.

Grayson also sees continuing education after high school, in a formal or informal setting, as an important factor in ensuring democracy. He says he has always been impressed with his own parents, college graduates who never stopped reading or thinking about issues. To keep up with how the world and democracy are changing, Grayson says, we must continue to read and to learn.

Grayson has seen evidence that Kentuckians understand the importance of being a "life long learner". He recently spoke to students at a community college and discovered all but one of the students were nontraditional - they didn't attend college immediately after high school but enrolled later. These nontraditional students understood what Grayson believes "You can never have enough learning."



Cox Hardware: A century of family business

Where do you go when you get a hole in your screen door or need to replace a wooden porch swing? For over 100 years, the people of Rockcastle County have relied upon the Cox family at their hardware store on Main Street in Mt. Vernon. And over those five generations, folks have had the additional pleasure of sitting around the pot-bellied stove located in the middle of the store, sharing stories and visiting with neighbors and friends.□□

Jim and Martha Cox have been operating the hardware store together ever since the death of his father, John, in 2001, but their involvement in the business goes back much farther in time, as does that of the entire Cox family.

When asked to give a brief

description of the store's involvement with the community, Marty replied, "The store has always catered to the farmers with all the old necessary tools...such as stove pipe, wash tubs, well buckets, dog collars, wash boards, dish pans, pressure cooker supplies, glass, screens, plumbing and electric supplies, keys-keys, and knives-knives."

The business currently owned and operated by the couple originated when Jim's great-grandfather, William Henry Cocks, relocated in the late 1800's from Pennsylvania to Rockcastle County and built a blacksmith shop. He made quality wagons and other necessary wooden items for his friends and family in the Hopewell community. It was there that he met his wife,

Matilda, in church. They had six children: William (1871), Robert (1872), Edward (1875), Nettie (1876), Grace (1879), and Claude (1884). (The children decided to change the spelling of their name to Cox.)

In 1901, brothers William, Robert, and Claude (Jim's grandfather) moved to Mt. Vernon and purchased the old Joplin Hotel on the same site as the hardware store sits today. An early morning fire in December 1907 destroyed that building. The brothers then built the structure that currently houses the store at the same site. Claude had his hardware store where it is now, while brother Robert had a dry goods store on the other side (now also occupied as the hardware store). Brother William opened an undertaker business upstairs.

Operating the store has continued to be handed down through the generations of the family. Claude's son, John Cox, started working with his dad full-time following his return from World War II. Claude remained as proprietor until his death in 1973, when John became the owner.

John Cox not only spent his entire adult life in loyal service to his customers, he died while literally behind the counter at the business on February 6, 2001. At 82 years of age, he had been with the Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department for 62 years. At the time of his death, he was the oldest fire chief in Kentucky and the third oldest in the nation.

Although John's son, Jim, did not adopt the hardware store as his primary profession, he recalls working in the store on weekends and during the summer during the 32 years that he spent as a teacher in the Rockcastle County School System. He began his career in 1965 teaching biology in Livingston. In 1966 he moved

to Mt. Vernon High School, remaining there until 1972 when he moved into the new Rockcastle County High School. By 1990, he had become Assistant Principal and remained in that position until his retirement in 1997. It was then that Jim again began working full-time alongside his father at the store.

Jim's wife, Martha, however, has been working consistently at the hardware trade for a longer period of time.□ She joined the family business in 1976. ☐ Jim says of her service, "Marty saved the store!" He also recalled his father, John, once remarking about Martha, "The girl has spent most of her time in the store moving things around, cleaning, and then moving things some more."

It is obvious that Martha's heart resides in the family business. "It has been a joy to work in this place ... there has been a special feeling that cannot be duplicated anywhere else," she said. That special feeling may in some sense be nurtured by the assortment of antique tools, photographs, and signs that adorn its walls and speak of days long past.

Jim and Marty's favorite memory of the old store with the hardwood floors revolves around the "smell of the stove and the stories being told around it." She said, "We have made generations of friends here...and the memories are just too many to describe."

There is certainly a warmth in the space occupied by Cox Hardware. Evidently, it can be detected by virtually anyone who walks in the door. Countless numbers of both locals and tourists continue to stop by often just for a visit. □There seems to be a sort of peace that lingers in the air. Maybe it has its source in all of that history a spiritual result of generations of those caring souls who have






