County applies for \$230,000 makeover for the Quail Park

If two grant applications are approved, Quail Park on Hwy. 70 will get a much needed face lift.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court Friday, at a special meeting, approved two grant applications, one for \$60,000 for a new building at the park which would be heated and air conditioned and have restroom facilities for year-round use. Application for this grant is being made to the Governor's Office of Local Development (GOLD) for coal severance funds.

The second grant will be made for a Land and Water Conservation grant and will be in the amount of \$150,000. These funds will be used for blacktop for drive and parking area, a septic system, ball field lighting and fencing (girls softball field), bleachers, wheelchair accessible picnic tables, swing sets, new roof for the existing shelter, etc.

The county will have to provide 50% of the \$150,000 grant and County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis said Monday that \$63,000 of the \$75,000 would be provided by county labor and equipment, \$9,000 in cash from the county and \$3,000 in cash from the Quail Homemakers who manage the facility.

The several acres of land for Quail Park was donated by Roy and Flora Mae Brown in the 70s and became a project of the Quail Homemakers Club. With only \$500 of borrowed money, that was personally guaranteed by club members, the park has provided limited facilities for Rockcastle countians for years. The park's shelter is completely booked every week end from Spring through October.

Now under county ownership, the park is still managed and supervised daily by the Quail Homemakers Club. Other projects applied for During the special meeting, the Fiscal Court also applied for an additional \$1,296,000 of projects through GOLD from coal severance fund. Carloftis told the court that the county's total of coal severance funds available is \$501,355. However, he also said the county has no guarantee of getting the \$501,355 from the fund but that there is also the possibility of getting more, if the GOLD office deems the projects presented as worthy of funding.

Over \$900,000 was applied for for Eastern Rockcastle Water Association, primarily for the laying of water lines on Ky. Hwy. 1912 (\$56,000), Mullins Station Road (\$113,000), Cromer Boone Road (\$108.000). Bloss Road (\$42,000) and Poplar Gap Road (\$70,000).

There was also included in the application, two 20,000 gallon water tanks - one on Hwy. 1249 (\$151,000) and one on Hwy. 1955 (\$113,000) and water system improvements in District 2 and 3

The Kentucky Music Hall of Fame and Museum will benefit by \$300,000 if the application is approved. The grant includes funding for display cases (\$90,000), \$80,000 to update the heating and cooling system; \$40,000 for an outdoor classroom; \$35,000 for interactive displays; \$20,000 to update their web site and \$15,000 for a blacktop drive and sidewalk.

County Judge Buzz Carloftis was none too happy with the results of the application. After receiving notification of the turndown Wednesday, and being asked what the reason for the non-funding was, he said "I don't know and I'm mad."

Theft of natural resources occurring on forest lands

The market for medicinal herbs has theft on the rise on national forest lands. The bark of slippery elm (Ulmus rubra) is one of several forest products in high demand. The bark of these trees is being stripped and sold to buyers in the business of herbal remedies. The mucilaginous inner layer of the bark is used as a soothing agent for gastrointestinal inflictions and skin irritations.

Recently, three separate incidents of illegally taking slippery elm bark from trees on the Daniel Boone National Forest have led to the apprehension of several individuals. Two of these incidents occurred in Leslie County, which involved the arrest of three people who repeated the offense of removing slippery elm bark within one week of their first offense.

Rockcastle **Memories**

I have always been somewhat of a fanatic about radios. I purchased my first transistor pocket variety when I was about ten years old and carried it with me wherever I went. Every night I took it to bed, and usually fell asleep with the earphone in my ear. From that point on, I have been addicted to radio. When my automobile starts, the radio comes on, and I never consider going anywhere without it playing. I keep a replica of an old tube type model playing in my kitchen 24 hours a day, and it is never turned off. I believe that this fascination is the result of my grandfather's (Eugene Stokes) love of his old wooden floor model -- a Wagner console radio, which now sits in the front room of my home.

Pop pulled a chair up to the front of this radio and sat with his hands on the top as he listened to his favorite programs. He was totally involved with whatever specific show he was hearing at the time. As a young boy, I learned that he did not want to be interrupted when he was "connected" to his radio. Over the years, I was able to place his programming into three categories: news, religion, and entertainment -- in just that order.

Every morning and evening – without fail – he would listen intently to either Lowell Thomas or Edward R. Murrow to get the latest news of the world. I think he preferred Lowell Thomas to all other news reporters. At night Pop would turn up the volume when Thomas would say, "Good evening everybody, this is Lowell Thomas." Thomas always ended his newscast with, "So long until tomorrow." During World War II, Thomas broadcast detailed accounts of the war, often from a mobile

truck behind enemy lines. Pop admired his solid voice of authority.

To the best of my memory, Pop's choice of religious programming was limited to two sources. One of my favorite memories of him was sitting with his hands on the top of the radio as he listened to Oral Roberts preach. Even though Pop was a staunch Baptist, he loved to listen to Roberts, who was a Pentecostal preacher. By 1950 Roberts was traveling the country with a huge tent and broadcasting simultaneously on over 60 radio stations. For some reason, Pop felt connected to Roberts' ministry. The other religious program that he loved was the "Sunday Morning Gathering," which originated from Renfro Valley. He simply would not miss a single episode of that show. I can see him now patting his foot as singers performed the old standard hymns.

Pop also loved comedy and adventure. I believe his "all time favorite" show was Amos and Andy, which was a weekly situation comedy. The show ran from 1943 until 1955 and was the story of two black comedians. He also never missed the Red Skeleton Show on NBC which began in 1941. Red portrayed several characters on his show, with the most famous being the dim-witted cab driver Clem Kadiddlehopper.

Another of Pop's favorites was called the Inner Sanctum. It featured one of the most memorable openings in radio history: an organist hitting a chord, a doorknob turning, and the famous "creaking door" slowly opening. As a matter of fact, Pop called the show the Creaking Door. We actually sat

I was demonstrating the fine art of catching soft crawfish and grampus to a couple of aspiring, adolescent fisherboys the other day on the lower reach of Paint Lick Creek.

Any fisherperson knows that these are the ultimate live bait if you are in pursuit of any game fish that inhabits a Kentucky stream.

There's a long, wide shoal there on the lower end of the creek where the water is only about ankle deep and the current trickles over a series of flat limestone rocks about the size of turkey platters and maybe and inch or so thick.

The bottom is too rocky to use a seine and the water is too shallow for the ever-wary small mouth bass to venture into so it's about as perfect a place to hide if you are a vulnerable, shedding crawdad or a hellgrammite (which I call grampus) as there is on the creek.

But the water is just swift enough and the bottom just clayey enough that, if you lift a rock up, the water immediately gets muddy and you can't see if there's anything under it or not. Nine times out of ten your quarry goes skittering down stream and crawls up under another rock before you have time to even think about grabbing it.

So, as I explained to my protegé, the best, if not the only effective way to catch soft craws and grampus is to hunker down and use both hands and gently feel back under the rocks and grab anything that moves. This is called noodling. "What if they bite you," one of the boys wanted to know? I explained that it wouldn't hurt much and that a little pain was a small price to pay to tie into some of the lunker small mouth and redeves waiting in the deep holes there under the towering elms upstream. I promised them that a grampus couldn't bring blood, etc.

After I had fetched three or four big peeler crawdads and a grampus nearly three inches long came out latched onto the end of my finger, Robert and Joey got into the act.

Individual Right of Defense Gaining Popularity

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It seems that 2005 amendments to Florida's deadly force statutes have prompted similar recent measures in numerous other states. This trend has



stricter gun control laws.

Florida's new law, known derisively as the "Shoot First law" or the "make my day law" broaden the right of Florida citizens to defend themselves against attack in any location where the victim has a lawful right to be present. The NRA has championed passage of similar legislation throughout the United States.

As expected, large urban media sources sharply criticize such legislation suggesting that it provides merely another excuse for aggressive individuals to justify the unrestrained use of deadly force in an exaggerated response to minor threats. Proponents of similar legislation cite anecdotal evidence of rebuffed attacks by street thugs.

Of course, the truth is probably somewhere in the middle. No doubt, some will abuse such laws and presumably be prosecuted and punished. And let there be no doubt, lives will be saved because of the judicious and lawful use of force in selfdefense.

Bloggers are everywhere on

this issue, usually vehemently for one side or the other. One particular, though trivial, issue emerged from a recent review of these sites which requires edification: nowhere in the U.S. Constitution is the right to "bare" arms reserved to the citizenrv!

Kentucky's deadly force statutes have long provided for selfprotection only when the defendant believes that such force is necessary to protect himself against death, serious physical injury, kidnaping, or sexual intercourse compelled by force or threat. The protection of others statute is even more restrictive.

Numerous court cases have interpreted these statutes since their enactment and the propriety of individual circumstances which prompted criminal prosecutions. After all, these statutes are legal defenses--someone has to be charged with a crime before asserting the statutory right of self defense. The ultimate decision of whether the use of deadly force was proper is usually the province of the jury once a prosecutor determines that sufficient evidence exists to support an indictment--a situation no reasonably sane person wants to find themselves in.

The right of personal defense is a compelling issue for Americans, one deeply rooted in our heritage and collective psyche. Given the proliferation of new statutes similar to Florida's and expanding laws legitimizing the concealed carry of deadly weapons, it appears that the former swell of anti-gun legislation has eased, if not altogether reversed.

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



Senate Week in Review

Small businesses -- in many ways the lifeblood of Kentucky's economy -- will save more than \$40 million in taxes each year under a plan approved by lawmakers in special session this week. We took only five working days to approve the plan while also providing tax incentives to help lure a \$1 billion clean-coal, zero-emissions power plant to Henderson County, making this an incredibly efficient and successful special session.

Gov. Fletcher called the session last week so we could revise portions of his "tax modernization" plan that proved to be a burden on small businesses. Under the Governor's plan, many small businesses and other groups saw their tax bills grow dramatically.

Under the fix we approved, businesses with less than \$3

million in profits will be exempt from the what's called the alternative minimum calculation (AMC), while businesses with profits of more than \$3 million but less than \$6 million will have the AMC gradually phased in. Certain charities, cooperatives and other groups like homeowners associations will be exempt.

The AMC under the Governor's plan had proven extremely problematic and even unfair to many of the state's 70,000 small businesses, because it is based on gross receipts or gross profits rather than net profits. As a result, some high-volume businesses with narrow profit margins -and even some businesses that showed no net profit at all -- had seen their tax bills soar. In addition, the corporate tax rate will also decrease to 6 percent.

In addition, the bill also eliminates significant confusion caused by the Governor's tax plan. It conforms to federal language on the "pass through" -allowing small business income to be taxed with an attachment to the individual return of the owner, as does the federal government. Under the Governor's tax modernization, Kentucky no longer recognized "passthrough" status, resulting in two very different tax systems and a great deal of confusion and consternation among Kentucky taxpayers.

The second issue taken up by the special session was tax incentives to help lure FutureGen, a demonstration and research facility focused on clean-coal, zero-emission power, to Kentucky. The federal Department of Energy is leading the consortium that will build the \$1 billion facility. FutureGen would produce hydrogen and electricity from coal, while capturing carbon dioxide and containing it underground instead of releasing it into the atmosphere. The result is a cleaner environment,

a beneficial use for a reclaimed surface mine on the Green River in Henderson County, and untold economic gains for Kentucky.

Seven states have submitted 12 bids for the project, with 3-5 finalists expected to be named in July. If Kentucky is one of the finalists, several site tests will be conducted to compare our proposal to the others. The winning bid should be announced late next year.

Our package could total as much as \$90 million in tax incentives. The bill sets up a sales tax exemption for the purchase of materials needed to construct, repair, renovate, or upgrade FutureGen.

It is estimated FutureGen will generate 1,300 jobs during its construction phase, and 125-150 high-paying professional jobs after that. There will also be the benefit to related industries — the extra coal that will be needed for the plant, the min-

ing equipment and other heavy machinery necessary for the plant's operations, and other economic sectors — and the various spin-offs that could come from hydrogen energy and coal gasification.



As for me, I'm gonna stick to noodling under the little rocks that are no bigger than a turkey platter.








Two Seminary classes visit Northside Baptist

Dr. Art McPhee, Professor at the Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary, in Elkhart, Indiana and Dr. Ronald K. Crandall, Dean of E. Stanley Jones School of World Mission & Evangelism and a professor at Asbury Theological Seminary in Wilmore, Ky., brought 25 seminary students to Northside Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon, Ky. for a class tour June 16th. Dr. McPhee's wife, Evie, also accompanied the group. The students represented a wide geographical area including Nigeria, British Columbia, Canada, Virginia, North Carolina, Mississippi, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Texas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Indiana, Ohio, and New Jersey.

The class tour was the second time Dr. McPhee brought students to Northside as he ended a one-week summer class titled "Turnaround Strategies for Local Churches." The course is described as "help for small churches that are plateaued or declining and also for those who want to maintain their church's vitality. The approach is based on new ways of understanding local churches and how they function, and from data from churches that have recovered and regained vitality."

Dr. Larry Martin, Missions Growth Team Consultant for the Ky. Baptist Convention, Louisville, Ky., gave the seminary students at Northside an overview of a prayer movement in Kentucky that began in 1996. "That year," Martin said, "participants at a Mountain Missions Conference in Oneida were still on their knees, crying out in desperation to God, two hours after the meeting was scheduled to end." He said that no one knows exactly how the prayer began but those prayers led to prayer meetings that were scheduled in the five state parks in Kentucky in 1997. "In 1999, God opened the windows of heaven," Martin said in describing God's movement in Kentucky.

As a result, many new ministries have developed in different parts of the state but the movement has been particularly felt in Eastern Kentucky. "Five years ago," Martin said, "Eastern Kentucky had four ministry centers to distribute food and clothing and building materials. At last count, 47 ministry centers, from food closets to large ministry centers, like in Lynch, Ky., are operated throughout Kentucky by local people. God is doing the humanly impossible and it is happening through prayer."

Mission Service Corps missionary Shirley Cox told the students the story of Northside Baptist Church, which had dwindled to 30 active members six years ago. Bro. Chad Burdette, who was called to preach in a drug treatment facility, has pastored the church during a period of extensive growth of the church. New ministries are still emerging, including a large Outreach Ministry Center that is scheduled to be under roof in October, In each of the past two years, Northside Baptist Church has baptized over 100 new converts. The church's rapid growth has brought recognition from associational, state and national levels of the Southern Baptist Convention. Cox also showed a video, "Battered to Beauty," an award-winning film produced by Barbara Adams, a Berea College student.

The following day, the seminary class visited Meridzo Center, a multi-faceted ministry in Lynch, Ky. operated by Mission Service Corps missionaries Lonnie and Belinda Riley. The multi-faceted ministry includes food and clothing, home repairs, child care, equestrian, literacy and job training. Over 2,000 people have accepted Christ since the ministry began in 1999. In addition to directing a staff of 17 full-time volunteer missionaries from six states, the couple coordinates the work of more than 3,000 volunteers each year.

In a letter to the Dean of the Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary, one student who attended the class tour wrote, "We were inspired as we heard testimony after testimony of answered prayer, of changed lives and communities which are continuing to change. We are certain God will use this experience as we practice the presence of God in our lives."

"We were delighted with the presentations and the hospitality we received at Northside and Lynch," Dr. McPhee said. "I firmly believe that when students move from their textbooks to actual ministry settings they acquire a far richer understanding of God's Spirit at work through the church. This trip is yet another confirmation of that conviction."





and the new building for Quail Park, the application also includes \$41,785 for a sidewalk in Mt. Vernon on Lovell Lane, from Richmond St. to the four way stop, and \$15,000 for each of the five fire departments and one rescue squad in the county.

Carloftis also told the court that, discounting the application for the Eastern Rockcastle funds, there would be about \$9,480 left of the \$501,355 in coal severance funds that he recommended be used to help build public restrooms at the city park in Mt. Vernon. Carloftis said the project was estimated, by Mayor Clarice Kirby, to cost \$25,000 and the city had said they would come up with the balance of the funding needed for the project.

The court approved the recommendation. Other project applied for

Judge Carloftis also presented three road projects to the court for approval to advertise for bids for. Carloftis said he had been told by an official of the State Transportation Cabinet that they were always "willing to help with special projects" so he was going ahead and advertising for bids for the projects.

The other case of slippery elm bark theft occurred in Jackson County.

Once the bark of slippery elm tree is removed, the tree soon dies. The life of the tree is essentially cut off once the xylemn and plhloem layers of the bark are removed. These inner layers of bark provide for the flow of water and nutrients that sustain the tree.

The theft of natural resources from national forest lands is nothing new. Ginseng has been illegally removed from public lands in the eastern United States for decades, causing serious decline and even extirpation of this plant in some forest areas. Other forest products commonly removed from na-



If you missed the experience of making five carbon copies on a manual typewriter, be thankful. Making a mistake meant that you had to stop and individually erase the mistake on each page before

6. Does your car have air conditioning? Can you imagine traveling without it? When I was a child, my grandparents lived in the southern part of Georgia. My dad always got his vacation in July. Do you know how hot it is in an un-air conditioned car with two adults and two children in Georgia in July? In the days before I-75, the drive took sixteen hours. My sister and I only barely avoided doing major bodily harm to each other. I can only imagine how my parents must have felt.

7. Talked to anyone on your cell phone lately? Cell phones have both advantages and disadvantages. You can call from anywhere, anytime, which is especially helpful when your car breaks down, and you are stranded in the middle of nowhere. The disadvantage is that you never have a moment's peace. Anyone who carries a cell phone as a part of his job is always at someone's beck and call. If you younger folks can imagine this, when I was a child, we had no phone at all! We walked to the neighbors to use the phone. That was quite a chore but, on the positive side, no tele-marketers ever called us either. And we were never awakened in the middle of the night by a wrong number.

Federal, state and local environmental regulations require KU to continually build and upgrade equipment and/or facilities in order to operate in an environmentally sound manner. Specifically, KU is seeking Commission approval of a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity ("CCN") to construct a new Selective Catalytic Reduction System ("SCR") for Ghent Unit 2 at the Ghent Generating Station in Ghent, Kentucky to comply with federally mandated Nitrogen Oxides requirements. Additionally, KU is seeking recovery of costs associated with environmental projects necessary for compliance with the Federal Clean Air Act, Clean Air Interstate Rule, Clean Air Mercury Rule, and the Clean Air Visibility Rule. These additional projects primarily relate to installation of an SCR system on Ghent Unit 2, mercury emissions monitoring, precipitator upgrades, Air Quality Control System equipment necessary to operate Trimble County Unit 2 within the approved environmental limitations and sulfur trioxide mitigation on electric generating units which burn high sulfur coal. The total capital cost of these new pollution control facilities is estimated to be \$325 million.

The estimated impact on a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours per month is expected to be an initial monthly increase of \$0.82 for KU customers during 2007, with the maximum monthly increase expected to be \$2.67 during 2010.

The Environmental Surcharge Application described in this Notice is proposed by KU. Local judges attend conference

Chief Justice Joseph E. Lambert brought together circuit and district judges from across Kentucky to attend a child protection conference in Covington June 12-13. Chief Justice Lambert proposed the idea for the conference, titled "Justice for Children: the Critical Role of Judges," after participating in the National Leadership Summit on the Protection of Children in the fall of 2005.

Circuit Judges Debra Hembree Lambert and David A.Tapp, who serve Lincoln, Pulaski and Rockcastle counties; and District Judge Janet C. Booth, who serves Garrard, Jessamine and Lincoln counties, attended the conference, which was sponsored by the Administrative Office of the Courts with a federal grant from the Children's Justice Act.

"Children are our most vulnerable citizens and one of the foremost duties of Kentucky judges is to see that they are protected," said Chief Justice Lambert. "While Kentucky is making progress in moving foster children toward safe and permanent homes, there is always more we all can do to improve this process with due regard for the rights of the children and their parents. This conference is designed to give judges practical ideas on how to handle these sensitive cases and achieve an outcome that best serves the children." Jefferson County Family Court Judge Patricia Walker FitzGerald and Christian County District Judge James G. Adams served as co-chairs for the conference.

Several presenters from the National Leadership Summit joined Kentucky judges, social services professionals and officials from the Cabinet for Health and Human Services to serve as faculty for the conference. Guest speakers included Judge William Byars Jr., director of the South Carolina Department of Juvenile Justice; Drs. Otto Kaak and James Clark, primary investigators for the Comprehensive Assessment and Training Services Project, University of Kentucky; and Commissioner Tom Emberton Jr., Department for Community Based Services, Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services.

The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) supports the activities of more than 3,500 Kentucky Court of Justice employees, including the elected offices of justices, judges and circuit court clerks. The Education Services Department of the AOC provides continuing education to these elected officials through conferences and judicial colleges.

Steer Wrestling at the Little World's Fair

What is Steer Wrestling?

Steer Wrestling is probably the most exciting event in the rodeo arena. When a man drops from a running horse onto the steer, stops the steer and throws him to the ground. Spectators have seen skill overcome heavily weighted odds.

The secret is this, as the cowboy catches up to the steer, he reaches with his right hand grabs the right horn and as his horse speeds by the steer the cowboy gets the horn in the crook of his right elbow. At the same time, his left hand pushes down on the other horn while his horse veers off to the left. The cowboy's heels drop ahead and at a 45 degree angle to the path the steer is taking.

The cowboy digs in his heels, turns the steer's head, and pulls it toward the center of a left hand turn. As the steer stops, his rear having swung around, the cowboy grabs the animal's nose with his left hand and with this sensitive hold, throws the steer onto his side. In addition to the steer wrestler. a second man, the hazer, is alongside the steer and to the onlooker all he seems to do is retrieve the wrestlers horse after the jump is made. Actually, he watches for mishaps which happen if the steer slams on his



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brakes or veers away from the wrestler or sometimes called the dogger. The hazer has to foresee these possibilities and correct them, often in a split second. This event is judged on the fastest time.
