Donald Martin pleads guilty to porn charges

Prosecutors with the U.S. Attorney's office in Lexington announced last Thursday that a Mt. Vernon man had pled guilty in a child porno case.

Donald R. Martin, 47, of Old U.S. 25, pled guilty to one count of producing child pornography and one count of possession of child pornography.

Martin was arrested on April 7th of this year by Rockcastle Sheriff's Detective Matt Bryant, after Bryant said Martin had pornographic pictures of three children ages 11-13 in his possession, which he had apparently taken at his photo shop, Southern Stars Modeling, located on Main in Mt. Vernon or at his home on Old U.S. 25. Martin was originally charged with 208 counts of child pornography. 200 of the photos found by police were found in Martin's home located across from Elmwood Cemetery in Mt. Vernon.

When Martin was taken into the Sheriff's office for questioning, he immediately complained of chest pains and was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital, where he was released the following Monday to police who took him into custody.

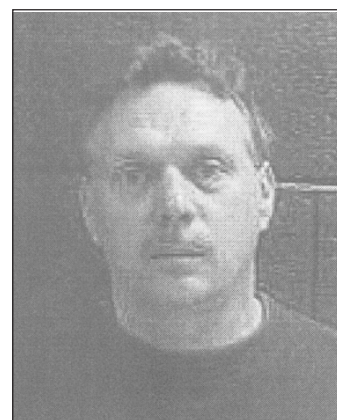
Martin, who apparently came to Mt. Vernon from Alabama, was not listed as a sex offender at the time of his arrest.

At the plea proceedings, authorities said Martin admitted that he took sexually explicit photographs of three minor children while they were attending modeling classes at his photo studio.

The production of child pornography is a federal offense, according to Bryant, who said that federal officers picked up the prosecution of the case in mid-April.

Martin will be sentenced on December 18, in London before Federal Judge Jennifer Coffman.

Prosecutors did not say what kind of sentence would be recommended for Martin.

Rockcastle County, Mt. Vernon receive \$55,000 from PRIDE

Eastern Kentucky PRIDE has awarded \$55,000 for environmental improvement projects in Rockcastle County. Through the PRIDE Community Grant Program, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court received a \$40,000 grant, and the City of Mt. Vernon received a \$15,000 grant.

PRIDE announced recently that 47 grants totaling \$1,106,515, were awarded this year. The one-year grants will be used primarily to remove illegal dumps and dispose of trash collected during community cleanup events, such as the PRIDE Spring Cleanup.

Arrest made in burglary

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department has made an arrest in connection with a recent burglary and theft near the Lincoln County line.

On the morning of August 24th, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department arrested Matthew Holden, 36, of Mt. Vernon, just across the Lincoln County line. Holden was in possession of several items which were later discovered to have been stolen from two Rockcastle residents' vehicles - Money Ed Cummins, a former Rockcastle Circuit Court Clerk and Teresa Bowman.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department contacted Det. Barry Adams, who notified the victims that Holden was possibly in possession of some of their items and they were later able to identify several of the items as belonging to them.

On Tuesday, an arrest warrant was obtained for Holden for Burglary in the third degree. He is currently being held in the Lincoln County Detention Center for related charges and the information will be presented to the Rockcastle Grand Jury at a later date.

"The local officials who applied for these grants should be commended for their leadership," said Richard Thomas, PRIDE executive director. "Congressman (Hal) Rogers makes sure PRIDE funds are available for environmental stewardship, but it is up to communities to put the funds to work."

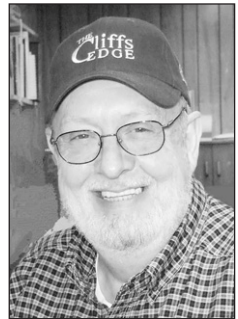
"Citizens also have a role to play in their local stewardship campaigns," Thomas continued. "For example, volunteers may be needed to help with these Community Grant projects. I encourage you to call your local grant recipients to see if volunteers are needed. Second, throughout the year, citizens can report littering and dumping to their local solid waste coordinator. Cleaning up after a few irresponsible people is expensive, and we need to send the message that we no longer will put up with their illegal activities."

The PRIDE Community Grant program provides up to \$50,000 to counties, cities, other public entities and nonprofit organizations for environmental improvement projects in southern and eastern Kentucky. The program encourages community and citizen involvement in projects to promote personal responsibility for the environment.

"Call it one small mistake by somebody, one giant loss for mankind," the headline read. It was a web story that I read a few days ago. I could not believe my eyes.

The article continued, "The original film footage of astronaut Neil Armstrong's first steps on the moon, one of the most important artifacts of the 20th century has been lost." The moon tapes lost. Unbelievable. Not just unbelievable, unthinkable.

The television footage that most of us witnessed was the equivalent of a photocopy of a photocopy. It came from a television camera pointed at a black and white monitor of the actual television footage. The original

magnetic tapes that recorded the iconic images of man's first footsteps on the moon are missing and scientists fear that they are in danger of deteriorating into dust unless they are found quickly and converted to digital format. The article went on to say, "The tapes have been mislaid, most likely in NASA's vast archives at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Maryland."

Goddard is also home to the only equipment that can still play the 14-inch format tapes of the moon walk. A spokesman for the space agency said, "We're trying to track them down through the paperwork

Some vegetable gardening thoughts and observations. Disclaimer:

This is from my intimate and personal experience and not from the University Agriculture Extension Service. Not that I don't respect them because exactly the opposite is true. It's just that I try a lot of stuff that the Extension Service would not recommend. So take this with the proverbial grain of salt. But it's only going to cost you less than the price of a fast food hamburger to give it a shot.

Summer garden planting time is pretty much over in Kentucky unless you are getting ready to put out onion seed, gar-

lic cloves and sow spinach and kale to winter over for spring harvests. In which case you are too early. It's not quite time for any of those yet.

Turnips and mustard greens will give you a double crop if you sow them now (one in late October and another in March next year), but by the time the current season is ready for onion seed and garlic sets and spinach, most people will have changed the oil in their tillers, run a little WD-40 through the carbs, drained the left-over gasoline out of fuel tanks, changed the fuel filters and hi-

Improving Your "Good" Cholesterol

Many of us never thought we'd see the day we wanted to raise our cholesterol levels, but now that is just what we want to do.

Researchers have found that there is more than one form of cholesterol. And that the different fractions of cholesterol affect the body in different ways. While the majority of cholesterol in the blood is a "low density" cholesterol (LDL) which contributes to plugged arteries and heart attacks, the "high density" cholesterol, or HDL, has a protective influence on the arteries and heart.

The ratio of the two forms of cholesterol determines the risk of heart disease from your cholesterol. What's more, there are simple things we can do to raise the good cholesterol and lower the harmful cholesterol.

Exercise is a simple way to stimulate increases in the good HDL. Exercising 20-30 minutes three times a week will have a positive effect.

Replace saturated fats (butter, lard, beef fat) with unsaturated fats. Unsaturated fats are mainly found in vegetable oils such as corn oil, margarine and sunflower oils (but avoid palm oil and coconut oil).

Losing weight also appears to raise the level of HDL. Also, one to two alcoholic drinks a day has been reported to decrease heart disease, possibly by affecting the HDL. However, this must be weighed against the risk of alcohol use.

Cholesterol-lowering medicines and niacin can help raise the HDL. Your doctor can prescribe these medicines as well as provide further information on the value of exercise and dietary changes

when Brutus, a thin and frail man, collapsed.

During a pre-trial hearing, the defense sought to exclude the prosecution's expert, a state medical examiner, who intended to testify that Brutus was a victim of "homicide by heart attack". According to the defense, the doctor's testimony was unreliable and invaded the province of the jury to determine whether Brutus died as the result of homicide. The trial court ruled that the testimony could be properly admitted. Binta pled guilty and then appealed this issue to the Kentucky Supreme Court.

The Court affirmed Binta's

conviction. In its opinion, the Court noted that the term "homicide", does not necessarily imply that criminal act occurred. In fact, the term "homicide" is usually defined as the killing of a human being by another. Kentucky law excuses many forms of homicide, such as killings in self-defense, defense of others, or by accident. Thus, simply permitting the medical examiner to characterize Brutus's death as "homicide" did not imply that Binta had committed an offense. In fact, in Kentucky, there is no crime of simple "homicide".

Justice Cooper also noted that nearly every jurisdiction in the United States has upheld convictions predicated upon death by heart attack. In 1986, the Kentucky Supreme Court upheld a murder conviction where the defendant raped and assaulted an eighty-year old woman who died twenty-nine days later from a heart attack. In that case, there was evidence that the victim, aside from her advanced age, had previously suffered a heart attack and suffered from severe coronary disease. Nevertheless, a jury could properly consider whether her death was attributable to the defendant's acts and that the injuries "hastened her death". Other states have upheld convictions where death by heart attack resulted from "emotional stress" rather than physical injuries suffered during a crime.

Reasoning that it would not be apparent to most jurors that a heart attack was the result of

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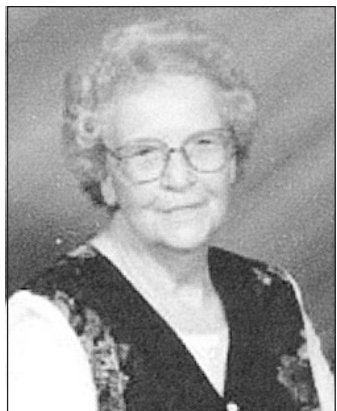

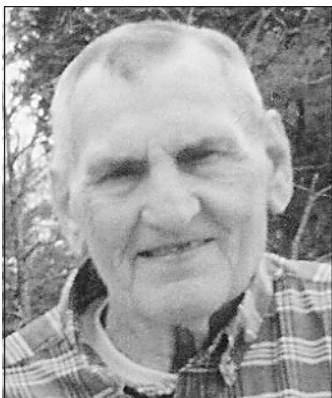

James Milton Reynolds, 69, of Spiro Road, Mt. Vernon, died Wednesday, August 30, 2006 at Rockcastle Hospital.

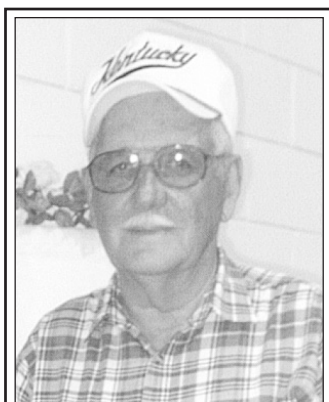
He was born August 12, 1937 in Pulaski Co., the son of Simon "Sam" and Beulah Anderson Reynolds.

the physical altercation between Binta and Brutus, the Kentucky Court determined that expert medical testimony was necessary. Since manslaughter in the second-degree requires proof that the defendant wantonly disregarded a substantial and unjustifiable risk that the altercation would result in her father’s death, the medical examiner’s opinion was not tantamount to telling the jury that a crime had occurred.

By permitting his testimony, the medical examiner was not being permitted to testify whether Binta was acting wantonly, recklessly or accidentally. That question was only for the jury and the decision would ultimately determine whether Binta had actually committed a crime.

Often times, unintended consequences result from what might only constitute minor criminal activity. When those consequences include death, Kentucky law may require full accountability.

created at that time. But it’s 35 years ago, so it’s a challenge.”

The story caused me to remember the long sequence of events leading up to the NASA walk on the moon. In 1957 the Soviet Union launched Sputnik, the first artificial Earth satellite. At that time, I was a skinny, flat-topped, 13-year-old teenager and was most impressed. Photos of the orbiting sphere were plastered on the local newspapers and on our black and white televisions.

I purchased a model of Sputnik and hung it from my ceiling light in the center of my bedroom. The idea of this man-made hunk of metal traveling around the earth fascinated me. I could not take my eyes off of my model.

As years passed, the space race between Russia and the United States continued. By the time John F. Kennedy became

President, the next goal was so ambitious that it seemed the stuff of science fiction. On May 25, 1961, he announced the goal of landing a man on the moon. “I believe that this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the Moon and returning him safely to the Earth.” I witnessed President Kennedy making this announcement to Congress that evening and thought it the most exciting dream I had ever heard.

By 1962, John Glenn, Jr. had become the first American astronaut to orbit the earth. In 1968, the United States launched Apollo 8 – the first manned space mission to orbit the moon. Finally, on July 20, 1969 Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin, clad in their spacesuits, sitting in the tiny moon module, settled gently onto the dusty lunar surface and Armstrong radioed to a waiting Earth, “Houston, Tranquillity Base here. The Eagle has landed.” The audio of the actual event was very broken and distorted but our hearts raced with excitement.

I was actually attending the Bluegrass Fair in Lexington but had taken note of a sign directing us to a tent where we could watch the moon landing. The event was even more exciting when Armstrong stepped onto the surface and proclaimed the now famous words, “That’s one small step for man... one giant leap for mankind.”

With eyes glued to the screen, I witnessed the first steps ever taken on the moon’s surface. I watched Armstrong plant the American Flag on the lunar soil. I saw him jump and run on a heavenly body with hardly any gravity. My heart raced as history was being made and I was a witness. At 25, I thought nothing could ever top this demonstration of scientific wonder. It was suddenly awesome to be alive and living in the USA!

I was also reminded of Job 38, which asks the question, “Where were you when I laid the foundations of the earth ... and set the stars in their courses?” That night, in July of 1969, it was evident that He had allowed us to be there on the Moon – standing in the actual dust of the lunar surface.

On July 24, Apollo and its crew landed safely on Earth and marked the beginning of a new age of space adventure. Over the next weeks and months photos of the space walk and video of the adventure were broadcast over all television networks. We could not get enough. Teens watched with fascination and wonder as did our parents and families. We celebrated with the astronauts as they were ushered down main streets of America under ticker tape parades. They were our heroes! Children all over the United States began dreaming of becoming astronauts.

Looking back now, it is clear that we were living in the

golden era of space discovery and exploration. NASA, its programs, and its management are now under severe scrutiny from a multitude of angles. I have remained its champion. However, the loss of the moon walk tapes give me pause.

How could one of the most important films in the history of the US be lost? Why wasn’t some NASA employee given the responsibility to preserve and catalog this famous film footage of man’s walk on the moon? The very idea that it is missing is quite unsettling! Does this mean that changes within the NASA organization have diminished the responsibility of preserving history for mankind? Doesn’t NASA realize that there can only be ONE first moon walk?

bernated their motorized gardening implements until all danger of frost is predicted for 2007.

Nothing wrong with that if you choose to surrender to cold weather.

The only way that I have found to grown decent spinach in our climate is to plant it the first week of November and let it “winter over”. Weeds ain’t gonna take it in December, January or February. It’ll grow a little bit every time the ground thaws and the sun comes up. At least it does for me.

Wanna grow garlic? Buy some Kentucky grown bulbs right now and be patient. Long about the first of November, trowel up some garden soil, separate the bulbs into individual cloves and plant them about an inch deep about six inches apart in whatever pattern you choose to bed them. Harvest the fresh blossoms next spring when they burst out for salad or soup seasoning. Pull the new bulbs up in June, wash them off and let them dry. Save a couple or three bulbs for replanting and repeat the cycle.

Onions. I grew big (half pounders) Walla Walla onions this year from seed. Directly seeded in the garden; I forget which company I got them from (Parks, Twilleys?) but a packet of seed cost like a dollar for like a hundred seeds.

I Planted the tiny seed, meticulously, about an inch apart on Thanksgiving

Day last year and every seed as far as I could tell, sprouted. I planted them about an inch apart and by early March they were crowding. Walla Walla are grown in Washington State and they are not good keepers, but they are far sweeter than the Vidalia look-alikes that wind up tasting and burning like sulfuric acid when they are grown in our climate.

In the meantime, the Bodacious Sweet Corn is in . I

only have two short rows--- maybe twelve dozen ears---but enough to serve at a few special celebrations before it’s here again in 2007.

Last week I was at an Amish farm in Lincoln County, actually looking for an overripe German tomato that I could get for seed. He had sweet corn out the kahooty for two bucks a dozen, but he had the Bodacious priced at \$2.75. He was leading his saddled horse about in front of an immaculate barn and two young ladies were tending the vegetable stand.

“So what’s the difference between Bodacious and everything else” I wanted to know?

“It’s better corn but the seed is hard to get and its hard to grow “. He slapped his hat against his leg to kill a fly and shooed them off his horse.

“Some local yokle started growing it fifteen years ago and now everybody wants it..”

“That would be me,” I told him. “I ordered the seed from Twilley’s there in Trevoise, PA and I’m pretty sure I made it popular over the last decade because hardly a year goes by that

I don’t write about it at least once or twice.”

“Good for you,” he said. “Now go over into Casey County and see if you can buy a

seed tomato. I don’t have a single one for sale.”

He climbed on his horse and rode away and the girls just stood there and giggled.

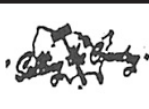
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Minds in the Middle

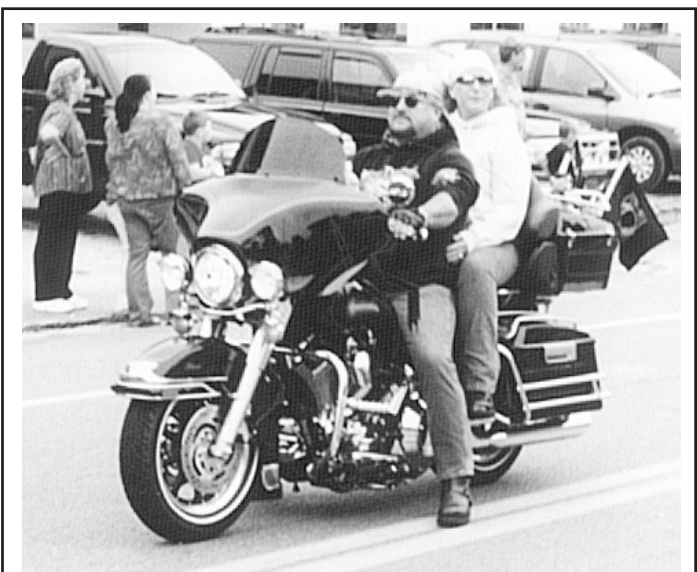

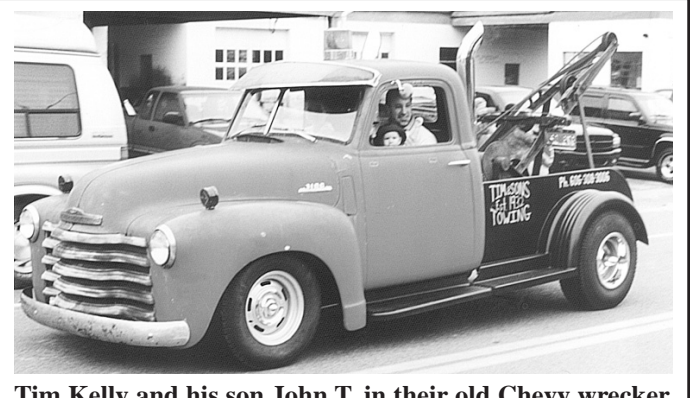

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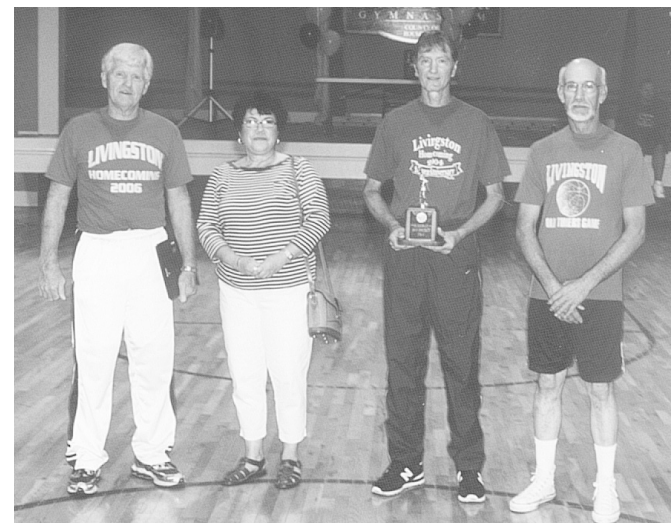

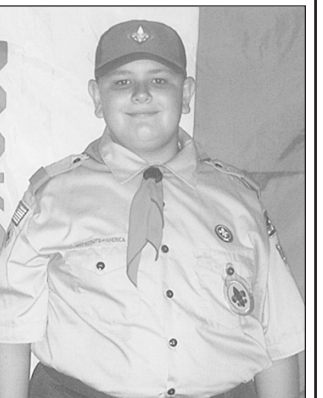

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Third straight win

Rockets come from behind; down Thoroughbreds 47-25

If Charles Dickens had been the author of Friday night's football game at the ROCK, he may have called it the tale of two halves.

But it was the Rockcastle offensive unit who wrote the tale of two halves and a unit which left the best reading until after intermission, when the ROCK scored six times to defeat visiting Harrison County 47-25.

The Rockets, now 3-0 in the 2006 season, were flat both offensively and defensively in the first half of the first ever UNITE Bowl. The defense allowed a 71

yard run by Harrison County, from scrimmage, for a touchdown, two and half minutes after the Rocket's punt team allowed a 67 yard punt return for a touchdown.

With 9:31 left in the second quarter, the Rockets found themselves behind 19-6.

Offensively, the Rockets had done nothing after scoring on the first drive of the game to take a 6-0 lead.

After only five minutes of play, senior Dusty Miller took the ball in from the two yard line to cap off a 61 yard scoring drive.

The offense, however, would strike one more time before half.

The Rockets got the ball back deep in Harrison County's territory to set up the must score for the Rockets, on a fumble recovery by senior Izak McQueary. The score came on a 17 yard pass from quarterback Izak McQueary to senior receiver Shawn Childress. It would be McQueary's second straight pass completion on the night on his way to nine completions in a roll.

Senior placekicker Brad Durham added the extra point and the Rockets had cut the Harrison County lead to 19-13 at the half.

In the second half, the Rockets first offensive drive ended when the Rockets turned the ball over on downs, but sophomore defensive back Steven Trimble got the Rockets back on a completely level playing field with Harrison County, when he picked off a pass and ran 54 yards for the score to tie the game at 19.

Although the Thoroughbreds would put one more score on the board, they would never lead in the contest again.

After an interception by McQueary on the next Thoroughbred series, Miller again got the call and rambled 30 yards for the score to give the Rockets a 25-19 lead.

The Rockets would score two more times in the third period.

First McQueary hit Childress on a 32 yard touchdown pass and Miller added the two extra points for a 33-19 lead.

Harrison County would score with 40 seconds left in the third quarter to pull within eight, but that would be as close as they would get.

With 9:49 left in the fourth quarter, McQueary found Childress again, this time for 26 yards and the Rockets were up by two touchdowns again.

With 3:31 left in the game McQueary would take the ball in from the one for another touchdown.

On the extra point attempt the Rockets faked a kick and McQueary, the holder on extra points, found Childress all alone in the end zone.

The Rockets racked up 427

yards of total offense on the night and held Harrison County to 230 yards.

Offensively, McQueary was nine for eleven for 116 yards and he rushed ten times for 51 yards. He threw three touchdown passes, an two-point extra point throw and he rushed for one touchdown.

Senior tailback Dusty Miller had his best game of the young season with 206 yards rushing on 27 carries and he caught two passes for 17 yards. He scored two rushing touchdowns and one two-point conversion.

Senior fullback Adam Hensley had 33 yards on eight carries and sophomore Cody Mize had 27 yards on six carries.

Childress caught four passes for a total of 77 yards, but all four catches counted. Childress had three touchdowns and one two point conversion catch.

Sophomore Tanner Perkins had three catches for 22 yards and Durham was one for four in extra point kick attempts.

Defensively, the Rockets were led by Defensive Player of the Game Donovan Pigg, who had five tackles and assists and two sacks.

McQueary had four tackles and assists, picked off a pass and recovered a fumble.

Miller had almost as good a game on the defensive side of the ball as he did on the offensive side, with six solo tackles.

Sophomore Casey Hayes wasn't too far behind Miller with five tackles and assists and Perkins had three tackles and he intercepted one pass.

Other Rockets with tackles and assists on Friday night were: Durham, two; Josh Garrison, one; Scott Daughtery, one; Hensley one; Childress, one; Willie Martin, one and Trimble, two and an interception for a touchdown.

"I was certainly proud of the way our team fought back on Friday night and if we are able to win on the road this week, we will have to give our best effort," head coach Tom Larkey said.

The Rockets will take their perfect 3-0 record on the road to Lincoln County to take on the Patriots.

Last year the Rockets won 31-8. The Patriots are 1-1 on the season. In week one, the Patriots lost to Pleasure Ridge Park, 30-13 and in week three they defeated Garrard County, 41-0.

The Rockets will still be without two-way starter, junior Zack Burkhart on Friday at Lincoln County, who is still recovering from Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever.

After the Lincoln County game the Rockets have a week off before heading into district play against Letcher County Central. The September 22nd contest will also be homecoming at the ROCK.



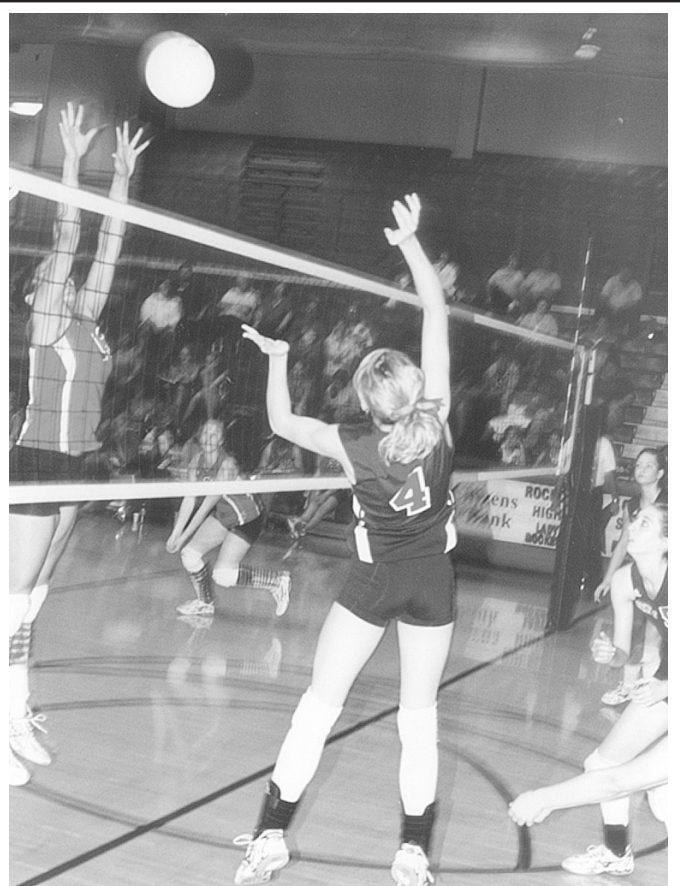

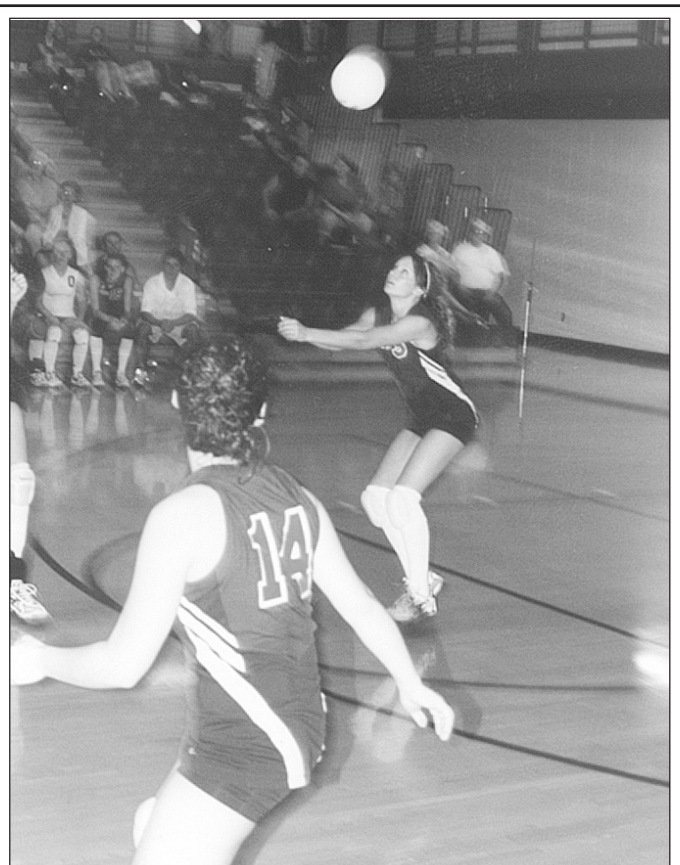

ronment. Recipients must match the grant with a contribution worth at least 10 percent of the grant amount. “PRIDE Community Grants have been used to clean up over 2,000 illegal dumps,” Thomas said. “It was the first PRIDE grant program, and it has made a tremendous impact on our region’s landscape. Since the region-wide cleanup campaign has progressed so well, PRIDE will begin to shift more resources toward envi-

ronmental education. That’s the key to preventing our past pollution problems from re-occurring.”

Since 1997, PRIDE has invested \$24,937,449 in grants to tackle the region’s solid waste problems. So far, local governments and non-profit organizations have used PRIDE grants to clean up 2,268 illegal dumps across the region.

PRIDE promotes “Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment” in 38 counties by encouraging and providing resources for communities to clean waterways, end illegal trash dumps and promote environmental education. PRIDE was founded in 1997 by Congressman Hal Rogers (KY-5) and the late James Bickford, former secretary of the state’s environmental protection agency, and is funded by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

incumbent jailer James Miller, who easily defeated Ralph Powell in the May Primary.

Kemper ran for Sheriff in 2002, garnering 11 votes in the race.

Other write-in candidates in the General Election are Rodney Adams for Constable in district three, Donnie Cope for Constable in district four and Donald Dees for Magistrate in district four.

The filing deadline for write-in candidates is October 27th. The filing fee is \$50 for county offices and \$20 for city offices.

No write-in votes will be counted election day unless the candidate has filed in Houk’s office.

Write-in candidates will not appear on the ballot.

The final day to register to vote in the General Election is October 10th in Houk’s office. Voters can also change precincts if they have moved, addresses if they have moved into the county and party affiliations until October 10th. The voter registration books close on the 10th of October and will re-open November 13th.

Approximately 11,200 Rockcastle Countians are registered to vote.

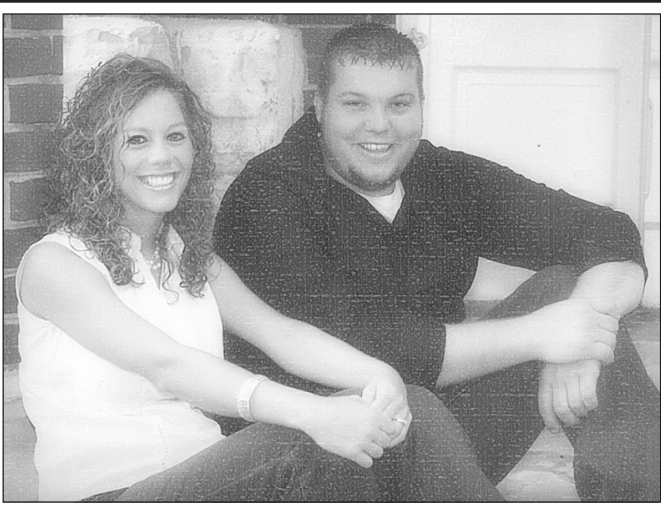

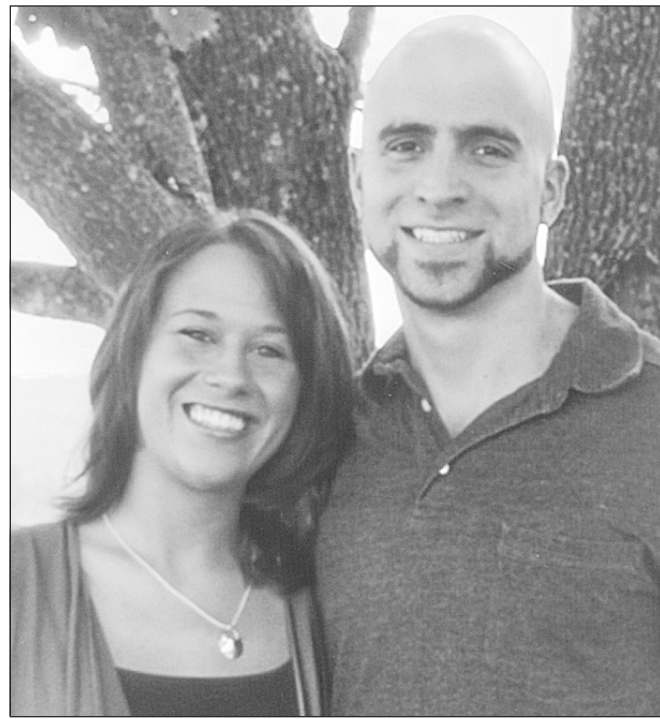

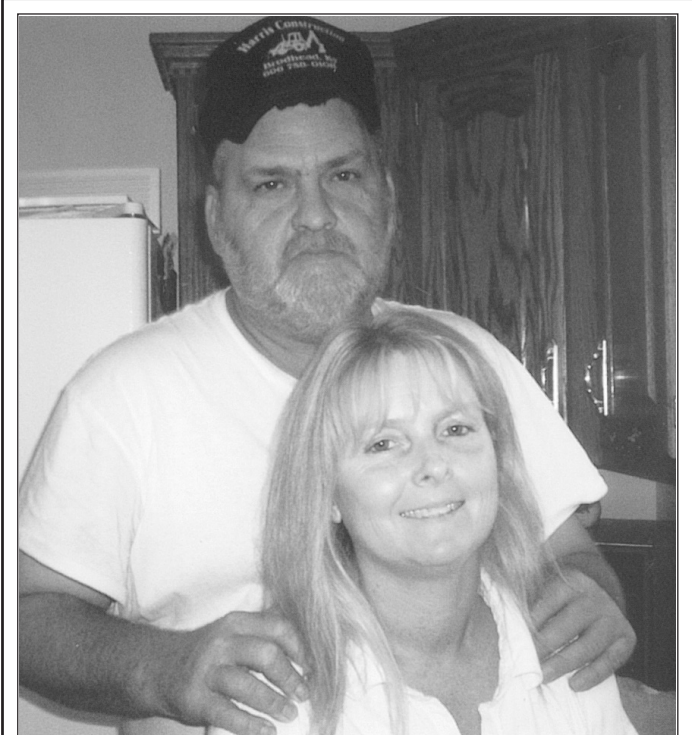

MRSA education and awareness

The local hospitals and health departments remind citizens that this time of the year, especially among sports teams, a nasty but common bacteria rears its ugly head. Community-associated MRSA, Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus Aureus, is a type of infection caused by Staph bacteria that is resistant to some common antibiotics, such as penicillin. The infected area usually starts out as a small bump resembling a pimple or a boil, which becomes red and often develops pus drainage. Many people go to their doctor's office with what they think is a spider bite and then a lab culture reveals that it is MRSA.

Staph bacteria are commonly carried on the skin or in the nose of healthy individuals. Staph and MRSA are spread by close contact either through direct physical contact with an infected individual or by touching objects contaminated with the bacteria. In most cases, MRSA infections are mild and can be treated successfully with proper hygiene and the appropriate antibiotics. If left untreated, MRSA can progress and become more difficult to treat.

Here are a few guidelines to help prevent and control the spread of MRSA in the locker room and community:

- Wash hands frequently with soap and water.
- Avoid sharing personal items such as towels, washcloths, razors, clothing, or uniforms.
- Report any suspicious skin sore or boil to your healthcare provider or school nurse.
- If you participate in sports involving close personal contact, shower with soap and water immediately after each practice, game or match.
- Non-washable gear should be wiped down with alcohol before and after each use.
- Athletic equipment such as wrestling or gymnastics mats should be wiped down regularly with an antibacterial solution.
- Athletes should receive a body check prior to a game or match.
- If you are not able to keep your wound covered with a clean, dry bandage at all times, do not participate in activities where you have skin-to-skin contact with

other persons (such as athletic activities) until your wound is healed.

•Any cut or break in the skin should be washed with soap and water and a clean dressing applied on a daily basis.
