Local woman gets 12 years

Loretta Whitaker, 39, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced Friday on two counts of first-degree trafficking in a controlled substance, to 12 years in prison, according to a news release from Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery.

According to UNITE prosecutor David Dalton, Whitaker was indicted in March and April of 2005, because of two separate occasions in July of last year, in which agents from Operation UNITE purchased Oxycontin from Whitaker.

In each case, a confidential

witness was able to buy an 80 milligram pill from Whitaker for \$100.

Rockcastle Circuit Judge David Tapp denied probation for Whitaker, who committed the crimes in Rockcastle

Voters have many choices

2006 General Election is just five days away

When Rockcastle County voters go the polls next Tuesday, they will have a number of decisions to make.

All Rockcastle voters will find races for United States Representative, Judge of the Kentucky Court of Appeals, Family Court Circuit Judge, District Judge and State Sena-

There are contested races on the ballot in three of the four magisterial districts, in the city council races at Mt. Vernon and Livingston and in the Mayor's race in Mt. Vernon and Livingston.

There are also five write-in candidates who have filed for the general election and whose votes will be counted.

Those whose names do not appear on the ballot are John Kemper, who is running as a write-in candidate against incumbent James Miller.

Donald Dees, is a write-in candidate in the fourth district magistrate's race against incumbent Republican Fred Mullins and Democrat challenger Jan Stevens.

Three candidates are running as write-ins in constable races. In district one, Ernest Alcorn is a write-in against Republican Dale McFerron; in district three, Rodney Adams is a writein against former Brodhead police chief Joe Bussell and, in district four, Donnie Cope has filed in the constable's race against Republican, Leonard Dale Miller.

Write-in candidates do not have to put a party affiliation on their application papers when they file to run. There are contested races in

magisterial districts one and three as well. Longtime Republican mag-

istrate Bill McKinney is facing opposition from Democrat Gary Gentry.

In district one, former magistrate Democrat John Holbrook is trying to get his seat back from incumbent Republican David Gibbs, who defeated him four years ago.

All other county government office holders and State Representative Danny Ford are unopposed, but are on the ballot.

School board members Angie Stallsworth and Tina Cain Hasty are also unopposed. Stallsworth represents, division one and Hasty represents, division three.

In Mt. Vernon incumbent Mayor Clarice Kirby has opposition from two current council members and a local business-

Kirby faces council mem-

bers Jack Renner and Betty Carter Bussell, along with Subway/Godfather's owner, Jerry Pensol.

There are seven people running for the six seats on the council.

Incumbents, Clark "Joe" Mullins, Wayne Bullock, Sharon Saylor and Shelley

Rockcastle Memories

There just isn't anything like good ol' rock and roll music. On Sunday, July 28, 1957, this skinny, flat-topped, thirteenyear-old teenager was glued to the television screen when Jerry Lee Lewis performed his hit, "Whole Lot of Shakin" on the Steve Allen show. I remember vividly that my mother (Bee) and my grandmother (Mommie Katie) were also watching the "boogie woogie" piano playing, rock and roll singer as he kicked his stool away and banged on the keys with a ferocity unseen at the time. For many, this was their first experience with rock and roll. Mommie Katie called him a "wild man" and exclaimed, "Lordy – Lordy!"

Lewis was a pioneer of piano rock not only from the sound he made famous but by his style of playing. He raked his hands up and down the keyboard and even played with his feet on occasion. Shortly

after the Steve Allen show, his hit propelled him to national fame. "Whole Lot of Shakin" moved up the charts until it reached number one in all fields of music - Pop, Country and Western, and Rhythm and Blues. Only two other singers accomplished this feat – Elvis Presley and Carl Perkins.

Later that same year, Jerry Lee released his second record breaking hit, "Great Balls of Fire," and it also reached the number one spot in all three categories. No one before or since has duplicated this accomplishment probably never will. However, the title of this song created lots of controversy and labeled Lewis as a "bad boy" of rock and roll. He embraced the title and even played the role to its fullest extent. I remember hearing many adults at the time discussing how vulgar and

Not too long ago, my daughter was asking about forfeiture of property for drug crimes following some news story she had read at school. I explained the



forfeitures glected to mention the Biblical and commonlaw origins. Almost everyone is

aware that the commission of certain crimes may give rise to the forfeiture of property used or intended to be used in the commission of the crime (instrumentalities) or property derived

from the commission of crime (proceeds). Though commonly thought of as a sanction for drug related offenses, the truth is that forfeitures are available to deter or punish a wide variety of criminal conduct, including money laundering, organized gambling offenses, child pornography, obscenity, racketeering, and a wide variety of other conduct.

Forfeitures are divided into two general categories, criminal and civil. Criminal forfeitures occur only following the convic-

tion for a crime and are in personam, that is directed at a particular person's interest. Thus, if during a cocaine transaction, the trafficker uses his vehicle, let's say a glistening new Dodge Ram pick-up, to transport the drugs or the proceeds following the exchange, the jury may, upon conviction for the underlying drug crime, also forfeit the vehicle to the government. This is the most common type of forfeiture and by far, the least his-

Civil forfeitures, though now less common, are far more historically interesting. A civil forfeiture proceeds upon the fiction that the property itself is the wrongdoer, and thus these proceedings are in rem--against the thing. Historically, they required no criminal conviction and the offending object, whether it be a car, a boat, or even real estate, was the defen-

torically controversial.

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Are your house plants poisonous?

If you are like most people, you probably have several plants in your house plus some seasonal ones, such as poinsettia, holly

Most people do not know which plants are poisonous and which are safe. Many of us are not even sure of their common names, much less their scientific names. Since children under six commonly in-

gest plant leaves and berries, here are some quick notes on house plants and poisoning.

There are over 100,000 plant poisonings each year in the United States. Most are mild; only a few lead to serious illness or death. But these episodes are very frighten-


ing and can be averted by a little common sense and knowing which plants must be kept away from children.

Most cases of ingestion cause no symptoms and those that do usually cause local irritation, such as burning in the lips, mouth and throat. Plants causing these symptoms include philodendron, dieffenbachia, dumb cane, schefflera, umbrella plant

The next most common symptoms are nausea, diarrhea and other gut symptoms. This may occur from holly leaves, poinsettia, yew, inkberry, bittersweet, climbing nightshade, rhododendron and azalea.

Very few are lethal. Only a few people die each year from ingestions and most of these are poisonous mushrooms. The plants which a person must be very careful with, especially around children, are yew, rhododendron, azalea, rosebay or oleander, castor beans and daphne.

Always be careful with poisonous plants, and if there is an ingestion, bring the plant, or at least a large clipping, with you



dant. Hence, you may have heard of strange case names like United States of America v. Real Property Located at 100 Park Place, New York, New York or United States v. The Endurance, a 80 Foot Sailing Ves-

Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes attributed the origins of these civil forfeitures to early man's desire to personify inanimate objects. In Homes words, "The hatred for anything giving us pain, which wreaks itself on the manifest cause . . . leads even civilized man to kick a door when it pinches his finger. 'Thus, man has always punished the "thing" that has wronged him. Early Judeo-Christian theology teaches that the oxen that goreth a man was slain and given to the decedent's family or more likely to the king or local nobleman who then distributed the meat amongst the populace.

The best example of the personification of an inanimate object, and not coincidentally the root of modern day civil forfeiture procedure, arises in admiralty. Ships have historically been endowed with human characteristics, they are, again in the words of Holmes, the most living of inanimate

things". We attribute them with gender and despite being captained, they exercise an independence from man's control, reacting to wind and current as a live thing, and each with their own personality. Thus, this personification fiction gave rise to unique perspectives in applying civil forfeitures.

Because the "thing" itself is in the wrong, guilt or innocence of the owner is not historically a concern, thus criminal convictions were not usually required before an object, be it a ship, a car, or even land itself, could be forfeited to the government. For example, suppose a ship owner leased his vessel to a captain, who then collided with another vessel. The ship's owner is free from personal liability but the ship remains the only logical source from which the wronged can recover is damages. In modern times, these civil forfeitures oftentimes resulted in the harsh reality that mothers and fathers lost valuable property due to crimes committed by their children. Fortunately, civil forfeitures have largely fallen into disfavor and are only infrequently used.

Criminal forfeitures remain a vital tool in remedying the effects of certain crimes and deterring many others. They serve only to determine the ownership of the wrongdoers' interest in particular property and thus, rarely affect the innocent.












Members, who were neither candidates nor judges, were polled concerning the candidates' knowledge of the law, experience and judicial demeanor.

The poll was released by bar association member Jerry Cox, who said his law partner, Jerry Fish, president of the bar association, conducted the poll.

According to a press release, these type polls have been encouraged by the Supreme Court of Kentucky in the case of *Dean v. Bondurant* wherein it observed, "...that lawyers, because of their opportunity for personal observation and investigation, have a special responsibility to

distasteful this song was for young ears. Some even called it "devil music." My mother was one of those parents. Whatever the music was labeled, my friends and I could not sit still and listen to him play. We had to be moving to his wild beat!

In 1958, Jerry Lee released "Breathless" which reached the number 3 spot on the Rhythm and Blues charts. While on tour in London, reporters discovered that Jerry Lee had married his thirteen-year-old first cousin. The publicity of this news created an uproar that almost killed his musical career. He was dropped from the Dick Clark show. Because of the incident he went from earning \$10,000 per night for his concerts to \$100 a night in beer joints and small clubs.

Jerry Lee's life has been plagued with many personal problems. His oldest son was killed in an automobile accident, and his second son drowned in a swimming pool incident. Lewis has always been a heavy drinker and has suffered from health problems for most of his life. In 1970, he checked himself into the Betty Ford Clinic. In spite of his personal problems, Lewis continues to play his music and tours with his band. Roy Orbison called Jerry Lee the "best raw performer in the history of rock and roll music." Lewis was part of the first group inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1986.

A few days ago, I was checking out the latest CD releases at one of my favorite music stores and found a new disc by "The Killer." It is a compilation of duets sung by Jerry Lee and 21 other famous rock and roll stars (and a few country). Of course, I bought a copy and immediately put it in my SUV's CD player. I was pleasantly surprised that the 70year-old rocker still can make you want to get up and boogie woogie. Before I could drive home, I had turned up the volume and was keeping the beat on the steering wheel.

On the back of the disk a paragraph describes what is inside. It says, "50 years ago, Sam Phillips' legendary Sun Records in Memphis, Tennessee was the home of Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, Roy Orbison, Carl Perkins, and Jerry Lee Lewis. The founding fathers of rock and roll – today Jerry Lee Lewis is the 'Last Man Standing'."

"Everybody's dying. They're all gone," said Lewis. He may be living in a world of ghosts, but his talent has not died. Every track of his latest CD makes you want to pat your foot and sing along. Jerry Lee has thrown himself into each cut of the album. You can feel his excitement as he croons with the likes of B.B. King, Bruce Springsteen, Mick Jagger, Rod Stewart, George Jones, Willie Nelson, Eric Clapton, Kris Kristofferson, and 13 others.

In this man's opinion, "The Killer" is alive and well at 70 years of age. Old rockers like me will love this disk. Keep it up – Jerry Lee!

In the race for Family Court Judge, Judge Debra Lambert and former Judge Walter Maguire were very close with each receiving votes in the qualified and highly qualified area.

The Bar Association feels no need to comment on uncontested races, according to the release.

Cox said that not all members of the local Bar voted on the poll.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds and Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette, both members of the local Bar said they did not receive a copy of the poll.

"It upsets me somewhat that this matter was not even brought before the Bar, as to whether to conduct a poll or not, at least I know I was not contacted," Burdette said.

"I'm not sure how much stock you can take in the results of a poll, when not every member of the Bar was given the opportunity to vote," Reynolds said.

County while on probation from felony charges in Boyle County. Whitaker received two six year sentences to run consecutively.

Also on Friday, Elmer Robbins, 40, of Brodhead pled guilty to one count of second degree sodomy, with an individual under 14 years old.

Commonwealth assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley recommended a sentence of six years to be probated for five years.

Robbins is to have no contact with minors under age 18, except his own children, as long as the mother is present.

Robbins, who was indicted in May will also have to register as a sex offender.

Judy Carman Ritchie, 58, of Dayton Ohio pled guilty to complicity to trafficking in a controlled substance while in possession of a firearm, first offense, first degree and to trafficking in a controlled substance third degree, also while in possession of a firearm.

Bartley recommended a total sentence of 25 years, to be probated for five years.

Christopher Alton Bradley, 28, of Crab Orchard, who had pled guilty in August to the cultivation of marijuana over five plants, first offense was sentenced to three years in prison, probated for three years and he was placed on home incarceration for sixty days.

Mark Proctor, 26, of Mt. Vernon has his pre-trial diversion revoked after he failed to complete conditions of his release, including failing to complete drug court.

Bartley recommended that his two year sentence be imposed. Proctor was indicted in September of last year for theft by unlawful taking over \$300.

His sentencing date is November 13th.

David 'Piggy" Madden, 51, entered an Alford Plea, after being indicted in May for second degree trafficking. Bartley recommended a year in jail.

His sentencing date is November 29th.

Bartley also recommended that probation for Frankie Chestnut 43, of East Bernstadt be revoked and his three year sentence be imposed, after violating his probation.

Chestnut was indicted in March of last year for possession of a controlled substance first degree and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Probation for Samantha Dillingham, 37, of Brodhead and Darrell W. Lamb, Jr., 32, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon were also revoked for non-payment of child support.

Dillingham will receive her full two year prison term and

Lamb is facing a three year term in jail, on the recommendation of Bartley.

Dillingham was indicted in June of last year for non-payment of over \$7,000 in child support and Lamb was indicted in March of last year for not paying, \$10,700 in child support.

In Brodhead, Mayor Walter Lee Cash is unopposed and there are four candidates, incumbents, Larry Taylor and Rick Branham are joined on the ballot by Johnny Boone Saylor and Marvin E. Owens.

Current council members, Johnny Harris and Johnny Wilcop did not file.

In the race for Judge of the Court Appeals in district three, former Rockcastle County Attorney James H. Lambert is challenging former Rockcastle and Pulaski County District Judge Mike Henry, who is the incumbent.

Lambert served as county attorney from 1982 to 1994.

Henry served three terms as district judge, until being

elected to the Court of Appeals.
Although all three Circuit
Judge seats are up for grabs,
only one is contested.

Incumbent Family Court

Circuit Judge Debra Lambert of Mt. Vernon is being challenged by retired District Judge Walter Maguire of Somerset.

Lambert was appointed in

1988 to the position and was elected in 2000, when she defeated challenger Mike Duncan, also of Somerset.

Circuit Judges Jeff Burdette of Mt. Vernon and David Tapp of Somerset are unopposed.

The 28th Judicial Circuit is made up of Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln Counties.

Both district judge seats are also on the ballot, but only one race is contested.

Current District Judge Katie Wood of Somerset, who was appointed last year to fill then district David Tapp's seat, is being challenged by current assistant commonwealth attorney and assistant Rockcastle County Attorney John Gillum, also of Somerset. District Judge Scott Lawless, who was also appointed is unopposed. The 28th Judicial District is comprised of Rockcastle and Pulaski counties.

In the 34th Senate district, made up of Rockcastle, Lincoln and Madison counties, incumbent Democrat Ed Worley is being challenged by Republican Barry Metcalf.

Both men are from Richmond.

Four years ago, Worley defeated Metcalf by 1,900 votes.

Metcalf has experience in state government, serving as state senator from 1994 to 1999 and he has made casino gambling the hot issue of his campaign, saying Worley is in favor of casino gambling for Kentucky

Worley, who has been the Democrat's Senate Floor Leader for the past four years has touted his record on what he calls tremendous improvements in education for his district, while in office.

Donald Vanwinkle of the Evangelical Christian Party is also a candidate for the state senate.

Fifth District United State Congressman Harold Rogers of Somerset, who has been in Congress since 1980 has opposition from Barbourville lawyer, Democrat Kenneth Stepp.

District five is composed of counties in southeast and eastern Kentucky.

The actual general election may not be until next Tuesday, but 129 Rockcastle Countians have already voted.

As of Wednesday, 74 voters had cast their ballots in County Clerk Norma Houk's office by way of the absentee voting machine and 55 more had mailed their absentee ballots in. Absentee voters can vote in Houk's office through Monday.

Mrs. Houk said she mailed out 101 absentee ballots and that her office would take them, via mail, until election day.

Absentee ballots will be counted in the clerk's office at 10 a.m. on election day, but results will not be publicly announced until 6 p.m., after the polls close.

and water bottles, laundry detergent jugs, bleach and fabric softener jugs, milk and water jugs, cooking oil bottles and jugs, shampoo bottles, dish liquid bottles and alcohol bottles), (all lids must be removed and thrown into the trash (not to be included with the recyclable) and all jugs must be rinsed out), metal cans must also be rinsed and empty aerosol cans, aluminum cans and phone books will also be accepted.

Rechargeable batteries such as those found in: cordless power tools, cellular phones (the whole phone can be recycled) cordless phones, laptop computers, digital cameras, two-way radios, camcorders and remote control toys. "If it says rechargeable on it, it's recycable," Renner said.

However, knowing who someone's grandma was often helps, just ask the 48-year-old man from Calloway County who came to Livingston looking for his birth mother recently.

The gentleman, who was adopted at the age of three months, knew his mother's name, that she was from the Livingston area and that she should have been in the 1960 Livingston High School annual.

He first talked to Dell Ponder who told him that Livingston City Clerk Ann Senters had all the Livingston High School annuals and referred him to her.

Mrs. Senters does not have all the annuals but, when the man told her his mother's name, she knew that the family had been raised in the same "holler" as her husband, Gene. She also knew the woman's ex brotherin-law and gave the man a call. He told Ann that his oldest

daughter knew where her aunt, the man's mother, who now lives in Knoxville, TN, was.

Ann gave her a call and she was excited since she knew that her aunt had tried to find her son many years ago and had been told that he died at birth. Ann gave the niece the man's phone number and his mother contacted him and they are to meet next week

Ann also said that she had been able to give the man a lead on his biological father, since she had a cousin that had married into that family.

The man was very appreciative to say the least. He told Ann that he began looking for his mother two years ago when he became ill and needed more information on his medical history.

He said he first tried to get his adoption record but was told they were sealed. He hired a lawyer but told Senters that she had helped him more in two days than the lawyer had in two years and gave Ann a \$50 gift card to Cracker Barrell as a token of his appreciation.

Steer clear of deer

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) is joining the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and law enforcement agencies across the Commonwealth urging motorists to focus on defensive driving skills during the forthcoming deer mating season. Collisions with deer can result in very serious consequences.

"We are obviously concerned with the safety of motorists. Deer-related crashes can result in serious injuries or death," said Transportation Secretary Bill Nighbert. "We are also very much aware of the financial burdens that collisions with deer inevitably bring. For those reasons we are very serious about our responsibility to get the message out there and pound it home: Motorists need to be a lot more cautious this time of year."

Despite the popular misconception that hunters are flushing the deer out into the roadways in greater numbers this time of year, the most influential stimulus is the decrease in daylight which triggers the mating urge in deer.

'Simply stated, this is the time of year that deer breed," said David Yancy, Senior Wildlife Biologist for the Department of Fish and Wildlife. "All of the activity associated with the whitetail mating season, which we refer to as the 'rut', causes deer to cross our roads more frequently. In general, the entire deer population is very unsettled this time of year, and they are on the move everywhere." Yancy also pointed out that without the effects of hunting, there would be even more deer crossing the roads.

The typical whitetail deer mating season ranges from late October to late January. Fish and Wildlife statistics clearly show that the peak mating season is from mid to late November. That time is also a peak time for deer/auto collisions.Ê In fact, statistics show that the number of deer/auto collisions in November is nearly twice as many as those

in October. "Vigilance should be the watchword," said Commissioner Tim Hazlette of the KYTC Department of Transportation Safety. "Too many of us have learned the hard way that it only takes a deer a second or two to dart out of the woods and into your path, leaving you almost no time to react. My advice is to be alert and be buckled up. Most serious injuries resulting from collisions with deer have been suffered by those who were not wearing their safety

belts."

While even the most cautious drivers do not have any guarantees that they will be able to avoid a collision with a deer, the Department of Transportation Safety offers the

following suggestions:
 •Always wear your seatbelt.
 •Drive defensively, constantly scanning the roadside.

•If you spot a deer on the edge of the road, blow your horn. Use a long steady blast to get the deer's attention.

•If a deer freezes in your headlights, flick the beams on and off to break the deer's concentration. That may cause the deer to move.

•Slow down immediately. Proceed slowly until you are past the point where the deer have crossed.

•Don't swerve. Stay in your lane. Most fatalities stemming from deer-related accidents involve drivers swerving, in an effort to miss the deer, and hitting a stationary object.

•If the worst happens, keep both hands on the wheel and brake down steadily.

•Report any deer collision, even if the damage is minor.

•Nationally, about 500,000 deer collisions occur on U.S. roadways each year, causing an average of \$2,000 in damage

Rockets down Central 22-7 for ninth victory

The Rockcastle County Rockets upped their season record to 9-1 on Friday night with a 22-7 win over the visiting Knox Central Panthers.

The Panthers jumped out to an early 7-0 lead on a 49 yard pass over the middle with 9:40 to go in the first quarter, but it was the only time they would find the end zone the rest of the night.

On the Rocket's next possession, they took the ball straight down the field and scored on a two yard run by quarterback Izak McQueary.

Brad Durham added the extra point kick and, with 7:54 left in the first period, the score was tied at seven.

Still in the first period, the Rockets scored again when tailback Dusty Miller scampered 75 yards to pay dirt, but this time the extra point kick failed and the Rockets were ahead 13-7.

The Rockets took that 13-7 lead into the dressing room at half-time and, in the third period, Durham added to the Rocket lead with a 28 yard field goal.

In the final two minutes of the game, Donovan Pigg blocked a Panther punt and Miller took the ball in from the four yard line. The extra point kick was again no good, but the Rockets had won their sixth straight game of the regular season and finished district play undefeated.

"The sloppy field conditions made it difficult for both teams to play their best football," said Rocket head coach Tom Larkey.

The poor field conditions no doubt contribued to six Rockcastle fumbles and two Knox Central fumbles.

The Rockets lost three of their six fumbles and Knox Central turned the ball over both times they fumbled.

'I had a feeling all week that it was going to be a struggle to win the game and the field conditions was the great equalizer," Larkey said. "Knox Central has a good team and they really improved during the season," he added.

The Rocket offense mounted only 265 yards, but the Rocket defense held the Panthers to just 110 yards.

The Panthers had 90 yards

ground and picked up only five first downs, compared to the Rockets 14.

Of the Rockets 265 yards senior tailback Dusty Miller accounted for 220 yards on 26 carries and he caught one pass

McQueary was four for eight passing for 17 yards and he carried the ball seven times for minus yardage.

Cody Mize ran the ball twice for 15 yards and he caught one pass for three yards. Adam Hensley had nine yards on one

Shawn Childress caught one pass for five yards and rushed the ball once for three yards.

Tanner Perkins had one catch for minus yardage.

Durham accounted for four points, with the extra point kick and the field goal.

Defensively, the Rockets were led by sophomore linebacker Casey Hayes who had an outstanding game with 11 tackles and assists. Four of his solo tackles were sacks.

Besides his blocked punt, Pigg had seven tackles and assists, which included a sack.

Defensive lineman Josh Garrison had two tackles and recovered a Panther fumble and Miller also added two tackles and intercepted a pass.

Durham had five tackles, one a sack, while Scott Daugherty and McQueary had four tackles and assists each.

Other Rockets recording tackles and assists on the night were: Zach Burkhart, three; Steve Trimble, two; Tanner Perkins, two; Childress, one and Hensley, one, which was good for a sack.

Friday night the Rockets host Clay County in the first round of the district seven play-offs.

In week seven, the Rockets destroyed Clay County 61-13 with a 41 point second half performance.

Knox Central travels to Bell County on Friday night and the winner of that game will play the winner of the Rockcastle/

The winner of district seven will likely face Johnson Central, from district eight for the regional championship.

If Rockcastle wins Friday night they will host the second through the air and 20 on the round game of the play-offs on


November 10th.





RCMS sixth grade all-stater Michaela Hunter added another accomplishment to her impressive cross-country resume this past Saturday at the KTCCCA Meet of Champions Elementary and Middle School State Cross-Country Championships held at Masterson Station Park in Lexington. Possibly the largest single sporting event in the state based on the number of participants, the Meet of Champions played host to well over a thousand athletes from kindergarten to 12th grade.

Michaela ran in the sixth grade and under division with an eye keenly on the state title, as well as the meet record. With over three hundred girls in the primary race and another hundred in the open race, the competition was tough to say the least. The race is a true determinant of the state champion since there are no class divisions. Michaela got off to a great start and led the field going into the first mile. She would never relinquish her lead and cruised to the state championship title with a personal best 3,000-meter time of 12:19.57. The despite the breezy, cool weather conditions and a wet, muddy course, Michael ran the second fastest time ever at the meet for 1.8 miles, missing the record by only five seconds.

Fifth grader Kellan Coffey had an outstanding performance as well. Kellan fought her way through the talented field of competitors and finished 166th overall. Her stellar time of 15:49.75 was an improvement of nearly one minute from last year's competition. Third grader Emily Childress ran a terrific race and finished 185th overall in an impressive 16:07.17, an improvement of one minute twentyfive seconds from a year ago. Fourth grader Rachel Cain ran a superb race and finished an impressive 193rd overall in 16:19.79, bettering her time from last year by eighteen sec-

Third grader Victor Chasteen was the only competitor for Rockcastle in the boys' elementary state championship race. Nearly five hundred runners competed in both divisions of the race. Victor ran exceptionally well in his first state meet, finishing 358th overall in an impressive 17:37.82.

RCHS sophomore Michael Thomason had an outstanding performance in the boys' Class 2A race. Michael finished an impressive 151st overall in 24:54.15, one of his best performances of the season against some very tough competition.

The RCHS girls' crosscountry team dropped to 9th place in the latest Class 2A poll released recently. Regional rival Lexington Catholic moved up to 6th. Michaela Hunter retained 5th place in the individual Class 2A rankings. The team came into the Meet of Champions hoping to improve their chances of defending their regional championship from a year ago. With three runners potentially in the top ten at region, RCHS looked to solidify the 4th thru 7th positions on the team, which will likely be a major determinant in this year's regional champion. The 6th position becomes extremely important at region since it is used as a tiebreaker for the overall team score.

The RCHS girls' had another impressive team performance and showed signs of improvement, despite missing Michaela Hunter, who ran in the sixth grade and under race, and all-stater Laura Dollins, who is out for the remainder of the season. RCHS finished 6th overall in the meet. They defeated Lexington Catholic, who ran their 'B' team in an attempt to not give away any strategies, but were defeated by West Jessamine, another regional rival.

Eighth grader Sara Hammond, running in her fourth meet of the season, ran exceptionally well. She finished an impressive 13th overall among the best Class 2A has to offer. Her outstanding time of 22:03.74 was her best this season. Freshman Deana Gabbard had another outstanding performance. She finished an impressive 28th overall with a new personal record time of Bullock ran well and placed 75th overall in an impressive





November recognized as Diabetes Month

Throughout November recognized nationally as American Diabetes Month and Diabetic Eye Disease Month the Department for Public Health (DPH) is reminding Kentuckians living with diabetes of the importance of dilated eye exams.

DPH is joining the American Diabetes Association and Prevent Blindness America to raise awareness of this important issue. Health officials and educators are using this time to teach Kentuckians about diabetes, particularly the impact the disease can have on eyesight and how people living with the disease can live healthier lives.

"Diabetic retinopathy is the most common form of diabetic eye disease and the leading cause of blindness in adults,' said William Hacker, M.D., acting undersecretary for health and public health commissioner at the Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS). "Finding and treating retinopathy early, before it results in a loss of vision or blindness, is our best treatment option. That's why we recommend that people living with diabetes get annual dilated eye exams."

Kentuckians of all ages and backgrounds live with diabetes. An estimated 376,000 Kentuckians have diabetes, with more than 109,000 of these individuals being undiagnosed. The commonwealth ranks seventh (tied with two other states) in the nation for the highest percentage of the adult population diagnosed with diabetes, according to DPH data.

For Kentuckians living with diabetes, appropriate medical care and self management are crucial to maintaining a healthy life despite the disease.

Trend data shows more people have been getting necessary dilated eye exams over the years, with an adjusted rate of 55.6 in 1995 compared to 65.5 in 2004.

"With over one-third of Kentuckians with diabetes not getting the recommended dilated eye exam, there is much room for improvement," said Janice Haile, of the Kentucky Diabetes Prevention and Control Program. "It is very important for Kentucky practitioners and diabetes educators to take steps to ensure that people with diabetes understand the importance of getting this critical exam."

The Kentucky Diabetes Network (KDN) Health Plan Partners recently developed a diabetes and eye disease brochure that includes a form to assist the medical provider in obtaining reports of dilated eye exams from the eye doctor. Yards to Paradise

As trees lose their green and present us with a palate of yellow, orange, red and purple, what a lovely time to be outdoors as much as possible!

As shorter days and cooler nights bring a halt to growth (at least limb and leaf growth) in most trees and plants, there's less urgency to jump out of our air-conditioned autos and into our air-conditioned homes, it's a splendid time to study or rediscover your outdoor space at your place.

From enjoying your yard (or going for a drive in the mountains if your neighborhood is not colorful) and the change of colors and to seeing the skeleton of the landscape with the leaves littering the ground as winter approaches. Fall is a perfect time to imagine and plan for future years if your piece of paradise is not as lovely as you wish it were.

When leaves are missing, frequently we see the ditches, streams, stone outcroppings, mulched planting beds, perhaps nests of birds or squirrels.Ê Seeing the bones of the landscape can be useful as we make plans to improve our

yards. Designing before digging has always been words of wisdom I recommend you follow. We can, of course, move a young tree before it gets too well established, or we can build a deck or patio around the tree, if we did not get it perfectly sited to begin with. (Hiring a landscape architect or designer to do a plan, even if you want to save money by doing your own landscaping, is a wise idea if you are unaccustomed to gardening,

farming or landscaping, or are artistically challenged.)

Fall can be a super time to build that new walk or path, construct that deck, gazebo, patio or pond.

Creating planting beds or raised beds and lightly mulching them can get you a big jump on the plantings you wish to do in the spring.

Preserving part of nature if you're fortunate to have some in your yard or your new home site, is very desirable. It takes years to grow a big tree, but protecting some already existing on a building site can be so worth the small amount of trouble.

I'd even suggest our federal and state lawmakers could give tax credits away to developers who preserve some existing greenery, surprising how money can talk.

Speaking of taxes, couldn't city councils allow a deduction off property tax bills for new street trees that make a town prettier? Instead of rules, why not try incentives?

To tree planting: if the ground is not frozen, tree roots are still active; so, consider fall planting of trees as they will be less stressed if their roots get established before they need to send out new leaves.

Same for many shrubs and perennials. Just keep in mind that frosts can heave shallow plants up out of the ground in winter where drying winds hitting exposed roots may spell death to some new plants.

Mulch for temperature regulation, for erosion control, for weed control, and for it's good appearance.

Consider planting some fruit trees. Again, if your congressman is like mine, he can move rivers and mountains, dig tunnels and build waterparks. Couldn't he give every home a free backyard apple tree?

Fruiting vines, trees, an ornamental strawberry bed, or a backdoor herb garden can be a lovely addition to most landscapes as well as a source of free homegrown organic produce.

Allow your imagination to roam as you take that brisk autumn stroll or leisurely weekend drive. Fall can be such a productive time. To landscape since the lawn mower is retired and the heat and humidity of summer have receded.





While I have never had a personal dispute in Family Court, over the past several years I have listened to numerous people involved with Family Court. Their stories of having their children forcibly removed by the current Family Court Judge are nearly all identical.

According to the law passed by you, I, and our neighbors, children are to be taken from their parents only in cases of abuse or neglect. The current Family Court Judge should be bound by this law. Yet, in the cases I hear about, there are simply no allegations of abuse or neglect.

Number of Kentucky farmers' market up 10%

The number of registered farmers' markets in Kentucky increased 10.2 percent and the number of vendors rose 7.7 percent from 2005 to 2006, according to the Kentucky Department of Agriculture's 2006 farmers' market report.

Janet Eaton, the KDA's farmers' market coordinator who wrote the report, attributed the growth to three factors: "It's farmers looking for local outlets, customers looking for local products, and the freshness issue." She called farmers' markets "a win-win for local communities." Markets promote nutrition and wellness, enhance economic development, preserve family farms and create a public gathering space, Eaton said.

The number of farmers' markets in Kentucky grew from 98 last year to 108 this year. The number of vendors increased from 1,678 in 2005 to 1,808 this year. Eaton said the increase in vendor numbers can be attributed in part to the increased diversity of products offered at the markets.

Another "huge, huge thing for Kentucky's small farmers," according to Eaton, was a 2003 bill that allows Kentuckians to produce products in their homes to sell. "If they don't sell their produce at the market, they can process it into value-added products with a longer shelf life," she said. Some of the most popular products of this legislation are jams, jellies and baked goods, Eaton said.

"That piece of legislation has probably added more income to our small farmers' bottom lines than any one thing," Eaton said. "The surrounding states are so envious of Kentucky."

Gross sales at Kentucky farmers' markets in 2005 totaled nearly \$7 million, according to the report. The Lexington Farmers' Market became the first in Kentucky to report more than \$1 million in sales in a year with a total of more than \$1.8 million – more than two times greater than the state's No. 2 market in Boone County. Lexington vendors reported average sales of \$25,853 last year.

Eaton stated in the report that the KDA's support of farmers' markets has "contributed significantly to their growth both in numbers and sales." The Department provides advertising cost share

[Today's guest columnist is Anita Galbreath. This column first appeared in *The Bridge*, the newspaper of Somerset Community College. Here Ms. Galbreath relates her personal experience as a victim of domestic violence.]

Have you ever been in a relationship where you felt hopeless and that there was no way out of it? If so, you are not alone. One out of every five women has been abused by a spouse or partner at some point in her life. Since October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month, it's a good time to examine abusive relationships.

I was in an abusive marriage for almost seven years, and I finally had the courage and strength to get out in October 2003. But not before I went down a long spiraling path of continuous chaos and turmoil.

My breaking point was when the courts had given temporary custody of my children to my parents, due to the constant vio-

encouraged to attend.

lence in my home, which brought law enforcement to my home almost every week. At that point, my children were only two and four years old. I was suicidal and homicidal all at the same time. I was scared of dying at my husband's hands, but I also considered committing suicide. I could not go on living that way anymore.

Many women go through this same scenario every single day, every single minute, and nothing gets done about it, except an occasional trip to the nearest emergency room. Even when this happens the abuser is usually sitting right beside the victim, and therefore the incident goes unreported.

Many people feel that domestic violence is a "private family matter," but trust me, it is not. Did you know that the leading cause of homicide against women is violence in the home? If you hear a neighbor scream or yell, call the police. You can help without even

abused have a major fear of being killed if they leave. The ma-

jor source of power for any abuser is control. In my case, my ex-husband tried to control everything in my life. I could not have a job because I was constantly accused of infidelity. He was alienating me from my family and friends. I as always put down, called obscene names (which cannot be printed), and would never amount to anything in my life. He also controlled all the money in the household.

I was a prisoner in my own home because I was so ashamed and depressed that most days I didn't even have the ability to get out of the bed and function. This included taking care of my

Finally in October 2003, I walked out and never went back. Since then, I have gained full custody of my children, and he has not seen them in two years. I started back to school in August 2004, and will graduate in May 2007, maintaining a 3.0 GPA, and majoring in Journalism. I am currently writing a book, my autobiography, which will be a best seller!

Eventually I will get my BA in Journalism with a minor in Social Work. You see, God has truly blessed me and my family, and I don't feel like I would have gone through the things in my life, if I wasn't meant to help others.

My children are very happy and well adjusted now, and I am finally happily married to a wonderful man.

Together we can make a difference and break the cycle of

The auction will begin at 10 a.m. on the Cumberland Ranger District of the Daniel Boone National Forest near Morehead. The work center parking lot on Highway 801 South, across from the dam at Cave Run Lake, will serve as the auction location.

Registration for bidders is required on the day of the auction. Bidders may begin registration at 7 a.m. Registration will continue until the scheduled time for auction. Property will be sold competitively to the highest bidder. Bidders must be present, 18 years of age or older and have a valid drivers license in their possession.

Provisions of the auction state that the conditions of the vehicles is not guaranteed. Inspection will be Friday, Nov. 17 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Credit cards are not an acceptable form of payment. Personal and business checks are accepted, only if accompanied by an informal letter of credit from a legitimate bank. The letter must state that the bank will guarantee the check up to the dollar amount spent for a period of up to 30 days after the date of the auction. All payments are requested in full by 3 p.m. on Nov. 18.

The USDA Forest Service expects to receive fair market value for the vehicles to be sold. The agency reserves the right to reject unacceptable bids.



Talented Gregg Moyer is a craftsman and musician

Had it not been for a three week long period of bad luck, local muscian and craftsman Gregg Moyer may not have had any luck at all - at least any luck ending up in Rockcastle County.

The six year resident of the county is a truly multi-talented individual, working as a master wood worker by day and a musician at night.

Gregg the woodworker was born and raised in a family of woodworkers in

Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

Perkasie, PA, a small Pennsylvania town 38 miles northwest of Philadelphia. Both his father and grandfather were accomplished craftsmen and, in 1972, Gregg began a five year apprenticeship with a well known "art furniture" designer and builder from Bucks County, Pa.

For the next nineteen years Moyer worked for two woodworking firms, honing his craft and in 1993 he, along with a partner, opened a cabinet making company, "Paster and

Mover Cabinetmakers."

His firm served the Philadelphia area, specializing in high end cabinetry, as well as custom made doors and windows.

A nine month restoration project on the island of Bermuda was the highlight of that partnership. "I loved the work but wanted a smaller more personal business where I could interact with people as opposed to dealing with large corporations," Moyer said.

Moyer said that he had al-

ways loved the south and, in 2000, an opportunity brought him to Kentucky where he set up his one-man shop in Mt. Vernon.

The opportunity which brought Moyer to the county was work on the home on the Ed Mullins farm at Scallfold Cane. "My girlfriend bought the house and farm from her uncle and I worked to restore the house for about a year," he

While working for his girlfriend, Moyer met a Berea designer, who contracted with Moyer for several jobs.

Moyer specializes in custom made cabinetry and furniture and furniture restoration.

"I simply love the area and the people are so nice, I have found my home," he said Mon-

Gregg the musician plays drums and sings with "Soulpatch" a Rock "N" Soul band from Richmond, which plays approximately two weekends a month.

Gregg played drums professionally from 1976 to 1987 and can play all musical instruments, including the piano.

Five of those years from '76 to '87 were spent playing in the casinos of Atlantic City and a short gig in Las Vegas.

Gregg played piano professionally from 1995 to 2001, while doing woodworking part time. "I found that I enjoyed the

song writing process more than playing live five to six nights a week," Gregg said. Gregg's songwriting and

singing has led him to the internet.

At the encouragement of a friend, Gregg has posted three songs on the website, www.Soundclick.com which is a world wide site for unsigned musicians and songwriters to feature their songs.

As of last week, all three songs were ranked very high on the website.

"Greatest Part of Me," a song Gregg entered in the Contemporary Gospel category was ranked 17th out of 1,182 songs. Gregg's entry in the Con-

temporary Christian category, "Have it All" was ranked 40th out of 6,492 entires and "Mary Had a Baby" was 41st of 2,437 songs in the Urban Gospel category.

Gregg did not have any insurance on his car or his equipment and he was all alone.

"I thought maybe it was time to re-think some things," the 52-year-old bachelor said, with a big smile on his face.
