At 4:30 a.m. Thursday, Kentucky State Police responded to multiple-vehicle crashes with and without injury on I-75 in the north and southbound lanes, near Exit 59. KSP Public Affairs Officer Don Trosper said that a total of seven traffic crashes, involving 20 vehicles occurred within a two mile stretch of the interstate. Four people were treated at the Rockcastle Hospital, including a Frankfort couple who were driving the above pictured Kia Sedona mini-van which rear-ended a KC truck from Manchester. The truck was hauling empty crates used to transport motor parts. The woman had a severe laceration and the man broke his left leg in two places. They were cut from the vehicle by members of the Mt. Vernon Fire and Rescue squad. In the middle photo, workers remove cereal from a transfer truck and load it onto a smaller truck, after the truck was involved in one of the seven wrecks. In the top photo, crews worked for hours to remove the transfer truck, which caused most of Thursday's delays. The truck driver, from Canada escaped the fiery crash without a scratch. The interstate was closed both north and south for several hours Thurday and traffic was re-routed along US 25 and Hwy. 461. The interstate wreck, caused primarily by very heavy fog, caused a virtual log jam of traffic in and around Mt. Vernon most of the day.

## County awards bid for clean-up of illegal dump

In a continuing effort to rid the county of illegal dump garbage, the Rock-castle County Fiscal Court awarded another bid to a contractor for the cleanup of a huge illegal dump on Burnt Ridge Road at their regular meeting Tuesday.

Keeton Excavation of West Liberty was the low bidder of the six bids received.

The money for the contract to clean-up the dump will come from the federally funded PRIDE (Personal Responsibility in a Desired Environment) program.

The bids ranged from Keeton's low bid of \$51,111 to the high bid of \$148,250 submitted by Hinkle Contracting

Corporation of Lexington.

Although the county has never done any business with Keeton and did not inspect any of his work, Solid Waste Coordinator, James Renner told the court that Keeton had worked in seven counties for PRIDE.

"The PRIDE director for dump clean-ups knows him well and says he will do a good job," Renner told the court.

Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis and Renner assured the court that the site would be inspected before PRIDE released the money for the cleanup. The money will be a direct reimbursement to the county from PRIDE with no matching

Burdette said Didonato had initially been very skeptical of the drug court program. But, because of the value of the rehabilitative approach, Didonato was anything but skeptical.

Drug court participants are required to have stringent drug and alcohol testing, out-patient

prison time himself. In 2003, the Dog traveled to Puerto Vallarta to apprehend Max Factor heir Andrew Luster who had been charged in connection with three alleged rapes. Ironically, after being arrested in Mexico for the illegal apprehension, the Dog posted bail and then falled to appear for court. Mexican officials then initiated extradition proceedings. Most recently, a Mexican appellate

court issued an order staying further proceedings against the Dog. Whether this development signals the impending dismissal of charges remains unclear.

Bounty hunters, also known as bail enforcement agents, are generally employees of bail bondsmen. In many states, after a defendant is arrested for a criminal charge the court may set a monetary bail which when posted permits the defendant to remain free pending trial. Since most defendants cannot raise such large sums, many choose instead to pay a small fee to a bondsman who then posts the entire amount of the bond with the court to ensure the defendant's subsequent availability. If the defendant fails to appear for court, the bondsman faces the prospect that the court may forfeit the bond, typically a sum entailing thousands of dollars. Bounty hunters are re-

## Rockcastle Memories

My eldest grandchild, Baylor, was born on November 22. His birthday is not one that I have to write down because the date was etched into my memory decades before he was born. I knew on the day of Baylor's arrival that I would never have any trouble remembering his birthday – and that it would always take me back to the same date in 1963.

I will never forget that Friday, a cold November afternoon. I got into my car, after attending a college class, and heard the news that John Fitzgerald Kennedy had been gunned down in Dallas, Texas. Chills still run down my spine as I type these words. It was the most memorial moment in my young life. He was, and remains, a hero to me.

Upon heading back to my dorm in my '58 Chevy, the radio announced, "President Kennedy was gunned down today by an assassin's bullet in Dallas, Texas." At first, I just froze – and then I began to cry. I hurried to my dorm room to hook up my reel-to-reel recorder. The tape ran for the next four hours of coverage from WHAS radio in Louisville. My dorm room was filled to capacity with young men listening to the saga unfolding in Dallas. No one was talking or going anywhere.

Sometime later, everyone began to congregate around the small black and white television in the recreation room of the dorm. The sound from the TV filled the room. Not another sound could be heard. For the next three days, the nation was glued to the coverage documented the events surrounding the assassination.

We watched as Lee Harvey Oswald was arrested in a theatre shortly after Kennedy died. We witnessed the execution of Oswald when Jack Ruby shot him in a Dallas police station. One escalating event seemed to follow another throughout the weekend

Nothing was more heartwrenching than Kennedy's funeral. The rider-less horse (named Black Jack), John John's salute to his father, and the countless numbers of Americans that lined the road to Arlington National Cemetery. I can still hear the beat of the drums and the sound of the hooves as the carriage bearing the body of our slain President rolled down the street toward his final resting place.

Dignitaries from all over the world came to pay their last respects to President Kennedy and his family. Many of these important world leaders marched behind the casket for the entire trip from the Capitol to Arlington Cemetery, a distance of six miles. An estimated one million people lined the route with hardly a dry eye in the multitude.

I was a sophomore at Mt. Vernon High School when John Kennedy ran for the presidency. In the Democratic primary, he faced Senator Hubert Humphrey Minnesota, Senator Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, and Adlai Stevenson, who was the favorite "write-in" candidate. On July 13, 1960, the Democratic Party nominated Kennedy as its candidate for

My grandfather, Eugene Stokes, was one of Rockcastle County's most staunch Republicans and, therefore, was not a supporter of Kennedy. But he, as did much of America, had further reservations about Kennedy's Catholicism. It was a blaring issue for a short time. Other issues included Cuba and the Soviet space and missile programs.

After Kennedy assumed office, Pop quickly accepted his new President's role as the leader of the most powerful country in the world. I think his attitude had begun to change when Kennedy commented in September of 1960, "I am not the Catholic candidate for President. I am the Democratic Party's candidate for President who also happens to be a

## **Points East**

For several months this past growing season, I have literally fought a ground hog that is invading my little orchard and vegetable garden. He/she/it had numerous entrance holes around the acreage that I suspect are intertwined in a complicated system of deep underground tunnels.

Suffice to say that they are well below the reaches of an 18 inch turning plow. But they have to be down there somewhere.

Twice or three times I plowed over those holes and suspected tunnels with a huge, four-wheel-drive Ford tractor digging so deeply into the clay that the front wheels came of f the ground. Carrying a loaded and ready to cock rifle if the whistle pig showed itself.

Two days later, there were mounds of earth piled up around new hole among the furrows.

I tried pouring gasoline down the holes—I'm talking five gallons of gasoline soaked in for several minutes— and sitting it afire. The earth trembled upon the explosion and I am lucky to be alive. Smoke and fire bellowed from every visible ground hog hole on the place, which, I believe verifies my tunnel theory. (Do not try this gasoline approach at home unless you are bent on suicide and intent on burning yourself alive.)

I survived but don't count yourself so lucky.

But nooooo. Two days later sooty dirt began piling up here and there and my Romas and Blue Lake beans began taking a beating, or should I say "eating?" In short order my peas were obliterated. Chewed off at the root tops.

So I resorted to sulfur. I plugged up all the groundhog holes I could find and dug out one of those little burners that holds like 6 or eight blocks of charcoal that campers use to heat up hot dogs. I had already

purchased a 12 oz. box of sulfur at a local hardware store. I believe, thank God, that I got the last one and that it has long been against the law to sell this stuff.

But Mom used to buy it and put it on red-hot coals in old hub caps that she sat around the barn once a year to get rid of chicken mites. The yellow smoke would kill anything that breathed it and it would permeate the barn. Mom would set it asmoke and make sure that me and the younger boys were well out of reach of the orange smoke.

She'd have all the chickens and livestock out of the barn, but I'm telling you that it smoke-killed rats and mice as well as lice and mites and fleas. She also knew how to sulfur smoke apples so they tasted like gun powder but that's another story.

So I acquired my box of sulfur, ran a 200- foot electrical cord off the front porch and took along an industrial grade hair dryer. I heated up my charcoal to bright red and poked it down in the ground hog hole and dumped in the sulfur, poked in the hair dryer and, tamped in a bit of moist soil and turned the dryer up to high. Then I mounted a WWII gas mask that I had purchased on Ebay and sat there on the battleground.

Within seconds orange smoke was rolling out of the crevices of my property and I let it go like that for thirty minutes until it looked like the hair dryer was going to fry.

This morning when I went to get the paper right at dawn, the ground hog was sitting on my rock wall chomping on a turnip. He/she/it immediately slithered back into a hole where smoke had recently arisen, turnip in paws.

And I thought to myself: "this battle is not over but at least it doesn't have fleas."

## Colon Cancer Can be Hereditary

Presented by David Bullock, M.D. We seldom think of cancers as something we inherit. Yet there are a number of cancers that have one or more genes that directly affect a person's chances of developing it.

Colon cancer is one of these cancers where genetics is often involved. Fortunately, we have genes that protect against the cancer too. It is when you end up with the wrong combination of these genes that you are at greater risk



of developing the cancer. Your family tree becomes important in assessing your risk. If your direct relatives had cancers of the colon, breast or ovaries, you are at increased risk of colon cancer. You need to watch closely for symptoms, do screening tests, and work to avoid further risk factors.

Any prolonged change in bowel habits is a warning sign that needs to be evaluated by your physician. Also any pain or bleeding with bowel movements needs to be evaluated.

Even if you have no symptoms, you should routinely do the card tests for blood in the stool and a flexible sigmoidoscopy according to guidelines. The card tests for blood in the stool should be done each year, starting in your 40's or earlier if cancers have developed in your family at a younger age. A flexible sigmoidoscopy is typically done every 3-5 years beginning at age 40.

Other colon cancer risk factors which you can control are tobacco use and a diet too high in fat and too low in fiber.

To determine if you have an increased risk of cancer from hereditary causes, make a list of all your relatives, if they developed cancer, what kind, and at what age for your doctor to review.





warded with a portion of the bond if they re-capture the defendant and surrender him to the

The U.S. Supreme Court has recognized the broad historic rights of bounty hunters and bondsmen to re-capture fugitives. In 1872, the Court noted that: "The bail bondsmen have their principal on a string, and may pull the string whenever they please, and render him in their discharge." Thus bounty hunters can re-capture their clients pretty much at will, by force if necessary, by breaking into their homes, or on the Sabbath. Few restrictions exist. Except the one that got the Dog.

Many foreign jurisdictions and some states, like Kentucky, have no bondsmen and do not recognize the right of bounty hunters to forcibly remove clients from their territory. In fact, Kentucky affirmatively eliminated this type of vigilante justice in 1976 with passage of leg-

islation abolishing commercial bail bonding in favor of a professional pre-trial release system. Our current system is acclaimed nationwide as a model of effective pre-trial release.

Because bondsmen are illegal in Kentucky, bounty hunters like the Dog frequently find themselves in conflict with Kentucky law enforcement. In 1997, a Cincinnati bondsman posted a \$21,000 bond to secure the release of Allen Wayne Barkley who was being held on traffic charges and a domestic violence offense. Barkley failed to appear in court and fled across the river to northern Kentucky. The bondsman went after him and several months later observed Barkley's vehicle being driven into the parking lot of what was believed to be Barkley's residence. The bondsman gave chase and eventually located Barkley, though he was not the driver of the vehicle. Barkley resisted and the Newport police were called. Upon their arrival, the bondsman was unable to produce a warrant for Barkley's arrest, in accordance with interstate extradition practices, and police ordered that Barkley be released. The bondsman was charged, however, with violating a Kentucky statute which provides that no bondsman may arrest another for violating the terms of his bail unless a warrant has been issued for that person's arrest. At trial, it was revealed that this bondsman had made more than 50 such apprehensions in Kentucky without

legal authority. Because of the risk of wrongful arrest, and the concurrent dangers associated with breaking the peace, Kentucky and other states-and apparently Mexico-prefer that police officers re-capture fugitives after an appropriate warrant is obtained. To misuse a Waylon Jennings' verse: Well, I've been sitting here at home with the porch light on/While you've been chasing everything that runs/Let me put this in your ear and make it be so clear/Baby, that dog won't hunt. At least not in Ken-

Catholic." After that, my family did not dwell on the religious background of our new leader.

While Kennedy President, the Berlin wall was constructed. On June 26, 1963, he visited West Berlin and gave a public speech criticizing communism. In that speech he said, "Freedom has many difficulties and democracy is not perfect, but we have never had to put a wall up to keep our people in." I never heard my grandfather criticize President Kennedy again following that

speech. The day after the assassination was a Saturday, and I went home that morning to be with my family. It was a time for gathering together for consolation. We sat in front of the TV for the entire weekend. and I watched every member of my family cry for our fallen President. Not only did my family draw closer together but

so did the entire country. Those of us who survived the tragedy remember well where we were when we first heard the horrible news. United Nations Ambassador Adlai Stevenson said of the assassination, "all of us will bear the grief of his death until the day of ours." He was so right.

## Rockets 'pick-off'? Bell Co. in 13-0 win

The Rockcastle County Rockets used a ball control offense and three interceptions to beat the visiting Bell county Bobcats Friday night 13-0 and capture another district seven football championship.

The Rockets kept the football eight minutes and 23 seconds on their opening drive which ended with a two yard touchdown run by tailback Dusty Miller. Place kicker Brad Durham added the extra point and the Rockets were ahead 7-

In the second period, the Rockets scored with just 19 seconds to play before half-time on a one yard run by quarterback Izak McQueary.

That score came at the end of a five minute and 23 second drive. Durham missed the extra point and the Rockets were ahead at half-time 13-0, which would be the final score.

Of the 48 minutes played Friday night, the Rockets had the ball for 34:13 to the Bobcats 13:47 seconds.

The Rockets racked up 16 first downs compared to Bell County's 11. However, Bell County had nine first downs in the second half compared to Rockcastle's three.

Bell County's offense certainly outperformed the Rockets in the second half, picking up 153 yards compared to the Rocket's 74, but it was turnovers that would spell doom for the Bobcats and victory for the Rockets.

For the game, the Bobcats turned the ball over four times, three of those were interceptions, all in the second half and all in the end zone.

The Bobcats also fumbled the ball once in the second half, which was recovered by defensive specialist Donovan Pigg.

"Our defense dug in when they had too, just like they have all season long," said Rocket defensive coordinator Adam Coleman.

Defensively the Rockets yielded only 172 yards to the Bobcats the entire game, all through the air.

The Rocket defense held Bell County to minus six yards on the ground.

In the first half, the Bobcats gained only 19 yards on the eight plays they ran. On the other hand, the Rockets ran 42 plays, picking up 185 yards and scoring the only two touchdowns of the game.

Besides his fumble recovery, Pigg led the Rockets in tackles and assists, which included two



fastest time in the history of RCHS cross-country. Placing in the top eight guarantees her a 1st team all-state selection for the second straight season. Michaela's second straight top fifteen finish (after finishing 6th last year) will give her a chance to become only the second girl in the history of Kentucky cross-country to make the top fifteen for eight seasons in a row, provided she remain healthy and committed over the next six years.

RCMS eighth grader Sara Hammond came through at state with an all-state caliber performance. Sara got off to a great start in the race, putting herself in contention early on. She finished a strong 29th place overall in a personal best time of 21:16.53. Her 29th place finish was also a career best. Sara's terrific performance will likely earn her a spot on the allstate team as well. Even more amazing is the fact that Sara has had very few days of practice time with the team. Next season, she should become a serious individual state title contender in Class 2A with much more practice time available due to the later start of basketball season.

Freshman Deana Gabbard saved the best performance of her career for state. She ran a great race throughout, finishing an impressive 78th overall with a new personal record time of 22:13.8. Deana's time was an improvement of over 25 seconds from her previous personal best. In only her first year of cross-country, Deana has already established herself as one of the hardest working runners to ever compete for RCHS.

Junior Courtney Bullock has battled the entire season to overcome injury and illness. The state championships were no exception. It seemed as if Courtney might not be able to participate before the race began due to severe stomach cramps. Despite the pain and discomfort, Courtney ran her

**Committee election** The 2006 FSA County Committee elections will be held November 3 through December 4,

Committee members apply their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on disaster and conservation payments, establishment of allotments and yields, producer appeals, employing FSA county executive directors and other local issues that affect their communities.

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in FSA programs. A person who is not of legal voting age, but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm, can also vote. Agricultural producers in each count submitted candidate names during the nomination period held last summer.

Eligible voters, who do not receive ballots by mail, should contact their local FSA County office. December 4, 2006 is the last day for voters to submit ballots in person to local FSA County Office. Newly elected committee members and alternates take office January 1, 2007.





money from the county.

The garbage dump on Burnt Ridge Road will be the third dump cleaned up in the county in the past few months.

The finishing touches have just been done on a dump on Bryant Ridge Road, which cost the county and PRIDE \$44,903 and the clean-up of another dump on the Floyd Renner Road at Chestnut Ridge was just completed at a price tag of \$7,096, according to Renner.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court received a \$50,000 Community Clean-Up grant from PRIDE, which paid all but \$2,000 which was picked up by the county.

Renner said that work release prisoners from the Rockcastle County Detention Center helped at the Chestnut Ridge dump, which offset the county's cost of the clean-up.

Renner said that clean-up at Burnt Ridge should begin in two to three weeks.

The fiscal court also did not take any action on an ordinance that would require land owners around Lake Linville to hook to the city of Mt. Vernon's sewage system.

Carloftis told the court that Mayor Clarice Kirby had told him that money for the extension of new sewer lines had been approved, but because those effected by the extension were not in the city, an ordinance will have to be passed to require them to hook on.

"The main reason for the new lines, which apparently will run down the lake road from the dam to the boat dock, is to keep raw sewage from getting into the lake,' Carloftis said.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said he already had an ordinance prepared for the court, which will require those residents who would be effected to hook on.

Third district magistrate Bill McKinney told the court that he had had several inquiries from residents of Rainbow Ridge Subdivision, which is located across from the lake road side, near the lake, but does not actually adjoin it.

"All of the septic systems in that subdivision are new and have been inspected and approved by the health department," McKinney said.

Carloftis said he did not think those landowners would be affected, but, because he has not seen any specifics on how close a landowner has to be to the new sewer line, he was going to table the ordinance for now.

"When we know more about the requirements and the distance between the land owners and the new line, we'll have Billy (Reynolds) draw up the appropriate ordinance and we will vote on it," the judge said.

The Judge also told the court that discount prescription cards, through the Kentucky Association of Counties (KACO) for Rockcastle County residents, would be available by the first of the year.

"The cards could save residents some money on their prescriptions, but local pharmacies must agree to participate in the

program," he said.

Because it is a new program,
none of the pharmacies cur-

rently participate and the Judge said that he had not talked with any of them about their participation.

There is no charge for the prescription cards and residents only have to show identification that they are a resident of Rockcastle County.

Cards will be available at the Rockcastle County Judge's office. For more information on the program call the Judge's office at 256-2856.

Joy Dunn, a landowner in the Northeastern portion of the county, was present at Tuesday's fiscal court's meeting to request a name change on the road where she lives.

Dunn said that she would like for the court to change the road, now called, Abney Cemetery Road, to Abney Road or Rube Abney Road.

She said that the cemetery on the road was actually the Gadd-Smith Cemetery.

Magistrate McKinney asked Mrs. Dunn if she would like the road name changed to the Gadd-Smith Cemetery Road, but Mrs. Abney was reluctant to have the word cemetery included in the road name.

Carloftis said he would research the county's registry of cemeteries to make sure the cemetery was correctly named.

Fourth district magistrate Fred Mullins, Jr., whose district the road is in, said the county only maintains the road to the cemetery. No action was taken to change the road name.

The court also took no action on the closing of the end section of the Sowder School Road.

Carloftis told the court that one landowner at the end of the road wanted the road closed, but that the local school board had an easement on the road for a bus turnaround and "they have told me they are not going to give up the easement," Carloftis said

"You're talking about several hundred feet of county road, including the turn around," second district magistrate William Denny said.

The court also approved two letters to Congressman Harold Rogers concerning the Civil War battlefield site known as Wildcat Mountain.

Carloftis wrote the letters to the Congressman and all five members of the court, along with Carloftis, signed them.

One request is for a bridge that crosses the Rockcastle River joining Rockcastle and Laurel County, the actual location of Wildcat Mountain.

Because of recent improvements at the historic Civil War battlefield, the site has been opened to the public.

Visitors to Wildcat Mountain will find a new pavilion holding historical markers, a paved parking area, walking trails to Hoosier Knob, and original entrenchments, restrooms and other improvements.

The fiscal court is asking for Roger's help in securing \$3.47 million for a bridge that will cross the river from Rockcastle County into Laurel.

The bridge, which was designed by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, calls for a 350-foot span, two lanes, 60-foot height bridge with 75-foot height piers.

"The state called the proposed bridge, a "Cadillac bridge," the Judge told the

Carloftis said that since the time that Wildcat Mountain has been opened to the public and the road signs on Interstate 75 at exit 59 have been put up, 20 to 25 cars a day visit the historic site.

"Just getting the conceptual design cost estimate from the state is a start," he said.

The other request from Roger's office was for \$30,000 for reconstruction of an old county bridge that had been removed from the Copper Creek area of the county.

"They are going to use the bridge as a historical monument, when they get it reconstructed," Carloftis said.

The bridge was moved to Wildcat Mountain by the state.

After a hour and a half long closed session to deal with personnel, the court voted to terminate Russell Jackson's employment at the county's animal shelter.

The court hired Jackson on May 30th on a six month trial basis. "It just didn't work out," Carloftis said.

Jackson's replacement will be James Kidwell who will go to work on Friday. Jackson was dismissed by a unanimous vote and Kidwell was hired by one also.

Sheriff-elect Mike Peters, and possible deputies Bill Mink and John Guilfoil, also were also included in the executive session to discuss the hiring of Peters' staff when he takes office in January.

"The only thing we told him was to stay within the budget that was approved by us so that we do not run into the same problems we did with the current Sheriff," said McKinney.

In other business, the court was reminded that this week is National Homeless and Hunger Awareness Week (November 12-18).

Tammy Blackburn made a short presentation to the court about homelessness and hunger in the county and invited them to a pig roast on Saturday at Dogwood Crafts and Gardens on Hwy. 25N and Brindle Ridge Road, from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Blackburn said the Pig Roast, which is being sponsored by the Family Life Abuse Center, will culminate the week's events.

The court also approved the purchase of three new computers and software for PVA Margaret Offutt's office at a cost of \$1,797.

The PVA office is a state office and Carloftis reminded the court of that before the vote was taken.

The only thing the county is responsible for, by law, is to provide, Offutt with office space, maintain that space, pay the utilities and give the office over \$4,800 quarterly to help defray expenses of the office.

The vote to buy the equipment was unanimous.

The court also voted to transfer \$10,000 from the Local Government Economic Assistance fund to the 911 fund to meet expenses and payroll until Windstream gets payment of their monthly fee to the county lined out.

Treasurer Joe Clontz presented the county's financial statement for the month of October.

All fourteen of the county's bank accounts showed a positive balance, except for the De-

counseling, attend AA/NA meetings and keep a job.

Didonato told the crowd that he was thankful for the program and that, in past appearances in the court room, he was a nervous man.

'This room makes me nervous, but I don't have to worry about that anymore," he said.

"With the things that I have learned in this program, I am going to stay sober. I would do anything to stay sober," he continued.

Didonato had nothing but good things to say about Drug Court. "I already had a head start on

staying sober, but the things I learned in here help me maintain my desire," he said. "It took me a long time, and so

many times of being down and out, to realize drugs were no good," Didonato said. 'You don't see an addict recov-

ering from drugs in 30 days and the length of this program is just as much a factor as what you learn,"

"Drug Court changed my life and helped me to manage my priorities - drugs are no longer a part of my life and I am happier than I have ever been," the 37-year-old

Commonwealth's Attorney Eddy Montgomery, whose office was responsible for prosecuting Didonato, told the graduate he was glad he had proven him wrong re-

garding his ability to stay clean. "I certainly think he will make it, he seems determine," Montgomery said after the graduation.

Keynote speaker Kentucky Su-

preme Court Chief Justice Joe Lambert of Mt. Vernon told those in attendance that during his first tour of the state, as Chief Justice in 1988, he witnessed his first Drug Court graduation in Fulton County.

The Chief Justice said that at the time there were only 12 drug courts in Kentucky and now there are 60 throughout the state.

Lambert noted that there were many good reasons to support Drug Court besides the dollar savings.

"It is well documented that rehabilitation is cheaper than incarceration, but there are much better reasons, the families, husbands, wives and children who have been saved by this program are the other reasons," the Chief Justice said.

"We've tried to incarcerate our way out of the drug problem and now we are working together to find the best solution for everyone," he added.

Lambert also lauded the efforts of Kentucky Congressman Harold Rogers for his ongoing fight against drugs, through the UNITE program, which he helped create and which the federal government

"Many recent accomplishments in Eastern and Southeastern Kentucky would have not been possible without the Congressman's help," Lambert said.

Karen Engle, Executive Director of Operation UNITE, praised the success of Drug Court and the leadership of Chief Justice Lambert in the fight against the drug prob-

"I think we have something that works," she said.

Judge Burdette said that because of his completion of Drug Court, Didonato escaped three years of jail time but, more than anything, "he has gotten his life back on track."

'You would never believe it, if you didn't already know, that he had been in and out of trouble with the court system since 1999," Burdette said.

"It is an uplifting story," he continued.

Didonato's criminal record is completely clean and his only requirement now is to complete a year of after care, which may require him to be randomly drug tested.

The Circuit Judge said that at least two other graduations in Drug Court are on the horizon and admitted that many of those who have been admitted to drug court failed and were sent to jail. "That has happened many times but at least drug court gives them a chance to change their lives," he added

Wednesday, the 17 members of the drug court panel will vote on whether or not to admit two other local people into the program.

Bostic told the informant that she was selling four Vicoden pills for \$20, but lab reports later revealed that the pills were actually just methocarbamo, a pain relaxer which is a non-controlled sub-

And then in October and December of last year an informant went back to Bostic's home and was sold Hydrocodone.

Bostic request for a probated sentence was denied by Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette.

Bobby Jo Delph, 38, of Brodhead was also sentenced to two years by Burdette for second degree trafficking in a controlled substance.

In October, Delph pled guilty to a March, 2005 incident where she sold four Hydrocodone pills to a UNITE undercover officer.

At the sentencing hearing, Delph asked Judge Burdette to probate her sentence as well, but he also denied that request. According to the news release,

When Kirby was arrested last year at the Bittersweet Festival on the indictment charge for trafficking, he was also in possession of marijuana, according to Dalton.

Dalton combined both charges against Kirby, which he pled to in August in Circuit Court.
