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Coach Parrett dies at home Monday at 79

One of Rockcastle County's best known and most respected individuals has died.

Coach Preston Parrett died in his sleep Sunday night at his Brodhead home. He was 79.

Family and friends of one of the most noted figures in basketball in the county said Parrett died from apparent heart failure.

Coach Parrett began his coaching career at Livingston High School and coached the Blue Devil's boys team for 18 years, winning the district tournament in 1965 and taking runner-up in the district five times.

When the county schools consolidated into Rockcastle County High School, Coach Parrett coached the Livingston Elementary girl's team from 1972 to 1981, winning several county championships and posting a record of 164 wins against only seven losses.

At one time coach Parrett's seventh and eighth grade girl's teams had a 69-game winning streak.

Coach Parrett coached for a total of 34 years at Livingston and joined the staff at the Rockcastle County High School, taking over the girl's program in 1975 and coaching there until 1987.

His Lady Rocket teams made five trips to the 13th regional tournament.

In 2002, the Livingston Elementary School gym was renamed *The Preston Parrett Gymnasium* in his honor.

Mr. Parrett, who was no doubt one of Livingston's favorite sons although he never lived there, was named an Honorary Citizen of Livingston in 1987 and again in 2005 and served as Grand Marshall in the Livingston Homecoming Parade a few years ago and, in 1962, the school annual at

Brodhead man seeking help to rid West Street of abandoned house

Randy Cromer of Brodhead says he hasn't had much luck getting the property next to his father's, Carlis Cromer's home, on West Street in Brodhead cleaned up.

"That property has got snakes, rats, 'coons' and possums all over it," Cromer said this week "and it is a danger to people and especially the children in the area."

Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash said he had looked at the property with Cromer and, as it stands right now, there isn't much the city can do, but he is working on it.

"I've asked our city attorney, (John Ford), to look into

it because Randy's right, something needs to be done, but we don't have an ordinance on the books that deals with this type of situation," the Mayor said.

"That place is not the only one that needs to be cleaned up.

There are a couple of more in the city and we need to deal with all of them the same way," Cash said.

Cromer said the problem on West Street started six years ago when the house caught fire and received heavy smoke and water damage.

Sharon Simpson, formerly of Brodhead, was living in the house but Cromer said

In City of Mt. Vernon

Council votes to investigate process to expand limits

At their regular meeting Monday night, the Mt. Vernon City Council, on a motion by Councilwoman Lonetta Daughter, voted to investigate the expansion of the city limits.

Daugherty has been a strong proponent of the action for some time, saying the limits need to be "squared off."

The city's boundary is now somewhat haphazard with one side of a road being in the limits and the other not and, for example, with State Farm, on West Main Street, being inside the city and Save-A-Lot, located directly behind State Farm, not being in.

Mayor Clarice Kirby told the council that she had written a letter to all businesses in the Industrial Park on 150, detailing to them the advantages of being in the city limits, including better fire insurance

and sewer rates and police protection. Kirby also said that the Burr area needed to be brought in for the same reasons and because residents in the area would save money on sewer rates when a planned sewer line expansion in the area takes place.

Councilman Joe Mullins said one of the first orders of business would be to get a detailed map showing the present city boundary so the council could decide exactly what areas would be involved.

The council also informally okayed the use of their parking lot near city hall, for people to gather with the lot being closed at 11 p.m., except for those who use it for car pooling purposes.

Councilman Mullins broached the matter to the council, saying those who use

IDA hires design firm to create brand, identity for Rockcastle County

The Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority (RCIDA) has hired a Somerset graphics design firm to create a brand and identity which embodies the riches of, "the community of Rockcastle County", RCIDA President Corey Craig reported in a news release this week.

The branding project will include the creation of a "logo" which will be available for all leadership organizations within the county to utilize and the brand will be designed accordingly.

"We are excited about the opportunity to create a brand for Rockcastle County which shows the unity of the commu-

nity working together and will help us better position ourselves as competitors for development in our county," Craig said.

According to the release, the project has the support of RCIDA, the Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce, the Rockcastle Tourism Board, Rockcastle County government and the leadership of all three cities Mayors.

However, when the branding project was brought before the Mt. Vernon City Council on Monday night, Mayor Clarice Kirby said she was afraid it would cause the county's three

T.J.'s Journal

Dear Journal:

A few days ago, some of our family was sitting around the kitchen table at the "old homeplace" in London talking about our family history. Some of us are interested in that kind of thing and are doing research on the various lines of the family. After all of this research, all we have are names, dates, and how who is related to whom. They are just names on a piece of paper. We don't know anything about them. What a tragedy. It is even a worse tragedy that the following generations will know nothing of us and those of our family that we can remember. To remedy this, we have decided to write an oral history with me being the major contributor. This is because I grew up around grandma and grandpa, hearing many old tales and seeing many of the family who would come and visit the younger generations have never seen or at least, have no memory of.

I've started a brief summary of some of the lives of my grandmother's relatives. One of the most colorful characters was her younger brother, Frank. Of course, he was well into middle age by the time I came along. He was rather short and stocky, always seemed to be smiling, and had a humorous story to tell. Wherever he went, adventure was sure to follow.

He is one of the uncles that I had written about in my journal over a year ago that was working at the Clovertop Bakery in Corbin back in the 1940s when his brother, Raymond, another of my uncles stopped by for a visit. He had brought along a jar of moonshine from Tennessee. On Frank's break, they started sipping on the moonshine. Of course, the other men who worked there wanted a little "swig" too. Needless to say, the whole bunch got outrageously drunk,

and started a pie fight. When they ran out of pies, they started with the cakes, or whatever else they could find. In my mind, this seemed almost preposterous, as I remember these two uncles as two elderly gentlemen who would not dream of taking the smallest drink, and attended church every Sunday.

Long before his days of being a baker, when he was in his mid-teen years, he had an encounter with a lion right there in the mountains of Tennessee. This was probably just prior to 1920. He was coming home one pitch-black night, walking up the railroad track. He had been to a circus that was travelling through their little town. He got within about a mile or two of home when he was certain he had detected a lion following him. He stopped and held his lantern as he peered into the darkness behind him to see for sure if his suspicions were true. He had been hearing what seemed to be a large animal in the brush behind him, and what he thought to be a low growl...and a ROAR. He didn't see anything, but he could feel its very presence.

He decided to make a run for home. He took off in a mad dash with his feet hitting every few railroad ties, and his lantern waving as he ran. The farther he went the faster he ran, he said.

Upon reaching home, he ran up the front steps, across the porch, and burst through the front door. His dad, my great-grandpa, was still up reading by an old coal oil lamp. After falling headfirst into the living room, he caught his breath long enough to speak. He told his dad of the lion he was certain was following him down the railroad track, and all the way home. His dad, I'm sure, thought he'd had a few sips of moonshine, that night. He was

Then I burned the palm of my hand on the pot handle while getting it off the stove, dropped it on the floor and branded the linoleum before I could splash blood and water on it.

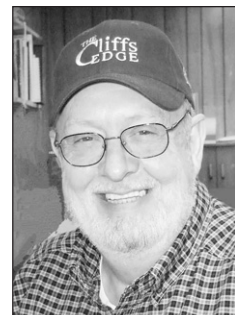
Not a pretty sight. And I have put a note on the shopping list stuck on the refrigerator door to remind Loretta that we need a new first aid kit.

Risks of Sunburns

Presented by David Brabon, M.D.

Sunburns are not just a nuisance of summer or rites of a fishing trip. They are very harmful to the skin and can lead to skin cancers and other skin damage. Sunburns are directly linked to melanomas, the most serious form of skin cancer.

While most skin cancers are relatively benign and do not spread, melanomas are much more like cancers of other areas: they spread easily, they are very difficult to cure, and they kill people.

The incidence of melanomas is increasing rapidly--4% per year--and they are occurring at younger ages each decade. It is not uncommon to see these serious skin cancers in 30-year-olds, and they are being seen in people in their 20's and even teens.

It is not known exactly how sunburns predispose to melanomas, but it is clearly best to avoid sunburns. Each time you burn, it adds to the risk.

Sunscreens are very useful in protecting against the harmful ultraviolet rays which cause sunburns, skin damage and skin cancers.

Sunburns and skin cancers are primarily caused by the lower portion of the UV band, called UV-B. The damage to collagen and elastic fibers in the skin is primarily caused by the higher portion of the UV band called UV-A. The first sunscreens that were sold only protected against UV-B and allowed the aging changes from UV-A to continue unabated.

Now, a person can get sunscreens which protect against a greater portion of the ultraviolet light--both UV-A and UV-B. You should be sure to use a sunscreen that protects against both. Look for avobenzone in the ingredients or ask your pharmacist for assistance in choosing from the many products available.

Liars, Liars, Pants on Fire

Patrick Fitzgerald, the Special Prosecutor in the I. Lewis "Scooter" Libby case, summed it up best: "We need the truth

from government officials."

When I first read that little blip in Newsweek's Perspectives feature, and having for-

gotten momentarily who Fitzgerald was, I mistakenly assumed that he was referring to Mike Nifong, the now disgraced prosecutor in the Duke University rape case.

Amen, brother! That was my first reaction. But as I realized that Fitzgerald was referring to Libby and not Nifong, I also began to think about the similarities of the two cases, and this conundrum: Why is it that Libby, who lied to prosecutors is going to prison, while a prosecutor (Nifong) who lied in order to falsely put someone else in prison only faces the loss of his law license?

Certainly, the final chapters have not yet been written in the Libby and Nifong sagas. Who

knows what lies ahead. A complete or partial pardon for Libby? Or perhaps, additional investigations into Nifong's actions? But as they are currently told, these stories have striking similarities.

Libby, the Vice-President's chief of staff, lied about his knowledge of a media leak which outed Valerie Plame as

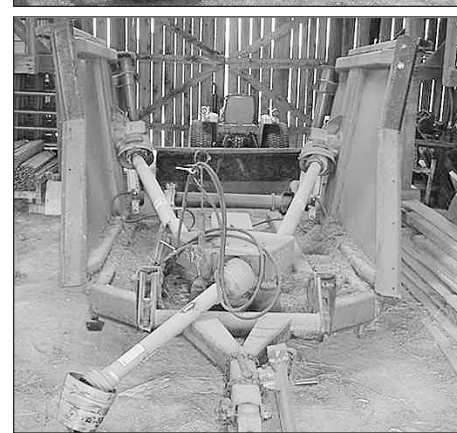

In lieu of flowers the family request donations be made to the Livingston School Gymnasium Air Conditioning Fund at 339 West St., Brodhead, KY. 40409.

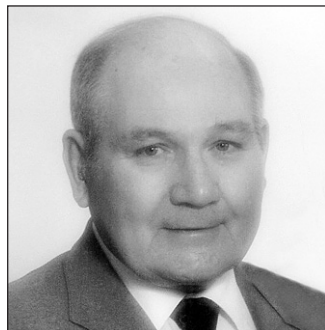

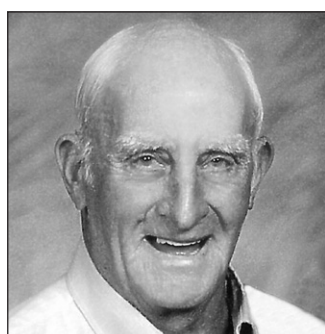

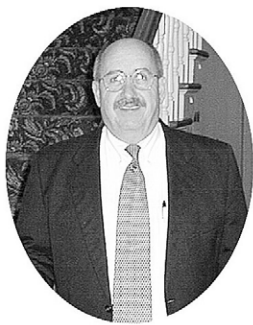

Discussing these songs brought back waves of emotions that we felt as teenagers. It was even possible to re-count where we were when we heard a couple of the songs. I remember being parked in my ’58 Chevy at the dam in Rockcastle County when I heard Town Without Pity on my car radio. Also, the song Soldier Boy will always remind me of Sandy,

who was dating a young man who was going to join the Army when we graduated.

After discussing the songs that were popular in 1962, we began to identify news items that happened during that era. He had been in the armed service and reminded me that John Glenn was the first American to orbit the earth in “Friendship 7.” This flight, of course, was the beginning of the Apollo series that would eventually lead to the moon landing in 1969.

We also remembered that Marilyn Monroe had been found dead in a cloud of suspicion. She was one of the biggest Hollywood “bombshells” of her time. Her death was ruled a suicide. Her connection to President Kennedy added to her mystique both before and after her death.

1962 was also the year that Johnny Carson began a 30-year reign as the host of the “Tonight Show.” Johnny remained the chief leader of late night television until he retired.

After much thought, we also recounted a few movies that hit the big screen that year. The three that we could agree upon were: Dr. No, The Longest Day, and Days Of Wine And Roses. I will never forget seeing the James Bond flick at the Valley Drive-In Theatre in Renfro Valley. It remains one of my favorite Bond movies. Several other classic movies were also released that year, such as: Lolita, Mutiny On The Bounty, Sweet Bird of Youth, and To Kill A Mockingbird.

In February of 1962, the United States’ ban on trade with Cuba went into effect. Little did I know, or even care, that President Kennedy had purchased and stored several thousand Cuban cigars before the embargo. Once I became an adult cigar lover, that fact didn’t sit so well with me.

In October, the first Beatles single, Love Me Do, was released. It was also during that month that President Kennedy revealed on national television that Soviet missiles had been placed in Cuba. A few days later, the United States imposed a naval blockade on Cuba to prevent military supplies from reaching the country. Kennedy insisted that the missiles be withdrawn, and Nikita Khrushchev announced the re-

moval of all missiles from the Cuban soil. It was a time of great national stress and fear of war.

Lately, I find myself reminiscing a lot more about what our lives were like when we were young. I have such crisp recollections of my life as a teenager. As I write, Stranger on the Shore is playing on my iPod. That song by Acker Bilt was Billboard’s number one single for the year of ’62. It’s haunting melody is etched into my memory and brings with it fond memories of years gone by.

an undercover CIA operative. Supposedly, Libby did this to protect his job. It is a federal crime to knowingly reveal the identity of a covert CIA agent. President Bush had vowed that whoever had leaked Plame’s identity would be fired. No one has been charged with the intentional leak of Plame’s identity.

Nifong also lied to protect his job. The North Carolina prosecutor was accused of deceiving the court where three Duke lacrosse players were awaiting trial on charges that they raped a stripper during a college frat party. And as we now know, those charges against the Duke athletes were bogus. State bar disciplinary authorities charged Nifong with making inflammatory statements about the case, lying to the court, and withholding DNA evidence which would have helped exonerate the Duke defendants. The supposed motivation for Nifong’s unethical behavior was a forthcoming election against a tough challenger.

So that’s the setting. One prominent figure faces criminal charges and prison for lying to prosecutors, while a prosecutor only faces ethics charges for lying about a defendant. . . well three defendants actually. But the point is the same.

Not surprisingly, the defenses offered by both Libby

and Nifong are remarkably similar, and according to many, both equally lacking in credibility. Though he never testified at trial, the thrust of Libby’s defense was based on the vagueness of human memory. In essence, he claimed he simply was unable to recall who told him about Plame’s covert role and that the information he provided to investigators was not knowingly false.

Nifong also characterized his misstatements as unintentional. According to the Washington Post, Nifong testified at last week’s disciplinary hearing that he had only been trying to “do the right thing,” and “did not intentionally withhold evidence or try to mislead.” And like Libby, Nifong vowed to defend himself against allegations that he intentionally lied or withheld evidence. Wow!

A New York Times columnist recently suggested “[t]here is a perception that justice might depend on who your lawyer is, it might depend on how much money you have, it may depend on whether you’re white or black.” All true, and all unfortunate.

What is equaling troubling, however, is the idea that lying to prosecutors is somehow worse than a lying prosecutor. Both are wrong and both deserve to be punished. But it’s going to take a while for me to wrap my mind around the idea that lying to authorities to protect someone from going to prison is a greater sin than that of authorities lying to falsely imprison someone for a crime they did not commit. The whole thing makes my head hurt.

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At National History Day Competition

RCMS students receive Outstanding Junior Group Project

On April 21, seven Rockcastle County High School and Middle School students competed in Frankfort for a chance to go to the University of Maryland for the 28th Annual National History Day competition.

Jessica Simpson, Stephanie Barnett, and Morgan Harper, all students at Rockcastle County High School, competed in the Senior Group Exhibit category. Their project, German Medicine: A Tragic

Beginning and End, finished just shy of qualifying for national competition. The students created their exhibit by researching, with the assistance of advisor Anita Nation, the medical experiments performed in the German concentration camps. They included photos of the experiments, quotes from survivors and Allied soldiers, and their own analysis of the horrendous atrocities thousands of Jews, Poles, Gypsies, and others

faced at the hands of the Nazi Regime.

Jasmin Johnson, a student at Rockcastle County Middle School, competed in the Junior Individual Exhibit category with Alder Creek Camp: Winter 1846 and the Tragic Party at the Donners. Jasmin's board displayed not only photos of the members of the party and an original sketch based on the so-called cannibalism practiced by the starving settlers stranded in the mountains of California but also quotes from rescuers and historians and her own analysis of the multiple perspectives on this historic mystery.

Ben Lake, Jon Kidwell, and Derek Jones, RCMS students, placed first in the Junior Group Exhibit at state competition with their exhibit Manzanar: The Tragedy of the Japanese-Americans. Thanks to a family vacation to California, Ben was able to visit historic Manzanar, the first internment camp established for the Japanese-Americans during WWII. This first place finish qualified the boys for national competition at the University of Maryland which was held this past week. Judges comments included "unique", "original", and "well researched."

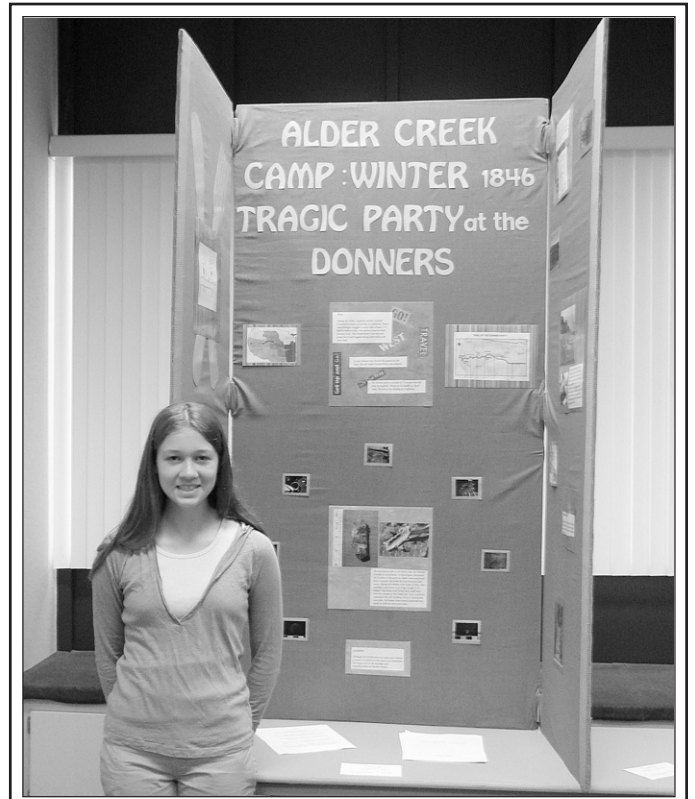
This project was entered into national competition against more than 100 other exhibits from across the nation, including the Department of Defense (Italy and Germany). On June 10, Ben, Jon, and Derek, along with parents Scott Lake and Paul Kidwell, and advisor Melissa Singleton and Ann Benson left Mt. Vernon headed to College Park, Maryland to represent Kentucky at the national competition.

During the awards ceremony on Thursday, June 14, the students' exhibit was awarded Outstanding Junior Group Project for the state of Kentucky. The students' project ranked higher than any other Kentucky junior projects in the various other categories and placed fifth in their pool. While at the national com-

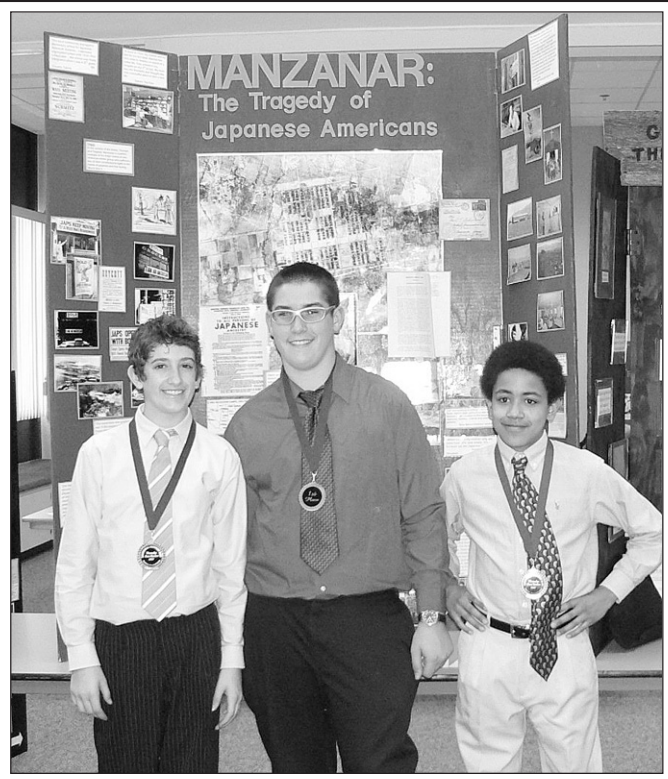
Jasmin Johnson with her Junior Individual project, Alder Creek.

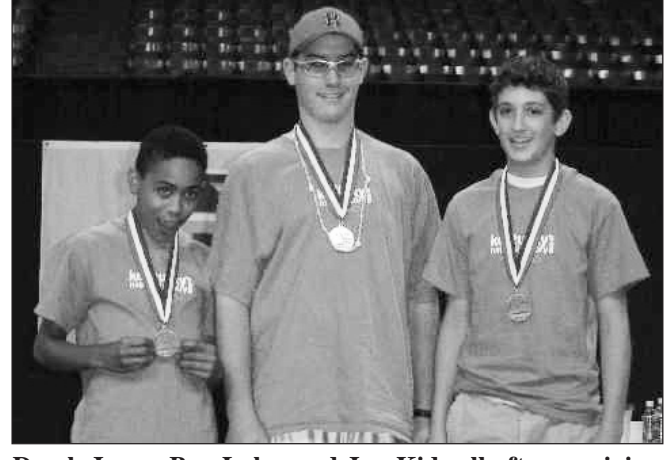

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Opportunities abound at Brodhead Baptist Church

Brodhead Baptist Church is one of the oldest churches in the county with one of the largest congregations.

The church dates back to 1876 when the congregation shared a building on the same lot with the Free Masons.

The two organizations apparently built the building together, with church services being held on the ground floor and the second floor being used by the Masons.

In 1905, the lot next door was purchased and a new church building was dedicated in September of 1907.

Following the commission to evangelize, Brodhead Baptist

began their first mission at Chestnut Grove schoolhouse in 1905 and, in 1915, they began to organize a Baptist Young People's Union or Training Union.

In November of 1927, a tremendous spiritual revival was held that lasted sixteen days and resulted in eighty-two decisions. Sixty-two were baptized at one time in Dix River.

On January 29, 1928, tragedy struck the congregation when fire destroyed the church building.

But through the valiant efforts of the community, most of the church furniture was saved and the bell, which fell to the ground as the steeple burned,

was unharmed and calls the faithful to worship today.

Within days of the fire, a committee was named to plan another house of worship. Funds were raised and plans went forward for the construction of a new building.

The building was dedicated one year and eight months after the fire on September 29, 1929.

In 1934, the first parsonage was a house on Main Street, bequeathed by Mr. A.E. Albright and, in 1967, a new home was built.

In 1995 additional education space was built and, in 2003, the most noticeable improvement to the church property was completed -- the current sanctuary,

which was dedicated on Easter Sunday of 2003.

Since then the old sanctuary has been remodeled and serves as a Fellowship Hall.

In 2007, Brodhead Baptist has an average Sunday morning attendance of approximately 175 people with 342 on the active roll of the church.

Sunday night the church was blessed with the addition of another member when Albert Banks, who is in his 70s, was baptized.

Current pastor Luther Allen has been at Brodhead Baptist for the past three and half years, coming from Hamilton Ohio where he spent 12 years.

But Allen is not new to Rockcastle County. From 1985-89 he served as youth minister at First Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon.

Allen says his return to Rockcastle County is truly like returning home to a place he and his family love.

Allen and his wife Sandy, who plays the piano at the church, have two children, Luke 14 and Allyssa 11.

"I don't think there is a better place where we could be raising our children," Allen said. "I joke a lot of times that Brodhead is like Mayberry in so many good ways, it is just a great community," he added.

Allen said the total worship experience is quite different from what he was used to in Hamilton.

"Here we are a family. We respect each other and we are accountable for our efforts and our actions. These people are true examples of what Christians should be," he said. "Not that Hamilton was bad, it was just different," he added.

In 2007 the church is overseen by seven deacons, Everett Harper, Chairman, Robert McDaniel, Bill Adkisson, Howard Saylor, David Pensol, Floyd Gabbard and John E. Harris.

Mr. Harris, who is 95, is also the oldest active church member.

2007 COC election

On June 15th the 2007 COC nomination period began. Nomination forms will be available to nominate a person for the COC in Rockcastle County in LAA #1. LAA 1 area includes the western section of Rockcastle County bound by Pulaski, Lincoln and Garrard County. Highway boundaries are Hwy 70, Hwy 150, I-75 and Hurricane School Road.

This area is currently represented by Gary Burdette. So get your thinking caps on-maybe you're interested in running for the office or maybe you know someone you wish to nominate. COC terms are for 3 years and a total of 9 years may be served pending re-election.

Committee members are critical to the operations of FSA. Members apply their judgment and knowledge to provide local input on Commodity price support loans and payments, Conservation programs, Incentive, indemnity and disaster payments for some commodities and Emergency programs.

FSA needs to 2 or more people to be nominated for placement on the ballot. The one receiving the most votes will serve as the COC member and the second person will serve as the alternate. The USDA issued guidelines for ensuring that FSA committees fairly represent the agricultural producers of a county are designed to increase participation by minorities and women.

Nomination forms will be available from the local USDA Service Center and online at HYPERLINK "http://www.fsa.usda.gov/" http://www.fsa.usda.gov/underNews & Events/County Committee Elections.

August 1, 2007 is the last day to file nomination forms at the local USDA Service Center.

Benefits of crop acreage reports

Annual crop acreage reporting is now a requirement for most FSA programs. For those farms participating in the Direct and Counter Cyclical Program (DCP) and Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) crop reports are mandatory. In order to maintain eligibility for commodity loans and loan deficiency payments (LDP), a producer must report acreage of all crops on which a loan or LDP will be requested. The deadline to file the report is July 16th for the 2007 crop.

Farm owners, operators, persons authorized by Power of Attorney, and persons with an interest in the affected crop can file a crop acreage report. With the new farm bill scheduled to begin shortly, it is more important than ever that your farm's

cropping history be complete and accurate. Your cropping history file will determine the extent of your program options under any new farm bill program.

Filing the report with your local FSA office is free and usually only takes a few minutes out of your busy schedule to complete. While you are at it, ask for a photocopy of your farm, as it is also free of charge. Remember: even if you don't have row crops planted you can and should report your hay and pasture.

Reading logs are due July 7th, and no later. The final program for summer reading will be July 12th at 1:00pm with Ronald McDonald and a pizza party!



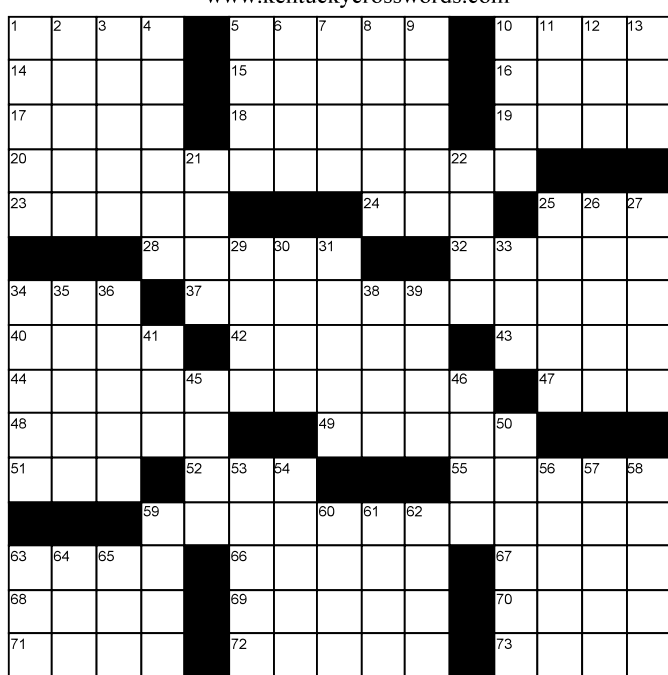

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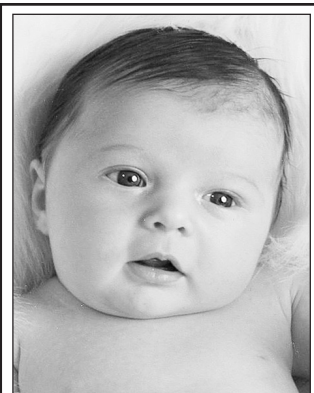

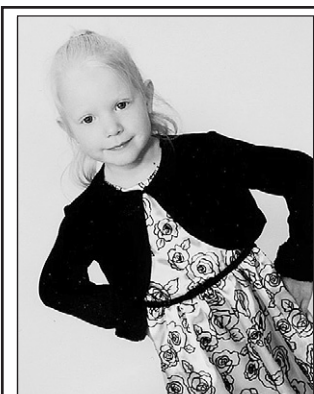

cities to lose their identities and was not in favor of it.

Mayor Kirby said Tuesday that when the project came up for a vote at the meeting she did not vote either way.

"I don't see why we need a website or a new logo to show we are all on the same page - I think that is pretty obvious," she said.

The branding project will include the design of a logo, a website which will represent all leadership organizations within the county and printed marketing materials to be utilized to recruit commerce to the area.

"I am excited to see the leadership countywide, both volunteer and elected, step up and show everyone inside and outside of the county that we are taking our commitment to growth and development to the next level," said Jim Holton who was recently hired as the RCIDA Economic Development Consultant.

"Rockcastle County has a great deal of positive projects and resources available for us to promote. This branding project will help us have a marketing presence which will rival communities all over the country and through the Internet, we will have rich information regarding those resources to people worldwide," he said.

The branding project is one of the first projects recommended by Holton since beginning his work with local leadership on promoting

Rockcastle County.

Kirby Stephens Design, a graphics design firm with 20 years experience in Somerset, has been hired to provide the service.

Already, meetings have taken place to get feedback from various leadership organizations throughout the county to get a sense of the "personality" of the community and the universal strengths Rockcastle County has to offer.

The new website will be found at the current url address for the RCIDA which is www.RockcastleCountyKy.com and this site will then become the primary site for the chamber, tourism, RCIDA, county government and information about the local city governments.

"As a professional, it says a great deal about the volunteer and elected leadership of this community for everyone to unite behind the commitment this community has made to make this project possible. I think we are in the process of building on some very positive projects which are already underway in Rockcastle County and I think our future looks very bright," Holton said.

The website is to be up and running by the first week of August while other marketing materials should be completed prior to the end of that month.

The Branding project was approved at the IDA's monthly meeting on May 30th at a cost of \$20,400, which will apparently be paid from IDA funds.

Livingston "The Footprints" was dedicated to him.

Mr. Parrett was also honored in his hometown in 2004 when he was named Citizen of the Year.

A well known, talented poet, Mr. Parrett wrote many poems about people, places and events in the county, telling a story in most, if not all of them. At least one of his poems was about former basketball players who have passed away.

Paul Ponder, who played basketball for four years for Mr. Parrett from 1956 to 1959, said Mr. Parrett never forgot a player who had played for him. "I think he could have told you

just about all of their names, years after they had played at Livingston," Ponder said.

"He loved the game and he cared so much about his players and what happened to them on and off the court," said Ponder, who played for Parrett in his first year as coach at Livingston.

Ponder, who lost his father at age seven, said Mr. Parrett was like a father to him.

"He helped me in so many ways besides on the basketball court."

"One time he gave me money to buy a book for a class that I needed to take, but didn't have the money for the book and another time he made sure I had a coat for the prom - because we couldn't afford it, those are just a couple of examples," Ponder said.

"I truly looked up to him and respected him and I know everybody that played for him did," Ponder added.

But the ex-marine had a reputation for being tough.

"Sure he was tough on us when he needed to be, but he was never tougher than he should of been. He built character and determination in us that most of us held onto - he was simply a special man."

Billy Wayne "Red" Bryant, who played for Mr. Parrett from 1961 to 1965 said he had lost a dear friend, on Monday

morning.

"I can't describe the respect I had for Mr. Parrett. He was somebody we all should look up to and try to be more like," Bryant said.

"Even in my adult years I always called him Mr. Parrett out of respect," Bryant added.

When Bryant was selected Livingston Citizen of the Year in 2005, Mr. Parrett wrote one of his famous poems about the outstanding Livingston player.

In his poem, Mr. Parrett wrote, "Billy Wayne set a good example of citizenship as he worked to improve the town."

"No one I know has set any better example of what we should be like than Mr. Parrett," Bryant said.

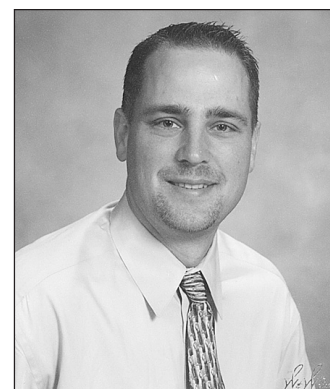
Visitation for the late coach and teacher started at 5 p.m. on Wednesday in the Livingston gymnasium named in his honor.

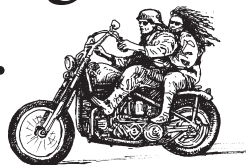

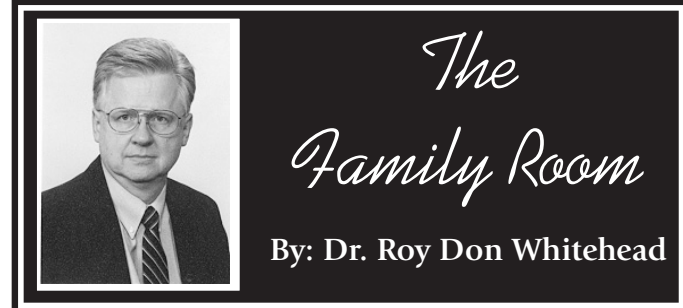

The Family Room

I have had parents tell me, "The children don't know we fight." Parents who believe this are deluding themselves. Even if children do not actually see the fighting, they hear it. Even if they neither see nor hear it, they feel its effects. They know when Mom is upset because Dad hit her last night, and this violence affects them.

Battering or spouse abuse causes damage and distress to the fetus. Violence affects that child even before he is born. Mom's anguish and worry produce chemicals that affect the fetus. At its worst physical violence can cause such injury to the mother that she has a miscarriage. I have counseled two women in the past six months who endured such an experience.

Violence in the home means emotional abandonment of the children. A mother who is being abused has to use most of her energy to cope with that abuse. She has very little left for her children. Nor is Dad supportive to the children because he is too angry. The result is that the children are left to fend for themselves, emotionally and physically.

Battering means living in constant fear. Keeping the body and mind in a state of constant arousal has a negative physical effect. Fear was meant to be a short term emotion to help humans cope with a threat. It was not meant to go on for months and years. Children who grow up in violence are always looking over their shoulders, wondering when the next battle will occur. They know it is coming; they just do not know when.

Violence makes children feel powerless. They want to help Mom but nothing they do stops Dad from being abusive. Many children, some as young as three or four, will try to intervene when Dad attacks Mom. They are rudely shoved aside or sometimes seriously hurt by the abuser. They cannot stop the abuse and they feel powerless. This affects them as adults when they attempt to cope with life.

Battering creates low self esteem. Children tend to personalize everything that happens in the family. In short, they blame themselves. "I must be doing something wrong," they think, or "I must not be good enough," they conclude. They come to see themselves as the problem. This sense of low self esteem shadows them into adulthood.

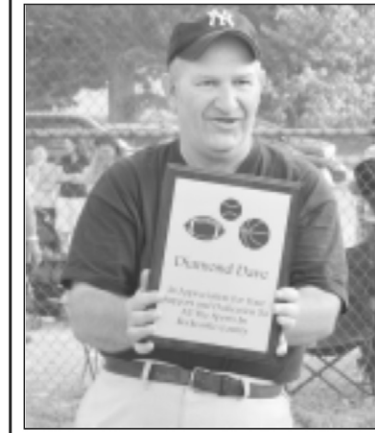
Battered children take on adult roles prematurely. When Mom and Dad are unable to fulfill the parent role, one of the children usually takes over. Often the oldest female child will be Mommie to the younger ones. Some

girls become "parents" in this way by age six. They are not able to enjoy a normal childhood.

Violence often results in stress, depression and flashbacks. These symptoms of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder occur in survivors of abuse, just as certainly as they occur in survivors of combat.

Children of abuse may learn to abuse others or to be abused themselves. Not everyone who grows up in abuse becomes an abuser, but some do. They learn that violence is the only option for handling life's problems. Others take on the role of victim and end up in abusive relationships as an adult.

Stopping abuse now prevents many problems later on for the children in violent families.

We are pleased to present this Annual Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform the public about the quality of water and services provided on a daily basis. Our commitment is to provide our customers with a safe, clean, and reliable supply of drinking water. We would like the public to be assured that we will continue to monitor, improve, and protect the water system and deliver a high quality water direct from the tap. We know that water is the most indispensable product in every home and we ask everyone to be conservative and help us in our efforts to protect the water source and the water system. Please report any activity that might jeopardize the water supply.

Our water is produced by Mt. Vernon Water Works. Mt. Vernon Water Works is located at Renfro Valley Kentucky. Our supplier treats surface water sources. The source water assessment has been completed for our supplier and indications are that susceptibility to contamination is generally moderate. Areas of concern are agricultural activities, failing septic systems, highways and railroads. The use of pesticides and herbicides and the potential for chemical spills pose a threat to the water source. The complete source water assessment can be reviewed at Mr. Vernon Water Works. The Brodhead Water Works routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to federal and State Laws. The table enclosed within shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 through December 31, 2006.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects may be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and may pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include: Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, (sewage plants, septic systems, livestock operations, or wildlife). Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, (naturally occurring or from stormwater runoff, wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming). Pesticides and herbicides, (stormwater runoff, agriculture or residential uses). Organic Chemical Contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, (by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, or from gas stations, stormwater runoff, or septic systems). Radioactive contaminants, (naturally occurring or from oil and gas production or mining activities). In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water to provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some or all of these definitions may be found in this report:

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - the level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Below Detection Levels (BDL) - laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.

Not Applicable (N/A) - does not apply.

Parts per million (ppm) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) - or micrograms per liter, (µg/L). One part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Parts per trillion (ppt) - one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.

Parts per quadrillion (ppq) - one part per quadrillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000,000 years or one penny in \$10,000,000,000,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) - a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Millirems per year (mrem/yr) - measure of radiation absorbed by the body.

Million Fibers per Liter (MFL) - a measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 10 micrometers.

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) - a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity has no health effects. However, turbidity can provide a medium for microbial growth. Turbidity is monitored because it is a good indicator of the effectiveness of the filtration system.

Variances & Exemptions (V&E) - State or EPA permission not to meet an MCL or a treatment technique under certain conditions.

Action Level (AL) - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system shall follow.

Treatment Technique (TT) - a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

In Memorial

Oscar Chasteen
1920 - 2007

Oscar Melvin "Toad" Chasteen's ancestors came from Virginia and they were farmers. Oscar's great great grandfather fought in the Revolutionary War and his great grandfather fought in the Civil War on the side of the Union.

He was the son of William and Bertha Jane Hounshell Chasteen and lived in Kentucky almost all his life, living in Middletown, Ohio in his early childhood. He had nine brothers and one sister.

Oscar's family moved back to Kentucky when he was nine years old.

Oscar served in World War II for four years. He was inducted into the Army three months before World War II began and was shipped to Mineral Wells, Texas, then to St. Louis and next to Oregon where he was part of the Oregon 96 Division. He then was sent to California and sailed to Hawaii from there then was sent to the Philippines for a taste of the real war.

Oscar didn't talk much about the war, some things he really wanted to forget, but he was very proud of the freedom and the liberties that we have

today because of it. "It had to be done," he said. "I was very proud to stand up for our nation and God," Oscar added.

In the Philippines, a 37mm anti-tank gun fell on him and nearly lost his leg. But, by the grace of God, his leg was saved. He was also stationed in New Guinea and Okinawa and was discharged a staff sergeant from the anti-tank company 382nd infantry on December 25, 1945 with 14 awarded medals.

These included: the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, Mod Conduct Medal, American Defense Service Medal, American Campaign Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, Bronze Star (Double), World War II Victory Medal, Combat Infantryman Badge, 1st Award, Expert Infantryman Badge, Philippine Liberation Ribbon & Bronze Star (Double), Honorable Service Lapel Button, Sharpshooter Badge and Carbine Bar.

"The Lord bless me and my family," Oscar said. "The prayers of my mom and dad were what brought me and the others home. My parents had 6 out of 10 sons to serve our country- three Army and one Navy -- during WWII and two during the Korean War. They had to do a lot of praying because we all made it home."

After his service, Oscar came back to Garrard County and married Dorothy Francis Pingleton on February 1, 1947. They had three daughters, Brenda (Hamilton), LaVerne (Winstead) and Judy (Parrott) and seven grandchildren.

Oscar drove a school bus for Garrard County, back when you owned your own bus, and farmed to provide for his family. He drove a bus for 18 years and, when Garrard County bought the buses, he retired.

The house the Oscar and Dorothy lived in on their Garrard county farm burned and they lost almost everything. Oscar managed to carry a refrigerator outside and they were able to throw some things out a bedroom window.

The family moved to another building on the farm and opened a store which Dorothy was supposed to operate. However, when a customer told Oscar one day, "I came by the store to purchase some things but it was closed," Oscar de-

cidated they would close the store and move to Paint Lick and Dorothy would be the janitor for the school.

Oscar and the agriculture teacher at Paint Lick bought a farm in Rockcastle and Garrard County in 1953. However, the two could not agree on farming methods and Oscar bought him out.

In 1955, the family moved to the second farm in Rockcastle. The house was over a 100 years old and the floors and foundation in the back wing had to be replaced.

Dorothy grew a garden and canned the food for winter, saving the family on grocery bills. They also had a dairy on the farm. Then, the barn burned, killing most of the dairy cows which were not paid for. The debt had to be paid and this made it very hard on the family's finances.

Oscar would get up, milk the cows, and leave to go on his school bus route at 7 o'clock in the morning. He would find jobs in Paint Lick and then go on the return school bus run. Dorothy and Oscar worked the farm together until dark. Then, Oscar decided the dairy was too much

work for him and Dorothy decided to run it on her own. This lasted a year before she decided to close the dairy.

Oscar then devoted his time to farming and raising horses, which he loved to ride, and going to horse shows. Family Gospel music and visiting churches were what he really enjoyed. He was a member of Brindle Ridge Baptist Church but loved going anywhere when he was able.

‘50s. As WHAS and CBS were leaving the Valley, it was decided to utilize the existing broadcasting studio to house a new 50-watt radio station to serve the local area.

Renfro Valley founder John Lair and partner Tom Hargis were the original owners of WRVK when it first went on the air in 1957.

The original WRVK transmitter tower was located across Renfro Creek at the modern day location of Renfro Valley Entertainment Center’s 2007 RV park expansion.

Today, WRVK is no longer a part of the Renfro Valley Entertainment Center. In fact, the station has been separately owned and operated for many years, although WRVK does continue to be among those station which broadcast Renfro Valley’s famous Gatherin’ program on Sunday mornings.

Through the years that followed WRVK’s first inception by Mr. Lair and Mr. Hargis, the station has undergone several ownership changes.

WRVK was owned by Cochran-Smith Broadcasting Inc., from Nashville for a number of years. It was in the late 1970s, during this period of the station’s ownership history, when the studios and transmitter were moved from Renfro Valley Entertainment Center to a new location on a hill just north of the Valley, where they are still located today.

The Larry Burdette family’s Cumberland Media, Inc. owned and operated WRVK next, in the late 1980s and throughout the 1990s, changing the format to gospel music and talk radio for several years.

In 2002, WRVK was acquired by Saylor Broadcasting, Inc., of Mt. Vernon. Charles and Bobbi Saylor and their staff have since returned the station to a unique country format, very much in keeping with the station’s early traditions.

The WRVK broadcasting studio, offices and transmitter are all now located on Red Foley Road, off US 25 North in Renfro Valley near KOA Campground.

WRVK is now a 1,200 watt broadcasting station as authorized by the Federal Communications Commission.

the lot for this purpose will have to take responsibility for not littering and for not causing complaints over too loud music. “I hate to not give them a place to congregate,” Mullins said, “as long as they do not cause a disturbance.”

Kirby said that she had received calls from young people asking “where they were going to go” after being barred from the Health Department’s lot and from the lot on Richmond Street where Northside Apartments once stood.

“If any of those wanting to use the lot wants to come in and talk to the council about what we expect of them, we would be happy to have them,” Kirby said.

In other action, the council decided to have the value of the city’s property, known as the “gravel pit,” assessed. The county has shown an interest in purchasing the property, reportedly for use as a parking lot for county employees and others.

Mayor Kirby also told the council that she had been approached by the Industrial Development Authority to join in with other cities in the county and other government entities about using a common “brand” on letterheads and other business correspondence, in order to make the brand immediately identifiable with all things connected with Rockcastle County.

However, Kirby told the council that she felt the city should retain its own brand and, although she knew the council supported the county in all its endeavors, she just felt this was something the city didn’t need to participate in.

Although no vote was taken on the matter, other council members seemed to be in agreement with Kirby’s feelings on the matter.

Simpson’s mother, Faye Ledford owned it before she died. “I think the deed is still in her name,” he said Monday.

“We’ve asked her to do something about it, but she won’t do anything, all she does is come down here about once a month and make sure no one has driven in the grass in the driveway and then she leaves,” Cromer said.

Cromer said he thinks Simpson lives somewhere in Richmond but she was unavailable for comment this week.

“We’ve had to kill some of the coons and possums who come out of that property, because we don’t know if they are rabid or not,” Cromer said.

“The neighbor on the other side of the property has grandchildren who can’t even get out

and play because of the varmint on that property and I told her that I was going to try to do everything I could to get it cleaned up,” Cromer said.

Besides consulting with Mayor Cash, Cromer has also solicited the help of County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis.

Carloftis said this week, that the county did not have an ordinance on the books to deal with abandoned home, but that the fiscal court could pass one that would include cities who do not have an ordinance.

Carloftis said he was going to research the situation more and possibly bring it before the fiscal court.

Mayor Cash said he and the council want to keep the city clean and have even taken it upon themselves in the past to cleanup an eyesore.

A few years ago, the city cleaned up the former Family

Cafe property on Main Street in Brodhead because repeated attempts by the city to get property owners to do it failed.

The city was out \$8,000 in landfill costs and have not been reimbursed by property owners. The city has filed a lien on the property.

Cash said he would bring up the problem on West Street at the council’s next monthly meeting.

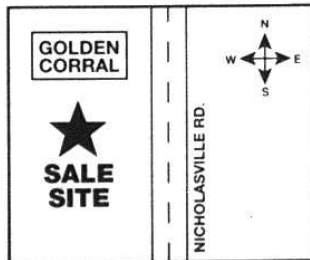

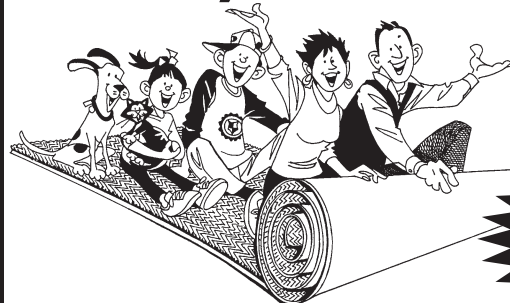
