IDA approves \$25,490 in funding

# Project will help sell Industrial Park #2

Another company looking at manufacturing building

The Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority took another step Monday to put themselves in a better position to attract new industry to the county.

On a unanimous vote the board approved \$25,490 for a four phase project that will make sure Industrial Park #2 is ready when companies come calling to consider industrial sites.

The request was made by IDA consultant Jim Holton and included monies for a phase I environmental audit, geo-technical exploration, a master plan development and mapping of the 83 acre site.

Holton told the board that because there is already a company, B&H Tools, located in the park, they also have to be included in the audit to ensure they have not compromised the property in any way.

"We will be doing an assessment of the entire site to provide a clean bill of health for the land for anyone interested in purchasing it," Holton said.

Holton said the property would be flown over and information and photos gathered would be used to develop two foot contour maps of the property.

"This will allow us to help companies who may be interested in the property to determine site development cost," Holton said. Presently the IDA has only 20 foot contour maps of the property.

The geotechnical exploration will provide the IDA board with core drillings and soil analysis to help determine the character of the building sites for potential clients, Holton told the board.

He also said the information from the core drillings will be used, along with the contour maps, to help develop a better picture of the subsurface character of the land in the park.

Holton said the master plan development will take into

# **Subscription** rates increase

Due to a hefty increase in mailing costs of the *Signal* by the U.S. Postal Service (over 20%), subscription rates will increase as of August 1st.

The bulk of the increase was put on papers being mailed out of the county and these subscribers will bear the bulk of our increase.

Effective August 1st, county subscription rates will go from \$18 a year to \$20; out of county in state rates will increase by \$4 to \$27 a year and out of state rates will be \$35 a year - up from \$30 a year.

The Signal regrets this increase but it is the third one we have absorbed since raising rates and it was simply a necessity at this point.

# Agreement reached on illegal closing of road


The process began last August and ended last week with an agreement between the county and Sylvester Kirby over Mr. Kirby closing off Rash Road/CR1187, off Chestnut Ridge Road.

With good paying jobs few and far between in Rockcastle County these days, it is good to see members of the Rockcastle Development Industrial Authority, along with the fiscal court, taking their jobs so seriously.

Monday, members of the IDA board approved a \$25,500 project for Industrial Park number two which will make the property much more market-

The project was requested by the board's new strategic development consultant Jim Holton, along with IDA president Corey Craig.

The project seemed to have the support of everyone in attendance at the meeting, including CountyJudge Buzz Carloftis who called it a "must."

After years of not being able to attract hardly any new industry, mainly because of not having the tools and resources to do so, Craig and the development board have kicked the recruiting process into high gear.

The IDA's ability to convince Alcoa to sell their plant to another manufacturer of plastics products was a great thing for the county, bringing over 100 jobs back to the

Craig told me a few months ago that something had to be done and something had to be done quickly.

He said he was going to be more passionate than ever about recruitng new jobs and he has made good on his prom-

First he used his own personal experiences with Jim Holton to convince Holton to take over the recruiting/retention reins at the development

board.

Holton has the experience and drive it takes to get new jobs for the county and, from all indications, he thinks he has a marketable product in Rockcastle County. This is important because it is hard to sell a product you don't belive in.

And the development board and fiscal court have given him the resources by approving, well over \$55,000 for needed projects and a salary and expense account for Holton.

Craig summed it up best Monday when he said the county had been in "idle" since the late 70's when two very good employers, Rockcastle Manufacturing and Mt. Vernon Plastics opened in industrial park number one.

Attracting new jobs will certainly not happen overnight, but at least, for now, there is a renewed interest with a solid plan to make it happen.

Time will only tell if the latest efforts pay off but, for the first time in a long time, things are headed in the right direction which could result in significant economic advancement for the county.

With the cost of gas and food these days, minimum wage jobs just do not cut it anymore.

It is difficult for those who have these type of jobs to even come close to making ends meet. Good luck to the IDA.

## **Points East**

Loretta and I love Roma beans. I grow the bush variety, Roma II, which is simply a short version of the old time pole variety that grows like English ivy.

We usually can 21 quarts and by the time beans are ready in the garden come another year, they are all gone.

Brothers Steve and Keeter who, except for Elaine Adams and her Dad, Lowell, are the most serious vegetable gardeners I know, say that if Romas were the only choice they had come gardening season, they wouldn't even fool with growing beans. And they divorce their wives if they caught them wasting jars to can them.

But as far as I'm concerned, comparing Romas to other beans is sort of like comparing apples to oranges. Besides the Romas, I am growing cornfield bean, Bufford Caudill fall beans, goose beans and before the day is out I will have planted a couple of heirloom varieties that Elaine passed along to me so we should have beans till frost.

Still, if Loretta had her way, we'd only grow Romas. I feel the same way about the Bufford Caudill fall beans.

Anyway, the beans are ready and we've been eating Romas at least one meal a day since the middle of the month.

Besides having such unique and wonderful taste, they cook up really fast and they are subjective to a range of recipes. They are equally great in the traditional pot with a hunk of bacon as well as simply steamed with basil and oregano

There is no finer casserole than a big dish of fresh Roma beans mixed with a liberal helping of ground pecans, a couple of big, diced, fresh tomatoes, a diced bell pepper, a small diced onion, and a dozen or so fresh, sweet-Italian basil leaves chopped and added in. You can also add some fresh rosemary, summer savory, oregano if you want. Sprinkle on some salt and fresh ground pepper to suit yourself after the dish has baked for 30 minutes

If Mexican food better suits your palate, do the beans, tomatoes, onions and peppers with almonds instead of pecans. Use fresh cilantro instead of basil and chop in a fresh, hot chili or cayenne pepper.

There's really nothing magic about these recipes. I never do them the same way nor do I ever measure anything. I just start adding stuff in till the dish is full and then I stick it in the oven. And rarely do we have leftovers if anyone

erally stated, "pre-impact fear" refers to the psychological an-

guish suffered by auto accident victims from the time the victim becomes aware of the impending impact until the impact itself.

Melissa Congleton was tragically killed in Henry County when a tractor trailer delivering steel coils lost its load. One coil, weighing an estimated 37,000 pounds fell off the trailer directly into the path of Melissa's oncoming vehicle. She died at the scene.

At trial, the jury awarded Melissa's estate total damages in excess of \$3.7 million dollars, including \$100,000 for pre-impact fear damages. The evidence which tended to support the conclusion that Melissa was aware of the impend-

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



#### State Universities misuse tax dollars...

Kentucky Attorney General Greg Stumbo on June 1 issued an advisory opinion which states that both U of L and UK were--and to date, continue--in violation of the state Constitution, which prohibits domestic partners. Stumbo, saying he would take legal action if the schools do not change their policies giving marriage benefits to "domestic partners", despite the 2004 Marriage Amendment outlawing such a practice, has made no move to rectify the situation.

award. The rationale for this rule is that emotional distress inflicted by another's negligence is speculative and difficult to measure unless directly caused by physical harm. Thus, victims may recover for damages sustained from the impact itself and those which occur subsequent to impact, but not necessarily for the fear and apprehension which occur immediately prior to impact.

Sometimes proof of pre-impact awareness is readily evident, such as when a victim survives and is able to provide credible testimony. Yet in many incidents, no evidence exists whatsoever.

The Challenger disaster aptly illustrates how tenuous evidence of pre-impact fear may be even in closely monitored situations, and thus the speculative nature of attaching monetary damages to victim's perceptions occurring prior to the infliction of physical injury.

The only verbal indication that the Challenger astronauts were aware of any danger and the impending disaster is found in the transcripts of the operational cockpit recorder. At T\_1:13, Pilot Michael J. Smith was recorded as saying ". . .Uhoh....". Milliseconds later, all recorder data was lost. The Report of the Presidential Commission on the Space Shuttle Challenger Accident disclosed that at 73.124 seconds after launch, a massive liquid hydrogen leak created a sudden forward thrust pushing the hydrogen tank forward into an intertank structure. At the same time, the solid rocket booster impacted the same intertank structure, and "[w]ithin milliseconds, there was massive, almost explosive, burning of the hydrogen streaming from the failed tank bottom." As we all know from the iconic photographs of the disaster, at this point the Challenger was "totally enveloped

in the explosive burn." Consider that this tragedy was monitored by the world's greatest aviation experts and the most sophisticated instruments available, and that the post-explosion investigation was as thorough and complete as humanly possible. Yet the severity and duration of any pre-impact terror felt by these brave astronauts is unknown. Obviously, most automobile accidents lack this degree of

tangible evidence. Still, the Kentucky decision does not categorically exclude pre-impact fear as a basis for recovery in all cases. Justice Mary Noble indicated that a future personal injury action "could well give rise to a strong challenge to the impact rule . . . if the victim can give a first-hand account or reliable eye-witness testimony is available, and there is demonstrable evidence of mental distress manifesting in a medical injury proven through expert testimony."

Last year alone, Kentucky experienced over 126,000 automobile accidents including 27,400 which involved physical injuries. Many of these resulted in litigation. Undeniably Kentucky Courts will again soon consider awarding pre-impact damages in instances like that suddenly confronted by Melissa Congleton where neither fear nor danger can be avoided.

## Rockcastle Memories

Are you old enough to remember the milkman? When fresh, cold milk was delivered house to house at the crack of dawn? The very idea seems so sweet in this frantic day and

Several days ago I received an e-mail from Bill Houston, a reader who now lives in Ohio. His father, Frank, owned and operated the house-to-house milk delivery company in my

home county. Bill informed me that his dad started the business in the late 40's and continued until 1957, at which time the business was sold to Southern Belle. Even though the business was owned by another company, Mr. Houston maintained the delivery service for several additional years.

When I was a young boy living with my grandparents, our milk was delivered several times per week. The milkman came to our house-rain or shine—and was very punctual. The milk arrived in glass bottles with cardboard stoppers. It was my job to carry in the milk (and milk products) as soon as the delivery came.

My grandmother (Mommie Katie) kept a small pad and pencil next to the back door in the kitchen. She maintained a running list of dairy products that she needed from Mr. Houston. The night before the scheduled delivery, Mommie Katie placed the list in one of the empty glass bottles for Mr. Houston. My job was to take the empty bottles outside on the night before the delivery was

The empty bottles were also used to make payment for the items. Cash was placed into one of the empty bottles for the next pick-up/delivery. My grandfather (Pop) paid his milk

bill once a week. When the weather was extremely cold, it was necessary to watch for the milkman so I could bring in the milk before it froze. Once, when I was sick, Pop forgot to watch for Mr. Houston. When he finally realized the mistake and brought in the milk, the stoppers were sitting on a column of frozen milk about four inches above the rim of the bottle. Mommie Katie was furious!

We were blessed in those days because we had a real refrigerator instead of an ice box. Mommie Katie made sure that we always had fresh milk, buttermilk, real butter, and occasionally chocolate milk. According to Bill, his dad delivered sweet milk for 12 cents a quart and buttermilk was 10

The milkman also delivered to the schools. Mr. Houston had a contract for Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, and Livingston schools. I remember when my grandfather Eugene Stokes was on the school board, there was a bidding war between Houston Dairy and the Berea College Dairy.

Bill informed me that Berea College underbid the contract by cutting the price of a pint of milk by one-quarter cent. Both Pop and another board member, Doc Maggard, were infuriated. They wanted to buy from local businesses whenever possible. (That was the same year that Berea High School beat Mt. Vernon in basketball. Doc told folks that if he could get to Lexington without going through Berea, he would.)

During the latter years that we received milk products from Houston Dairy, they also sold orange juice, cottage cheese, and other tasty morsels. The entire family looked forward to the milkman coming up the gravel road. The deliveries were made no matter the weather conditions. I remember a day when snow was several inches deep, but the milk was delivered in spite of the slick road conditions.

If wish I could get my milk today in glass bottles - and why aren't we doing this for the recycling? I would also love to have one of those glass, quart bottles with Houston Dairy on the side. Wonder if Bill has a few stashed away? (wink, wink) No, really, think how great it would look sitting on mv desk!





On August 1st from 9:00-12:00 the Rockcastle 4-H and FFA will be hosting Fair Exhibits at the Rockcastle County High School Vo-Ag Department. This will be what is usually held at the Little World's Fair in Brodhead. Listed below are the rules and regulations.

AGRICULTURAL FAIR RULES & REGULATIONS

1. The Brodhead Fair is planned and conducted according to Kentucky Department of Agriculture regulations for use of State Funds.

2. All entries must be on grounds and remain on display to conform with

3. All exhibits (except livestock) must remain on display until 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, August 12, 2006. Premiums will not be paid for exhibits removed prior to that time.

4. All exhibits (except open livestock shows) are limited to residents of Rockcastle County.

5. 4-H and FFA members are eligible to show in all open division classes with the same animals as shown in 4-H and FFA departments. All entries must be made prior to the show. 6. The Fair Board reserves the right to combine classes when a class has fewer than three entries and/or two

7. All livestock must be accompanied by an official health certificate in keeping with the State Department of Agriculture health regulations.

8. No individual may take more than one entry in any one class, except that two may be entered in livestock classes.

9. The Fair Executive Committee reserves the right to interpret and resolve all matters connected with or incident to the fair.

10. The Fair Board will not be responsible for losses, accidents, injury to persons, animals or other exhibits, but will take precautions to prevent any losses.

11. Money not used in one division may be transferred to another division on the Danish system.

12. Foods, fruits and vegetable entries are to be made on paper plates. Canned foods are to be exhibited in standard canning jars. Jars that are not sealed will be disqualified.

13. When there is only one entry in a class, it is the discretion of the judges to determine the ribbon received.

General Provisions for Kentucky

and Out-Of-State Livestock: All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a health certificate. A health certificate means a legible record covering the requirements of the state of destination accomplished on an equivalent from the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services, United States Department of Agriculture, that is prepared and issued by a licensed accredited veterinarian. A) Health Certificates for Kentucky livestock shall be void 150 days after issuance.

B) Health Certificates for Out-of-State livestock shall be void 30 days after issuance.

If animals are from tuberculosis accredited or brucellosis certified herds, the accompanying health certified shall show the accreditation and certification number with the date of the last herd test for tuberculosis and brucellosis.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

FOR KENTUCKY CATTLE

All cattle for exhibition shall be identified individually on a health certificate in the owner's name. Brucellosis - Animals 12 months of

age or over shall have been negative to an official card test for brucellosis conducted in a state federal laboratory within 150 days of the date of exhibition, unless exempt by one of

the following: A) Originate directly from a certi-

fied herd B) Have been officially vaccinated under 20 months of age for the dairy

Tuberculosis - Native Kentucky cattle are not required to have been negative to a tuberculin test to enter shows in Kentucky. Other Disease Requirements - Cattle

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## Agricultural News

#### **Continuous CRP**

The Continuous Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is a private lands environmental improvement program that allows participants the opportunity to enroll environmentally sensitive acreages in conservation practices that will reduce soil erosion, improve water and soil quality and provide wildlife habitat and food sources.

To be eligible for enrollment in the Continuous CRP, participants and acreage must meet certain requirements. Provided the eligibility requirements are met, FSA will automatically accept enrollment of acreage into Continuous CRP. Landowners may enroll in the program at any time during the

For more information on CRP contact your local FSA office.

#### **Emergency having and** grazing of CRP

Emergency having or grazing of CRP land is restricted to certain CRP practices that are 12 past being determined fully established by NRCS.

The haying or grazing requires written pre-approval by the local Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Committee. However; the same acreage CANNOT be scheduled for both having and grazing. And

the emergency haying is limited to only one (1) cutting in the approved year.

For more information or to make a request for the emergency haying or grazing contact your local FSA office.

#### **Closing of FSA offices**

FSA is in the process of downsizing FSA offices in Kentucky. Included in this process to close county FSA office; public town meetings are being held in counties which are scheduled to be closed.

FSA realizes county office closures may create a significant disadvantage for some producers in obtaining reasonable availability and accessibility to services. However; producers on farms in County Offices that close will have a 60 day time frame in which to request with the office to select a new administrative County Office and transfer the farm records.

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

Installing an island garden or raised bed in a conspicuous spot in your yard can transform the ordinary into a very extraordinary yard. We could be talking front yard, or backyard if your front is already great looking or if your space in front of your home is limited.

Choose a location that would be enhanced with a new bed...preferrably from several vantage points.

Lay out the proposed area with a garden hose and some spray paint (or plain flour works fine).

You can move the hose (or 100 foot cloth measuring tape if you have one) several times to get the look you want. Some pleasing curves are recommended over square or other shapes with angled corners.

Trenching machines or bed edgers (or spades and shovels if you prefer) can cut the grass sod along the lines you have marked for bed edges. Then a shovel can remove grass a few inches in from the edge.


(I submit that since dirt is going to generally be added to raise the bed, that removing all the grass is not a requirement.) (Roundup is an option to digging, ofcourse.)

Before I go on, let's recap. You have decided on a new island planting bed. You have chosen a good spot. You have marked it out. You have defined the edges. Now what?

Most beds will be raised, which means buying or otherwise hauling in topsoil. Stones of varying sizes may be used to contain the bed, or a trench, or many other materials are possible, including brick and concrete, as well as simple plastic edging.

Oh, we will need plants, ofcourse. I suggest a focal point inside your "focal point" island

It may be a unique plant, or a structure of wood, a bench, a waterfeature, or simply a rock outcropping. But something special that catches the eye can be especially nice in improving front yard curb appeal. Then,





The Family Room By: Dr. Roy Don Whitehead

Some wise person once defined insanity as doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results. As a friend of mine says, if nothing changes, then nothing changes.

Human beings seem to have a particular aversion to change. Though all may be falling apart around about them, they hang onto the same way of doing things that their parents and grandparents did before them.

This is true for people and for organizations. The book The Seven Last Words of the Church defined those last words as "We've never done it that way before." Many organizations have ended up on the scrap heap of history because they did not want to try a different way. As one man is reputed to have said, "If the King James Version of the Bible was good enough for the Apostle Paul, then it is good enough for me."

Sometimes fear precludes change. The same way is at least comfortable and not so scary because it is the known. The unknown is almost always more frightening, even if it might lead to a better life. The old way is like an old shoe that slips neatly onto the foot. It may pinch in places and allow the rain to soak that foot, but at least it is familiar, and familiar is comfortable.

Change is often just too hard to accomplish. Change requires work, often a tremendous amount of work. The normal, everyday and predictable require little effort. Becoming a different kind of parent requires daily, determined effort. It does not come easily. Old habits do not just die hard; they fight ter at 800-755-5348.]

back, kicking and screaming on their way to extinction.

Overcoming an addiction is one of the monster changes that can take a lifetime. It requires daily, concentrated effort. It requires spiritual diligence. It requires dedication and commitment. Oh, and it requires work.

Change requires taking responsibility for one's own actions. Certainly parents influence the direction of their children's lives, but change requires letting parents off the hook and taking over the internal controls of life. Everyone had the same kind of parents, the imperfect kind. Granted, some were more imperfect than others, but change acknowledges the parent's imperfections and then moves on to forge an independent life.

The payoffs for changing can be tremendous: a new life, a new relationship, a new beginning and the end of old destructive behavior. The risks of continuing the old life are also tremendous. The destructive behavior may drive one to an early grave, yet the old behavior lingers because change is too hard or too scary or too unfamiliar.

Support may be the key. Most change happens when the atmosphere is right, and that atmosphere usually includes support from people who care. Those who care may be the church, AA, NA, a domestic violence shelter, family or friends, but it is hard to imagine change happening without

## **Unemployment decreases in June**

Kentucky's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell from 5.5 percent in May 2007 to 5.4 percent in June 2007, according to the Office of Employment and Training (OET), an agency of the Kentucky Education Cabinet. June 2007's jobless rate was lower than June 2006's rate of 5.7 percent.

The U.S. seasonally adjusted jobless rate remained unchanged at 4.5 percent from May 2007 to June 2007, according to the U.S. Department of Labor.

of Labor.

Three of the 11 major nonfarm job North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) sectors reported employment increases in June, while seven decreased, and one was unchanged, according to OET. A decrease of 2,200 jobs in June 2007 brought Kentucky's nonfarm employment to a seasonally adjusted total of 1,854,600. Since June 2006, Kentucky's nonfarm employment has increased by 9,000

According to the seasonally adjusted employment data, Kentucky's professional and business services recorded the highest number of new jobs in any sector in June 2007 with 2,600. This area had 4,700 more employees in June 2007 than in June 2006. The professional and business services sector includes professional, scientific and technical services, and management of companies and administrative and support management, including temporary help agencies.

Educational and health services sector positions rose by 500 jobs in June 2007. Since last June, this segment has gained 3,500 jobs. This sector includes private and nonprofit establishments that provide either education and training, or health care and social assistance to their clients.

The natural resources and mining sector had 200 more jobs in June 2007 compared to

May 2007. Since June 2006, the segment has risen by 500 jobs.

On the down side, the lei-

sure and hospitality sector lost 1,700 jobs from May 2007 to June 2007. Since June 2006, employment in the sector has increased by 1,700 positions. The leisure and hospitality sector includes arts, entertainment, recreation, accommodations and food services and drinking places industries.

Kentucky's trade, transportation and utilities sector recorded 1,500 fewer jobs in June 2007. This area includes retail and wholesale trade, transportation and utilities businesses, and warehousing, and is the largest sector in Kentucky with 380,600 employees. Since June 2006, the number of jobs in this

sector has decreased by 300.

The government sector, which includes public education, had a drop of 1,000 jobs in June 2007. Since June 2006, this sector has added 600 jobs.

The construction sector declined by 400 jobs in June

2007. Since June 2006, employment in this job area has gone up by 1,500.


Jobs in the manufacturing sector fell by 400 in June 2007. Compared to June 2006, jobs in the sector were down by 5,500 in June 2007.

The information sector went down by 400 positions in June 2007. This segment, which includes firms involved in publishing, Internet activities and broadcasting and news syndication, had 400 more jobs in June 2007 than in June last

The financial activities sector reported 100 fewer jobs in June 2007. This segment, which includes businesses involved in finance, insurance, real estate and property leasing or rental, has added 1,700 jobs over the past 12 months.

The state's other services sector, which includes such establishments as repair and maintenance places, personal and laundry services, religious


## "What Is Written"







organizations, and civic and professional organizations, had the same number of jobs in May 2007 and June 2007. This area had 200 more jobs in June 2007 than last June.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics' monthly estimate of the number of employed Kentuckians for June 2007 was 1,942,596 on a seasonally adjusted basis. This figure is down 2,925 from the 1,945,521 employed in May 2007, but up 21,214 from the 1,921,382 employed in June

The monthly estimate of the number of unemployed Kentuckians for June 2007 was 111,348, down 1,126 from the 112,474 Kentuckians unemployed in May 2007, and down 5,639 from the 116,987 unemployed in June 2006.

The monthly estimate of the number of Kentuckians in the civilian labor force for June 2007 was 2,053,944. This figure is down 4,051 from the 2,057,995 recorded in May 2007, but up 15,575 from the 2,038,369 recorded for June

Unemployment statistics are based on estimates and are compiled to measure trends rather than actually to count people working. Civilian labor force statistics include nonmilitary workers and unemployed Kentuckians who are actively seeking work. They do not include unemployed Kentuckians who have not looked for employment within the past four weeks.

Kentucky's statewide unemployment rate and employment levels are seasonally adjusted. Employment statistics undergo sharp fluctuations due to seasonal events, such as weather changes, harvests, holidays and school openings and closings. Seasonal adjustments eliminate these influences and make it easier to observe statistical trends. However, because of the small sample size, county unemploy ment rates are not seasonally adjusted.



our waterways to their pristine beauty and engage the community to continue removing trash dumps in the mountains and litter on the roadways," he added.

PRIDE, which promotes Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment in 38 counties, was launched in 1997 by Rogers and the late General James Bickford, former Secretary of the Kentucky Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet. Their vi-

sion was to restore the natural beauty of their native region by encouraging citizens to take responsibility for protecting their environment.

Through these and other grant programs, PRIDE has invested \$185 million to clean up the environment.

And PRIDE has been good for Rockcastle County.

At one point, during the past ten years, PRIDE funding helped to eliminate more failing septic systems and straight line pipes than in any county in the fifth district.

264 septic systems or sewer hook-ups in the county were completed at a cost of \$983,973.

That statistic and the following statistics were provided by Karen Engle, Executive Director of the PRIDE program in the fifth district.

PRIDE has funded 18 community grants for the clean-up of roadsides and small dumps under \$50,000 for a total of \$516,699.

A total of \$300,000 has been spent in the county on the cleanup of super dumps in excess of \$50,000.

PRIDE has funded 14 educational grants for a total of \$57,430 and is in the process of funding a \$755,000 waste water project around Lake Linville, which will cost the city of Mt. Vernon nothing.

In the past ten years, 15 streams, lakes and rivers have been cleaned, 68 dumpsites cleaned up, 264 roadways cleaned, 97 appliances collected and 4,500 tires disposed

Nearly 4,000 volunteers have logged 14,579 hours cleaning up the county.

'We truly appreciate the cooperation of the general public and the elected officials in Rockcastle County. Without them the program could not work as well as it has," Engle

The latest PRIDE project in the county was a Community Cleanup sponsored by the City of Mt. Vernon.

Because of a \$15,000 PRIDE grant, the city accepted junk and garbage on June 21-22, which was disposed of by BEE Garbage.



ing Denny to "sue me." That's just what County Judge Buzz Carloftis did at that point, signing a criminal complaint against Kirby. However, before that warrant could be served, Kirby sued the county in circuit court.

The original suit, instigated by the county, was heard before District Judge Katie Wood last week and during the testimony of Judge Carloftis, Kirby's attorney Robert Cato called a recess. During the recess, Cato and County Attorney Billy Reynolds reached an agreement to resolve the matter. According to the agreement the case against Mr. Kirby was dismissed without prejudice on the following conditions: Mr. Kirby is to remove the gate currently blocking the Rash Branch road and Kirby, or the county, "shall not use any material or object to block the road, pending further court order." The other part of the agreement reads, "the county may maintain the road, as well as Mr. Kirby may maintain; however, neither Mr. Kirby nor the county shall modify or make significant improvements to this road." The dismissal without prejudice means the suit can be reinstated if the conditions are not met, according to Reynolds.

Following resolution of the issue, Carloftis told the Signal, "I felt I had an obligation to sign this complaint. Any Rockcastle citizen has the right to travel any county road 24/ 7." Carloftis went on to say that no one lives on the road but there are other property owners on the road who need access to their land.

The charge against Kirby, "obstructing a highway or other public passage" is a Class B Misdemeanor and a guilty sentence could have carried up to one year in jail for Kirby.

Although last week's ruling by Wood would seem to resolve the issue, Kirby's counter-suit in Circuit Court is still pending. Reynolds said Tuesday that he had filed an answer to the suit and, if it eventually is heard in circuit court, he was "confident that the county would prevail."
