State trooper sued over actions after traffic stop

A Louisana man has filed suit in Rockcastle Circuit Court in an effort to get back \$30,000, taken from him during a June 30th traffic stop on I-75.

According to court records, Michael D. Rogers of Deville, Louisana was stopped on I-75 by state trooper Jason Vanhook, who gave Rogers a ticket for going three miles over the speed limit and crossing the fog (outsde edge) line.

According to Rogers'suit, Vanhook also confiscated \$30,000 cash from Rogers, after police searched his vehicle. However, nothing about taking the \$30,000 appears on the citation.

According to the citiation issued by Vanhook, Rogers said he was talking on the cell phone when he crossed the fog

The suit states that Vanhook called for back up from other officers and did not commence writing the uniform citiation until after he had detained Rogers for a period longer than it should have taken to write the citation.

The suit against Vanhook also alleges that he did not tell Rogers that he could refuse the search of his vehicle.

The suit states that Rogers told Vanhook he did not have any drugs or illegal items in his vehicle, but that he did have the \$30,000 in cash, which Rogers said was his vacation money.

The suit alleges that Vanhook told Rogers he would need to produce receipts at the state police post in London, showing its source, before it would be returned to him.

"This is a total miscarriage of justice," said Jerry Cox, one of Roger's attorneys.

"They brought in drug dogs and thoroughly searched his

Hansel said Poynter was not at home at the time of the fire because he had not returned from Somerset where he had gone to the Cruisin' Car show on Saturday night.

The fire captain said it appeared that someone had broken through the basement door on the side of the house and that it was very likely the house had been set on fire.

Rockcastle | Memories

With all the fairs and festivals occurring at this time of the year, I thought it appropriate to share some of my memories about the famous "Little World's Fair" held annually in Brodhead, Kentucky. (This year the fair will be August 13 through 18.)

When I was a little boy, it was a yearly event for my Dad. Hobe Griffin, to put me into his pickup truck and head for the fair in Brodhead. Occasionally, he allowed me to take a friend. Because of the enormous crowds, we had to park about a mile away and walk to the fairgrounds. Daddy always complained about the heat and the long walk to the day's

We usually spent some time at the horse show before venturing into the throngs of people who were purchasing tickets to board the joy rides. Daddy was not interested in riding himself, but he always allowed me to choose which rides I wanted to enjoy. He stood close by, watching me have fun.



Daddy was a "people person" and spent a great deal of time chatting with his friends. Everyone knew him and wanted to talk. Sometimes I became aggravated when he spent too much time chatting with his "buddies" instead of walking me though the ride area. I remember one year when Daddy actually rode the Mary-Go-Round with me. It was a real thrill to have him by my side. I was probably six or seven at the time. I don't recall that he ever did that again.

Part of our tradition was to sample most of the food items that were available at the fair. Daddy loved pork bar-b-que and usually tried to find a vendor that was serving good pork.

After lunch we had to find an ice cream stand to cool us off. In the afternoon, a variety of candy and fruit was the standard fare. I remember sitting under a shade tree while we consumed a whole watermelon. We had the sweet juice all over us by the time it was finished.

One of my favorite parts of the yearly event was the games of chance that had booths around the circle. As a very small child I loved choosing the floating ducks to see which prize I could win. As I got older the games of chance became harder to produce a prize.

As we walked around the circle, fair workers barked at the crowd, trying to convince us to spend our money at their individual booths. One year Daddy got into a shouting match with a "pushy" carnival guy who wanted me to toss rings over Coke bottles.

Daddy threatened to "call the law" if he did not leave us

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

The Auditor's Office stands by its work and was very disappointed we were not given the chance to refute the incorrect allegations by Mrs. Houk contained in the article. There are several misstatements of fact throughout the published story.

The audit was performed under government auditing standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. It was performed by career, merit employees with over 46 years of government auditing experience. Our professional auditors work very hard to accurately prepare audits in every Kentucky county.

Specifically, auditors met with Norma Houk regarding her audit on December 6, 2006 at the Rockcastle County Courthouse. At that time she was given documentation that supported each of the comments in the audit and Ms. Houk was asked to review it. As with all elected officials, she was told that if she finds mistakes the audit would be corrected. She subsequently told auditors on more than one oc-

casion that she did not have time to review the findings. At her request, auditors met with Ms. Houk on January 25, 2007 in Frankfort. She informed auditors that she disagreed with some of the findings. Auditors requested that she review the documentation and again she refused. Evidence was never presented to auditors refuting the findings

The audit reported that the Clerk's Office had a deficit at the end of the 2005 calendar year totaling \$4,286. The office had undeposited Deed Transfer Tax receipts of \$1,979. Records indicate that the office received more money than was deposited into the office's bank account. At the time, the clerk and the auditor both agreed with the reconciliation.

An additional amount of undeposited receipts of \$2,307 was also discovered. This was because the last deposit for the 2005 calendar year was \$2,307 less than the daily checkout sheet. The checkout sheet is the clerk's record of each day's transactions. Ms. Houk was unable to offer an explanation. We commend Ms. Houk for fixing her mistake by repaying the county the \$4,286 deficit.

Auditors are required to prepare a yearly report on set criteria. These criteria include accounting standards, state and federal statutes, and other established protocols. Auditors

report these findings to government agencies and the public. All agencies have accepted this audit. However, no citizen has to take our word for it, they can review the entire report by going to our website at www.kyauditor.gov http:// www.kyauditor.gov>.

The auditing bill was \$34.15 per hour; the exact rate billed every county in the Commonwealth. The extra auditing hours were necessitated by the additional time spent trying to identify the cause and nature of the deficit.

I am extremely proud of the hard working professional staff of the Kentucky State Auditor's Office. We all work extremely hard to be the independent watchdog for Kentucky taxpayers. We will continue to do

in federal court seeking an injunction against enforcement of the federal laws which prohibit the possession, transfer or sale of marijuana. In court, Raich claimed, and the government did not attempt to disprove, that she was faced with a choice-of-evils, either comply with the federal Controlled Substances Act and endure excruciating pain and then death, or violate the terms of the Act and obtain relief from her agony. The federal court determined that Raich made a sufficient showing that the use of marijuana was necessary in her unique condition and thus might provide her a defense in a criminal prosecution.

Yet, the appeals court still denied Raich the right to prevent federal law enforcement from charging and then prosecuting her, holding that while "[w]e agree . . . that medical marijuana and conventional wisdom that recognizes the use of marijuana for medical purposes is gaining traction in the law . . . , that legal recognition has not yet reached the point where a conclusion can be drawn that the right to use medical marijuana is 'fundamental' and 'implicit in the concept of ordered liberty."

Only two years ago, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the authority of the federal government to regulate marijuana despite the passage of laws in 11 states which permit medical

cannabis. Raich was also the lead party in that case. A close reading of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision indicates that part of the problem underlying the legitimization of medicinal marijuana for those few patients who might truly need it, is the difficulty of enforcing laws against illegitimate use.

Under California law, marijuana clinics are supposed to only dispense to seriously ill people and may only seek reasonable compensation. Yet evidence exists that many of these "compassionate use" facilities are nothing more than fronts for what can be characterized as illegal trafficking. DEA agents report seizing enormous amounts of cash and pot. And some clinics were apparently buying pot from street dealers and then reselling it to their "patients" at twice the street price. Not surprisingly, when compassion meets avarice, greed most always pre-

If you accept that marijuana can be a viable and effective treatment option for some extreme medical conditions despite conflicting medical evidence, then you might also argue that medicinal marijuana might ought to be legalized in those unusual and rare circumstances. But that's not what most who advocate legalizing marijuana want. Instead, they advocate for widespread decriminalization and despite existing bans, they cultivate, possess and traffic illegally. By doing so, they not only expose themselves to arrest and prosecution, but they undermine the claims of those patients who have legitimate and sometimes horrendous medical conditions which beg for relief.

Maybe the blame for this conflict doesn't always lay with a heartless uncaring government so much as with those who utilize other people's suffering to justify their own criminal conduct.

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the accompanying statement of revenues, expenditures, and excess fees - regulatory basis of the former Sheriff of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, for the year ended December 31, 2005. This financial statement is the responsibility of the former Sheriff. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on this financial statement based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for County Fee Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the Sheriff's office prepares the financial statement on a regulatory basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.





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Origins of Blue Springs church of Christ date back to the 1930s

Photos By: Richard Anderkin The Blue Springs church of Christ traces its origins back to 1930. At that time, Joe McClure began having services under a big oak tree at the home of Nathan McClure. Several were baptized and a building was erected for services. The building became knows as the Highdry church of Christ.

In the 1940s, the WPA (Works Progress Administration) started construction of a graveled road (Hwy. 1249) to the southern end of Rockcastle County. Brother Swan Bullock of the Highdry congregation donated land adjoining this new road and the congregation built a new building at Blue Springs in 1948. This is the current location of the church, approximately seven miles south of Mt. at Blue Springs.

Early preachers in the church were, Joe McClure, Henry Rowe, Jim Haug Cromer and Henry Cromer.

In 1963, Zade McClure was baptized and soon began preaching. Bro. Zade took an active leadership role in the congregation that is maintained to this day, some 44 years after his conversion.

In 1998, evangelist Doug Hawkins moved to Mt. Vernon and began to work with the Blue Springs church. From 1999-2002, Blue Springs sponsored a television program that aired every Sunday morning on WKYT in Lexington with Brother Doug preaching. Last year Doug moved to Richmond, but still occasionally preaches

Currently, there are four

teachers at Blue Springs: Zade McClure, Gary Reppert, Coy Cromer and Marcus Reppert.

The congregation financially supports preachers of the gospel in Lexington, Texas, and West Virginia, as well as two African preachers in the nation of Togo. Blue Springs publishes a monthly bulletin and sponsors two gospel meetings a year to proclaim the gospel. 
In our public worship services, the men do the instructing in truth and righteous living. The women keep silent as learners, along with other men


and children (I Cor. 14:34; I Tim. 2:11,12). You are welcome to bring your Bible and follow the teaching as we study from God's Word.



No Pass/No Drive Law now in effect for students

Don't look for teenagers to pass you on the road if they don't pass their high school courses in the classroom. The No Pass / No Drive Law (KRS 159.051) is now in effect. The law states that all students ages 16 or 17 can be denied a driver's license or have a license revoked for academic deficiency. The statute only affects drivers who obtain a permit or license after August 1, 2007.

A student is considered academically deficient when he or she has not passed at least four courses or the equivalent of four courses in the previous semester, has accumulated 9 or more unexcused absences, or has dropped out of school.

Students will be required to present a school compliance verification form, which is issued from their school, and a parental consent form when applying for a driver's license or permit.

or permit.

If a student becomes academically deficient, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet will be notified by the school, and that student's license will then be revoked. Students may reapply for a license once compliance is met.

"I'm sure this will not be a popular law with some students," said Transportation Cabinet Secretary Bill Nighbert. "But education serves as a foundation for success in life. If this measure keeps kids in school then the

extra work involved for the Transportation Cabinet, Department of Education, and school districts will be worth it. Part of the process of becoming an adult includes accepting responsibility for your actions and this law holds teenagers accountable."

The original No Pass / No Drive Law (HB-43) was enacted in 1990. In 2003, the law was ruled unconstitutional by the Supreme Court, and a new version was created. The new No Pass / No Drive Law will affect students in public and private schools as well as students being schooled at home.

Each Lord's Day (first day of the week) we strive to observe the Communion in the same way it was instituted by Jesus and bound by the Apostles (Acts 20:7; Matt 26:26-28; I Cor. 10: 16,17; 11:1,2, 23-28). A man serves at the Lord's Table. He takes bread (unleavened) and gives thanks, breaks off his portion and eats, and then all other Christians partake in the same way. Then he takes a cup containing the fruit of the vine (grape juice), expresses thanks, drinks a portion and then gives it to the other communicants who also drink. This is a joint participation in the body and blood of Jesus, a memorial of His great sacrifice on the cross (Matt. 26: 26-28; Luke 22: 17-20; I Cor. 11:26). Thus, we follow the simple pattern given us in the Bible.

The only service in which a collection is taken is on the first day of the week (I Cor. 16:1,2) in the Lord's Day worship service. At this time, the members of the church are permitted to give of their means as the Lord has blessed them, purposing in their own hearts how much to give (II Cor. 9:7,8). These contributions are for the work of the church. No one but a member of the church is expected to give.

At each service, an invitation is extended to all that are not Christians to obey the Gospel and become followers of Christ (Rev. 22:17, II Thes. 1:8). The backsliders, likewise, are also urged to return to the Lord (Gal. 6:1, Jas. 5:19, I John 1:9). This is done in such a way so as not to embarrass those present, but to allow anyone the opportunity to obey the Lord.

We wear the name "Christian" as disciples of Christ (Act. 11:26; 4:12), and we understand that those who obey the gospel are added to the church by the Lord (Act. 2:47). Christ we honor as the head of the church and the savior of the body (Col. 1:18, Eph. 5:23).


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

WABA declares August **Breastfeeding Awareness Month in Kentucky**

August 2007 has been declared Breastfeeding Awareness Month in Kentucky. The Alliance Breastfeeding Action (WABA) has declared August 1-7, 2007 as World Breastfeeding Week. The theme for this year is "Breastfeeding: The 1st Hour -Welcome Baby Softly." Throughout the month of August, there are many activities promoting and supporting breastfeeding in Kentucky such as the Rock and Relax Room

at the State Fair. Breastfeeding the newborn provides the skin to skin contact and warmth that babies need most, especially premature and low birth weight babies. New scientific evidence reveals that if all women started breastfeeding within one hour after delivery it could prevent one million of the four million deaths of babies worldwide who die during the first month of life.

Early initiation of breastfeeding reduces the high neonatal mortality worldwide, protects infants from early ex-

posure to bacteria and viruses, increases maternal oxytocin important for milk production and attachment and helps pre-

vent maternal blood loss. Pre-term infants benefit from breast milk because of the greater amounts of protein, fat, sodium, iron, chloride and other nutrients than milk from mothers of term infants. Breast milk changes as the baby grows to meet their ever-changing

Skin to skin contact is another important component of breastfeeding. When a mother is nursing her infant, the warmth of the mother's body helps regulate the baby's temperature and heart rate. Skin to skin contact also serves as a pain analgesic, reduces infant crying and lowers stress levels in mothers.









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Josh Logan presents gold record to KY Music Hall of Fame

"Seems every time I make my mark, somebody paints the wall," from "Somebody Paints

Country music veteran Josh Logan has had a mark in Renfro Valley since 2002, when the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame and Museum put some of his memorabilia in a display case.

Nobody has painted over it in the past five years, and a gold record will soon join the display.

Logan, who was born in Cartersville and has called Berea home for most of his life, had his biggest hit in 1989. Its title was "Somebody Paints the Wall," and, 18 years later, it is still selling. You can buy it on amazon.com and ebay.com.

Earlier this year, Logan's recording company, Curb Records of Nashville, calculated that accumulated sales had surpassed 50,000. That is enough for a gold record on an independent country music label. In late June, Curb Records recognized Logan's sales' milestone by presenting him a

framed golden disc at the Nashville offices of Earthwide Music Service.

On Wednesday, Logan loaned the gold record to the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame and Museum to add to a display case already dedicated to memorabilia from a career of more than 33 years.

The display sits next to one highlighting another music act from Madison County, Exile.

The gold record will join the hat, boots and jacket that Logan wore on his first of three national concert tours. The display also includes guitars, album covers and signed photographs.

Logan also loaned a framed set of his three biggest singles and a mounted silver plate presented by the Guantanamo Naval Base officers' club.

While he also has had four concert tours abroad, Logan sticks close to home these days, playing clubs and events in the region. He performed for Richmond's July 4th Extravaganza at Lake Reba Park.

"I'm selling more records and getting played on the radio more in Europe than in the United States," Logan said. "I've had offers to go on European tours in recent years, but I don't like to be that far from home for extended periods."

"Somebody Paints the Wall" was released at a time of transition in the recording industry, Logan said. It came out in four formats: as an LP, a 45 rpm single, a cassette tape and as a video. Later, it was released on compact disc.

"My version of 'Somebody Paints the Wall' was among the first country music videos and rose to No. 34 on the Country Music Television channel's popularity list," Logan said. It also was shown on The Nashville Network.

George Jones, who Logan cites as one of his greatest influences, recorded "Somebody Paints the Wall," but had little success with the song. Later, Tracy Lawrence recorded the song, and it rose to No. 4 on the country music charts.

Conway Twitty took a song that Logan recorded, "I Made You a Woman for Somebody Else," and used it as the flip

side of his hit single "Tight Fittin' Jeans."

These stories seem to follow the lyrics of Logan's biggest hit. After he made the marks, Lawrence and Twitty painted

However, Logan said he was flattered that artists such as Jones, Lawrence and Twitty would use a song he had intro-

"I opened for George Jones several times," Logan said. He also preceded Garth Brooks at a concert in Alexandria, La., at which Ronnie McDowell had the top billing.

Logan has no regrets about

said. "Many people put in a lot of hard work and effort to make my career happen," he said at the Nashville presentation. "I accept these awards in their honor.'

The late Earl King of Richmond "was with me in the very beginning," Logan said. "He took me to Memphis, Tenn., to cut my first record in 1974. 'Mitchell Tate has stuck with me for a lot of years and helped me through some difficult times." It was Tate who would come to the rescue "when I was broke down on the road somewhere," he said. Logan also thanked Charles Miracle who "co-wrote a number of songs with me and supported my en-

"I thank the good Lord above for giving me a voice to sing. I'm very lucky to still be singing after all these years."

Logan's granddaughter, Hayley Nikole Sayler, who turned 9 years old July 13, accompanied him for the presentation to the hall of fame and

Gear Up

High school education leads to future success

While all education prepares students for the future, the high school years are especially important in helping students develop the skills they need for college and a career. In order to assist high schools in preparing students for the future, the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) has developed a new initiative aimed at refocusing high school curriculum.

GEAR UP recently posed questions about the importance of secondary education (high school) and post-secondary education (college) to Debbie Powers, Secondary Program Consultant in KDE's Division of Secondary and Virtual Learning, and Lisa Gross, director of KDE's Division of Communications. Powers and Gross agree, "Sstudents who are wellprepared, no matter which path they take, are more likely to be successful. Adequate preparation leads to overall success in college, work or the military.'

There are many reasons why a college or some type of post-secondary education is necessary. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, an individual without a high school degree is likely to earn an average of \$19,169 per year. A high school graduate, however, will earn \$28,645 per year on average. Students who complete a Bachelor's degree earn, on average, \$51,554 and individuals who go on to complete a Master's degree or higher earn an average of \$78,093.

The Kentucky Board of Eduation decided to refocus secondary education when it became evident that although Kentucky was making gains in certain areas the gains were not enough to compensate for other apparent weaknesses. For example, the dropout was decreasing, but not very fast. In addition, Kentucky's high schools were not giving students adequate opportunities to participate in higher level courses. Also the need for remedial classes for college freshmen was increasing. Colleges and universities place incoming freshmen in remedial courses when the student cannot demonstrate basic understanding of reading or math concepts. The increased need for Kentucky high school graduates needing remediation revealed that Kentucky students need to be better prepared in high school in order to succeed in college.

A major component of KDE's "Secondary Agenda" is the Individual Learning Plan (ILP). The ILP is a tool that helps students explore career interests which acts as a guide that enables the student, their parents and their high school guidance counselor to develop a plan of study that includes the classes needed to meet their career goals. According to Powers, the ILP, available via the Web, helps middle school and high school students better focus their coursework on individual goals as they prepare for college and career.

"It's never too early to start planning for the future," says Powers. "Setting goals as early as middle school provides students with opportunities to map out their remaining years in high school to maximize their experience."

The Kentucky Department of Education strongly recommends that students use the Web enabled ILP. Teachers, parents and guidance counselors should also use the tool to make the secondary educational experience the best it can be, says Powers.

"It's important for students to be successful, no matter what their chosen path," Powers says. "Higher education has become increasingly important to business and industry, and new employees are expected to have a level of knowledge that many believe can only come from attending a college or university."

Ultimately, educational attainment affects more than one person. Communities that have individu-



SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective

Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

- Arrive at a bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety
- measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
- Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you. Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.
- The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating
- Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
- Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
- Obey the rules posted on each bus. Do not block aisles in any way.
- 10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus.
- 11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a complete stop.
- 12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses. 13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
- 14. Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.
- 15. Report any damages to the bus.
- 16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
- 17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions.
- 18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.
- 19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times:
 - a. Use of profane/foul language.
 - b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus.
 - c. Fighting on the bus.
 - d. Destruction of bus property. e. Defiance of driver's authority.
 - f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.
- 20. Disciplinary Action: Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.

Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal.

Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.

Farmers reminded of Deadlines for 2007 DCP and COC elections

Farmers are reminded that the deadline to sign your 2007 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) contract is August 3rd.

In March 2007, FSA extended the DCP sign-up deadline to Aug. 3, 2007. The original DCP enrollment deadline was June 1, 2007. Producers failing to sign up by Aug. 3, 2007, but before Sept. 30, 2007, will pay a late-file fee of \$100.00.

August 1st is the last date to file County Committee election nomination forms. The 2007 election nomination forms must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on August 1st. Drivers Be Aware

With students heading back to school soon in most locations across the state, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) is reminding drivers to use extreme caution once school buses return to local roads.

"We cannot over emphasize how important it is for motorists to watch out for stopped school buses," said Secretary Bill Nighbert. "There is always an adjustment period for drivers when classes resume, as they get used to school bus routes and stops that haven't been there for the past few months. Drivers need to be extremely attentive as they share the road with school

buses.'

Kentucky law requires all traffic, both oncoming and following, to stop for a school bus loading or unloading passengers when the bus' stop sign is extended and its red flashers are on. The only exception is for four-lane divided highways, where oncoming traffic is not required to stop. Modern school buses are also equipped with yellow flashers that serve to warn following or oncoming drivers that a stop is imminent.

"Our law enforcement officials and judicial system take violations of this law very seriously," said Tim Hazlette, who is Chairman of the Governor's Executive Committee on High-

way Safety and Commissioner of the Transportation Cabinet's Department of Transportation Safety. "By being observant, drivers not only help keep our schoolchildren safe, but they save themselves the cost and inconvenience of an expensive traffic citation."

Many mornings during the first few weeks of school are foggy, and the sun rises later each day as the days get shorter. These factors can combine to reduce visibility on the Commonwealth's school bus routes.

"The strongest piece of advice we can give drivers is to slow down and allow yourself more time to get to your destination if you are traveling while buses are running. This is especially important during the mornings when darkness and weather conditions can make buses and students less visible," added Deputy Secretary of Transportation Crystal Ducker.

Drivers who are familiar with school bus stops along their normal routes should not count on that familiarity, as the location of these stops may change from time to time. The Transportation Cabinet places some signs alerting drivers to the location of school bus stops along state-maintained highways, but not all stops are

marked.
Students who live in ur

Students who live in urban areas and walk or bike to school should use sidewalks, and cross streets only at designated crosswalks. Although pedestrians have the right of way at crosswalks, they should always look both ways before crossing a highway, even at crosswalks controlled by traffic lights.

The Transportation Cabinet administers a Federal Highway Administration grant program called "Safe Routes To School," which encourages children to walk or ride bicycles to school when possible; to make walking and bicycling to school safe and more appealing; and to facilitate the planning, development, and implementation of projects that will improve safety and reduce traffic, fuel consumption, and air pollution in the vicinity of schools. 
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
