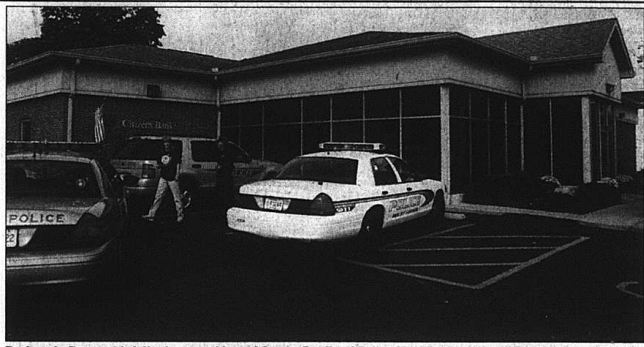

Charged with sexual abuse of 21-month-old daughter

Brodhead man will go on trial Tuesday

A Brodhead man, who has been in jail since his arrest on April 19th, is scheduled to go on trial on Tuesday for sexual abuse of his 21-month-old daughter.

Nicholas L. Williams, 21, of Castle Village Apartments has

been in jail under a \$200,000 cash bond since his arrest, along with his wife Virginia, 20, who was arrested the same time.

At the time of their arrest, the two were charged with Sodomy, first degree and Incest.

Last Friday, Rockcastle Circuit Jeffery T. Burdette overruled a motion for a continuance in the case and ruled that Nicholas Williams would go on trial Tuesday.

Judge Burdette did rule in favor of a motion to sever the

two cases and agreed to allow a private attorney, John Helmuht of Lexington, to represent Virginia Williams.

The judge also ruled that Virginia Williams should undergo a psychiatric evaluation before standing trial.

She will be taken to LaGrange for her evaluation at the Kentucky Correctional Psychiatric Center.

Burdette postponed a trial date for Williams until after her evaluation.

According to the arrest warrant served by Kentucky State Trooper Coby Smith, the Williamses admitted to the incident, after they were read their rights.

According to court records, police were brought into the case after a referral about the Williamses from social services.

The Williamses were indicted.

Livingston gets "good" bids for new water tank and lines

Livingston Mayor J.C. Griffin expressed satisfaction Wednesday with the bids received Monday for the city's new water tank and water lines.

"The bids came in lower than expected and now we'll have to wait and see, after the project, what the state wants us to do with the rest of the money," Griffin said.

The mayor was referring to the fact that the total of the two bids is \$565,970 and the city has \$1,000,000 for the project. However, Griffin said the city has to hold all the money until the projects are completed in case there are over runs.

Low bidder on construction

of 8,000 feet of new water lines in the city was Steton Construction out of Salt Lick, with a bid of \$287,970. Welding, Inc. of Charleston, West Virginia was the successful bidder on the new 128,000 gallon tank at \$278,000.

Construction is expected to begin very soon and, hopefully, completed within a few months.

The city commission held their regular monthly meeting last week and were told by Griffin that around 400 feet of sidewalk had been redone in various parts of the city at a cost of around \$5,300. \$5,000 of this amount will be reim-

bursed to the city by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

Griffin also reported that Hill Street and Mahaffey Hill were recently blacktopped at a cost of \$3,200, taken from the city's own funds. These streets are in addition to the streets that were recently repaved with a special appropriation from the state.

Livingston is also having to deal with the state over delinquent utility tax reports from the city. Livingston Clerk Tammi Martin told the commissioners that the reports, which should be filed monthly,

No one hurt as masked gunman takes cash

Josh Rickles arrested for Citizens Bank armed robbery

Freedom was short-lived for one bank robber Wednesday, after police arrested Josh Rickles, 27, of Tyree Street, Brodhead, just hours after he robbed Citizens Bank in Brodhead.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said Rickles confessed to the robbery.

Kentucky State Trooper Tommy Cromer, who was the first officer to arrive at the scene, said Rickles was masked and had a gun when he walked into the bank and then fled with about \$3,500 in cash.

Cromer said Rickles was

wearing a camouflage coat and pants and had a ski mask over his head.

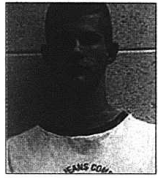
"He really frightened one teller, who dropped the money she was carrying all over the floor as she fled to the back of the bank, but no one was injured," Cromer added.

After taking the money, Rickles left the bank in a white Oldsmobile sedan, heading toward Mt. Vernon, the trooper said.

The car Rickles was driving had been sitting outside the bank for sometime before the robbery occurred, Cromer said.

Police found the car

Mt. Vernon man killed on Thursday while cutting tree

A 21-year-old Mt. Vernon man was killed last Thursday morning in an accident on Little Hurricane Branch Road, formerly Bradley Powell Road, at Conway.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said Michael Swinney died at the scene, when an Oak tree he was cutting, for a load of firewood, hit him in the head after it split out and fell.

Dowell said Swinney was cutting a tree but did not notch it on one side and, when he went to the other side to finish

cutting the tree the rest of the way, it split out above him and hit him, killing him instantly.

The coroner said Swinney was cutting firewood with Frankie Lamb of Calloway, on a farm owned by Lewis Coffey. Dowell said he thought the two men were cutting the wood to sell it.

Funeral services for Swinney were held Sunday at the Cox Funeral Home in Mt. Vernon. (See a complete obit on page A-3).

Somerset man indicted over wreck charges

A Somerset man was indicted last Friday on seven counts, four of which stem from an accident August 24th in Rockcastle County, which sent four people to the hospital.

William Adkins, 33, of Providence Road, Somerset, was indicted for assault, first degree, two counts of assault, second degree, wanton endangerment, first degree and operating a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol/drugs, first offense, all related to the three vehicle accident on the Hwy. 461 bypass near McDonald's.

According to police reports, Adkins crossed the center line and then the fast lane of the southbound lanes of the bypass, clipping a Dodge pickup driven by a Berea man and then going sideways into a van driven by a Somerset woman. Adkins, his son and stepson, had to be extricated from their vehicle after it came to rest next to the guard rail.

Adkins was also indicted for trafficking in marijuana, first offense, possession of drug paraphernalia, first offense. Almost two pounds of processed marijuana, a set of scales

and sandwich bags were found in Adkins' car at the scene of the accident.

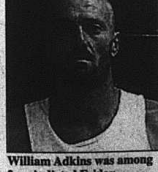
Adkins has been in jail since his arrest on August 28th, following his release from UK Medical Center. He is under a \$50,000 cash bond and will be arraigned November 12th.

Rockcastle Memories

Have you ever had that eerie feeling that someone was watching you? Last week while driving through southern Virginia on my way home from a week's vacation on Chincoteague Island, I felt certain that my dear mother was looking down from heaven on her youngest boy.

This was our second visit to the Island, and I am sure it will not be our last. We fell in love with the area where the legendary pony, Misty, was first discovered on the island in 1946. The next year, Marguerite Henry completed her famous book, *Misty of Chincoteague*, based on the life of the feral pony. The local residents say that the horses swam ashore approximately 300 years ago when a Spanish vessel ran aground off the coast. Due in part to publicity from Henry's book, most of Assateague Island has been protected from development by the National Park Service and became Assateague Island National Seashore in 1965.

In addition to the celebrated ponies, the island is home to about 300 species of shore birds. We witnessed a wide variety of egrets, herons, ibis, pelicans, sandpipers, and ducks. It is a photographer's

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paradise! I came away with (what I believe to be) a sample of award winning photographs. My wife has asked me to print a couple for framing. My best was an egret that is taking flight and a "strutting" Great Blue Heron.

Upon departing the island to return home, we finally chose to take the back roads across Virginia to extend our vacation as much as possible. As we were passing through the historic town of Appomattox, we saw a sign for a small, local restaurant called Granny Bee's. That is what everyone in Rockcastle County called my mother.

After parking our SUV, we strolled around the quiet little town square venturing into the local gift and craft shops. My wife could not resist a small, delicate afghan that she found, especially since Bee had made so many for us and others when she was still with us. The colors were perfect, and the just had to purchase that throw for our home on Furnace Mountain.

That was the first of several hints about Bee that we encountered on our return home that day. In the Bible, Malachi (3:10) makes reference to the windows of heaven. I just can't help but believe that the Lord occasionally allows His "flock" to see wonders occurring on earth for His gratification. As we approached the entrance into Granny Bee's Restaurant, I swear I could feel her watching.

Points East

Today is Saturday, October 13 and it's supposed to frost tonight.

I made the mistake of going to the garage to find my big tarp-like sheet of plant cover that I believe is called Remy or something like that. It's 15 feet wide and thirty feet long and made out of some fibrous material that looks a bit like insulation. Good stuff, whatever it's called.

However, the mistake I made was assuming that I needed to use it. After lugging it out there, I discovered that there's nothing left in the garden worth going to the trouble of covering up except for three little tomato plants and a couple or two peppers with bells about the size of golf balls.

Normally we cover a passel of tomatoes and peppers with the cloth and then keep an ear on the weather forecasts. The night before a hard freeze we usually pick everything left in the garden and pack it to the basement in 5 gallon buckets. Since at least the early eighties we have consistently had ripe tomatoes and peppers from our garden on the weather forecast and several times we've had tomatoes keep until Christmas.

That's not apt to happen this

year. I may try with some of the golf balls just to see if it can be done but they are going to have to survive tonight on their own. I won't be using the veggie cover again until spring.

Which brings us to The National Association of Woolly Worm Winter Weather Watchers better known as NAWWWWWW.

I've been looking for members of NAWWWWWW for weeks now and you probably already guessed it. They were, indeed, gathered up under the plant cover. Hundreds of them. Hiding from the heat like desert sheikhs.

The first question I had was why on earth is this hot in October and does that mean anything for the rest of the year?

NAWWWWW, in unison shook their fuzzy little heads and tried to crawl back under the big white tarp. At which point I struck a deal. Either talk to me or the tarp was going to the garden. Turns out that woolly worms will do about anything to get out of the heat.

So here's the forecast. The dry spell is just about over. The dust bowl is ready to disappear. By January you will have hauled through so much mud that you will remember the drought of 07 with fond regret.

Starting out before the end of October, according to NAWWWWWW, will commence getting some rain nearly every day. The woolies told me that I need not worry about frost tonight and that, in fact, I might yet have a late garden of greens.

No frost until after the first of November on Lowell Branch, they have promised. Look for the wettest winter we have had in at least a decade. But don't expect a lot of snow. Most of the precipitation will be rain but not the kind to go walking in.

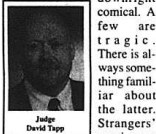
But do look for at least three big snows measuring more than a foot deep and three in the 6 to

When the Lifeline Fails

One of the most thankless tasks of modern society has to be that of the emergency dispatcher. In nearly every jurisdiction, hundreds, even thousands of telephone calls pour into 911 centers every day. Most calls are routine, some are

downdrifting with desperation and fear—emotions that we can all easily recognize and with which we can empathize. Despite the professionalism of nearly every emergency dispatcher, now and again, mistakes are made. We know that for every chilling second of a "real" emergency call, someone's life is slipping away or perhaps already lost. And every once in awhile, the 911 system "fails with disastrous and fatal consequences," according to Jeffrey Hickman, an author extolling the abolishment of governmental immunity as a defense for negligent handling of 911 calls.

It should not be surprising that calls to 911 do not always result in the proper response.

The first 911 call was made in 1968 in Haleyville, Alabama, but it wasn't until 1999 that Congress directed that "911" be the official emergency telephone number within the United States.

Nearly the entire United States is now served by some form of an emergency dispatch center. The proliferation of cell phones means that 911 centers no longer receive a single call for help as in years past. Offentimes these 911 centers receive dozens of calls involving the same incident. According to Kentucky's Com-

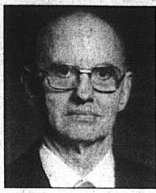

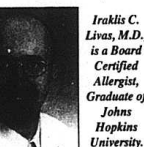

mercial Mobile Radio Service Band, wireless calls to 911 centers now far exceed those made from traditional telephone.

Deficient responses to 911 calls vary widely. A caller's request for an ambulance due to a severe headache was re-buffed—the 911 operator suggested instead that the victim take an aspirin—and the victim suffered a stroke and ultimately died. A gun-shot victim being held for 48 minutes in a recorded 911 call. Dispatchers ignore the address provided by the victim, choosing instead to send police to incorrect address gleaned from a faulty computer system. Just this week, it was disclosed that dispatchers for the California Highway Patrol ignored as many as five 911 calls that reported a forest fire on the rim of Lake Tahoe. That fire ultimately destroyed 254 homes and burned 3,100 acres

of mountainous terrain surrounding the lake.

Society has taught us to rely on 911 for nearly every critical situation. Hickman writes, "[V]irtually all emergency vehicles carry signs advertising the 911 service, telephone directories direct callers to 911 for emergency assistance, children are taught in school to call 911, and many communities have signs posted on streets that advise passers-by that they are entering a 911 community. Properly respond to calls for assistance. These victims argue that when the governmental entity breaches that duty, they should have to pay for that negligence.

Victims often assert that the statutory duty to operate a 911 center imposes a duty upon that governmental entity to properly respond to calls for assistance. These victims argue that when the governmental entity breaches that duty, they should have to pay for that negligence.

Courts generally focus on the nature of the "duty" imposed by statute. If the duty is owed only to the general public, courts generally hold that the emergency centers are immune from suit. However, if the court determines that the statutes authorizing the 911 center create a "special duty" between the victim caller and the dispatch center then the 911 center must perform in a non-negligent (i.e. "reasonable") manner.

We are fortunate in this area to be served by competent and well trained emergency professionals. Perhaps that is why in Kentucky, no published court decision expressly sets forth the duties of a 911 center. Legalities aside, we all want to know that our "lifeline" is always ready. Hopefully, our courts will never be called upon to decide such a heart-rending issue.

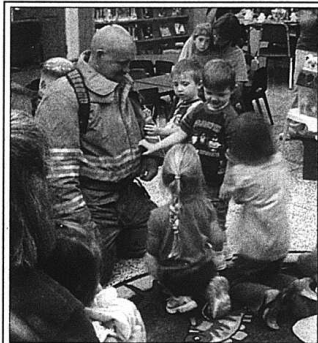

Crop Disaster Program (CDP)

Farmers, if you suffered crop losses because of natural disasters in recent years, you may be eligible to receive benefits through the new Crop Disaster Program.

Sign-up is underway for quantity losses at your local USDA Farm Service Agency Service Center. USDA will conduct sign-up for quality losses as soon as possible.

You may be eligible if you suffered losses from natural disasters that occurred in 2005, 2006 or to 2007 crops that were planted or prevented from being planted before February 28, 2007.

Producers must have suffered losses in excess of 35 percent, and they must have obtained crop insurance coverage or coverage under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program for the loss year.

Benefits are available for losses to multiple crops if the losses occurred in the same crop year.

Sign-up for New Livestock Program

Rockcastle Co. FSA is now accepting applications for a new disaster program offered to eligible livestock producers of Rockcastle County to receive benefits under the Livestock Compensation Program (LCP). This program compensates livestock producers for feed losses occurring during the 2005 calendar year due to a natural disaster.

To be eligible under LCP, livestock must be dairy cattle, beef cattle, buffalo, beef cattle, buffalo, equine, poultry, elk, reindeer, sheep, goats, swine or deer that have been physically located in an eligible county on the beginning date of the applicable disaster period; have been maintained for commercial use as part of a farming operation on the beginning date of the disaster period and not have been produced and maintained for reasons other than commercial use as part of a farming operation. Such

excluded uses include, but are not limited to wild free roaming animals or animals used for recreational purposes such as pleasure, hunting, pets, roping or for show.

To be eligible for LCP, producers must have either owned or cash-leased eligible livestock on the beginning date of the applicable disaster period and suffered an eligible feed loss from produced or purchased forage or feedstuffs, or incurred additional feed costs as a result of an eligible disaster event during the applicable disaster period and the feed lost or additional incurred feed costs were intended for use with eligible livestock.

Livestock producers applying for LCP must submit the following: a completed application in their administrative county FSA office

filed during the application period; adequate proof that the feed loss or incurred additional feed costs were for the claimed eligible livestock; the feed loss or incurred additional feed costs were of an eligible disaster event during the eligible disaster period in the calendar year for which benefits are being requested and other supporting documentation necessary to determine the applicant's eligibility. Applicants' eligibility is subject to producer's certifications including Highly Erodible and Wetland Certification, Payment Limitation and Adjusted Gross Income. National payment rates are provided per head by livestock category.

Harrison County finally gets win over the ROCK

It wasn't as easy for the Thoroughbreds of Harrison County as they had thought it

was going to be, but they finally beat the ROCK on Friday night at Cynthiana. Harrison County, which is

now one and three against Rockcastle, won 34-22, dropping the Rocket's record to four and four on the season.

The Rockets got the ball to start the game and were moving up the field when junior Casey Hayes fumbled the ball at midfield and a Harrison County player picked it up and ran it in for the score.

The Rockets found themselves down 7-0 within the first three minutes of the game but, it didn't take long for Hayes to redeem himself.

With a minute to go in the first period, Hayes scored for the Rockets, cutting the lead to 7-6.

But Harrison County struck right back, scoring on a 64 yard run on their next possession to move out to a 14-6 lead.

Senior Abe Kirby cut the Harrison County lead to six when he tackled a Thoroughbred in the end zone for a safety with six and half minutes to go in the first half making the score 14-8.

As the clock ran out in the first half, quarterback Dustin Bullock in the end zone on a 28 yard touchdown completion. Bullock made a great catch, in traffic, in the corner of the end zone, but the Rockets' try for the two point conversion failed and the score was tied at 14 at half time.

Harrison County drew first blood in the third period, scoring on a 47 yard pass play with 5:18 left in the third, but again the Rockets came back.

With less than a minute on the clock in the third period, Hayes scored his second touch-

down of the night on a seven yard run and he scored. The two point conversion, to give the Rockets their first lead of the game at 22-20.

But the Thoroughbreds took the ball from their 30 yard line and drove it down the field to score again with 5:21 to play in the game. The touchdown and the two point conversion gave the Thoroughbreds a 28-22 lead.

Another Harrison County score with 2:20 left in the game, sealed the victory for the Thoroughbreds who are now six and two on the season after the 34-22 win.

"If you take into consideration the size and athletic ability of the two teams on the field on Friday night, you would think we didn't have a chance, but that wasn't the case," said head coach Tom Larkey.

"I was impressed with our kids by the way they went out there and fought Harrison County to the end. We had a chance to win in the fourth period, but their speed took over the game and there isn't much you can do about a team who is faster than you are," he added.

"I was pleased with our passing game. Bishop had good protection in the pocket and he stayed in there and did a good job of finding his receivers," Larkey said.

Bishop completed 10 of 17 passes on Friday night, with only one interception, for 161 yards and a touchdown.

Three different receivers, Bullock, Kirby and Zach Burkhardt caught those ten passes.

Defensively, Larkey said he was pleased with his team's ability to contain Harrison County's speed as long as they did and he was especially pleased with the play of linebackers Hayes and Burkhardt.

The two combined for a total of 25 tackles and assists on Friday night.

All told, the Rocket defense gave up the most yards they have all season long, 401. Harrison County had 272 yards on the ground and 129 through the air.

Besides Burkhardt's 15 tackles and assists and Hayes ten, Kirby also had a good defensive game with five tackles, two for sacks. One of the sacks was the safety in the second period.

Senior Brian Mize had six tackles and assists, followed by: Shawn McHone, who had five, Scott Daugherty, two, Devon Mason, Cody Mize and Bullock, three each and Trendy Coffey, Jamie Todd and Cole Abney, one each.

Offensively, the Rockets gained almost 400 yards themselves, racking up a total of 377 yards, 216 on the ground and the 161 through the air.

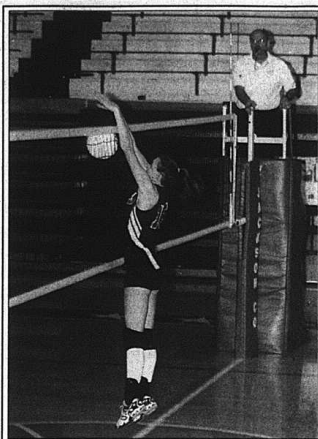
Hayes led his team in rushing again with 144 yards on 21 carries and the two touchdowns.

Cody Mize had 54 yards on 17 carries and, besides his 161 yards passing, Bishop had 13 yards on the ground on two carries. McHone and Todd each had one carry for short yardage.

Bullock caught four passes, including the touchdown pass, for a total of 52 yards. Burkhardt also caught four passes for 57 yards and Kirby caught two passes for 52 yards.

The Rockets get a much-needed break this week, but will return to action on October 26th when they travel to Mercer County.

Mercer County is the state's Class 2A defending champion, but they are four and four on the season. Last week they defeated Boyle County 34-17.

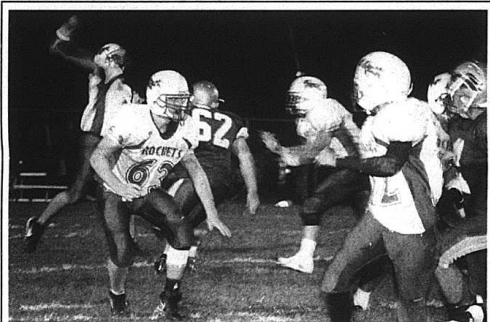
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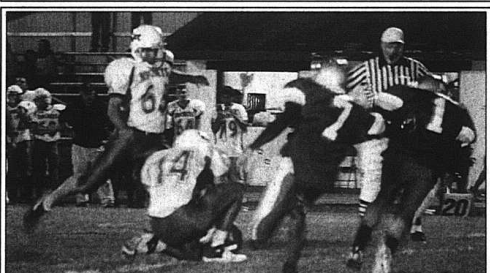
Senior Scott Daugherty is shown making one of his two tackles on the night against Harrison County.

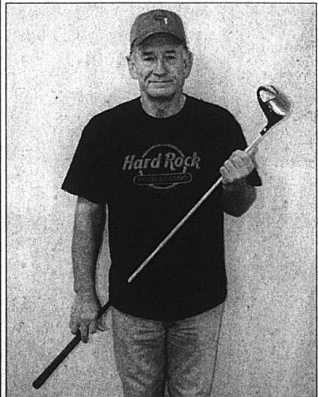

The RCHS cross-country teams had their best meet of the season this past Saturday at the 31st Annual Lexington Catholic Invitational held at the Kentucky Horse Park, the site of the Cross-Country State Championships in November. RCHS ran in the combined Class A/AA division, which featured many outstanding teams including most of the top-ranked teams in both classes.

In 'the AA girls' division, seven of the top ten teams in the state were present. Up until this meet, the 6th ranked RCHS girls had only been defeated by two Class AA teams the entire season. That occurred at the Capitol View Classic in Frankfort while RCHS was missing a key team member. When all was said and done, the Lexington Catholic Invitational served as an excellent measuring stick of Rockcastle's potential for a state title season.

Sophomore Laura Dollins and seventh grader Michaela Hunter started the race up front, maintaining their position in the top four for nearly a mile. Freshman Sara Hammond, sophomore Deana Gabbard, and freshman Jessica Albright also got off to a strong start, while senior Courtney Bullock, freshman Jasmin Johnson, sixth grader Kellan Coffey, and sophomore Molly Coffey remained close early on.

As the race approached the second mile, Rockcastle's hard work and perseverance throughout this season began to pay off. Michaela and Laura crossed the finish line with season's best performances. Michaela led RCHS with a spectacular 12th place finish overall in a season's best 20:22.48, while Laura finished very close behind with an awesome 15th place finish in a season's best effort of 20:27.82. Michaela was 2nd and Laura 3rd among Class AA performers.

Sara ran an incredible season's best race, nearly eclipsing her personal best mark. She finished 41st over-

all in an impressive 21:17.7, only two seconds away from her personal best, and was 14th among Class AA competitors.

Deana had the best competition of her career Saturday. She finished an amazing race in 62nd place overall with an exceptional effort of 21:53.85, 21st among Class AA competitors.

Jessica also came through with a career best performance. She covered the 3.1-mile race in an impressive 23:06.19 and finished 102nd overall, 43rd among Class AA competitors. Both Deana and Jessica knocked over twenty seconds off their previous personal bests.

Courtney and Jasmin had strong season best performances. Jasmin led Courtney for most of the race but was edged at the finish. Courtney finished 146th in an impressive season's best effort of 25:30.86, while Jasmin finished 147th in a terrific season's best time of 25:31.9. Courtney placed 62nd among Class AA runners, while Jasmin was 63rd.

Kellan had a superb race, finishing 156th overall in a personal best 26:05.91. She was 65th among all Class AA competitors.

Molly had a great performance, finishing 169th overall in 28:26, one of her best performances ever. She was 70th among all Class AA competition.

RCHS punctuated their great team performance with their 6th place finish overall in the meet out of 35 teams. More impressively, they defeated every Class 2A team with their closest competitor being North Oldham who Rockcastle defeated by 15 points. RCHS also defeated Highland, who had been ranked ahead of them the entire season, by 100 points. The girls' team average time of

21:25.61 was their best this season.

Class AA's top-ranked Muhlenberg South and 2nd ranked Bell County were not present at the meet, but will be among the favorites for the state title in November. RCHS did defeat Bell County at Somerset earlier this season, but has not encountered Muhlenberg South yet.

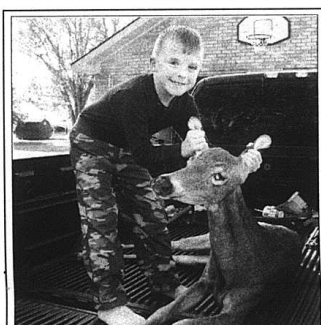
Freshman Justin Poynter continued his brilliance for the RCHS boys' team. Fresh off of his runner-up Bittersweet 5K

EQIP applications being accepted until Oct. 31st

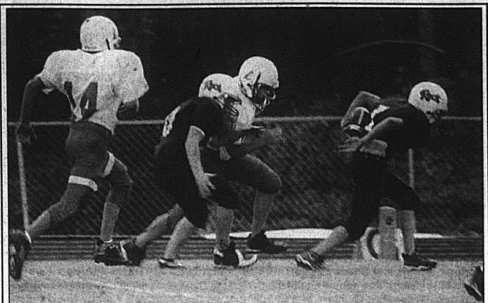

The deadline for the first ranking period is October 31, 2007, however one can apply at anytime for the EQIP program with applications held until the next period.

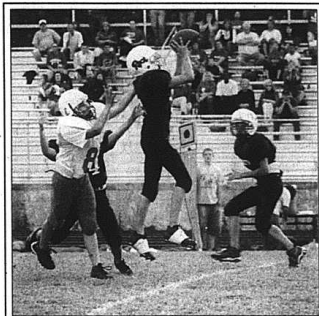

For applications selected for funding, an EQIP plan of operations will be developed with the landuser to identify appropriate conservation practices. 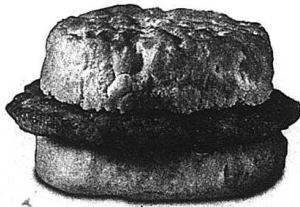

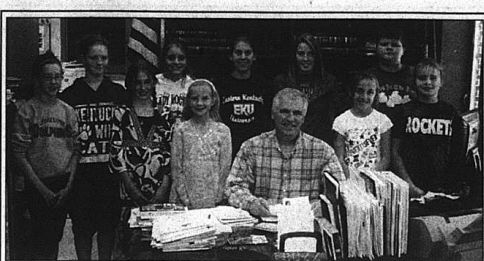

For a coffee shop

“Pappy and Mammys Place” has a lot of Rockcastle history

If you stop by Pappy and Mammys Place for a cup of freshly brewed coffee, some hot chocolate or delicious hot tea, you may also get a

heaping helping of history. Jones Conn Hiatt and his wife, Ramona, are nearing the end of a almost five-year remodeling and reconstruction project on Jones Conn's

grandfather and grandmother, Jones A. and Maggie Hiatt's, house in Renfro Valley.

During that five years, they have found numerous historical items in the house, gathered information about many items they already knew were there and, also, on the property. The house is now listed on the National Historic Register.

“We had a lot of experts look at the house and the general consensus was to tear it down,” said Jones Hiatt.

“But Ramona and I decided differently,” he said. “We’re still not completely finished, but we are getting there,” he added.

Built in 1819, the house is one of the oldest, if not the oldest, house in Rockcastle County.

Abner Hiatt, who came to Rockcastle County to work in Saltpeter Cave making gunpowder before 1800, married Lucy Peasley in 1790 and obtained about 200 acres of land in the Renfro Valley area.

The farm covered much of what is now Lake Linville and was split up by Interstate 75.

Jones Conn and Ramona live in a house on the original farm, as does Jones' sister, Nancy Bradley and her husband, Coy. The Hiatts and Bradleys are the eighth generation of Hiatts to live on the farm.

The Pappy and Mammys house was built by Abner Hiatt for his son, Bennett Hiatt.

Only Hiatts have lived in the house since it was built nearly 200 years ago, but it was empty for about 40 years after the death of Jones A. Hiatt, Jones Conn's grandfather.

“When people come to the house they always share memories of their grandparents and growing up on a farm,” said Ramona.

“The home-like surroundings keep people smiling and hanging around for hours - you hear a lot of funny stories,” she added.

If you go to the house, you'll find a lot of interest-

ing items, including a 1953 International Harvester tractor, which Pappy Hiatt owned and used on the farm, but never drove.

“He did a lot of farming, but his workers drove the tractor,” Jones said.

There is a coal shed with coal in it from 60 years ago, bricks from the old Rockcastle County Courthouse, which was torn down in 1964, a wooden washing machine that still holds water, handmade quilts, cancelled checks and written receipts dating back to 1897.

There are old wooden boxes that were used for shipping and an old rocking chair and many old books and history articles.

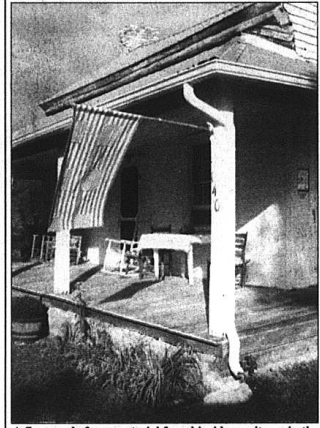
It was a monumental task to restore the kitchen where you'll now find freshly-baked items to go along with the fresh coffee, tea, hot chocolate and soft drinks.

The Hiatts had to shovel over 250 wheelbarrows of dirt from the floor before they could even start restoring the kitchen, which also has an old chest of drawers from the old Rockcastle Hotel in Mt. Vernon.

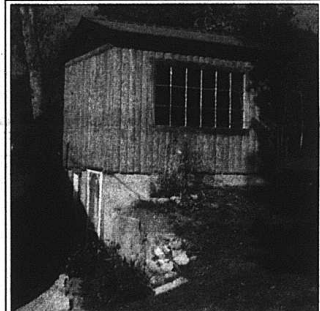

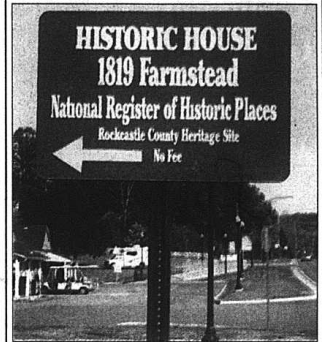

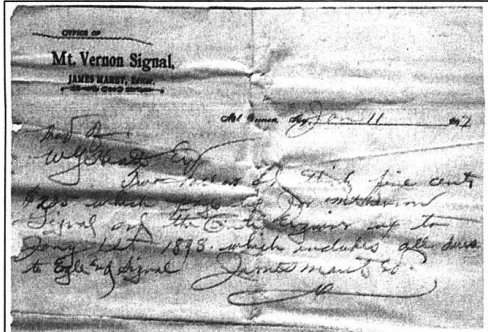

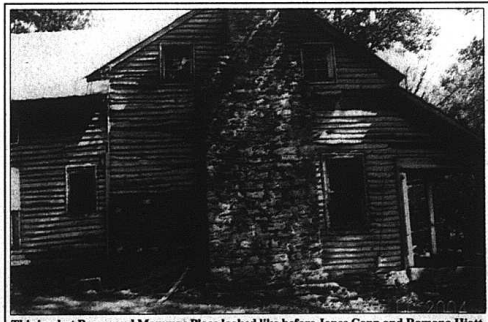
A sign directing motorists to the Historic Pappy and Mammys Place, sits at the entrance to Water Plant Road in Renfro Valley.



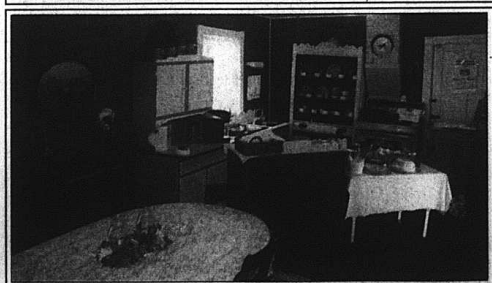

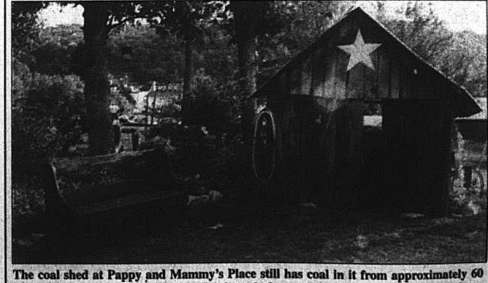
Jones Conn Hiatt sits on the front porch of “Pappy and Mammy's Place” on a sunny Tuesday morning last week. The house was originally built around 1819.

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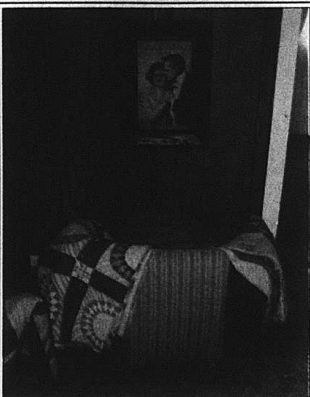

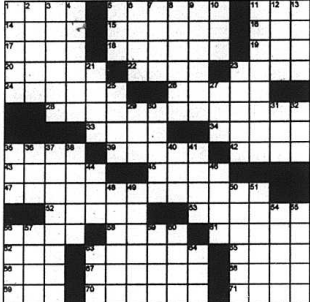
