I made the mistake of going to the garage to find my big tarp-like sheet of plant cover that I believe is called Remay or something like that.

It's 15 feet wide and thirty feet long and made out of some fibrous material that looks a bil like insulation. Good stuff

fibrous material that looks a bit like insulation. Good stuff, whatever it's called. However, the mistake I made was assuming that I needed to use it. After lugging it out there, I discovered that there's nothing left in the garden worth going to the trouble of covering up except for three little tomato plants and a couple or three peopers with bells abut little tomato plants and a couple or three peppers with bells abut the size of golf balls.

Normally we cover a passel of tomatoes and peppers with the cloth and then keep an ear on the weather forecasts. The on the weather forecasts. The night before a hard freeze we usually pick everything left in the garden and pack it to the basement in 5 gallon buckets. Since at least the early eighties we have consistently had ripe tomatoes and peppers from our garden on Thanksgiving Day and several times we've had tomatoes keep until Christmas. Starting out before the end of October, according to NAWWWW, we will commence getting some rain nearly every day. The woolies told me that I need not worry about frost tonight and that, in fact, I might

tonight and that, in fact, I might yet have a late garden of greens. No frost until after the first of November on Lowell Branch, they have promised. One of the most thankless tasks of modern society has to be that of the emergency dispatcher. In nearly every jurisdiction, hundreds, even thousands of telephone calls pour into 911 centers every day. Most calls are routine, some are downright comical. A few are tragic.

few are tragic. There is always some-thing famil-In thing familiar about the latter. Strangers' voice's made familiar by desperation and fear—emotions that we can all easily recognize and with which we can empathize.

Despite the professionalism of nearly every empragency dis-

of nearly every emergency dis-patcher, now and again, mis-takes are made. We know that takes are made. We know that for every chilling second of a "real" emergency call, someone's life is slipping away or perhaps already lost. And every once in awhile, the 911 system "fails with disastrous and fails consequences," acsystem "fails with disastrous and fatal consequences," ac-cording to Jeffrey Hickman, an author extolling the abolishment of governmental immu-nity as a defense for negligent

It should not be surprising that calls to 911 do not always result in the proper response.



A caller's re-quest for an ambulance due to a severe headache was re-buffed-the 911 operator sug-gested instead that the victim take an aspirin—and the victim sake an aspirin—and the victim suffered a stroke and ultimately died. Dispatchers ignore the address provided by the victim, choosing instead to send police to incorrect address gleaned from a faulty computer system. Hickman writes, 7[v]irtually all emergency ve-hicles carry signs advertising the 911 service, telephone di-rectories direct callers to 911 for emergency assistance, chil-dren are taught in school to call 911, and many communities have signs posted on streets have signs posted on streets that advise passers-by that they are entering a 911 community." Yet courts routinely reject this reliance as a basis to impose li-ability when 911 does not de-

ability when 911 does not de-liver upon the promise to help. Victims often assert that the statutory duty to operate a 911 center imposes a duty upon that governmental entity to prop-erly respond to calls for assis-tance. These victims argue that when the governmental entity breaches that duty, they should have to pay for that negligence.

Courts generally focus on the nature of the "duty" im-posed by statute. If the duty is owed only to the general pub-lic, courts generally hold that the emergency centers are im-mune from suit. However, if the court determines that the statutes authorizing the 911 center create a "special dut between the victim caller a the dispatch center then the 9 center must perform in a no negligent (i.e. "reasonable al duty

we are fortunate in this area We are fortunate in this area to be served by competent and well trained emergency professionals. Perhaps that is why in Kentucky, no published court decision expressly sets forth the duties of a 911 center. Lethe duties of a 911 center. Le-galities aside, we all want to know that our "lifeline" is al-ways ready. Hopefully, our courts will never be called upon to decide such a heart-rending issue.

This program compensates live-stock producers for feed losses occurring during the 2005 calendar vaer due to a 2005 calendar year due to a natural disaster

To be eligible under LCP, livestock must be dairy cattle, beef cattle, buffalo, beefalo, equine, poultry, elk, reindeer, sheep, goats, swine or deer that have been physically located in an eligible county on the beginning date of the applicable disaster period; have been maintained for commercial use as nat of a farming call use as nat of a farming call use as not only the call of the ca cial use as part of a farming operation on the beginning date of the disaster period and not have been produced and maintained for reasons other than commercial use as part of a farming operation. Such

excluded uses include, but are not limited to wild free roam-ing animals or animals used for recreational purposes such as pleasure, hunting, pets, roping or for show. To be eligible for LCP, producers must have either

producers must have either producers must have either owned or cash-leased eligible livestock on the beginning date of the applicable disas-ter period and suffered an eli-gible feed loss from produced or purchased forage or feedstuffs, or incurred addi-tional feed octures a result of tional feed costs as a result of an eligible disaster event dur-ing the applicable disaster period and the feed lost or ad-ditional incurred feed costs were intended for use with

were intended for use with eligible livestock. Livestock producers ap-plying for LCP must submit the following: a completed application in their adminis-trative county FSA office





"Pappy and Mammys Place" has a lot of Rockcastle history

If you stop by Pappy and Mammys Place for a cup of freshly brewed coffee, some hot chocolate or delicious hot tea, you may also get a

heaping helping of history.

Jones Conn Hiatt and his wife, Ramona, are nearing the end of a almost five-year remodeling and reconstruction project on Jones Conn's

grandfather and grand-mother, Jones A. and Maggie Hiatt's, house in Renfro Valley.

During that five years, they have found numerous historical items in the house, gathered information about many items they already knew were there and, also, on the property. The house is now listed on the National

Historic Register.

"We had a lot of experts look at the house and the general consensus was to tear it down," said Jones

Hiatt.

"But Ramona and I decided differently," he said.

"We're still not completely finished, but we are getting there," he added.

Built in 1819, the house

is one of the oldest, if not the oldest, house in Rockcastle County.

Abner Hiatt, who came to

Rockcastle County to work in Saltpeter Cave making gunpowder before 1800, married Lucy Peasley in 1790 and obtained about 200 acres of land in the Renfro Valley area.
The farm covered much

The farm covered much of what is now Lake Linville and was split up by Interstate 75.

Jones Conn and Ramona live in a house on the original farm, as does Jones' sister, Nancy Bradley and her husband, Coy. The Hiatts and Bradleys are the eighth generation of Hiatts to live on the farm. on the farm.

The Pappy and Mammys house was built by Abner Hiatt for his son, Bennett

Only Hiatts have lived in the house since it was built nearly 200 years ago, but it was empty for about 40 years after the death of Jones years after the deam of Jones A. Hiatt, Jones Conn's grandfather.

"When people come to the house they always share memories of their grandparents and growing up on a farm," said Ramona. "The home-like sur-roundings keep people smil-ing and hanging around for

hours - you hear a lot of funny stories," she added. If you go to the house, you'll find a lot of interest-

ing items, including a 1953 International Harvester trac-tor, which Pappy Hiatt owned and used on the farm,


