No arrests made

Days Inn robbed at gunpoint again last Wednesday

Late last Wednesday night a masked man robbed the Days Inn at Exit 62 in Renfro Valley/Mt. Vernon around 10 p.m.

According to Mt. Vernon Assistant Chief of Police Eddie Delaney, the man entered the motel office, showed the desk clerk a small hand gun and demanded all of the money.

Delaney said the desk clerk said he was told if he did what he was told the robber would not hurt him. The clerk was then made to lie down on the floor and the man took the money from the drawer.

The assistant chief said the robber then kicked the desk clerk and fled from the motel office. The clerk told police that the robber got in a small dark colored four door car when he left the parking lot.

Delaney said the lone gunman was wearing a hooded shirt with a mask pulled over his face, blue jeans and tennis shoes. He was also carrying a back pack.

The desk clerk suffered no major injuries and no medical treatment was needed.

Mt. Vernon Police Chief Terry Jackson said Wednesday that there were no suspects in the case, but the investigation was continuing.

Last Wednesday's robbery at the Days Inn was the second one at that interstate business in two months.

On September 28th, a man, who said he had a gun, robbed the clerk and then fled on foot.

In that robbery the robber ran towards Arby's Restaurant and police did not get a description of any vehicle used in the get away.

That robber was described as a white male, 6' in height. An arrests has not been made Fire Department at 453-3877

in that case either.

In both robberies an undisclosed amount of cash was taken. Police aren't saying whether they think the two robberies are connected.

Parent says new program at Brodhead School is causing a hardship

A program, newly instituted this year which determines which families get help providing Christmas toys for their children, at Brodhead Elementary School, has caused hardship in one family, according to a mother of children at the school who wishes to remain anonymous.

"We have had a bad year financially. My husband was unable to work for some time because of being laid-off, and I had two surgeries, and we are heavily financially obligated. My husband is now back at work but we are able to keep up with just the bare necessities and this does not include anything for our children at Christmas," the mother said. "We have four children and it is not feasible for me to work and pay day care," she added.

The new program strives to make parents, who receive help with Christmas for their children, more accountable, according to a letter sent out by the Family Resource Center at the school.

The letter states that parents must now earn points by attending PTA meetings, parenting classes, parent conferences, etc. in order to participate in a Christmas program that helps provide for their children.

However, the mother said that there was usually a crisis of some sort, with four small children at home, that prevented her from taking them to the PTA meetings plus her husband works in Frankfort and takes night classes in order to advance in his field.

"For example, there is a PTA meeting tonight (Tuesday night) and two of my children are sick and my husband has night class and I certainly can't drag two sick children to a PTA

meeting," the mother said. "It seems to me that I should

Rockcastle | Memories

Last Saturday night after a very exhausting day, my wife and I finally returned home and had just retired for the evening when Kentucky Educational Television began to air a special called, A Black and White Night. It is a performance of Roy Orbison's early hits. The black and white program was taped approximately one year before his death in 1988.

Orbison was joined on stage for the PBS broadcast with some of his famous friends: Bruce Springsteen, Elvis Costello, Bonnie Raitt, K. D. Lang, Jennifer Warnes, Jackson Browne, Tom Waits, and T. Bone Burnett. It is a performance that I have seen before. but it never fails to knock my socks off.

The press called the program a "late-in-life comeback". Whatever it was called, it captured the music-loving public. The song, "Oh Pretty Woman," performed by Orbison and Springsteen, won the 1991 Grammy Award for Best Male Pop Vocal Performance. The show has proved to be the single most successful fundraiser in PBS history.

As a dedicated fan of Roy's from the time I was a very young man, I purchased all of his early 45's and his first album for Monument Records, which was released in 1961. The album was titled Lonely and Blue. It includes the song "Only the Lonely," which is one of my all-time favorite Orbison tunes.

At that time I was dating a girl named Sandy, who spent her summers in Mt. Vernon even though she actually lived in Florida. When she announced to me that she had to go home, I purchased a copy of the album for her goingaway present.

That same album has re-

cently been re-released by Orbison's wife, Barbara, who made sure the CD received the re-mastering treatment it deserved. It demonstrates his fine-as-silk voice accompanied with the Anita Kerr Singers, Floyd Cramer on piano, and Boots Randolph on saxophone. Orbison wrote or co-wrote seven of the 12 original tracks. One of his songs, "Blue Avenue" is difficult to obtain, except on this CD.

Elvis Presley once called Roy, "The world's greatest singer." Most of the teenagers of the early '60's agreed with Elvis. He has also been called "One of the most distinctive vocalists in the history of rock and roll."

It is hard to believe that it has been 46 years since I purchased his first album. "Only The Lonely" jumped out of AM radios and record players all over the world to the excitement of American teenagers. As you listen to the newly released album, the songs become fresh all over again. Rov's voice never sounded better. Legacy Records has done a beautiful job of keeping the integrity of the original recording as well as the liner notes of the 1961 album.

Shortly after recording the Black and White Nights soundtrack, Roy was working with Jeff Lynne of Electric Light Orchestra for a new album. He joined Bob Dylan, George Harrison, Jeff Lynne, and Tom Petty to form a new group called The Traveling Wilburys, which was extremely successful. He also recorded a new solo album called, Mystery Girl.

On December 6, 1988, at the age of 52, Orbison suffered a fatal heart attack while visit-

Constitutional Philosophy Likely to Determine Gun Owner's Rights

In what many observers believe to be the most momentous court case for generations, the U.S. Supreme Court is poised to finally determine the parameters of the Second Amend-



tices' approach to interpreting the Constitution than the actual facts which gave rise to the litiga-

At issue is the District's strict gun control laws. Several plaintiffs, including Dick Heller, a special police officer charged with protecting the Federal Judicial Center, filed suit seeking to prohibit the District from enforcing laws which preclude an individual citizen from possessing a pistol within his own home and which required that registered long guns be kept disassembled and unloaded in the home.

Thus far, Heller's lawsuit has been hugely successful. Although he and the other plaintiffs lost at the trial court level, a federal Court of Appeals determined earlier this year that the Second Amendment conferred an individual right to keep and bear arms.

Consequently, the District's

laws were unconstitutional. Since then, the justices of the Supreme Court have accepted the case, thus setting the stage for the ultimate gun control showdown. The Second Amendment provides that "[a] well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed." If the

INCLEMENT WEATHER SCHOOL CLOSINGS **EARLY DISMISSAL**

Every effort will be made to keep parents and concerned citizens informed as to school closings, early dismissals and possibly a delay plan.

The number one concern is the safety of students. After an extensive evaluation of road conditions in the county, taking into consideration all roads, a decision will be made in regard to closing school.

School closings will be announced on radio stations and four television stations. They are as follows: Radio - WRVK (AM 1460), WVLK (FM 93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WRSL (FM 96.3), WLKT (FM 104.5) WKQQ (FM 100.1) WKDP (99.5). Television - WKYT (Channel 27), WLEX (Channel 18), WTVQ (Channel 36) and WDKY (Channel 56). If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a decision by 6:00 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m.



Early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on WRVK. Roads will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. If the need for early dismissal does occur, parents should make arrangements

to meet children as they arrive safely.

Parents and students should not call any radio or television stations to inquire about school closings. This could delay the information distribution to the necessary channel by tying up the phone lines.

There may be a time when a few isolated bus routes may not be made or may be delayed for an hour while the rest of the bus routes will be made on the regular schedule. These bus routes will be announced only on WRVK radio station.


Floyd Clay Baker, 76, of Mt. Vernon, died Saturday, December 1, 2007 at his home.







high court agrees that this language confers an individual right, than many, if not most, of the nations' gun control laws may be struck down.

However, should the Court determine that the Second Amendment confers a "collective right", than firearms restrictions are likely to withstand future constitutional challenges. The stakes are enormous. World Series of Poker final table enormous. Super Bowl enormous. In fact, some characterize the importance of this case for some Americans with Roe v. Wade and Brown v. Board. of Edu-

Undoubtedly, the individual justice's approach to this issue will be guided by their own perception of whether the Constitution is a "living document" or should be applied as the framers originally intended. The distinction in these two approaches could potentially make all the difference in how the 27 words which make up the "right to bear arms" clause will be applied for many years to come.

"Originalists" or 'textualists" believe the Constitution's meaning was fixed by the drafters' intent, and that judges should not be free to interpret the Constitution in a manner at odds with the original meaning. An

originalist approach is more restrictive, requiring the federal government to operate within the written strictures of the Constitution. When society determines that a policy change is needed which is not contained within the Constitution, an amendment is required.

The "living document" approach, however, permits the Constitution to be utilized in a flexible manner, adaptable to meet the ever changing needs of society. This approach permits the integration of social policy into federal judicial decision making.

Most contemporary constitutional scholars agree that Justices Clarence Thomas and Scalia Antonin "originalists" and thus more likely to declare that the Second Amendment confers an individual right to bear arms. Justices David Souter, Ruth Bader Ginsburg, John Paul Stevens and Stephen Breyer are perceived as more likely to view the Second Amendment as conferring a collective right, one that is subject to reasonable regulation by the federal and state governments. It's too early to tell about Chief Justice John Roberts and Justice Samuel Alito. Justice Kennedy remains an unknown.

No one can predict the outcome of Parker. Only three

prior U.S. Supreme Court cases in 1876, 1886 and 1939 have focused on the Second Amendment. The current Court, should it elect to not sidestep this polarizing social issue, may well decide not only the rights of millions of gun owners but also the manner in which future courts interpret the sometimes sparse language of our Constitution.

ing his mother in Nashville, Tennessee. At the time of his death, he was the first person since Elvis to have two albums (Mystery Girl and Traveling Wilburys) in the top 5 of the rock and roll charts

rock and roll charts. When the word of Orbison's death was reported by the media, my son Todd (who later died in an auto accident in 1992) immediately called me and said, "Dad, did you hear that Roy Orbison died today?" He had called merely to say he was sorry since he knew how much I loved Roy and his music. It is one of the sweet and tender memories I have of Todd. I will never forget receiving that call on December 6, 1988.

In 2004, Rolling Stone

named three of Orbison's songs ("Only the Lonely" – "Oh Pretty Woman" – "In Dreams") on its list of the "500 Greatest Songs of all Time". That same year, Rolling Stone ranked Orbison #37 on their list of the "100 Greatest Artists of all Time".

The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame explained Orbison's voice in this way, "The melancholic intensity in his voice resonated with listeners of all ages, but especially heartsick teenagers who know how unrequited love and loneliness felt." Roy was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in

It was a real treat to finally locate a copy (re-mastered CD) of Roy's Lonely and Blue album. As soon as I discovered the disk, I purchased a copy for my collection. I have always considered Roy to be one of the few breathtaking vocalists of the Rock and Roll era. I sure hope that Barbara releases more of Roy's original albums because she can count on me to purchase each one!



I remember the first Thanksgiving and Christmas after the death of my father: it was very hard. We decided to depart from our usual routine and eat Thanksgiving dinner in a restaurant. Somehow this seemed easier than sitting around the table at my mother's house without Dad. I am not sure our effort was successful. At Christmas that year we met the grief head on and watched movies from the previous Christmas which included pictures of my father. That was also very hard. Thus, we tried both avoiding and confronting the grief. It was still a very lonely time with an obvious missing link in the family

Others who will be sad during the holidays are those who are depressed. Depression is a very real illness that afflicts possibly one in ten Americans. These folks feel blue and lonely. They have little energy and abnormal patterns of sleep and appetite. They may want to withdraw from people and may even

Depression is difficult to cope with any time, but it is especially so during the holidays when joy and excitement are the expectation. A depressed person may feel even more depressed as he watches others laughing and having a great time. The contrast makes his feelings of depression painfully

Families in crisis will not share in all the joy of the season. Marriage problems, abuse and addiction drain the happiness from families. Children in crisis and aging parents whose health is declining can drag down even the hardiest of souls. Physical illness also takes its toll on those who would celebrate the season.

My wish for all those who feel pain at this time of year is: Peace. The Hebrew word is "shalom." Nothing will totally remove the grief, the hurt or the loss. Peace is that which we find deep inside of ourselves that lets us know that we will survive. That can be enough.



weeks ago right beside the road.

I have named him White Lightning because he has an unusually distinctive, large white tip on the end of his tail. Actually the last quarter of his tail is snow white and he is so fast that my attempts to photograph him have resulted in blurs. He will stand, statue-still, no more than 20 feet away until I get my truck stopped but as soon as I reach for the camera he is gone like lightning. The name fits.

And Lightning gets around. I've seen him three or four times within a hundred feet of my house as well as, on several occasions, more than 6 miles away on both White Lick Road and over on 21. Lowell Branch (where I live) and White Lick are tributaries of Paint Lick Creek and Lightening is never more than a few yards from one of the stream beds and by the time I have a camera in my hand, he's already in a creek.

We've had a lot of rain lately which makes it easy to find fresh tracks and there are

several places to get off the road and look for them. I know fox tracks when I see them and I promise you faithfully that Lightening always uses the right bank in whichever direction he's headed as he makes his rounds. I'm not sure what this means or whether it's even important, but I find it interesting and figure it has to be a sign of something.

I also know that since Lightning has come into the neighborhood, there has been a very noticeable decrease in visible road kill on 21. If you see a dead rabbit or squirrel on your way to Berea it will, most often, be gone when you return. Up until just recently, drivers usually had to slow down a couple of times on 21 to keep from killing buzzards feeding in the middle of the road. I haven't seen one in weeks.

In the meantime, keep your eye peeled on this space in your newspaper. If it ever stops raining, Loretta is going to do the driving on week-end mornings and late afternoons while I lean out the window with my camera's shutter ready to trip.

My goal is to get a decent shot of White Lightning instead of just a blur and I intend to run the photo in this column.

Do stay tuned.



Freedom Baptist Church is the fourth oldest established church in the Rockcastle Baptist Association and is affiliated with the Kentucky Baptist Con-

On September 25, 1847, Colbert Hayes deeded land located in the Freedom community to the Baptist people for the sum of \$1.00 for the purpose of establishing a church.

In 1849, a church was organized and is now known as the Freedom Baptist Church. Later,

more land was given to the church by Mr. and Mrs. Slacker and in 1891 a new building was constructed.

At the time the building was constructed, people met once or twice a month for worship. In the late 1940s, the congregation began to meet weekly and organized an evening worship ser-

In 1946, Baptist Training Union at the church was organized and is still a part of the ministry, but is now known as

In 1960, the organ was donated by Lawrence Bradford in memory of his wife, who was a member of Freedom and the same year the church furniture was purchased.

In 1967, the church building was bricked, the parking lot was blacktopped and a piano was purchased. In 1969, carpet was installed in the sanctuary and the steeple was purchased. In 1971, the parsonage was bricked and a garage built on. In 1982, a pastor's study,

baptistry, kitchen and restrooms were added to the present building. In 1986, the church purchased at auction, three acres between the church and the parsonage for church activities.

In 1991, a two-car garage was built at the parsonage. In 1997, new Baptist Hymnals were purchased by family and friends in memory of Bro. James Payne, who had been a Deacon for over 55 years.

In 1999, the congregation

celebrated their 150th anniversary as a church. Several former pastors, former members and friends were at the church to help celebrate the great achieve-

In 2000, the parsonage was remodeled and in 2006, a shelter was constructed for different activities of the church.

The current Pastor, Albert McKinney, and his wife Glenda, have been at Freedom since March of 2003.

The church has a present membership of 266 and the primary goal is the spreading of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the community, as well as the rest of the world.

Seven men have surrended to the ministry from the church body at Freedom.

Freedom Baptist was recognized in 2005 and 2006 by the International Mission Board for being the top giver and top per capita giver to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering in the Rockcastle Association.

Freedom supports and gives to the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for North American Missions; Eliza Broadus for State Missions and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for International Missions; Oneida Baptist Institute; Sunrise Children's Services; Tony Horn Ministry in the Phillipines; Laurel Lake Baptist Camp; Operation Christmas Child and Book-Link.



have been contacted and asked about the circumstances of why I needed this help. Sure, we live in a nice house but it's because it's a family property, we don't even own it, we just have to make the monthly mortgage payment. With my husband being off from work for several months, and paying for basic necessities plus \$500 a month for gas because he works in Frankfort, we were not able to provide for our children this Christmas. But, mainly, I won-

der, under this new system, how many children are going to be left out this year. I am afraid there are going to be some children go without," the mother said.

Fortunately, the family is being helped by another agency in the county, she said.

Satica Morgan, coordinator of the Brodhead Family Resource Center, said Tuesday that the program had been approved by the center's advisory council and was in place in several centers across the state. "It's just a question of holding people accountable and those who take responsibility will be the ones who reap the rewards," Morgan said.

"We (the resource center's advisory council) have been working on this program since last Christmas. I believe it is a good thing because I believe in holding people more accountable. It is certainly not difficult to earn points," Morgan added.

Morgan also added that parent participation at PTA meetings, parent conferences and parenting classes had increased under the new program.







Mr. Dogwood goes to Washington

Chapter 9

Hi, fellow Americans. It is a gorgeous day and I have never been more proud to be an American. You see, mom, dad, Chloe and I are standing in Arlington National Cemetery. As with the other places in Washington, D.C., Arlington National Cemetery has a Visitor's Center that offered maps and guidebooks. Chloe and I knew from previous places that the brochures helped us learn lots of information. We sat on a bench outside the cemetery reading the facts about this historical burial place. Mom and Dad explained that we needed to remain quiet and respectful while on the grounds of the cemetery. We needed to read the information and ask our questions before we entered.

Arlington is located in Arlington, Virginia -just outside of D.C. - across from the Potomac River. More than 600 acres, it's the burial place of more than 300,000 servicemen and women from all of our nation's wars, as well as other famous Americans such as President Taft and President Kennedy. "What's a serviceman?" I asked. Dad explained that a serviceman or woman

was anybody who was in the military or armed forces. "It would be someone in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard. They protect our country. Remember when the Colonists had to fight to gain freedom from Britain? Well, the colonists realized they needed a military to protect them. That is when the first military was started." Dad went on to tell us that today there are about 500,000 servicemen and women stationed all around the world protecting our freedom.

"Puppies," Mom said. "Do you realize that every single person buried in this cemetery paid the price for our freedom? They actually gave their lives and died so that we could live in the greatest country on earth." For once, I was at a loss for words. I couldn't imagine that somebody loved me enough to fight for my rights and freedoms. Sure, my parents and siblings loved me, but they knew me! These soldiers didn't even know my name, yet they cared enough about our country and me to dedicate their lives to America. "One more thing before we enter the cemetery," Dad said. "Pay special attention to the Tomb of the Unknowns." I opened my

mouth to ask, but was glad when Chloe beat me to the question. "I don't understand, daddy. What is the Tomb of the Unknowns?" she asked. Dad explained that it is a monument in the cemetery dedicated to the American soldiers who died without their remains being identified. That is when I saw Chloe's first tear.

We quietly entered Arlington to pay our respects. We walked along, not saying a word to each other, though I was sure we were all thinking the very same thing – that living in America was a privilege. As we approached the Tomb of the Unknowns I saw guards protecting the tomb. Dad had explained earlier that the tomb is guarded 24 hours, seven days a week, no matter the weather. As we approached, we saw the words inscribed on the tombstone - "Here Rests In Honored Glory An American Soldier Known But To God"

As we left the cemetery, I felt an American pride I had never felt before. Once we were outside the cemetery, Chloe and I promised each other that the next time we saw a military person, we were going to stop and say thanks. "See Woody," Dad said, "Already you are thinking like a true patriot!" I smiled!

Leaving the cemetery, I felt the need to go home. Maybe it was the somberness in my heart from Arlington. I couldn't put my paw on it. I didn't feel tired, even after all we had seen. Fact is, I didn't even know how long we had been gone, but I asked Dad when we would be returning to Kentucky. Sinus Infections

When colds and other viruses are going around, the sinuses can get into a lot of trouble. The sinuses normally secrete mucus to help moisten the air you breathe and to trap pollution and particles of dirt. When viruses, allergies, or weather changes cause congestion, the sinuses cannot work properly.

The sinus openings become blocked and pressure builds up. The normal secretions accumulate and the bacteria can multiply since the body cannot easily remove them from the plugged nose and sinuses. Then the mucus becomes thicker, and the color turns to yellow or gray--an infection has started.

The infections may cause pain in the cheeks and along the sides of the nose. There is often a fever and pain in the teeth, especially the upper molars.

What can you do to prevent or treat sinus infections? It is useful to open the nasal airways with decongestants, such as pseudoephredine. Antihistamines are often used, especially if allergies are involved. You should also raise the humidity in the house and drink plenty of warm liquids to keep the secretions thin.

Cigarette smoke paralyzes and eventually kills the cilia which sweep the sinuses clear of mucus. This damage from smoking allows the mucus to build up, and the amount of secretions is increased because of the irritants in smoke. Always avoid smoking.

When a bacterial infection develops, you will usually need antibiotics to help clear it up. It may take a prolonged course of antibiotics or a change of antibiotics if there is a slow response. Cortisone nasal sprays may be useful depending on the cause of the sinus infection. Viral infections are the most common cause, of course, and do not respond to antibiotics.





Do you know? Wind Chill

Wind Chill is the term used to describe the rate of heat loss on the human body resulting from the combined effect of low temperature and wind. As winds increase, heat is carried away from the body at a faster rate, driving down both the skin temperature and eventually the internal body temperature. The wind chill index combines the temperature and wind speed to let you know how cold the wind "feels" against your skin. While exposure to low wind chills can be life threatening to both humans and animals alike, the only impact that wind chill has on inanimate objects, such as vehicles, is that it shortens the time that it takes the object to cool to the actual air temperature (it cannot cool the object down below that temperature).

The National Weather Service office in Jackson will issue advisories or warnings whenever the combined effects of temperature and wind will create a threat. Wind Chill Advisories will be issued whenever the sustained wind speed will exceed 10 mph creating wind chill equivalent temperatures of 10 to 24 degrees below zero.

Wind Chill Warnings will be issued if the sustained wind speed will exceed 10 mph and the wind chill equivalent temperatures are from 25 degrees below zero and lower. Sustained wind speeds less than 10 mph do not create a significant difference from the actual air temperature. Exposed skin will freeze in 30 minutes within the advisory temperature range, and in 10 minutes when the warning criteria is reached.

To understand the dangers and warning signs associated with the cold, it is important to understand how the human body regulates its temperature. The human body loses heat during the winter due to the conduction and convection of heat from the skin to nearby air, due to evaporation of moisture from the skin surface, and due to normal respiration. To compensate for this heat loss, the body burns energy to produce heat to keep the body temperature at a relatively constant level. If, however, a body loses heat faster than it can produce heat, the body temperature will cool to below normal levels, a medical condition known as hypothermia.

ally worsen unless the overall rate of heat loss can be stopped. The warning signs for hypothermia may start with shivering and shaking and may end in death. Initially, as the body temperature starts to drop, shivering begins. At the same time, the brain begins to reduce the amount of blood that is circulated to the extremities of the body in order to conserve heat for the vital organs near the body's central core. If the central core of the body continues to cool, uncontrollable shaking, memory loss, disorientation, incoherence, slurred speech, drowsiness, and apparent exhaustion may develop. These are all signs of a very serious situation. If the body core temperature drops below 95 degrees, just 4 degrees below normal, immediate care is needed, as the person will likely become irrational. Once the body core temperature drops below 90 degrees, the person loses muscle control, and outside help is the person's only hope for survival. If that help is not available, heart and/or respiratory failure and death will eventually follow as the core tem-

Hypothermia will gradu-

perature continues to drop. If a person is suffering from hypothermia, it is critically important that the person be warmed properly, or death may result. In a hypothermic person, cold blood is concentrated in the body extremities, (arms and legs). If the extremities are warmed too quickly, this colder blood will be released into the body's central core, possibly lowering the central core temperature to a fatal level. In other words, do not totally submerge a severely hypothermic person into a tub of warm water. Instead, keep the arms and legs out of the tub while warming the core, and gradually warm the extremi-

Frostbite is a condition in which the body tissue actually freezes. Frostbite is often associated with hypothermia. In a hypothermic person, the brain greatly reduces the amount of blood that is circulated into the extremities of the body which increases the chances that the tissue at the end of the extremity may actually freeze. The most susceptible areas for frostbite include the fingers, toes, nose and ear lobes.

As with the effects of cold and wind on people, any living thing, including outdoor animals also are affected. Even though fur provides the animals with a degree of protection, when exposed to prolong periods of wind with no shelter, animals will also succumb to the cold. Farmers need to move livestock to sheltered areas, and pet owners need to provide adequate shelters for outdoor pets.





Gear Up

Prioritize and balance to minimize stress

Stress. It's generally not a welcome element of daily life, but nonetheless, it's often there. For some students, stress is such a large part of life that it can interfere with their well-being as well as their achievement in school. Whether brought on by peer pressure, difficult classes, a busy schedule or family problems, counselors say students can take steps to alleviate some

Eighth-grade students and high school students share some of the same stresses. "Freshmen tend to stress out over social issues--those 'he said, she said' kinds of problems. Also, freshmen are trying to get accustomed to a new school, new teachers, new schedule, and they seem to struggle with those adjustments," says Janice Miller, Guidance Counselor at Rockcastle County High School. "Seniors have so many stressors! They are trying to make decisions about what they are going to do after high school, and they have to fill out applications, write essays, and meet deadlines. Plus, they have to deal with the emotional stress of moving to a new phase in their

All students, Miller says, stress over homework and balancing that work load with extracurricular activities and jobs.

Counselors recommend that when students experience these stresses, they reflect on what is most important to them. Students sometimes must make choices and prioritize their activities. Is it more important to have an after school job or to be on the basketball team? Should those Saturday hours be spent studying for a difficult class or hanging out with friends?

When students need to talk, Miller says, "Counselors' offices are a good place to start because they give students the opportunity to 'vent'. Students often don't realize that simply talking about what is bothering them does help!" She also sees counselors as helping students work out problems with teachers by acting as a go-between or referring students to other resources that can help them.

"Parents are also a valuable resource," Miller says. "Students sometimes feel 'pushed' by their parents, and communicating with them about what is going on is an excellent way to relieve some of the tension."

Even though they might be facing a busy schedule, Miller says students are expected to be "well rounded" when competing for scholarships and other honors. "I think that students have to choose their extracurricular activities wisely. If they can be involved in a few meaningful activities that they enjoy, they are better off than if they just try to rack up a list of activities just for the effect on applications," Miller says. Sometimes that means taking an honest look at what is most important and let-

ting something go. Participation in extracurricular activities can also teach students social skills, responsibility, respect for others and teamwork.

So to minimize stress, reflect and prioritize. And, Miller adds, "Don't spread yourself too thin. Make sure that your commitments are worthwhile, meaningful activities. Finally, although after school jobs are good experiences, keep them in perspective. Remember that you have the rest of your life to work, and that right now, school is your most

important job."







In the past decade we have grown substantially more dependent on technology, having a machine provide for our every whim. However, these advances have done more than give us a comfortable lifestyle. Many of the machines that provide us with these common conveniences are powered by fossil fuels. Sadly, this seemingly practical source of energy is causing a major upset in the environment. This grievance is known as global warming.

The Way it Once Was...

In the past, our damage to the environment was balanced out naturally through biogeochemical cycles in the biosphere; this is no longer the case.
