#### **Sentencing for Steve Isaacs** delayed again

The sentencing for a former Rockcastle County Fish and Wildlife officer in federal court has been delayed again.

Steven Ray Isaacs, 45, who pled guilty in August to mail fraud, had been scheduled to be sentenced on Monday, but the sentencing date was rescheduled for Thursday (today).

# **Nine indicted** by Rockcastle **Grand Jury**

**By: Richard Anderkin** The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down nine indictments on Friday for crimes ranging from child abuse to trafficking of a controlled substance.

Gary Stephen Blevins, 38, of 9 Mullins Street, Livingston was indicted on one count of Criminal Abuse First Degree by intentionally abusing a child under twelve years of age, thereby causing physical injury and or placing him in a situation that may cause serious physical injury or cause torture, cruel confinement or cruel punishment

Blevins' wife, Kristina S. Blevins, 35, was also indicted for permitting her husband to harm the child while in her custody.

Rockcastle Sheriff Mike Peters, who worked the case along with the Department of Social Services, said Tuesday the child who was harmed was Blevinses.

The Blevinses will be arraigned on February 22nd. Gary Blevins is free on a \$20,000 property bond and Kristina Blevins is free on a \$2,000 cash bond.

Larry D. Mink, 19, of Carter Drive, Mt. Vernon was also indicted on one count of child abuse. He is accused of intentionally harming a child under the age of 12 on June 24th of this year.

Mink has not been arrested and Rockcastle Circuit Judge Jeffery T. Burdette set his bond at \$10,000 cash or property.

Kyefi S. Hicks, 33, of Nicholasville, was indicted on one count of first degree robbery.

Sheriff Peters said Hicks

Melinda Phillips on Rose Hill Road on November 10th.

The Sheriff said the vehicle was recovered and Hicks was arrested in Louisville last week.

When Hicks is returned to Rockcastle to face her indictment charge she will be placed under a \$100,000 cash or property bond.

Four people were indicted Friday on drug charges.

Jeffery L. Mullins, 38, of South Wilderness Road is being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center on a \$50,000 cash or property bond, and will be arraigned on January 11th,

Bartley, Montgomery's lead Rockcastle Prosecutor, Roberts, 49, of Brodhead pled guilty in 2005 to Sodomy (4 counts), sexual abuse, first degree, (2 counts) and sexual abuse, second degree (3 counts). He was sentenced to fifteen years imprisonment by

sentencing, Roberts was eligible for parole after serving twenty percent of his sentence. The Parole board met on

December 3rd to consider early release for Roberts and Bartley represented the Commonwealth at the parole hearing in opposition to his early release.

Following the hearing, Bartley told the Signal that he had reminded the parole board that the State Legislature has recognized the likelihood that sex offenders will re-offend and he also noted the impact that these crimes have on the young victims, and they too should consider these factors.

Since Roberts' sentencing, the General Assembly has made all felony sex crimes, "violent" crimes, meaning that those convicted must spend at least eighty-five percent of

# **Rockcastle** Memories

Several weeks ago I found an old glass bottle filled with sassafras bark chips. Those chips are from one of my excursions into the woods with my grandmother. They are at least 50 years old but still retain the characteristic aroma of sassafras bark. The smell alone is a walk down memory lane.

Mommie Katie loved sassafras tea. She took me with her as a young boy into the woods behind our house to find young saplings. (On any walk into the woods my grandmother knew precisely what she wanted and where to find it.) She knew exactly which saplings were mature enough to cut in order to get chips that contained the right flavor for her tea.

It was a delight to take walks into the woods with my Mommie Katie. She used that small thicket of wooded property to accent her wonderful cooking. She allowed me to join her as she looked for country greens and the sassafras chips.

It was also a bonding event for us – even though I did not recognize that at the time. Mommie Katie was a wise and wonderful woman, and she used those walks to instruct me about things that she considered important. I probably learned more from her than I realized both about the woods



and about life.

She also had a special way of turning the concentration in the refrigerator into a large mug of the tea which she shared with her lady friends in the neighborhood. Mrs. Charity Barnes particularly loved the tea and often requested a cup when she visited our home.

I cannot remember whether anyone else in the family loved her special potion. But I do remember Mommie Katie pouring me a cup when I was about 10 years old and, to her surprise, I did not especially care for the taste. I guess you had to develop a liking for the flavor of sassafras tea.

Sometime in the early 60's, an article appeared in the local newspaper stating that sassafras tea contained a carcinogen called safrole. It was supposed


#### Cold Hard Christmas Currency, Please



# **RCHS hosts Book Fair and Canned Food Drive**





# **Pine Hill Holiness Church was established in 1955**

Submitted Pine Hill Holiness Church, located on South Wilderness Road in Mt. Vernon, was built

in 1955 by George Collins. George, and most of his family, lived at Piney Branch. They had a church there but, one by

one, they were leaving Piney Branch. So, after about four years of going from Pine Hill to Piney Branch, George decided to build at Pine Hill.

The land was donated by Tom and Edith Marshall. His brother gave him the first offering of money and, with the help of friends and family, they began to cut logs for the building of the church.

When the actual building began, George had \$40 to start. But they went ahead and then Oscar Graves, who had a business at Calloway, stopped by and talked to George about the church. He told him he would co-sign a note for whatever he needed.

The first church service was held in September of 1955 with 20 members and grew from there with additions and remodeling over the years. However, soon the building was not large enough for the congregation.

In 1992, it was decided that the congregation would take on the same job that George had done so well many years ago -build a new church larger and more up to modern standards. Of course, there were humps and hurdles but they were overcome. Finally, the new building was completed in May of 1994 and the old building was torn down.

In 2005, an elevator was added which is enjoyed by old, as well as by the young.

Pastors at the church have included D.O. Brown, John Durham, James Payne, Leonard Centers, Bob Hasty, Jasper Car-

penter and the present pastor, Allen Hensley, who has pastored for 24 years.

The first homecoming was held in September of 1960. It's still held annually on the second Sunday in September.

The church also sponsors missionaries in Mexico and Haiti.

When we started this project, our motto was "With God all things are possible." Truly, today we, as a church, can say it is so. No doubt, in 1955, when George first conceived the idea for the church, he felt the same way. He could not have done it on his own but, through God, the way was made possible.







portive parents.

Fortunately, local, state and federal enforcement agencies are becomingly increasingly adept at ferreting out the location of these delinquent parents, as well as devising new ways to coerce non-paying parents to comply with their support obligations.

Nationally, child support collection efforts garner over \$20 billion dollars annually. Kentucky is contributing its fair share, collecting approximately \$400 million dollars each year.

Identification of a non-paying parent and their employment is the key to successful enforcement. Once the nonpaying parent is identified enforcement agencies have a host of obligation efforts available to them. Overdue support can now be collected from federal and state tax refunds due to the obligor. State and country officials can, and do, file liens on real and personal property for past due support. It is also becoming increasingly common to report unpaid support obligations to credit bureaus or to even freeze bank accounts. Moreover, professional, occupational, recreational, and drivers' licenses may now be suspended due to unpaid support. Some collection statutes even authorize the use of more aggressive efforts, such as the placement of so-called "boots" on an obligor's vehicle in order to render it immovable.

Our local officials take full advantage of these tools. While final figures remain unavailable, collections efforts in Pulaski County are expected to exceed \$4,000,000. Lincoln County will have collected in excess of \$1,355,000 and Rockcastle County will also exceed \$1,000,000.

The refusal of a parent, who is motivated by ill will or even apathy, to provide adequate economic support for a child, strikes a visceral chord. That some children will be derived of better nutrition, improved housing or the opportunity to participate in an educational or extracurricular opportunity is disturbing. With the conclusion of this year near upon us, let us again resolve to decrease the opportunity for this unfortunate type of neglect that exists within our society.



McKinney, who were fined \$12,500 in Rockcastle Circuit Court for illegal poaching of deer and turkey, to pay their fines to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife and make the money orders out to him and mail them to his Mt. Vernon Post Office box.

Isaacs received \$9,500 from the two brothers and deposited them into his personal bank accounts. He was originally scheduled to be sentenced on November 11th, which was moved to Monday and has now been moved to Thursday.

Isaacs faces up to 20 years in prison, a maximum fine of \$250,000 and up to three years supervised release.

Isaacs served as Game Warden in Rockcastle County from January of 2003 to April of 2006.

surance, the county's largest carrier of fire insurance, said Tuesday, the lower rating would mean about a \$40 decrease in the cost of a insurance premium on a \$100,000 piece of property.

Only 152 towns in the state have a five or better rating, according to state statistics. The lower rating will take effect on March 1st of next year.

The council also discussed the fact that they were losing about 26 percent of their water, somewhere.

"The state says a 12% loss

is acceptable, but we are paying Mt. Vernon for 26% more water than we are billing for," City Clerk Becky Bussell said.

The council agreed that something should be done, but took no action.

In other business, new council member Ronnie Cash also asked that the city's Christmas lights go up on November 1st of each year, which was agreed upon by all the council.

Everett Harper and Jerry Pensol, members of Leadership Rockcastle, invited council members and Mayor Walter Cash to a *Plan for the Future* Seminar at the Rockcastle County High School on January 17th at 6 p.m.

The two men said the meeting would mainly consist of a presentation concerning planning and zoning and that there would be no debate during the two hour presentation.

The two emphasized the fact they were not for or against planning or zoning at the present time and just wanted the council and other members of the county to know as much about the subject as possible.

after he was indicted for one count of trafficking in Methamphetamine and one count of possession of drug paraphernalia.

Cole T. Hammond, 22, of Russell Springs and formerly of Rockcastle County, was indicted on one count of possession of cocaine, one count of possession of drug paraphernalia and public intoxication.

He has not been arrested on the indictment charge and a \$50,000 cash or property bond was set.

Ralph E. Carpenter, 28, of Patsy Lane, Berea, was indicted on one count of possession of methamphetamine, after having already been convicted on a prior offense.

He has also not been arrested and his bond was set at \$15,000 cash.

Joshua Lainhart, 24, of McKee was indicted on one count of possession of methamphetamine and one count of possession of drug paraphernalia-a smoking pipe, designed to introduce meth into a person's body.

He has filled a \$1,000 cash bond and he will receive a summons concerning his court appearance.

His bond was set at \$18,000 cash, which will go towards the payment of his back child support, if he is able to post bond.







# Barnett joins Army


Stephen J. Barrett has joined the United States Army under the Delayed Entry Program. The program gives young men and women the opportunity to delay entering active duty for up to one year.







# Get the most from your holiday roast

Lean beef is a healthy choice for protein in the diet. Beef roasts are a convienent alternative for holiday meals. Premium roasts such as ribeye, rib and tenderloin are very popular at holiday time. However, more economical roast choices – round tip, top sirloin and eye round – are also delicious holiday options.

How much to buy?

These guidelines will help determine what size roast to purchase.

Boneless roasts, such as tenderloin, round tip, eye round, top sirloin and tri-tip will yield 4 three-ounce servings of cooked, trimmed beef per pound. (For example, a 3-pound roast will yield 12 three-ounce cooked servings.)

Ribeye roasts, which have more trimmable fat, will yield 3 three-ounce servings of cooked, trimmed beef per pound. (For example, a 3-pound roast will yield 9 three-ounce cooked servings.)

Bone-in rib roasts will yield 2-1/2 three-ounce servings of cooked, trimmed beef per pound. (For example, a 3-pound roast will yield 7-1/2 threeounce cooked servings.)

Shop smart.

• Choose meat last when shopping to ensure that beef stays as cold as possible.

• Choose beef with a bright cherry-red color, without any grayish or brown blotches. A darker purplish-red color is typical of vacuum-packaged beef. Once exposed to oxygen, beef will turn from a darker red to bright red.

• Choose packages that are cold, tightly wrapped and without tears or punctures or excessive liquid.

• Purchase before the "sell by" date printed on the package label.

Store it properly.

• Refrigerate or freeze beef roasts as soon as possible after purchasing. Roasts wrapped in transparent film can be refrigerated 3 to 4 days (or frozen up to 2 weeks) without rewrapping.

• For longer freezer storage, repackage in heavy-duty aluminum foil, freezer paper or plastic freezer bags, removing as personal preference. (Always add salt after cooking.)

• Make sure to use a meat thermometer to check doneness.

• To prevent overcooking, remove roast from oven when thermometer registers 10°F below desired doneness and let it stand, tented with aluminum foil. During the 15 to 20 minute standing, the temperature will rise to the desired doneness. For food safety it is suggested that the internal temperature of the roast reach 160°F. Therefore remove roast from oven when thermometer registers 150°F.

• Important: Do not cover or add water during roasting. Let it stand!

After removing from the oven, the temperature will rise to reach the desired temperature and juices redistribute, making carving easier.

Carve correctly.

A sharp carving knife is a must. For uniform slices, hold the knife at the same angle for each cut. The more tender the roast, the thicker the slices can be. Rib, ribeye and tenderloin roasts can be sliced 1/2 to 3/4 inch thick. Round tip, top sirloin, eye round and tri-tip should be 1/4 inch thick or less. Always practice food safety.

Defrost frozen roasts in the refrigerator to prevent bacterial growth. Allow 4 to 7 hours per pound to defrost a large roast; 3 to 5 hours per pound for a small roast. If defrosting in the microwave, defrost just prior to cooking. Do not defrost at room temperature.

To avoid cross-contamination:

• Wash hands well in hot soapy water before and after handling raw beef. Also wash utensils, counters, cutting boards and other surfaces raw meat has touched.

• Keep raw meat and meat juices separate from ready-toeat foods, both in the refrigerator and during preparation.

• Don't place cooked foods on the same board, tray or platter that held raw meat. For example, do not carve a cooked roast on the same board used in preparing the raw roast.

# **Christmas** Tree precautions

For many Kentucky families, nothing sets the mood for a joyous holiday season more than a Christmas tree. Taking basic precautions in decorating will ensure that tree doesn't pose a fire hazard.

"Christmas trees cause about 200 house fires a year around the United States," said State Fire Marshal Rodney Raby. "Fires occur with both natural and artificial trees. But taking a few basic steps can ensure that your Christmas tree provides a safe and cheery atmosphere for this special occasion."

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) offers these safety tips:

•When decorating your tree, use only lights inspected and labeled by an independent testing laboratory. Lights labeled for outdoor use only should not be used on an indoor tree.

•Unplug tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.



### NOAA Weather Radio: A gift to save your life

If are you are searching for a gift, maybe you should consider a gift that could save you and your family's life. In this age of nifty gadgets, NOAAAll Hazards Weather Radio is a definite must! The National Weather Service wants NOAA Weather Radio to become as common as the smoke detector in your home. This is especially true if you live in a manufactured home. Severe weather and flooding can strike at any moment of the day or night. Advance warning can spell the difference between life and death.

Did you know that you could be in your home, sound asleep in your bed at 2AM, and the National Weather Service (NWS) can wake you up, tell you that severe weather is moving in your direction, and help you find a place of safety to move your family? It is true. NOAA Weather Radio (NWR) is one of the most valuable pieces of electronic equipment that you can have in your home because it can save the lives of you and your family. It can assist you in making decisions that can minimize property damage, and can give important information during national emergencies, and it is the fastest means of receiving warning or updated weather information. NWR is like having your own personal tornado Known as the "Voice of the National Weather Service," NWR is provided as a public service by the National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), which is part of the Department of Commerce. NWR includes more than 900 transmitters, covering all 50 states, adjacent coastal waters, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and the U.S.

Pacific Territories. NOAA All Hazards Weather Radio broadcast over 7 frequencies, so if you are anywhere in the country, you can find a station from a nearby NWS office.

Weather Radio is an "All Hazard" radio, meaning that it will broadcast information for much more than severe weather watches and warnings. It will also alert you to civil emergencies such as a chemical spill, a nuclear accident, volcanic or earthquake information, and a dam failure. In Kentucky, NOAA weather radios will also respond to the "Amber Alerts" which are designed to assist in locating missing children. Specially built receivers that have a "tone alert" feature will automatically sound a loud tone similar to a loud alarm clock, and begin broadcasting the emergency message. It is this feature that can wake you from a sound sleep and allow you to take action to protect the lives of your loved ones. These receivers are available at many discount department stores, electronic stores, and many mail-order catalogues for a reasonable price.

Most of the time, the weather conditions are not hazardous, so NWR normally broadcasts local forecast, daily climate statistics, river stage information, and current conditions for the local area. During periods of potentially severe weather conditions, this broadcast cycle will take on a different tone, with increasing emphasis on the weather threat. It will contain advice as to what actions are recommended for the threat, and advise you what to look or listen for if the potential threat becomes a reality. If actual warnings are required, then the alert feature will be

activated, and as much information as possible will be broadcast to you as to what the threat is, where it is, and where it is moving toward.

So, if you're looking for something to give you and your family when you are searching for a perfect gift, consider obtaining a NOAA All Hazard Weather Radio which is available at department stores, discount stores, specialty electronic stores, and over the Internet. The National Weather Service does not sell or profit from weather radios. We simply provide the broadcast at no charge for the public.









# **Cold weather brings increased risk of home fires**

Winter weather brings more than colder temperatures, snowstorms and holiday celebrations. It also brings a significantly higher number of residential fires and accidental carbon monoxide (CO) poisonings, tragedies that can be prevented if appropriate safety precautions are in place.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), home fires are most prevalent in December and January and the number of CO related injuries and deaths increase in winter months when furnaces, space heaters and other fuel burning appliances are in use.

"There are several reasons for the increase in fires and CO accidents in winter months," says Debbie Hanson, director of external affairs for BRK Brands/ First Alert, a leading manufacturer of fire extinguishers, smoke and CO alarms and other home safety products. "Candles and

holiday decorations such as Christmas trees and lights, along with increased use of kitchen appliances for holiday cooking all contribute to the higher incidence of home fires," says Hanson. 1) Install smoke alarms with both Photoelectric and Ionization sensing technologies on every level of your home and in all sleeping areas for maximum protection. 2) Test smoke alarms at

least once a week. 3) Change the batteries in

smoke alarms every six

months or when the low battery signal is heard.

4) Create and practice a home escape plan at least twice a year, making sure everyone is involved from kids to grandparents.

5) Keep a fire extinguisher or fire extinguishing spray in your kitchen and near other areas where a fire could occur, such as in a workshop, garage or near a fireplace.

Winter Carbon Monoxide Safety Tips

Often referred to as the silent killer because you can't see, smell or taste it, CO is the leading cause of accidental poisoning in the U.S. It is a by-product of combustion produced by cars, stoves, water heaters, fireplaces, gas grills and a number of other appliances. The following safety tips will help residents avoid CO and other dangers associated with power outages and changes in seasonal temperatures:

1) Never run a generator indoors or in a poorly ventilated area, such as a garage or porch, and use the appropriate-size power cords to carry the electric load.

2) Install one batteryoperated CO alarm (or ACpowered alarm with battery backup) on every level of the home and one in each sleeping area.

3) Ensure that CO alarms have working batteries installed.

4) Never burn charcoal or other outdoor cooking appliances indoors or in the garage.

5) Inspect and clean any soot and debris, such as bird nests and paper, out of the chimneys, flues and stacks.

Carbon monoxide is difficult to detect without the help of CO alarms. Outward physical symptoms of CO poisoning include headaches, dizziness, weakness, nausea, vomiting, chest pain and confusion. 
