In sodomy, incest case

State asks for 25 years for Williams

A Brodhead woman has pled guilty to complicity to sodomy and incest in Rockcastle Circuit Court, according to a news release by Eddy F. Montgomery, Rockcastle Commonwealth Attorney.

Virginia Williams, 20, of Brodhead, was charged, along with her husband, Nick, in an indictment in June 2007. The two were charged with sex acts involving their 21 month old daughter.

Nick Williams was found guilty of the charges in a trail late last year and is awaiting sentencing.

Virginia Williams, whose case was set for trial this month, decided to change her plea to guilty after she was found competent to stand trial by Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette in a pre-trial proceeding.

Police charge **Dale Renner** after 4 hour stand-off

Police took a Pine Hill man into custody last Thursday night, after a four-hour stand off at his home on U.S. 25 near the Pine Hill Circle.

Kentucky State Trooper Tommy Cromer said Dale Renner, 50, was taken to Hazard for a mental evaluation, after he surrendered to police at approximately 11 o'clock Thursday night.

Cromer and KSP officer Tom Atkin, along with deputies Ronnie Bradley Sr. and Jason Kirby went to Renner's home sometime between 6:30 and 7:00 p.m., after 911 received a call from a family member that Renner might be contemplating suicide.

The trooper said that he knocked on the door several times at the residence but, getting no response. went to a double patio door.

"When I looked through the patio door I saw Renner holding an assault rife and began shouting obscenities and telling us to get off his property," Cromer said.

Cromer said police returned to their vehicles and secured the area.

Other officers were called, including a state police negotiator who took over for Cromer, who had been trying to talk to Renner for about an hour before the negotiator arrived.

The trooper said that besides the negotiator, other officers, including officer Ryan Loudermilk who is related to Renner in some way, talked to him during the four-hour stand

After Renner finally agreed to surrender, and police took him into custody, they searched the residence.

Cromer said police found eight high-powered rifles, two of which were fully loaded, and several loaded magazines of ammunition. Cromer said the assault rifle Renner was carrying was fully-loaded all during the negotiation.

Because of the high-powered rifles, and the close proximity of Renner's home to U.S. 25, police shut down the road to passing motorists during the stand-off.

Renner's legal problems actually began on Tuesday when police arrested him on a warrant issued by Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds' office.

Pine Hill Baptist Church Pastor Casey McClure requested a warrant for Renner's arrest, after several problems at the church in the past few months, involving Renner.

McClure said Wednesday morning that Renner, who is a member at the church, had been coming to church on a fairly regular basis since late October.

But, several times during that period, Renner had disturbed services with loud outbursts, so bad that it had frightened some members of the



Mayors should be commended for taking right stand

Mt. Vernon Mayor Clarice Kirby and Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash both said this week that it was time for the county, as a whole, to begin the process of implementing planning and

However, County Judge Buzz Carloftis declined to comment on the issue either way, when I spoke to him Tuesday afternoon.

I guess as a representative of the people, he is supposed to do that, even if it may not be in the best interest of the future of the county.

Kirby went as far as to say that it could hurt her popularity as Mayor, but it was the right thing to do.

Both mayors said the planning stages need to start now. They are right - actually it is



something that should have started about 50 years ago.

The simple fact that Rockcastle County is the only county along I-75 that does not have some type of planning or zoning in place - shows a past lack of leadership in our

And, like it or not, while it may be at a slow pace, Rockcastle County continues to grow and we need to be ready.

I sincerely hope voters don't hold it against any elected official who says or does what they think is best for the future of Rockcastle County.

Dear Journal:

In the last entry of my journal two weeks ago (I've been sick), I had written that when I was a teen, on snow days off from school, I enjoyed writing short stories or poems. I had attempted to write a short story very loosely based on an actual family even that happened during the time of the Civil War. I called it "The Long Journey."

The last time I wrote, we had just met Becky and her ten children who, on a late fall day, had taken a walk over to the next ridge top, there in the mountains of North Carolina to visit a friend, the elderly Widow Marley, as she was known. They had taken along a basket of goodies for her, and fortunately, had come along when she needed the companionship of a good friend. She had just learned of the death of some of her family, who was fighting in the war "up north" in Virginia. After comforting the widow, Becky and the children began their journey back

lowed Holly Creek back home as the late fall winds began to blow and as the darkness began to settle early deep in the valley. They felt a gladness in their hearts for the kindness they had shown a neighbor in need, and felt well-blessed themselves, although the world around them was at war. The cool air encouraged a briskness to their steps, along with the anticipation of eating some mutton stew and corncakes that Becky had left simmering on

the hearth. At long last, when there were only a few rays of sun left, they reached the short path that led home. Becky suddenly could almost sense that there was something wrong...very, very, wrong. Her eyes peered ahead with what light that was left through the shadows to see her dear husband, Jim, lying face-down in the door of their cabin.

What was wrong? What had happened? A thousand thoughts ran through her mind. She and the children ran to his side, but it was too late. He was dead. Union soldiers had come through the area while Becky and the children were away, and had been killing, burning, pillaging, and looting everything in their path. If they had been there, undoubtedly they would have met with the same fate as Jim.

Soon after seeing that Jim was dead, the harsh reality set in that they had lost almost everything that they had to their name. The soldiers had stolen most of their livestock and plundered their root cellar,

Back in the 70's I worked for several years with a fellow from Wisconsin whose name is David Schroder. We were neighbors in Berea at the time and on days like this, Dave would be complaining that a heat wave was passing through.

He lived just a matter of steps from the Berea Country Club and he, along with his children, were frequent guests out on the golf course throughout the winter months. Dave's recreation did not, however. involve a club with which to knock around a little white ball.

Anytime there was a snow on the ground, he and the kids would be out there cross country skiing on the fairways. I seriously doubt that anyone in Berea had ever seen cross country skis before the Schroders showed up in town. And I don't see many of them now.

The Schroder's family car was a 4 wheel drive International Scout. Half a dozen of us car-pooled between Berea and London, while Dave was here, which meant that every 6 days or so it was his turn to drive. Needless to say the all wheel traction was seldom necessary on I-75. On the other hand, as far as he was concerned, there was no such thing as weather so bad we couldn't get to work.

If a foot or even 18 inches of snow was on the ground, and that did happen several times, and the Interstate was closed, Schroder was especially motivated to get to work. This meant that he could drive his Scout down the median if jackknifed trucks had the highway blocked.

We once drove all the way to London after a big snow storm, the only automobile on the road in either direction, only to discover that there was no electricity in our office building because the storm had blown down the power lines.

David figured out right away that he was not going to have any luck trying to get any of his coworkers into skiing, but on weekends when the outside temperature was sub-zero he seemed especially irritated that nobody wanted to join him to frolic in the great outdoors.

In warmer weather we sometimes went fishing together. Early one Saturday morning, in the dead of winter, when it was actually much colder than it is today, my

Rockcastle | Memories

A few mornings ago, while taking Cody (my sheltie) for his morning constitutional, I heard an owl in the woods next to my house. He was hooting, barking, and screeching as he tried to turn back the morning sun. Cody cocked his head trying to determine where the cry was coming from and looked at me to see whether this matter should be of concern to him. The sound reminded me of a juvenile Screech Owl that I found when I was only eight or nine years old.

At that time my mother and I were living with my grandparents (Pop and Mommie Katie). I stumbled upon the very small screech owl while playing in the yard behind their house. Because I was unsure if I should try to pick it up, I ran to the house to get Pop's assis-

He carefully placed the bird in a small cardboard box and let me take it to my room. Pop told me that he thought the bird was injured, so I should give it good care until it could be released back into the wild.

After a couple of days, the owl allowed me to touch it and feed it from my hand. Pop helped me to dig earthworms for feeding him. We also fed him small insects that I collected in the yard. I was amazed at how much food the tiny bird could actually consume.

My tiny friend, whom I aptly named "Hootie," would not stay in his box no matter how many times I returned him to his tiny nest. My wise grandfather suggested that we cut a long strand of leather to tie to one of "Hootie's" legs so he could perch on the top of my bedroom door.

After tying one end of the leather string to his leg and the other end to the door knob, he was content to sit on the top of my door watching all of the humans walking around in our house. At night he made a "peeping" sound as he kept an eye on me sleeping in my bed. This was my first encounter with nocturnal animals, and I found it difficult to snooze while he observed me.

Every day Pop and I took Hootie outside to allow him to walk in the yard and get accustomed to his surroundings. Sometimes he actually found tiny insects to feed upon during his walks. Throughout my

time with Hootie, he never tried to actually fly away. Pop had examined his wings and was unable to find any injuries.

While researching this column, I found that the small owls usually nest in open woodlands or on the edge of open fields. Obviously nocturnal, they are very small in stature, weighing just over 7 ounces. They dive to catch their prey, consisting of small rodents, birds, chipmunks, flying insects, frogs, crayfish, and tiny fish. While perching near their nests, they drop small pellets that are composed of fur, feathers, bones, teeth, and pieces of the shells of insects. Some captive screech owls have been known to live for 20 years.

One night Hootie did actually drop a pellet that I found the next morning. I had never seen anything like that, and I ran to Pop to see if he knew what I found. Of course, he explained exactly what the owl had deposited on my bedroom floor. It was a very valuable learning experience.

After a few weeks, Pop determined that Hootie was ready to be released into the woods behind our house. I remember the Saturday morning that he walked into my bedroom to say, 'David Joe, today we must let the owl go back to his own family." I started to cry because he had become a dear friend and

Pop then explained that his family was missing him and that he needed to go home. With that in mind, Pop and I took the small bird into the yard behind our house, and I untied his tiny leather leash. He sat on my hand for a moment, and I allowed him to fly away.

Up and away he flew into the woods. It took several weeks to stop thinking about my small friend with the big eves. Every time I ventured into our woods, I watched and looked for Hootie. But I never saw him again. I loved that little owl, and he gave me an unforgettable experience.

Senate Week in Review...

We began our second week
of the 2008 legislative session

in joint session with the House of Representatives. Governor Beshear delivered his State of the Commonwealth



Address in the House chamber, largely discussing the financial condition of the state and what we can and should accomplish within the serious financial constraints we face this year.

I was happy to see that Governor Beshear shares some of our views on the future of the Commonwealth. Given the extraordinarily tight budget we face, this is really an opportunity to make sure our priorities are in order. This is the perfect time to re-evaluate what services state government must provide, and identify how we can provide them more efficiently and cost-effectively. We may have to make some shortterm sacrifices, but delay means forcing even-more painful sacrifices on future generations of Kentuckians.

At the same time, we must continue our strong investments in education and economic development so that we can attract and fill the jobs we want our children and grandchildren to have. Balancing our true needs with our resource constraints will take hard work and ingenuity over the next three months, but I believe my colleagues and I will meet the challenge. Governor Beshear will address the General Assembly again later this month to spell out specifics of his budget proposal.

The full Senate also passed its first bill of the 2008 session. Senate Bill 5 would eliminate the primary-election runoff in the governor's race. Under current law, a runoff is needed when no slate receives at least 40 percent of the votes in its

party's primary.

The measure was somewhat controversial when it was proposed in last year's session, because it would have affected the ongoing gubernatorial campaign. Fortunately, no runoffs were necessary in either party's primary, but we cannot expect to dodge that bullet every four years. Counties statewide could have spent \$5.4 million — \$1500 per voting precinct — to prepare for a runoff had we needed one last year, a financial bite few if any of them could afford. Now that we're far removed from the campaign, we can hopefully pass this money-saving legislation without current political considerations entering the debate.

Other measures are also moving through the process. Among the bills now heading to the Senate floor is Senate Bill 2, wide-ranging legislation aimed at improving math and science education in Kentucky. Under the bill, schools could receive grant money to develop middle- and high-school programs to boost the number of students taking rigorous math and science classes. A similar provision would seek to expand energy-technology career education across the Commonwealth. If we want to ensure a better future for our children and grandchildren, we need to make sure they have the tools to compete and reach their full potential. Our target is to offer all students the opportunity to take challenging courses that both engage their intellects and prepare them for the new world economy.

The Senate Judiciary Committee also approved a measure that could make our roads considerably safer. The bill, which now awaits a vote by the entire Senate, deals with the issue of driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Senate Bill 71 would allow law enforcement to arrest anyone caught driving under the influence of drugs, within certain

parameters. Blood or urine tests would be used to determine whether the driver was impaired; prescription drugs taken as directed would not be illegal. There is currently an overwhelming burden on our police officers if they want to charge someone with driving while high, allowing too many dangerous drivers on our roads. Stiff DUI laws have helped decrease the numbers of drunk drivers on our roads, and we hope that treating drug intoxication in the same strict manner will do similar good. At the same time, the bill would lessen the threshold to penalize the most intoxicated of drivers. These drivers, whose blood alcohol level is nearly twice the legal limit, are by far the most dangerous, and getting them off the roads could drastically reduce the number of accidents

in Kentucky. The legislative process will continue picking up momentum in the weeks to come. That makes this a very important time for lawmakers to stay in touch with the people we serve, to report on our work and ask for feedback. smokehouse and cabin.



Bill will provide state funding for UNITE

A bill allowing Operation UNITE to continue providing uninterrupted services to communities through mid-year was introduced Tuesday in the Kentucky Senate.

Senate Bill 97 would allocate \$450,000 from a \$12 million pool of money in the Multi County Economic Regional Development Fund, which is comprised of revenue from the coal severance tax, Sen. Robert Stivers (R-Manchester) told approximately 120 coalition representatives from across UNITE's service region Mon-

"Today is a day of commitment and dreams," said Stivers, who represents the 25th District. "This is a stop-gap measure to keep Operation UNITE up and running through the end of the fiscal year."

"Drugs cause so many problems," said 21st District Sen. Tom Jensen (R-London), the bill's co-sponsor. "This is an issue that looks beyond district lines and party affiliation. This is something good for the re-

The legislation, which will carry an emergency clause allowing it to take effect upon the governor's signature, is expected to draw bi-partisan sup-

"I will certainly co-sponsor this legislation," said 31st District Sen. Ray S. Jones II (D-Pikeville), who was out-ofstate on business Monday afternoon. "UNITE has been instrumental in helping treat those suffering from an addiction to illegal or prescription drugs, and in prosecuting the drug dealers who are profiting from the epidemic. In order for us to have any chance of combating this problem UNITE must be fully funded."

"Senator Stivers and I have worked together in an effort to bring an end to the drug epidemic, and two years ago we were able to secure \$1.5 million to help UNITE establish two residential treatment facilities in Eastern Kentucky -- one in Pike County and one in Clay County. Senator Stivers should be commended for not only filing this bill, but also for his

ongoing efforts to help bring an end to this scourge."

Fifth District Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers explained that UNITE's recent decision to scale back its staff by 10 law enforcement officers and one employee each from the education and treatment components was due to "some bumps" in the federal budget. Congress appropriated no earmarks for any program during the current federal fiscal year and provided only \$4.1 million to UNITE for next fiscal year.

"That's why we turned to our friends in the state legislature," Rogers said. "Senators Stivers and Jensen are taking that lead."

Last month President George Bush met with UNITE President/CEO Karen Engle to discuss the efforts of UNITE and its coalitions. "You were singled out as being the most effective in dealing with the drug problem," Rogers said.

"You are the model the country should follow.'

"UNITE is having an impact. It's saving lives. We simply cannot let the effort deteriorate. This issue has got to remain a priority," Rogers said.

'We're plowing unplowed ground here. There's nothing like you in the United States of America."

Stivers said he spoke to Gov. Steve Beshear Sunday evening and was "pretty confident" about the bill's chances. "I can't guarantee anything, but we are going to be up there and working on it."

Barring any unforeseen snags, SB 97 could move swiftly through the legislative process and be sent to the governor by the end of January.

'What this group needs to do now, we need to get on the phones and call people," Stivers told the coalition representatives. "Let your senators and representatives know how important it is to continue the fight against drugs. There is nothing that impacts Eastern Kentucky more than getting rid of drugs."

Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps **Some Landscape Plants Need Watering in Cold Weather**

It may surprise you to hear that you may need to water your landscape plants in the winter. Forgetting about your landscape after the leaves fall and it becomes too chilly to enjoy gardening could be a mis-

I don't mean to imply that daily and weekly watering must continue all winter. Soaker hoses or automatic sprinkler systems are enemies of plants when the ground is already soaking wet from rain or snow. But plant tissues can become dehydrated in low-humidity, sunny and windy conditions...and if the ground is either dry or frozen, plants that stay green in the winter are subject to stress for lack of sufficient water.

Selective watering with a garden hose in the winter at times when the ground is not frozen is highly recommended, especially on young or recent plantings.

While the bigger winter and spring problem is often too much water, especially in clay soils or those that perk slowly some plants may need a supplemental drink in the winter.

Examples of stress for lack of water come to my mind from experiences. Evergreens, any plant that still has green leaves during the winter, still give up water to the wind and sunshine in winter. So they only have a certain amount of sap in the stems and leaves to lose before demands are placed on the root system. They can get real thirsty when the humidity is low and drying wins are blowing. Even more if it is sunny, too.

Compounding of this drying problem occurs if the ground is frozen, or bone dry, or the evergreen plant is against the house and protected from rainfall reaching it's roots, since

they will not be able to replenish what they lose to the elements, and this could cause death of plants. Older, wellestablished plants probably will hang in there, but it is still smart to keep an eye to winter desic-

(I have hesitated to recommend watering in winter because more plants die from wet soggy waterlogged conditions than from dry conditions.)

Here are some examples of plants that may need care in winter, or at least monitoring. (Recently transplanted shrubs and trees especially should not be forgotten about in winter.) Pines, spruces, hemlocks, laurels, large leaved hollies, rhododendrons, azaleas, peris traxus, junipers, arborvitae, southern magnolias with their big green leaves, boxwoods, acuba, leucothe, deutzia, gardenia...and the list could go

It is so sad to see good plants fail to grow, or die, especially when a timely drink might have been all it took to make them grow and thrive. And the evergreen plants that continue to beautify all season long are most likely to suffer on dry windy winter days.

Watering is something we should not neglect to do just because it is cold outside, especially if we have recentlyplanted evergreen trees, shrubs, and groundcovers in our landscapes.

Winter driving tips to motorists

The winter driving season is upon us, and the Kentucky State Police is reminding drivers to use extra caution when road conditions deteriorate.

Winter provides new challenges and responsibilities to the public and the Kentucky State Police," said KSP Commissioner Rodney Brewer. "We ask that drivers be prepared to meet the challenges of the upcoming winter season in Kentucky. Plan ahead, make sure everyone in the vehicle is properly restrained, drive defensively and be sure the vehicle is properly maintained to handle the effects of cold temperatures."

Highway Safety Branch Commander, Captain Tim Lucas offers a word of caution about braking on snow covered

"Know what kind of brakes your vehicle has and how to use them properly. In general, if you have anti-lock brakes, apply firm pressure, if you have non anti-lock brakes, pump the brakes gently," said Lucas.

"If you find yourself in a skid, stay calm and ease your foot off the gas while carefully steering in the direction you want the front of your vehicle to go. This procedure, known as "steering into the skid," will bring the back end of your vehicle in line with the front," added Lucas.

The Highway Safety Branch has posted these additional safe driving tips on their website: Winter Safe Driving tips to

•Be Cautious About Travel •Listen for radio or television reports of travel advisories issued by the National Weather

Service. ·Avoid traveling on ice-cov-

ered roads if at all possible. •If you must travel, let someone know your destination and when you expect to arrive. Ask them to notify authorities if you are late.

•Check and restock the winter emergency supplies in your car before you leave.

•Never pour water on your windshield to remove ice or snow; shattering may occur.

•Never rely on your car to provide sufficient heat; the car may break down.

•Always dress warmly. •Always carry clothing ap-

propriate for winter conditions. What To Do If You Get Stranded

•Staying in your vehicle when stranded is often the safest choice if winter storms create poor visibility or if roadways are ice-covered. These steps will increase your safety when stranded:

•Tie a brightly colored cloth to the antenna as a signal to res-

•Move anything you need from the trunk into the passenger area.

•Wrap your entire body, including your head, in extra clothing, blankets, or newspa-

•Stay awake. You will be less vulnerable to cold-related health problems.

•Run the motor (and heater) for about 10 minutes per hour, opening one window slightly to let air in. Make sure that snow is not blocking the exhaust pipe-this will reduce the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning.

•As you sit, keep moving your arms and legs to improve your circulation and stay

•Do not eat un-melted snow it will lower your body tem-

Prepare Your Vehicle For Winter

gerous winter travel problems by planning ahead. Have maintenance service on your vehicle as often as the manufacturer recommends.

•Have the radiator system serviced, or check the antifreeze level yourself with an antifreeze tester. Add antifreeze, as needed.

•Replace windshield-wiper fluid with a wintertime mix-

•Replace any worn tires, and check the air pressure in the tires.

•During winter, keep the gas tank near full to help avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines.

(to melt snow for water)

•Windshield scraper







last jury thought about the case really changed her mind," Jeremy Bartley, assistant Commonwealth Attorney, said. "She knew she faced the same time, if not more, and we were prepared to make sure that happened had she not pled guilty. With a guilty plea, there will be no appeal as there might have been had the case gone to trial," Bartley added.

The Commonwealth's recommendation in Virginia Williams' case is 25 years. The Commonwealth had already recommended a sentence of 20 years for sodomy and 10 years on the incest charge for Nick Williams. Judge Burdette will conduct final sentencing hearings on February 8 for both defendants.

Montgomery applauded Bartley's handling of the case. "The two together are going to pull about 55 years for this outrageous crime. It is a good result and I am pleased that they won't be out there hurting any more children."

Both Virginia and Nick Williams' sentences will be required to register as sex offenders for life and will be monitored, if and when they are released they will remain under supervision for five years.

take in the entire county. However, the other options are for the three cities, if the fiscal court opts to not take part in planning and zoning, can undertake the process together or individually.

Once a commission is in place, preparation of a comprehensive plan is the first order of business. Lowry said the comprehensive plan will be the overall planning document for the county and usually takes at least a year, sometimes several years, to complete.

Lowry gave several reasons for a community to have planning and zoning. They included:

1) To ensure that new developments have adequate infrastructure.

2) To provide citizens with a public process for community development, and

3) To preserve property rights and values by providing a level of certainty in the market for those conducting business, living in or relocating into the community.

Lowry said it is a must to keep governmental bodies and the general public involved in the process from the start.

Before anything, including zoning, can be done officially, governmental bodies must hold public hearings and pass ordinances. "In my opinion, if you don't have everyone involved, especially those people who have to pass ordinances very involved and informed, the chances of them passing these ordinances the first time they are presented to them would not be very good," Lowry said.

Lowry said a zoning ordinance can be drafted which is specific to a community. She said there is not one set plan out there for the state and that every community has different needs.

Lowry said in most all cases, properties, such as a businesses already located in a newly designated residential area, would be grandfathered in and houses that may be built too close to the road under new specifications, would remain until the house is torn down. Other exceptions would be areas such as a trailer park, already in a designated single family housing residential area, which could remain as long as the park was in place before planning and zoning.

planning and zoning.

A Board of Adjustment, which is a board that may opt to change requirements of the zoning ordinance, would also be put in place to oversee objections a landowner may have. They would also field requests for zone changes in cases where someone or some company may want to build a business or factory in or near a designated residential or agricultural area.

If the board of adjustment and the land owner cannot reach an agreement, the dispute would end up in Circuit Court.

Lowry pointed out that all unresolved disputes between land owners and the Board of Adjustment end up being resolved through Circuit Court action.

Planning and zoning doesn't come without a price, however.

Lowry estimated start-up costs for Rockcastle would be about \$85,000. \$40,000 for the comprehensive plan, \$30,000 for a zoning and map ordinance and \$15,000 for subdivision regulations.

Lowry gave examples of counties with nearly the same population as Rockcastle, who had annual budgets that ranged from \$50,000 a year to \$168,000. A portion of the money used for Planning and Zoning comes from fees, but in all cases, the counties and cities had to contribute.

For example, in Henry County, where their population is 15,060, compared to Rockcastle County's 16,857, their annual budget is \$50,000 with only \$15,000 coming from fees.

During the question and answer portion of the lengthy informational meeting, Lowry and development board member Jerry Pensol told Mike Blount, another development board member, that Rockcastle County was the only county in the state from Ohio to Tennessee, along Interstate 75 that had no type of planning or zoning.

Blount's question was one of only three asked after Lowry's presentation.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis, Livingston Mayor J.C. Griffin, Mt. Vernon Mayor Clarice Kirby, Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash and four county magistrates, William Denny, Jan Stevens, Bill McKinney and John Holbrook were in attendance, but none of them had questions or comments.

This week, the *Signal* gave the Judge and the three Mayors another chance to comment on the subject.

Carloftis said he appreciated the chance to comment on the matter, but at this time had no comment.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Clarice Kirby said that while it may not be the most popular of her decisions she thought planning and zoning should begin in the

"It is time to move forward and at least begin the planning process. The fiscal court needs to do planning and zoning for the entire county. It would be simpler and more cost affective for everyone to fall under the county's umbrella," she said.

"We've got to educate the public about planning and zoning. I used to be against it, but it was because I really didn't understand it. It is something that needs to be done in the entire county," Kirby added.

Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash said basically the same thing. "I'm for it and we all need to do it together and not just one or two cities in the county," he said. "The way I understand it, it could take up to five years to get it completed, so we need to get started," Cash said.

Livingston Mayor J.C. Griffin said he had no comment at this time, because he didn't understand the entire process. "I just need to know more about it," he said.

Leadership Rockcastle members passed out a survey during the meeting, which asked those in attendance to indicate whether they were in favor of, against or undecided when it came to "organized planning and land development efforts within Rockcastle County."

In all, 36 surveys were completed - which was 73% of the 49 people in attendance at the meeting.

Of those surveys, 31 (86% of those polled) stated they were in favor of planning and zoning within Rockcastle County. Additionally, three people (8%) were undecided on the issue while only two people (6%) were against the process.

Of those surveyed: 28 (78%) were in favor of county-wide planning and zoning standards while three people preferred planning and zoning only within the city limits and one preferred joint planning and zoning among multiple cities

The individuals surveyed represented a good cross section of the county with nine people from the Brodhead and Livingston area, 11 from the

city of Mt. Vernon and 13 from the general county area.

congregation.

McClure said that Renner had also donated some used musical equipment to the church and it had been accepted by the board.

However, McClure said Renner brought new musical equipment to donate on more than one occasion, which amounted to \$4,000 to \$5,000.

McClure said board members declined to accept the equipment after they learned Renner had charged the equipment on a credit card and was planning to file bankruptcy to avoid paying repaying the debt.

"We told him we didn't think that he could file bank-ruptcy on credit cards and that it was wrong to do what he was doing, even if he thought he was doing the right thing," McClure said.

McClure said Renner had also been asked to stop attending church services because of his actions before, during and after services.

The pastor said Renner had threatened members of the church, at church and on the phone and had went as far as to go to a couple of their homes.

"Some people at the church were becoming afraid to go to church because of him and, although it is a very unfortunate situation, it is one that we had to deal with," McClure said.

"We hope he gets the help he needs and are just very thankful that he, or no one else, has been hurt," McClure said.

When Renner was arrested last Tuesday, he was charged with criminal trespassing, disorderly conduct and harassment.

Renner filled a \$200 cash bond and was released from the Rockcastle Detention Center last Wednesday.

Cromer said police were awaiting the outcome of Renner's mental evaluation in Hazard and that several charges were pending against him, including wanton endangerment.

Renner's court date on the first charges was moved to next Wednesday in Rockcastle District Court.

In other business, the court also agreed to include the new Pongo Fire Department in the county's fuel funding program at a cost of \$150 per month to the county.



Sharon Graves wins state education award

By: Bryan Marshall Sharon Graves very nearly missed her calling.

"I never wanted to become a teacher," the Clark-Moores Middle School American History teacher said. "I wanted to become a lawyer. It wasn't until my junior year in college that I thought that maybe I should look at other options. I kind of fell into it. It was not a planned career, but I found my niche here with the eighthgrade kids."

Graves, who has taught for 18 years at Clark-Moores, was one of 20 educators across the state selected by the Kentucky Department of Education and Ashland Inc. as a recipient of the 2008 Ashland Inc. Teacher Achievement Awards.

"I have no idea who nominated me," Graves said. "I would love to know. No one has said a word. That someone thought of me enough to do that

is a true blessing.'

The Rockcastle County native was honored October 19. 2007 at a ceremony in Frankfort in the State Capitol Build-

Ashland presented the 20 TAA recipients with cash awards and framed certificates.

Representatives of the Kentucky Department of Education, the Governor's office and Ashland were on hand to honor the teachers and to recognize the state elementary, middle and high school teachers of the year.

Holloway Chandra Emerson, a middle school teacher in Oldham County, was named the overall winner as middle school teacher of the year in the state.

Graves is a 1982 graduate of Eastern Kentucky University, where she also went on to receive her Rank II and Rank I teaching certifications, Graves

learned of her award by letter. "When I got the letter, it was

shocking," Graves said. "I did not expect it. I wanted to tell someone so bad. I was walking on air."

However, she said she initially was only allowed to tell people on a need-to-know ba-

Her students and fellow teachers finally learned the good news after an announcement was made over the school's intercom.

The reaction was very positive from students and teachers, with one even bringing Graves a tiara to wear around the halls.

When Graves is not in the classroom, she usually is spanning the globe.

When she takes students to Washington D.C. in 2009, it will be the fourth presidential inauguration she has attended.

Graves also has taken three middle school groups to Japan and she went to Ukraine in 2003 through a teacher exchange program.

"I've visited 49 of the 50 states," she said. "When I make my trips, it's always to go to some historical sites for some purpose in class. I rarely use the textbook. My information comes from my visits and the books that I get. It pretty much drives my class.'

"The only state left is Hawaii," Graves said. "It's a goal in the next two years."

This marks the sixth year the Department of Education and Ashland have jointly honored Kentucky educators.

Judging was conducted earlier this month by a blue-ribbon panel of veteran educators,

many of whom have more than 30 years of teaching experience. Applications included information on the nominees' teaching philosophies, their teaching experiences and involvement in their respective communities, as well as letters of recommendation from peers, students, parents, administrators and others.

Ashland has recognized outstanding Kentucky teachers with its Teacher Achievement Awards since 1988. More than
