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Mt. Vernon fire and rescue workers and Mt. This Tuesday night, the county got a different dose of medicine from Old Man Winter, when ice and snow began falling early Wednesday morning. # Grand Jury returns 11 indictments **Two indicted** for stealing **Christmas gifts**

Eleven people, including two men accused of stealing Christmas presents, were indicted Friday by a Rockcastle Grand Jury.

Terry D. Montjoy, 34, of Hammond Trailer Park, Mt. Vernon, and Christopher Spoonamore, 27, of Berea were indicted in connection with a December 9th incident in which they are accused of stealing Christmas presents from the home of Richard and Renee Damrell on Tark Hill Road.

The seven count indictment includes charges of burglary, theft by unlawful taking and committing the offense of being persistent felony offenders. Montjoy was also indicted for possession of a controlled substance.

Montjoy, who was arrested after his girlfriend turned him in, is being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center, under a \$35,000 full cash bond. Spoonamore has not been arrested.

According to police, the night of the robbery, Montjoy's girlfriend told police he brought the stolen presents into a trailer at Hammond's Trailer park, unwrapped them, burned the wrapping paper, put them in a bag and took them outside to hide.

After police arrived at the trailer, they recovered all of the stolen presents which were

### No school on **Monday for President's Day**

Rockcastle County school students will get another break from school next Monday, when classes will be dismissed in observance of President's Day.

The scheduled break for students will be the last until Spring Break, which begins on March 31st and runs through April 4th.

Wednesday's unscheduled closing of school was the fourth time this year school has been called off for either snow or high water.

The final day for students this school year is now May 28th

Nicholas Williams, 22, will have to serve 30 years (20 years for sodomy and 10 years for incest). His wife, Virginia, will serve a 25 year sentence (20 years for sodomy and five years for incest).

Under Kentucky law, the sodomy charge is considered a "violent offense" that requires both Williams to serve at least 85% of their imposed sentence and both will be registered sex offenders for life. Additionally, they will be monitored by the Department of Corrections, if and when they are released from prison.

Burdette's decision came last Friday, during sentencing arguments in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

Nicholas Williams was found guilty of both counts after a jury trial held in the latter part of 2007. His wife later changed her not guilty plea in exchange for a recommendation of 20 years on sodomy and five years on incest.

Prior to his decision, Burdette noted that he was "deeply disturbed by the nature and weight of evidence"

Griffin said that service lines now had to be laid and that, fol-



Even though its origin occurred ten years before I was born, the comic strip Li'l Abner became my childhood reason for reading the daily newspaper. My grandparents (Pop and Mommie Katie) subscribed to the Courier Journal. I could not wait for the comics to arrive to see what the fictional clan of hillbillies from Dogpatch was up to that day. Before I could read, Pop placed me on his lap and read the daily saga to me until I could read the strip on my own.

Al Capp created Li'l Abner, which has been universally heralded as the greatest comic strip of all time. At its peak, the strip was read by 70 million Americans. Li'l Abner Yokum was a dumb, strong, and goodnatured hillbilly who lived with his parents, Patsy (Mammy) and Lucifer (Pappy) Yokum. Mammy dominated her family with determination and a knock-out punch. Pappy was just the opposite. He was an illiterate and hopeless parasite.

Li'l Abner himself spent countless years evading the marital wishes of Daisy Mae Scragg. She eventually succeeded in pressuring Abner to marry her, and the event was of such popularity that it made the cover of Life magazine on March 31, 1952.

Author John Steinbeck called Capp "the best writer in the world." One reason for his tremendous success was the variety of "unforgettable characters" that showed up in the comic strip. It would be impossible to discuss all of them; however, I will attempt to bring back a few to your memory.

My favorite character of the Dogpatch world was the Shmoo, which first appeared on August 31, 1948. The bowling-pin-shaped personality with legs and no arms reproduced asexually, and they were terrifically prolific. Shmoos were also delicious to eat. If fried, they tasted like chicken. When roasted, they tasted like beef. Raw, they tasted like oysters. In addition, they produced eggs, milk, and butter. The pelt was used for shoe leather, and their whiskers made perfect toothpicks. The lovable and selfless characters ultimately brought misery to humankind because people with a limitless supply of the animals stopped working and society eventually broke down. Capp invented the Shmoo to satirize the rise of the welfare state. Pop was very savvy about politics and understood what Capp was trying to convey to the American public. Pop considered Capp to be brilliant. I and other children who were

fond of the comic strip did not "get" the social satire; we just thought it was as funny as could be.

Pop's favorite character from Li'l Abner was Fearless Fosdick. He was the long-running parody of Chester Gould's "Dick Tracy." This stripwithin-a-strip became a regular feature of Li'l Abner. Everywhere Fearless went, bullets were flying all around him. His trademark look was the Swiss cheese bullet holes through his body. He was very loyal to his department, even though he was only paid \$22.50 per week. His fiancée was Prudence Pimpleton, but they never married.

Fearless Fosdick actually became the spokesman for the popular men's hair product, Wildroot Cream Oil. By 1952 the bumbling detective had become so popular that he became the star of his own TV show.

Another of my favorite characters was Joe Btfsplk, the world's biggest jinx. He walked around with a dark, rain cloud hanging over his head. Terrible luck was sure to come upon anyone in his vicinity. Even though he actually had a well-meaning and gentle personality, his reputation preceded him. Joe was a "lonely and feared man." He was a character with an unpronounceable name. Capp pronounced Btfsplk with a "raspberry sound."

Other characters that made up the daily strip included: Senator Jack S. Phogbound (Capp's parody of the Southern Democrats who opposed the New Deal), Marryin' Sam (a local preacher), Native American Lonesome Polecat, and the statuesque beauty Moonbeam McSwine.

Occasionally, the clan would venture to a far-away frozen land called "Lower Slobbovia" (conceptually based on Siberia). The strip became a forum for Capp's conservative political and cultural views. For example, he **Points East**

#### Dear Journal:

The other night, Stanley and I were watching a movie that was taking place back in the mid-50s. Of course, it would show cars of the era, and the 1940s, as well. Stanley, being the fan of classic cars that he is, was paying as much attention to the cars as the movie. I liked them quite well, too.

About midway through the movie, there came across the screen, a bright red 1956 Ford pickup truck identical to the one Stanley had learned to drive in. He ran the movie back, and froze the picture for quite a while to look at and admire this old pickup truck. He went on to briefly explain some of the experiences he and his older brother, Dale, had when he was learning to drive it.

I suppose everyone can recall the vehicle that they learned to drive in, and the various outrageous circumstances that went into this rite of passage. I know I certainly do...both times.

The first time I was learning to drive, was when I was about fourteen or fifteen in a medium blue late-1960s or early-1970s Volvo that belonged to my Uncle Junior, who was teaching me to drive.

My mom and grandma, who lived next door to each other, were in the mood for spring housecleaning and then planned to do some painting in each house. They liked to use those gallon-sized tin cans for cleaning buckets and paint cans when they were working. They were certainly cheap, and could be thrown away when the project was over.

As fate would have it, we lived about a half a mile away from the Colony Elementary School that had a little garbage building out back where the kitchen staff dumped such cans as was needed. One morning, when school wasn't in session, Mom and Grandma got Junior to drive over to the school, and was told to fish out about six or eight of the cleanest gallonsized vegetable cans for their projects. I went along. We got the cans and put them in the trunk. Before we headed home, Junior asked me if I would like to drive a little there in this big "ole" paved parking lot with absolutely nothing in it except one security light on a pole...conveniently located dead-center, of course.

He didn't have to ask twice. In a flash I was in the drivers' seat with the engine going. We puttered round and around the parking lot several times at about ten or twenty miles per hour. Things were going along pretty good, when all of a sudden it happened. That security

depicted college students carrying signs with the acronym "S.W.I.N.E", which stood for Students Wild and Indignant about Nearly Everything.

In its heyday, the widely well-liked comic strip was the topic of discussion for nearly every American citizen – old and young. Teenagers even copied the Sadie Hawkins Day event and made it their own – an effect that survives in many schools to this day. Many still have that one dance each year where the ladies get to choose their dates.

I am glad that I lived during the time that Al Capp gave birth to his popular strip. Most everyone from that era remembers it because of the language, characters, and situations that Capp created. In many ways, it has become a permanent part of American history – at least as long as we boomers survive. *You can reach me at*



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### "What is Written"

Let's begin today by looking at two texts, "Buried with him in baptism, wherein also ye are risen with him through the faith of the operation of God, who hath raised him from the dead." Col. 2:12. "Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of ife." Rom.6:4. In both of these texts Paul teaches the proper mode" of baptism, which is to be a burial, an immersion. Even if one did not know the meaning of the Greek word 'baptizo" (which means to dip, plunge, to make whelmed, i.e. fully wet) we can still know this from our 2 texts cited. The problem with several sects is that they seek to follow human wisdom and church tradition in practicing sprinkling and pouring as "baptism." But if, we are going to be pleasing God, we must be baptized as he described it to be done. Everyone knows how we bury people at the cemetery, they dig a hole about 4 feet deep, and they place the casket down in the ground and completely cover them over with dirt. This is the way we baptize people; we bury them down under the water. How do you all baptize people, is it as Paul describes it???





light on the pole moved, and jumped right in front of the car, and I smashed it "real good." That pole was buried at least six or more inches deep dead center of that Volvo. I don't think I'd ever seen my uncle cry before then. It was a mighty long half-mile walk home. He never said a word all the way back. Those Volvos must have been awfully fragile cars...that one was totaled.

You'd be surprised how word gets out about one unfortunate experience like that. Pretty soon, nobody in the family, friend or neighbor, would offer to let me learn to drive in their car. Needless to say, I didn't get the chance to drive anymore until I was nineteen, married to Sam Olivastro, and living in the suburbs of Providence, Rhode Island when I fell into dire straits and had to drive. The second time I learned to

The second time I learned to drive turned out to be quite unintentional. Sam and I had befriended a couple, Juan and Denise Vasquez, who were about our age and lived across the street from us in another apartment building. One Saturday evening they were visiting us, and it was getting late. We all decided to go out for a bite, and decided upon Kentucky Fried Chicken.

We got to Kentucky Fried Chicken when Sam and Juan noticed a little bar across the street, and decided to go over there with the excuse of playing pool. That left Denise and me to eat at KFC alone. We ate and sat thee and talked for quite a while. After about two hours or longer, we saw our husbands staggering their way back across the street headed straight for the KFC. Denise and I went outside, and headed them off, hoping to get them into the car. It was at about this point when Juan and Denise met another couple they knew, and were invited back to this couples' apartment. They accepted their invitation.

You would never think that one could come to dire straits in the parking lot of a Kentucky Fried Chicken, but believe me, you can. I was standing there with a drunken husband, and I finally managed to get him into the car. I got the keys and sat down in the drivers' seat. I waited for Sam to get straightened up so he could drive, but I could see that it was going to take longer to sober up than it did to get drunk. Pretty soon I noticed that the KFC was closing, and I know that we couldn't sit there any longer. Besides, I didn't want to stay there in the parking lot half the

night, anyway.

The time had come that I must drive so I started the car and headed for home. It was a 1972 Ford Pinto...avocado green. I hadn't "driven" since the "Volvo days" but here I was streaking through the streets just outside Providence on a Saturday night at almost one o'clock in the morning.

By this time, Sam had lain down across me, and was squirming about. He put his feel out the window on my side of the car, nonetheless. We finally got home. The next morning, he didn't remember how he got there, but he assumed that he drove, knowing that I couldn't. I informed him that I was the one who drove us home. He said that he was glad to know that he was drunk at the time because if he weren't, it would have scared him to death.

I'd hate to see it burned, and, for that matter, I'm still grieving way too much to even think about firing up my own saw.

It's almost like losing a member of the family. I'll miss the birds for sure and I'll miss munching on the tangy fruit after the first good frost of autumn and I'll miss the shade there on that end of the porch. I'll miss propping up my garden tools against it and I'll miss the place I've always leaned to take time out and watch the garden grow.

But mostly I will miss the tree for its very being. Our front yard looks barren and empty. The house will never look the same to me.

Over the years, many people have stopped by every spring to dig up seedlings that sprout from the seeds of fruit we didn't manage to pick up. My old tree is the proud parent of saplings that I know are living everywhere from Gerogia to northern Michigan.

I even mailed some to Pennsylvania and New Jersey just



# Sand Springs Baptist Church was established in 1948

The Sand Springs Baptist Church on Hwy. 1249, five miles from Mt. Vernon, was established in 1948.

The same church building still stands on property donated by Jerome Graves next to Skaggs Creek.

The first pastor of the church was Eugene Bradley, grandfather of current pastor, Bobby Bradley. Bradley's grandfather held church services on the ground, while the church was being built.

Eugene Bradley came from Well Hope Baptist at Chestnut Ridge to organize the church at Sand Springs, with the help of other baptist churches in the county.

Property for a picnic shelther was later donated by Leonard McKinney and property for parking was donated to the church by Dee and Katherine Graves, after the church was built.

Bro. Agee Stokes followed Eugene Bradley to the pulpit at Sand Springs with some of the other pastors after Stokes being, Arville McKinney, Jason Ivy, Eugene Gentry, Billy Joe Cameron and David Carpenter.

Some of the first members of the church were Stella and Leonard Moore, Dee and Katherine Graves, Jerome Graves and Bud and Ruby Bradley. Bud Bradley, father of Pastor Bob Bradley, was a member of Sand Springs Baptist for 55 years.

Pastor Bob Bradley, who followed David Carpenter at Sand Springs, was baptized by Bro. Arville McKinney 28 years ago and has been pastor at the church for the past 16 months.

Before taking over as the pastor, Bradley had a seven year jail ministry and was pastor at Rose Hill Church.

All eight of Bradley's siblings attend Sand Springs Baptist. They are: Jack, Boyd and Floyd Bradley, Lucille Hasty, Lois Hayes, Joyce McCracken, Gail Wilson and Sharon Boone. The most recent renovations to the church were about five years ago when central heat and air was put in the building.





### Summer programs prepare **Rockcastle students for** medical/dental careers

school seniors and college students interested in pursuing careers as physicians or dentists are eligible to participate in summer programs at the University of Kentucky offered through its Professional Education Preparation Program.

The PEPP Scholars Summer Program, designed for students from medically underserved areas, is open to high school seniors. The PEPP II Medical and Dental School Preparation Program is open to students who have completed at least two years of college.

Selected participants will stay on the UK campus, interacting with UK physicians and dentists, and participating in weekly hospital rotations, health seminars and other educational experiences.

PEPP Scholars will take enrichment classes and learn about surgery and labor and delivery. PEPP II students prepare for the admissions process to medical or dental school and learn about surgery, labor and delivery, emergency medicine, pediatrics and outpatient surgery. Students interested in careers in dentistry have rotations in the UK dental clinics, including oral/maxillofacial surgery and the dental emergency clinic.

Seminar topics in both programs include medical admissions, dental admissions, cancer, organ transplants, rural medicine, autopsy/pathology, trauma surgery, medical mission trips, gross anatomy lecture and lab, ethics, and compassion. Visits to area hospitals, camps for special-needs children, a psychiatric hospital, and

Rockcastle County high a children's hospital are included in the weekly activities. Recreational activities include sports, music, and dining out at restaurants. Eligible students who are selected to participate receive dormitory housing and a stipend for meals.

> The deadline to apply for the PEPP Scholars is March 3. The PEPP II deadline is March 7.

Students do not have to attend the University of Kentucky to be eligible to participate in either program. 





Victims of domestic violence go to great lengths to protect their children. They do not want their children to be hurt and will voluntarily take a beating in order to keep their children from being hit. The mother's worst nightmare is to have her children become a vic-

tim of the violence. On December 2, 2007 a 7 year old girl jumped in front of her mother and was hit by six bullets fired by the mother's exboyfriend. The latest update on her condition is that she is still in the hospital recuperating, has had three surgeries and has lost the sight in one eye. Her name is Alexis Goggins.

This horrible incident occurred in Detroit when her mother's ex-boyfriend jumped in the car with them. As a friend tried to call for help, the boyfriend pulled a gun. As he fired, Alexis threw herself across her mother, crying, "Don't hurt my mother!" Six slugs from the 9 mm handgun hit Alexis, one piercing her right eye. She was also hit in the chin and jaw. Her mother was hit twice. She was treated for two serious wounds and released from the hospital a few days later.

The former boyfriend was a 29-year-old out on parole. He was arrested and charged with two counts of assault with intent to commit murder. He could be facing life in prison.

The mother said she had dated the gunman for about three months. When she tried to end the relationship, he began to stalk her. He would call her house and show up there in the middle of the night.

Alexis is being hailed as a hero by the Detroit media. Her class at school named a stuffed toy "Hero" and placed it in her

chair, awaiting her return. "We didn't want Alexis' spot to be vacant, so she's got a sweet bear to sit in her place until she comes back," said her teacher.

Alexis is not the only child injured while trying to protect her mother from abuse. Adults have told me of getting between Mom and Dad when they were children and being shoved or knocked out of the way. Victims have told me of their own children jumping between them and their abusers in an attempt to stop the violence. Most of the time the injuries have been minor, but the potential for deadly violence is always present. In Alexis' case, her mother's worst nightmare came

Not only can children be physically harmed in an abusive relationship, they also suffer emotional damage. Children who live with violence may become depressed and anxious. They know that the Dad will blow up at some point, but they do not know when. They live in fearful anticipation, walking on eggshells trying not to be seen or heard.

Some will mimic Dad and become violent themselves, acting aggressively toward their mothers or other siblings. Some of these children may have problems at school, including poor grades or disciplinary problems. For some children the exposure to violence will make them more likely to find violent partners when they reach adulthood.

Our hopes and prayers are with Alexis as she lies in that Detroit hospital.

### Thacker ranked 26th in US with new record Girls' track team wins at Mason

The RCHS girls' track and field team had perhaps their best team performance of the season this past Saturday at Mason County. The girls easily won a very competitive meet, defeating last year's Class AA indoor state runnerup, Llovd Memorial, by a score of 110.5 to 66. More than fifteen teams were on hand for the competition.

The highlight of the meet came in the long jump competition. Senior Morgan Thacker enjoyed a record-setting performance. On her first jump of the contest, she leaped an unbelievable 18' to establish a new RCHS record in the event. The former record was 17'7.75" held by Western Kentucky University and former RCHS standout Heather Hammond. Nationally, Morgan's jump ranks her 26th in the United States and places her on the Milesplit First Team Elite in the event. In order to be first team in long jump, an athlete must have reached the 18' mark. Morgan had a career best performance in triple jump as well. She finished 1st with a tremendous effort of 33'7.25". Morgan also finished 3rd in the 55-meter dash with an exceptional effort of 7.47 seconds, only one hundredth of a second away from first place.

Despite being ill during the meet, sophomore Samantha

Smith led RCHS with 29 total points in four outstanding inperformances. dividual Samantha finished 4th in the 55-meter dash with a time of 7.51 seconds, the second best time of her career. She finished 2nd in the 400-meter dash with an awesome effort of 1:05.02. In the long jump competition, Samantha leaped an incredible 16'0.25" to capture 2nd place. In triple jump, she performed equally well, finishing a very close 2nd with a stellar effort of 33'6.5". Her marks in both events were indoor personal bests.







water have been lost during laying of the new lines. City Clerk Tammy Martin said that the city's bill to their water supplier, Wood Creek, was up \$1,000 more this month but Griffin said that the contractor for the project would reimburse the city for the expense.

In other reports to the commissioners, Griffin said that the city caught up all utility taxes for 2005-06 to the state and that the Uniform Financial Report had been submitted. The city paid the state \$2,944.96 during January to catch up the delinquent tax which is 3% of the water bills collected. This should get the city's road money for the past two years released, about \$6,000 to \$8,000 and should also release the special \$35,000 appropriation approved by the state for the city to resurface all city streets.

Griffin said that he hopes to be able to lay a two inch line to six residences across the bridge, who currently have only a 3/4 inch line, with money left over from the water project. Griffin said he was also looking into the purchase of several new water meters and equipment for the water department from the same funds. He did say however that the city cannot put a new line in to properties, across Wildcat Mountain, because the grant does not allow new construction.

The mayor also reported that the roadside had been cleaned from White Star to the Laurel County line.

Griffin told the commissioners that trouble with the sewer plant was presently being encountered with the chemical coordinator not working properly. He, and asst. city water superintendent David Blackburn, have been having to check every four hours at the sewer plant to make sure that the coordinator is properly dispensing chemicals. The new \$1,625 coordinator has been ordered and was scheduled to be received Wednesday. This expense can also be taken out of funds left over from the water project, Griffin told the commissioners. However, one expense coming up shortly will have to be borne by the city and it is an audit which will cost several thousand dollars. Griffin said the audit was a requirement of cities and would have to be done until they were brought up to date. But, Griffin had some good news to report also. The city's financial situation is slowly improving and, within the next few months, Griffin said the financial situation would be reevaluated with an eye toward lowering customers water rates.

City Clerk Tammy Martin's January financial report to the commissioners showed income for the water department of \$9,330.30 and \$4,596.37 insurance tax revenue as the major revenue for the city. With all bills received to date paid, as of Feb. 11th, the city had \$15,317.11 in the general fund, \$4,820.92 in the water department revenue account and \$834.46 in the operation and maintenance account. Martin was told by the commissioners to enforce collection of all late fees on water bills and prop-

erty tax bills. Griffin told the commissioners that he attended a meeting in Frankfort with the economic development cabinet to see if there would be any funding for projects in 2008-09 available and that he was scheduled to go back to Frankfort on Feb. 27th for another meeting with the governor's staff when he would take a plan of improvements for the city with an eye to getting grants and low interest loans for future projects.

partment so they can be made a part of the annual audit.

Mayor Clarice Kirby told the group that she appreciated the department for all the time and effort they put into making the city safer (and keeping insurance rates down for property owners) but that the council must operate the department under state statutes. And, as to fund raisers, the council must be kept in the loop so that when residents call to check on whether a fundraiser is actually being carried out by the department she will know the answer.

The Mayor also told the fire department that they could no longer fill private pools because it is in violation of city policy. Hansel said that the department had already been turning down requests for the service.

The fire department also receives \$150 a month from the fiscal court for gas expense for the county rescue vehicle housed at city hall and the fiscal court pays the payment each month on the vehicle.

Meadows recommended to the department that work begin now on their budget for submission to the council in time for the beginning of the next fiscal year, July 1st.

Pennington and State Trooper Coby Smith, received information this week, that he felt warranted reopening the case.

"I don't think everything happened that night just the way Griffin told police it did," Reynolds said.

Reynolds said Griffin's pattern of conduct was another reason for his request.

"He has been involved in three shootings in the past several years and I simply think we should be allowed to take a closer look at the shooting at Copper Creek in 2006," Reynolds said.

In that shooting, Simpson was shot in the stomach once with a .357 magnum by Griffin, who told police Simpson was on his property and armed with a baseball bat. The two men were neighbors.

According to family members the shooting has left Simpson, a logger and sawmill operator, crippled and unable to work.

In the latest shooting involving Griffin, who is currently living on Hinkle Road, Eubank, was arrested early Saturday morning as a suspect in a 2:30 a.m. driveby shooting at 87 Hansford Street in Eubank. Griffin was charged with first-degree assault, a Class B felony and first degree wanton endangerment, a Class D felony.

Pulaski County Sheriff's Department Det. Brett Whitaker said Sheriff's units, responding to reports of the drive-by shooting, discovered that several shots had been fired from the street into the trailer and garage at the residence. Carl "Rick" Smittle, 45, who lives at the home, was injured in the shooting and transported to Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital where he was treated and released. Whitaker reported several other people inside the home were not injured. Whitaker said the sheriff department's investigation revealed that several friends gathered at Smittle's home earlier in the evening and an argument began that soon escalated into a fight. "Griffin, who was involved in the fight, left the residence and returned a short time later armed with a rifle," Whitaker said. "Griffin fired more than 50 rounds from a .223 caliber assault rifle into the home and garage while driving past the home. Smittle, who was in the kitchen of the mobile home, received injuries to the chest from shrapnel from the shooting,' Whitaker said. Whitaker said Griffin fled the scene and was later located at his home where he was arrested without further incident. He was taken to the Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital to be treated for injuries he suffered in the original altercation at the Smittle home. Griffin was released from jail on a \$20,000 full cash bond on Monday. He is scheduled for a preliminary hearing before District Judge Katie Wood on Thursday, (today). In December of 1996, Griffin also shot Eugene Chasteen, then 42, also of Copper Creek, twice, after an argument at Griffin's home.

Chasteen was shot in the hand and one bullet grazed his back. After an investigation by Kentucky State Police, no charges were filed against Griffin.

Reynolds said that if the case against Griffin in the Simpson shooting is reopened, and probable cause is found, he will ask that an arrest warrant against Griffin be issued with a high bond, as quickly as possible.





# Three neighbors, two in same building die Local man critically injured in TN tornado

A former Rockcastle County man is among those still recovering from a deadly tornado that struck the small Tennessee town where he now resides, on "Super Tuesday," February 5, 2008.

26-year-old Jeremiah Faulkner left his parent's Sand Hill home in August, to travel to Castalian Springs, TN, to meet 30-year-old Kimberly Rumble, a woman he had been talking to on the Internet for about a year.

Faulkner said the couple immediately hit it off and fell in love.

But, on Super Tuesday, the man and wife to be, were literally torn apart, when a tornado ripped through Castalian, a town of about 700.

And, although both were injured, Jeremiah critically, they were the lucky ones.

Three people, two in the same housing unit and another in a house about a 100 feet away, died.

"We lived in a unit with two duplexes, which was completely destroyed right down to the foundation. The people who lived in the other part of the duplex both died," Faulkner said by telephone this Tuesday night.

Speaking from the home of his fiancee's mom, Faulkner said the 23-year-old mother of the 11-month-old found in the field, who died, was also a neighbor. "They lived on the same side of the street, about a 100 feet away."

Kerri Stowell, 23, the mother of the 11-month-old, who got national attention after he was found alive, and 49year-old Ronald Currey and his mother, 72-year-old Mabel Pryor, as well as Faulkner and Rumble, all lived on Hartsville Pike. "They found the baby across the road about 300 feet from where his mom died," Faulkner said.

Faulkner said he and his fiancee were aware of the bad weather in the area and that local television was tracking the storm on Harsh Lane, which was very close to their duplex. "I went to the back door to see if I could see anything and when I opened the door, all I heard was a loud roar and the sound of trees breaking. I ran back into the duplex, where I met Kim in the hallway and we fell to the floor, holding onto each other," he said.

"It was only a few seconds before the place starting coming apart and the wind was pushing us up and then down and in a rotating way, which caused us to come apart from each other. I didn't know what to think, it was the scaredest I have ever been in my life. There was so much dust, dirt and mud," he said.

When the tornado finally went through, Faulkner said he could hear Kimberly yelling for him, but he couldn't see her and he couldn't get up.

"I managed to pull myself out from under the debris on top of me and I could see her about 20 feet away, but she couldn't get up either," he said.

Both had been thrown near the area of the Castalian Post Office, which was next to their duplex and which was com-

the Department of Health and Families Services, from May of 2003 through June of 2007.

Her bond was set at \$10,000 cash or property. She has not been arrested.

**James Timothy Williams,** 47, of Wallin Street, Brodhead, was indicted for possession of pletely destroyed by the tornado.

Faulkner said it took about ten minutes for emergency workers to arrive at the scene.

Faulkner, who works in home construction in Sumner County where a total of seven people died that night, had his left leg and hip completely crushed and seriously hurt his right leg.

He was taken to the Sumner Regional Medical Center, but later transferred to Vanderbilt University Hospital because of the seriousness of his injuries.

Faulkner spent about 10 hours in surgery, where doctors resconstructed his left leg from

the hip to the ankle with metal rods and pins. Faulkner also had some bleeding from his brain, which finally stopped.

His fiancee broke seven bones in her back and received a deep cut on one of her legs.

Faulkner, who has already begun to move around some on a walker, said doctors had told him it would be at least eight weeks before he would be able to walk on his own.

"It is hard to describe the feeling you get when you think about the two other people, who lived in the same building, who died and why you didn't," he said. and Shirley Faulkner and said he plans to stay in the Sumner County area, which is about 40 miles east of Nashville.





## Legislative Update...

#### By Danny Ford State Representative

With just over a third of the 2008 General Assembly behind us, the first full week of February saw several key pieces of legislation deliberated in committees and on the House Floor.

Penalties for the falsification and misuse of military status would be established under House Bill 110. Approved by the House Committee on Seniors, Military Affairs, and Public Protection it will be known as "The Stolen Valor Act." Individuals would be charged with a Class A misdemeanor if they falsely apply for a special military license plate, claim that they are entitled to wear military awards and decorations, or makes any substantial misrepresentation of military service.

Legislation aimed towards raising our Commonwealth's low voter participation rate passed the House Elections, Constitutional Amendments, and Intergovernmental Affairs Committee. House Bill 138 would allow any registered voter to cast their ballot at least 12 days before an election

This amends the current law that requires voters to give a legitimate reason they cannot vote on the scheduled day before they are issued an absentee ballot.

One hot-button topic that created tension throughout the House floor last year was once again approved by the House Health and Welfare Committee. House Bill 396 would require all school-age children to be immunized against the human papillomavirus (HPV). Parents who do not wish to have their children inoculated with this immunization may sign a statement to withhold consent. Parents would also be given information that identifies the link between HPV and cervical cancer. I understand the epidemic that cervical cancer is becoming in our society; however, I still have many questions about this mandate.

This week, the House approved House Bill 36. Passing 90-0, the state vital statistics registrar would be required to send an incomplete or unsatisfactory certificate of death to the appropriate funeral director, physician, dentist, chiropractor, or coroner responsible for the entry to complete or correct the certificate. Additionally, the state registrar would be obligated to notify the individual who submitted the certificate of death that it was returned to the appropriate individual for completion.

The Kentucky Family Trust Fund Program would be created through House Bill 13. This legislation that was approved 91-0 would allow a board to establish and operate a trust fund program that would manage money for the benefit of individuals with special needs. The money directed to this fund would be used to help defray the cost of their health care needs. Additionally, individuals with a disability would be able to plan for possible medical needs in the future. Withdrawals from the account would be allowed and upon the death of the individual whose name the trust is in, any remaining balance would be sent to the Trust Fund to assist others with disabilities.

House Bill 307, approved 93-0, would create the Gatton Academy for Mathematics and Science at Western Kentucky University. Students who are selected for the Academy would be allowed to utilize their SEEK money, and allows the Academy to award diplomas to graduating students.

An additional measure of consumer protection is provided through House Bill 348. Passing the House 93-0, this legislation would move our Commonwealth one step closer to providing complete protection in the insurance arena by protecting consumers when they are faced with in the

incident of an agent using life settlements as a way to sell life insurance policies.

The relationship between two friends was the motivation for House Bill 234. Winning approval from the House 94-0, this legislation would create incentives for live organ donations. All expenses related to the donation would be reimbursed, 30-day special paid leave would be given to state workers who donate, and tax credits would be provided to companies for any lost income. Provisions of the act are known as "Beth's Bill" as "Beth" was the name of both the friends who were the live organ donor and live organ recipient.

With less than two months remaining in the 2008 Session, we still have many important issues to address, including the state budget. The budget review subcommittees are currently reviewing the budget, which provides funding for state services for the next two years. Once the subcommittees finish their work, the budget will then be sent to the full Appropriations and Revenue Committee before coming to the full House.

In the meantime, I will continue to update you on the work of the 2008 General Assembly. 

place nurses in our schools. These nurses will be able to provide services to our students and staff that the unlicensed personnel could not. They can provide immunizations, do physicals, dispense medications, do Insulin injections and carbohydrate counting for students with diabetes, and assess physical and mental situations

and make medical referrals. The nurse will be available for administering emergency medication if the need arises and for doing mini health presentations in the classrooms.

Roxanne Hammond was the first health department nurse to be placed out in one of the schools. Mount Vernon Elementary was fortunate to be chosen as the school to receive a nurse who will be able to provide valuable services for our families. Families, students, and staff have all welcomed Ms. Roxanne into the school. Two of her main focuses have been working closely with diabetic students and doing physicals for 5th graders. Mr. Davidson and his staff have only positive comments for how well Ms. Roxanne has fit in as part of the team at MVES.

Roundstone Elementary School and its principal Ms. Patricia Renner welcomed Angie Thacker as the second health department nurse to be placed out in the schools. She started working at Roundstone Elementary in February. Working with students with diabetes and other medical conditions will be a daily part of her routine. Soon immunizations and physicals for 5th graders will be part of the services available to the students at Roundstone Elementary. "We are happy to have Mrs. Angie Thacker on staff at Roundstone. Mrs. June and I feel that she is a wonderful addition to our health program.

She will be a great help to our students and parents who take advantage of her services," said Ms. Patricia Renner, principal of RES.

"The Rockcastle County Health Department is very excited about our recent endeavor to place a registered nurse in the Mt. Vernon and Roundstone Elementary schools at no cost to the school system or to the parents. We hope that parents feel comforted knowing that their children will be cared for by a trained nurse in the event their child should become ill or have a life-threatening event happen at school. Parents of children with chronic illnesses such as diabetes, seizures, etc., can be more at ease knowing there is a nurse there to take care of their child." The CVD Health Department has indicated that there are plans to place nurses at other schools. A clinic area has

already been provided at RCMS and is eagerly awaiting the arrival of a nurse.

As a nurse is placed in a school, information is being sent home to families. The health department requests that the information about the students be returned as quickly as possible. One form grants the nurse permission to treat the student if he/she becomes ill or injured at school. Another form is asking permission to bill the family's insurance (private or Medicaid) for services provided. Regardless of receiving permission to bill for services, the nurse will still treat any child for whom she has a signed permission form from the family.
