RCIDA votes to move forward with plans to create more jobs

Leaders say education is the key

The Rockcastle County Development Board voted unanimously Monday to move forward with their efforts to attract more jobs to the county.

Members of the board discussed several issues, with their main focus being education of the general public.

Development Board consultant Jim Holton said he would meet "with any group at anytime" to explain the importance of a Land Use Master Plan and planning and zoning for Rockcastle County.

Holton said the board should show solidarity behind elected officials who will have to ultimately make decisions concerning several important issues, such as a possible county-wide occupational tax.

"We have mostly open minded, forward thinking elected officials who are willing to listen and who have already demonstrated they are willing to help," Board Chairman Corey Craig said.

"The community has got to get behind them and support them and the support needs to start here," Craig told the board.

"The bottom line is either we support what needs to be

Construction is underway on the long-awaited Lake Linville sewer project. Residents of the area can learn more about the project at informational meetings set for 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. next Monday, March 3, at the VFW Club at Lake Linville.

The sewer project is being funded by a \$750,000 PRIDE Wastewater Construction Grant to the City of Mt. Vernon. PRIDE is a nonprofit organization, headquartered in Somerset, that helps communities improve water quality, clean up solid waste problems




Several wrecks in Rockcastle County over the past week

Rockcastle **Memories**

After witnessing a couple of snows on Furnace Mountain last week, I started to think about the huge snow storms that we had when I was a teenager. Marty Cox of Mt. Vernon sent me an e-mail about one night when several of us rode our sleighs on Old US 25. We had over a foot of snow.

Before you get concerned about teenagers riding sleds on a highway, let me assure you that automobiles were not capable of coming up that particular road with the snow that we were experiencing. The stretch of road running from my house to the cemetery was probably about two miles.

We had not had school for several days and, as you might expect, we were bored. That afternoon several of the girls started calling their friends to invite them to a "bonfire" and skating party at a place near my house.

By night-fall, there were approximately a dozen guys and girls who had gathered around a huge fire which we had built near the road. The guys had been asked to bring their sleds so we could accommodate everyone. Some of the sleds were big enough for three people. On those that were just singles, a couple of the girls would pile on top of a guy and then they would begin the exhilarating ride all the way to the cemetery.

This was during the time when I owned a '58 Chevy. That afternoon we had put chains on the tires so that we could use my car to carry us back to the top of the hill via the new US 25 section of the highway. Marty and I tried to recall the names of the "party goers," and we believe that they included: Carla Baker, Gary Foster, Paul Thompson, Lloyd Fain, Gary Coffee, Bud Cox, Bobby Sweeney, Dorcas Woodall, and Paul Daily.

Sometime during the evening, some guy decided that the fire was not big enough and added a couple of automobile tires to the flames. It created a huge flame with black, tar-like smoke Marty recalled "I do remember getting black faces from standing around the burning tires trying to keep warm before we climbed back on for another scary ride – laughing our heads off all the way down

the long hill." I remember that Gary Foster lived at the bottom of the hill. After a few trips, he contacted other teens to join us. Marty referred to him as a "dare devil," and I know why. He was always the one to volunteer to try something new – especially if it was risky. Due to his efforts, we had several other car-loads of young people join the party.

One of the sharpest curves on our trip downhill was the area in front of McKinley Arnold's house. I remember being on the bottom of a sled when it became top-heavy and tossed all of us into the ditch at the side of the road. We had snow all over us by the time we got back to the fire. Shivering and cold, we stood as close to the blaze as we could possibly get so that we could thaw out – only to begin once again after

we had warmed up. After a few hours of this adventure, some of the girls suggested that we ask Mommie Katie to make some hot chocolate. Of course, she was more than happy to oblige. All of my friends felt at home at her

So we put out the fire, and everyone went home except a few freezing individuals who decided to join us for hot chocolate. Mommie Katie was

Dear Journal:

I've been sitting here trying to wake up while watching the Today show as I usually do every morning. They had on a segment about the reunion of an old 70s sitcom, "Happy Days," featured this morning. I was a big fan of this show, and watched it almost every Tuesday night. The Today show hosts such a reunion from time to time. These shows bring back a lot of good memories.

The 70s and 80s TV reunions were nice, and their shows were certainly a far cry above anything that is on now. I really miss the "Golden Age of TV." You could see the firstrun shows of such programs as "I Love Lucy," "Leave It to Beaver," "Bonanza," and "Gunsmoke" as well as a host of other great shows that will never be duplicated. "American Idol" never had a thing on the "Ed Sullivan Show."

Back then, a TV was something of a novelty. A lot of families didn't even own one, much less have one in most every room of the house, and they being usually attached to a variety of gadgets such as DVD players, VHS players, surround-sound speakers, and let's not forget, the video games. If your family was fortunate enough to own a TV, it was the

centerpiece of the living room. It was a big, blocky, floormodel set with an almost oval screen. When you turned it on, it would take at least two or three minutes to "warm up" and quit flipping and flopping, and for the "snow" to clear. When you turned it off, the picture on the screen would shrink to a little white dot about the size of a pencil eraser, and slowly fade away. This usually took another two or three minutes. A color TV was unheard of, and there were no more than two or three channels available, for the most part: the three major networks, and perhaps a PBS station. There was no cable or satellite. There was no fighting over the remote because there wasn't one-you had to do everything manually, which usually involved adjusting the horizontal and vertical hold at least once every show. I had just about forgotten the details of those old sets. For those of us who remember these old "dinosaurs" it seems almost impossible to have advanced to where we are today.

Of course, along with the TVs came new "must-haves" to go along with it: The "TV light," "rabbit ears," and the "TV dinner." This one got mom





Hickory Grove Free Pentecostal was est. in early 1900s

The Hickory Grove Pentecostal Church has a rich history, dating back to the first services which were held in 1912 or 1913 in the first church building, which burned to the ground about a year after it was built.

Although the church has always been known throughout the county as Hickory Grove Free Pentecostal Church, many of the older members still remember it as "Frog Pond" Church.

Pastor Randal Adams said that in the early days, many of the men would socialize around a pond next to the church which was full of frogs.

"That is just the nickname

those old southern men gave the church and it stuck throughout the years," he said.

The second church building was built on land donated by M.C. Saylor and wife Susie in 1919 and stood across the road from where the current church building stands.

The new building, which is located near the intersection of the Brindle Ridge and Copper Creek Roads, was built in 1954 on property donated by Mrs. Edna Saylor and property for a large parking area was donated by Carlo Saylor at the same

A story in the Signal in the August 26th, 1954 edition, called the new building, "One of the finest church buildings in Rockcastle County."

Rev. Aaron Cupp was the Pastor at the time of the construction of the new building and served the church until

That building is still in use, but has undergone many improvements beginning in the 1980s when bathrooms were put in the front of the church building. In the 1990s another addition was built onto the rear of the building for a baptistry and classrooms.

In 2002, a separate 2000 square foot fellowship hall, with evangelist quarters, was built on the property.

And, in 2006, the biggest improvement to the building over the years was made.

A beautiful 3,100 square foot sanctuary, which has seating for 250, was built on the side of the building.

The former sanctuary is being remodeled and used for other purposes, such as a nursery, restrooms and classrooms.

Also in 2006, land for a larger parking lot was donated by Clinton Parsons and Kathy Kalunzy.

There have been several Ppastors at Hickory Grove, but most of them in the early days were visting ministers. Pastor Randal Adams has

been at Hickory Grove for the past 34 years, serving since 1974. Adams followed Rev. Donald Wilson, who pastored at the church from 1968 to 1974. Currently the church has an


average Sunday morning attendance of about 100 parishoners and they support missionaries in Mexico and Europe.


Rev. Adams' son, Scott, serves as Youth Pastor and he is also an adult Sunday School teacher. Other Sunday School

This year's legislative session reached the halfway mark this week, a milestone marked by the first bill to pass both

chambers being sent to the governor for his signature.

House Bill 168, if signed into law, will

give returning military service members a 90-day grace period to renew their expired driver's licenses. We have heard stories of soldiers coming home only to be ticketed for driving on an expired license. The transition to civilian life is difficult enough already and we hope this eases the burden.

It is appropriate that the first bill to reach Governor Beshear's desk will make life

Also during the week's work, we had two bills directed at members of the military and their families pass out of Senate committees. Senate Bill 150 would permit the surviving spouse of a former Kentucky National Guard member or a retired veteran to keep special license plates assigned to that member or veteran. Senate Bill 163 authorizes the military family assistance trust fund to be used for educational expenses by Kentucky members or veterans who lost a limb while on military duty.

and promote environmental education.

"I encourage homeowners to take advantage of this opportunity to do the right thing for their own well-being and quality of life in their entire community," said Congressman Hal Rogers (KY-5), who founded PRIDE in 1997. 

The Lady Rockets struggled early, trailing by seven at the end of the first period, 18-11. But they battled back in the second period to hold the Lady Briarjumpers to just four


Rowe, who had 27 points on the night, hit a three pointer as time ran out in the half to give the Lady Rockets a 25-24 lead going into the locker room.


Then in the fourth period, Rowe scored the first five points of the quarter and the team as a whole did a good job of converting their free throws to hold onto the win.













In 1996, Griffith was charged in Rockcastle County with first degree criminal abuse of a child less than 12 years of age and later pled guilty to third degree criminal abuse.

"He is someone that needs to be off the streets while this case is prosecuted," Reynolds said.

done to attract new industry and new commercial businesses or we don't, which is it?" Holton asked the board.

"We hired Jim to help us put ourselves in position to be able to attract new companies to the county and he has certainly done what we are paying him to do. He has got the ball rolling and now we have got to keep it rolling," Craig said.

Rockcastle Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis, who told the Rockcastle Chamber of Commerce last week that the county had to have funding to get things done and to support economic development efforts, said an occupational tax would probably be the best source of funding for economic development. "I recognize something different has to be done because the same process ends with the same results - nothing," Carloftis said.

"Officials with the Economic Development Cabinet in Frankfort are obviously willing to help us, but we've got to show them that we are willing to help ourselves," Carloftis said.

Carloftis said he was also going to do what he could to educate the public and to keep the fiscal court completely informed on what was going on with development efforts.

"They (fiscal court) are going to be involved and informed from day one because, in the end, they will have to make any type of final decisions concerning all of these issues," he added.

At Monday's meeting, Carloftis also said he would bring up the issue of the Land Use Master Plan at the next fiscal court meeting for discussion and he also pointed out that Rockcastle County was the only county in this region of the state that does not have an occupational tax.

The Judge said he was also working on an article himself for publication, to inform the public of the necessity for improvements in the county. Carloftis said his article would be entitled "Ten ways to make sure a county stays poor."

When Holton was speaking to the board, about the proposed county wide occupational tax, he said for things to work correctly the city of Mt. Vernon would have to rescind its current half percent payroll tax which has been in place for five years. Holton said the city would of course be reimbursed with any new county-wide tax and no doubt actually receive more money. Holton said the cities of Livingston and Brodhead should benefit as well

"That is down the road, but I think it is very important that we move on these issues in the next 90 days," Holton said.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Clarice Kirby said she would be willing to explore any options that would allow the city and county to work together, but that she and the council needed to do much more research on the matter. "I certainly do not want to stand in the way of progress, but I have got to make sure we keep the city on solid financial ground, too," she said.

Although the vote Monday was unanimous to proceed with the education of the public and to propose a 2% county occupational tax to the fiscal court, Carloftis, Mayor Kirby and Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash did not vote, because all three of them had already left the meeting.

"Some people may perceive an occupational tax as a negative thing, but what is the alternative? We have got to have funding so that we are not just sitting here spinning our wheels," Craig said.

"We've worked too hard not to take the needed steps to continue to move forward," he added.

For the past several years, economic development efforts in the county have been funded by private businesses and the city of Mt. Vernon.

Citizens Bank, Community Trust Bank, Rockcastle Hospital and the city have contributed thousands of dollars to the effort each year.

Holton told the board that it is estimated that a 2% county-wide occupational tax would generate about \$2 million a year for county coffers.

The fiscal court would be responsible for setting guidelines on how the money is spent but it was obvious at Monday's meeting, that development board members would like to see the bulk of the money spent on economic development efforts, which of course can cover many areas of county and city government.

The next meeting of the development board is scheduled for March 24th at the court-house







FSA Offers Disaster Coverage for Hay and Pasture Losses – March 1st **Signup Deadline**

Anyone counting on a good hay crop and/or adequate pasture for grazing in 2008 should find out more about USDA's Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP). The drought and high temperatures in 2007 affected almost everyone in Kentucky and left many of us scrambling to find extra hay. With the coverage offered though NAP, producers will be better prepared to deal with future hay or pasture shortages.

When natural disaster conditions cause hay and pasture production to fall below 50 percent of normal, this program takes action with payments to assist you with replacing your losses. You can increase your coverage by providing an annual, written record of how much you harvested in past years. This record does not have to be anything official, just something showing how many rolls or bales you made, the average weight of each roll or bale, and the acres of hay that were harvested.

The regular cost of a NAP policy is \$100 and that covers all of a particular crop you have in the county. This covers all land you own and have leased or rented in the county.

Many farmers will be eli-

gible to get this coverage free of charge. You pay nothing for this coverage if you answer "YES" to the following two questions:

Your gross farm sales, for each of the past two years, were \$116,800 per year or less as shown on your Schedule "F" tax form.

In each of the last two years, your total adjusted gross income (income from all household) from your tax return was less than \$19, 350.00 per year.

If you have an interest in hay or pasture acres, take the time to visit your local FSA Office and enroll in this program. RE-MEMBER: March 1, 2008, is the deadline and no late coverage will be offered.

Pear trees are \$18.00 each and include varieties such of:

Seckel, Warren and Kieffer.

While the Kieffer pear is considered self-pollinating; both the Seckel and the Warren pear should have another cultivar for a pollinator.

Grafted Pecan trees are \$30.00 each and include varieties of: Major, Kanza and
