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Graduation at RCHS is 8 p.m. on May 31st

Some have complained, but the Rockcastle County High School graduating class of 2008 will make history on May 31st, when their graduation ceremony takes place at the latest time of the day ever.

RCHS Principal Jennifer Mattingly said Tuesday the late start time was necessary to accommodate all members of the senior class.

The Kentucky State Track meet, which RCHS will participate in, is scheduled for Friday, May 30 and Saturday May 31st and RCHS will have senior members on that team.

"If wouldn't be fair to ask those athletes, who have worked so hard some for several years, to miss the state meet and it would certainly be unfair for them to have to choose between the track meet and graduation," Mattingly said.

The last event at the state track meet, which is being held in Louisville, is at 4 p.m., which will give students enough time to return home for graduation.

Mattingly also said she couldn't move the graduation to Sunday because of seniors who are members of the JROTC, who will be leaving for basic training on Sunday.

"This way no one is left out and every senior will be able to participate in a dignified graduation ceremony," she

The principal said one good thing about the late start time is that Project Graduation will be able to begin very shortly after graduation and again, everyone will be able to attend.

"I hope everyone understands, it was the best thing we could do for the students," Mattingly added.

A Brodhead resident and members of the Brodhead City Council, including Mayor Walter Cash, agree that the city has a problem with stray dogs.

John Burton, who lives on Pike Street, brought the subject up at the council's regular monthly meeting Monday night after he says he encountered problems with a neighbor's dog and with a resident who was walking a dog who was not on a leash.

Burton said he feared for his children, one of whom is 18months-old and for his wife, who has had to call him at work before because of dogs being on the Burton's property and chasing her into her own home.

Burton said recently a Golden Retriever, who was with his owner and walking past his house, attacked his (Burton's) dog, while he was tied up to the house.

"The dog came into my yard, attacked my dog and his owner did nothing to stop it," Burton said.

Burton said when he asked the Brodhead resident, who he says he has known for years, but whom he did not identify, to put his dog on a leash, the

Police find five dead horses, 17 others starving

A 54-year-old man, with a London address, was cited with second degree cruelty to animals on Tuesday afternoon, after police found five dead and 17 starving horses on property on the Robinson Cemetery Road, just off South Upper River Road (Hwy. 89), near the Jackson County line.

According to a citation issued by Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane, Jerry L. Campbell, 54, of Byble Road, London, admitted that the horses belonged to him and that he had not been feeding them.

Lane and Sheriff Mike Peters, along with KSP officers, Scottie Pennington, Coby Smith and Lafe Owens and Deputy Rick Brummett went to the property after police received complaints that horses on the property were in very poor health.

According to Sheriff Peters the horses were grazing on pasture land with very limited browse for the animals to eat.

Lane, who charged Campbell with 22 counts of cruelty to animals, said he (Campbell) stated he had attempted to care for the horses but was overwhelmed by the responsibility of caring for the animals.


The 17 horses still alive, were all in poor health, malnourished, many had mange and numerous bones, including hips, back and ribs were exposed on the horses.

Lane said one of the horses had a halter in its mouth and that the horse's flesh had actually grown around the halter and would have to be surgically removed.

Local veterinarian Dr. James Chism was called to the scene to administer aid to the horses.

Lane said he did not arrest Campbell because he (Campbell) had arranged for a large truck load of hay to be brought in to feed the animals and he (Campbell) said he would do a better job of caring for him.

Lane and Peters said police would monitor the condition of the horses at numerous times before Campbell's May 28th court appearance.

Police investigating home invasion on 618

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said Wednesday that Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane is investigating a home invasion in the Quail community, which occurred on Tuesday morning.

Reynolds said the invasion occurred around 5:30 a.m. at a home on Hwy. 618.

The county attorney said the men were wearing ski masks but apparently identified themsevles as police officers

and were wearing police shirts. Reynolds said officials were releasing very little information about the incident because arrests were imminent.

However the county attorney cautioned residents to not allow anyone inside their house, including police, until they had called 911 to verify that the people are who they say they are.

"Residents should let them stand outside until they have talked to 911," Reynolds said.

The county attorney said that evidence in the case was being sent to the State's Forsenic Lab in Frankfort to help police determine and verify who the intruders were.

Dear Journal:

Spring is bursting out all over and struggling to remove the cold, icy grasp of winter. I've been noticing the grass beginning to burst in to a vibrant green, the beautiful spring flowers coming to life, and right now, the redbuds blooming with the dogwoods soon to follow. This is such a beautiful time of the year.

It's at this time of the year I love to get outside and take in all of the freshness of spring. The other day, Stanley and I took a little trip over to London to visit the library, to eat out, and generally enjoy the day. We decided that it was so pretty, we would get a pizza and eat outside at the park.

On the way through town, I noticed all of the improvements they've been making just in the past three or four years. They've torn down a lot of old, familiar places and dressed up the rest. There is a new elementary school and educational office complex downtown. There are an additional two new wings to the courthouse, a new federal courthouse and annex, a parking garage, and so many new businesses you can't keep count; they seem to spring up almost weekly. They've broken ground on a new hospital, have a new assisted-care facility, and have remodeled and added on to the nursing home. I've even heard of a new mall in the works, with a J.C. Penney or some other major anchor store spoken of recently. There's a theme park, so I hear, in the works as well called "Frontierland." Where is that quaint little southern "onehorse town" that I once knew as a child? It's going with everything else that some of us of a certain age or older remember. It's not that I'm against change and improvements, but it's good to have memories, and as time passes, they become

more special. I remember some of the old houses located along Main Street. There was an old twostory white house with all of the carved wood curly-cues on the porch. It had a huge maple tree in the front yard that was particularly breathtaking in the fall when its leaves turned red and gold. An elderly lady lived there alone, and taught piano for many years.

Just up the street about two blocks from this house was another old white two-story antebellum Southern-plantation style house with huge pillars in the front. Two spinster sisters lived there until they had to go

to the nursing home. One was a noted ballet dancer in New York, for a time.

There were three lunch counters in town located at each drug store. They sure sold some mighty delicious food there. They served breakfast, and had a grill for such things as hamburgers, and they sold various sandwiches as well. Of course they stocked plenty of homemade cakes and pies, along with various ice cream treats. My favorite was the banana split, which cost about a quarter or thirty-five cents. The ice cream cones were about ten cents a scoop. Pop was ten cents a glass, and that was for the large size.

Farther down the way, out near the park entrance, was Finley's Drive-in. On the other end of town was Bruner's Drive-in, and about halfway between was the Dairy Dart Drive-in. Teenagers from back in the fifties through the seventies, when I grew up, would cruise town, circling these establishments. There was a drive-in movie theater on the edge of town where carloads of families would be seen on hot, summery nights and for couples who were dating, was a favorite spot. There were family-owned Mom-and-Pop stores up and down Main Street, with only a handful of those remaining.

All of these are now gone to make room for progress except for a few stores, as I had said and the Dairy Dart that closed and sat empty for a long time. The drive-in has now re-opened under a new name. A lot of the town that I remember is now gone forever.

Even out in the country where my family lived has changed. Once there was a little two-lane road that wove its way through the countryside with family farms and rolling hillsides that supported crops and cattle. Barns dotted the countryside. Now there is a fourlane road, with industrial parks, subdivisions, and big billboards dotting the countryside. The old farmhouses of our friends and neighbors where I once visited and felt right-at-home have been bulldozed down for the sake of progress.

We finally got out to the park with the pizza, but it was too cold and windy to eat the pizza outside. We just sat in the car as we ate and watched others try to stay warm as best they could. There was a wedding that was concluding that had

The glow of Foxfire

A few days ago, I was casually walking my new puppy, Shiloh, through the woods near our home on Furnace Mountain looking for mushrooms when I noticed a large rotting log close to the path. Hoping to see the wrinkled tops of morels, I took a closer look and saw a white fungus growing on the end of the log. The experience made me recall the two times I have seen foxfire in my lifetime.

The term foxfire is a name commonly given to a bioluminescent (life that glows) fungus that grows on rotting wood in moist forests. The fungi usually produce a faint green glow that can only be seen in very dark areas. The light is much like a firefly's light and is an integral part of the decaying process of rotting wood in our forests. The fungi give off no noticeable heat in the course of decompos-

The first time I witnessed the "eerie glow" of foxfire was when my brother, Al, and his friend Dempsey Ramsey let me accompany them into the woods near the Ramsey property behind our small farm. Dempsey's great uncle, Dee Ramsey, actually owned the property.

As I am ten years younger than my big brother, I guess I was about 4 or 5 at the time. They had constructed a small fort in the woods, and we were sitting around a fire listening to the sounds of the forest. As I was walked around the area near the fire, I detected a glow on the moist ground. I asked my brother what it was, and he correctly identified it as foxfire. (Al recently told me that our mother, Bee, usually referred to foxfire as "will o' the wisp" another common name for the

fungus.) I was totally fascinated with the strange light on the ground in the woods, but it seemed awfully creepy. It was almost 'spooky" to a young boy in the dark and scary forest. If my memory serves me correctly, I came back to the fire and sat quite close to big brother Al for the rest of our adventure.

Later, when I was old enough to explore the woods with my own friends, several boys set up a campfire near the property owned by Floyd Carter. As we gathered around it, someone observed that same weird glow near the site we had chosen to build our fire. I do not recall the names of all my friends gathered that night, but I do recollect that Kenneth Hansel, Floyd Carter Jr., and Paul Hansel were there. None of the group had previously experienced the light except me, and I proceeded to tell them what Al had taught me. I think they were shocked to learn that I had already witnessed the strange glow.

Each member of our party carefully surveyed the cool light growing on a log near our campfire. They asked me questions about my previous experience as if I were some sort of expert. I reveled in it – it was awesome to know something about which my friends had no

Ever since I encountered the uncanny "green glow" in my childhood, I have constantly watched for its presence any time I find myself in the woods. On many occasions, I have walked through my own woods carefully checking the ground for a hint of foxfire. My wife and I love to be in the woods at night, which gives us the opportunity to be on the lookout for its cool light.

There was one night of hiking in the woods when I kept an eye out for foxfire. I never saw any - but it was a night to remember. We had walked to the very back of our property, accompanied by our friend, Larry Jefferson. On our way back to our vehicle, we were cautiously walking in single file when we

up, mindful of the complaining bird, I looked back inside and noticed what I assume to be the mother, with her head poked out of a hole in the mess of grass and feathers. She cocked her head sideways, took in the scene, and seemed amused but not the least bit frightened by my presence.

And there's a reason why. I have absolutely no way of knowing for sure, but I would bet a hundred dollars that she is the same Mama who raised two broods of baby wrens on our front porch last spring and summer. One of these broods happened in the top of a Bluegrass Hardware shopping bag sitting

on a bench on my front porch. The bottom half of said shopping bag contained about forty dollars worth of garden seed that I'd purchased the week before.

I had to go back to the store because there was no way I was going to disturb the wrens. I'm currently hoping that last year's mammouth melting sugar peas, bodacious sweet corn, Roma II beans, and couple dozen bedding plant seed will sprout this spring. But that's another story. Suffice to say that I've kept my seed this year in a rubber maid box that is not open to the feathered public.

Later in the summer, the same wrens nested in an asparagus fern hanging right beside out front door and they didn't even complain when we carefully watered the plant while making sure the nest was not disturbed.

So I'm guessing that Mama has found a new man and that he'll get used to me soon enough. I'm also guessing that she figures that as long as she has her nest on something important to me, she will get my attention and I'll pay close attention to her welfare.

And, of course, she's absolutely right. I believe I can get at least one or two knives out from under the nest without bothering the birds when the bluegill commence biting before the first of May, but the whet stone will have to stay there for the next few weeks. When the first brood finally fledges, I'll remove my belongings and build another shelf. I intend to let the nest stay right where it is and hope it becomes a permanent home. Which is to say that I have infinitely more affection for wrens than I do for field mice.

In the meantime, I have found a rat-tail chain saw file in the garage and it has served the purpose needed by my cheese knife. The blade's edge is a bit ragged but the good Wisconsin babySwiss sliced thinly enough and the taste was unaffected. Come Monday I'll venture over to Granny's Amish Country Store on 39 between Crab Orchard and Lancaster to purchase a new whet-stone and one of those dandy little sharpeners for when I'm in a hurry. There's a bunch of other stuff I need from over there anyway and I'm betting the wrens already knew it.











"What Is Written"

The past few weeks we have been discussing the importance of taking things in context. Let's look at another example.

The idea and the word "pastor" is greatly misunderstood by many today. The general theory is that "the pastor" is the loca preacher at a church, who can be a young man, a single man, a married man without children, or a married man with young children. But the way the word is used in the scriptures it refers to the office of a bishop or elder. In Acts.20:11&28 we read 'And from Miletus he sent to Ephesus, and called the <u>elders</u> o the church. . . . Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood." [see also I Pet.5:1-3] Notice Paul is talking to the elders. They are overseers or bishops. They "feed" or pastor the flock of God. Thus the pastors are the bishops who are the elders. Now there are qualifications for those who serve in this capacity, as we read in ITim.3:1-7and in Tit.1:5-9. A pastor or bishop or elder among other things is to be married, having children, having children old enough to be believers. And one more quick point, there are to a plurality of elders or pastors, or bishops in a local church, not just ONE. So we can see how important context is in determining what is right.



Livingston has to void contract with Welding, Inc.

The first major bump in the City of Livingston's ongoing water project came Monday night when they had to vote to void their contract with Welding, Inc., the original successful bidder to construct a new water tank for the town.

The action came after much discussion with Steve Willard, of HMB Engineers, contractors for the job told the council that it was his recommendation that the council void the contract with Welding, Inc. and vote to begin the process to award the contract to the second high bidder, Kentucky Glass Tanks. Willard told the commissioners that Welding, Inc. had asked that the contract be voided, with no penalties invoked. The engineer also told the commissioners that, after consulting with local attorney Bill Gregory, it was his, and Mr. Gregory's opinion, that legal action by the city to recover Welding's performance bond, or to force them to complete the job, would end up costing the city more in legal fees than the bond proceeds, not to mention the delay to the city in getting the tank installed.

Livingston Mayor J.C. Griffin was unhappy with the situation, saying at one point that he disliked "dishonest people (referring to Welding, Inc.)."

However, Commissioner Lorraine Maggard pointed out tthat the city actually had no recourse except to void the contract and proceed with another contractor, and made a motion to that effect. Other commissioners, Lil Griffin and Phillip Doan went along with the recommendation, except that Doan kept asking Willard if the city could at least get a start date from the new contractor.

Willard responded that he had worked with Kentucky-Glass and knew they would do the project as quickly as possible although, Willard said, it would probably be early summer before the project was actually under construction.

Kentucky-Glass's bid was \$4,100 higher than Welding, Inc. and Willard told the council that there was no problem with the city having enough funds in the project to absorb the extra expense

The commissioners also discussed the problem with mud and debris, caused by laying the new water lines and Willard offered to field the complaints from residents for the commission. However, Griffin and David Blackburn both said they would continue to take the calls and only hoped that people would understand that the mess would be cleared up by the contractors once the project of laying the new line was complete. The contractor figured 450 tons of blacktop in their original bid to repair city streets after the project.

In other action, Mayor Griffin reported to the commissioners that he had hired someone who had mowed the park, cleaned up behind city hall, trimmed hedges, etc. and that the Spring PRIDE Clean-up was scheduled for the end of the month.

Financially, the city is still on an even keel with bank balances, as of last Friday, of \$11,200.29 in the general fund and \$5,222.46 in the water revenue account.

As you can imagine, the

community leadership was horrified at the prospect of the company closing. The people who worked at the plant, many of whom had worked there since it originally opened, were devastated and began to wonder what was next. But then, the two groups began to work together to say let's see if there is a way for us to keep our jobs in the community and keep the industry open. At this point, it was a collective effort of local management and workers at the plant, local volunteer and elected leadership, and representatives from state government and private utility companies who all came to the table to try and save the company. And, while ALCOA had no interest in continuing the operation, the team of volunteers, plant workers and elected officials identified another company which was interested in maintaining the operation in Rockcastle County, while at the same time retaining the majority of the workforce at the

plant. It was at this time that Rockcastle County Industrial Development Board, made up of volunteers within the county and Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis, asked me if I would be interested in working with the community to help recruit this new company to the ALCOA existing facility and workforce. I accepted the opportunity and collectively we all began to do what each could do to help the company meet a very tight time schedule to complete the trans-

As you know today, we were fortunate, through hard work, determination and commitment, to achieve our goal of recruiting the company, retaining most of the jobs and saving a plant which was going to close.

Today, the new company, Plasticware, LLC has plans for the expansion of the facility with new equipment, a new production line and the opportunity to reinvest in the plant and the community.

What does that mean for us? It means retaining existing jobs and create new jobs. It means a company which was going to be lost has been revitalized. It means that we drew a line in the dirt and said that, as a community, we will no longer sit back and let bad things happen in our economy without trying to do something about it. While this was purely a "reactive" approach to community economic development, it has set the stage for "proactive" community economic development opportunities to begin to occur in Rockcastle County.

As we begin our proactive efforts to support existing business and industy in Rockcastle County, we must look at understanding their needs, try to create a stronger environment for them to do business and develop resources to support them and the investment they have already

is by allocating a portion of the county's economic development funding for the creation

of a low-interest loan program. As part of how we would use occupational taxes collected for community economic development, I would propose that we establish a low-interest loan program for the existing industry in Rockcastle County. Criteria for eligibility for the funding would include jobs to be created, investment being made by the company and their ability to receive funding from a conventional funding source. Other specific criteria would be developed but, ultimately, our revolving low interest loan fund would be designed to create a perpetual pool of monies which would just continue to grow and be replenished with the payments being made back to the fund by the companies who borrowed the monies. Also, there would be a contribution to the revolving loan fund from our overall economic development funding initially for a period of years

to help get the funds built up. If you wonder why it would be important to create these types of funding resources for existing industries think about this. When you are recruiting new business and industry to the community, you have another recruitment tool to tell them about in your revolving loan program for existing industry. Because when you break ground for their new company and they invest their money and hire our people, they become an existing industry too.

Community economic development is creating the environment for development to occur and when you help existing industry sustain, grow and expand you are showing that business and anyone else looking at Rockcastle County that you are a group of people committed to community economic development.

One indictment from March unsealed

Grand Jury returns five new indictments

A Mt. Vernon man, who had been arrested on March 3rd for trafficking in marijuana, after Deputy Sheriff Joe Rush found four and half pounds of pot in his vehicle during a traffic stop, is in trouble again.

Two days after Nathan T. Stewart, 20, of Brush Creek Circle, was lodged in the Rockcastle Detention Center, on the trafficking charge, he is accused of knowingly introducing marijuana into the jail.

Stewart was one of five people indicted on Friday by a Rockcastle Grand Jury. He is charged with promoting contraband and tampering with physical evidence.

Stewart appeared in Rockcastle District Court on Wednesday of this week where he was released on the same district court bond of \$25,000 property, which he posted after his March 3rd arrest. He was also ordered to wear a monitoring device. He was arrested on the indictment charge last Friday evening, after being indicted on Friday morning.

He will be arraigned on the indictment charge on April 25th but has yet to be indicted on the trafficking charge. He is scheduled for another hearing in that case on May 14th.

Others indicted included: Brian Hellard, 20. of Mt. Vernon, who had been ordered to wear an ankle monitor on March 5th, was indicted for escape, after failing to report to a parole officer at the designated

Duane Carr, 33, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on two counts of receiving stolen prop-

Carr is accused of having property valued at over \$300 in his possession that belonged to Paul Griffin on January 23rd and 24th of this year.

Jake Wagers, 49, of Rt. 1, Mt. Vernon was indicted for possession of a forged prescription, which he tried to get filled at Main Street Pharmacy in Mt. Vernon on February 18th.

Michael Angell, 39, of Whistlin Hollow Road, Mt. Vernon was indicted for second degree burglary and operating a motor vehicle without a license. Angell is accused of trying to enter a dwelling owned by Leonard Barton on March

Indictments against Alvin Knuckles, 39, of Ramsey Trailer Park, were unsealed this week, after he was indicted on two counts of trafficking in Oxycodone and Hydrocodone on May 1st and May 15th of last year.

According to the indicment, Knuckles sold the illegal drugs to a confidential informant.

He was also indicted for being a persistent felony offender. He is currently being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center under a \$50,000 cash bond, after he was arrested on March

He is scheduled for a jury trial in Circuit Court on August






