Campbell has day in court

A London man, who was charged with 21 counts of cruelty to animals after police found five dead and 17 starving horses on property on Robinson Cemtery Road in the southern part of the county a couple of weeks ago, has had his day in court.

Rickles gets 57 months for bank robbery

Joshua Shane Rickles, 28, of Brodhead, was sentenced Tuesday afternoon to 57 months in prison by a U.S. District Judge for robbing Citizens Bank in Brodhead, according to a news release from the U.S. Attorney's Office.

According to the release, Rickles pled guilty in January of this year and admitted that on the morning of October 17th of last year, he robbed the bank in Brodhead at gunpoint.

A bank teller reported to police that Rickles approached her, wearing a camouflage jacket and ski mask, pointed a handgun at her and demanded money.

According to the release, Reppert emptied her drawer and Rickles grabbed approximately \$3,750 and drove off.

Shortley after the robbery, police obtained information from witnesses at Brodhead Farm Equipment, which is located near the bank, about a suspicious vehicle and occupant who had been hanging around the area prior to the rob-

According to the release, their description of the vehicle matched the description of those who witnessed the bank

Kentucky State Police arrested Rickles a short time later in Berea, after taking him in for questioning. Rickles admitted to the crime at the time of his arrest.

Under federal law, Rickles must serve 85 percent of his prison sentence and, upon his release, will be under the supervision of the United States Probation Office for five years.

Garrett Dale Stewart charged with assault after shooting his son

A preliminary hearing has been scheduled for next Monday for a local man charged with first degree assault, after police say he shot his own son, last Friday.

Garrett Dale Stewart, 52, of Orlando was released from the Rockcastle Detention Center on Monday, after filling a \$50,000 property bond after spending the weekend in jail.

According to Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane, police were called to Stewart's residence around 7:20 p.m. after Stewart apparently shot his son, Travis, 31, in the stomach. Lane said a verbal alterca-

Lambert to step down as state's **Chief Justice**

After a decade as chief justice, and nearly 22 years as a justice of the Supreme Court of Kentucky, Chief Justice Joseph E. Lambert, of Mt. Vernon has decided to leave the court and join the Senior Judge Program. His resignation will be effective June 27, 2008.

"We have made great progress in the last decade to improve Kentucky courts and make them more responsive to the needs of Kentucky's families and children," said Chief Justice Lambert. "As with any individual's efforts, however, there comes a time to move on.

"I believe it's a mistake to remain for too long in a highlevel position in government,"



Rockcastle Memories

Jewell T delivery

Anyone remember the Jewell T trucks coming to your home? Growing up on a small farm on the outskirts of Mt. Vernon in Rockcastle County during the late 40's and early 50's, I certainly do.

In those days many housewives did not drive, including my grandmother (Mommie Katie). She and I were the members of the family who waited anxiously for the Jewell T guy to show up with his truck full of "goodies." He came around about every two weeks. If the item we wanted was not on his truck, he made sure he brought it when he came back the next time.

Frank Vernon Skiff was the fellow who actually started the business in 1899 in New York. He had \$700 in cash, a horse, wagon, and an idea to operate a business offering freshly roasted coffee (delivered daily) to the consumer with a door-todoor approach. A brown panel truck eventually replaced the horse drawn wagons. It was filled with coffee, tea, spices, toilet products, grocery and household items, Amway products, Tupperware, and even some toys.

The business also offered coupons that a customer could accumulate and eventually trade in for additional items, such as "Autumn Leaf" dinnerware. The truck came at the same time on the same day every two weeks. Their products were covered with a moneyback guarantee. At one time, Jewell Tea became the sixthlargest retailer in the country. By 1916, the company operated 1,645 routes across the continental U.S.

My grandfather (Pop) was a traveling salesman for Louisville Grocery Company and Aubrey Feed Mills, also located in Louisville. Each week he traveled around the Rockcastle and several adjacent counties taking orders for groceries and feed. A truck would deliver his products a few days after he dropped off the orders at the L&N Depot in Mt. Vernon. On many occasions, he allowed me to go with him as he sold his goods throughout Rockcastle County. He knew everyone, and he loved his job.

For this reason, Pop was not too fond of the Jewell T delivery system. He thought that they took away from his "store orders." I distinctly remember him telling Mommie Katie that

she should be buying her supplies from the local grocery stores that he dealt with in his business. She responded that some items she purchased were not available in the local stores.

I certainly did not want Mommie to stop trading with the Jewell T guy. The basic reason that I looked forward to his arrival was that she often bought me a toy of my choos-

I remember a cool little truck just like the one driven by the Jewell T man that she purchased for me. I loved that toy truck so much, and I kept it for a very long time. I recently found one like it on the internet, and it is now worth lots of money. I, of course, have no idea of whatever happened to

During WWII, women replaced men in operating the service routes, causing many routes to be reduced. The company was also hit hard when sugar and coffee were rationed. Drivers then began to distribute catalogs to their established customers. Orders were taken bi-weekly and filled through the mail. As a matter of fact, Jewell was the first homeshopping service to introduce a catalog.

There is one incident in particular that I recall about the Jewell T company that involved me personally. I was in the sixth grade, and I had a girlfriend. (Sorry y'all, I don't remember which gal it was!) When her birthday rolled around, I wanted to get her a gift, and good ole Mommie Katie came through for me

She let me pick out a small bottle of perfume to give to my girl. I have no idea why I remember this, but I can tell you for certain that the name of it was "Radio Girl." And if memory serves, the bottle cost about 50 cents. The young lady was very appreciative, and I received a kiss on the cheek in return for my thoughtfulness. (I wonder if she still remembers receiving perfume on her twelfth birthday

Mommie Katie always purchased Jewell T Cocoa, which came in a metal box. Everyone thought her hot cocoa and chocolate milk were the best, and I knew the secret of where she got the ingredients for her wonderful concoctions. She often reminded me to keep her

Dear Journal:

I've just gotten home from a trip to Ohio. I had been gone Friday through Sunday on a church-related trip, a gathering of the brethren from Kentucky, Pennsylvania, and Ohio who met there in Columbus for two services.

I left Friday morning. It seemed everything bad happened before I left from having to end up having to drive one of Stanley's cars because mine was acting up to both of us being locked out of the house. It was one of those mornings that if anything could go wrong, it would. I wondered, since all of this was happening before leaving, what would happen on the way.

I was traveling with a girlfriend of mine who also attends church with me. We stopped in Lexington near an exit to get something to drink and some snacks to eat along the way, and use the bathroom. I know it almost contradicts itself, but we didn't care. We were two women on a road trip, and we could stop for bathroom breaks as much as we wanted, and who knows how many times that could be.

The day was picture-perfect for travel. The temperature was just right, with no rain and a nice breeze blowing. We even had the sunroof open for a while. We were passing a lot of bluegrass rippling in the breeze. The ankle-deep grass looked almost like ocean waves being tossed to and fro in a gale. The grass was so green and fresh looking, I suppose it tasted very good to the cattle and the horses we saw grazing in the distance. Speaking of horses, we saw quite a few grazing in the Lexington/Georgetown area. The rows and rows of meandering white fences were quite picturesque, especially near the Kentucky Horse Park. The whole area was suitable to be put on a postcard. These scenes could rouse the pride of any Kentuckian, making them eager for the other travelers, especially those from out of state, to be overtaken with the beauty our state has to offer.

We traveled yet farther, crossing over into Ohio. It was early afternoon by now, and there was not much traffic out, so we made good time going through Cincinnati. On north of Cincinnati, the lay of the land began to change, and before long we were in the middle of what looked to be a vast open prairie. There were nothing but barren fields, for the most part, awaiting spring planting for miles except for the occasional barn and the old turn-of-the-19th-century farmhouses dotting the countryside.

These old farms and farmhouses were an Americana treasure. They were located a mile or two apart, and each one had its own unique charm. As I was driving, I thought that, at one time, all of these old houses held big farming families with a half-dozen or so children each. All of the neighbors knew each other in these little farming communities, attended the same little church, and their children attended the same oneroom school. The church and the school building probably functioned for both. I can almost imagine their lifestyle; get up early every morning, work hard all day, go to bed early, and get ready to go again the next morning. They probably enjoyed simple entertainment; quilting, bean stringing, soap making, and the occasional barn raising or square dance.

They, too, probably had their

share of church socials, pie sup-

State cuts for public defenders is shortsighted...

Dear Editor,

Our new state budget has shortsightedly slashed funds for public defenders. Every dollar we cut, by denying legal defense to accused, costs us ten dollars in penitentiary costs from the inflated sentences of "innumerable innocent boys and girls and men and women who plead guilty because they are too dazed to understand their rights and legal position and they can better stand the disgrace than the money loss" - reformist Clara

The proof is in the pudding. Kentucky has the fastest growing prison population in America. America has the highest prison rate in the world. Over 80% of those we hold captive are non-violent, no more dangerous than you or me. But, after a few year's service, an underpaid (or unpaid) public defender may feel that they can better their career by saving expense for the court and throwing the poor on the mercy of the prosecutor.

There has been some wonderful talk (just talk, so far) about reducing the number of Kentuckians held captive. But, if we abridge the rights of the accused, then any reduction in prisons out the back door will just be a green light for the courts to pitch more of our mothers and fathers and sons and daughters back in the prisons' front door again. Instead, we can save money by focusing on an ounce of defense prevention (not to mention an ounce of justice and equity) rather than a pound of cure.

In the meantime the little fish gets put in a cell of sorts---a 1 cubic foot box that will submerge in the aquarium to allow fish to get acclimated before they are released. And that where it stayed for a week while she tried to determine what it was, if not a piranha.

Turns out that, after an intensive internet search, the juvenile fish is a pacu which is a piranha cousin, also with a mouth full of sharp teeth, and is supposed to grow up to 24 inches long. The minimum aquarium size for pacus is 250 gallons. Ours hold 55. And besides that, what do you feed such a critter?




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







bill will be issued a Certificate of Delinquency which represents a lien upon the real estate described on the face of the tax bill.

"Those Certificate of Delinquencies will be filed in the county clerk's office and interest at the rate of 12% per annum will accrue upon this certificate from the date of issuance, plus other d fees put on by the company or people who purchase them," Bullen said.

One property owner, who purchased land here in 2004 and was told by the company selling the property that they had taken care of the 2004 taxes, was before the fiscal court earlier this year with his tale of woe.

It seems that the company didn't pay the tax for 2004 but he wasn't aware of it until 2007 when he received a letter from the company who purchased the delinquent tax bill. The bottom line was that he had to pay over \$1500 for a tax bill that was originally for just over \$400.

Over the past several years company have purchased tax bills from County Clerk Norma Houk in bulk.

In 2006, two companies paid the county \$236,000 to purchase delinquent tax bills from previous years.

Bullen said that taxpayers can purchase their own bills, even though someone else has bid on them before and during next Thursday's sale.

"All property owners, who owe a tax bill will have the right to pay their taxes and avoid any problems down the road,"

Bullen said. Houk and Bullen both cautioned all Rockcastle property owners to make sure their taxes for 2007 have been paid by calling the Sheriff's office at (606) 256-2032.

Bullen said some property owners may not have received their tax bills because of address changes brought on by road name changes to facilitate 911 and in some cases a mortgage company may have been responsible for the property taxes and did not pay them.

"It is just better to make sure you've got a receipt and or a canceled check - or just to call," Bullen said.

According to state law, after 10 percent of the county's delinquent tax bills are sold next Thursday, the Sheriff's office is required to call the state to see if the state's Finance and Admin-

istration Cabinet wants to buy the bills themselves, in order to keep the state lien on the property, according to Bullen.

However, if the state chooses not to purchase the remaining bills, then County Clerk Norma Houk has a process to go through before the bills can be offered to a third party no sooner than May 15th. "This will probably involve a lottery among the companies wanting to purchase the bills,' Houk said.

Illegal brush fire at Burr Quarry

Local State Forest Ranger Marvin Stone was called to investigate a report of a fire, shortly after midnight last Wednesday, April 23rd, in the old Burr Quarry area at Burr Hill.

According to Rockcastle County Solid Waste Coordinator James Renner, when Stone arrived he found several large piles of illegally dumped brush which had been set on fire. Stone had to call out other forestry personnel to help control the

Renner said the crew had to put lines around the fire in order to keep it under control and that the fire could have easily spread to surrounding areas, which included Peg's Food Market and a mobile home court on top of the hill.

"In addition to being a danger to surrounding businesses and homes, the thick smoke that came from the fire created a driving hazard on I-75 and US 25 for a while on Wednesday night," Renner said.

The Soild Waste Coordinator said, Rockcastle County Ordinance 90-3 and three state laws make it clear that it is illegal to dump trash, brush, limbs, yard debris, dirt, rock or anything else in the old Burr Quarry "or anywhere else for that matter."

"When people dump garbage and or brush and debris, it costs you, the taxpayer money. To cleanup the trash that was thrown out in the Old Burr Quarry it cost Rockcastle County approximately \$1,900 in equipment and labor and approximately \$300 in disposal of the trash alone. That is approximately \$2,200 of your tax dollars spent to clean up someone else's mess," Renner said.

The Soild Waste Coordinator is asking for help to stop illegal dumping in Rockcastle County.

"Report anyone that you see dumping trash or brush to the Rockcastle County Soild Waste Office at (606) 256-1902," Renner requested.



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

tention of serving only two four-year terms. However, due to a massive number of judicial elections in 2006 and due to significant changes in the makeup of the Supreme Court at that time, I felt a duty to stay through the period of transition. I'm happy to say that the Court of Justice continues to operate smoothly and this is an appropriate time for me to move on to other professional opportunities."

Chief Justice Lambert, 59, was first elected to the Supreme Court in 1986 from the 27 southeastern Kentucky counties of the 3rd Supreme Court District. He was subsequently re-elected in 1994 and 2002. He become Kentucky's fourth chief justice in October 1998 by a vote of his fellow justices. Chief Justice Lambert was later re-elected to two additional four-year terms as chief justice, in 2002 and in 2006.

Reflecting on his tenure, Chief Justice Lambert said, "Serving on the Supreme Court and as chief justice has been the greatest privilege of my life. I have had the honor of serving with 26 outstanding men and women, every one of whom has been a fine legal scholar and a thoroughly honorable person.'

Seven justices sit on the Supreme Court, Kentucky's highest court. They are elected from seven appellate court districts and serve eight-year terms. The Kentucky Constitution provides that the justices elect one of their fellow justices to serve as chief justice for a term of four years. The chief justice is executive head of the statewide judicial system. He oversees the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) in Frankfort and the 4,000 statewide employees of the Kentucky Court of Justice, including elected justices, judges and circuit court clerks. The chief justice proposes a biennial budget to the General Assembly and executes the Judicial Branch bud-

During Chief Justice Lambert's 10-year tenure, the Kentucky Court of Justice has made great strides in Family Court, judicial facilities, court technology, Drug Court, judicial education, pretrial services and diversity awareness.

The Chief Justice considers passage of the Family Court constitutional amendment in 2002 to be one of his most significant accomplishments. In the last decade, Kentucky has earned a national reputation for Family Court, court facilities improvement, Drug Court and many other cutting-edge initiatives.

As a justice of the Supreme Court, Chief Justice Lambert authored more than 400 published opinions of the Court and scores of dissenting and concurring opinions. In addition, he has authored more than 500 memorandum opinions. Chief Justice Lambert has been a frequent lecturer at bar conferences and has authored articles for publication in scholarly journals and the Kentucky Bar Association's Bench and Bar magazine. He has also participated in numerous national legal education events as an invited speaker or panelist. As chief justice, he has been an active member of the national Conference of Chief Justices and was elected to serve on its

board of directors.

In 2000, the Kentucky Bar Association named him Outstanding Judge of Kentucky. He is a former board member of the Conference of Chief Justices and a former regent of Eastern Kentucky University. He currently serves as board chair of the Kentucky Judicial

Form Retirement Plan. The Kentucky Department of Public Advocacy gave Chief Justice Lambert its Public Service Award in 2006. In 2004, he received the Civil Rights Award from both the Northern Kentucky NAACP and the Lexington NAACP for his commitment to eliminating discrimination. In 2003, he was awarded the Kentucky Bar Association President's Special Service Award. He was given the Kentucky Public Advocate Award in 2001. In 2000, the National Association of Drug Court Professionals gave him its Leadership Award.

In October 2007, U.S. Chief Justice John G. Roberts Jr. appointed Chief Justice Lambert to membership on the Committee on Federal-State Jurisdiction of the Judicial Conference of the United States.

He holds a bachelor's degree from Georgetown (Ky.) College and a juris doctor from the University of Louisville Brandeis School of Law, which gave him its Distinguished Alumni Award. He has received honorary doctor of laws degrees from Georgetown College, Eastern Kentucky University and Northern Kentucky University Chase College of

Clarice Kirby. "And through their project, they are helping us to get assistance with rebuilding a vital component of the community's infrastructure."

The Hanson \$6 million facilities expansion project includes major construction on the existing Hanson site in the county. The project plans call for the company to construct an on-site "rail loop" which will feed rail cars with the ultra-pure limestone from a silo and conveyor system. The rail cars will then be pulled into the Hanson site with the same CSX engines which will haul the limestone to the power plant in Georgia. It will take approximately 5-6 hours to load the 60 cars attached to the train, while still in motion, with about 1,200 tons of material being loaded per hour. Initially, the project will be providing 30 train loads per year to the one power plant but the company sees the number of cars increasing to 100 train loads per year with additional customers added.

Another positive environmental impact of the project is the bi-product created at the coal fired power plants. When a slurry of ultra-pure limestone mixes with the hot exhaust gasses of coal combustion, a cleaning process of the sulfur dioxide occurs, a chemical reaction takes place which creates a "synthetic gypsum" which can then be used in the manufacture of wallboard or drywall.

Construction on the project has already begun with site preparation work but the largest portion of the site work will involve the creation of a "loop cut" to create a level platform for the rail site to match the existing rail grade. Also included in the project will be the construction of an on-site bridge to span over the "rail loop" to provide access to and from the Hanson site when trains are on the property being loaded. It is anticipated that the "loop cut" will be completed by December of this year. All aspects of the project

. All aspects of the project should be completed and in place by June 2009 to begin shipping product to the customer by July 2009.

Hanson Aggregates is a subsidiary of the Heidelberg Cement Group, which is one of the 5 largest construction materials supply companies in the world today.

The local plant, which began 100 years ago as Kentucky Stone, currently employs 12 people.



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

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
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Reducing fertilizer costs

With skyrocketing prices for fertilizer, tobacco growers are looking for ways to reduce their fertilizer bill. One of the easiest ways is to reduce overall fertilizer costs by applying only the nutrients needed by the crop. How much does the crop really need? The only way to know for sure is to have a soil test run. A soil test will identify situations where phosphorous (P), potash (K) or lime is needed to avoid yield loss. However, many tobacco patches have historically received annual applications of complete fertilizer like 5-10-15. As a direct result, these soils are often high in P or K and do not need additional amounts to produce a good tobacco crop.

On soils where P and K are required, banding is generally more efficient than broadcast application. Research on K deficient soils has demonstrated that placing the fertilizer in two bands 4 inches from the

row reduced the amount required by about 30%. Placing fertilizer in a wide band beneath the row was even more efficient than drill bands near

There is no reliable test for measuring the capability of a soil to supply nitrogen (N) to a crop, so N recommendations are based only on crop history of the site and soil drainage. For most soils where tobacco is grown, optimum nitrogen rates are 225 lbs. N per acre or less. Rarely would more than 225 lbs. be necessary under normal growing conditions. With the high cost of N it does not make sense to apply additional N with little or no likelihood of a response. Growers who side dress N will generally see an improvement of efficiency of about 25 lbs. N per acre. In other words, if a recommendation called for 225lbs. N a grower could expect to get the same result from 200 lbs if 1/2 or more of the

Strengthen your immune system with proper nutrition

There has never been a more important time for individuals to assure themselves of a healthy immune system. The best way to combat illness is through a healthy immune system...

The human immune system has many processes with one of three particular jobs to do; stopping disease from entering the body; killing bacteria or viruses once they enter the body before they make you sick; and destroying viruses and/or bacteria after they have created disease. The immune system can only accomplish these goals if it is healthy enough.

Achieving a healthy immune system starts with a solid foundation: good nutrition. Good nutrition can help you develop the best possible immune system which will increase the ability of your body to know that a virus has entered it - lowering your chances of getting sick; increase the ability of your body to attack the virus, helping you fight off an illness once you get it and provide "reserves" that can be used

when you are too ill to eat. A healthy immune system takes time to build, it cannot be created overnight. The body must be given the building blocks daily to ensure a healthy immune system. In order to allow for these building blocks to be delivered properly, and to receive this good nutrition, you need to start eating healthy now.

The first step to eating healthy is eating many different types of foods every day. Eating a variety of foods from day to day will also improve your nutrition and thus, your immune system. Include at least five vegetables every day. One serving is approximately a half cup or an average size piece of fruit. You should make these choices a variety of colors as well. Include

three servings of low-fat dairy each day. One serving is one cup of milk/yogurt or one ounce of

Add six or more servings of whole grain breads and cereals to your meals each day. One serving is one slice of bread, one cup of dry cereal or a half-cup cooked rice, cereal or pasta. Protein must not be left out of your daily intake. Most people need two servings of protein each day. One serving is a piece of meat the size of a deck of cards, two eggs or two tablespoons of peanut butter. Choose low-fat options as frequently as possible.

All foods as they are grown are good foods. However, some foods are packed with nutrients and phytochemicals, compounds found in foods that have special benefits to health. Many of these compounds are found in the fruit and vegetable groups. Some fruits high in phytochemicals are blueberries, cherries, strawberries, red grapes, oranges, plums, blackberries and raspberries. Some vegetables with these beneficial nutrients are Brussels sprouts, broccoli, kale, beets, red bell peppers, corn, onions, eggplant and spinach.

Strengthening your immune system can greatly increase your chances of fighting off disease and doing this starts with good nutrition. Good nutrition can be achieved through proper eating habits and a good balance of the foods you need from day to day.

total was side-dressed by 3 to 4 weeks after planting. Growers should compare

unit prices on different sources of N to determine the most economical source available. Often the per unit cost of Urea or UAN solutions are 5 to 10 cents less than that of ammonium nitrate. These sources can be used on tobacco without causing harm to the crop as long as they are used at appropriate rates as discussed above. Fertilizers containing urea should be incorporated with a day or two of application, or treated with a urease inhibitor to reduce the potential for gaseous losses of N.
