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London man dies in ATV accident

A London man died from blunt force trauma to the chest Monday evening after being involved in an ATV accident in southern Rockcastle County, near the Rockcastle River.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said Justin Samples, 20, of Oak Hill Drive, London, was riding on ATV trails in the Lunar section of the county, off River Road, when he hit a steel cable that had been stretched across a very muddy, dirt roadway, apparently by a private land owner. The trail was in a remote, rugged area of the county.

Dowell said Samples appeared to have died instantly from the impact, which knocked him off the ATV. Dowell said Samples had to have been traveling pretty fast when he hit the cable, which was attached to a tree, because the staples that were holding the cable in place were pulled

First reading of occupational tax passed by Fiscal Court

It wasn't a huge outcry but there were 25 citizens on hand for Tuesday's called meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court for the first reading of an occupational tax ordinance which, if imposed, will cost workers in Rockcastle County an additional 1.5% from their pay check, beginning July 1st.

For several months the county has been struggling with an impending deficit for next fiscal year of around a half million dollars and, representatives of the Governor's Office for Local Development (GOLD), finally stepped in and gave the court no choice but to bring in additional revenue to cover the deficit and present their office with a balanced budget by June 30th.

The court had only three options: increasing the current

4% insurance tax, tripling the property tax rate or imposing the occupational tax. The insurance tax must be amended within a certain time frame each year and the court had missed that window of opportunity; a property tax increase would have been subject to recall on the November ballot -- and tripling the rate would have just about assured that it would have been recalled -- or the occupational tax.

Of the 25 present for the meeting, Angela Mink, asst. manager for Denny's Restaurant in Mt. vernon, was the most outspoken, telling the court, "I can't hardly get people to work for minimum wage now and I can't pay them more. They'd rather be on welfare

Three fallen Rockcastle County lawmen honored in ceremony Wednesday

Three Rockcastle County lawmen, who died in the line of duty in a 20 year span of time from 1932 to 1952, were honored in a memorial service last Wednesday, along with 22 other fallen officers, by the Department of Criminal Justice Training in Richmond.

The ceremony was held at the Kentucky Law Enforcement Training Complex on the EKU Campus.

Those honored were Sheriff Noah J. Tipton, 50, who was shot to death on January 16th of 1932.

According to records from the *Signal* Tipton was shot on a Saturday night in Mt. Vernon by a state reformatory guard, who had brought a prisoner to the county to testify in a trial. The trial was in connection with the closing of Peoples Bank in 1930.

His daughter, Wathalene Fairchild was on hand to accept the American Flag in his honor. Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff

Charlie Ramsey, 42, died on November 27 of 1943.

Ramsey was shot as he attempted to break up a fight on Main Street in Mt. Vernon on a Saturday night, according to family members.

Ramsey was taken to the

hospital in London and died a few weeks after the shooting from penumonia, which he developed because of the gunshot. A local man was arrested and charged with the shooting.

Rockcastle Sheriff Mike Peters accepted the flag in Ramsey's honor and memory.

Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Leonard Davis died on December 4th of 1952.

According to *Signal* records, Davis died of a massive heart attack, after a failed bank robbery in Mt. Vernon.

After fleeing the bank, the robber caused a wreck on U.S. 25, which killed the robber and

Brock, an outspoken critic of any new tax, will be replaced by Carl Bustle.



Early TV Ads

My wife and I received a boxed set of old programs from the Ed Sullivan show from a good friend of ours at Christmas last year. They actually showcase the performances of Elvis. But while watching them, we were not only impressed by the talented acts that appeared on the popular program, we have been fascinated by seeing old advertisements again.

The Ed Sullivan Show was a television variety show that aired from June 20, 1948 until June 6, 1971. It was hosted by former entertainment columnist Ed Sullivan. It ran on CBS on Sunday evenings at 8 pm, and most of America was tuned

One of the first ads that I noticed was for Lucky Strike cigarettes. The ad explained, "Lucky Strike is the best made of all five principal brands." Just the mention of cigarette brands immediately called my mother (Bee) to my mind. And no, she was not a smoker heaven forbid!

I distinctly remember when my mother was working at the Mt. Vernon Greyhound Bus Station in the '50's. They had a cigarette machine (you remember the old mechanical type) which only took quarters. A pack of cigarettes only cost 22 cents. Therefore, my mother used a razor blade to slice open the side of each package and insert three pennies in order to give the correct change for a quarter. On the bottom of each pack of Lucky Strikes these letters were printed: LSMFT – a reference to their motto "Lucky Strike Means Fine Tobacco."

Another ad that captured my attention was that of Dinah Shore singing, "See the USA in your Chevrolet...." The popular jingle began in 1952, and it became Dinah's signature song. From 1957 until 1962, she hosted her own show on NBC sponsored by Chevrolet. Each week, she sang the jingle and the entire country sang along with her: See the USA in your Chevrolet America is asking you to call Drive your Chevrolet through the USA

the levee Performance is sweeter Nothing can beat her Life is complete in a Chevy o make a date today to see the USA

And see it in your Chevrolet

Another ad that was one of my favorites was for Alka Seltzer. Unlike other radio and television sponsors, Alka Seltzer provided its own sound effects. All the announcer had to do was hold a glass full of water next to the microphone and drop two tablets into the water; and the listeners heard a refreshing sound. "Plop-plop, fizz-fizz, oh what a relief it is." The mascot Speedy had a squeaky voice and pop eyes. His hat was an Alka Seltzer. He always said, "Get the feel better feeling with Alka Seltzer."

Brylcreem (pronounced brill-cream) also had a catchy jingle on the Ed Sullivan show. A cream that kept hair in place while giving it a deep shine and gloss, it was formed by combining water, mineral oil, and beeswax. Actually, it was a lighter version than what was commonly referred to at the time as "that greasy kid stuff." The lyrics to the jingle will be familiar to anyone from that

If you smoke, stop.4. If you drink alcohol, use moderation.5. Find out if you have high cholesterol. If so, work with your doctor to control it.6. If you are diabetic, follow your doctor's recommendations carefully to control your diabetes.7. Include exercise in the activities you enjoy in your daily routine. Even a brisk walk is good.8. 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

Upset over tax...

Dear Editor,

I am writing this letter to express my concern regarding a recent experience with our county government. I received information concerning a decision that would be discussed during a meeting of the Fiscal court, which has a direct effect on me personally, and also on all citizens that work in Rockcastle County. Since I did not know of this issue until approximately one hour prior to the meeting, I called my magistrate to express my concerns about this issue. As you have probably guessed the issue being discussed is the occupational tax that the county is implementing to balance the county budget.

I attended the meeting, at which I was able to gain some insight into the reason for the occupational tax. What I was able to glean from the meeting was that the county owes \$500,000, some of it borrowed from various designated budgets. The county has borrowed

money from designated budgets and grants in order to balance the budget in the past. The state is now saying that the county must repay this money, because money spent from a designated budget must only be used for that purpose. Because the budget must be balanced by the end of the fiscal year, the money will be taken directly out of our paychecks. This is not a sudden occurrence; the county has known for some time that it cannot meet these obligations. They are being forced into action by the state government.

There were several concerned citizens and business owners at this meeting and essentially all concerns that were voiced were met with "we have no other choice". It was also expressed during this meeting that the budget concerns could be met with a 1% increase. An increase of 1 % was passed to allow for economic growth. I would ask Mr. Carloftis and the magistrates that support this tax, if the idea of economic growth for the county as a whole is going to make a difference to the people struggling to pay their bills and put food on the table. I also ask you how the current business owners that have chosen Rockcastle County feel about the tax. I presume you would at least like to consider the opinions of the business owners that are already contributing to the county's economy when making these important decisions. I saw many business leaders in the room that were opposed to

I would like to comment that it seems that there has not been adequate information given to the people of the county in a timely manner. The information on this issue has been given out sparingly, mostly by word of mouth, which makes it difficult for the issue to be given adequate consideration by the public. On a positive note, I learned from attending this meeting that we do have employers in this county that will stand up for the rights and welfare of their employees.

In conclusion, I would like to remind the people in the county government who supported and played a part in implementing this tax that you are an elected official, put in the position you are in by the will of the people. I feel that the decisions you are making and the seeming mismanagement of our county government will affect future election results. I have discovered the importance of being aware of the activities of my local government. I encourage my fellow residents of Rockcastle County to increase your awareness of these issues that may have a profound affect on your daily

ioned way, the Pioneer Weapons Wildlife Management Area includes more than 7,000 acres where only primitive weapons may be used.

Collectors of Civil War artifacts will want to visit the Swamp Valley Museum, located halfway between Possum Hollow and Lizard Ridge in Menifee County.

Here, housed in several buildings, are items ranging from equipment used by midwives to a coffin-making shop.

Just seven miles from Journey's Inn, the Frenchburg School campus is a place worth checking out. This is the site of a school established by the Presbyterian Church in the early 1900s. Still standing are buildings that included dormitories and a hospital. It was the only high school in Menifee County until a modern public school was opened in 1958.

While in town, take a short walk down one of several trails and discover Donathan Rock. This massive boulder is spectacularly balanced on an out-I'd fill pop cans half- full of cropping of rock atop a hill overlooking Frenchburg.

> Outside the courthouse, a marker notes the county was named for Richard H. Menefee, a well-regarded statesman and successful lawyer. The misspelling of the county name occurred in the legislature when the county was chartered. At age 32, he was the youngest person to have a county named for him.

> Back at Journey's Inn, Danny and Jessica aren't concerned with how their names are spelled. They just want people to come sit around the pool for a spell after experiencing all the area has to offer.

"Once people come, they don't want to leave," said Danny.

"We're hoping to be here another two or three years ourselves."

During the time church members met in the Brush Arbor, Omer McNew was the caretaker.

McNew Chapel has had several pastors, including Eugene Gentry and Elmer Oakley and their current Pastor Jerry Ballinger has been the preacher on two different occasions.

Tim Singleton serves as asst. pastor and Donnie







"What Is Written"

In 1 Timothy 2:11-12 Paul says, "Let the woman learn in silence with all subjection. But I suffer not (permit not ASV) a voman to teach, nor to usurp authority over the man, but to be in silence." Women are in a role of subjection in relationship to men, both in the home and in the church. God has ordained this functional subordination. Paul spoke of this principle of neadship in 1 Corinthians 11:3 "But I would have you know, that the head of every man is Christ; and the head of the woman is the man; and the head of Christ is God." Women's role of subjection does not mean that she is sub-human any more than God being the head of Christ, that this somehow would make Christ sub-Deity. Women can teach other women, Titus 2:3-4; women can teach children, 2 Timothy 1:5, 3:15; women can teach men, Acts 18:26; women can teach in the church, Col. 3:16, Eph.5:19. Yes, she can teach anyone, anytime, anywhere as long as she is in her role of subjection, and is not usurping authority over the man. It's rather shocking that you will hear of various churches of men to have women who are preaching to congregations, leading in prayers at the assemblies, leading the singing, being appointed as "elders and deacons." Such actions are a clear violation of what Paul was teaching.







RCHS girls' track team sets sights on first outdoor state title

Fresh off their dominating regional championship performance from a little over a week ago, the RCHS girls' track team is headed for the Class 2A State Track and Field Championships with one goal in mind their first outdoor state championship title.

Last week, RCHS took home their fifth regional title in a row, defeating runner-up Casey County by an amazing 78 points. This marked the 8th title for the RCHS girls' track team in the last nine years. The team has an incredible run of eleven straight top two regional

finishes, including three regional runner-up performances along with their eight regional titles. Several RCHS competitors finished in the top two state qualifying positions at region, while several others scored in the top six.

After a disappointing start which saw the girls' 3200-meter relay team disqualified due to a technicality, RCHS rebounded with a state championship caliber meet performance. The girls' 3200-meter relay team of Laura Dollins, Deana Gabbard, Michaela Hunter, and Sara Hammond

qualified for state with an awesome second place finish, but had their performance nullified when an official ruled they cut in before the allowable break point. Unclear instructions from the meet official and a poorly marked track, which had cones everywhere but their proper locations, led to the confusion. Despite an appeal, the official's ruling was upheld. The team would have likely finished in the top three at state.

Senior Morgan Thacker led RCHS at region with several sensational performances, capping off a brilliant season and career. Morgan leaped an incredible 18'3.5" in long jump, breaking her own RCHS record in the event and winning the regional championship title. She had another 18' plus effort as well in the greatest series of jumps ever for a RCHS female athlete. She also attained Milesplit National Elite status for her outstanding effort and

recorded the top long jump mark in the entire state this season. Morgan also won the 100-meter dash regional title with an awesome effort of 13.14 seconds. In triple jump, Morgan also took home the regional crown, jumping an impressive 34'1.25". Morgan placed 2nd in the 200-meter dash with a superb race and a state-qualifying effort of 26.82.

Sophomore Samantha Smith played an integral role in Rockcastle's dominating win, much as she has all season. Samantha won the 200meter dash regional title in an awesome new personal best 26.46 seconds, the second fastest time in Class 2A heading into state. In the long jump competition, Samantha leaped an incredible 16'7.5" and finished as regional runner-up. Samantha also finished as regional runner-up in triple jump with a tremendous effort of 33'3". Samantha also ran a very


fast leg on the regional runnerup 1600-meter relay team. Reminiscent of Heather Hammond's exciting catch-up performance at state in 2004, Samantha made up a good 25 meters in the third leg of the race and added 25 more of her own to put RCHS firmly in state qualifying contention with a season's best time of 4:17.28..

Freshman Sara Hammond had several awesome regional performances. Sara won the high jump regional championship with an awesome personal best leap of 5'2" which ranks her third going into the state finals. Sara also won the 400meter dash with an amazing new personal best effort of 59.64 seconds. Going into state, Sara is ranked first in the event. Last season, Sara finished as state runner-up in the event, but has shaved nearly a second off that time. Sara also anchored the regional runnerup 1600-meter relay team with


a blistering final leg of the race. The relay qualified for state in a season's best 4:17.28. Sara anchored last year's state championship 1600-meter relay team and hopes to have a chance to defend the team's state title in the event this year at state.

Seventh grader Michaela Hunter continued right where she left off last season at region, winning regional championship titles in the 1600 and 3200-meter runs (12:43). Michaela finished the 1600 run with an incredible effort of 5:38 and led Class 2A with a time of 5:30 this season. She's also the defending state champion in the event in Class 2A after recording a school record 5:21 while capturing last year's state title. In the 3200-meter run, Michaela finished in an impressive 12:43. She finished 3rd at state in the event last year and ran an RCHS record 12:05



The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court imposes an Occupational License and Net Profits Tax and Payment of Occupational License and Net Profits Tax by persons and business entities conducting businesses, occupations, and professions within Rockcastle County, Kentucky. 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





then pay an additional tax." Mrs. Mink went on to say that this tax would only widen the gap between the working poor and the middle class.

Mink also questioned why the court did not realize this crisis was upon them sooner which would have given people more time to adjust their budgets. "Why didn't you inform people six months ago that you couldn't balance your budget and this tax was needed," she asked the court.

County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis assured Ms. Mink that the court did see this problem coming six months ago. "We balanced our budget last year with the help of \$180,000 in carryover federal grants and, of course, those grants have had to be used to pay for the purposes they were intended," Carloftis said.

Before the discussion began, Carloftis told the crowd that the court was not attempting to impose the occupational tax lightly but, he pointed out, without the additional revenue from the tax, the county will not be able to meet state mandated requirements. Also, Carloftis said the tax will allow the county to invest in industrial development which will provide job opportunities for citizens in the county -- 3100 of whom now live here but make their living elsewhere. 'Without tools you can't build a house," Carloftis said "and that tool is funding."

Carloftis also said that a large part of the deficit the county is facing is for the detention center but, "If we had to close our jail and ship our inmates to other counties, we would be paying out at least \$650,000 a year to other counties which would help their economy, not ours."

economy, not ours."

"Our jail is operated efficiently since many counties our size have to subsidize their jailsby as much as \$500,000," Carloftis said. He went on to point out that most of the funds received by the county are restricted, except those of the general fund. "If we have to borrow from the road fund, as we have the past several years, those funds must be repaid. The general fund is the only fund the county has that does not have to be repaid and it has been getting weeker."

been getting weaker."

However, Carloftis told the group, "this court has always been against any tax on wages unless there was a possibility of improving the likelihood of workers increasing their wages by getting better paying jobs into the community." He added that revenue from the 4% in-

surance tax had been only a "stop-gap" measure and the court had not been able to use any of the revenue to invest in the county's economic development. Carloftis told the group that since Laurel County imposed an occupational tax and invested a huge chunk of it into economic development, business at the county clerk's office from deed tax, car license fees, etc. had jumped to the point that the clerk's excess fees to the county had risen from \$120,000 to \$400,000 a year. "We must invest in our county's future growth," Carloftis said.

However, some of those present still voiced their disapproval of the tax. Marcia Chism, who along with her husband owns and operates Rockcastle Veterinary Clinic, agreed with Mink that the minmum wage people would be the ones hurt the most and later said that she felt there would be children in the county that would not eat as well as prisoners at the county jail if the tax were imposed.

And, Rockcastle Hospital CEO Steve Estes said the tax would increase their problems of hiring and maintaining adequate personnel. "At any given time, I have openings for 20 licensed personnel and with this tax, that number will probably jump to 40 because we will lose people who live out of town and work here, mainly because there is not an occupational tax," Estes said. "I have already had one out-ofcounty employee give notice because of the chance of the tax being imposed and there will be others," Estes added. The hospital currently employs 540 workers, 82 from out of the county, with an annual payroll of \$16,400,000.

"There has been a range of frustration by our workers over this proposal," Estes said, "mainly because the rate has not been known," Estes told the

Carloftis assured Estes that the county appreciated the hospital but pointed out that people who live here and work elsewhere are already paying an occupational tax. "We are the only county in this region without an occupational tax," Carloftis said "and people come in here and get jobs and pay nothing to support Rockcastle County government plus pay a higher property tax than we have in their home county."

Carloftis also asked Estes what the hospital did when the cost of their supplies went up and Estes admitted that the hospital had rate increases of three to six percent yearly because of price increases in supplies.

However, Estes did inquire about the possibility of the court imposing a gradient tax that started at a half percent and went up a half percent a year for two years, giving people more time to budget for the extra expense. Carloftis said that this would not work because a 1/2 percent would not cover the county's current deficit and that expenses increase each year and there would never be enough to set anything aside

for economic growth.

Carloftis asked the magistrates for comment and Magistrate Ralph Allen said that while he realized that the measure would be hard on minimum wage workers, he expected the tax to help the county improve things to where those workers could make more money.

Mink's final word to the court was "however this fiscal court votes on this, I will sup-

port them 100% because my children are going to grow up in this county and I want the very best for them. But, I still don't like the way it was sprung on us."

Bob Randolph, who led a successful petition drive to deny the Soil Conservation Service a 30% tax rate increase last year, told the court that "bureaucracies have a way of growing" and the county could soon have oppressive taxes. "We can be unique," Randolph told the court. "Don't use the argument of what other counties are doing," he added.

During the meeting, Lonnie Campbell with the GOLD office outlined for everyone the procedure if the court did not take the necessary steps to present his office with a balanced budget.

According to Campbell, county government would be shut down as of July 1st and the matter would actually go before a circuit judge with both the county and the state presenting their side. The judge would, no doubt, then order the fiscal court to impose the tax and, if a majority of the court still refused, then the judge and magistrates could be jailed for their lack of action. "I don't expect it to come to this," Campbell said. He added that there were four or five other counties in the same shape as Rockcastle and they were also working with GOLD. 75 of the 120 counties in Kentucky al-

ready have an occupational tax.

After the reading of the ordinance by County Treasurer Joe Clontz, Carloftis made a motion to approve the first reading of the ordinance and received a second from Magistrate John Holbrook. Magistrates Bill McKinney and William Denny both voted no on the measure and Magistrates Ralph Allen and Jan Stevens

voted yes, along with Holbrook.

The second reading of the ordinance will be held at a special called meeting, Thursday, June 5th at 1 p.m.

Following the vote, Renfro Valley CEO Connie Hunt, who had several questions for the court during the discussion, commented that it was appropriate that the Memorial Day Holiday just held stood for our freedom to have an open voice to air frustrations and concerns. "People look to you to run our county and you are going to get feedback which is what you are hearing today. It is not a popular move but necessary but it couldn't have come at a worse time. I hope you are going to incorporate economic development so that we won't have this problem again. Use the money wisely but don't forget businesses that are already here who are struggling," Hunt told the court.

The 1.5% tax is expected to generate \$1,245,000 a year of which about \$522,000 will be needed the first year to meet deficits in the Detention Center, Road Fund, 911 operation and Local Government Economic Assistance Fund.

After the meeting, and on question, Magistrate Billy McKinney told the *Signal* that his no vote was mainly due to "people on very low wages being hurt by the tax and the court should have started earlier to try and make cuts -- not including senior citizens, employee health insurance, etc. -- just better management."

Denny's comment was essentially the same, except that he was more adamant that the court should have been better informed about the financial crisis. "I thought things were alright," Denny said, "I didn't know we owed over \$100,000 to a vendor for the jail."

49% to 44%.

Cross said the poll had a margin of error of four and half percent, meaning either candidate could be better off or even worse off but, in his opinion, the poll was fairly accurate.

Cross said that for the first time since 1990, when McConnell had a tough race against Democrat Harvey Sloan, he faces a challenger with personal wealth who can match McConnell's advertising blitz on the airwaves.

Cross also said a tough race for McConnell means that he will be held accountable for the last 24 years he has been in office.

Cross said whether you like the system or not, it does hold politicians accountable for their actions and ultimate

Cross, who is the Director for Rural Journalism and Community Issues at the University of Kentucky, said Senator McConnell has called the race for his fifth term the toughest yet - due largely in part to the tarnished image of the Republican party in the state and nationwide.

Cross said a recent poll found that 81 percent of Americans think the country is on the wrong track, "which means there are a lot of mad voters."

Shortly after Cross's remarks to the Chamber, McConnell's camp released a statement saying he had a 50 to 39 percent lead over

Lunsford. McConnell's camp said the poll of 600 likely voters was conducted on May 21st and 22nd by Voter/Consumer Research.



A Look at this Year's Edition of a Classic High School Tradition

On Saturday, May 17. RCHS held it's own endof the-year gala celebration with hundreds of juniors and so niors dressing up and stepping out in style. The theme this year was "Wonderful Tonight," and the gym was reconstructed into a ballroom of purple, white, and some gold. Beginning at eight o'clock, couples and friends began showing up to make the walk down the "purple carpet" that greeted them in the RCHS entry courtyard.

Some Background on the Big Event

The word "prom" was first used in the 1890s, as a short way of saying "promenade," which is an old term meaning "to walk gracefully; to parade." The first proms were held in the 1920s. By the 1930s, proms were common across the country. For many older

Americans, the prom was a modest dance in the school gym, decorated with crepepaper streamers. Prom goers were well dressed but not totally "decked-out": Boys wore jackets and ties and girls put on their Sunday dress. Couples danced to music by an amateur band or a record player, either would provide a song list of the era's hits.

After the 1960s, and especially after the 1980s, things changed quite a bit, but the spirit of the prom was still the same. Girls wore designer gowns or the nicest dress they could afford, and guys wore tuxedos or very nice full suits. For many promgoers in the 80's Limousines were hired to drive the couple or group to expensive

restaurants or discos for a night of fun. When they finally did hit the floor at the prom, they danced to the thumping sounds of fullfledged deejays with powerful sound systems and light shows. The audio entertainment went fully electronic and fully loud.

Today, in Rockcastle and other parts around Southeastern and Central Kentucky, many juniors and seniors do things up big for the big night. Over the three weeks or so that make up prom season, high schools all over the region will be cleaning up, decorating, booking entertainment and photographers in preparation for their own events. Students will be arranging for thousands of tuxedos and formal gowns, gearing up to look their best.

What's Up With Gas Prices? RCHS Students Among Those Feeling the Pain

"Every time I put the nozzle into the tank, it makes my eyes cry blood." Senior Amy Poynter's words do a great deal to sum up the mood in which RCHS students have embraced current gas prices. With a gallon of gasoline now ringing in at over \$3 a gallon, the wallets of students are cringing from its impact.

RCHS senior James Leger, for example, drives a diesel truck and estimates that his fuel expenses average out at about \$120 a week. James works at Thorough Truck in Berea, but unfortunately has to give up approximately 80% of his earnings to keep his truck fueled.

What makes prices so steep? The price of crude oil – though not the sole reason that gasoline prices are soaring – is certainly a factor. Although the gas we use can come from a

number of global sources, some of which are in our own country, we can thank OPEC for generally setting the rate of crude oil. OPEC (the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries) was established in 1960 for the benefit of petroleum-producing nations. Its members

include Iran, Iraq, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Venezuela, Qatar, Indonesia, the United Arab Emirates, Algeria, Nigeria,

Ecuador, and Angola. Together, these nations control about twothirds of the world's oil reserves and account for 35.6% of global oil production. Since 1982. OPEC. quotas to ensure that oversupply in oil does not decrease the profits that they make from their most valuable export. Although OPEC is a great organization for the countries that export oil, it

Even keeping the earth green affects the amount of green that we hand over at the pump. Environmental regulations in the US prohibit drilling from taking place in our nation's own oil reservoirs in Alaska and on the continental shelf. This increases our dependency of foreign oil, putting us at the mercy of other nations regarding what we pay for imported crude. Also due to environmental regulations, there are eighteen different gasoline formulations used across the US. This is caused by legislation

My Sister's Keeper Offers Controversy and Drama

My Sister's Keeper is an offering from Jodi Picoult, the sometimes controversial author of several published books.

The books centers around several characters: Anna, Kate and their mom, Sara Fitzgerald. Kate, a sickly and pale a teenager, suffers with a very rare form of leukemia and needs a kidney transplant. Her sister Anna is a thirteen year old who is an allogeneic donor and a perfect sibling match for blood marrow for Kate. Kate. whose mother constantly makes decisions for her, knows she can influence Anna greatly and tries to get her to do what she wants.

Anna is a skinny girl, still maturing into a teen. She has brownish, blonde

hair and freckles that you could use to connect the dots. She is the one that starts the conflict in the story and is probably the most important character in the book. She can be loving when she wants to, but has a mind of her own when she gets upset enough, like people in real life. Anna decides that she has done enough to help cure her sister and decides to take a stand, but her mind is influenced by others.

Their mom, Sara, who is compared to a princess in her features yet is said to have a "look of eternal-tiredness" on her face at all times, makes the decision that Anna should sacrifice to saver her sister. It is a decision that will land Sara Fitzgerald in court, defending her actions and all

but admitting to caring slightly more for one of her two daughters. Yet, even more shocking revelations about the design of Anna and Kate's sisterhood come to light.

The storvline follows the action after Anna sues for medical emancipation, so that she can decide for herself what procedures to undergo. 

week they attend three days of "B" classes.

For incoming RCHS freshmen, they'll have 4 classes each day, although they will have a total of 8 classes running at all times. Most of the classes will probably run the entire year. Since students will only be attending each class every other day, it will take the full year to add up to a semester of class meetings.

The new schedule has been studied in other school systems and was being considered for all grade levels at RCHS. using However. Freshman Academy to develop the idea was decided on because the Academy students already follow a different schedule, which has included several split block classes this year. Now, incoming freshmen will be looking to use the advantages of the A/B schedule.

Students operating under the new system will have the same amount of

electives available and will have to meet the same credit system we have now to graduate. Mrs. Mattingly said it was very important to school officials that the electives remain the same for students in the A/B schedule format. "The one thing I wanted to make sure of was that no student would lose the opportunity to take those elective classes in areas they find interesting," she said.

Why make the change to the A/B schedule? According to Mrs. Hamilton, "Students will be able to retain what they have learned, and form closer relationships with teachers." However, Mrs. Hamilton did say that students and teachers will have to work to adjust. "Teachers have to take into consideration that students will have eight classes to keep track of," Mrs. Hamilton said.

So the discussion is over for now. As next year comes, RCHS students will find out if the A/B schedule is going to be good or bad.



Bullying isn't an issue

"norm," it is easier to make fun of them than it is to make an effort to learn more about who they are. We get into our comfort zone and are afraid to venture outside of our safe little circle of friends. However, when that fear turns into incidents of harassment, bullying, and ostracizing, it becomes a much bigger and

more serious problem.

So how does R.C.H.S. address intolerance? For one thing, the Youth Services Center purchased posters and literature that address the problem of bullying. The posters identify bullying behavior as "name calling, deliberately leaving someone out, teasing, physical violence, making people feel frightened, and putting people down." The purpose is to make students aware of these behaviors, hopefully causing students look more closely at how they treat others who might be perceived as "different." The posters also address the common reasons why some people choose to bully others, including the need for attention, the fear of being singled out or bullied themselves, and an abusive home life.

R.C.H.S. has rules in place to try to deal with the problem. Students who engage in harassment against other students face severe disciplinary action including P.A.S.S. time, suspension, or

even expulsion, depending harassment will be dealt with and the punishment will send a message to everyone that we have a zero tolerance policy where this is concerned."

Cyberbullying has become such a problem that it is addressed in anti-bulling laws in eight of the thirty states that currently have such legislation. Although the Kentucky bill did not originally include cyberbullying as a form of harassment, it was amended in the House of Representatives to include cyberbullying, so anyone trying to use technology in this way should know that it's not only wrong, it's illegal, and the punishments can move quickly beyond the schoolhouse to the courthouse.

It's unlikely that bullying will ever completely stop. Unfortunately, some people will likely always feel a need to harass and belittle others. But hopefully the measures being taken by the





passed largely in metropolitan areas, where cleaner-burning gas is desired to decrease pollution. While this is a good thing for the environment in such areas, it also increases the cost of distribution because refiners have to be sure to get the right "type" of gas to the right area, rather than putting it all in one truck and going.

Jay Cobb might not mind environmental regulation, but he's not too happy paying for all that carefully distributed gas. He works at Arby's, but typically sees about 50% of what he makes going into keeping gas in the tank of his Chevy S10. His assessment of the gasoline situation? "I'm broke."

Also spending half of his earnings on gassing up his S10 is senior Chris Sowder. He works at the Brodhead Hometown Market, but it's hard to pile up cash when you have to spend so much on fuel. His evaluation of gas prices is very similar to Jay's: "I have little money."

people the tools to get involved and engage their generation online," explained Hans Riemer, political director of Rock the vote, responding to the ability to get involved in politics through the internet.

RCHS students eligible to vote seem to be very concerned and aware of the upcoming election. RCHS senior Erik Jordison says that he stays informed about most of the presidential candidates. "I know something about most of them." Jordison, who plans to vote in November, says. Cody Wilson, also an RCHS senior, says that he plans to vote, "Because I'm American."



Amy Poynter says that she tries to stay informed about the candidates and says that she plans to vote in the upcoming November 2008 presidential election because "I don't want an incompetent person to become president, and I want to do everything I can to prevent that from happening." Sabrina Stern is voting in November she said, "Because then I can complain about who gets in office." When asked why she planned to vote in the presidential election, Holly Brown said that she was going to vote, "Because I can."

Already, the young vote in the caucuses has not been disappointing. More than 84,230 18-29 year olds voted in the New Hampshire caucus, a 271 percent increase from 2004. In the

Iowa caucus, the total turnout of 17-29 year olds was triple the turnout of the age group in 2004, according to the Center for Information and Research on Civic Learning and Engagement. With the November presidential election looming ahead, the "young" vote will continue to be of much importance to the candidates.



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
