# Serious problems between Mt. Vernon Mayor and firefighters come to head

The problems between members of the Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department and Mayor Clarice Kirby have gotten much worse in the past couple of days.

Things are so bad that fire department members are asking prosecutors to consider a possible indictment against the Mayor and most, if not all, said they would likely quit the city fire department on Wednesday afternoon, after a meeting with members of the state fire commission.

And, on the other hand, the Mayor is advertising for parttime paid positions for the officers on the fire department and did so without offering those paid positions to current volunteers.

The Mayor did not consult with Fire Chief Garry Hansel, before placing the advertisement in the Signai and did not bring the matter before the council.

Councilman Joe Mullins said Tuesday night he had talked with the Mayor on a couple of occasions about eventually having to go to a paid department, but was unaware that the ad was going to

At a meeting of the fire department members on Tuesday night, Chief Hansel, and other members present, said he thought the Mayor should have offered the paid positions to the fire department before any applications were taken.

However, Mayor Kirby said on Wednesday, during a meeting at City Hall, that she did not hire anyone who works for the city without looking at every application and that she did not offer those paid positions to the

# **Monday** night fire

Mt. Vernon firefighters were called to a structure fire on Quarry Street in Mt. Vernon around 6:20 p.m..

Sometime between 6:45 and 7 p.m. Mayor Kirby and her passenger, councilmember Wayne Bullock, went to the fire

Mayor Kirby said when she tried to approach the fire scene she was stopped by a Mt. Vernon firefighter who told her she couldn't go on down the street because it was blocked

Kirby said she attempted to back up and turn around but could not and, when she asked for assistance, she got no help from firefighter Steve Griffin, he "turned his back on me".

That is when Kirby apparently drove down the street beside the burning structure, crossed fire hoses, being used to fight the fire and went to City Hall for a a regular monthly meeting of the council.

The Mayor said she was late for the meeting and was not getting any help to go back up the street, when she drove down the street.

Griffin said he tried to stop Kirby again from going down the blocked street, but was unsuccessful.

Kirby said she did not know it was illegal to drive across the lines and that "I wouldn't have in any way put anybody in danger," she said.

The Mayor later returned to the scene with State Trooper Scottie Pennington and apologized. Kirby said she meant no disrespect and did not intentionally break the law.

"I appreciate the valuable time these volunteers put in and I've even told them in the past, that I would try to see that they get some kind of compensation - I've even helped them get some small amounts of insurance on their vehicles and personal items such as eyeglasses." Kirby said.

# Orlando man electrocuted

Last Wednesday, at approximately 1:31 p.m., the Rockcastle 911 Center received a call for an ambulance for a male subject that had been electrocuted and fallen off a ladder.

According to a news release from the Kentucky State Police, when officers arrived they determined that the victim James Wynn, 24, of Orlando was standing on a ladder and using bolt cutters in an attempt to steal copper from a Jackson Energy power line, off Goochland Road, when he was electrocuted.

Eddy F. Montgomery, Commonwealth Attorney for Rockcastle County, announced Wednesday that a Mt. Vernon woman will go to prison as a result of her plea of guilty to robbery charges.

According to Montgomery's lead prosecutor in Rockcastle Circuit Court, Jeremy A. Bartley, Kyefi Hicks, 33, of Nicholasville, pled guilty to Robbery, second degree, before Circuit Judge Jeffrey T. Burdette on Friday, June 13.

Hicks was indicted, following an investigation by Rockcastle County Sheriff Mike Peters.

According to police records, Hicks was a resident at a local abuse shelter, as was the victim in the case. On November 10, 2007, around 9 a.m., Hicks approached the victim, who was holding her infant daugh-

Rockcastle County High School Lady Rocket basketball star Sarah Rowe will don the blue and white of Kentucky when basketball season kicks off in the Fall.

Rowe confirmed Tuesday that she had been asked to be a walk-on, for the 12 member squad at U.K., by head coach Matthew Mitchell.

"I'm so excited, I had decided to not play basketball in college, but when U.K. called I couldn't pass that opportunity up," said a smiling Rowe.

The 5'10" guard/forward said she would begin conditioning with the Lady Wildcats after she got some paper work out of the way, such as her class schedule.

"I know it is going to be the hardest thing I've ever done,

but I'm going to work harder than I ever have in hopes of earning some playing time," she said. Rowe, who was the lone se-

nior on this year's Lady Rocket state tournament team, averaged 20.6 points per game this year, the most in Lady Rocket

Rowe also averaged 6 rebounds a game, 3.3 assists and 3.1 steals.

Rowe left RCHS as the school's second all-time leading scorer for the Lady Rockets with 1930 points.

During her four years as a Lady Rocket, Rowe competed in three state tournaments and was named second team allstate this year.



The Blonde in the Black Cacillac is Back

Rick Perkins has vivid memories of his first ride in a Cadillac.

He had attended funeral services in Lexington for his grandfather, famed horse trainer Frank Sanders.

The owner of Romanoaks Farm in Woodford County had died in July of 1960 when his helicopter crashed in Chicago.

Five-year-old Rick, his mother and grandmother were riding to the cemetery with family friends, the Freeman Keyes, owners of Reverie Knoll Farm near Danville.

"I was in the front seat between the Keyes. We hadn't gotten too far down the road when all of a sudden my grandmother spoke up from the backseat, saying, 'Freeman, I really like this Cadillac," recalls the grandson she called Rick-Rant.

"I remember him saying, 'Well Elsie, why don't you just go downtown and buy you

Two weeks later, the grieving widow was at Dixie McKinley Cadillac in Lexington, driving her sleek new \$5,800 Coup de ville off the lot at 432 East Vine.

Over the next four years, the flashy blonde with a zest for life used the car for business and pleasure, always accompanied by her mixed breed dog, Black Gal, and often with Rick and his five siblings along for the ride.

"There are so many family memories associated with that car," says Rick, now a designer of custom window treatments in Lexington.

When Lexington's original McDonalds opened on New Circle Road, she loaded all six of us grandkids in the car and took us over there to check it

"In 1963, my parents were on the verge of divorcing when grandmother sat them down in the front seat of that car and talked them into staying together.

"My sister and I would spend hours making faces and looking at our reflections in the car's shiney exterior.

The back seat had arm rests that folded down in the center, making a perch often occupied by Rick. She drove fast and I was always falling off when she rounded curves. One time I asked her why she drove so fast and she said, "Rick-Rant honey, I'm just trying to stay out of the way of all those fools who don't know how to drive."

Smells associated with the car also became a part of Rick's memories.

"The four scents I associated with that car were the new-car smell, dogs, cigarette smoke, and Chanel no. 5.'

He also remembers the day his grandmother put a small dent in the front passenger-side fender while pulling the car into her garage. "That really upset her,' he says.

The memory-making car was four years old when Elsie decided to trade it in on a new Oldsmobile.

Memories lingered, but all



### What is Autism?

Presented by Dr. Callie Shaffer

Autism is a complex syndrome of abnormal brain function resulting in a wide variety of symtpoms as a child develops. While it is not entirely clear what causes autism, it's origin

appears to begin early in pregnancy while the brain is developing. Due to some abnormal stress on the brain and its development, the normal connections that connect one brain cell to many others are damaged, pruned off, or just do not develop. The most likely cause is thought to be a viral infection occurring in the first 28 weeks of the pregnancy. Autism includes abnormalities of language and communi-



cation along with problems of social inteaction and lack of imaginative play. A child with autism may have a high IQ but with the social interactions and language problems it may not be apparent. Cases of possible autism are important to identify though, since they may respond to treatment better if diagnosed early.

Autism is found in all cultures and is 4-5 times more common in boys than girls. The risk for recurrence in a family is 5-8% indicating some genetic predisposition.

Autism is diagnosed by delayed language or unusual speech patterns and abnormal interactions, such as being unresponsive to being touched or when parents play "peek-a-boo." The child may also show repetative or non-functional behavior such as lining up toys.

Although there is no cure, it is helpful to treat it early since they may have an improvement in behavioral problems and be able to cope with mainstream life.

If autism is suspected, a child should be referred to a center designed to do a full evaluation of the child and follow his develoment as he ages.



### Extra occupational tax was needed...

Dear Citizens,

I would like to take this opportunity to communicate this message from myself, Mayor Clarice R. Kirby, and on behalf of the Mt. Vernon City Council to the citizens of Mt. Vernon.

As most of you know, there have been additional taxes placed on our citizens recently. Some of you agree with those decisions and some of you would rather keep things more as they have been for the last 100 or so years. I, for one, want improvements in all areas of our county. I don't necessarily want to have to pay a high price to catch up for what the county has neglected to do for all these years -- be responsible -- but that is what has had to be done or else we can sit around wishing forever that we had some things like other counties have been enjoying for a long time.

Getting back to the implementing of the city's 1/2 cent increase on occupational taxes, we had to do this because the county did not see fit to include us in their package when they had their first reading at their called meeting. I had waited to see what would happen before our council acted on our 1/2%. If the county had done the more businesslike thing, they would have included the city with their passage and not had the overlap of the taxed jobs within the city. But it's done and everybody needs to quit sulking and let's do the right thing of being watchful over our tax dollars.

Eight years ago I was a council member. I fought for the people who worked in Mt. Vernon to be charged less than two cents on the dollar. The council and mayor at that time finally passed a 1/2% occupational and net profits tax. When I came in as Mayor, the city was (5) five years behind on audits and there were lots of other problems to clean up; but, my point is, that the city has been operating for eight years on the 1/2 cent per dollar rate. We've made a lot of progress but we are at the point of our money being stretched to the limit.

For some people who might not know, this is the first increase in the occupational tax that the City has passed in eight years so if you've had any pay years you've had more than the City of Mt. Vernon. We need this increase for day to day expanded growth. Just because

we haven't overspent, and have shown a balanced budget, doesn't mean we don't need more money to provide needed services. We have stayed legal and haven't spent more than we expected to receive in revenue.

I want to thank my council for showing the leadership they have shown in the past and ask that you, as citizens, understand that we have to, by law, provide services and I don't believe the one cent per dollar tax will break anyone.

Ask the county to reduce the amount they are charging, which overlaps workers in the city when, and if, they get caught up and don't show need.

I appreciate all the supportive calls and visits.

of a sudden the car Rick had "fallen in love with the first time I laid eyes on it" was gone.

Elsie was also soon departed, the victim of a heart attack suffered at a Lexington nightspot where she had been

Meanwhile, Rick's fascination for Cadillacs grew even stronger.

Throughout his youth, the new location of Quantrell Cadillac on New Circle Road was only a short bike ride away.

"I couldn't wait for each September to roll around, so I could ride over to the dealership and see what changes had been made in the newest editions," he recalls.

One of the biggest changes in Rick's life occurred in 1973 when he left Lexington for Ohio and later, South Florida.

Twenty-seven years later, a desire to be near family brought him back to Lexington.

He was taking some back streets home after a drive across town when he spotted a big black Cadillac sitting in front of a house, a "For Sale" sign across the front window. It looked a lot like the one he had last seen in 1964.

Upon closer inspection, he also found a small dent in the passenger-side front fender.

He returned with a friend a short time later, telling the elderly owner he thought it could be the same car his grandmother had owned.

The owner told him that was unlikely and provided as much history as he knew, including the fact the vehicle had been stored in a barn at Winchester for many years before he found it on a local car lot.

While taking the car for a test drive, Rick opened the glove box, finding paperwork

that "chilled me from head to toe."

There were numerous documents signed by his grandmother, including an accident report from when the car was rear-ended in 1961.

With work to finish up in Florida, Rick was away from Lexington for several weeks, during which time the car was sold.

After three months of "kicking myself hard," he found himself with a second opportunity to own the family heirloom when an ad appeared in a car trader magazine.

That was eight years ago. Since then, he has been driving the car every day when it is not being restored by a mechanic in Wilmore.

"My mission now is to bring it back to what it once was,' said Rick, noting he has already invested \$28,000, with body work and painting remaining to







My neighbors aren't very nosy. As I said the van stayed parked in my driveway for the better part of three days and not a single person stopped by to inquire about what on earth was strapped to the top of it. Nobody even called while the guys were here but I will say this, had the van been in one of their driveways, Loretta and I would have been doing some very powerful speculation and it would not have been very

They guys hadn't been gone for more than a hour when my phone range and a neighbor finally called to ask about my houseguests and of course, to get some satisfaction in regards to the kayaks.

I explained the circumstances including the fact that they were headed west.

I told her that we were too busy solving the problems of Habitat for Humanity and two very prestigious educational institutions to talk much about anything else. still have leftovers for the cat.

kitchen as it agitated our clothes. The hot water was heated on a wood burning stove that also was situated in the small kitchen. Large tubs of water were poured into that old washing machine. When the cycle was completed, the machine had a drain hose that Bee placed under the kitchen door so that the wash water poured into the yard. The grass in that section of the yard grew like mad.

I also remember Bee making lye soap in large bars that she used to wash our clothes. I still can see her shaving those bars of lye soap into the wringer washer. She would then add liquid bluing to make the whites whiter. The process of doing the family wash was an all-day job.

Bee had made sure that the clothesline in the side yard was properly attached to two trees and was sufficiently secured before hauling the large baskets of clothes out of the kitchen. She also used long poles to help prop up the clothes line when it was filled with her wash.

Bee was the only one that could hang the clothes on the line. She was the only one that had mastered the art of properly hanging them on the line to her specifications. Of course, she used the old wooden clothes pins to secure the newly washed laundry.

Occasionally, one of Pop's "long handle" underwear would be included in our laundry. I always thought that it was so funny to see them blowing in the wind – an unforgettable image. It was ghost-like to watch them sway back and forth as the wind moved the legs and arms.

The nice shirts and pants were always hung on the line far away from trees to prevent birds from dropping their deposits on them. White sheets were also hung on that end of the clothes line. When Bee put these sheets back on my bed, the fresh aroma of line-dried sheets was refreshing beyond description. It has been over 50 years since I have smelled that country fragrance.

Even though the sheets and pillowcases seemed ready to put back on the bed, Bee always got out her black irons and placed them on the Warm Morning stove to begin the ironing process. This was, of course, the day after wash day. She ironed everything. And many items were also starched. Do you remember how it felt to slip into bed between fresh washed and ironed sheets? It was simply unbelievable how good that felt.

Bee was always so focused

on laundry day that she made us fend for ourselves for breakfast and lunch. Often she would not even eat until the washing process was completed. She did put on a pot of her freshly brewed coffee and, throughout the day, she kept her mug filled with that aromatic brew.

At the end of the day, the old wringer washer was pushed into a corner of the kitchen behind the door. There it was covered with an old quilt until the following week when Bee rolled it back into the middle of the kitchen for the process to begin all over again.

And my wife thinks that our washer is hard on clothes!



A total of 14 students had perfect attendance at Roundstone Elementary School this year. Way to go! We hope we can have an even bigger number next year.





# **Consumers warned** of scams asking for personal data

The Kentucky Office of Insurance (KOI) has received reports of several scams and is warning consumers to take extra precautions to protect financial information.

Consumer advocates, police departments and other agencies across the country are warning about a variety of scams coming from a Bismarck, N.D., telephone number - 701-221-2212.

A woman in Louisville told an investigator from KOI's Consumer Protection and Education Division that she took a call from that number earlier this week. The caller, who identified himself as Sid Johnson, said Medicare was making some changes to its plan and he needed her bank account information to ensure that her Social Security check was properly deposited.

In an effort to prove the call was valid, the man said his Medicare ID # MD10956J.

The Louisville woman said the caller already had some information about her but was missing some key pieces, such as her age. She did not give him any information, hung up and called KOI.

Other scams associated with this number have included the promise of a rebate from the Internal Revenue Service or some other refund or check that can only be received by direct deposit.

Consumers should never give financial information over the phone, particularly if they did not initiate the call, said John Burkholder, KOI acting executive director.

Another scam report came from the Mt. Vernon police department. Several senior citizens in the area reported receiving an automated message that the consumer's auto insurance was expiring and must be renewed by pressing "1." When the consumer followed the directions, the next message asked for personal information. This call originated from 702-528-1131, a number in Las Vegas.

"If a call makes you suspicious or uncomfortable, hang up," said Burkholder. "Government agencies, insurance companies and legitimate businesses would not ask consumers for information using these methods.'

The Office of Insurance is an agency of the Department of Public Protection in the Environmental and Public Protection Cabinet.



# Crackdown announced on illegal telemarketers

Attorney General Jack Conway today announced a crackdown on illegal telemarketing, having obtained a temporary restraining order to halt one fraudulent telemarketer and a \$10,000 civil penalty against a second company for violating Kentucky's Do Not Call law.

The actions are part of a joint operation between state attorneys general and the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). The partnership and telemarketing fraud sweep is being dubbed "Operation Telephoney."

When companies break the law by violating the Do Not Call list, they invade consumers' homes and violate their trust," Conway said. "Fraudulent telemarketers not only invade our privacy, they steal our money. It's important for businesses to understand that if they break the law, they will face prosecution and significant penalties.'

In the first action, General Conway's Office of Consumer Protection filed a joint suit with the FTC to obtain a temporary restraining order from the U.S. District Court in Atlanta against Direct Connection Consulting, Inc., owner Elliott Borenstein and office manager Joann R. Winter, of Alpharetta, Ga.

The legal action stems from deceptive marketing and illegal billing practices by the company in connection with sales of its "SureTouch" long-distance calling cards. Investigators found that the company fraudulently told consumers it represented a major retailer or credit card company, placed unauthorized charges on a consumer's card, debited bank

accounts without authorization or informed consent, provided false identities, and refused consumer's request not to be called again - sometimes calling up to six times a day until consumers listened to the pitch.

Kentucky and the federal government are seeking injunctive relief, civil penalties and consumer restitution. A preliminary injunction hearing has been scheduled for May 28,

In the second telemarketing enforcement action the Attorney General's Office obtained a \$10,000 settlement from DNH Consulting, of Oviedo, Fla., which also does business as "Health Services." Investigators report that DNH violated Kentucky's telemarketing laws while selling a discount prescription drug card by contacting Kentucky consumers whose residential phone numbers were listed on the Do Not Call list. The Attorney General also alleges that DNH violated the law by failing to provide consumers required disclosures, including notifying consumers of their 14-day right to cancel a telemarketing sales contract.

DNH agreed to enter into an assurance of voluntary compliance and pay \$10,000 in civil penalties. DNH does not admit any violation of law or admit to any liability in reaching the settlement. The assurance of voluntary compliance was entered by Franklin Circuit Judge Thomas D. Wingate on May

# **Rockcastle County** Government **Division of Occupational Tax Collection**

## **SUBJECT: 1.5% OCCUPATIONAL LICENSE TAX**

The Rockcastle County Government provides that, effective July 1, 2008, the 1.5 % (one & one-half percent) Occupational License Tax (Ordinance No. 23) applies to all individuals, employers, and businesses in Rockcastle County.

The rate is:

- (1) 1.5% of each individual's gross wages, salaries and commissions earned within Rockcastle County.
- (2) 1.5% of the net profits of every business from activities conducted within Rockcastle County.

### Additional provisions of the Ordinance are:

- (3) Each employer must withhold 1.5% Occupational License Tax from gross wages, salaries and commissions paid to employees for services performed within Rockcastle County.
- (4) Each business becoming subject to the Ordinance must at that time register for Occupational License Tax. Registration applications may be picked up at the Fiscal Court Clerk's office or call (606) 256-1293 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday.

### The forms for required reporting are:

- (5) The return of Occupational Tax withheld must be used by employers to report Occupational License Tax withheld from employees. This return will be mailed out quarterly and is due on: April 30, July 31, October 31, and January 31.
- (6) The Net Profit License Tax Return must be used by each business to report annually its net profits subject to 1.5% license fee. The return will be mailed out at the end of each business fiscal year and is due one-hundred five days (105) thereafter.



However, on the other side, Griffin said Tuesday night, that when he, and Fire Captain Bryan Hansel, saw Kirby coming down the street he tried to stop her again, but to no avail.

"We had to get out the way pretty quickly," Griffin said.

Members of the fire department said they had been in contact with the Commonwealth Attorney's office, to see if the Mayor had committed an indictable offense.

Trooper Pennington said he had opened a criminal investigation into the case and the investigation is continuing.

KRS 189.903 reads - "No vehicle, train or other equipment shall be driven over any unprotected hose of a fire department when the hose is laid down, on any street, private driveway, or track for use at any fire on fire alarm unless the fire department official in command consents that the hose be driven

KRS 189.903 is only a misdemeanor, however firefighters contend that the Mayor's actions did interrupt fighting of the fire and could have caused injury to a firefighter and or damaged expensive equipment and they were looking into try-

ing to get her indicted.

One firefighter, John Butler, who was on a ladder with another firefighter, said their hose lost pressure when the Mayor ran over it and that it put him and firefighter Mike Muncy in danger when the pressure returned and almost knocked them off the ladder.

Butler said Tuesday night he would be one of those to sign a criminal complaint against the Mayor.

But the Mayor said Wednesday that she was told by City Engineer Luther Galloway, who has worked with other cities in the state, that because an emergency had been declared in that area because of the fire, she, as Mayor, had the legal right to drive over the hoses.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds, who was also called to the scene after the incident, said Tuesday that he hoped everything could be worked out for the betterment of the community.

"Everybody involved needs to sit down and work things out. It simply would be best for the city as a whole," Reynolds said.

Reynolds said that no criminal charges have been filed in the case and if any were it would be through Commonwealth Attorney Montgomery's office.

### No city fire truck

During a special called meeting of fire department members on Tuesday night, it was revealed that the city has been without a city fire truck for the past ten months.

Members of the fire department said the Mayor had known the department was without a fire truck for quite a while but the Mayor said on Wednesday morning that it had only been a few weeks.

The Mayor said the city's county truck could cover city runs while another truck was being obtained.

But each member present agreed that it could be a real problem if there was a fire in the city and the county at the same time. For now, the city fire department has been using the county truck to fight fires in the

And, Charles Wynn, owner of Wynn Fire Equipment, said Tuesday night that the Mayor had, unofficially, told him earlier this year to get started on building a new fire truck and that she would bring the matter before the council for approval at a later date.

Wynn said that after the Mayor told him to get started on building the fire truck, she told him she would have to get bids for the truck.

The matter of a new truck has never been brought before the council in open session but Mayor Kirby and councilwoman Shelley Lewis said the matter was brought before the council in a closed session at their last regular meeting.

The Mayor said the closed session was supposed to be to discuss fire department personnel, but, when the session got underway, it turned completely to fire department business with discussion between firefighters and council members. "They told me it was for personnel, but it wasn't," she said.

Wynn said Tuesday night that the truck, which will cost \$191,000, is almost finished and that if the City of Mt. Vernon doesn't take it he can sell it to someone else.

The Mayor said that Wynn had the city's truck at his location in Corbin and that he was apparently unable to fix it.

"He said we owed him \$14,000 for repairs and and I told him we weren't going to pay because it wasn't fixed and that I wanted the truck back," the Mayor said.

Kirby said Wynn then told her he would not charge the city for the repairs but the truck has not been returned. Wynn said on Tuesday night that he could not fix the truck because parts were no longer available for the 1985

The Mayor said that fire department members must have told Wynn to go ahead with the project, because they (Wynn and the fire department) had worked together for years. "I didn't tell him that," she reiter-

And, on Tuesday morning, Mayor Kirby fired city employee Jason Hansel, volunteer firefighter and son of Chief Hansel. Kirby announced the firing and gave no reason to Hansel or the Signal. Hansel had only worked for the city for a short period of time.

As for a new fire truck, the Mayor said she and her staff were working to complete a bid process to present to the council which would enable them to obtain bids for a new truck. But, the bottom line is the city has no truck and is using the county's on all fire runs. No cooperation

Members of the volunteer fire department say they can't get along with the city and Mayor Kirby says it is impossible to get along with the fire department.

Fire Chief Garry Hansel said Tuesday night he was fed up with the entire situation. "I'm out of answers/ I'm ready to give up being a member of the city's fire department," he said.

"If she (the Mayor) didn't want me to be Chief she should have had enough about her to at least call me to tell me before putting an ad in," he continued.

"I joined the fire department to help the people in this community, but the way things are going it just isn't worth it," said firefighter Mike Muncy, who turned in his equipment on Tuesday night.

Captain Bryan Hansel, who has been with the fire department for 18 years, also turned his equipment in on Tuesday night.

"Her not even offering those paid positions to us first, shows just how unreasonable she is," Bryan Hansel said.

"We are all going to come out of this with a black eye, but I simply can't work with the Mayor," Hansel added.

Wednesday morning Mayor Kirby who was a council member before becoming Mayor, said the fire department "has caused trouble ever since I've been on the council.'

The Mayor said she thinks fire department is upset because she has asked for an accounting of their funds.

The Mayor says by state law the city council is supposed to get an inventory of the equipment, bank records and audits

of the department and that she has not received anything except a general budget for the coming year.

"I asked them to be accountable for their fundraisers and they quit having them," Kirby said.

The Mayor said that if members of the department were all to resign, she had 45 certified firefighters ready to help. "The city will not be without fire protection, Brodhead has said they would help us," the Mayor said.

Chief Hansel and other members said that if they did resign from the city's fire department they would continue to volunteer on the rescue squad and county fire department.

One member, Jackie Wayne Weaver said Tuesday night that he hated to quit serving the residents inside the city limits and hoped things could be worked out. His dad, Asst. Fire Chief Jack Weaver, said Wednesday morning, that it was his intentions to serve as a volunteer for the city and the county and that no matter who was in charge he was not going to resign. "I made a vow to help people and I'm going to do that," Weaver said.

The Mayor said to remedy the problem, she would appoint a committee to help her screen applications for officers of the department and move forward with those officers being paid as part-time employees.

In her advertisement this week she asks that all applications be submitted to the city by 7 p.m. next Monday night, which is the council's next scheduled meeting. The Mayor said those chosen as officers would be responsible for filling the ranks from there.

The solution to the problem for the majority of the firefighters at Tuesday night's meeting, was for the Mayor to

Members of the fire department and the state fire commission were scheduled to meet at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Rockcastle County Courthouse to see what, if anything, can be done to help resolve the problem between the fire department and the Mayor.

ter. The victim also happened to be four months pregnant at the time. Hicks demanded the keys to the victim's car and, not satisfied with the victim's response, struck the victim, causing injuries to her face and placing the infant and unborn child in danger.

Hicks then took the keys and drove off at a high rate of speed. On December 7, 2007, Louisville police trafficstopped Hicks and arrested her for receiving stolen property. She pled guilt to Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle in Jefferson District Court and was transported to the Rockcastle Detention Center.

Bartley recommended a ten year sentence for Hicks, based on her plea of guilty to robbery.

Final sentencing will be held in July. Hicks remains incarcerated in the Rockcastle Detention Center.

Members at **CRRC** have voted to move along with a total renovation of the pool, which is being required by the state for safety reasons. At least two companies, including, Ky. South Central Pools, of Mt. Vernon are going to submit bids on the pool, which will probably not be open this summer. After Goff removed the concrete from around the pool, those interested in submitting a bid to fix the pool could get a better idea of just how much work was needed and how much it will cost. 



# Education helps reduce cycle of incarceration

We are living in an age of difficult economic times. Obtaining a job that can provide suitable wages for sustaining a household gets more difficult with each passing day. Competition for good jobs is fierce. Employees worry every day about layoffs, plant closings, outsourcing and the current economic crunch that impacts everyone. But what if you had to face these worries with the additional stress of a criminal record? What if you made

mistakes and poor decisions in your past and paid your price to society by spending time in jail? What could you do that would prove to an employer that you are a skilled worker? What could you do that would make your application or resume stand out among the many other applicants who are applying for that same job?

Inmates at the Rockcastle County Detention Center (RCDC) have been offered GED preparation and classes

education levels for reintegration into the community and workforce does not appear to provide enough of an advantage with the trend of a more skilled and highly educated workforce. WorkKeys may help to provide that advantage for inmates. WorkKeys is an assessment designed by ACT for employability skill levels. Last fall, Rockcastle County Adult Education Director, Jennifer Napier and instructor, Therese Tackett, proposed to Rockcastle County Jailer, James Miller, that inmates be offered the opportunity to study for the ACT WorkKeys Assessments and then have the opportunity to test and earn a Kentucky Employability Certificate (KEC) during their time of incarceration. The local high school, com-

for years. But improvement in

The local high school, community college and Adult Education Center encourage their students to take the WorkKeys assessments to prepare for a highly competitive workforce. Napier and Tackett wanted inmates to have the same opportunity to demonstrate their employable skills as their employable peers. Miller was in full support of the idea. Earning this state recognized certificate signed by the governor of Kentucky, would provide inmates with current docu-

mentation of their employable skill levels and assist them in re-entering and competing in the workforce upon release from jail. Preparation for the WorkKeys assessments began immediately after Miller's approval.

Tackett, who instructs GED classes for the female inmates at the RCDC, began incorporating the WIN curriculum into her GED class time at the jail.
