At Mt. Vernon council meeting

Mayor given authority to take legal action

After about an hour in executive session on Monday night, the Mt. Vernon City Council voted unanmiously to give Mayor Clarice Kirby authority to take legal action to make sure the city had all fire equipment that was rightfully its, after many of the city's volunteer firefighters resigned last Wednesday.

The Mayor said Tuesday that she only wanted to make sure the city had its equipment back, including the city's fire truck from Wynn Fire and Rescue in Corbin, and to move forward.

Kirby said that she was informed by former firefighter Jack Weaver that some equipment, which was owned by the city fire department, was missing from the city firehouse.

Kirby said Weaver told her that before he resigned his position as the new chief last Friday afternoon.

Kirby said Weaver's wife turned his keys in at City Hall and said her husband just did not want the responsibility.

The mayor said that one particularly expensive piece of equipment, the Cascade Machine, which fills the oxygen tanks used by firefighters inside structures, was missing and that she wanted it back because it was purchased through the city.

"We've got some equipment to work with, some old turnout gear, but no pagers or radios," she said.

The Mayor said she did not actually have a written list of what was missing or what was still at the fire house.

Jason Hansel, a former volunteer firefighter and officer of

the department, said Tuesday that the group of men who quit the city's fire department last week had either left or returned everything that belonged to the city fire department and that they had even returned the county fire truck and the county's rescue truck to the city's fire house, at Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis' request. That request came after a somewhat heated exchange on Thursday afternoon between Carloftis and Mayor Kirby.

The trucks were removed by the firefighters after a meeting between State Fire Commissioner Jeremy Rodgers and the firefighters who resigned at that meeting last Wednesday.

Hansel also said the pagers and radios in question were controlled by the county's CSEPP program, administered by Hal Holbrook, Jr.,. Holbrook is out of town this week and unavailable for com-

Kirby also told the council that Charles Wynn, owner of Wynn Fire and Rescue had not returned the city's truck, and that he said the city owed him \$23,000 for repair bills.

The Mayor told the council that Wynn had told her earlier that he would not charge them for the repairs to the truck because he couldn't fix it and that he had offered to buy the truck for \$4,000. Kirby told the council she thought that was unacceptable.

Mumps

I recently overheard a young mother talking about taking her child for his MMR (measlesmumps-rubella) vaccine. We didn't used to do that. In my day, children were subjected to diseases like the measles – once we survived the ordeal, we became naturally immune. We know better than that now. But anytime I hear about "mumps," I am reminded of the time I had the disease when I was a young boy living in Mt. Vernon.

It was the habit of my family to visit the Dog Patch Free Zoo near London, Kentucky, each year. It served as a family escapade. We went to see the animals, followed by sharing a picnic at Levi Jackson State

The Dog Patch area had a trading post with shops selling items such as moccasins, tshirts, toys, novelty items, food, and coon-skin caps. After strolling through the zoo area, we always spent a considerable amount of the afternoon looking at the novelty gifts.

I was probably about six years old at the time. I can remember slowly walking through the zoo area, casually watching each of the caged animals. I specifically recall the zoo having a petting area for small animals, a snake pit,

monkeys, and a caged lion.

Does Poison Ivy Spread?

Poison ivy causes a rash with blisters that sometimes just seems to keep increasing. Because of this, many people believe that poison ivy spreads and that the fluid from the blisters contains a poison.

There are a couple reasons why the rash of poison ivy

spreads, but the fluid from the blisters is not one of them. This fluid is just serum from the body, the same as any other "water blister." The damage from poison ivy occurs

almost immediately after contact with the plant. The allergic reaction occurs when the resin in the sap binds with proteins of the skin. Only by washing the area within minutes of exposure can some of

the reaction be averted. After the resin has become bound to the skin it is only a matter of time--usually 2-3 days--before a person breaks out with the typical red, itchy skin and blisters of poison ivy.

Pollen and dust allergies occur immediately because the reaction is caused by a pre-formed antibody. With poison ivy, the poison binds with the skin immediately, but the rash is delayed because the reaction is caused by allergic cells which take time to multiply.

One of the reasons that the reactions appear to spread is because thinner skin may break out quicker than areas of thicker skin. The more sensitive skin will show the reaction first, but the other areas will follow. Also, areas with greater exposure to the poison will break out sooner. Finally, repeated exposures to poison ivy or even indirectly from animals, tools, clothes or other objects will cause more blisters to break out.

Prevention is the key, of course, but medicines can help slow the reaction and decrease the symptoms.







Dear Editor,

My name is Steve Griffin. I am a former Captain with the Mt. Vernon Fire Department and I would like to let you, and the citizens of Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County, know my side of the story in response to Mayor Clarice Kirby's comments in last week's Signal and on television. I cannot go into a lot of detail at this time and I apologize for this.

I was on the scene of a structure fire in Mt. Vernon last week when the mayor drove her vehicle down a street to the fire scene. Mayor Kirby has done this very seldom in the past. When the mayor wanted to drive through the scene, I advised her that the street was blocked with fire trucks and hose lines and that she could not drive across the fire hose or around the fire trucks. She insisted that she wanted to anyway, rolled up her window and backed up. She did not ask for any assistance. I turned around to watch the firefighters and the fire scene and someone yelled, "look out." I turned around to see the mayor driving toward me. I waved my arms and attempted to stop her but had to jump out of the way because I

was almost hit by her vehicle. She proceeded to drive across the 2 1/2" and 1 3/4" fire hoses, across residents' lawns and then attempted to move a fireman's personal vehicle that had its red lights flashing and was being used to block a

To the Livingston Fire Department, thank you for your assistance. I am sorry your lives were put in so much danger.

As to the mayor stated she had helped with insurance and eyeglasses, I have to this date received no help with my personal insurance and I do not know anyone who has. We, as members, did have insurance to cover any equipment that was damaged or lost on a scene, as do many other departments and emergency services and it was excellent but the mayor chose to drop it some time ago and we were never advised that it

The mayor has decided to hire part time officers for the fire department. Sure this would be great but I feel that members that were on the department already should have been offered those positions first or at least advised that the

ad would be placed in the Signal. We knew nothing. To me this was very disrespectful to myself and all other members. The mayor wanted all fundraiser money to pay bills with and we gave it to her. She stated that we stopped having fundraisers. We only had two a year -- the Bittersweet Festival and the pictures that were taken at the fire department. The mayor asked members to sell food at Old Fashioned Tradin' Days this year which we never had done before. We did as she asked and all proceeds were

turned over to the city. To the citizens of Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County. I joined the fire department in February of 1999. I joined because I truly enjoy helping people, as I am sure all volunteers do. We go out in all kinds of weather, all hours of the day or night, pay for our own gas and provide a lot of our own equipment because we like helping people. Myself, and all other volunteers, give us a lot of family time and risk our lives to help others. Some people call us crazy because we run into burning buildings when everyone else is running out and we don't get paid.

I did not become a firefighter for the pay, although it would be nice. I became a firefighter to help my fellow

I apologize to the citizens of Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County. But, after several years of only meeting resistance from the mayor, there comes a time when you have to say enough is enough. Thank you to the editor and citizens.

Dear Editor,

I am writing this letter to comment on some statements made by the mayor of Mt. Vernon concerning previous members of the city's fire department.

I, for one, know the hard and dangerous job these firemen have performed, since I am the wife of one of them, and I don't

feel they have been given the respect they deserve to have.

I know many citizens of Mt. Vernon have no idea what previous members went through or how they have been treated. Most of you had not had a look behind the scenes of everything that has happened.

I feel the mayor is doing a lot of finger pointing at those members of the fire department when she should be looking at herself.

I know that my husband was almost hit by the mayor's car that afternoon of the house fire. If it had not been for a fellow firefighter, and a concerned bystander, yelling at him to watch out at which point he looked over his shoulder and realized what was happening and ran to get out of the path of the mayor's car. He never turned his back on the mayor, yet the mayor turned her back on the entire fire department. I am sure that if anyone else had attempted to go through a fire scene, at which the roads were closed, then everything would have been different and the mayor herself would have felt differently about someone's life being put in danger. Also, on that same fire scene, the mayor drove over the fire hose that was being used by two fire departments to extinguish the house fire. She also proceeded to attempt to move another firefighter's vehicle that was being used to block off a street to traffic, so that she could go on with her daily schedule.

The firefighter that owned the vehicle requested that the mayor remove herself from his truck so, at that point, she decided to drive through residents' yards as she pleased. I know the mayor stated she could not get out the way she had come in and that is why she proceeded to do the things that she did. Well, I am sure her car is equipped with reverse like all other cars have and the last time I was around the streets involved, most of the houses had driveways that she could have turned around in. I don't see how the mayor can say she could not get back out the way she had come in since there was no other traffic involved.

I know the mayor is also making it look like previous members of the fire department did not do their part as a whole. Well, let me say that I know that my husband has been called many times by city hall and asked to do different tasks since he became a member of the

area. Bee and Mommie Katie scurried around filling the tables with enough food for the eight or ten people in our group. By that time, I was again lying on a blanket under a large shade tree – but feeling worse all the while.

Bee filled a small plate with food that she thought I could eat and brought it to me. There was not a morsel that I could stomach. She was growing more uneasy, especially with my fever going up as time passed. I distinctly remember her feeling of my glands just under my earlobes. Then I overheard her telling Mommie Katie, "I think David Joe has the mumps."

With that announcement, Bee and Mommie Katie put me in one of the cars and immedi-

ately headed for Mt. Vernon. As we drove, Bee said, "As soon as we get home, I am going to call Dr. Griffith." Then I began to get worried. After we got home, Bee indeed called our family doctor, who said he would be right up. I asked what the mumps would do to you. She calmly replied, "The doctor will give you some medicine, and you will be fine."

Within about half an hour, he pulled up in our driveway. After giving me a thorough examination, he finally declared, "Bee, Dave has the mumps. I am going to give him a shot, and he should stay in bed for a few days. Let him drink all the 7-Up he wants." All the 7-Up I could drink! He became my favorite doctor right then.

The next day my cheeks were extremely swollen, giving me the look of a chipmunk. 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
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

Conway Missionary Baptist established 75 years ago

Conway Missionary Baptist Church is celebrating 75 years of serving the Lord.

The church was organized on July 2 and 3, 1933 by a group of concerned and dedicated Christians who saw the need for a Missionary Baptist Church in the community.

There were 14 charter members -- 13 of which came from Brindle Ridge Baptist Church and one from Pleasant

Run Baptist Church. All of the charter members are now deceased.

Mrs. Ruth Leger Huff was baptized into the church on July 2, 1933 and, to our knowledge, is the only member who is still living of all those who came by letter of baptism at that time. The current membership is 212.

The church met at Conway School until the present church building was built on land obJuly 1, 1934 and wired for electricity in September of 1939. In June, 1977, under the

The building was dedicated on

pastorship of the late Bro. Bill Hamilton, new classrooms were started and the entire building was remodeled.

The steeple and bell were installed in 1980 and 1981 and the fellowship hall was built and air conditioning was installed in 1984. The stained glass windows were installed in 1986-87 and the baptistry was added during the winter of 2001. The church is now in the process of obtaining property adjoining their present site with plans to expand.

Conway is a small country church, located between Berea and Mt. Vernon. Our Sunday School enrollment is 68, with an average attendance of 40 to 45. Our Sunday worship service has an average attendance of 55 to 60.

Bro. Jim Ritchey is our pastor and has been here since April 2003.

We have a very active youth group. Susan Sears is the youth

The 5th Sunday is Youth Sunday when the youth and children conduct all Sunday School classes, as well as morning worship. This practice started in the late 70s.

Our youth are involved in many other activities, such as nursing home visits, Bible Camp, visitations and mission trips, as well as the things youth enjoy doing -- movies, skating parties, lock-ins and just being together to fellowship.









Before wedding, consider legal, financial aspects of marriage

With the summer wedding season in full swing, couples considering marriage have many things to think about before tying the knot. Two important issues are financial and legal decisions newlyweds face in Kentucky. It is important for both parties to be aware of and prepared to make these life changing decisions shortly after nuptials.

One of the biggest decisions a couple will make is whether or not to change their name once they are married. Historically, women have changed their last name to their husband's, but in today's world, many different name changing options exist including whether the wife or both should hyphenate the wife's and the husband's surnames, using the wife's last name as a middle name for one or both, both deciding on a new name, combining names or switching names with each

These decisions are personal and for the couple to make. When deciding on name changes, couples should weigh the importance of name recognition in professional and community circles, continuing a family name and all members of the immediate family, including any future children, having the same name.

If a person decides to change his/her name, they must make sure others are aware of the name change. The individual should update common records and organization memberships including driver's license, motor vehicle registration, passport, credit cards, social security, Internal Revenue Service, bank accounts and loans, safe deposit box, insurance, retirement plans, voter registration and selective service. People who choose non-traditional names should review all legal documents to make sure marital status is clarified.

A common misconception is

once a person is married they inherit their spouse's credit. This is not true. Credit depends on an individual's financial abilities and payment record. If possible, both parties should establish individual credit histories so they can acquire credit in the event of a spouse's death, separation or divorce. It is required by law for new joint accounts and loans to be in both spouses' names for credit pur-

Each couple will have their own way of managing finances. Financial institutions have many different types of checking accounts available. Couples should review all options before selecting the best fit for them. Couples should remember that financial institutions make new account holders sign a signature card. The way a person signs the signature card determines the type of checking or savings account he/she has, or if someone has the power of attorney to act on their

Once married, spouses may want change their beneficiary options to list the other on their retirement plans and life insurance policies. Be sure to make the appropriate changes with your employer and insurance company. You should make a new will to designate what property will you will leave to your new spouse in the event of your death. If you don't make a new will, state laws will determine how your assets are distributed to your spouse and

The Farm Service Agency announced that nominations for local county committee elections began on June 15 and will continue through August 1,

Ballots will be mailed beginning November 3. All ballots are due back to the local county office either via mail or in person by December 1. Newly elected committee members and alternates take office January 1.

To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in

the local administrative area in which the person is a candidate.

To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign a nomination form for county FSA committee election (FSA-669A). The forms and other information are available at the local FSA office or online at http://www.fsa. usda.gov. Nomination forms for the 2008 election must be postmarked or received by close of business on August 1.

FSA county committee members make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs and other important agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide, there are more than 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. Committees consist of three to five members who are elected by eligible local producers.



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



The Governor's Office Agriculture Policy has made special monies available to farmers suffering losses from the April 2007 freeze and 2007 drought. Nearly 70,000 dollars additional Cost Share funds are being made available for Rockcastle Counties Agriculture Leadership to assist affected farms.

Leadership has set the Cost Share cap at \$2500, which will allow approximately 27 applicants to be funded. Applications will be taken July 1 through July 31, 2008 and are available at the Rockcastle County Extension office. A scoring system provided by the state will determine which applicants receive funding. Applications will be scored in early August and approval letters by mid August.

Realizing that monies will not be available for all applicants Agriculture Leadership plans to run the 2008 Phase I Cost Share program starting in mid September.

- 1. Drilling for sub-surface aquifers and well establish-

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The Family Room By: Dr. Roy Don Whitehead

I was asked to speak to a group of Girl Scouts about domestic violence. I was impressed that this organization that has done so much to help young women is now committed to helping its members deal with dating violence. When I arrived at the meeting place and saw the study guide they were using, I was pleased to see that it dealt forthrightly with very sensitive issues.

There were six young ladies who met with me, ranging in age from 11 to 15. All were intelligent, alert and extremely well informed. They asked questions that reflected the problems they see at school everyday. I asked how many of them knew a fellow student who had been abused by a boyfriend, and four of the six raised their hands. They had seen the problem first hand.

"Dating violence occurs when one partner attempts to maintain power and control over the other through one or more forms of abuse, including sexual, physical, verbal and emotional abuse."[1] The Girl Scouts with whom I met understood that physical abuse is not the only form of abuse, and that abusers can use many methods to gain control of the relationship.

Women ages 16 to 24 experience the highest per capita rates of intimate violence – 20 per 1,000 women, making this age group the most vulnerable to abuse.[2] Thirteen percent of teenage girls who are in a relationship report being physically hurt or hit. The young women with whom I met already knew that abuse happens to far too many of their fellow students. Fiftyfour percent of all rape cases occur before victims reach 18 years of age. Again, this is the most vulnerable age.

The breakup is the most dangerous time in a dating relationship. Nearly one in five teenage girls report that their boyfriends threatened violence or self-harm when presented with a breakup. "I will hurt you," and "I will hurt myself' continue to be the abuser's trump cards to keep her from leaving. The fear of being hurt herself or the possible guilt the victim would feel if he hurts

himself may keep a victim in

an abusive relationship.

A study of 8th and 9th graders found that 25% have been victims of non sexual dating violence, and 8% have been victims of sexual dating violence. Twenty-six percent of teen girls in a relationship report enduring repeated verbal abuse, and 42% of boys and girls say the abuse occurs in a school building or on school grounds. Much abuse goes unreported, as over 30% of teenagers do not tell anyone about being victimized by their partners. Less than 3% of victims report the abuse to police or another authority figure and only 3% tell a family member about the violence.

These are sobering statistics indeed. As communities and schools renew their efforts to stop bullying, this effort should include stopping those who are bullies in dating relationships. Just because he says, "I love her," does not mean he is not abusing her. In fact, most abusers proclaim their love for their victims. Abuse, however, is not about love but is about power and control and bullies know how to play the power and control game. Victims need parents, teachers, counselors and administrators to help them voice their pain and help stop the abuse.

Growing Food in the Landscape

Let us consider planting and growing edible things in our yards in today's column. We may expand this to additional stories, but for the present let's consider growing some things without major changes to the yard or landscape. Growing food means more time together as a family, it means fewer trips to the store in the gas-guzzler, and it means fresh (and American grown to boot!) produce that you have control over as to pesticides, organic fertilizers, and you can be confident your tomatoes are free from salmo-

Having grown up on a farm, studied agriculture in high school, and with many years practical knowledge to go with "book learnin'" let me get started and see if we can't get you growing something edible in your yard this season.

Tilling up a section of yard is a possibility for a traditional garden plot. You may need to improve the soil, and you may need to use fertilizers. But, some veggies are so easy, maybe you can just plant and see what happens. For instance, with many stores selling tomato, pepper, and various type plants in small pots, or six packs, or full flats, you have quite a bit to select from to bring home and plant right away. If you till a new spot, you can plant a few tomatoes almost at once. Starting with seeds reauires longer a commitment...and in the Mid-Atlantic states sowing tomato or pepper seeds may not make

Just buy a few plants.

Finding a few empty spots in existing flower beds or borders that can accommodate a tomato plant, a little chives or a parsley plant is a quick way to start growing some edibles at home without a commitment to a big spot of garden.

If you are in a hurry, deciding to grow a garden and don't own a tractor or tiller, thy this: Do just what the farmers do, kill an area of nice green healthy grass with Roundup or Spectracide. Then plant bean seeds, corn seeds, carrot seeds, mustard, radishes, put out cabbage plants, etc. Almost as soon as the weed killer has dried. (The grass will turn brown and not compete with your new garden plants.) Be more careful with tomatoes and other very sensitive plants...you will have

to wait a day or two from weed killing to setting out new tomato plants. Some other plants may experience yellowing if planted too soon after weeds and grass are killed with chemicals. (I grew my best garden ever in Rockcastle County Kentucky in 1999 by this method of no-till gardening. To the point of canning and freezing over 60 quarts of corn and as many tomatoes. Beans galore, okra, even melons and cucumbers.)

Then consider simple landscaping using edibles. An apple tree, a pear tree or a cherry tree. Some blueberry bushes or a grape vine or a gooseberry. Some Jerusalem artichokes that produce tubers like potatoes, but bloom like sunflowers. Find a shady spot and sow a few lettuce seeds, or some basil in a sunny spot. Some plants don't require a lot of attention to get growing.

I always figure salad greens and "greens" that go with beans and cornbread and milk...you know, turnip greens, spinach, etc....well I actually prefer "wild greens". So, learn what you can harvest from the yard, or from the woods, that is already growing wild. Things like sorrell, (oxalis), water cress, (creasy greens), upland cress, polk, violets, dandelions, nasturtiums, chicory, plantain, lambsquarter weeds, just to start a list.

A dogwood can be replaced with a cornelian cherry dogwood, or a serviceberry tree. For those farther south, a citrus tree or loquat or other semitropical can be planted for landscaping as well as the fruit.

We have barely scratched the surface. But with the rapidly climbing prices for groceries, and the skyrocketing price of gas, perhaps I have inspired you to try a little gardening in your yard.

Afterall, picking some fresh parsley or garlic or sage, fennel or dill can be a refreshing and fun experience.

Herbs from the clamshells at the supermarket just aren't quite the same! Go ahead; try growing a few things in your garden or yard this summer. It is pretty easy really, and I know you'll be glad when harvest time comes and you return from the flower bed with fresh tomatoes and herbs for the kitchen table.

the water from the line or the line itself comes to the top of the ground, but that wasn't the case this time.

"Rocks had split a 20 foot section of four inch line and the water was going down, because the line was lying on top of a lot of other rocks, which were apparently on top of a cave," DeBorde said.

A boil water advisory has been in effect and remains in effect for all Western Water Customers in the Burr, Pine Hill and Calloway areas.

DeBorde said the cost of the repairs to the line and the numerous hours of overtime will cost the water association thousands of dollars.

when they finished the projects.

A representative for Greer Bros., present at the meeting because of the bid opening, told the court that he couldn't answer why it had taken his company so long to get to Rockcastle and it wasn't true that a big contractor like Greer Bros. didn't want a small county's business. "There was a tremendous work load because other county's got extra money for their roads and it was just the way things fell,"

he said. County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis reminded Allen that if he used Kay and Kay in his district that he would be getting less blacktop for the money allocated to his district. However, Allen responded that "10 months was too long to wait for blacktop.'

Allen did agree that Greer Bros. would be given first chance at any job because of their low bid, "but if they can't be here in a month, or two, or three, then I want to be able to contact Kay and Kay," Allen added.

Magistrate William Denny who, along with Magistrate Bill McKinney, did not vote in favor of accepting both bids commented that while the court had "had to wait on them (Greer's), they have had to wait on us too (for payment)."

The two companies submitted both an index and a fixed price bid for both binder and surface class asphalt. Greer's fixed price bid for asphalt, laid in place, Surface Class I, was \$63.50 a ton while Kay & Kay's was \$72.65. The two companies index price for the asphalt was \$57 a ton from Greer and \$68.20 a ton from Kay and

The court opted to go with the fixed price since the index price can fluctuate with the cost of oil. Allen commented that he thought having the price locked in would be a good idea because he didn't see things getting any cheaper

and seconded a motion by Magistrate Jan Stevens to accept the fixed price of both companies. Magistrate John Holbrook voted with Stevens and Allen.

Greer Bros.' low bid of \$52 a ton, to Kay and Kay's \$55 a ton, was the only one accepted for cold mix.

In other action, the court also accepted Benge Farm Supply's low bid for all culverts to be purchased during the next fiscal year. The only other bid submitted was from Davis Distributing from Dunnville and Benge's bid was substantially lower in their price for every size culvert.

The court also discussed the purchase of an occupational tax software program from Fiscalsoft Corp. out of Lexington which will be used to set up and administer the newly levied occupational tax in the county.

County Treasurer Joe Clontz told the court that he had looked into two different county's (Laurel's and Pulaski's) methods of collection of the tax and he recommended that the court purchase Fiscalsoft's Fiscal Tax 4.0 system which will cost \$14.995 for a 20 year license to use the system and the company's support system at \$2,000 a year. Clontz also told the court that a new computer will have to be purchased at a cost of \$1,281. Clontz got approval of both requests.

Clontz did tell the court that purchase of the system and computer would be put off until after July 1st, when the new fiscal year would begin.

Employers are required to begin withholding the 1 1/2% July 1st and will be required to make their first remittance of the tax to the county on October 30th.

The court also discussed closing a portion of Spirit Camp Road, from the cemetery on, but tabled it until their next meeting so the exact dimensions of the part to be closed can be ascertained.

As their final item of business, the court authorized the hiring of Lauren Clontz as a part-time temporary worker in Carloftis' office. Amanda Owens, who now works full time in the office, has gone to part time, since she is considering a return to school, and Clontz will be employed at a rate of \$8.50 an hour to fill in.

full emergency-service, in-theline-of-duty, ceremony, Arnold said. He was considered to be on duty when returning to his home from a 24-hour shift.

Hall's nickname was "Shrek" and was known as the "gentle giant" at work and in the community.

"He was a friend to everyone at the ambulance service," Arnold said. "I've never heard him say an unkind word to anyone."

Hall was dedicated to his job and had a promising future as a paramedic, he also said.

Just two weeks ago, he and fellow Garrard EMS employee Justin Bergman received a plaque at a fiscal court meeting for responding to an emergency call at the home of Jim and June Long on Lexington Road last October.

"We are very sorry and deeply saddened," Mrs. Long said about Hall's death. "I was absolutely devastated when I heard about it."

Hall and Bergman saved her life that night and she will be always grateful to them, she

It was Hall who rode with her in the back of ambulance to the hospital, worked on her with IVs and kept gently talking to her, encouraging her to hang on until they got there.

In fact she did not recognize Hall at the fiscal court meeting until he lean down to hug her. It was then she recognized his voice.

"He was so kind to me and my husband," she said. "He actually stayed and came in and spoke to me before he left."

"Even though I have only met Chris twice in my life, he made such an impact on my life," she added "I'm deeply grateful to him and also to the fact that we have EMTs in our county that can do what they are trained to do- save lives."

Still under a doctor's care, she had delayed recognizing the two men and was thinking about postponing it for another month. Now she is glad she and her husband went ahead.

Visitation for Hall was Wednesday night from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. at Rockcastle County High School. Funeral services will be held (today), Thursday, at the Rockcastle County High School at 11 a.m.

The Garrard County Ambulance service will serve as honor guard.

Hall will be transported to Crestview Cemetery in Mt. Vernon in the Garrard ambulance he made his last run in, Arnold added.

The family has requested that any donations be made to the Garrard County Ambulance Service or to the Clay County Ambulance Service where he worked part-time.

The mayor also presented the council with a list of the new members of the city's fire department, which includes 16 certified firefighters. Some of those on the list are serving on other fire departments such as Brodhead, Brindle Ridge and Livingston.

Kirby also said that she had appointed former Mt. Vernon Asst. Fire Chief David Bales as the new chief, after Weaver resigned, and that Bales was recruiting more firefighters.

Bales said the new department had responded to fires in the past week.

The first was Saturday night around 10:30., when they went the home of Marvin and Darlene Mink on West Main Street.

Bales said although fire department members were being paged by listening to scanners and/or radios from other departments they were on, they responded in only a few minutes.

That fire turned out to be just an electrical fire, which caused no damage. Seven firefighters responded. On Tuesday night, Mt. Vernon firefighters responded to another fire on Hwy. 1004 at the home of Wyoma Smith, around 5:30.

Bales said a storage building was completely engulfed when firefighters arrived.

"They didn't even call us until it was almost gone,"

Bales said. Nine firefighters went to that fire scene.

Bales said that, for now, the city was using the county fire truck to respond to both city and county fire trucks.

The new chief said the city obviously needs a fire truck and that one had been promised from a neighboring county, after all the paper work for the new city department was complete.

Bales said those papers were completed on Tuesday and turned over to Fire Commissioner Jeremy Rodgers and that the city's new fire department members would now be eligible for \$180,000 in life insurance and worker's compensation.

"I hope we can have a loaner truck for the city in a few days," Bales said.

Also at Monday night's meeting of the council the Mayor said she and the council would work together to amend the city's personnel policy to include firefighters who would be paid on a parttime basis. She said the fire department was on the agenda and she was going to discuss the matter of advertising for paid part-time officers last week, but that there was not a quorum at the meeting. "I did discuss it with Shelley (Lewis), Sharon (Saylor) and Wayne (Bullock), briefly," the Mayor said. "We will all work for what is best for the city," Kirby added.

And former firefighter Ryan Messenger was at the meeting to see how the mayor and council felt about him returning to the city's fire department. Messenger said he was out of town when everything between the department

and the mayor happened and that he did resign his position on the fire department by phone.

The mayor told him he thought he would be welcomed back and to tell anyone else who was interested that they, too, were welcome, but that "things were going to be different."

The mayor told Messenger things would be different than before and that everything was "workable." Messenger said he thought he would have no problem working with Chief Bales.

As for Mayor Kirby's personal legal problems, Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said that he had recused himself from the case, after it became obvious that the county may become involved in a legal dispute with the city, posing a conflict of interest for him.

Reynolds said that Attorney General Jack Conway had appointed Pulaski County Attorney Bill Thompson as a special prosecuter in the case, involving the mayor and firefighters.

That criminal case is under investigation by Kentucky State Trooper Scottie Pennington and involves an incident at a fire on Quarry Street in Mt. Vernon on June 16th, where the mayor is accused of driving across fire hoses being used to fight the

Reynolds said to his knowledge that Thompson had not been approached about filing any criminal charges as of yet by the firefighters or mayor.

The next regular scheduled meeting of the city council will be on July 21st.

"Meal or No Meal"

A school meal is still the best deal in town

Everyone is feeling the effects of rising fuel and food

Across the state and nation school districts are having to raise their meal prices. The cost of nearly everything is going up. Besides struggling with the rising cost of meat, eggs, milk and bread as well as corn and flour, schools also struggle with the fact that fuel prices are causing companies to charge more for the delivery of groceries. School food service departments are expected to pay their own way so there is little choice but to increase the cost of school meals.

The prices for school meals at the Rockcastle County Schools will increase this fall. Even with the increased cost of the school meal, parents will find that this is still the best deal in town. Public school systems that participate in the federal school lunch program must serve lunches that meet federal requirements and they must offer free or reducedprice lunches to eligible children. Federal and state guidelines require that meals provide meat, bread, fruit and vegetables, and milk to ensure the students get sufficient nutrients. All of these food items are more expensive to buy, but schools are still required to serve these as part of the school lunch. Increasing the price of a school lunch will help pay for the groceries purchased for the meals.

Elementary Student: breakfast = \$1.00lunch = \$1.25Middle/High Student: breakfast = \$1.00lunch = \$1.50

These meal prices are still lower than most of the surrounding school districts. Parents will find that it will not only be cheaper but also more nutritious for their children to eat breakfast and lunch at school.

With the rise in the cost of groceries and school meals, many families may be especially hopeful of qualifying for free or reduced-price meals. The federal meal applications will be mailed in July to families of currently enrolled students. Be sure to complete the application and return it in the self-addressed, stamped envelope before school starts on August 7th. If you do not receive an application in the mail, call or stop by Central Office to pick up an application. It doesn't take long to complete an application, and your student may qualify for free or reduced-price meals. Be prepared to pay for all student meals until you have been informed that you qualify for free meals.





Rockcastle County Government **Division of Occupational Tax Collection**

SUBJECT: 1.5% OCCUPATIONAL LICENSE TAX

The Rockcastle County Government provides that, effective July 1, 2008, the 1.5 % (one & one-half percent) Occupational License Tax (Ordinance No. 23) applies to all individuals, employers, and businesses in Rockcastle County.

The rate is:

- (1) 1.5% of each individual's gross wages, salaries and commissions earned within Rockcastle County.
- (2) 1.5% of the net profits of every business from activities conducted within Rockcastle County.

Additional provisions of the Ordinance are:

- (3) Each employer must withhold 1.5% Occupational License Tax from gross wages, salaries and commissions paid to employees for services performed within Rockcastle County.
- (4) Each business becoming subject to the Ordinance must at that time register for Occupational License Tax. Registration applications may be picked up at the Fiscal Court Clerk's office or call (606) 256-1293 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday.

The forms for required reporting are:

- (5) The return of Occupational Tax withheld must be used by employers to report Occupational License Tax withheld from employees. This return will be mailed out quarterly and is due on: April 30, July 31, October 31, and January 31.
- (6) The Net Profit License Tax Return must be used by each business to report annually its net profits subject to 1.5% license fee. The return will be mailed out at the end of each business fiscal year and is due one-hundred five days (105) thereafter.

THIS IS A NOTICE OF CLASS ACTION AND OF A PROPOSED ADDENDUM TO CLASS ACTION SETTLEMENT; YOU, YOUR WARD OR YOUR CHILD MAY BE A MEMBER OF THE CLASS.

THIS IS NOT A NOTICE OF A LAWSUIT AGAINST YOU. TO ALL MEMBERS OF THE CLASS DEFINED AS FOLLOWS:

"All present and future Kentuckians with mental retardation and/or related conditions who live with caretakers and who are eligible for, and have request ed, but are not receiving Medical Assistance community residential and/or support services."

A lawsuit in this Court involved claims, by the named Plaintiffs, that Defendants violated provisions of Title XIX of the Social Security Act by the manner in which they administered that portion of the Medicaid program concerning the provision of Intermediate Care Facility for persons with Menta Retardation (ICF/MR) services in community-based settings. The Court ruled that the case was to be maintained on behalf of the class defined above. The lav suit sought only prospective, injunctive relief ordering reforms in the manner in which the program is conducted. The Court, following a fairness hearing in March of 2006, ruled that the parties' settlement agreement was fair, adequate, and reasonable and it ordered the parties to abide by the settlement agreement. The Parties have now mutually reached an addendum to the settlement agreement, the terms of which are more fully described in § IV below. This case involves <u>no money damages</u>. There will be no individual awards of money damages to either the named Plaintiffs or to the class members.

The purpose of this notice is to advise you of your possible membership in the class, your rights with respect to the lawsuit (including your right to exclude yourself, if you so desire) and including your rights with respect to a proposed addendum to the settlement agreement.

Your rights may be affected by this lawsuit.
