Rogers helps celebrate completion of sewer line project at Lake

United States Congressman Hal Rogers was in the county on Monday to help the city of Mt. Vernon celebrate the completion of a sewer project that will help protect Lake Linville.

The lake supplies drinking water for 23,000 people, serving the vast majority of Rockcastle County and portions of five neighboring counties.

A new sewer line was recently installed along Lake Linville Road to serve 35 homes, which had failing or no septic systems, the boat dock and the VFW Club.

The sewer line also connected to the campground and city park at Lake Linville.

As a result of the sewer project, a sewage dumping station has been added to the RV parking lot and restrooms will soon be installed at the recently renovated park.

Mayor Clarice R. Kirby hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony at Lake Linville Park with Rogers as the featured speaker. Rogers was responsible for securing the federal funding for the \$755,000 sewer project through the PRIDE program.

"This is one of my happiest moments since becoming mayor," Kirby said. "Our community has wanted this sewer line since the lake was built back in 1969. A few years ago, the project moved to the front burner when the lake had an outbreak of blue-green algae, and untreated sewage fed the problem. I want to thank Congressman Rogers and PRIDE for helping us take care of Lake Linville."

"I commend Mayor Kirby and the city council for taking this project from the drawing

Ordinance passed by Mt. Vernon Council 1,525 acres, 350 residents to be annexed by city

After very little discussion from the Mt. Vernon City Council, or the 30 or so visitors at Monday night's regular monthly meeting, the council unanimously voted to annex 1,525 acres and 325 people located southwest of the Mt. Vernon City limits.

The vote came after a short presentation by the city's engineer Luther Galloway, who also presented a map showing the areas that would be annexed.

The passage of the first ordinance came after several months of discussion by the council, who authorized Galloway to move forward with the project, in an effort to square up the city limits.

Mayor Clarice Kirby told the council that Monday's ordinance was the first of three the council would need to pass to square-up the city's limits, instead of the "jagged, haphazard way the line now runs."

The property included in the first ordinance is located along Hwy. 1249, (Sand Springs Road), Hwy. 2549, (White Rock Road), and along Hwy. 150, past Benton Bullock's Subdivision.

Bullock's Subdivision, both Rockcastle Industrial Parks, Countryside Estates and Hanson Aggregates are among the properties that will be annexed in this first ordinance.

Mayor Kirby said residents who would be annexed into the city would be notified within two weeks as to the city's passage of the ordinance.

According to the ordinance the council passed, any landowner affected by the City's actions may submit a petition in opposition to the annexation to the city.

According to Galloway, the city would then turn the petition over to County Clerk Norma Houk, who would verify the petition. If enough

Railroad crossings will be closed for improvements

CSX officials announced this week that each of the approximately 20 railroad crossings from Mullins Station, through Mt. Vernon, to the Rockcastle Industrial Park #1 will be closed at some point for major improvements.

The crossings will be closed one at a time while the work is being done to upgrade the crossings as well as the eight miles of track.

The work began in the county this week with work on the crossings in Mt. Vernon slated for next Monday and Tuesday.

signatures are verified the annexation question would be placed on the ballot at the next General Election.

Mayor Kirby told the council and the many visitors that residents would benefit from being annexed by having better police and fire protection, lower water rates and, eventually, sewer service and lower insurance rates.

Council votes to work with Hanson on park property

In an unanimous vote on Monday night the Mt. Vernon City Council authorized Mayor Clarice Kirby to work out a right-of-way agreement between the city and Hanson Aggregate for less than a tenth of an acre at the city park on Williams Street.

Several Hanson employees, including vice-president Craig Morgan, made a pitch for the right-of-way agreement, saying it would help them complete their \$6 million expansion project and benefit the city and county as well.

Morgan said he did not think CSX would have agreed to refurbish eight miles of track from Mullins Station to the Industrial Park without Hanson doing their project and that by working on the track and keeping it open, more factories may be more inclined to locate in the park.

The agreement between the city and Hanson would take a portion of the park at the rear and part of the walking track.

Morgan said Hanson would do all the work and fix the track back so that it would not be noticeable that it had been shortened.

Morgan said CSX was "absolutely" requiring Hanson to have more room for trains that will be coming in and out of the Quarry in order to haul rock to Georgia Power from Mt. Vernon. The rock being shipped is a unique ultra-pure limestone which is used as a scrubber stone in coal fired power plants.

Hanson has secured a long-term contract with Georgia Power and Morgan said his company was looking for more customers who may need the unique rock.

The trains traveling into Mt. Vernon will have anywhere from 60 to 70 cars and Morgan said approximately 30 trains will come and go at the Quarry in the next year.

Morgan was asked several times by visitors, Perry and

Livingston man shot Saturday

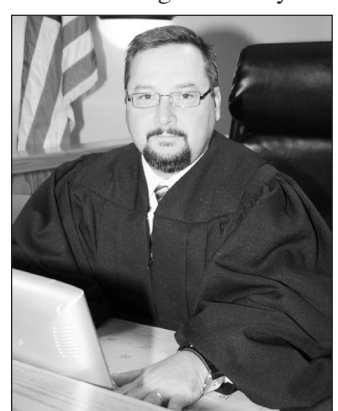
A Livingston man is listed in serious condition at the U.K. Medical Center, after being shot in the chest area, and another is behind bars charged with first degree assault.

Changes needed at Animal Shelter

"A righteous man regardeth the life of his beast"
Proverbs 12:10

We are writing in regards to the Rockcastle County Animal Shelter. We are not trying to cause controversy, point fingers or place blame on anyone. We simply see an opportunity to use the attention already brought on the shelter to try to improve upon a variety of issues. We do not personally know a single person involved with the shelter from Judge/Executive Carloftis to the magistrates down to the director. We did not even know any of these people by name, other than Judge Carloftis, so there are no personal attacks or vendettas on our part.

After attending the fiscal court August 12th, we felt we did learn a couple of things about Judge Carloftis. #1, he seems to be a compassionate and caring man about the welfare of animals - which is a very good thing since under state law the judge/executive is ultimately responsible for running a county shelter. #2, he has many county issues to attend to and is obviously not able to devote an abundance of time to any single issue. We believe some of our suggestions may help the judge spend less of his time on concerns of the shelter. He seemed very receptive both to our concerns and our ideas for the future of the shelter. That being said, we want to inform the public of what we believe is needed and what we experienced at the meeting.

We moved here 12 years ago and immediately noticed an abandoned animal problem. We started picking up animals from the side of the road, upon moving here (16 thus far), and provided homes for all of them. We also had each spayed or neutered.

Within a few months, we responded to a flyer at the Brodhead grocery for concerned citizens to form a shelter, posted by Terry Eden-Lunce. From that, a small group was organized (R.A.A.P.) that worked fervently to gain support and funding.

We managed to get a beautiful piece of land donated to us for the location of the shelter. We drew out plans and got enough donations to lay a foundation but could not generate the funds to finish the building. At that time, the county stepped in and took over the shelter.

The county set up their own rules for how the shelter would be run, which did not correspond with the vision we had and we were told our input would no longer be needed. Most of us backed away at that time, as their goals in no way matched ours.

The shelter was opened with

litter or no fanfare and most of the public knew nothing of it. Since that time, the shelter has become nothing but a convenient killing ground for all the unwanted pets of this county.

There has never been an active move to adopt these animals, i.e. no advertisements for pets available, no please for help with the shelter, nothing - absolutely nothing to benefit the well being of the shelter and the helpless animals taken there.

The shelter was placed under the care of the magistrates -- why we don't know. These people are not known to have shown any interest in running the shelter (did anyone notice them stating that improving the shelter was of concern in the last elections?). Allow me to illustrate the sentiments of at least one of these magistrates during this meeting. Mr. Ralph Allen stated, in regard to the recent horrible puppy incident, and I quote "they are there to be killed anyway. I don't see what the big deal is. While I am sure here are many who would defend Mr. Allen as a good man who does much good for the community, that is not the issue here. We are only concerned with this particular issue and the cavalier attitude portrayed by his statement. I would like to pose a question. If you were condemned to death, as is almost every animal taken to the shelter, would you prefer your death to be humane euthanasia or would you prefer to be tied up in a garbage bag with other dead bodies and placed into a freezer to either suffocate or freeze to death? It IS a big deal! For anyone there who still just doesn't get it -- the importance of humane treatment of animals -- please consider these verses from Ecclesiastics: *I said in mine heart concerning the estate of the sons of men, that God might manifest them, and that they might see that they themselves are beasts. 3:18 For that which befalleth the sons of men befalleth beasts; even one thing befalleth them: as the one dieth, so dieth the other; yea, they have all one breath; so that a man hath no preeminence above a beast: for all is vanity. 3:19 All go unto one place; all are of the dust, and all turn to dust again. 3:30 Who knoweth the spirit of man that goeth upward, and the spirit of the beast that goeth downward to the earth? 3:21.*

While trying to garner the support of this community for R.A.A.P. we encountered some very idiotic attitudes, such as the comment made when we

Instead, the waitress brought out two tiny cups containing maybe four thimbles-full of some kind of liquid.

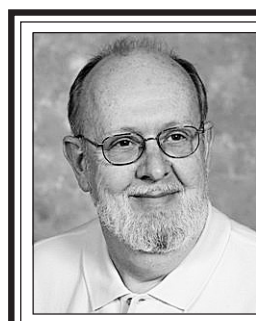
I asked Dwain what we were supposed to do.

Mommie Katie's Apron

A few weeks ago I noticed that my wife was ironing -- a chore that she almost never performs. (She promised to love, honor, and cherish -- but not to iron.) As a matter of fact, we could almost get along without an iron; we don't even own an ironing board. Therefore, my curiosity got the best of me, and I just had to find out what prompted the ever-so-rare ironing she was doing. Upon looking closer, I saw that she was pressing several of her mother's vintage aprons.

You may not know it, but aprons are "in" again, and particularly so if they are old ones from the good ole days. Upon my mother-in-law's death, several old aprons were found. A

couple of them -- one belonging to my wife's mother and the other to her grandmother -- were kept as keepsakes.

But most of the other ones were somewhat delicate and ornate. When I asked why she was washing and ironing the protective garments, she explained that she was giving them to our friend Mimi. It is a perfect fit. Half the time Mimi looks like she stepped right out of the sixties anyway, and she is also a young mother who sees the practical use of an apron when cooking and serving.

At about the same time that I found my wife ironing, one of my high school friends (Mattie Burton Petrey) sent me an e-mail about how the apron was used in the 1950's. I took this as I sign that I should write about my grandmother's daily use of these fine pieces of apparel.

Mommie Katie donned her apron as soon as she got dressed in the morning. The principal use was, of course, to protect her dresses while she prepared the family meals. But that was hardly the only use for these garments. I am sure that I will not be able to explain thoroughly the many ways that she put them to use; however, I will try to demonstrate their valuable nature.

The first thing that comes to mind is how Mommie Katie used her apron as a potholder to lift hot items from the wood-burning kitchen stove. She daily prepared a large pot of very strong coffee, which was aged on the stove throughout the morning and early afternoon. Each time she finished her cup of brew, the apron was

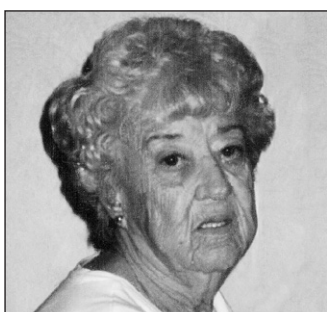
Elizabeth Miller

Finally some halting progress...

Dear Editor,

Well, finally some halting progress is being made by our Eastern Rockcastle Water Association (ERWA) Board. First, the Board has recently conducted two meetings that were in fact open to the public. Second, the Board has become aware that it must abide by the provisions of Kentucky's Open Records law, which enables members of the public to request information from ERWA records about its operations. Still the Board has not informed the public if or when it will produce an audited financial statement of its operations. In more than 14 years of operations the ERWA Board has failed to have an independent financial audit. It is crucial that an audit be done and the results presented by the Board at an open meeting so the public can know how the state and federal funds and user payments received by the ERWA board are managed.

Now the ERWA Board is facing what might be its most important and challenging decision to date, that is, how to conduct a fair and legal election of Board members at its forthcoming annual meeting. Until the recent hiring of a lawyer, the Board seemed to be lacking in or ignoring of the simplest of parliamentary procedures and rules for conducting meetings or appropriately electing Board members. We all remember too well the hanging chads in Florida and charges of voter intimidation and stolen National elections.

We certainly want to assure that the election of ERWA Board members at the next annual meeting is above board and avoids any question about its honesty or legitimacy.

Unfortunately some threatening signs have already appeared. A voter proxy form was sent July 16, 2008 by the ERWA Board vice president to select members seeking their support of two currently serving Board members. There are two important issues regarding this matter. The first is that the ERWA district office reports that this voter proxy form was drafted and approved by the recently hired Board lawyer. The fact that the proxy form has been available and not approved for use by other ERWA members gives patently unfair advantage to an entrenched few members of the Board. The second issue is whether ERWA funds were used to pay for the mailing of these proxy statements and the enclosed return stamped envelopes. This would seem at a minimum to be an inappropriate use of limited ERWA funds when the ERWA user rates for water are already much more expensive than water in many districts and higher than many of our neighbors can afford. The cost of this mailing by the Board vice president seeking votes could be nearly a \$1,000, including postage and staff time to prepare it.

Worse yet is the fact that some users have reported that their votes were solicited by ERWA staff more than a month ago. Unfortunately some of these ERWA water users were behind in their payments, raising the specter that they were targeted because of their potential vulnerability to intimidation. These ERWA users were told they were being asked to sign a proxy voter form as part of the "regular operation" of ERWA.

We can have a fair election of ERWA Board members, and it is hoped that the Board's lawyer will advise the Board of the procedures necessary to assure this. At a minimum the following actions should be taken. 1) An approved ERWA voter proxy form should be published in the Mount Vernon Signal ASAP so that it is available to all members who might wish to collect proxy votes. 2) A reasonable time period should then be given in which proxy votes can be collected by other ERWA members to assure equal opportunity with ERWA Board members who have been involved in collecting proxy votes for several weeks. 3) The verification process for counting votes and deciding who is elected as a Board member should also be specified in the Mount Vernon Signal. 4) Someone independent of the current Board should be appointed to conduct the annual election and vote counting according to established parliamentary procedures. 5) The person chosen to conduct this election should be someone who is not a current, former, or future ERWA Board member.

If these minimal conditions of fairness and legitimacy cannot be accomplished by the date set for the ERWA annual meeting and election of Board members, then the meeting should be rescheduled for a later time so these conditions can be met.

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Union Chapel Pentecostal Holiness dates back to 1906

Union Chapel Pentecostal Holiness Church, located two and a half miles northeast of Brodhead on Hwy. 1505, is one of the oldest Pentecostal churches in Rockcastle County. The current building was built after arsonists burned the original church building in 1910. The old building was about a mile further northeast on 1505. The original church was a rural community church, built by members around 1906, where more than one denomination worshipped, including Methodist, Baptist and Pentecostal Holiness.

Two early preachers for the church were the young Ben Doyle and W.G. Capps. Shortly after the burning of the first church building, members began clearing land to build the present day church. It was to still carry the name Union Chapel, but be Pentecostal in doctrine. J.M. Lear of Hiatt and T.S. Frith of Brodhead donated a half acre of land each, for the new church site. While the land was being cleared and the building constructed by the local rural people, services were

conducted in the members' homes. The deed was finalized March 28, 1913 with T.S. Frith, J.M. Lear, James Brock and William McQueen chosen as trustees. The sturdily built house was heated by a big coal and wood stove which sat in the middle of the building. The seats were made by placing 2x6s on wooden blocks and pieces of sawed-off logs, and were used for several pews. Light was furnished by kerosene lamps and later by Coleman gasoline lights until electricity became available. Being in a rural community with poor roads and, with only walking and horse providing transportation in those days, in the beginning, there was no regular pastor for the church. However, there was a seldom regular service held without a preacher being present even though he had to ride several miles to attend these services. It has been said that sometimes the preacher's shoes had been known to freeze to their saddle stirrups in bad weather, enroute to or from service. There were many memorable ministers who contributed to the growth of the church. Three of those ministers were later honored each year in August with a memorial service for their dedicated work. Those three were Andy Burke, John Blackburn and John Jess Belcher. Over the years the building has been modernized with a new heating and cooling system, Sunday School rooms, rest rooms, carpeting, padded pews and many, many more improvements, such as new blacktop in the parking lot. However, the original altar, which was constructed of sturdy poplar boards and made like a bench, still remains in the church. The current pastor is Bro. Ralph Reynolds of Crab Orchard, who has been a member of the church since 1980 and pastor since 1996. Reynolds, replaced Bro. Charles Shivel, who served at Union Chapel for about four years, after taking over for Bro. Virgil Brock, who pastored at Union Chapel for over 10 years. Bro. Brock had taken over for Bro. Oliver Abney.

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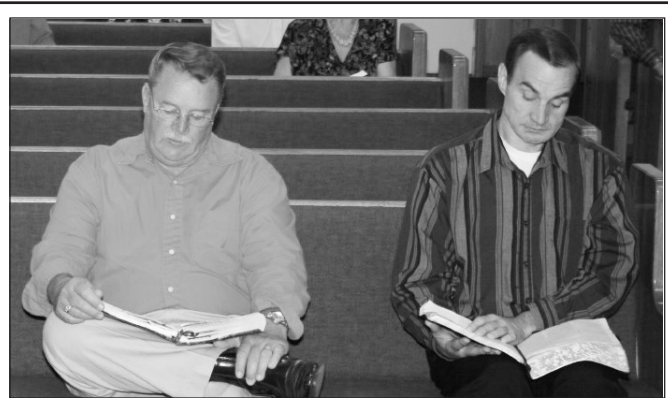

pel albums. Out of all his recordings, they were the only ones to receive a Grammy award.

For me, Elvis and his music were some of my first memories. Mom was a big Elvis fan by the time I came along, and played his music regularly. I couldn’t have been over three or four when I remember hearing my first Elvis music on the radio, and Mom explaining who he was. It wasn’t too long before I started listening on my own and watching his movies. I’d get one of his albums occasionally, too. I guess you could say that I grew up with Elvis, and like everybody else, would never have dreamed of the day when he wouldn’t have been around.

I think this frame of mind is what made his death such a shock to this country and made such an impact. He was so young and vital, and seemed indestructible. He seemed to embody an essence of an era and a lifestyle that appealed to us. It was an essence of the purity and innocence of the fifties; a time when life was simple and real, and even glamorized in the film industry. After all, this was supposed to be “the devil’s music” and not suitable for decent, God-fearing, folks. He seemed to be what everybody loved and hated all rolled up in one personage.

I’ve always thought that when Elvis died, a little piece of America died with him. There may have been a lot of famous and notable individuals before him, and many have come along since, but Elvis will always be in a class by himself.

It would be hard to imagine an old, feeble, Elvis with wrinkles, glasses, hearing aids, dentures, and mobile only with the assistance of a cane. As it is, he will always be remembered as young, handsome, and full of life...forever young, as they say.

asked to place a donation jar in one of the oldest and most prominent businesses downtown. The comment was “Honey, don’t you know we just put those things in a gunnysack and throw them in the river?” This was not a joke as no one else was there to hear it -- it was said in all seriousness. We knew then what we were up against. Mr. Allen’s thoughtless comment gives a clear illustration of the attitude of at least one of the people we have given such a huge responsibility.

Another suggestion, and a major concern of ours, is that all animals adopted from the shelter be spayed/neutered. That led to a comment from Magistrate Denny that people here could not afford that and if they were going to pay that kind of money, they would pick their own dogs.

First of all, that makes no sense, but secondly, ask anyone who has ever rescued a shelter pet and they will tell you there

are no better pets. Animals understand acts of kindness and will repay you with love and joy for a lifetime. The current adoption fee is \$20 for an animal that has no vaccinations, no rabies shots, no flea/tick control and no spay/neuter regulations. If people cannot afford to spend more for a health spayed/neutered pet, they cannot afford a pet. They are going to adopt a \$20 pet, take it home and it will have multiple litters which will end up costing much, much more than the initial spay/neuter fee, which should be provided by local vets at a reduced rate. (Frankfort offers applications for low-income families to obtain this service - which should automatically be given out at our shelter).

All of these unwanted litters, that people cannot afford, are promptly returned to the shelter for certain death at a cost to us all. We would rather see the animal initially put down than offered up for \$20 to go back to the public and continue the overpopulation problem.

Do you know that one female cat, and its offspring, can produce 420,000 cats within seven years and one female dog, and her offspring, can produce 67,000 pups within six years? Let’s stop this insanity.

There are a multitude of untapped resources the shelter could be using but they have never pursued any of these avenues. There is not enough space to name all the matters that are of grave concern but, the first thing that must be done is to take this shelter out of the control of an uncaring and ignorant (ignorant meaning unknowledgeable) group of people -- not necessarily each one, but certainly some - and placing it under the control of a volunteer group of concerned citizens who want to take the time and effort necessary to run a successful shelter that is beneficial to the helpless animals that are placed there and the community as a whole.

We know there were many supportive people who helped R.A.A.P. We beg of you to please come together again and voice your concern for the future of this shelter. Let’s make ADOPTION, no death, the primary goal.

Please contact Judge Carloftis with your support and possible interest in forming a board for the welfare of this shelter. As a side note, a big part of this meeting was dedicated to the promotion of Mt. Vernon for bring in new companies/businesses to help our community grow. Having lived in five states and been involved in community growth, be assure no one wants to invest in a community with such archaic practices regarding their homeless pet population. It is time to change. Please show your support and help us improve our county by providing a more responsible animal shelter.

A special note to all of you who believe these are “just animals,” not people and therefore not worth all this attention and especially to those of you who believe you have a relationship with God, please pick up your Bible and study these verses, in addition to the ones already quoted: Genesis 9:9-12, Job 12:7-10 and Hosea 2:19=8-19. While we understand there are also cases of human neglect and abuse in this county, that

should in no way take away from the seriousness of the humane treatment of our animals. After all, it has been proven that people who abuse animals are also prone to abuse other humans.

As stated in the Aug. 14 paper, we are not trying to place blame or persecute anyone. We don’t claim to be better or worse than anyone else. We simply see an opportunity to use the attention already drawn to the shelter and help in any way possible to make our shelter a more positive experience for all.

On behalf of the animals, of whom God himself made us stewards, thank you for your help.

used to lift the pot from the stove to pour another cup. It was also used to remove extremely hot iron baking pans from the oven, especially her famous cornbread muffin pans.

Aprons were used outdoors as well as in the kitchen. I have watched Mommie in the early morning as she gathered eggs from the hen house, placing them in her apron to bring in and cook for breakfast. Or she might fill it with kindling when she started to build a fire before cooking. Sometimes she filled her apron with strings or hulls when she broke fresh half-runner green beans.

From the garden, her apron was filled with all sorts of vegetables, such as tomatoes, radishes, cucumbers, or even corn. After she hulled the corn or peeled the other vegetables, the apron was used to carry the waste products to the edge of the garden for disposal.

In the fall, that same apron was used to bring in apples, peaches, and pears for canning or preparing those wonderful cobbler. It was also used for transporting her beautiful flowers into the house in order for her to put them into vases to decorate our home.

That big old apron was used on many occasions to wipe away the tears of a growing boy and to clean surplus grime from our faces. Once I remember her using it to clean a bicycle scrape from my knee. She was even known to clean our ears with the hem!

When my mother (Bee) or Pop announced that company was pulling into the drive way, Mommie Katie used that big old apron to take a few swipes in the living room to wipe away

the dust that had accumulated on her furniture. She could dust a whole room in a matter of seconds when company was walking up the lawn.

I also remember her wiping away the perspiration from her brow with her apron when she was working in her flower garden. Everyone in the neighborhood agreed that her flowers were the finest in the area, and she worked hard to keep them free from weeds and insects.

Mommie Katie’s apron was a large part of who she was, and she used it for a wide variety of daily chores. Except for Sunday morning and Wednesday night when she attended church, it hung from her waist ready to be used for an assortment of useful reasons.

Most ladies of those days found them to be invaluable aids for cleaning, carrying, and wiping. As a matter of fact, when I picture Mommie in my mind’s eye, it is always with an apron on. It was a major part of who she was.

No wonder I found my wife ironing aprons -- it was a labor of love.

But that was before the opening rounds of Women’s Beach Volleyball. I don’t know about the rest of my blog buddies who suddenly became quiet on the subject of boycotting the Olympics, but I can tell you for sure that my attention was captured and cuffed about thirty seconds after, out of curiosity, I tuned in.

Loretta called me a dirty old man for being so enthralled with watching young women so scantily attired in bikinis play volleyball. I will admit that the girls were exceptionally physi-

cally fit and attractive but two-on-two volleyball at that level of athleticism is simply unbelievable. I can’t imagine myself on the court taking a serve from name your favorite representative from any country unless I was wearing body armor. 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Competition begins in three weeks for Marching Rockets

There are less than three weeks left until competition season begins, and band practice is now more frequent and more intense. The whole band practices from 3-6 on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons and 3-5 on Fridays. The percussion section also practices on some Monday afternoons from 3-4:30 as well as all the other days. The volunteer assistants, Colorguard instructors Jon Baldwin, Christy Napier and Stephanie Barnett and volunteer Brass instructor: Matt Durham are working as hard as everyone else in the band and deserve a lot of credit for how good the band looks and sounds this year.

A simple definition of music is the arrangement of sounds and tones to produce harmonies

and melodies. Different combinations of instruments produce the unique sounds and tones attributed to one genre or another. An integral instrument to the genre of marching music is the mellophone.

The mellophone is essentially a marching French Horn, thus they are called the "horn" section. The horns are part of the brass section which also includes trumpets, baritones, trombones and sousaphones. The mellophone is a brass instrument with a broad range of high and low notes, very similar to the French horn, and is designed for playing while marching. The mellophone has a forward facing bell which projects the sound in the direction the player is facing and since the audiences for marching band competitions are all on

one side, directional sound projection is preferred.

The Marching Rockets has three mellophone players this year. Meghan Nation, a senior who is now in her 7th year as a Marching Rocket, is the section leader for horns and saxophones. Meghan has played the mellophone for six of those years, taking one year out to sub in the drum line as a bass drum player. As section leader she loves "being able to teach my section how to carry on." Her favorite horn song is "Hey Baby" by Bruce Channel. Her most favorite part of being in the band is "getting to travel with my friends," and her least favorite activity is Friday afternoon practices.

noon practices.

Mackenzie Craig, a seventh grader, is in her second year with the Marching Rockets. Her favorite song to play on the horn is "Night on Bald Mountain" by Modeste Mussorgsky, which is part of this season's repertoire. The best part of being in the band is "being with friends and everyone you know." Her least favorite activity is "marching in the heat all day."

Lillie Beichler, also a seventh grader, is in her first year with the Marching Rockets. Her favorite song to play is also "Night on Bald Mountain" by Modeste Mussorgsky. 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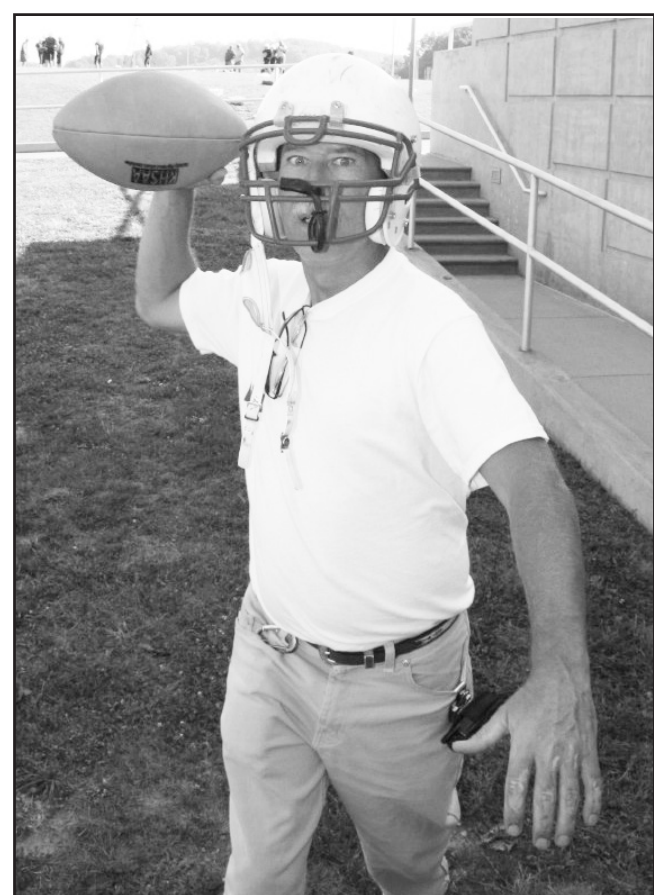

Amy Mink, if Hanson was going to pay for the property and each time he indicated that Hanson, simply wanted the right-of-way and to be a good neighbor.

When councilman Joe Mullins made his motion to work out a deal with Hanson, he said "don't just give it to them," but work something out. That is the direction Mayor Kirby said she would take. "We'll get something worked out," she said after the meeting.

Some residents were also concerned about the amount of dust and noise the trains would cause.

Morgan said most of the dust in the area was caused by the construction project now underway and trucks coming in and out of the quarry. "The trains actually cause very little dust to circulate," he said.

And Morgan said his company would do a better job of watering the road down to keep dust generated by the trucks at a minimum.

He said construction for the expansion should be completed late this fall.

Sidewalk project hits a huge snag

Mayor Kirby told the council on Monday night that the current sidewalk project, now underway on Richmond Street, has some problems.

The Mayor said the contract with Larry Coffey Construction of Berea, does not call for the completion of sidewalks past School Street on the west side of the street, although she and "everyone else" thought the contract called for the sidewalks to go to the Sally J Road.

Engineer John Carmen, who drew the specifications for the project, said the contract calls for the sidewalks to go to Rite-Aid on the east side of the street and stop at School Street on the left.

Carmen said there may have been some miscommunication, but that the plans had always been drawn up that way, and that he was not responsible for the misunderstanding.

An obviously very disgruntled Mayor said, "That sure wasn't the way it was explained to me."

After a lengthy discussion as to who was right or wrong in the matter, councilman Clark Mullins made a motion to try and work out a deal with Coffey to finish the sidewalks on both sides of Richmond Street, as far as he could with what money remains in the \$346,000 project.

Carmen told the council he would come up with a unit price as to what it would cost and how cost effective Coffey could do the work for the city, as a favor to the city at no cost, even though he shouldn't have to.

In a nutshell the city will not be able to run the sidewalks to Rite-Aid on the east side, because they will have to use that money to fix the sidewalks on the west side, to make them come out even on both sides.

City will go to court to try and get fire truck back from Wynn

The council voted on Monday night to authorize Mayor Kirby to have City Attorney Jerry Cox file a motion in Knox Circuit Court to get the city's fire truck back from Wynn's Fire and Rescue in Corbin.

Kirby said she did not think the city should pay the \$13,000 repair bill because Charles Wynn, owner of Wynn Fire and Rescue, could not fix the truck.

Kirby said the truck was taken to Wynn by former members of the fire department without her knowledge and that it was "just a matter of filing the motion."

When questioned by councilman Mullins, Kirby said Cox would charge the city \$250 to file the motion and that it would take one day for the Circuit Court to rule that the city could have the truck.

However, Mullins told the Mayor he didn't think it would be as easy as she thought it would be to get the truck back as he made the motion to seek the city attorney's help.

Councilwoman Shelly Lewis said it was her understanding that the truck had about \$20,000 in equipment on it that the fire department needed. She also said that \$10,000 of Wynn's \$13,000 bill was for labor.

Lewis said the council obviously needed to get something done, soon.

Cox was unavailable for comment on Wednesday, as to whether or not he had filed the motion.

Burdette," on the Mt. Vernon forum of Topics.com, according to a news release from the Kentucky State Police.

The postings on the Internet included several threatening comments by Tompkins, who went by the handle, "Big D Daddy." At one point Tompkins asked, "who wanted to put a bullet through Jeff Burdette's head, I do for one..." and ... "I'm thinking soon I'll begin my rampage, probably in a couple of days," said Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds.

Burdette is the Chief Circuit Judge of the 28th Judicial Circuit which includes, Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski Counties, and is also a former County Attorney for Rockcastle.

However, Reynolds said Tompkins' threats were not limited to Burdette, but included a variety of local, state and federal law enforcement officers. "He is no stranger to the court system where several criminal charges have been lodged against him over the years, some of which were prosecuted by Judge Burdette during his time as Rockcastle County Attorney," Reynolds said.

At the time of Tompkins' arrest, a search warrant was served on his residence and a computer was confiscated for evidence.

Court documents reveal a long list of convictions against Tompkins, which include:

Criminal Mischief, Terroristic Threatening, Violation of a Domestic Violence Order, Criminal Trespass, Harrassing Communications, and a Felony, Escape 2nd Degree, for which he served 213 days in 1998.

And most of the charges against Tompkins involved his family and police.

According to court documents, the affidavits in several Emergency Protection Orders, included allegations that Tompkins threatened family members' lives and shooting at family members' houses.

In a 2002 citation for a terrorist threatening arrest by State Trooper Ryan Loudermilk and others, Tompkins is alleged to have threatened troopers who were making the arrest saying that one day, "he would shoot us at point blank and that he would have no remorse."

Since his arrest, Tompkins has given an interview to a Lexington television station asserting his First Amendment right to say anything he desires.

During that interview, he admitted that he had threatened Burdette once before in 1998 by calling his office and telling him he was going to kill him.

Judge Burdette released a statement concerning the matter through the Administrative Office of the Courts: "My contact with Mr. Tompkins was limited to courtroom appearances when he was facing charges in Rockcastle District Court during my tenure as the Rockcastle County prosecutor. Mr. Tompkins made a threat against my life at that time. To my knowledge, I have had no contact with Mr. Tompkins since I became Judge in 2003. I am aware of Mr. Tompkins' current threat of assassination against me and I am cooperating fully with the ongoing investigations by law enforcement agencies."

Tompkins appeared in Rockcastle District Court on Monday, where Judge Scott Lawless continued his case until August 27th for a preliminary hearing.

Lawless kept Tompkins' bond at the same \$100,000 cash or property he had set earlier. He also put restrictions on Tompkins, if he were to make bond, which includes surrendering all firearms to Sheriff Mike Peters' office and wearing an ankle monitoring device.

County takes hit on truck license fee distribution

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis received some bad news earlier this week -- the county's share of the truck license fee distribution dropped from the anticipated \$230,000 to \$165,000.

Carloftis said that the county received \$228,000 last year for their share of the fee, charged to trucks weighing over 10,000 lbs., and had budgeted \$230,000 for this year.

However, they did not take into account the fact that the license was lowered from \$24 to \$11.50 thus lowering the county's share of the fee by \$65,000 less than the amount anticipated.

"The state lowered the fee so that counties could raise their local taxes to cover the shortfall," Carloftis said, with tongue-in-cheek. "At least we have the occupational tax which will have to be used to make up the difference to the road department," he added.

\$225,000 approved for Rockcastle in Kentucky Ag. Development Funds

The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board, chaired by Governor Steve Beshear, approved \$225,000 at their monthly meeting in support of a menu approach for five model programs in Rockcastle County.

The Rockcastle County Conservation District submitted proposals for cost-share assistance to the Rockcastle County Agricultural Development Council and the Kentucky Agricultural Development Board.

The five model programs include: The Cattle Genetic Improvement Program was created to increase the genetic quality of dairy and beef cattle in Kentucky through the selection of superior sires, either through purchase/lease of sires or artificial insemination (AI).

The Cattle Handling Facilities Program offers cost-share assistance to individual beef and dairy producers to implement best management and health practices that augment efficient production and marketing opportunities for beef and dairy producers in the Commonwealth.

The Dairy Diversification Program encourages and assists existing and new dairy producers throughout the Commonwealth for construction, renovation, or modernization of existing dairy facilities.

The Forage Improvement & Utilization Program provides cost-share assistance with individual producers to improve forage quality, quantity, and efficient use, as well as, encourage science-based forage management decisions.

The Hay, Straw & Commodity Storage Program offers cost-share assistance to individual producers seeking to increase income by implementing the best practices related to hay, straw and commodity storage and utilization. Using these practices will then improve feed and straw quality.

Governor Beshear and the Kentucky Legislature continue to make great strides toward lessening Kentucky's dependence on tobacco production while revitalizing the farm economy by investing 50 percent of Kentucky's Master Settlement Agreement into the Kentucky Agricultural Development Fund.

To date, Kentucky has in-

vested more than \$267 million to an array of county, regional and state projects designed to increase net farm income and create sustainable new farm-based business enterprises.

The Rockcastle County diversification programs represent more than 3,356 projects that have been funded through Agricultural Development Fund in Kentucky, since the inception of the program in January 2001.

School board approves slightly lower tax rate

The Rockcastle County Board of Education approved school tax rates for the coming year at a special called board meeting on Monday morning.

After receipt of the 2008 certified property assessments, from the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet, the board approved a rate of .391 cents per \$100 assessment for real estate which is a decrease in the rate from the prior year of .7 cents.

The rate approved for personal tangible property was 44.1 cents, and the rate approved for motor vehicles was 48.3 cents which was the same as last year.

In addition, a 3% gross utility tax rate was approved which has been a constant rate since 1990.

Overall, the real estate, personal tangible, and motor vehicle taxes, in addition to the utility taxes, will bring the local school district an estimated \$2.6 million in revenue which makes up less than 10% of the school district's operating revenue.

The Family Room

On Wednesday, August 13, a Pulaski County man was shot and killed during a domestic altercation. His wife who fired the shots was not arrested. Sheriff's officials said that her husband had been arrested for abusing her in the past. She had obtained two domestic violence protective orders against him, and there was also evidence that he had threatened his wife just prior to the shooting. The case may be presented to the Grand Jury which could still issue an indictment.

This is a tragedy for everyone involved. The one who pulled the trigger must live with whatever guilt or regret that she has because of what happened. The families are left with a great sense of loss.

The fact that no arrest was made indicates that there has been a change in the way society, law enforcement and the justice system view domestic violence. My personal opinion is that thirty years ago the shooter would have been taken into custody immediately. In 2008 there is more of an awareness of the brutality that can be inflicted on a domestic violence victim by the abuser. There is the recognition that, while a violent response is never the best solution, it may sometimes be understandable given the abuse that has been inflicted.

A question that was asked following this incident was: why would a woman stay with a man who hits her? It is an important question that deserves a thoughtful answer.

Some answers that have been suggested are simply false. In fourteen years as a domestic violence counselor, I have never met a victim who liked to be hit. Victims are not masochists who stay because they like being hurt. Other answers that miss the point are that the victim is "crazy" or "weak," because she will not leave him for good. Domestic violence victims are some of the strongest people I have ever met. They are survivors who have endured un-

speakable violence and continued to function. While some have mental health issues, these problems often stem from their abuse.

The truth is more complicated. Getting away from an abuser is incredibly difficult. A victim does not "leave" an abusive relationship - she "escapes." The abuser uses many tactics to keep her with him, including threatening to kill her if she leaves. Since leaving is the most dangerous time in an abusive relationship, the victim has every reason to believe him. He may also threaten to kidnap or harm their children or to commit suicide.

An important point to understand is this: ABUSERS DON'T HIT ON THE FIRST DATE. Abusers are excellent con men, who entice victims into the relationship by treating them like royalty. Only when the victim has fallen for him does the abuser begin the control and abuse. By the time she marries him, moves in with him and/or has children with him, she is so tied to him that leaving often seems impossible.

In order to keep her with him, the abuser engages in systematic brainwashing. He calls her "stupid, fat," and other hurtful, unprintable words. He tells her that no other man would ever have her. He tells her over and over that the abuse is her fault, because, he says, "If you wouldn't run your mouth (or a hundred other reasons), I wouldn't have to hit you." He cuts her off from family and friends who would help her. Gradually she succumbs to the propaganda and believes she is worthless and alone and without hope.

She can only escape with the combined help of law enforcement, the courts, the social service system, domestic violence shelters, media, personal friends and family members who are there when she decides to ask for help.

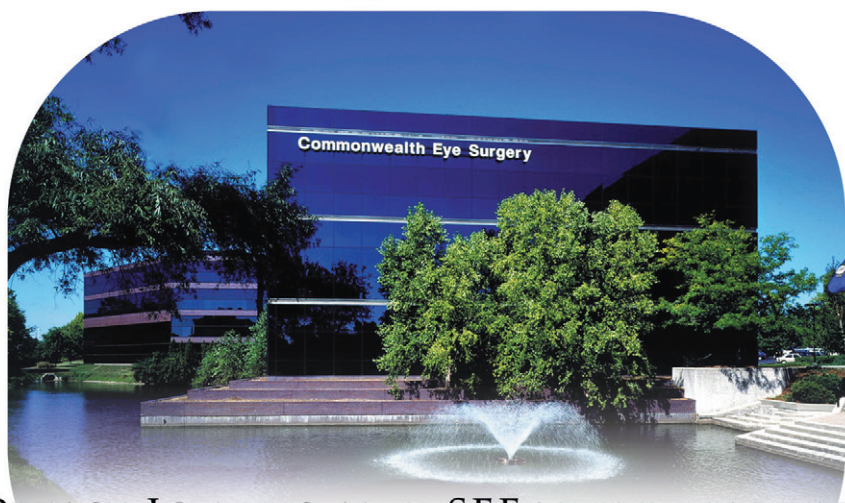

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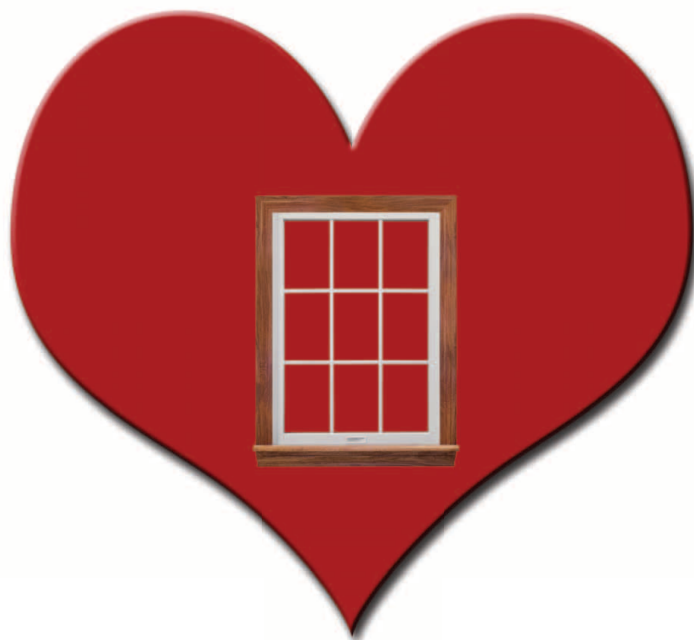


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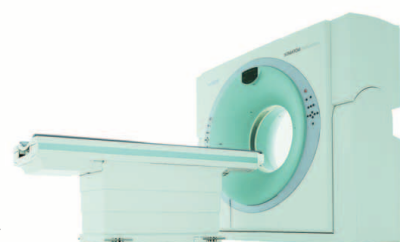

Please take notice that with this filing, KU is proposing to increase its required Customer Deposits from the current amount of \$115.00 for residential customers to \$150.00 (30.43% increase) when applicable.
