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139 new jobs coming to county

There is some very good news for the Rockcastle economy this week, after an announcement last Friday that

SourceCorp was expanding their operation in the county. On Friday, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court took unanimous action during a

special called meeting which will help pave the way for that expansion, which will create 139 new jobs in the county and guarantee the retention of the

91 jobs SourceCorp now provides locally. In a news release from Jim Holton, the county's Industrial Development Authority

Consultant, Holton stated that SourceCorp's expansion should be completed and in full operation within the next two years.

"The magistrates and County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis have been working closely with SourceCorp for over four months to work through the intricate details of making this project possible," Holton said in his news release. "While all of the details have not been finalized, the action

we took will help to close the deal this week, and this action by the Fiscal Court could not have been possible without the expected occupational tax revenues," said Carloftis.

"We are very pleased to be able to look forward to an increased presence here in the county by SourceCorp," he added.

At Friday's meeting, the court approved action neces-

Corry addresses a number of issues

ERWA board passes resolutions at request of general manager

At Tuesday morning's regular monthly meeting of the Eastern Rockcastle Water Association Board, General Manager Randy Corry addressed the board and others present concerning recent matters that he called slanderous and harassing. His concerns dealt mainly with letters and correspondence from water association member Elmer Whitler, who was

present at the meeting and said he would continue to question the operation of the water association by the board. Corry said he was not going to work under the recent pressure brought on by what he called untruths and, disrespectful and harassing remarks which had been made toward him and board members. Corry presented excerpts from several letters written by Whitler and told those in atten-

dance that the situation was "not funny" and that "it had to stop" or he and his wife were leaving the area. Whitler responded to those comments with a "Great". Corry said Whitler and his supporters had harassed him and the board and tried to intimidate and destroy the association board and that it was time to defend the integrity of the board. Whitler said that he stood

behind everything that he had written and each complaint leveled and that he wanted the board to operate the association in a more open and positive manner. Whitler said he also wanted an audit of the finances and that Corry was simply ranting in public. However, after Corry's lengthy presentation, he asked the board to pass four resolutions, which he thought were needed. Corry said that the attorney for ERWA, Jerry Cox, who was present at the meeting, be authorized to protect the association, board and its employees with whatever means neces-

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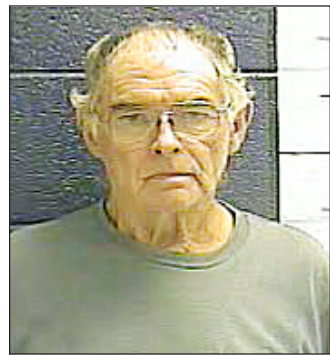
Brodhead man charged with assault after Thursday shooting

A Brodhead man is being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center under a \$50,000 full cash bond after a shooting in Brodhead last Thursday night. According to state police, James Carlos Cromer, 67, of Brodhead, was arrested and charged with first degree assault, after he allegedly shot his granddaughter's husband in the back, around 8:30 p.m. Thursday. Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds, who presented the case against Cromer in Rockcastle District Court during an arraignment on Monday, said police believe Cromer shot Larry Jonathan Bingham, 36, in the back with a .38 caliber pis-

tol, as Bingham was leaving Cromer's apartment. Reynolds said that Cromer had apparently been drinking and gotten into an argument with a female, who was apparently his ex-wife, when his granddaughter, Tara Bingham, went to his apartment to try and break-up the altercation. The County Attorney said that Cromer pushed his granddaughter and that Jonathan Bingham stepped in to stop it. "That is when Cromer shot him in the back," Reynolds said. Reynolds also said that State Trooper Coby Smith had recovered the gun and the bullet fired from the gun, which

traveled completely through Bingham. Cromer and the Bingham's all lived at the Brodhead Elderly Apartments where the

Fatal traffic accident Saturday on interstate

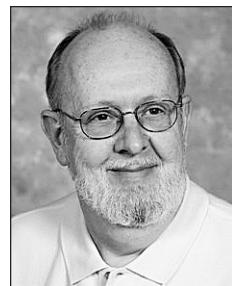
A two vehicle accident at the 69 mile marker of I-75 on Saturday afternoon claimed the life of a 76-year-old Michigan woman. According to Kentucky State Trooper Tommy Cromer, Theresa M. Dewey, 76, of Orion, MI, died after her daughter, Sherry Marketti, also of Michigan, lost control of the Trans Am she was driving as she attempted to pass a tractor-trailer on the interstate where the southbound lanes go from three to two. Cromer said Marketti's vehicle went into the median, came back into the roadway, struck the tractor-trailer and then hit the guardrail. Marketti's mother, who was not wearing a seat belt, was

ejected during the crash and fatally injured. She was pronounced dead at the scene by Rockcastle Coroner Bill Dowell. The accident occurred around 2:20 p.m. and caused the southbound lanes of I-75 to be shut down causing a two-hour delay on the interstate. Cromer said traffic, which was re-routed through Berea onto U.S. 25, also caused lengthy delays in that town as well. Trooper Cromer also said that numerous accidents have happened in the same place as Saturday's crash, where the interstate narrows from three lanes to two lanes and that he

Olympics spawn memories of Steamboat Springs and its famous skier

UK's old blue may be on a roll again

Big Blue is on a roll.

Old Blue may soon be rolling again, too.

The University of Kentucky campus is still excited about the Wildcats' defeat of archrival Louisville to open the football season.

Thirty-four years ago it wasn't so much football that was creating excitement, but UK's double-decker bus dubbed "Old Blue" that made its maiden tour through campus on Sept. 16, 1974.

The bus, painted blue with white lettering, was a gift to the university from the alumni association, who had purchased the vehicle directly from the London Fleet.

Early in its career, the 1953 model vehicle traveled the streets of London's west end.

For more than two decades, it would serve UK as a tour bus.

At 2 p.m. on most schooldays, the bus would pull out from the corner of Patterson and Administration Drives to take visitors on a free, 30-minute tour of the campus.

Becky Jordan, now a dean of students associate at UK and formerly with the university visitor center, has vivid memories of Old Blue.

Her office was in charge of hiring the student workers who served as guides on the bus.

According to Jordan, the bus was also used for transport when various elementary, junior high and high school groups were visiting.

"Old Blue was definitely a

popular attraction, and most visitors sat on the second floor," says Jordan.

"One of my fondest memories of Old Blue is the driver, J. R. (I believe his last name is Johnson). J. R. worked in physical plant, and he was the designated bus driver 99 percent of the time. I developed a wonderful relationship with J. R. and appreciated the 'pearls of wisdom' that he shared with me.

The big bus also caused Jordan some anxious moments.

"I remember thinking that the bus would never be able to make certain turns in the roadway, but J. R. always managed to navigate his way through those tough spots."

Ed Nighbert also has very vivid memories of the old bus, dating back to his days as a student in Joe B. Hall's annual basketball camp.

I took my first tour of the UK campus on that bus when I was 11 and attending Coach Hall's camp."

The now 40-year-old owner of A-127 Self Storage in Lawrenceburg never dreamed he would one day become co-owner of the vintage vehicle.

For nearly a year now, the bus has been sitting alongside a fence behind Nighbert's facility.

According to Nighbert, the bus was purchased from UK at auction "for less than \$3,000," by a business associate of Kevin Morgan, a Georgetown attorney. Morgan had it stored

Improving Your "Good" Cholesterol

Many of us never thought we'd see the day we wanted to raise our cholesterol levels, but now that is just what we want to do.

Researchers have found that there is more than one form of cholesterol, and that the different fractions of cholesterol affect the body in different ways. While the majority of cholesterol in the blood is a "low density" cholesterol (LDL) which contributes to plugged arteries and heart attacks, the "high density" cholesterol, or HDL, has a protective influence on the arteries and heart.

The ratio of the two forms of cholesterol determines the risk of heart disease from your cholesterol. What's more, there are simple things we can do to raise the good cholesterol and lower the harmful cholesterol.

Exercise is a simple way to stimulate increases in the good HDL. Exercising 20-30 minutes three times a week will have a positive effect.

Replace saturated fats (butter, lard, beef fat) with unsaturated fats. Unsaturated fats are mainly found in vegetable oils such as corn oil, margarine and sunflower oils (but avoid palm oil and coconut oil).

Losing weight also appears to raise the level of HDL. Also, one to two alcoholic drinks a day has been reported to decrease heart disease, possibly by affecting the HDL. However, this must be weighed against the risk of alcohol use.

Cholesterol-lowering medicines and niacin can help raise the HDL. Your doctor can prescribe these medicines as well as provide further information on the value of medicines, exercise and dietary changes.

One day I was coasting down the hill, and I started to pedal. Pretty soon, I wasn't just coasting any longer. I was ac-

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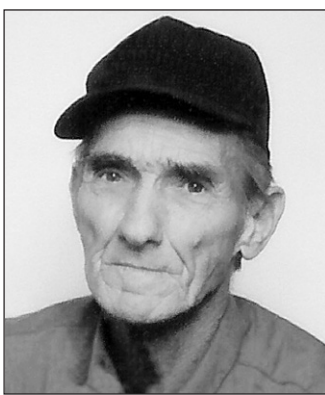

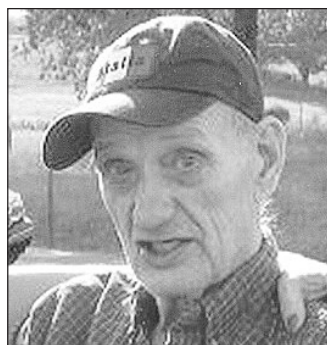

The Rockcastle County Conservation District, Rockcastle Cattlemen's Association and Agriculture Leadership will take applications for 2008 Phase I Cost Share starting Monday, September 15th through October 15th. Applications are available at the Extension Office on West Main Street.

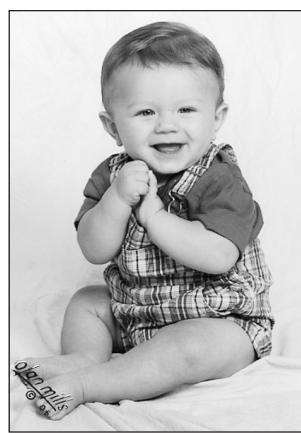
This year's 225,000 dollar Cost Share program will offer 5 areas on a menu approach. Up to \$2500 dollars total Cost Share will be available and farmers can choose between different areas all on one application. Each program will follow the Kentucky Agriculture Development Boards published guidelines. Farmers receiving reimbursement will be required to follow the KADB guidelines.

The 5 program areas are

Cattle Handling, Cattle Genetic Improvement, Dairy Diversification, Hay & Commodity Storage as well as Forage Improvement. Farmers can choose to allot their Cost Share in more than one area. Cost Share is a 50/50 reimbursement on eligible items not to exceed \$2500 per farm.

Agriculture Leadership has chosen the menu approach in an effort to better utilize county funds. Financial accounting on each program requires unused funds being returned to Frankfort then requested in new programs. By offering program through the menu approach farmers may better utilize Rockcastle's Cost Share without returning money to KADB.

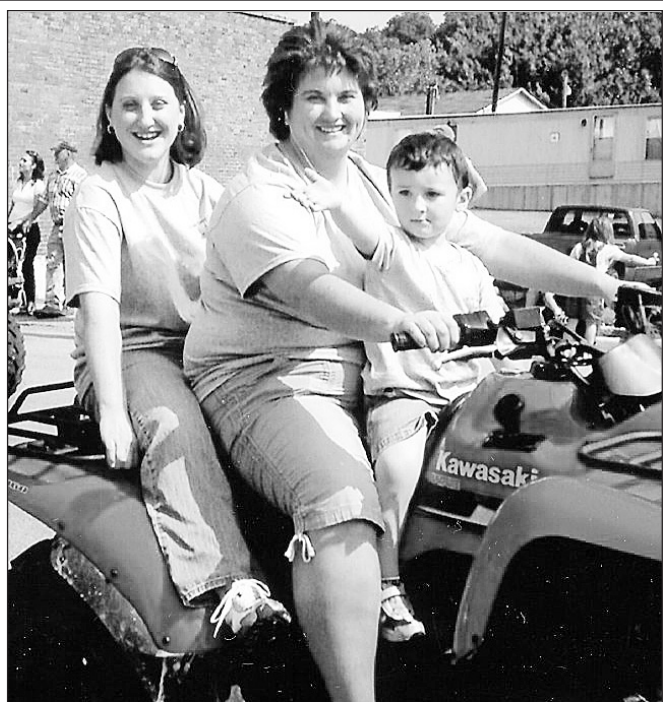

In accordance with the provisions of HB 44 enacted by the 1979 Kentucky General Assembly a public hearing has been set by the Rockcastle County Public Library Board of Trustees for September 24, 2008 at 4:00 p.m. at the Rockcastle County Public Library. The purpose of this hearing is to inform the public that the Rockcastle County Public Library Board is proposing the 3.1 cent tax rate with anticipated revenue of \$108,410. This tax rate reflects a 4% increase in anticipated revenue. The tax rate for the preceding year was 2.70 cents with anticipated revenue of \$89,992.

The compensating rate is 3 cents with anticipated revenue of \$104,913. The expected revenue from personal property is \$34,924. Increase for the 2008 budget year is needed due to the rising cost of books, library materials, technology, equipment and maintenance.

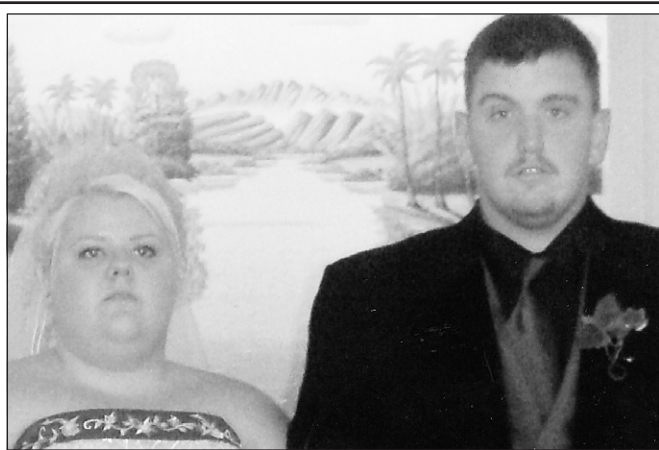

Rockets are 2-0 after 30-6 win over Wayne County

The Rockcastle Rockets forced five turnovers, which included two blocked punts, and junior QB Dustin Bishop threw four touchdown passes as the Rockets ran away with a 30-6 victory over visiting Wayne County on Friday night.

Bishop, the second year starter at quarterback, got the Rockets into the scoring column in the first quarter when he hit senior Dustin Bullock with a 46-yard touchdown

strike.

Bishop also connected in the end zone two more times in the first half, once to junior Matt Bullens and the other time to fellow junior, Jamie Todd.

And in the first half, a blocked punt by senior Devon Mason resulted in a safety by senior Jared Smith, which gave head coach Scott Parkey's team a 23-0 lead going into intermission.

The Rocket offense didn't

see the end zone in the third quarter, but did get another touchdown pass from Bishop in the fourth quarter when he threw a 15-yard touchdown pass to Bullens. That capped off a 30-6 Rockcastle County victory, the Rockets' second win in as many tries.

Bishop finished the day 8 of 18 passing for 181 yards and the four scores. Bullock came in for a few snaps and went 2 of 3 for 11 yards.

Senior Casey Hayes led the ground attack with 152 yards on 25 carries. Freshman Clarke Rowe carried the ball 6 times for 22 yards. Cody Mize carried twice for four yards. Dustin Bullock also had four yards on three carries.

Bullens caught a total of three passes for 66 yards and the two touchdowns. Todd caught three passes for 38 yards and two scores, while senior Jared Smith caught three passes for 42 yards. Bullock had the one catch for 46 yards and a touchdown. Mize had a catch and three yards.

In addition to a big night on offense, Matt Bullens also led the defensive effort for Josh Martin's defense. He had a total of nine tackles to go along with a sack.

Junior Dalton Dillingham and Jared Smith both had eight tackles, Dillingham adding a sack.

Steve Trimble had seven tackles, Hayes had six, Mize finished with five, and Cole Abney added four tackles.

John L. Saylor had three tackles and a sack, while seniors Bullock, Logan Kincer, and Devon Mason all added a tackle. Mason and Saylor both had blocked punts.

For the second consecutive week, Parkey wasted no time in crediting his superb special teams play for the victory. He also cited forced turnovers and a big-play passing attack as obvious strengths in his team's performance on Friday.

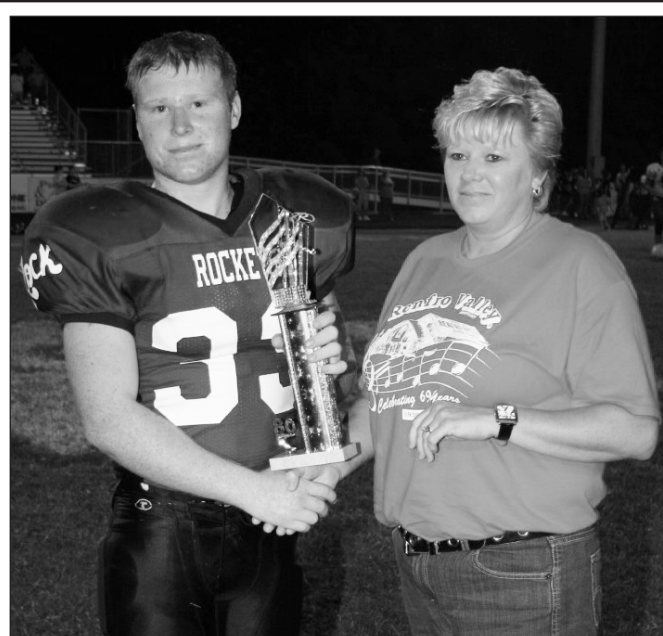
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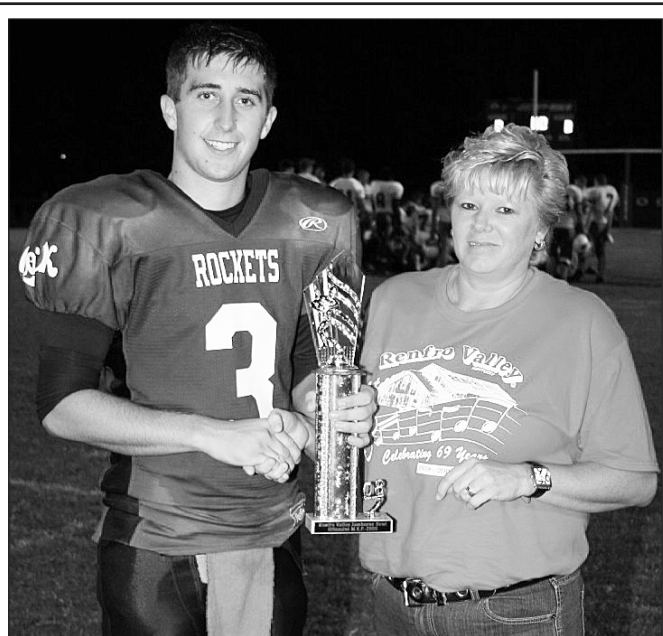

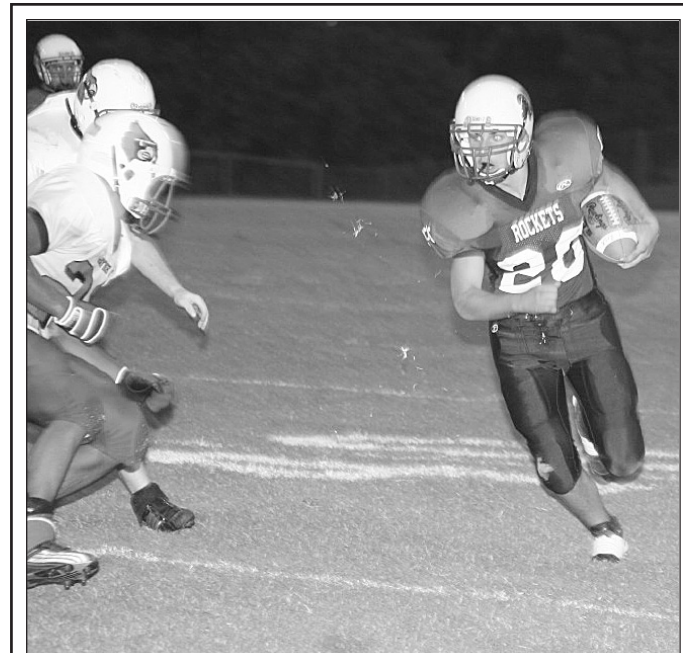

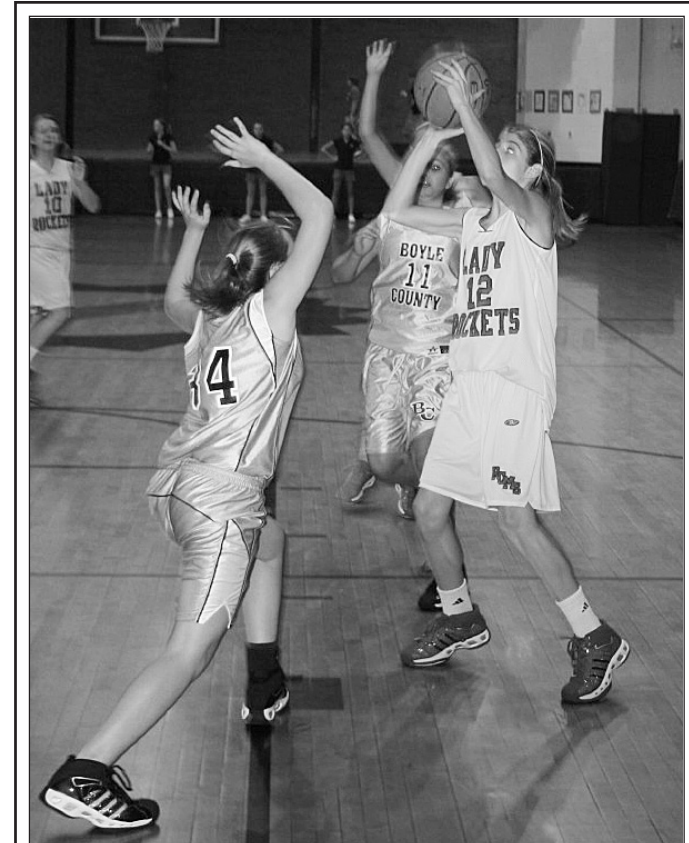

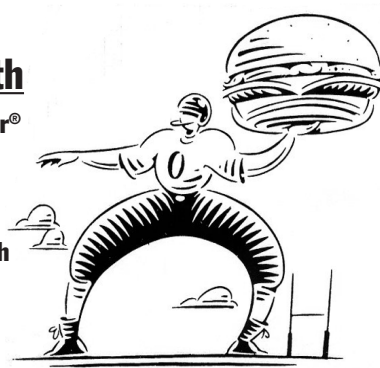

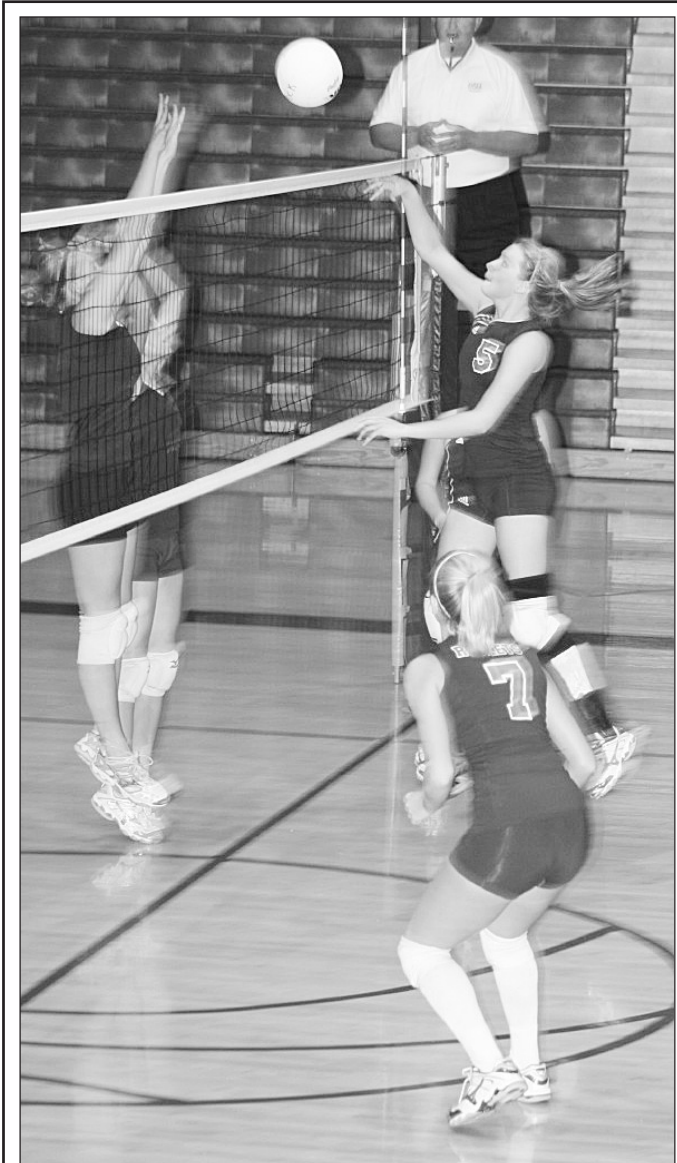

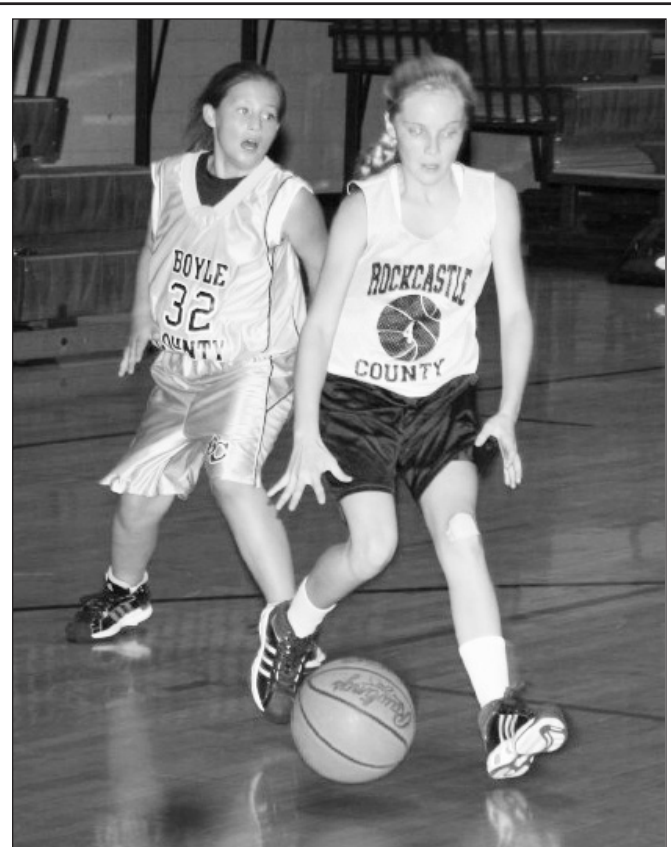

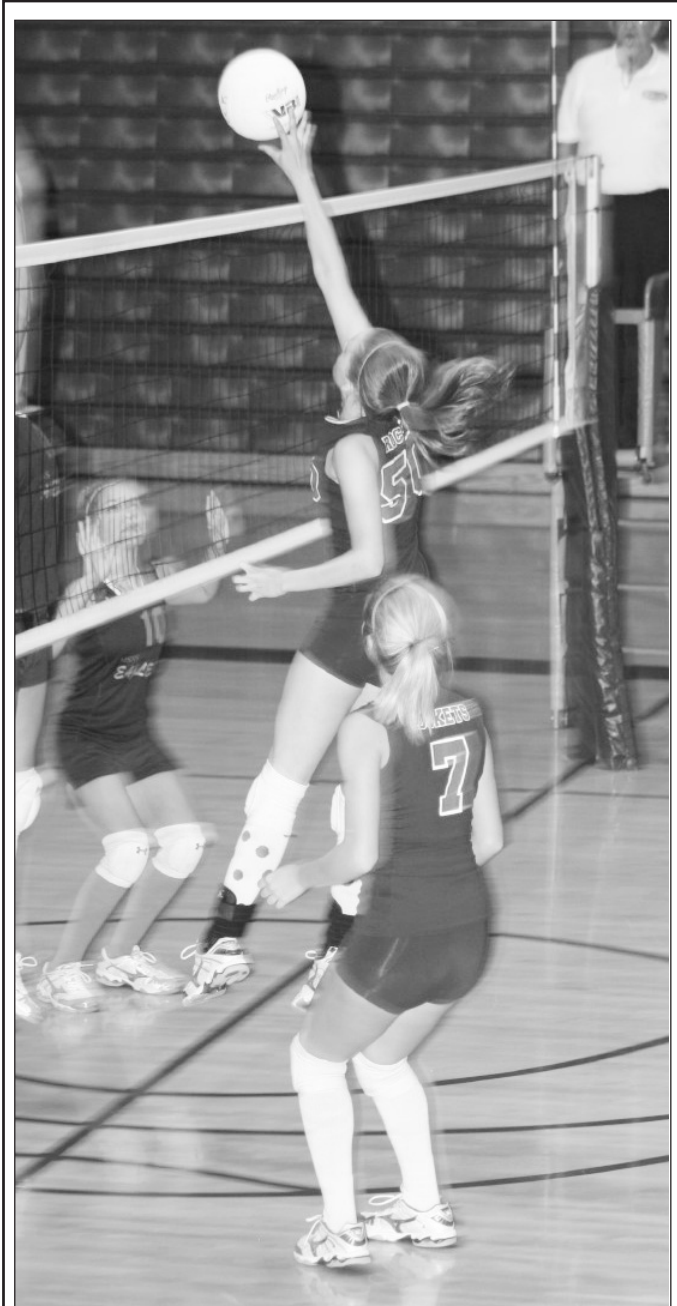

and how the ending with all the drumming was terrific! Everyone involved was extremely pleased that all the hard work has paid off.

This new category of 4A pits us against much larger bands and the contest at East Jessamine had us in competition against several former state champions. We didn't gar-

This week the band plans to add more visual elements to the show and begin work on the sets for the closer, “Scream”.

All instruments in a marching band play a role in the total sound. Saxophones make a variety of sounds due to several techniques employed including the growl, the laugh, the vibrato, circular breathing, flutter tongue and pitch bending. It is the use of these techniques that produce the varied sounds that fill out the total harmonies. Even though made out of brass, a saxophone is a woodwind instrument that produces sound through an oscillating reed and then manipulating the many valves to produce a specific note. Saxes are actually very similar to clarinets and were invented to give a brass projection to a reed instrument.

There are many types of saxophones based on their range of notes. The Marching Rockets this year has two alto saxophonists, Dalton Hutton and Josh Stallworth. Dalton loves “the excitement” of marching season “It’s what I look forward to all year.” This is his 3rd year in the Marching Rockets and he most enjoys playing around with different riffs on the sax. He has started learning to play piano and also plays drums at church. He loves all parts of being in the band and “Band is something I look forward to everyday.” He plans to major in music in college. He thinks this season is off to a good start. “We made proficient earlier than ever this year and I think we have a good chance of making state.” NIGHTSCAPES is one of his favorite shows from the past few years.

Josh Stallworth, who is also first cousin to Dalton, is in his 2nd year with the Marching Rockets. He is in ninth grade. He just loves playing the music and “Hey Baby” is his favorite. He is playing the alto sax this marching season. He is also adept with the tenor saxophone which he played in last year’s show PHYZYX. He prefers the tenor saxophone but is happy to play whatever is needed. He does play the tenor sax as part of the pep band which performs from the stands at all home games. There is nothing he doesn’t like about band. He even looks forward to band camp where he enjoys the experience and camaraderie. He is very excited about NIGHTSCAPES and told me, “I think we’re gonna do real good this year.” He is hoping that his excellence in music will pay off with a college scholarship and that in his future he can play jazz saxophone professionally.

This Saturday the Marching Rockets will travel to Hazard for the Band of Gold Invitational. We perform at 5:00PM. It is a very scenic setting and we always do well there. The rehearsals meantime will continue their unrelenting pace every day this week as the musicians continue to improve the show with their eyes focused on the quarterfinals.

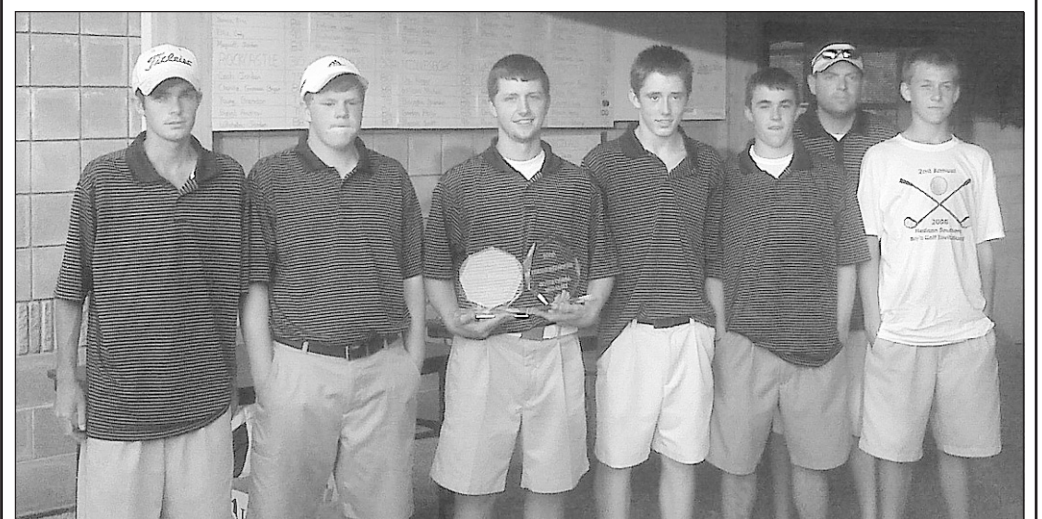



sary. Each of the association’s eight board members, except for Whittler’s wife June, voted in favor of the resolution. Cox also reminded the board that he was representing the association and board as a whole and not any individual board member or employee.

The board also voted unanimously to pass resolution number two, which called for the ERWA board to work closely with the Ky. Rural Water and Rural Development, considering the possibility of making a large payment towards the \$800,000+ debt to keep association monies from possible exploitation by board members or employees seeking to enrich themselves with association funds. The original resolution was a little different and read “to keep said monies from possible exploitation by “those seeking” to enrich themselves with association funds. The resolution wording was changed at the request of Mrs. Whittler.

Resolution number three was not voted on but asked if Mrs. Whittler, who was elected to the board last Wednesday at the association’s annual meeting, was able in a professional manner, to serve the association members as a whole or if it is her desire to serve the interests of “her husband, father and self.”

Mrs. Whittler said she thought she was probably the most professional person on the board and that resolution number three was the “silliest resolution” she had ever heard.

Resolution number four also passed unanimously, and dealt with any complaints made by employees, stating that they be handled in a proper manner, as to be decided by the board.

Corry also invited Frank Hall and Jim Hammons, employees of the state’s Division of Water to the meeting.

Both men told the group that Corry had done and was doing an excellent job in his operation of the water system and that in the eight years he had been the operator, there had been no violations, except for one, which had been rescinded.

Other highlights of the meeting included tearful remarks from longtime board member Anna Mize, who defended the board and said she was proud to be a board member. She also said she and her late husband, Sherman, had worked from daylight to dark to help people in rural areas get water and that she did not like all the “gripping and fussing and that it was God’s water.” Mrs. Mize received applause from the crowd following her remarks.

Also before Corry’s aggressive presentation concerning slander and harrasment, he publicly apologized to Jo Cook, who has now been rehired as Permanent Officer Manager for the Association by the board.

Cook was the longtime association clerk before a situation in early June in which she and Corry had some differences and she was either fired or she quit.

Also before his presentation Corry thanked board member David Ballinger for exposing what he called “a betrayal”. Corry did not elaborate any further on his comment.

New ERWA board elected

At the annual meeting of ERWA held last Wednesday, eight board members were elected for the coming year.

New members elected to the board were: June Whittler and George Shackelford. Board

members re-elected were: Dell Ponder, Margaret Martin, Murphy Martin, David Ballinger, Anna Mize and Sue Rodefer.

Three term board member Lee Bivins lost re-election by just two votes.

sary for beginning the process of the construction of a 25,000 square foot facility, utility and road construction and other improvements and cost necessary for the development of the project, which will take place in Industrial Park #2 off White Rock Road.

The next step for the court will be to contract with a bonding agent who will begin the process of selling approximately \$2.5 million dollars in bonds for the Fiscal Court’s portion of the proposed \$5.2 million project. Much of the court’s investment will be repayed by SourceCorp through a seven year lease on the building, according to Carloftis.

“I want to make sure the residents of Rockcastle County understand that this community could not have worked to save the existing 91 jobs and the creation of the 139 or more new jobs if the members of the Fiscal Court had not passed the county occupational tax earlier this summer. It was only through the revenue which the

county will realize from the tax that we were able to initially make a proposal and ultimately fund a deal like this and other plans we have for the future economic development efforts,” Carloftis said.

But on Tuesday night, the project hit a small snag when the Rockcastle County Board of Education tabled a request that would have lent a helping hand to the Fiscal Court by allowing SourceCorp to use a portion of the old Rockcastle Area Technology Center as an interim facility while the new facility is being constructed.

School Superintendent Larry Hammond, who brought the request before the board, said some board members wanted more information about the request by the Fiscal Court and SourceCorp before they voted yea or nay. Hammond said the matter would be brought up at a later date.

It is anticipated the company will move into their new facilities in late spring of 2009.

Judge Carloftis said he did not know if SourceCorp would pull from the 220 applications received at a job fair at RCHS on June 21st, or take applications at their facility in Industrial Park #1, or both.

Officials said both men were treated and released from U.K. on Thursday morning.

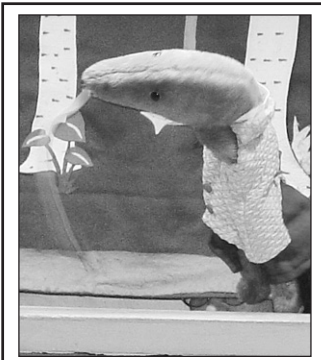

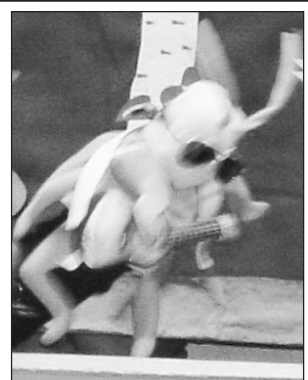

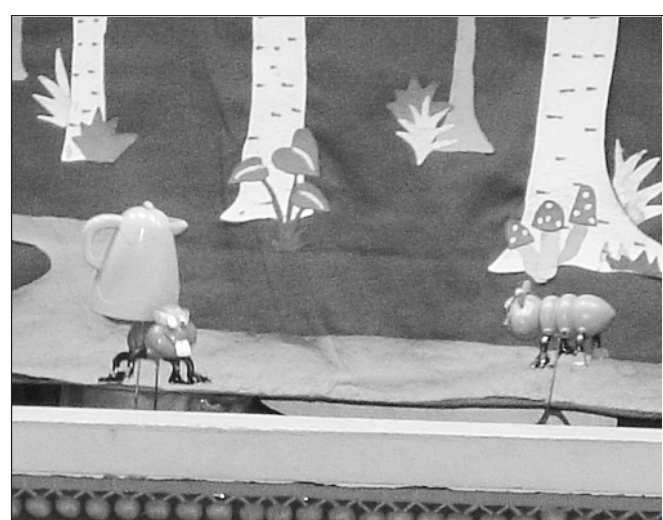
