Mayor arrested for official miscondcuct

Mt. Vernon assistant police chief Eddie Delaney arrested Mayor Clarice Kirby on Tuesday morning on a charge of official misconduct, first degree. a Class A misdemeanor.

Delaney escorted the 56year-old Mayor to Circuit Clerk Teresa Vanzant's office where she filled a \$500 cash bond.

The Mayor will be arraigned in Rockcastle District Court on October 20th.

Kirby was charged with official misconduct after Rockcastle School Superintendent Larry Hammond sought a warrant for her on Monday morning.

Hammond said he requested the warrant from County Attorney Billy Reynolds after the Mayor instructed city employees to do away with limestone rocks that belonged to him.

Hammond said the rock were in a wall in front of Henry and Phyllis Hines' home, which is located next to his home on Richmond Street. Hammond said the rock were going to be removed to make room for a new poured concrete wall, which was part of the sidewalk project now underway on that

Hammond said he asked Phyllis Hines if he could have the rock and she told him he

The Superintendent was in Mississippi last week at a continuing education meeting when the rock wall was torn down to make room for the new

Hammond said that when he returned from Mississippi, he inquired as to the whereabouts of the rock and was told they had been taken to property owned by Mayor Kirby.

Hammond said he went to City Hall on Thursday to tell the Mayor he wanted the rock back and that, after a short conversation, the Mayor agreed to have city employees take the rock to his property.

The superintendent said that on Friday afternoon he was told the rock had been dumped in Lake Linville.

The superintendent said he called city superintendent Dennis McClure to confirm that the rock had indeed been taken to the lake. He said McClure told him that the rock, which made two truck loads, was dumped at the lake.

Hammond said that he did not understand why the Mayor would do what she did and that he did not think he had any other course of action.

The Mayor faces a penalty of not more than 12 months in prison and/or not more than a \$500 fine, if she is found guilty of the charge against her.



Daddy's Fallout Shelter

In 1950, I was in the first grade at Mt. Vernon Elementary School. In those days, the underlying fear of communism and the Soviet Union's ability to deliver atomic and hydrogen bombs to the shores of the United States caused almost everyone to believe that an attack could come at any mo-

The news media routinely ran stories about the impending threat. They readily convinced school children of that day that families must be prepared.

In school, we were taught to "duck and cover" in order to protect ourselves. We practiced getting down on our knees, under our desks. Occasionally, we had to move to a location in the school near the basement – the idea being to protect us as much as possible if a nuclear attack took place while school was in

session. Some kids did not think too much about what we were practicing, but many of us did. And we were taught just the right combination of preparation and fear that we took the issue up with our parents. My wife remembers well that she begged her father to build and equip a shelter. Like most, he dismissed her pleadings without much

But there were a number of families that did construct bomb shelters in order to provide protection from the enemy. During that time in our history, more than 100,000 fallout shelters were built in basements or backvards.

My family did not have to construct such a shelter because we always had a storm cellar. It was mostly underground and

offered just as much protection from such an attack as it did in sheltering us during the frequent storms in our section of Rockcastle County. My father, Hobe Griffin, had a strong fear of storms caused by the frequent lightening strikes on our hill. It was not uncommon for a storm to strike one of the tall poplar trees in our yard and split it into several pieces.

Daddy had already made sure that our cellar was sturdy and equipped with the necessary items for us to be comfortable if we had to spend time inside during a storm. The cellar also stored two walls of canned vegetables, fruit, grape juice, bags of potatoes and onions, and several kinds of jams and jelly.

The only items that we had to take into the storm cellar were the kerosene lantern to provide light inside and a sufficient amount of water to drink. The door was very large and thick, just like it was supposed to be for a bomb shelter. Daddy's only concern was that the cellar was secure. He was always the first one to enter the small room when a storm approached and the last to leave when it had passed.

The fear of fallout was not limited to ordinary families in the United States. Even President John Kennedy had a shelter built by the Navy Seabees at his vacation home on Peanut Island, near Palm Beach.

Following the Cuban crisis of 1961, Kennedy recommended "a fallout shelter for everybody, as rapidly as possible." Although his was a wellkept secret in Washington, residents of Palm Beach knew all

Owen County farmer no longer dealing with bad apples

Larry Ayres has seen a lot of bad apples in his day, but they weren't all of the fruity variety.

The Owen County native spent more than half of his 61 years at the Kentucky State Police Crime Lab in Frankfort, working in forensic science.

He performed DNA analysis and used his expertise in the field to testify in more than 300 criminal cases.

Ayres retired from police work in 2001, but is still giving testimony as he sits on the back of his apple-laden pickup truck outside the Owen County Courthouse. He lauds this year's fruit crop as one of the best ever.

The owner of Ayres Family Orchard has some solid evidence to back up his claim. Nearly all the more than 2,000 trees on his picturesque, 40acre hillside farm south of Owenton are loaded with fruit.

"Ideal weather conditions. no freezes, and ample rain this summer are the major reasons this year's crop is so good," says the man who holds a degree in microbiology from UK, but has "always loved horticul-

A love of farm life comes naturally to the son of a farmer who can trace his family heritage in Owen County back to

The first in his family to attend college, he was guided by parents who did not finish high school and understood the value of getting a good educa-

"Due to their own hard times, they encouraged me greatly and made sure I experienced life beyond Owen County," he says.

He recalls the time he was five and his Dad sent him off to Louisville, alone, to visit his grandparents. "He took me to the depot in Sparta and turned me over to the train conductor. saving where I was going" he

There were also visits with his grandparents in Florida, including one trip at age nine when he was allowed to fly home alone.

"I was never afraid and never felt abandoned," he says. Worldly awareness and overcoming obstacles would serve him well in later years, when upon entering UK, he was told that 40 percent of his class would fail.

"I was bound and determined to stay focused, so that wouldn't happen to me," he

After graduation, he returned to Owen County, married, and purchased 10 acres from his wife's uncle. In 1973, he and Sherry built the brick, ranch-style home on Wilson Lane where they would raise a son and daughter.

"The land here wasn't suitable for row crops like corn or tobacco, but I wanted to make it productive in some way," he

After a decade of studying how to properly establish an orchard, consulting with the UK Extension Service, and experimenting with a variety of trees, the Ayres Family Orchard was established in 1983.

"Our goal was to make the business something financially feasible to do in retirement, and that's pretty much the way it's worked out," he says.

With peaches, plums, blackberries, cider, and jams added to the mix, Ayres peddles his wares at farmers markets in Owenton, Frankfort, and Boone County, often with help from his son, who also does his webpage, ayresapples.com.

Sherry does the bookkeeping, and their daughter prepares baked goods, making the business truly fit the name.

"It's a lot of hard, physical work, and certainly a yearround job, but I get a lot out of it. I even enjoy the management part and facing up to the challenges.

One of the main obstacles is finding enough markets for the bountiful supply of apples. "That's certainly the biggest challenge of the moment," he

Although running a small operation, Ayres has gained the I had a note pinned on my shirt respect of his peers. He is the current president of the Kentucky Horticulture Society.

Catalpa worms, as fish bait, are no secret to those of us prone to wet a line now and then and especially if we have catfish in mind.

However, if you ask where anyone who uses said worms for bait actually found them, you will get an elusive answer such as "over in Casey County" or "somewhere up on a hill on 75 between London and Cin-

At least that is what truthful people will tell you and it's not likely that you will convince them to be more specific.

More arrogant people will tell you that they drove around for two days looking at catalpa trees and finally found some with a worm infestation and that if you want some, they will suggest that you start hunting because they are not about to let you in on the results of their hard work.

And finally, some people will send you on a wild goose chase. They will come up with an imaginary mile marker on an obscure road at least 100 miles away and give you a vivid description of the locale and the trees on which they found their bait. If you follow up on this advice you will eventually discover that neither the mile marker, the locale nor the trees actually exist. And you will know not to ask this person about his catalpa worm bonanza again, which is precisely what he had20in mind when he caused you to waste a day.

Brother Keeter and Tim Mitchell were recently visiting Paint Lick and we'd been fishing the better part of two days without any luck to speak of. They had to run some errands in Lexington and when they

returned, the told me they'd found a couple of catalpa trees loaded down with big fat worms. Trouble was, said trees were on private property but close to the road.

Keeter figured that, since they were in plain view from the road, the owner was sitting somewhere nearby with a shotgun guarding the trees because he could not imagine why somebody hadn't already harvested the worms if they were not under armed guard.

He described the location and, as it turned out, I happened to know the landowner so I called him up.

"Help yourself. Get em all if you can. I'll loan you ladder if you need one," he said.

To make a long story short we did not need a latter because I have a 25-foot bamboo pole that I keep precisely for the purpose of dislodging catalpa worms from the leaves they cling to.

We manage to harvest over a hundred and later in the day, on the way to a favorite fishing hole I made the mistake of muttering that I had forgotten to stop by the bait store to get some night crawlers. I thought

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





I know this because I had to send an extra dollar for the extras, even though there is money in her lunch account. She also informed me that her extra dollar managed to get her 4 extra chips

So, with that info, I called the school cafeteria, and was told that she would only get extra chips and meat for her extra dollar, because the lettuce and tomato was considered a vegetable, not part of the entree. I was told that this info comes from Jeanine Parsons, which she apparently gets from the State Dept., in which they will also receive a phone call.

Well, anyway, I then called Ms. Parsons, and was told that in order to not be charged another \$1.35 to \$1.50 that my daughter should ask for a double lunch for \$1.25. This didn't really make sense to me, so when I then had to read the menu saying the entree was Taco Salad, she seemed to think that would include the lettuce and tomato. But, I then stated, again, that I had called the school and was told that, well you know, the thing about the chips and meat. So, what it comes down to is there seems to be a miscommunication, somewhere. But Ms. Parsons, however, thought that it all sounded better for my daughter to buy another meal for \$1.25, or possible \$1.50 for just the entree. She however, did inform me that lunch prices are better here than other surrounding counties, but my concern is the county that I reside in, not the surrounding ones.

When I stated that I would write this letter, and maybe others would feel the same, that maybe people would do something (I plan to take the money out of my childs account and pack the lunch of their choice), but she said that would be fine.

You must realize that all of my frustration, doesn't just come from lunch issues, that there have been several questions and concerns that I have had for the present school year. I know that there are many good people in our school system, but, it seems, that the bad tend to outweigh the good. But, when the people teaching our children don't seem to be held accountable for their actions, it all seems to be hopeless. But I have also realized when questions and problems arise, that we, as parents, need to voice our concerns, not to just one another, but to the people leading our school system. There are more concerns that I plan to voice when the time presents itself. I hope others will do the same.

Annexation proposal questioned...

Dear Editor,

First I'd like to express my sincere condolences to the Anderkin family for their loss. Reading Rick's column reflected that Mr. Anderkin was a man that was loved deeply by his family.

Last week I attended the city council meeting concerning the "proposed" annexation of 1500 acres of property into the city. It reminded me of when I was a child and my father would say no to something and when I asked why, he'd reply "because I said so".

Trying to get the council to

"table" the ordinance and provide a certified list of property owners was a waste of time. They passed the ordinance and agreed to provide the list as soon as possible. I did receive a phone call telling me that the list would be made available this Thursday. They will publish the 2nd reading in the newspaper when the list of owners is made available. Then "IF" more than 50% of the owner's sign a petition or more than 55% of the affected residents (who are registered voters) sign a petition to stop the annexation, it can be stopped. If not then it will automatically happen in 60 days after the publication in the newspaper. If the ordinance is stopped then it will

Cupps Chapel has approximately 40 members and an average attendance of 25 to 30 for each service.



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

Producers are reminded September 30 is Deadline

Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Jeffery Hall, reminds eligible producers they have until September 30, 2008, to sign up for the 2008 DCP Program.

The DCP program provides direct and counter-cyclical payments to producers who annually enroll their farms in the program. Payments are computed based on base acres and payment yields established for each farm. Advanced payments may be requested. Counter-cyclical payments provide support when prices are below certain statutorily set prices.

Farms with base acres of 10 acres or less will not receive direct or counter-cyclical payments, unless the farm is wholly owned by socially disadvantaged or limited resource farmers or ranchers.

Additional information on DCP sign-up is available at your local USDA Farm Service Center.

Farmers May Sign Up for Quality Loss Crop Disaster Program

The Farm Service Agency announced that eligible farmers who suffered quality losses to their crops in recent years can enroll in the Crop Disaster Program 2005-2007 (CDP) at local FSA service centers.

Only producers who obtained crop insurance coverage or coverage under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for the year of loss will be eligible for CDP benefits. Producers must have suffered quality losses of at least 25 percent to be eligible for CDP Quality Loss. The payment rate is set at 65 percent of the amount of the affected crop multiplied by 42 percent of the per-unit average market value in the year in which the loss occurred.

To be eligible for Quality Losses, producers must submit receipts that contain all three of the following items: Price, Production, and Quality affected. Quality losses must be due to an eligible disaster condition.

Producers may receive assistance for both quantity and quality losses. However, the total quantity and quality assistance, together with any crop insurance or NAP payment received for the same crop and the value of the crop production not lost, must not exceed 95 percent of the total value of the crop absent the disaster.

Bank account changes

If your bank account number changes or there is a change in your banks name notify FSA immediately to ensure payments reach your account timely.

This is very important to those receiving FSA payments as payments can be delayed if we are not aware of changes to your account or routing numbers.

Spousal authority

A husband and wife may sign FSA and CCC documents on behalf of each other UN-LESS written notification is on file in the FSA office denying a spouse this authority.

Support needed for "Home I Go Rescue"

Linda Brown, of the Pink Poodle Pet Parlor, is in urgent need of donations to keep her "Home I Go Rescue" (HIGR) program afloat.

Ms. Brown pulls condemned dogs from killing shelters (shelters in which dogs face imminent euthanization) and brings them home to her facility which she runs pretty much single-handedly. At HIGR the animals receive food, shelter, vaccinations, medical care, if needed, and affection for the dogs is included as a steady diet.

A customer of Ms. Brown's said recently, "I first met Linda when I took my Shih Tzu, Boomer, to have his long winter coat sheared for warm weather. She does excellent work in her Pink Poodle Grooming Shop and it didn't take long to recognize her love and dedication, not only in her grooming business but for all the animals she cares for on a daily basis at HIGR."

25% of the animals found in kill shelters are purebreds. Ms. Brown has said that she has noticed Dobermans, Poodles and Shih Tzus among those listed. Dobermans have been the main type of dog she has worked with, she said, but she has had to cut back on the number she now keeps from around ten, to two, because of the expense of maintenance. In winter, she usually houses from 40 to 50 dogs but, in spring and summer, there are normally 30 to 35. More people tend to adopt in warm weather.

At present, Ms. Brown has plenty of smaller dogs -- Poodles, Mini Pischers, Chihuahuas and Chihuahua mixes, plus Labs and Lab mixes.

In a world where animals often get a raw deal, Ms. Brown stands out as one of the few compassionate people who go beyond what is expected of most of us. That being said, HIGR needs any help it can get from the Rockcastle County community -- especially in Mt. Vernon.

Needed to keep the program running is:

•help from anyone with good computer skills who will donate time to set up programs which can be used to keep records of several aspects of HIGR or who will show Ms. Brown how to do it herself;

•monetary donations in any amount.

•long or short term commitments from anyone who will volunteer free time to aid in various simple chores for HIGR. This could including washing dog laundry once a month, feeding and watering

the animals once a week, general light repair work or some amount of clean up;

•someone who can write advertisements or short announcements concerning HIGR criteria;

walking the dogs;dogs houses - preferably

clean;

cages/crates/cat carriers;
 used quilts, blankets, bedspreads, throw rugs (used as bedding for animals);

•good, or not so good, wood pieces for mending and building fences, dog houses, etc;

•any type or size of quality dog and cat food;

cat litter/litter boxes;dog and cat food and water

•leasnes/collars/narnes •ID tags:

•dog and cat vitamins;


•dog/cat toys, and

•anything that can improve the lives and comfort of the animals.

As a last note, while Ms. Brown does adopt out her dogs, she requires the person interested in adoption to fill out an application and contract. She also will ask for references and a chance to get to know the person who will be adopting before taking the final step -- perhaps in the form of home visitation. And, lastly, she will ask that the adopter have a fenced yard and is prepared to make a lifelong commitment to the animal he/she adopts.

This may seem a bit much to some people but these animals have become a work of love and dedication for Ms. Brown. She know that only a truly committed person will go to these lengths to acquire a loving canine companion. On the other hand, if you would like to help an animal, but are unable to take care of one, you can adopt one or more dogs in the HIGR on paper, simply by offering a monthly support amount for the animals you prefer. Fostering a dog is another option however, the same rules apply with fostering as for a full

said he and five or six other interested individuals would split up the territory inside the areas to be annexed and circulate the petitions.

Bullock said that the group would pick up a list of the property owners from the city on Thursday (today) although his group has already compiled a list of their own from the map at City Hall and from courthouse records.

Bullock said the group had not received any type of "magic" number from the Mayor as to how many signatures it would take to get the issue placed on the ballot, but that he was certain the group would have more than enough, after they combed the areas to be annexed.

"We simply want the matter placed on the ballot so we can say yes or no to being placed inside the city limits," Bullock said.

"My biggest concern about being placed in the city is the fact that I don't think they have the equipment or manpower to properly maintain the roads in our subdivision," he said.

The following document was received from County Clerk Norma Houk, concering the city's annexation.

1. City enacts an ordinance. Ordinance shall accurately degine the boundary proprosed to be annexed.

2. Within 60 days following publication of ordinance, 50% of resident voters or owners of real property within the proposed territory can petition the Mayor in opposition to the proposal. Election will be held at the next regular election.

3. Mayor delivers a certified copy of ordinance to county clerk. County Clerk places before the voters the question "are you in favor of being annexed to the city of ...?"

Only persons who reside within territory shall be permitted to vote in the election.

Clerk has Sheriff deliver to the election officers in each precinct involved copies of the ordinance proposed to annex.

4. If less than 55% of per-

sons voting oppose annexation, the unincorporated territory shall become part of the city. 5. If 55% or more of persons

voting oppose annexation, the ordinance shall become ineffectual for any purpose.

Houk said she had had several inquiries about possible petitions.

"The bottom line is that everything must go through the Mayor's office and then she will notify me if the issue is to be placed on the 2010 ballot," Houk said.

Some of the areas the city is annexing are: both industrial parks, property along 1249 (Sand Springs Road), Hwy. 2549 (White Rock Road) and some property lying between Freedom School Road and the current city limits.



Friday night the Rockets will host the 2-2 Knox Central Panthers











about the "Detachment Hotel," as it was referred to in government circles.

Government officials also recommended that families keep a radio, two weeks of food rations, and board games or books to pass the time in their nuclear bunkers.

In addition to being extremely frightened of storms, Dad worried that a nuclear attack might come. Yet he was completely satisfied with the arrangement of hiding in the cellar.

Once in the fifties, I remember Daddy being in the small bathroom shaving when a large "boom" of thunder sounded. Everyone immediately headed for the cellar. When we were all secure and the lantern was lit, there stood Daddy with shaving lather all over his face. It

was so funny.

In 1976, when he decided to build a new home, Daddy's plans included a basement corner which was to be his new shelter. The walls and ceiling were constructed of thick concrete with enough space was left to make it comfortable in

case of an emergency.

My younger brother,
Dwight, told me that even then,
"Daddy was scared to death of
storms and retreated to his shelter when a storm was eminent."
I can remember him telling me
that he did not want people to
know about his "hiding place"
because they would want to in-

trude on his space. I suppose we thought those days of needing a shelter were entirely in the past. However, with the advent of 9-11 and terroristic threats evident today, FEMA actually has many plans available to you. They provide a list of needed supplies and materials to equip a shelter under today's standards. (Central Kentucky is considered to be in a medium risk area by FEMA because chemical stockpile located at the Bluegrass Army Depot.)

How terribly ironic that my generation went from hiding under a desktop – to being able to laugh at the fact that we did – only to end up right back where we started. The conditions in the Middle East and those recently stirring in Russia bring shelters back into the discussion. And, once again, it isn't funny anymore.

Marching Band Scoring Revealed

With no balls to hit or throw and no goals, bases, or hoops, scores in marching contests are based on Music Performance, Visual Performance, General Effect Music and General Effect Visual with Music Performance having the most weight in scoring. Two judges each independently assess the Music Performance and each of their scores is worth 20% of the total score. Another adjudicator assesses General Effect Music, also worth 20%. Two more judges individually assess Visual Performance for 10% each and yet another evaluates General Effect Visual, which is worth 20%. All these percentage points are then added together to come up with the final score, which is based on a scale of 100. Following is a scoring guide that better explains how the judges evaluate performances for Marching Band Contests. Sources for this article include the KMEA (Kentucky Music Educators Association) Marching Band Performance Assessment Event Rules and Regulations Handbook and KMEA Marching Band Committee meeting minutes and the KMEA sanc-

tioned contest judges sheets. Music Performance - Music Performance is divided into 3 sub captions: Musicianship (50 points), Technique (40 points) and Musical Content (10 points). Musicianship includes tuning/intonation, tone quality/ control, balance/blend, phrasing/expression/dynamics and appropriateness of style. Technique includes accuracy, precision/timing, uniformity of articulation and attacks/releases. Musical Content is also assessed by the adjudicator to determine the level of opportunity for the performer to display their skills.

Visual Performance - Visual Performance is divided into 3 sub captions: Technique (50 points), Form Control (40 points) and Visual Content (10 points). Technique includes uniformity of method, timing, posture, carriage and recovery from error. Form Control includes accuracy, clarity, spacing/interval and alignment.

Visual Content is determined by the opportunities in the show design that allow performers to display their skill in technique and form control.

General Effect Music -General Effect Music is divided into 2 sub captions: Effectiveness of Repertoire (60 points) and Performer Effectiveness (40 points). Effectiveness of Repertoire includes creativity of musical program, pacing/ continuity, integration of all elements, range of expression and effectiveness of staging. Performer Effectiveness includes communication of roles, emotional range, performer intensity, projection of style and confidence.

General Effect Visual -General Effect Visual is divided into 2 sub captions: Effectiveness of Repertoire (60 points) and Performer Effectiveness (40 points). Effectiveness of Repertoire includes creativity of visual program, pacing/continuity, integration of all elements, range of expression and effectiveness of staging. Performer Effectiveness includes communication of roles, emotional range, performer intensity, projection of style and confidence.

Tabulation - All scores are then combined and any penalties are deducted to determine each band's final ranking and rating. Music Performance - 2 judges (2 x 100 x .2 = 40 possible points); Visual Performance - 2 judges (2 x 100 x .1 = 20 possible points); General Effect Music - 1 judge (1 x 100 x .2 = 20 possible points); General Effect Visual - 1 judge (1 x 100 x .2 = 20 possible points); Total Score (100 possible points)

There are separate evaluations for guard and percussion and a separate adjudicator for each. These scores are also based on a scale of 100. In the coming weeks both the Guard and Percussion will be featured. The different elements which relate to them will be presented in greater detail at that time.

Featured instruments this week: Piccolos and Clarinets

Perhaps you have observed the Marching Rockets perform at a competition, parade, or at a football game and noticed that there seem to be three flutes, when in reality, there are no flutes at all! What looks and sounds like a flute is actually a piccolo. Flutes are reedless wind instruments that produce sound when a stream of air directed across a hole in the instrument creates a vibration of air at the hole. The air stream must be directed at the correct angle and velocity. They are tubes made of many different materials including wood and metal with precise placement of sound holes. The sound holes are then open or closed, by fingers or keys, to produce a specific note. Historically the piccolo had no keys but does today. The piccolo is a type of transverse flute and is smaller and more suitable for a marching band. It was first used in Beethoven's Fifth Symphony but became familiar in marching bands by John Philip Sousa's The Stars and Stripes Forever. The Marching Rockets boast three piccolo players this year including Nicole McFerron, Andrea Gonzalez and Caleb Coffey.

Nicole has been the Section Leader for the past two years. She is a junior and has been in the marching band for four years all together. She finds the position of Section Leader challenging, but says that it is "really fun to be able to help other people." The best part of band for Nicole is "being around all my friends throughout the year." Scream is her favorite song this year. She is not fond of "the long hours put into it. It takes up too much time," however NIGHTSCAPES "is going really well. I hope we make it to State [Finals] with it. I think this year has been my favorite so far." At this time she is planning on a career in Computer Technology and is hoping for a music scholarship. While in college she would like to continue her music in the concert band.

Andrea Gonzalez is also a junior and this is her fourth year with the Marching Rockets. The best part for her is "going to the competitions and hanging out with friends." Her favorite song to play on the piccolo is Think of Me by Andrew Lloyd Webber. Her least favorite part of being in the band is, "having to attend football games." Andrea knows that this is rare for someone from Rockcastle to admit, but "I'm not much of a football fan." told me NIGHTSCAPES is the "best show we've had in a long time. It's really cool." Right before performances she makes sure to hug everyone in her section and surrounding her and says "Good Luck". She plans to continue playing for her own enjoyment while pursuing her

dream of becoming a surgeon. Caleb Coffey is in his first year with the marching band. He is an eighth grader at RCMS. He plays piano, clarinet, French horn and saxophone as well as the piccolo. The best part of band for Caleb is the competitions. He loves, "the challenge and the excitement" of them. His current favorite song to play is Bugs which he is currently learning for the middle school concert band. His least favorite part is that "rehearsing takes so much time. It is so much of a time commitment." He says that NIGHTSCAPES is "not my favorite kind of music, but its pretty fun to play. I like classical." He plans to become a commercial genetic scientist and will continue to play mu-

sic for his own enjoyment.


The clarinet is woodwind instrument with a four octave range depending on the clarinetist. A single reed (usually made from the cane of a grass) is attached to a mouthpiece and when air is blown through the reed and the mouthpiece, the reed vibrates and produces the

sound of the instrument. This mouthpiece and reed assembly is joined to the body of the clarinet which is cylindrical and can be manufactured out of many different materials, although wood is traditional. This wooden cylinder has numerous tone holes and some or all of them are covered with keys. The manipulation of these keys/tone holes by covering and uncovering produces the different notes. It is a very versatile instrument that can take the place of a saxophone or a violin.

The 2008 Marching Rockets have only one clarinetist this season, Tara Baldwin. She is a sophomore and this is her third year marching with the band. Her favorite part of band is "getting to go around with my friends and play all the different music." Her current favorite song to play on the piccolo is Scream "It's really interesting. Not too hard, not too easy, and very fun to play." Her least favorite part of being in the band is the way "Mr. D works us really hard and practice lasts forever." About this year's show NIGHTSCAPES she said, "I think it's our best show yet. It's really cool. It has a lot of contrasts in it." Before each competition she prays "to do 'good' and have fun. If we have fun it doesn't matter so much that we win." Tara likes playing the clarinet for her own enjoyment and she hopes it will lead to a scholarship to help finance her college education where she plans to major in Marine Biology. She figures that college bands need more clarinets since "it takes more clarinets to make a big sound."







Rode 9,200 miles by himself

Fish rides his cycle, "North to Alaska"

Many Rockcastle countians have visited the great state of Alaska over the years and this year has been no exception with several locals making the trip to the country's 49th state.

However, one local man made the trip "North to Alaska" on his motorcycle and and all by himself.

Vincent Fish Roundstone, who will turn 74 this Sunday, always wanted to visit Alaska and decided this year that he was going with or without company.

Fish rode over 9,200 miles on his trip to and from Alaska, including 1,422 miles each way along the Alaskan Highway, a beautiful scenic route that takes motorists into the Northern region of Alaska.

Along the way, Fish saw Bears, one a Grizzly, Moose,

Mountain Sheep, Wolves and Bison, all in the wild.

"It was the most beautiful and interesting place I have ever been," said Fish, who retired in 1990 and moved back to Rockcastle County, from Sharonville, Ohio.

And, the stories from the trip include much more than the beautiful scenic ride along the Alaska Highway.

Some of those stories were about a few problems encountered along the way by the father of seven, which included a scare for those children and his wife of 56 years, Jean.

After hearing from Fish for eight straight days, the family did not get a call from him for three days.

Of course they became worried and his youngest son, Sean, called the State Highway Patrol in Alaska, police in the

Yukon Territory and the Royal Canadian Police. All three agencies told Sean there had been no motorcycle accidents along the route they thought his father would be traveling

One of his daughters, Marsha, who had been staying with her mom while her dad was on his trip, then called the phone company to make sure they could receive collect calls and that they hadn't somehow missed a call from her dad.

Marsha then called Fifth Third Bank to check the last transactions on her Dad's credit card and the family got some good news

Fish had used his credit card the day before to buy gas and rent a hotel room in Dawson Creek, British Columbia.

"After all that detective work, dad called home the next morning and was in Great Falls, Montana where he was getting a tire for his motorcycle," Marsha said.

"When I answered the phone and heard him say, 'Marsha' I cried and said, 'Dad, I have never been so happy to hear your voice' and he said, 'It is so good to talk to someone," her dad said.

Marsha said her father tried several times to call from pay phones but could not get service.

That was family's biggest ordeal, while the patriarch of the family traveled through the northern United States, Canada and Alaska.

But, Fish himself had more than one interesting experience while on the 15 day trip, that included an ordeal at the U.S, Canadian border, near Regina, Saskatchewan, where he was interrogated by four different immigration officers.

Fish said they held him at the border station for over an hour and a half

"They kept asking me why I was alone and I'm sure they thought I was trying to get drugs across the border or I was a terrorist. I'll guarantee you they x-rayed my bike, after they went through every item I had taken on the trip," Fish

"Finally after a hundred questions, which included whether I had a weapon or not, where I was going to stay in Alaska, who I was going to see,

the head official on site, finally let me into Canada," he said.

Fish did not have any other trouble at border stations, either when entering Alaska or when he returned to Canada, on his way home, but he did leave his cell phone in a motel in Cold River, British Columbia, on the initial leg of the trip, which contributed to the three day ordeal for his family. He picked it up on the way back.

Along the way, Fish encountered other adventurers who had had their fair share of trouble.

Fish said that he saw at least two bad accidents, both involving the numerous wild animals who wander the Alaskan High-

One accident involved a car and a Cow Moose. Fish said the pregnant Moose tore the top completely off the car and severely injured the passengers The accident closed the highway for an extended length of time Fish said.

He said the second accident involved a couple who were riding a Gold Wing.

Fish said the couple rounded a curve and hit a group of Mountain Sheep.

"They were hurt very badly and they had to fly one them out," Fish said

You had to be very careful when you were going around a curve because most of the time, there were animals standing in the road," Fish said

"Before I got to the second accident scene I met two couples from North Carolina, riding motorcycles and who were heading home, 'they had, had enough.""

Fish said the only time he was the least bit concerned is when he did not see a gas station, after he had traveled for several hours and his cycle got closer and closer to empty.

" I would turn it off and coast downhill and when I finally found a gas station, I was bone dry. I had tried to avoid that situation by filling up every chance I got because I didn't know when I would be able to do so again, but I still almost ran out of gas in the middle of nowhere," he said.

Fish said one other time he became a little concerned was when he got too close to a Grizzly Bear. "I never turned my bike off when I got off and it's a good thing - once I was going toward a Grizzly to get a good picture and the bear decided it didn't want a picture taken and it turned and ran toward me. I'm satisfied that is as fast as I've ever run. I jumped on my bike and needless to say hit the road without my picture. That Grizzly had claws as long as your middle finger."

Another day during the trip, Fish found himself 200 miles from nowhere at a little coun-



Applications for the 2008 Phase I Cost Share program are now available at the Extension Office on West Main Street. Deadline for completing application is October 15th.

This year's program will offer 5 areas on a menu approach. Up to \$2500 dollars total Cost Share will be available and farmers can choose between different areas all on one application.

Cattle Handling is to assist beef and dairy farmers construct alley ways and catch chutes to safely handle animals while performing herd health procedures. For farmers with good facilities, they may want to develop a weaning area or bull lot.

Cattle Genetic Improvement is to assist beef and dairy producers purchase Superior EPD bulls. Replacements from high EPD bulls help improve herd productivity.


Dairy Diversification assist dairy farmers improve their facilities. This includes equipment around the milk house,

free stall barn and feeding area. Forage Improvement is for new seeding Alfalfa and red clover with grass for hay production. Certified or PVP varieties with higher production records are required. UK Soil test are also required to determine the level of lime and fertilizer applied. This program

tilize pasture. Hay and Commodity Storage buildings are to assist farmers in protecting large round hay bales from weather damage. Commodity storage is to help farmers purchase feed in bulk by having a place to store several tons.

The 5 program areas will follow published guidelines from the Kentucky Agriculture Development Board. Approved applicants will be reimbursed 50/50 on eligible items NOT to exceed \$2500 per farm. 

Fish rides to Alaska

try market where he stopped to get gas. He had been riding a long time that day but he said he felt pretty good and he told the man at the gas station that he was going to ride until about dusk.

Fish, who was in Alaska in late June, said the man laughed and told him that if he planned to ride until dusk, he would be on the road until September.

Fish had made it far enough North into the polar region of Alaska, that he was in the home of the Midnight Sun.

The Midnight Sun is the time during which the sun remains visible in the sky for 24 hours, occurring in the polar regions, from March 21 to September 23rd.

After Fish learned that he wouldn't be able to ride until dusk, the man offered him a log cabin for the night "The cabin didn't have any electricity or running water, but I was sure glad to get it. He only charged me \$20 and, considering where I was and the fact I had been paying anywhere from \$90 to \$140 a night for a room, I more than appreciated it," Fish said

Fish spent a full six days in Alaska where he took several side trips off the Alaskan Highway, the Richardson Highway and the Dalton Highway.

Fish made his way to just South of Prudhoe Bay where

the Trans-Alaska pipeline begins and from where oil flows through an 800 mile long pipeline to the port of Valdez.

Fish said that at one point he estimated he was only 150 miles south of the North Pole.

Fish said as he got farther north the roads got worse and, at times, he could only travel a top speed of about 30 miles an hour.

He said roadways were snow and ice covered and in such had condition that even his 2007 Kawaski Vulcan would bottom out.

"A storm was coming off the Artic Ocean and blowing the bike all over the place. Everyone said it was going to be really bad in the area the next day, so I headed the bike south."

Fish, who had been to Canada in the late 60s to Moose Hunt but never been to Alaska, said his trip this summer was an experience that he would treasure for the rest of his life

"I had planned to go to Alaska in 1951, when I was 17 to get a job working on the roads up there. But my father got sick and I had to stay with the family," Fish said

His father, James Albert Fish, died in 1952 when Fish was 18. That was the same year he married his bride, Jean

Anderkin. Some 56 years later, Fish did something probably no other Rockcastle countian has

ever done. He traveled "North to Alaska, alone and on a motorcycle. Vincent said this week that he was looking forward to his next motorcycle ride to Alaska when he turns 90.
