## Fire destroys home on Menifee Hill

The family of Benton and Margaret Doan lost everything in fire that broke out in their mobile home at Menifee Hill Friday afternoon.

Mt. Vernon and Brodhead firefighters responded to the fire, which apparently was caused by faulty wiring in a back bedroom of their trailer. The Doans, and their children Christa, 14 and Megan, 9, lived in the trailer along with their dog, Tiko and guinea pigg, Sparkle.

Family members said the dog and guinea pig perished in the 2 p.m. fire. The Doans did not have any insurance.

Graves said the threats were made against her over the phone and that Bullens was never on school property.

## Small crowd attends open forum about annexation

Only 15 people attended an open forum, sponsored by, and held at, PD3 in Industrial Park #1 last Thursday night, where a recent annexation of property by the city of Mt. Vernon was discussed at length.

But the only person in attendance who could answer any questions on behalf of the city was engineer Luther Galloway, who has done extensive work on the annexation plan.

Rex McDonald, president of PD3, said his company had sent out invitations to city and county officials, well in advance of Thursday night's fo-

The main concern of the small crowd was whether or not an effort to have the annexation placed on the ballot would be in vain, because those circulating the petitions do not have enough information and therefore possibly not enough signatures for that to happen.

McDonald and others had a list of 146 property owners the city says will be effected but several questioned whether or not signatures from 50 percent of those property owners would be enough.

Property owner Connie Riddle, who is also a registered voter in the area being annexed, told the crowd she was the author of the petition and that two petitions were currently being circulated.

Riddle said signatures were being collected from property owners and from registered voters in the annexation area.

Riddle said that before petitions were circulated she had asked Mt. Vernon Mayor Clarice Kirby to look over them so there would be no questions as to whether or not the Mayor would certify the petitions.

Riddle said she had not

talked to Mayor Kirby, but that city employee Jill Medley told her the Mayor had looked over the petition and had asked that each signer of any petition give their current address.

McDonald said he only wanted the issue to go on the ballot so it could be voted on by those affected. He told the crowd his main concern was for his 26 employees who would be required to pay city payroll taxes and not receive any more benefits.

He also said the city should have to show how much more revenue would be generated by the annexation ordinance and how it would be spent.

Don Jones, who is a candidate for Mt. Vernon City Council in next month's general election, asked Galloway if, after a new council was seated

#### **Exercise to Lose Weight**

Losing weight and staying at an ideal weight is a lifelong battle for most of us. Everyone wants to lose weight, and everyone thinks that exercise is a quick, though not easy, way to

Actually exercise is a relatively slow way to lose weight. There are 3500 calories in each pound of fat, and this is more



than enough to run a marathon. A full marathon! If you run five miles a day every day of the week, you would burn up only one pound of excess fat each week.

The weight loss is even less on the scale because the training will increase your muscle mass. This is good, of course, but the number on the scale is

what a person looks at. The good news is that the increased muscle mass burns more calories, even at

Even if it is a slow process, exercise is still the key to any weight loss program. Your eating habits usually improve right along with increased fitness. One of the most beneficial results is that a person tends to cut out snacks and other "empty" calories that would otherwise be eaten. An ounce of potato chips is the equivalent of walking almost two miles or biking five miles. Exercise can even help suppress hunger pains.

Exercise also promotes a healthier life style. A person may ke the stairs rather than the elevator, or walk or hike to the post office rather than take the car. Over time, these small improvements in a person's physical activity, as well as his eating habits, can make a big difference in his weight and health.

Life style changes are the most effective way to control weight, and regular exercise is the foundation for many of the necessary changes.

## Rockcastle Memories

The Willow Whistle

A few days ago I was leisurely strolling through an antique mall, and I noticed a small, vintage willow whistle like one that my grandfather Gene Stokes made for me when I was a little boy.

Pop grew up in the Great Depression and was used to "making do" with whatever he could. As a result, he learned to make a variety of items out of the most common objects.

Pop took great pride in teaching me that human ingenuity is a valuable resource. One afternoon when I was about 7 years old, he took me into the woods near our house in order to find a piece of willow. He wanted to show me how to make a whistle. I was excited to learn anything from him because he was my hero. The only tool that he carried into the woods that day was his trusty pocket knife, which he used for a wide variety of uses. That same knife was used to peal an apple, dig out splinters, cut rope, and make his grandson several toys.

After he located a straight piece of willow, he hollowed out the pith in the center and began to carve the openings that would allow the wind to pass over his design to make the whistle sounds. We were sitting on a log as I witnessed the transformation of a small piece of wood into what I thought was the most awesome whistle I had ever heard. Finally, he took a small piece of leather out of his pocket and made a lanyard so that I could wear my new whistle around my neck. It was very cool, too, but the most important thing was that he had made it for me. Today, I would give a king's

ransom for that little whistle. The whistle was not the only item that Pop designed and constructed for his grandson. One day he showed me how to make an Elderberry pop-gun. We went back into the woods and found a small Elderberry shrub, and he cut a small, straight branch about a foot long for the barrel. He then lo cated a hickory twig in order to push the pith out of the barrel as well as to use for the ram-

He proceeded to teach me which berries should be used as ammunition for my new popgun. After loading the berries into the barrel, he showed me how to position the ramrod - so that when it was forced through the branch, the berries "fired" out of the tube with a loud bang. Of course, I was quite impressed with his knowledge of woodworking

As I became older, Pop showed me how to construct many other items from wood. There is one particular day that I will never forget. Early on a Saturday morning he came into my bedroom and told me to get out of bed because we were going to build a house for me to use as a "playhouse." I was stunned.

He had been planning this day for several weeks, because all of the items needed for this small building were lying inside the garage. Two by fours, nails, shingles, hinges, locks, and even a light for the ceiling were carefully placed there.

We carried all of the materials into the yard, and he asked me where I wanted my playhouse to sit. I showed him a shady spot near a large oak tree, and then we went to work.

As he carefully constructed my house, he described each step and explained exactly why he was doing each process. Not only was he building me a small room, but he was teaching me how houses were constructed. Carefully, the walls went up, and the roof was nailed into place. I assisted him with each step by measuring the wood and helping him saw each piece. I will never forget what I learned that day.

We only stopped for lunch. By the end of the day, my playhouse was neatly standing near the oak tree. It was now ready for me to begin the job of painting the walls and decorating inside. Pop had even purchased the white paint for the clapboard outside!

The last job was to hang the door and install the lock. He gave me the only set of keys for my house. The inside dimensions were approximately 4 feet by 4 feet with a small attic in the roof with just enough room for me to lie down. He even shingled the roof so that I could put my personal belongings inside without fear of them getting wet.

For the next few days, I carried my toys, books, and my BB gun to my own little house by the oak tree. I have never been so proud of anything in my life. Once again, Pop was my hero, and I loved him for taking the time to show me how buildings were designed and constructed. I was only eight or nine years old at the time, but that little house was still standing when I left for

the county, Sand Hill's attendance varies from 30 to 50 people each week, with their attendance on Sunday, October 12th being 42.

Also in 1999, new bathrooms were built in the church and, in 2007, the church underwent major renovations.





## Pay increase for ERWA board questioned...

Dear Editor,

All but one member of the Eastern Rockcastle Water Association (ERWA) board of directors voted themselves a huge increase in pay at their last monthly meeting, Tuesday, October 14th. The only action by Murphy Martin, ERWA vice president, during the entire meeting was to introduce a motion to increase payment of board members from \$35 to \$50 per month, a whopping 43 percent increase.

David Ballinger, a recently elected board member, jumped on this proposal with several other board members like a starving dog on a big juicy bone. Ballinger seconded Martin's motion and there was an attempt to approve it in a mad dash even before there could be any discussion.

Only June Whitler, ERWA board member, objected and did not vote to approve this increase. She questioned the justification for paying members of a voluntary board and asked how in the world such a large increase could be merited.

Randy Corry, ERWA general manager, jumped into the loud and excited rabble in an attempt to explain why ERWA board members should be paid and why the large increase was justified. He said ERWA board members had been paid for quite some time on a quarterly basis and that the large increase was justified because of high gas prices. He said that Martin had to meet with him frequently to sign papers an do other tasks.

Murphy Martin, and other board members who were licking their chops at the thought of getting a Wall Street type pay increase, chimed in that Corry's explanation was cor-

However, Corry and these board members obviously failed to comprehend their flawed logic, that is justifying a big pay increase because of high gas prices at the very time gas prices had a record decline and are predicted to fall further.

It should be recalled that Corry does not have a sterling record for providing sound rationales. In the last few months, Corry was involved in a showy dismissal of a staff member, repeating variations in public of a vague claim that the employee either threatened him with a gun or inappropriately had a gun in the former ERWA business office. Corry then rehires this staff member, first on a temporary and then regular full-time basis. Right on the heels of these seemly irrational acts, Corry claimed there was a Judas-betrayal of him, which was mysteriously and conveniently revealed by board member David Ballinger just in

time to keep Corry from being fired in a specially called board meeting in which another staff member was unexplainably terminated from employment.

While it is impossible to fathom some of this nonsense, it is not difficult to conclude that members of a voluntary water association board should not have their pay raised from \$35 to \$50 a month. If the board wants to compensate members for travel expenses, have them submit mileage reports and pay them per mile, based on approved IRS rates. We already pay some of the higher water rates in the state and do need to have our limited resources further squandered by a board that does not seem to care about its users or their own fiduciary responsibilities. ERWA water users should contact Dell Ponder, the ineffectual ERWA board president, and demand that he introduce a motion at the next meeting to rescind the insulting pay increase. If Martin, Ballinger, and other board members who voted themselves a \$50 monthly welfare payment, do not want to serve as voluntary board members, let them all be replaced. There are plenty of competent and honest ERWA water users who are ready to step in and provide better leadership.



gan his career with as a "community organizer" although fairness requires noting that Senator Obama was not personally involved in any of the fraud. When ACORN registers the deceased, several members of the Dallas Cowboys and community leaders named Mary Poppins, Dick Tracy and Jive Turkey, why would anyone allow the group to continue the abuse, much less give a blatantly partisan group \$31 million tax dollars? 

Not according to the Supremacists on the U.S. Supreme Court who have decided that they do not agree with the voters' opinions. Instead of having the voters decide this controversial issue 5 of the 9 justices on the Court feel they should decide [Kennedy v. Louisiana, 2008]. And, as in the case of the death penalty for juveniles, they barely even try to pretend they are following the Constitution. Instead they point to things such as laws in foreign countries, and a so-called "consensus" which does not contain even half of voters [Roper v.

Simmons 2005]. Similarly consider the voter disenfranchisement of Americans who feel that private property should forcibly taken by the government only for public use. Should these Americans have their votes counted? The constitution allows eminent domain only in cases of "public use," but the Supremacists on the supreme court do not like the clear language of this requirement. Instead, they reinterpret "public use" to mean taking the house that you built and raised your family in and giving it to a private strip mall developer. Once again your

vote, and the vote of all other citizens, is trumped by the Steven Breyers and Ruth Bader Ginsburgs of the world [Kelo

v. City of New London, 1985]. As you go into the voting booth you should consider civil right number 1A: the right of Americans to decide controversial issues through the democratic process. Barack Obama favors judges who legislate from the bench and "outvote" all other Americans time after time. John McCain favors letting you decide.

Emergency Conservation Program

Farms experiencing severe drought conditions may be eligible for cost-share assistance under ECP. Rockcastle County has been approved to start a 20 day sign-up period to implement practice EC6, Drought Emergency Measures for damage due to drought in the county and EC7, Other Emergency Conservation Measures - Hauling Water for

Livestock. Sign-ups will begin on October 9, 2008, and will end on October 29, 2008.

EC6: The estimated cost share that will be entered for the request will be 50 percent of the amounts listed for permanent and 75 percent of the amounts for temporary measures.

Permanent measures include: pipeline installed, watering facility installed, spring developments (permanently installed) and water well deepening or installed.

Temporary measures include: dugout/seeps, tank/ trough fountain and pipeline.

EC7: The estimated cost share for Other Emergency Conservation measures will be 75 percent. Examples of these measures include: emergency pipeline, hauling tank, storage basin and equipment cost of truck or tractor and wagon.

An onsite inspection must be made by FSA to collect data that will allow a practice eligibility determination to be made.

Persons requesting approval

are subject to payment eligibility and limitations.

Bank account changes

If your bank account number changes or there is a change in your banks name notify FSA immediately to ensure payments reach your account timely.





## Students at RCMS say, "NOse to the Flu"

Parents, now is the time to protect your child from the flu. The flu season can begin as early as October. The peak months for flu season are usually in February and March. For the first time, all Rockcastle County Students will have the opportunity to say, "NOse to the flu".

The Rockcastle County Health Department, in partnership with the Rockcastle County Board of Education, will be offering free FluMist vaccinations to all students. Each school will have dates that nurses are available to administer the vaccine.

Students may like this new vaccination. Instead of being administered by an injection, The FluMist is an intranasal vaccine which is inserted in the nose much like a nose spray product.

Vaccination is the best way to protect your child against the flu. Influenza or flu is a very serious illness. Each year in the United States there are more than 200,000 hospitalizations and 36,000 deaths related to the flu (CDC, 2008). In addition to the flu vaccination, there are some easy ways that you can protect you and your child from the flu and other respiratory

•Wash your hands often •Avoid touching your eyes,

nose or mouth •Cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing, preferably on your upper

•Avoid close contact with people who are sick

sleeve or arm rather than your


•Stay at home when you are sick or keep your child at home when they are sick

Each student has had information sent home to their par-

ents regarding the FluMist vaccine and a Student Vaccination Consent Form. Students will be able to receive the vaccine only if the school nurse receives a signed consent form from the parents. If you have questions about this service, please contact your child's school or the health department at 256-2242.

The flu vaccine is not in short supply this year, so all adults are encouraged to be immunized. In addition to the flu vaccine, the Department for Public Health is strongly encouraging all adults 65 years or older or individuals with a chronic disease such as asthma, diabetes, heart disease or hypertension to also have a pneumonia vaccination.

The health department is providing flu and pneumonia vaccinations daily in the clinic.





## **Rockets beat Harrison** County 17-0 on Friday

The Rockcastle County High School football Rockets improved their season record to 6 and 2 overall with a 17-0 victory over Harrison County in a home contest on Friday night.

The highly-touted Rockets were favored against the now 4 and 4 Thoroughbreds, who put up a better fight than many originally expected.

The Rocket defense held Harrison County to 100 yards on offense, but allowed the Thoroughbreds to stay in the game with costly turnovers and dropped passes.

The Rockets forced four turnovers on the night, with two fumble recoveries and two interceptions, however they gave away two fumbles and an interception of their own.

Once again, the defense carried the load for Rockets, recording seven sacks on their way to their first shut-out of the year.

The first score for the Rockets came late in the first quarter when senior tailback Casey Hayes broke away from the Harrison County defense to score on a 58 yard run. An Andre Swertle extra point made it 7-0 in favor of Rockcastle.

Later in the second quarter, Swertle, an exchange student from Germany, knocked down his first career field goal at the ROCK with a convincing 24 yarder, at the 5:39 mark, to put the Rockets up 10-0, a lead they would take into the half.

Only one more score would be recorded during the game and it would come with 5:33 left in the fourth quarter.

With great blocking from the offensive line, senior Cody Mize burst through the Harrison County defense to run for a 30 yard touchdown. The extra point would make it 17-

Junior quarterback Dustin Bishop and his receivers had trouble getting in sync from the beginning of the game with batted balls, tipped passes and dropped receptions that stymied three touchdown drives.


"I guess the biggest disappointment for our offense was the dropped passes this late in the season - we've got to do better than that if we expect to advance in the playoffs," said head coach Scott Parkey.

The Rockets had 187 yards of total offense -- 148 on the ground and 39 through the air.

Haves led the team in rushing again this week with 112 yards on 25 carries and a touchdown. Mize ended up with 60 yards on 9 carries and a touchdown. Bishop finished the night six for 12 for 39 yards and one interception.

Only three different receivers caught passes on the night with Dustin Bullock leading the way. Bullock had two receptions for 36 yards while junior Matt Bullens and Mize each had a catch.

Defensively, the Rockets had an outstanding night. hold-




Hayes had a great game on both sides of the ball, leading the defense in tackles and assists with 11 which complimented his good night







January 1, 2009, the annexation ordinance could be rescinded by a majority vote of the council.

Galloway told Jones that it was his understanding that at any time the council could rescind such an ordinance.

Galloway also told the group that it would actually cost the city more to take in landowners in the annexed area than it would receive in property taxes.

He said the only revenue benefit to the city would be an increase in revenue from those affected by the city's one percent payroll tax.

Some of those businesses affected by the annexation ordinance would be PD3, Plasticware LLC, B&H Toolworks, SourceCorp and all other businesses located in the county's two industrial parks.

A petition or petitions seeking placement of the annexation question on the ballot must be received in Mayor Kirby's office 60 days after the ordinance was published in the Signal on September 25th.

According to state law, if 50 percent of resident voters, or owners of real property within the proposed territory to be annexed, petition the Mayor in opposition to the proposal, the annexation question would be placed on the ballot in 2010.

If not enough signatures are certified on either petition by November 24th, the annexation ordinance would become law on November 25th.

Those areas being annexed by the city include all property between Freedom School Road, including Hanson Aggregates, Countryside Estates and much of the property on Sand Springs Road and White Rock Road.

At Thursday's meeting, Galloway agreed that the proposed annexation would almost double the size of Mt. Vernon's City limits.

## Auto accident changes 5-year-old's life forever

By: Kevin Canterbury Little Brianna McClure's life was changed forever on April 6, of this year when she was involved in a hor-

rific accident along Hwy. 150 near the Mt. Vernon

Because of the accident, the 5-year-old will never fully recover from her inju-

The family says the accident occurred after a hit and run driver, who has yet to be identified, caused Brianna's mom, Mindy, to lose control of her car and flip it several times.

The driver that caused the accident never stopped and McClure said: "They must have been drunk to not want to turn around and check on us. They simply didn't care or want to accept responsibility for the crash."

A large tree stopped McClure's Toyota Camry from continuing down the embankment and falling 90 feet into the train tunnel at the bottom of the hill.

But while the wreck was in process, Brianna's booster seat came loose and hit her fifteen- month-old brother Hunter in the head, which led to a fractured skull. Hunter was not responding or even breathing when Mindy got to him.

Mindy flagged down preacher Bill Slaybaugh, who was the first to pull over to help, and he performed mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, which revived the toddler at the scene, of the 7:45 p.m. accident.

Barry Edwards also pulled over to help and kept a watchful eye over Brianna, who was complaining about neck pain, while Slaybaugh and McClure attended to

Mindy said doctors at the University of Kentucky Children's Clinic assumed Brianna was just suffering from whiplash but later found she had a bruised lung and liver. Both children were kept in the hospital until April 8th.

It wasn't until a check-up two weeks later that they gave Brianna an x-ray as a precaution and found ligament damage in her neck.

She was immediately taken into surgery to repair the damage. Doctors used some of her own bone marrow to fuse the ligaments back together.

Mindy was then given a halo to help keep her neck completely still for three months but, just two months later, she began complaining of headaches and her grandmother, Betty Weaver, found four screws, from the halo, had fallen out.

The family then called the University of Kentucky to tell them what had happened. The clinic told them to come up right away to have the problem fixed but, shortly after hanging up, the last four screws had ripped from her head separating the halo from her skull.

An ambulance was called and Brianna was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital for immediate analysis. The family returned to UK shortly there after and a C-Collar was put in place instead of the halo. The C-Collar gave Brianna a little more freedom and didn't restrict her in the way the halo originally had.

Because the C-Collar gave her more flexibility, there was also a higher risk of her being paralyzed and put on a ventilator if she fell down.

The family thought things would begin to turn around for them but, a month later, another checkup proved otherwise. The entire time Brianna wore the C-Collar, her ligaments were not reacting to the bone marrow and not fusing together like the doctors thought they would.

Another halo was put in place and she continues to wear it today but it may be removed November 12th if the ligaments have fused satisfactorily. Brianna must sleep face down to keep from injuring her neck again and can only take baths in a few inches of water. According to her grandmother, Betty Weaver, "It's a true miracle of God that these kids are still alive."

Should the ligaments continue to reject Brianna's bone marrow, doctors will have to place a steel rod into her skull and all the way down her spine, limiting her body to only half of its potential mobility.

This is unlikely but still a very dangerous reality the family may have to face in the near future. Brianna's mother said, "My boyfriend Scotty (Winstead) and my family have been everything to me and they are the ones that have gotten me through this."

Brianna is home schooled for now and hopes to return to school as soon as she can get the halo removed.



tion, and group representation. The Field Commander can come from any section of the band: percussion, winds, brass or colorguard and is chosen based on musical abilities, leadership qualities, attitude, and passion for the sport. The position of Drum Major originated in the British Army with its' Corps of Drums in 1650. Military groups performed mostly duty calls and battle signals during that period. A fife and drum corps, directed by the Drum Major, would use short pieces to communicate to field units. With the arrival of military concert bands and pipe bands around the 18th century, the position of the Drum Major was adapted to those ensembles. The Field Commander is responsible for providing commands verbally, through hand gestures, or with a signal baton regarding where to march, what to play, and what time to keep. In addition to memorizing the music (between six and nine minutes of music is typical for high school marching bands) a drum major must memorize dynamics as well as tempo in order to provide proper direction and cues. In the absence of the Band Director, the Field Commander carries the authority of the director or instructor and as-

the band. In some bands, Field Commanders occasionally may serve in other capacities such as performing a solo. Field Commanders have also become more elevated over the years, having moved off of the field over the course of the 1970s and 1980s and onto small podiums, which in recent years have often become some eight feet in height or larger. There may be supplemental podiums for additional Drum Majors, usually smaller in stature. High School marching bands generally have anywhere from one to four Field Commanders or Drum Majors who are responsible for conducting and leading the band. The Field Commander's podium is set on the 50 yard line. Any other commanders are placed on yard lines closer to the end zone or to the rear of the band for about- face maneuvers.

sumes complete leadership over

The salute from the Field Commander is traditionally the beginning of judging in a competition, and also signals the end of a band's show. The dropping of a salute usually involves making the hand into a fist just above or in front of the face, and bringing the hand down by the side. The Field Commander is also responsible for calling the band to attention, beginning, ending and conducting the show. As conductors, they use a sort of musical sign language made up of hand, arm and facial gestures rather than speech to communicate with the musicians on the field. This musical sign language often reflects almost as much of the personality of the conductor as it does the music being played. Thus, no two conductors ever conduct in precisely the same way. A high school Field Commander

usually wears a uniform different than the rest of the band. It is designed to help the commander stand out when coming onto the field and to give distinction to the leader of the

The 2008 Marching Rockets Field Commander, Regina Rice, is a junior at RCHS. This is her third year with the band. Last year she was section leader for the clarinets. Her favorite song to play on the clarinet is Hey Baby. Regina told me that "the family atmosphere" is what she likes best about being in the band. "It's like the band is one big family. Also, I love music. It's a major part of my life." She loves being Field Commander because it provides "really good exposure. I get a great opportunity to grow as a person. It's a responsibility, but the rewards from helping others are great." When asked about future plans she said, "I am going to UK as a Robinson Scholar, which I won in eighth grade." She plans to major in either music or com-

puter engineering but is definitely planning to be part of UK's marching and concert bands. Regina said that she thinks NIGHTSCAPES is "really cool. It's different from anything we've ever done. It's really original." In addition to her band commitments, Regina also clogs and is involved in many clubs at school, FBLA, NHS, Student YMCA, and FCA. She credits her grandparents, James and Helen Rice, with giving her the opportunity and encouragement to succeed. "They've raised me. They always told me I could achieve anything I set my mind to." During the winter concert season she will again play her clarinet under the direction of Mr. Daugherty.

Michael Browning, also a junior, is the Assistant Field Commander of the Marching Rockets this year. This is his fourth year in the band and he was section leader for the flutes last year. His favorite song to play on the flute is Sun Dance by Frank Ticheli. The best part of band for Michael is "being with all the wonderful people." His least favorite aspect of band is "witnessing the bad attitude of others who are negative about the band." He is enjoying his command position this year. "It's been a really great experience from Drum Major camp to being in the field now. It's great to be able to help the program grow." He is hoping for a music scholarship, possibly to EKU or UK to help him achieve his dream of becoming a band director. NIGHTSCAPES he said, "Best show we've had in a long time. It really has good potential." When not active in band, Michael enjoys reading, especially classic novels like Catcher in the Rye by J. D. Salinger. He credits Mr. Greg Daugherty, Rockcastle's band director, with mentoring his vocation. "Mr. D. has been my biggest influence in choosing music as a career." This winter Michael will be playing his flute

in the concert band.




## Minds in the Middle


