

Livingston woman dies after fire in apartment

A 65-year-old Livingston woman apparently died from smoke inhalation, after a fire broke out in her apartment at the Livingston Manor Apartments on Tuesday night.

Rockcastle Deputy Coroner Bud Cox confirmed early Wednesday morning that Iverene Lawson Bond was pronounced dead at the Rockcastle Hospital around 9 p.m. Tuesday night after the members of the hospital staff tried repeatedly to resuscitate her for more than an hour.

Livingston Fire Chief Sam Stallsworth said investigators with the State Fire Marshall's office think the fire started in the elderly woman's apartment after a relief valve on an oxygen tank was set on fire by a cigarette she was smoking.

Livingston fire firefighters

and Rockcastle EMS workers administered CPR on Bond, who was helped out of her apartment by a neighbor after they saw smoke coming from the unit.

Livingston firefighters managed to contain the blaze to Bond's apartment, which sustained only smoke and water damage.

The vote came at the request of Mt. Vernon Mayor Clarice Kirby, who said the city "would now get only what is due to them under state law and not raise the amount of insurance

Court holds special meeting for financing of coming factory

The Rockcastle Fiscal Courtwas in special session Tuesday, and one of the items on the agenda was financing for the new factory planned for the Industrial Park South.

The factory is being built to house expanded operations of SourceCorp in Mt. Vernon and the court needs to put 5.2 million dollars of financing in place for infrastructure improvements and the new building

Jim Holton, a consultant with the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Assn. told the court that 70/30 grant money, from the state's Economic Development Adminis-

tration, was possible to help with financing the infrastructure improvements, including site preparation. Holton said that the RIDA was in the process of making an application for up to \$600,000 to go toward the \$2.5 million needed. "\$500,000 is probably a more realistic figure to hope for," Holton told the court. This amount would call for \$150,000 in matching money from the county.

Holton also said that an application would be made to the Department of Transportation and the Economic Development Cabinet for additional

Points East Rockcastle Memories

The Fancy Guppy

When I was enrolled in Mrs. Dorothy Landrum's biology class at Mt. Vernon High School, she taught me all about ichthyology and how fish were such an important part of the environment. We even dissected a small perch in her class, which I thought was so cool.

Deciding upon my college major a couple of years later, I kept thinking I would love to teach biology and chemistry. So when I arrived on the campus of UK, my mind was made up about what I would study. I never could master her "finger snaps" in order to control the class, but I did get my degree in biology and chemistry. I am grateful to have been in her class and watch a master teacher at work. I wanted so much to be just like her in the

When I was a junior in college, I worked part-time for a pet shop. The owner's name was Leo Rios, and he was from Cuba. His English was not very good, but he knew everything about pets - and especially about fish.

One Friday afternoon, he sent me to Louisville to pick up an order of tropical fish and gave me a check to pay for the supplies. On my way back home, a Kentucky State Police officer stopped me and asked what I was doing with a car full of pet supplies. He evidently thought that I had stolen the items. I called Mr. Rios and let him explain to the trooper why my car was full of fish. Even with his broken English, Leo was able to convince the officer that I was actually a pet shop worker; so he let me go without a ticket. I was tremendously relieved!

After a few months of working with Leo, I determined to develop the art of producing very good Fancy Guppies. I had tanks at home and was trying to breed them to sell to pet shops. Months and months went by; at one time, I had 13 fish tanks. (I know – even now it sounds ridiculous just to tell!)

On one occasion, I paid \$15 for a male guppy to use in my breeding experiments. Fifteen dollars was a heck of a lot of money in those days. I had this specimen in a large tank, sitting near the floor furnace in my living room. At night as I watched television, I could see him swimming back and forth in his tank.

One night – all of a sudden – he jumped out of the water and landed in the middle of my furnace. I heard the "sssssss" when he hit the hot metal. All I could think of was – I drove all the way to Louisville and spent \$15 only to watch this stupid fish take a suicide dive.

Because I had so many tanks, I decided to try another breed of fish to make some spending money for my hobby. Leo suggested that I try breeding the Siamese Fighting

(Betta) breed of tropical fish. I read all about the species before I purchased a pair to breed.

This particular fish takes oxygen from the surface of the water and can even drown if they cannot reach the outside air. Males cannot be kept in the same tank because they will fight, sometimes to the death. One of the novelties of keeping Bettas is to hold a mirror next to the tank and watch them flare or "puff out" their gills in order to appear more impressive and aggressive to their own reflections. Betta owners keep mirrors next to the tank to show how aggressive their own fish can be.

So, off to Louisville I traveled to purchase two males and a female. I even purchased a Betta tank to hold the males. This tank had a piece of glass between two separate areas for the two males. They seemed to be very satisfied with their new homes so off to bed I

The next morning I awoke to check on my two fine males only to discover that one had jumped into the other tank and killed the other. At that point, I decided that I apparently was not meant to breed fish. I immediately began to sell off my tanks and got out of the fish

If I ever decide to try tropical aquariums again, I will only purchase fish that merely swim around in the tank looking good. Neon tetras might be the fish of choice because they swim in schools and give off a bright red and blue neon color. Also, they are not purchased for breeding purposes!

Mrs. Landrum may have made a fish lover out of me, but I'm pretty sure she would have approved of me abandoning my attempts to become a breeder of them.

Over the last decade or so, I have routinely referred to anything that had to be shipped by common carrier as "snail mail". In other words, if it can't be pasted from a software application or scanned and attached to email so that you have it in seconds, even if you are New Zealand or on a walk-about in Australia with your trusty laptop connected to a global satellite positioning unit, then getting the info to you means it has to be printed, stuffed into an envelope, taken to the post office or some other common delivery service and it may take you a couple of days to get it.

Compared to the internet, all other forms of distributing printed material fall into the category of "snail mail" and that includes guaranteed overnight delivery from Paint Lick, KY to Beaver Falls, Oregon. Relatively speaking. all noneinternet means of distributing printed communication are sloooooooooooooowwww. And when you compare days to seconds, that's a factual truth.

But I have been advised that the people who work in our post offices take offense at the term "snail mail." Mostly because they have yet to see a snail crawl from Paint Lick to Beaver Falls overnight and deliver a certified letter from a beaver on this end to an eager beaver out there in the piney woods, 2,000 miles away, in the course of 24 hours.

But forget about the certified stuff and let's talk about plain old first class mail. If you or I post a letter before the close of business at most post offices in the country and it is destined to any address anywhere else in this country, the person named on the envelope is going to get the mail in three days or less. From Paint Lick to Chicago is usually one day. To Las Vegas or Beaver Falls may take two or three depending on when you got your birthday card to grandma in the mail.

And snails don't travel that fast. Nor do antelopes elusive

Time For Flu Shots

It is time for flu shots again. Each fall and early winter, people at high risk of complications if they catch this serious influenza virus should receive the shot. Unfortunately, only about 20-40% of people who should get the immunization, do



so. This low immunization rate allows the virus to spread through a community more easily. The virus normally spreads through the United States during the winter months, so it is important to get the shot by mid-November.

A person should get the shot if he is over 65 or if he has any severe or chronic illness, such as heart disease, lung disease or diabetes. Residents of nursing

homes or other long-term care facilities should routinely get the shot. Younger people should be immunized if they have any chronic illnesses, such as kidney failure or immune defi-

The vaccine is incubated in eggs, so if a person is allergic to eggs, chickens or feathers, he should not receive the shot without first doing a scratch test to verify the allergy. The shot should not be given during an acute respiratory infection or other active infection.

The shots are very safe and if any reaction occurs it is usually a mild fever, aching and fatigue. This may last one to two days. Rarely, a person will get hives, which is probably due to an egg allergy.

The more serious paralysis of Guillain-Barre syndrome is very rare and is only known to be associated with the "swine flu" component which was last used in 1976. Epidemiologists predict which strains of the virus are likely each year, so the shot is different each year.





Dear Journal,

It feels kind of good to put pen to paper again. I've been out of town for almost two weeks, and haven't kept up with my Journal. It is always good to get back home again, and get back into old routines, no matter how much you enjoy traveling. It's only been a few days since I got back from my Oklahoma trip so getting back from my Ohio trip was especially endearing.

My travels took me to northern Ohio, specifically the Sandusky area, for my church's yearly fall convention that lasted a little over a week. I went a day or so early, and stayed a day or two after it was over. It goes without saying that I enjoyed it very much, and learned a lot of things, as I always do. In the past, I've gone to the convention site in Greenville, South Carolina, but was sent north this year. The Greenville location was still available, as well as sites around the world, but the Kentucky churches were assigned to go to Sandusky. I met a lot of new people that I had never seen before. They had come from all over the New England states, eastern Canada, the northwest, and a lot of the midwestern prairie states.

As it turned out, Sandusky was the Gatlinburg of the north, catering a lot to tourists. Unfortunately, the bulk of the tourists had gone, and some of the restaurants, attractions, and such, were closed for the season. For the more adventurous, there was Cedar Point, a huge amusement park with lots of rides and shows still open on the weekend, but I'm a little too old for that. I did, however, get to do enough to suit me; things a little more my speed. I did some shopping, and got a few things for the house, and some clothes for Stanley. I got to eat some really good food. The restaurants were close to where I stayed, and there was quite a variety. I, and various groups of brethren, ate at familiar places like Ryan's, and the Outback, as well as local places like The Angry Trout or The Lumberjack.

Sams credits her parents with recognizing her talents early on and providing learning opportunities. She still has her first drawing, a cat sketched at age three.

Her Mom "bragged to everybody about that cat," says

As a second grader she was enrolled in a program at the University of Miami for artistically inclined children.

My mother showed such patience. She would take me every Saturday and sit outside waiting for me," she says.

By age 15, she was attending Taller Sinco, a school of designing art in her mother's native Columbia, South America.

Upon returning to Florida two years later, she was exposed to the art of stained glass for the first time. She relished the freedom to express herself through that medium.

I discovered that stained glass was my medium of choice, but I love pottery and textiles, too. I love doing designs with center focal points,"

Maria later became a teacher herself, sharing her talents at Hazel Green Academy from 1997 to 2002. More recently, she has been conducting workshops at her studio.

Attendees get an opportunity to watch Maria at work, designing her own patterns using the copper foil technique. 'Most lamps are made using that technique that was invented by Tiffany," she says.

Among the larger pieces she creates are church windows, which require about two weeks of work.

In addition to creating new pieces, Maria's talents are often in demand for restoration work, a task that sometimes makes her uneasy.

"I was up on scaffolding in Lexington doing repair work on a window that had been shot by vandals. It was not in the best of neighborhoods and there were shell casings lying all around. Kinda scary," she

The scariest thing facing Maria over the next few weeks will be fulfilling all the orders coming in for Christmas gifts such as lamps, sun catchers, jewelry boxes, clocks, night lights, butterflies and stars.

But, the busy season will soon pass, allowing her to get back in the woods and find inspiration to create new pieces reflecting the beauty and harmony of Kentucky.

"What Is Written"

In Matt.21:23 we read, "And when he was come into the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came unto him as he was teaching, and said, By what authority doest thou these things? and who gave thee this authority?" The people ask two related questions in this text. They wanted to know by what authority and who gave him this authority to do the things he was doing. Jesus did not act like authority was a non-issue, that it wasn't a big deal, it didn't really matter. But he did ask them, "I also will ask you one thing, which if ye tell me, I in like wise will \{ tell you by what authority I do these things. The baptism of John, whence was it? from heaven, or of men?" vss.24-25a. Jesus is} showing that authority comes from either heaven or from men. The baptism of John illustrates this point the Lord was making. These folks would not give an answer to his simple question, for they would get themselves in trouble to answer either way, vs.25b-27. Of course if they had loved the truth, and wanted to do what was right, they could have answered it very easily. The things we practice in religion, does the authority come from heaven or from men? Next week we will look at some examples.

the reasons just mentioned. Let me give you one legitimate reason for doing so--I'm tired or partisan politics.

Most will tell you that they will vote for Obama because he offers change. These same Americans will tell you, as I do, that partisan politics is the primary problem in Washington. 5. Junior age category talks are to be 3 to 5 minutes long. Senior age category talks are to be 5 to 7 minutes long.


6. A participant may secure assistance from anyone he chooses in writing or preparing his talk. There is no specific topic; any suitable topic can be used.

Regrettably I have had to close my dental office on Main Street in Mt. Vernon. The close was necessary because of gasoline vapors in the building. These vapors are from gasoline that has leaked into the ground from the underground tanks of a nearby station. Much of the gasoline remains in the ground and is on my property and under my building.

You may have noticed the large drill rigs working all over town. These rigs belong to a contractor who is working for Kentucky's Underground Storage Tank Branch. The contractor is attempting to locate the gas that has leaked into the ground and then remove it. At this point, he has not succeeded with either task. Meanwhile, gasoline vapors continue to seep into my office almost every day.

I have been advised that the environment inside the building is now too dangerous to work in. With the safety of my patients, my staff and myself in mind, I felt is was absolutely necessary to close the office.

Making the decision to close was very difficult. I am very grateful for all of my patients and I feel an obligation to them that I am now unable to meet. I hope to resolve that by relocating the office in the near future.

After relocation, I will be making plans to welcome a new, and much younger dentist, into the practice next summer.





Jeffrey Tipton is new coach for boys' cross country team at RCHS



Last week was a busy one for the Marching Rockets as they prepared for Class AAAA Regional Ouarterfinals. Spirits were high on Saturday morning as the Rockets began their day on the practice field at RCHS—getting in a final rehearsal before traveling to Morehead for the big event. Upon arriving at Rowan County High School, it became apparent that adverse conditions would play havoc with the remainder of the day's schedule. Rowan County High School's Viking Stadium could not be used due to the previous night's football game which included a downpour of biblical proportions. The Rowan County organizers scrambled to make alternate arrangements which included quickly turning a soccer field into a competitive marching field, complete with hash marks, vard lines and markers. There was

a raised platform and a cherry picker for the judges' box.

The Rockets fielded the smallest band at Regional competition on Saturday. The recent change to Class AAAA pitted the Rockets against bands twice or more their size in playing members. In the marching arena, added numbers of playing members translates not only into big sound and lots of show varietyspanning the football field from one end to the other—but also to additional community and parental support, not to mention the much-needed financial support, which is necessary to field a successful marching band.

Despite the size disadvantage, the upset in schedule and the wintery conditions, the Marching Rockets, performed admirably. While decidedly unhappy about not making the finals, the Rockets are proud of their accomplishments this season and they handled the defeat with the optimism that they have displayed all season long. How was that experience? I loved it, it was like high school band in that I had many opportunities to make music and hang out with incredible folks, it differed from my high school experience in that I was afforded the opportunity to play more advanced and more varied types of musical literature.

How did you become a music teacher? Because of the great musical experiences that I had under Bob Pybas, Marge Wilcop, and Johnna Ward (my high school music teachers), I decided I would pursue music education, choral and instrumental, during my junior year of high school. I then auditioned for the staff at Eastern Kentucky University and was awarded a vocal and instrumental scholarship to pursue my degree in music education.

What is the best part of directing a high school/middle school band for you? The best part would have to be seeing the culmination of all of our hard work realized in a performance event. It is wonderful to see students achieve a high level of musicianship and gain the ability to express themselves through music.

What style of music do you most like to listen to? I listen to nearly every type of music there is. I enjoy everything from classical to country, pop, alternative, R & B, bluegrass, jazz, big band, and easy listening. I just enjoy music; my iPod has something under nearly every genre.

What style of music do you most like to to play? I love orchestral transcriptions (Alfred Reed) for concert band (when I am playing tuba or euphonium).

What do you do to unwind from the intensity of competition season? I am currently playing tuba and euphonium with the Central Kentucky Concert Band, under the direction of Dr. Peter Larue. Director of Bands at Georgetown University. I really enjoy both the rehearsals and the performance and it is most beneficial to what I do each day as a band director. Not only to I get the opportunity to keep in touch of what it is like to be a performer but, I also get the chance to maintain my skill level as a musician, play some great concert band literature, and I get to enjoy just coming in, sitting down, and playing without having to worry about any of the logistics of running and working

a rehearsal.

Any comments about this season that has just ended? I felt that the students worked very hard this season, putting in a great many long hot hours of practice and, beyond the successes of the season, have grown tremendously in both their musicianship and level of discipline. I feel that the band members have also grown closer to one another and are more of a team as a result of the efforts put forth during this year's marching season as well.

Ms. Cassandra Smith:

How long have you been a band director of the Marching Rockets? I worked as a tech for a couple of years but I have been Assistant band director for two vears

Were you in a high school band? I played xylophone in Rockcastle's high school band a life time ago.

What was the best part of being in the RCHS Band? I made my closest friends in the band. I've been out of school for almost eight years now and the only friends I'm still close to are my old band buddies. I liked to play, but playing with friends made the experience really fun.

Is band different now from when you were in school? Band is a world away from where it was when I was there. Mr. Daugherty has really pushed the program over the years. When I was in high school we only competed a couple of times until my senior year (our first full year on the circuit) and now the band goes out EVERY weekend to compete. The program has grown in other good ways as well. I mean, way back then I WAS the pit, the lone xylo player, and now there are a slew of instruments and kids to play them. Kudos to Mr. D. for improving the overall program over the

What college did you attend? I was an EKU Colonel.

Were you in a college band? I was in several ensembles during college. I was a member of the Symphonic band, concert band, African drum and dance ensemble, percussion ensemble, steel band, and of course I was a marching Colonel in the EKU marching band. What instrument(s) did you play? As a percussionist I played all percussion instruments, and in marching band I played cowbell. They even made my name on the drum line shirt one year "more cowbell"

How did you become a music teacher? I told Norma Eversole in first grade that I was going to be a teacher and write a book. Well, almost twenty years later I am a music teacher but I don't write books with words, I write books with notes. It has always been in me to want to teach and music has always been a part of my life. It just made sense to me. I wanted to come home to teach to repay the favor for my teachers doing such a good job with me.

What is the best part of directing a high school/middle school band for you? Being a part of the kids learning and watching them grow and improve over the course of a season is my favorite part of working with the band. But, also watching them grow and mature as players and people over the course of their entire school career is a great reward for the time spent on the practice field.

What style of music do you most like to listen to? I like to listen to anything really. My pre-sets in the car are all over the place: country, rock, classical, pop, etc. And yes, I still rock out my mixed tapes of Ace of Bass and Madonna.

What style of music do you most like to to play? I love to play Steel Pan music. I'm currently playing with EKU's steel ensemble as part of my Masters degree in music and I LOVE it!

What do you do to unwind from the intensity of competition season? That's a funny question because Greg and I usually start talking about ideas for the next season before we've even hit Christmas break. When I can though, after the season is over I spend my free time catching up with friends and family. I also love to play with community bands or EKU ensembles when I can.

Any comments about this season that has just ended? This season was a season of growth. We laid a good foundation for ALL of our new-comers while pushing the boundaries for our seasoned veterans. Winning is fun, but my goal for the group was growth and improvement, from the first sectional back in the summer to the last step off the field this fall. I feel like we achieved that goal. The kids were great this year and should be proud of their accomplishments.

tax premium holders now pay."

"As Mayor of Mt. Vernon I am obligated to see that the needs of the city are met, first and foremost, and this is a tax the county has been collecting for years that is rightfully due to the city since we provide all the services to the property owners who are paying the tax," Kirby said after the meeting.

A spokesperson with the state's Department of Insurance said he had no idea how much money the city would receive because there is no clear list of property owners, with Mt. Vernon addresses, who live inside the city limits.

"This could be a a real problem for the department of insurance and for the county and fiscal court," he said.

Because the spokesperson is not authorized to speak for the state he asked to remain annoymous, but said the city council's move would certainly financially benefit the city and obviously hurt the county

"From what I've seen, the county receives a lot of insurance premium taxes from residents within the city and, by state law, the city can receive that tax revenue instead of the county."

A not-so-happy Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis issued this statement on Wednesday.

"Although the City of Mt. Vernon apparently, has the statutory authority to pass an insurance premium tax on its residents within its limits, the county will certainly suffer financially from this passage. With the city's passage of the tax rate at the identical rate set years ago by the county, the city will collect 100 percent of that tax within the city's limits. The county must now set into motion a system to assure that insurance companies do not send the county's share of the collections to the city, which insurance comapanies often do due to the simple use of zip codes of residents pay-

ing the tax. I am disappointed the city has done this because the county has relied heavily upon those revenues to meet its budrequirments. getary Livingston and Brodhead already have the tax and we do not collect anything from those residents for the county. I certainly hope that the City of Mt. Vernon is able to use the funds, that heretofore went to the county, in a manner that will improve the local government's services to the city's residents."

In 1997 the Rockcastle Fiscal Court passed a four percent insurance premium tax, which they have relied on heavily to balance their budget.

This fiscal year the county budgeted \$470,000 from the tax, which they will receive through June 30, 2009.

After June 30th of next yer, the city will get their share of the tax.

Carloftis said there was no way the county could determine how much the county would lose and the city would

gain, until the 'checks' were received from insurance companies

The Judge did say the county could lose as much as \$200,000 in annual revenue.

As with the county's tax on insurance premiums, life insurance, health insurance and worker's compensation premiums will not be taxed.



Nearly one in three American women will experience Intimate Partner Violence (IPV), which is defined as abuse by a boyfriend, husband, wife or girlfriend. There is much evidence that abuse leads to serious health problems later in life. This information comes from the Family Violence Prevention Fund and is available on their web site at http://endabuse.org/hcadvd/2003/tier4.pdf.

1. Preliminary data indicate a significant relationship between IPV and obesity. For instance, individuals who were morbidly obese were more likely to report childhood sexual and nonsexual abuse than adults without a history of weight problems.

2. Women who experience IPV are more likely than non-abused women to use tobacco. (Note: This does not mean that everyone who smokes has been abused nor that smoking causes abuse.)

3. Spousal abuse has also been identified as a predictor of substance abuse problems. In one study of 557 women, those who had experienced IPV were three times more likely to binge drink than those who had not been abused.

4. Women in abusive relationships are often forced or coerced into unwanted sexual activity, which can make it difficult for them to care for their

In a study of women seeking gynecological care, 27% of those seeking an abortion reported a history of abuse, while 8.2% of women not seeking an abortion reported abuse

5. Female survivors of IPV are at an increased risk for suffering from serious mental health problems that can continue years after the abuse has ended. One victim said, "Enduring repeated emotional and physical abuse drove me to a nervous breakdown."

6. IPV is a leading cause of injuries and homicide for women. "The U.S. Department of Justice reported that 37% of all women who sought care in hospital emergency rooms for violence-related injuries were injured by a current or former spouse, boyfriend or girlfriend. . . According to a study published by the Bureau of Justice in 2000, approximately one third of female murder victims were killed by an intimate partner. . . . IPV is the leading cause of female homicides and injuryrelated deaths during pregnancy."

7. Due to lack of insurance and controlling partners, children of mothers who are being abused are less likely to complete immunizations than other children.

8. Victims of IPV are less likely to seek preventative and injury-related health care than women who are not abused. This is often because the abusive partner forbids her to go to the doctor or hospital.

For all of the above reasons, abuse victims and their children have more health problems in the years following the abuse. Getting out of the abuse does not mean the end of the consequences of being abused. Chronic physical and emotional problems may continue for years afterward.

A victim does not "leave" an abusive relationship – she "escapes." Given the health consequences, helping her to escape improves her health and the health of her children.





Carloftis said that KACo's proposal showed a 3.75% variable interest rate with a repayment schedule of \$18,180.56 a month for a 15 year loan or \$14,822.21 monthly for a 20 year loan. If the court elects to go with a fixed rate (not tied to prime) of 4.80% for a 15 year loan or 4.87 for a 20 year loan, the repayment would be \$19,510.36 monthly for 15 years or \$16,319.89 for a 20 year loan.

Carloftis recommended to the court that they go with the variable rate. "KACo is good about letting up know when prime is going to rise and letting us lock the rate in beforehand," Carloftis said.

Carloftis also told the court that under the terms of a seven year lease, signed recently, SourceCorp, will pay a monthly lease payment of \$25,300. Plus, Carloftis added, if the grants being applied for are obtained, this money would be applied toward the loan with KACo and bring the amount owed down substantially.

Holton also reported to the court that there had been a successful bid, by Larry Goff Construction of Brodhead, received for site preparation and construction of a temporary road into the site, of \$148,000. Holton said he was very pleased with the bid since the estimate for this phase of the project had been \$210,000.

As to the financing of the remaining \$2.7 million needed for construction of the building, Carloftis said that a variety of options was being looked at, including issuance of Industrial Revenue Bonds by a bank which would get the court the best rate for the taxable (for profit) phase of the project. "Interest on these type of bonds is always higher," Carloftis said, "they will probably be at 5 1/ 2% to 6%.

Besides the lease payment, the two loans will be repaid by the extra occupational tax generated by additional employees planned to be hired by SourceCorp with the rest being paid from general occupational tax revenue.

At Hall of Fame **McConnell** here today

also passed a resolution approving an application for \$49,044.17 in funds to clean up seven local dump sites on Burnt Ridge Road, Bud Clark Ridge, Ky. 1797, Wildie Road, Upper River Road (Hwy. 490), Green Pond Ridge Road and Lovell Cemetery Road. The county will have to put up \$12,261 in in-kind matching funds, made up of labor, county equipment used, etc.

The court also approved Sheriff Mike Peters' tax settlement for 2007. The settlement must be approved by the court and then the state and then a quietus issued by the state before Sheriff Peters can begin collection 2008 tax revenue.

In other action, the court voted to borrow up to \$250,000, on a short term draw note, from PBK bank to help with their cash flow problems. Carloftis told the magistrates that the county normally takes in the bulk of the \$300,000 they collect annually from property taxes in November and December but, since tax bills will not go out until December 1st, the county's cash flow is tight.

The problem is aggravated, Carloftis said by the county having to pay some expenses related to the construction project at the industrial park from county funds until financing is in place when the general fund will be reimbursed.

One of those expenses was on the meeting's agenda in the amount of \$80,000 in commission due a real estate company in Lexington for handling SourceCorp's part of the lease arrangement with the county. "This amount was figured into the overall cost of the project but has to be paid before money from financing for the project is obtained," Carloftis said. Another bill on the agenda was for \$6900 to MacTech Engineering for core drilling, etc. for the new building.

In addition, the county only has until December 1st to make a payment of \$50,000 to Rockcastle Hospital, in settlement of about \$150,000 in bills due the hospital, over a long period, for inmate care.

The court has had to dip into road department funds already to pay bills in the general fund and the road fund has a final payment of \$97,000 this year for a road bond issued in 1990 for \$1,000,000. "After this year, the road department will have this \$97,000 to be used for maintenance," Carloftis reminded the court.

Tax Bills Will Be **Delayed**; All Discounts Will Apply

The matter of the 2008 tax bills was also discussed at the special meeting.

Carloftis pointed out to the magistrates that bills will be delayed this year because there is a question on the ballot concerning an increase in the tax rate for the Soil Conservation Service. The bills will have to be printed after the election with the same rate as before or the new rate, depending on the

Tax bills, which normally go out October 1st. will not be sent out, at least, until December 1st, according to Sheriff's Deputy Connie Bullen but all discounts will apply. Taxpayers will still have the same amount of time to pay their tax bill and get the same discount as always.

Since the county has to pay \$5100 for stamped envelopes for the bills to be sent out, some discussion was held about changing to a system whereby postcards are used. Bullen cautioned that this change would entail a new software program, at some expense but conceded that the savings would be substantial.







Local painter to be at KY Artisan Center

The weekend of October 31 and November 1 will bring two unique folk painters to the Kentucky Artisan Center at Berea. On Friday, October 31, Janice Harding Owens of Mt. Vernon will demonstrate her landscape oriented folk painting and on Saturday, November 1, Jim Gary Phillips of Edmonton will demonstrate his style of Folk Painting from 10:30-3:30 both days at the Kentucky Artisan Center at Berea.

As a native of Rockcastle County, Janice Harding Owens comes from a family of creative quilters and painters. Janice began to paint on boards and in 1989 painted her first canvass with acrylics. Folk Art collector John Irvin saw Janice's work and arranged for her to have her first exhibition of paintings at Central Bank in Lexington in 1991. She has since had painting exhibitions all over the country in Wash-

With children in her household, Janice chose to work with water based acrylic paints to avoid the smell of oil paints and to achieve a fast drying process. Often Janice bypasses sketching the painting first and goes right to the paint. She comments, "Sometimes I just go at it with the paint, by the time I sketch something in, I could have painted it!"

Her favorite subject is landscapes. While commissioned paintings require Janice to follow an actual image, her own landscapes might have a horse painted next to a building she saw in a magazine. Janice looks at photographs and other images as a reference point, and then juxtaposes them together in her own unique way.

Jim Gary Phillips is a selftaught folk artist who got the inspiration to paint from wellknown folk artist Minnie

Adkins. He states, "Minnie Adkins was a definite influence on me. Over the years I have gotten to be good friends with her . . . Minnie is always encouraging people to create." Jim Gary is not only a folk painter, but also works as a farmer, auctioneer, and appraiser in the rural Metcalfe County landscape of his birth.

Jim Gary says he made walking sticks as a boy - learning from his grandfather and took up painting about 8-10 years ago. He paints animals, scenes and sayings onto wooden boards - taking the sayings from a song, the bible or even just making them up. He initially painted on barn wood, and then began using discarded wooden cabinet doors from several cabinet factories located nearby.

Jim Gary paints directly onto the cabinet door wood, using bright colors and capturing animals and people with simple abstract renderings. He embellishes these images with sayings and words applied with a white-out pen that often fill the spaces in and around the painted figures. He sometimes plays with the language and often gives bible or wellknown verses a delightful new

Works by Janice Harding Owens and Jim Gary Phillips are regularly featured at the Kentucky Artisan Center at Berea, located at 975 Walnut Meadow Road, just off Interstate 75 at exit 77 (Berea). The Center's exhibits, shopping, and travel information areas are all open daily from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. and the café from 8 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Admission is free. The Center currently features works by more than 650 artisans from 100 counties across the Commonwealth. 

The Rockcastle County Conservation District asks for your support on November 4th by voting in favor of increasing the property tax rate for the Conservation District to three and one-half cents per one hundred dollars of assessed real property.

What the Rockcastle County Conservation District Does for You:

If you breathe, swim, fish, hunt, drink, eat, farm, work, or play, you have already benefitted from the work of the Conservation District. From education in schools, to managing efforts to rescue the county's water supply, the Conservation District provides leadership and assistance in the locally led effort to protect and enhance our county's natural resources, and sustain agricultural productivity. Since the year 2000, over 2.2 million dollars have been paid out through the Conservation District to landowners of Rockcastle County through various cost share programs for conservation practices. The district has also secured funds for the installation of nearly 200 septic tanks throughout the county totaling \$860,000. These installations replaced failing systems or eliminated straight pipes that were contaminating our water sources.

Why the Increase is Needed:

The Conservation District has always been the lowest taxing district in the county, and was able to keep their tax rate so low because of support in funds from federal and state government. However, those funds are no longer available and an increase is needed in order to: employ staff so that we can continue to secure funds for the landowners of Rockcastle County, provide for office space so that these services are not moved to a different county, continue to be a partner for clean air, clean water, and a desirable community. Managing the water and other natural resources is an effective and efficient way to sustain the local economy and environmental health.

What Your New Tax Bill Will Look Like:

The average assessed property value in Rockcastle County is \$65,000. Based on that amount, the average landowner would pay an increase of \$16.90 per year in property taxes. To figure out what you would pay under the new rate, use this formula: Assessed Property Value/100 x .035

Ex. $$65,000/100 \times .035 = 22.75
