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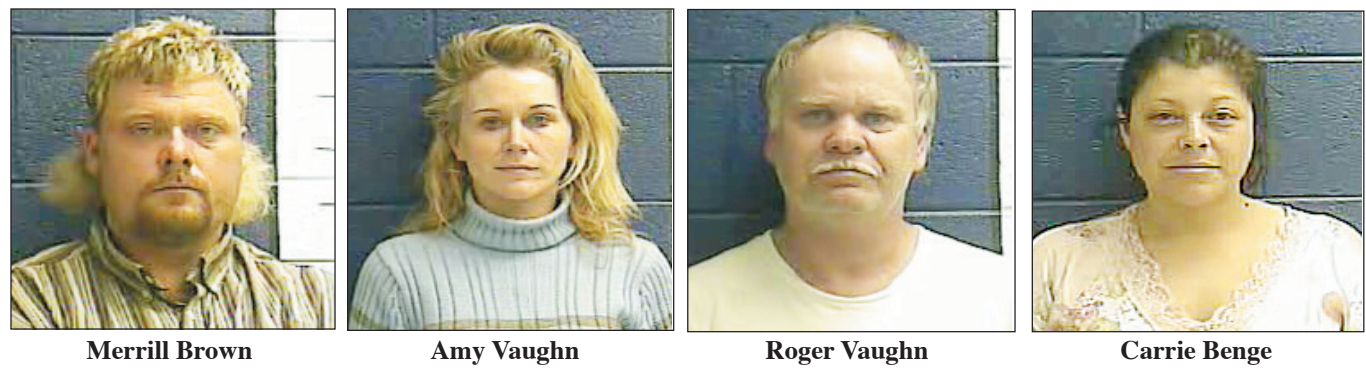

Four arrested for making meth, child endangerment

Four people are behind bars this week after police found a working meth lab on Sunday night on McHargue Branch Road, in the Burr Community.

According to police at the state police post in London, at approximately 7:15 p.m. the Post was notified, by the Rockcastle County 911 Dispatch, of a fight complaint in a residence at 1330 McHargue Branch Road.

According to State Trooper Scottie Pennington, when he and officers from the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Office arrived at the scene they could smell the strong odor of chemical substances coming from the residence. Pennington said further investigation into the incident discovered three one step Methamphetamine labs within the mobile home.

Pennington said three children were found to be in the residence at the time and they were taken to the Rockcastle Hospital where they were decontaminated and released.

Pennington said officers from the Rockcastle Sheriff's office then located three other children, who at been at the residence earlier, at a local church and they too were taken to the Rockcastle Hospital where they were also decontaminated and released.

The Department for Children and Families was contacted, in reference to the children and are involved in the matter of their safety, according to police. Pennington said four arrests were made at the scene with all four people being lodged in the Rockcastle Detention Center.

Arrested were:
Merrill K. Brown, 36, of 1330 McHargue Branch Road, Mount Vernon, who was charged with Manufacturing Methamphetamine 1ST, Wanton Endangerment 2ND, Tampering with Physical Evidence and Endangering the Welfare of a minor. Brown's address is the residence where the meth lab was found.
Roger W. Vaughn, 50, of McKee, was charged with Manufacturing Methamphetamine 1ST, Wanton Endangerment 2ND and Endangering the Welfare of a minor.
Amy L. Vaughn, 31, of Mount Vernon, was charged with Manufacturing Methamphetamine 1ST, Wanton Endangerment 2ND and Endangering the Welfare of a minor.
Carrie D. Bengel, 31, of East Bernstadt, was also charged with Manufacturing Methamphetamine 1ST, Wanton Endangerment 2ND and Endangering the Welfare of a minor.

The four are being held on bonds of \$30,000 cash or property and are scheduled to be arraigned next Monday, April 6th. At the time of Brown's arrest on Sunday night, he was already out of jail on bond, after he was indicted on March 13th for first degree stalking. Brown had been released on an unsecured \$10,000 bond signed by a third party on March 20th.

Trooper Pennington is continuing the investigation and was assisted at the scene by other officers from the Kentucky State Police, the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Office, the Cabinet for Families and Children and the Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department.

News from the General Assembly

One Ford bill will become law, another stalls in Senate

Thanks to a bill sponsored by Rockcastle's State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon, students who have parents or legal guardians in the United States Military will now have the opportunity to spend more time with them during the school year, without receiving an unexcused absence. House Bill 124 will amend KRS 159.035, a state law on attendance, which sets the guidelines for what is an excused or unexcused absence for a public school student in Kentucky, to grant excused absences for up to ten days for students with military parents or guardians to visit that parent or guardian while they are on leave. The excused absences would be granted only to students with parents or guardians stationed out of the country and on leave granted by the military. "There is enough pressure on parents and students when a parent is serving his or her country and they certainly shouldn't have to worry about receiving unexcused absences when they have the opportunity to spend time together, even if it is during the school year," Rep. Ford said. Another Ford-sponsored bill that would have amended a state law involving disabled Kentuckians who must apply for a homestead exemption each year, passed the House of Representative 97-0 and was

In Mt. Vernon Family loses everything in house fire

Sandy McClure and her two sons, 18-year-old Thomas and 15-year-old Brady lost everything in a fire early Tuesday morning at their home at the corner of Old Dixie Hwy. and Carter Ridge Road in Mt. Vernon.

Asst. Mt. Vernon Fire Chief

Jack Weaver said the fire was reported around 3 a.m. and when firefighters arrived a few minutes later the structure was completely engulfed in flames. "It had to have been burning for a long time before anyone noticed it because fire was coming through the roof in the

back of the house and the entire structure front to back was on fire," he said.

Mt. Vernon and Livingston firefighters battled the blaze for about four hours, which Weaver said probably started from a faulty baseboard heater. "She (Sandy) said she had

turned her heat on before she left for work on Monday afternoon and that is probably what caused it," Weaver said.

No one was at home when the fire broke out, according to Weaver who said McClure was at her job at TTAI in Pulaski County.

Five hurt in wreck on Interstate 75 Sunday

Five people were injured in a head-on collision on I-75 Sunday morning that closed both southbound lanes of the interstate for several hours.

Around 8 a.m. the Kentucky State Police Post in London was notified, by the Rockcastle County 911 Dispatch, of a multiple vehicle traffic crash on I-

75 in Rockcastle County, near Lake Linville.

Upon arrival KSP Traffic Crash Reconstructionist Senior Trooper Craig Reed determined that an unknown vehicle pulling a silver camper trailer was entering the northbound lanes of I-75 at the 62 mile marker and failed to yield the

right of way to the traffic flow.

Police said the unknown vehicle caused a 2004 gray Mercury Grand Marquis, driven by Eddie T. Price, 73, of Binton, OH, to make contact with a 2002 white Peterbilt tractor/trailer, driven by Michael E. Lynch, 52, of Spartanburg, SC. The Grand Marquis then

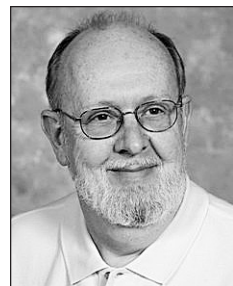
crossed the median and was struck in the passenger side by a 2009 gray Nissan Rogue, driven by Brenda Silvestri, 50, of Lexington.

Rockcastle Memories

Comforting Aromas

Several weeks ago my wife had Monday off from work, and when I walked through the front door at 5 o'clock, I noticed the aroma of the fireplace in our den. The fragrance triggered wonderful memories of my childhood and how our house smelled with the influence of our wood burning stoves.

I will never forget how carefully my mother (Bee) tended the fires in our Warm Morning stove in the living room and also in the kitchen stove. That smell of burning wood will forever remain in my mind. Other scents also tend to take me back to the small farm in Rockcastle County.

In those days, Bee used a large pot and lid to make popcorn for our snacks. She melted a huge "glob" of Crisco in that old pot and added the corn when the oil began to sizzle. Bee then "rattled and shook" the covered pot until the corn stopped popping. I can still remember that smell of popping corn as it filled our small house. She and I sat in front of our small, black and white television watching her favorite shows and munching on the fresh popcorn.

Each morning when I woke up from my comfortable bed, the smell of fresh coffee coming from our kitchen filtered into my room. As a child, I was not allowed to drink it, but the aroma will always be a favorite of mine.

When I turned ten years old, my grandmother (Mommie Katie) felt it was time to allow her grandson to try her blend of freshly ground coffee. She proceeded to pour a half cup of the liquid into a mug, filled it with milk, and offered it to me to sample. I have been an avid consumer of coffee since that time. No sugar, mind you, just coffee and cream.

Once per week Bee completed the laundry for our family, and the smell of Clorox permeated our small house. She was adamant about making sure our clothes were properly sanitized and clean. All day long she filled and refilled the wringer washer with hot water, detergent, and a small amount

of that odorous bleach.

Once the laundry was finished, she carefully hung our clothes on the line in our back yard. After allowing them to "air dry," they were brought back into our house. The bouquet of freshly washed sheets on my bed was utterly wonderful. Who could forget that crisp, fresh aroma?

Bee had a couple of electric fans that circulated the air throughout each room of our house. We, of course, did not have the luxury of air conditioning. I can remember playing on the kitchen floor as those fans blew cool air, along with whiffs of a variety of aromas – those associated with our home both indoors and outdoors.

She also placed one of those fans in my bedroom when the temperature escalated in the summer months – the end result of which is that I still require a fan in my bedroom. Habits are hard to break.

I think my favorite aroma was from Bee's kitchen on Saturday mornings. Bee thought Saturday was the time when the entire family should sit around the kitchen table for her special breakfast, which usually included fresh fried chicken, fried potatoes, home-made biscuits, gravy, fried eggs, and an assortment of her delicious jams and jellies. The smell of chicken frying in one of her old, iron skillets with home-made gravy simmering in another is beyond measure.

In the spring, my brother Al and my grandfather (Pop) kept the yards near our two houses clipped close and tended Mommie Katie's flowers under her careful scrutiny. The smell of freshly clipped grass (no power mower) and Mommie Katie's flowers filled the air as Bee and I sat in the swing on our front porch. I just loved how it smelled in and around our house.

And last but not least, Bee always used Jergens Lotion on her skin after her bath. She also did not use perfume, as most other women of her time. To this day, when I smell that lotion, I am reminded of the fresh, clean scent of my mother.

Points East

One thing I'm pretty sure about these days is that the economy is going to get a whole lot worse before it gets any better. And I don't expect food prices to get any lower during the crunch.

On the other hand, I do expect the best growing season we've had in a decade. I'm not going to get into the basis for that latter expectation in this column except to say that all the signs are right for cooperative weather for the rest of the year and boy gee, is the timing ever right.

If your budget is stretched thin, this may be the year that you need give some thought to growing some of the stuff you eat. But don't think very long. Just get off your lazy fat behind and do it.

If the sunshine hits your lawn or the sides of your home for 8 hours a day during the daylight saving time season, you can grow just about any vegetable worth eating that you'd find in the produce section of whatever grocery you shop for such.

If all you eat, veggie wise, is canned or frozen stuff from the grocery, then read no further. Go straight to the obituaries and commence planning on how you'd like to be remembered.

But if you want to eat the highest quality food known to man, try growing some yourself.

The easy choices are tomatoes, peppers, green beans, sugar snap or snow peas, green onions (scallions) lettuce, radishes, spinach, mustard greens, kale, cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, eggplant, cucumbers, squash, beets, okra, and whatever you like best as long as it's not mushrooms. If you have a sunny spot, a foot wide and ten feet long, you can easily grow a couple dozen ears of sweet corn and even plant Kentucky Wonder or cornfield beans to climb the stalks once the corn gets about a foot tall.

If your lawn will grow nice, green, grass it will grow veggies and herbs. You may have to borrow a mattock and a spade to dig up a few holes or trenches, but basically all you have to do is just that. Get a little exercise, pay some attention once a week to weeding and watering and feast out

when the crop is ready to eat.

Summer squash, such as zucchini and golden crookneck, will almost grow in asphalt. (Actually, if your driveway is badly cracked, just drop a couple or three squash seed in.) Don't bother with those because somebody like me will be trying to give them to you from June until late October.

And don't try everything at once. Don't be planting stuff that you won't eat unless Aunt Maggie is in the old folks' home and swears that eggplant is the only thing that will keep her alive.

If you have never tried to grow stuff, start out small. Get your feet wet before you try to swim across the Channel. Put out a hill of cucumbers and half a dozen big boy or Parks whopper or cherry tomatoes or a combination of the three. Sow a few lettuce seed and stick a few onion bulbs in the ground.

If you are a long time gardener, then bear in mind, that April and May are just the beginning of the planting season. Most leafy vegetables (lettuce, turnips, mustard, kale, collards, etc) actually do better in the fall here in Kentucky than they do in spring/summer and that's fairly common knowledge. But I start tomato seed in July for fall planting and we redo almost everything at least twice over the growing season.

Sweet corn is the exception even though we stagger plantings of it so that it will come in over a period of several weeks. And, of course, peppers, okra, and ichiban eggplant will literally bear all year as long as they get watered weekly and doused with Peter's Professional all purpose fertilizer once a month.

I've just read what I've written in this column and it sounds like a lecture and even though that's not what I intended, let me suggest that you go to your local Extension Service Office and get detailed literature on just about anything you want to grow.

And even if you have to put them in plastic five gallon paint buckets or cheap containers and set them on the patio, buy a few bags of top soil or composted cow manure (usually less than 2 bucks for 40 pounds) and try growing some of your own food this year.

You can use such a medium for several years and it will way, way more than pay for itself. But more importantly you will be eating veggies that taste far, far better than anything you can buy in a store along with the knowledge that they have not been picked prematurely, doused in enzyme killers and handled by several dozen hands other than your own.

And, finally, if the economy doesn't jump-start by this time next year, you may be looking for recipes for boiled crab grass, assuming you can find any grass to cook.

April is National Autism Awareness Month

What is Autism?

Autism is a complex syndrome of abnormal brain function resulting in a wide variety of symptoms as a child develops.

While it is not entirely clear what causes autism, its origin appears to begin early in pregnancy while the brain is developing. Due to some abnormal stress on the brain and its development, the normal connections that link one brain cell to many others are damaged, pruned off, or just do not develop. The most likely cause is thought to be a viral infection occurring in the first 28 weeks of the pregnancy.

Autism includes abnormalities of language and communication along with problems with social interaction and lack of imaginative play. A child with autism may have a high IQ but with the abnormal social interactions and language problems it may not be apparent. Cases of possible autism are important to identify as soon as possible, since they may respond to treatment better if treated early.

Autism is found in all cultures and is 4-5 times more common in boys than girls. The risk for recurrence in a family is 5-8% indicating some genetic predisposition.

Autism is diagnosed by delayed language or unusual speech patterns and abnormal social interactions, such as being unresponsive to being touched or when parents play "peek-a-boo." The child may also show repetitive or non-functional behavior such as simply lining up toys.

Although there is no cure, it is helpful to treat it early since they may have an improvement in behavioral problems and be able to cope with mainstream life.

If autism is suspected, a child should be referred to a center designed to do a full evaluation of the child and follow his development as he ages.

Mildred Stokes

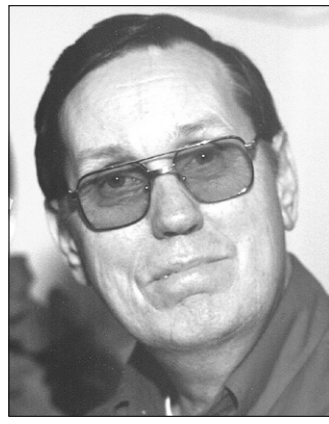
Mildred Irene Stokes, 85, of Florence died Monday, March 30, 2009 at St. Elizabeth Medical Center Hospice.

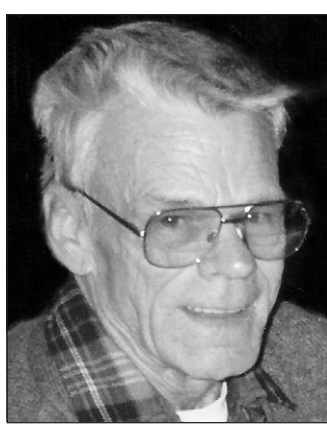

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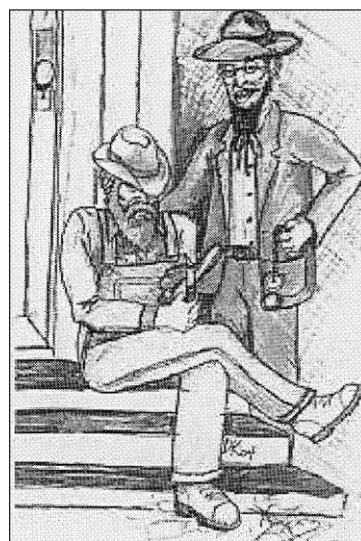

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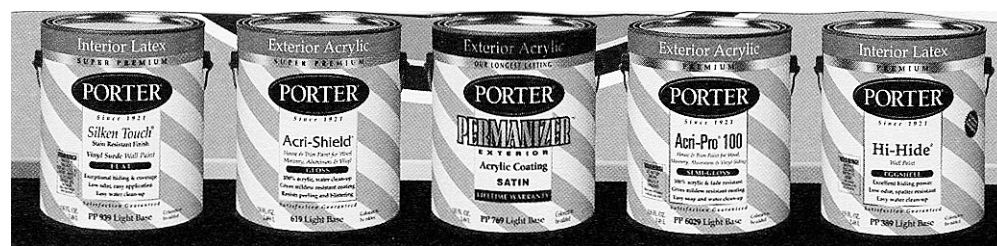

The Roots of Rockcastle

On this crisp, spring morning I've just come from a visit to a downtown Mount Vernon institution, the Cox Hardware Store. While there, I visited with proprietors, Jim and Martha Cox, a few customers who drifted in steadily, and two wonderful cats. The customers seemed to be as interested in visiting as they were in their purchases. I particularly enjoyed the cats, being a cat lover, myself. One was a short-hair, black with orange flecks, and the other was a solid black Persian. I love to see businesses that make room for cats, such as this one, and the New London Florist in London.

When you first enter the store, you know immediately you're in a special place. There is an old wooden floor under your feet, well-worn with age. I suppose that generations of Rockcastle-countians have trodden these floors. Even my relatives, the Joe Norton family of Wabd, have ridden their horses or wagons to Mount Vernon for hardware supplies at this very store, I'm sure, on various occasions. It's not often you can visit a place that your great-grandparents would have shopped at, and having it look reasonably the same way, today. Above, along the ceiling is the original crown molding, made of tin, and in back is a big, black, pot-bellied, coal stove. On each side of it are high-back rockers, just right for sitting, chewing the fat with customers, and staying warm on a chilly day. All around the walls is memorabilia from a long-gone generation and pictures that have frozen in time former images of the town.

Jim began the Cox history by recalling how his family came to being in Rockcastle County. It began when his great-grandfather's brother, Christopher, came here from Venango County in northwestern Pennsylvania from a town called Oil City. Earlier in the century, oil had been found there, but was beginning to play

out. For young entrepreneurs such as Christopher, this decline only caused them to desire to explore other avenues for success. He supposed that the foothills of Appalachia looked so much like that area of Pennsylvania, it couldn't help but to be rich in oil. He came to the area and settled near Skaggs Creek, which at the time was a thriving little community and town.

Before he could find oil, he was bitten by a snake. After becoming very ill, he later found it necessary to return home to Pennsylvania. In an attempt to salvage this venture, his brother, William Henry Cox (spelled Cocks, at that time) came to Skaggs Creek to finish the project. He was married to Matilda Jones. As we know, there was never any oil found at Skaggs Creek.

William Henry and Matilda had four sons and two daughters. One of the daughters died in her early twenties, and the other never married. William found work at the local gristmill, and sawmill at Skaggs Creek. From his work at the sawmill, he soon began to make wagons and caskets, which led to having funerals, since he was a deacon at what Jim thinks, may have been the Skaggs Creek Baptist Church, but he wasn't for sure. After a while, the Cox family left Skaggs Creek, and moved to Mount Vernon, where he bought land and established a home where Jim and Martha live today. It is located on old Old Highway 25, to the right of Elmwood Cemetery.

The fourth and youngest son of William Henry and Matilda, was Claude Chester, or "C.C." He was married to Amy Proctor. These were Jim's grandparents, and who founded the hardware store in 1907.

Before starting the hardware store, he had a blacksmith's shop at his home. It was located near the cemetery entrance and old Old Highway 25. Jim believes that

blacksmithing is what led him toward the hardware business.

On the site of the current Cox Hardware, once stood the Joplin Hotel that burned about 1906; then in 1907, the Cox building was erected. Originally, it housed not only the Cox Hardware on the right, but a dry goods store on the left, owned by William C.'s brother, Rob. Another brother, William A. had an undertaking business upstairs. Later, in the 1930s, William A. moved his undertaking business up the street to a building that houses Greg's Woodworking, next to the Singleton Insurance office. In the 1940s or '50s, C.C. bought out Rob's half of the building, and expanded the hardware section.

When World War II ended, John C. Cox, son of Claude (C.C.) and Amy Proctor, came home from the war and began work full-time at the store. He was married to Francis Brown. They are the parents of the current owner, Jim Cox. Claude passed away in 1973, leaving the store for John to run.

John ran the store for several years with the aid of a major asset, his daughter-in-law, Martha, who began to work there in the 1970s. John passed away in 2001 from a heart attack, just after returning from lunch one day. He was behind the counter of the store that he loved so much when he passed. He was also the local fire chief. In his honor, Mount Vernon put on one of the grandest funerals in its history, as I could tell from newspaper clippings that Jim and Martha had saved.

At this point, we'll close with this week's history remembrances, and continue next week with more Cox family history and points of significance to the downtown area.

It was an unforgettable experience. That Sunday morning, the sun was warm, and the sky was cloudless. Standing near the summit of the Mount of Olives with Bethany at my back, I looked westward at the old city of Jerusalem. In the reverie of that awesome moment, my attention was called to an ancient road that, for centuries, has wound its way over the west side of the Mount of Olives, across the Kidron Valley, and up the hill to a gate in the wall of Jerusalem. At that moment, the Triumphal Entry took on new meaning for me.

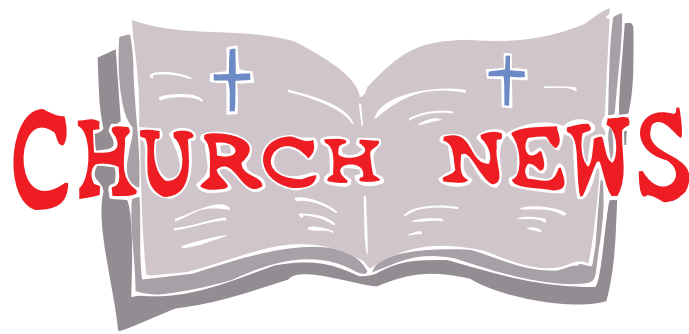
I realized I was standing very near the actual place where Jesus, riding a lowly donkey that was symbolic of a ruler coming in peace, met an adoring crowd who welcomed him vociferously when he made, what history has called, his Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem.

In the Gospel of John, it is recorded that "They took palm branches and went out to meet him." For that reason, Chris-

tians around the world commemorate the Triumphal Entry of Jesus into Jerusalem as Palm Sunday. The members of that crowd gave Jesus a royal welcome because they, at least, partially understood the symbolism of his riding a donkey.

Caught up in the emotion of the moment. Those who welcomed him were extremely enthusiastic. But the enthusiasm did not last. It is recorded that "At first the disciples did not understand all of this." Then, before the week was gone, the crowd was angry, and their shouts were, "Away with him. Crucify him." It is a reality. Loyalty based upon emotion can change quickly, and it often does.

But there is more in the record of the Triumphal Entry. Another example of loyalty is significant. In the Gospel of Matthew, it is recorded that some of "The disciples went and did as Jesus had instructed them." There are few things in life more important than doing the right thing at the right time for the right reason.

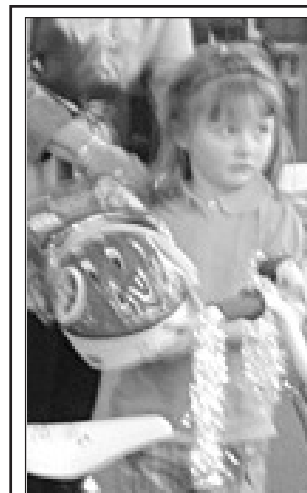

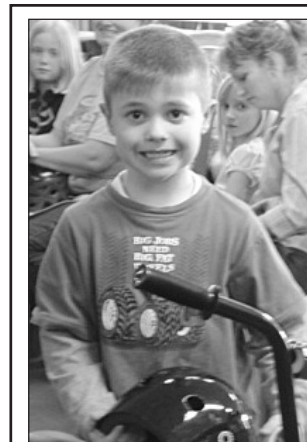

This report is designed to inform the public about the quality of water and services provided on a daily basis. Our commitment is to provide our customers with a safe, clean, and reliable supply of drinking water. We want to assure that we will continue to monitor, improve, and protect the water system and deliver a high quality product. Water is the most indispensable product in every home and we ask everyone to be conservative and help us in our efforts to protect the water source and the water system.

Our water is purchased from Mt. Vernon Water Works, that is located at Renfro Valley, Kentucky. Our supplier treats surface water from Lake Linville. The source water assessment has been performed to identify land uses which may impact the water supply. This assessment indicates that the susceptibility of the Mt. Vernon water supply to contamination is generally moderate. Contaminants present in source water may include microbial contamination, pesticides, and herbicides, organic chemical contaminants, and radioactive contaminants. The primary source of contamination are agriculture, onsite septic systems, and roadways. Activities and land uses upstream of this water can pose potential risks to your drinking water. The complete source water assessment can be reviewed at Mt. Vernon Water Works. The Brodhead Water Works routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State Laws. The table enclosed is results of our Monitoring for the period of January 1 through December 31, 2008, it can be obtained at Brodhead City Hall, 7 West Main Street, Brodhead, Kentucky.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects may be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and may pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include: Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, (sewage plants, septic systems, livestock operations, or wildlife). Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, (naturally occurring or from stormwater runoff, wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming). Pesticides and herbicides, (stormwater runoff, agriculture or residential uses). Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, (by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, or from gas stations, stormwater runoff, or septic systems). Radioactive contaminants, (naturally occurring or from oil and gas production or mining activities).

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water to provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some or all of these definitions may be found in this report:

- Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)** - the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)** - the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL)** - the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG)** - the level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.
- Below Detection Levels (BDL)** - laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.
- Not Applicable (N/A)** - does not apply.
- Parts per million (ppm)** - or milligrams per liter, (mg/l). One part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.
- Parts per billion (ppb)** - or micrograms per liter, (µg/L). One part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.
- Parts per trillion (ppt)** - one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.
- Parts per quadrillion (ppq)** - one part per quadrillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000,000 years or one penny in \$10,000,000,000,000.
- Picocuries per liter (pCi/L)** - a measure of the radioactivity in water.
- Millirems per year (mrem/yr)** - measure of radiation absorbed by the body.
- Million Fibers per Liter (MFL)** - a measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 10 micrometers.
- Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU)** - a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity has no health effects. However, turbidity can provide a medium for microbial growth. Turbidity is monitored because it is a good indicator of the effectiveness of the filtration system.
- Variances & Exemptions (V&E)** - State or EPA permission not to meet an MCL or a treatment technique under certain conditions.
- Action Level (AL)** - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system shall follow.
- Treatment Technique (TT)** - a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Information About Lead:
 If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Your local public water system is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. Funding for this program comes from the Kentucky Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement. Funding for practices will be approved by the Soil and Water Conservation Commission at the Kentucky Division of Conservation, located in Frankfort, based on an established statewide ranking system. As in the past years, the applications will be ranked according to the criteria established based on a high priority on addressing animal waste problems, landowners in Ag-

ricultural Districts and applicants that have their Agriculture Water Quality Plans on file with their local conservation district.

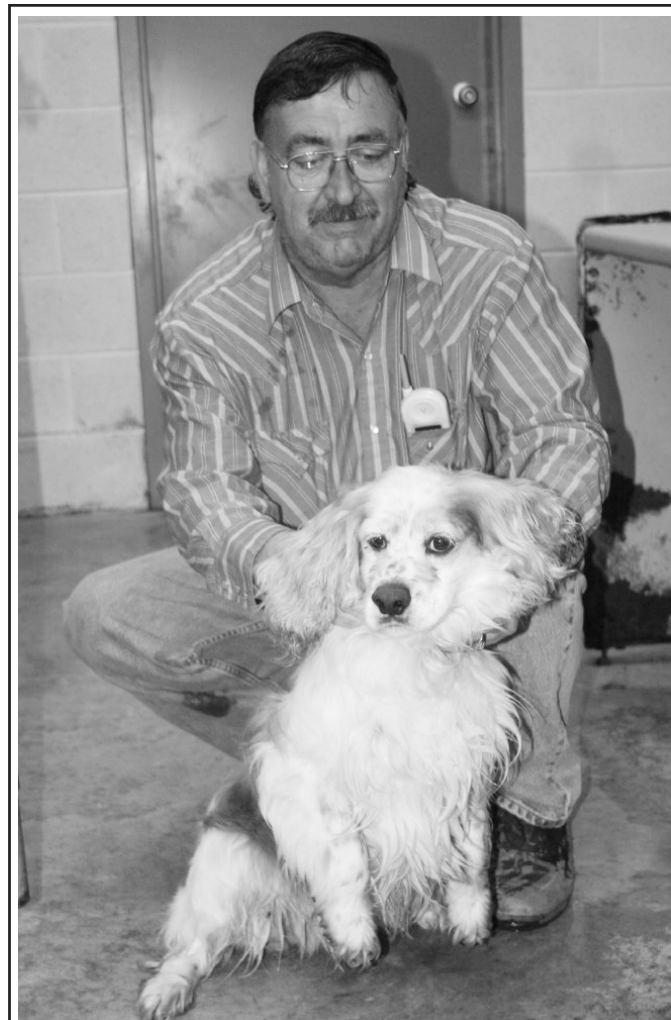

Farmers Reminded to Report Losses to FSA

Farmers that suffered losses due to the recent ice storms are reminded to keep detail records of livestock and other production losses to ensure eligibility for FSA disaster assistance programs. Farmers that lost livestock or other production losses directly related to the ice storm should report the losses to their local FSA County office to ensure future program eligibility.

Rockcastle County farmers are reminded the last day to request cost share due to the ice storm for debris removal and/or fencing is April 13th.

Production losses that are covered by the Noninsured Assistance Program (NAP) should be reported to the local FSA office within 15 days of when the loss becomes apparent.

This year, The Center for Rural Development is giving even more Southern and Eastern Kentucky eighth-graders—including those in Rockcastle County—the chance to develop critical leadership skills, get hands-on experience in science and math, and prepare to become the region's next generation of business leaders and entrepreneurs.

Students have until April 4 to apply for the Rogers Explorers program, which is expanding into 32 additional counties and adding a second June session on the campus of Lindsey Wilson College in Columbia.

These changes will double the number of participants and give more students than ever before the opportunity to become a Rogers Explorer.

"We are excited to expand our Rogers Explorers outreach to a new region and be on the Lindsey Wilson campus in addition to the University of the Cumberland campus," Jessica Melton, associate director of education and training for The Center, said. "This is the first time we have been able to offer the program to students in our entire 42-county primary service area."

Rogers Explorers is open to eighth-grade students with an interest in developing skills in leadership, technology, math, science, entrepreneurship, and community service. 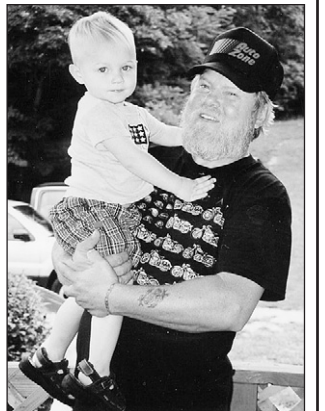

For the past five months, six RCHS sophomores have been training as student mentors through the LeaderNext program. LeaderNext was brought to us through the GEAR UP Partnership that we have with Berea College. Mt. Vernon Fire and Rescue Activity Report

March 16-29

Monday, March 16- Dispatched to a structure fire at 19:40. Call came from subject in Industrial Park that advised house was on fire in the area of Fairground Hill. Ten firefighters responded with two engines to find a small control burn outside a residence.

Friday, March 20- Paged to report of woods on fire on Big Cave Road at 18:01. Eight firefighters responded with pumper and tanker. Upon arrival, it was found to be a control burn also.

Friday, March 20- Dispatched to reported house on fire next to First Baptist Church at 19:33. Upon arrival of eight firefighters and two engines, it was determined to be a control burn only.

Friday, March 20- Responded to woods on fire on Lake Cumberland Road at 20:15. Four firefighters responded with one engine to find that it was a control burn. Landowner was burning field off and Western Rockcastle Fire Department was standing by on scene as a precaution.

Friday, March 20- Dispatched to Davis Lane to reported out of control fire in area. Six firefighters responded with one engine. Upon arrival, fire units found no fire.

Friday, March 20- Responded to Lake Cumberland Road to report of heavy smoke in area, possibly a larger woods fire. Upon arrival, fire units determined that there was actually no fire in the area and the smoke was coming from a several acre woods fire in Pine Hill area.

Tuesday, March 24- Dispatched to a truck on fire pulling a trailer on I-75 at the 66 mile marker. Seven firefighters responded with pumper and tanker. Upon arrival, units observed a Dodge Ram fully involved in fire. Used approximately 1200 gallons of water to extinguish.

Tuesday, March 24- Fire units received call from a female caller advising all of Mount Vernon was full of thick smoke and that she was having hard time breathing. Fire officials advised her that it was not illegal to burn in Mount Vernon after 6pm and that there was nothing the fire department could do. No action was taken.

Tuesday, March 24- Dispatched to a grass fire on I-75 at 61 mile marker. Five fire units responded to area and found nothing in an eight mile section of I-75.

Wednesday, March 25- Responded to South Wilderness Road to the report of a single vehicle accident with entrapment. Nine firefighters responded. While enroute, units were advised by law enforcement that all passengers had gotten out of the vehicle and were uninjured.

Friday, March 27- Dispatched to I-75 56 mile marker to report of an accident with entrapment with vehicle on its top. Eight firefighters responded. Upon arrival extricated one patient from vehicle.

Saturday, March 28- Dispatched to 75 Sigmon Street to possible stove on fire and apartment full of smoke. Ten firefighters responded with two engines. Upon arrival units observed apartment with smoke in it and no actual fire. After further inspection it was determined that a burner on the stove was melted. Firefighters advised occupants not to use the stove and advised apartment manager of the situation so the stove could be repaired.

Saturday, March 28- Dispatched to a structure fire on South Wilderness Road. Eight firefighters responded with a pumper and tanker. Upon arrival, observed a heavy amount of fire inside unoccupied mobile home which had no electricity. Three firefighters made entry into residence and extinguished fire. Due to the fact that this was rental property that occupants had just moved out of, along with definite signs of arson, a Kentucky State Police arson investigator was called to the scene and is currently investigating.

Sunday, March 29- Responded to the report of a single vehicle accident with vehicle on its side in ditch just above Brown Road on Highway 70. Upon arrival of Mount Vernon and Western Rockcastle Fire Departments, it was determined that the driver had left the scene. Fire units had vehicle removed and towed to owner's residence at the request of owner's family.

Sunday, March 29- Fire units were dispatched to a multiple vehicle accident with entrapment on I-75 at exit 62. Twelve firefighters responded with two pumpers and rescue truck. Upon arrival, units observed that driver and passenger of one vehicle were trapped, three patients in another vehicle had already been removed by EMS. Fire units used the jaws of life to extricate the driver and passenger of vehicle. Female passenger was airlifted from the scene. Driver was taken to Rockcastle Hospital.

Sunday, March 29- Rockcastle Sheriff's units requested assistance from firefighters at a residence where a meth lab had been found. Two firefighters responded with a rescue truck to provide lighting for law enforcement units while the meth lab was dismantled.

headed for a full vote in the Senate when the General Assembly adjourned last Friday.

If the bill had been passed by the Senate, KRS 132810 would have been amended to provide that totally disabled individual, with an irreversible disability, may report the disability only upon the initial application for the homestead exemption.

As it now stands, persons with a disability must apply for the homestead exemption each year with the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet.

"The bill came out of the Senate committee with a very favorable response and think it would have easily passed the full Senate if they had had time to vote on it," Ford said.

"It will be brought up again in the General Assembly, because I think that law really needs to be changed," Ford said.

Also during the General Assembly Ford and Democrat State Senator Ed Worley of Richmond combined on legislation that will bring nearly \$59 million in road projects to the county, including the completion of Hwy 150 from Crab Orchard to Mt. Vernon. As well as representing Rockcastle County, Ford and Worley also represent Lincoln County.

Worley, who also represents Madison County in Frankfort, has served in the state senate since 1999 and is currently Minority Floor Leader.

Ford, who is the longest tenured Republican in both the House and Senate, has served in the General Assembly since 1982.

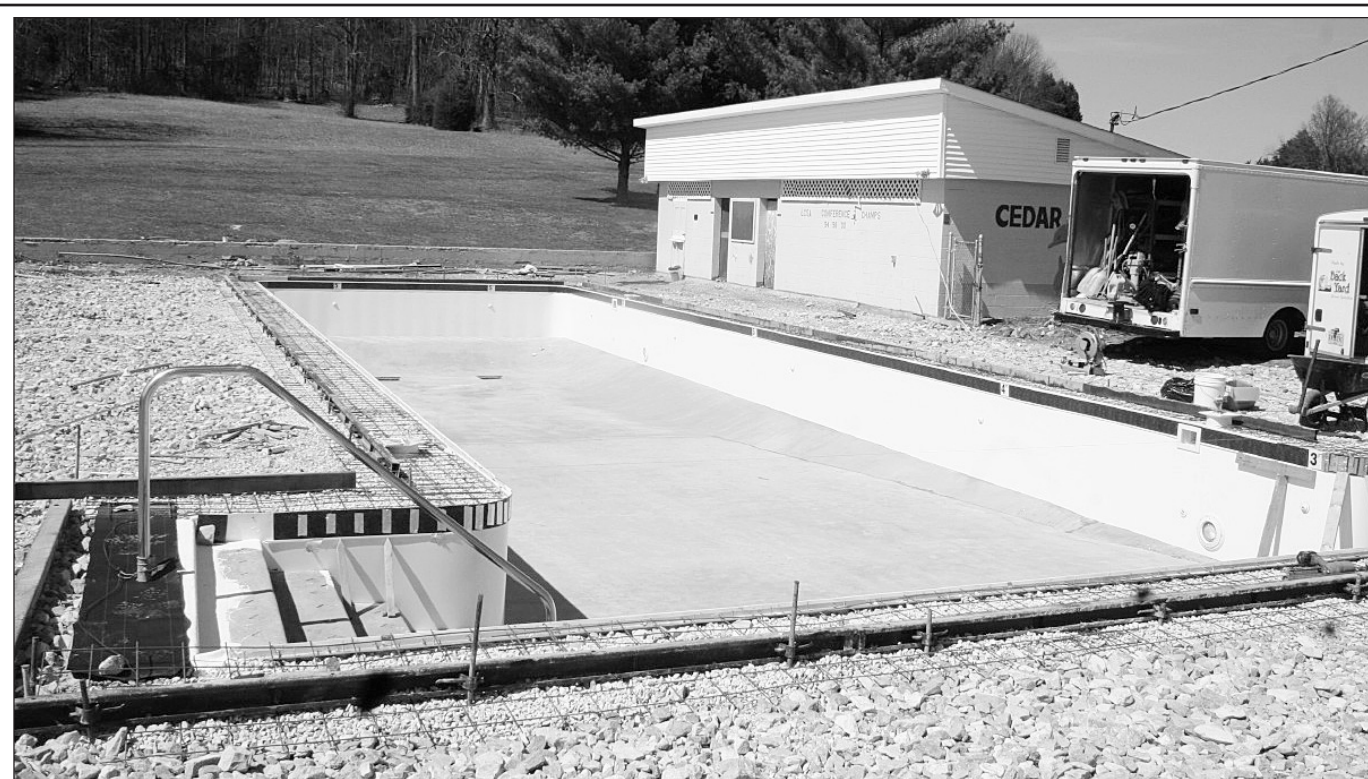

Vernon, walked around the make-shift gravel track last week, while construction was going on behind her at the Hanson Aggregate Quarry. A Hanson official said Tuesday the \$6 million renovation project, now underway at the local quarry, should be completed around the end of June. As part of the renovation and expansion project at the quarry the city of Mt. Vernon gave Hanson approximately one tenth of an acre to make it easier for CSX train cars to come and go from the quarry. In exchange for the park property, Hanson agreed to do all of the work involved in the project, which includes shortening the track and give the city 100 tons of materials from the plant each year for the next five years. Hanson officials has said they would not fight annexation into the city of limits of Mt. Vernon.

Branham speaks about Brodhead at Chamber meeting

Former Brodhead Council member Rick Branham, who is still very active in promoting the city of Brodhead although he has moved out of the city limits, was one of two featured speakers at March's monthly meeting of the Rockcastle Chamber of Commerce.

Branham told Chamber members and guests about the numerous projects now under way in Brodhead. The former council member said the city was in the process of using \$70,000 left over from a recent water project to upgrade more water lines in the city. He said some lines on Main Street, along Hwy. 1505, Big Sinks Road and possibly Short Street would be upgraded until the money ran out.

The initial project, which also included construction of a new water tank in Brodhead, is also 100% complete.

Many of the water lines in Brodhead were constructed in 1939.

Branham also told the group that big plans were underway for the Brodhead Homecoming, which will run this year from Wednesday, May 20th through May 23rd.

This year, the same carnival company, which will provide the rides at the Little's World Fair, will also be at the Brodhead Homecoming, set up on city property across from

Citizens Bank.

Also during the homecoming, the annual Lion's Club Horseshow will be held on Saturday night, the 23rd.

Branham also announced that the annual Little World's Fair, will be held once again the first week in August, beginning August 1st. The midway will be open August 3-8 and admission will again be \$8 for all events and rides.

The fair is sponsored and operated by the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department, of which Branham is a member.

Branham also told Chamber members that the city was planning to build a new city park on donated property, which lies along Hwy. 150 (Main Street), across from Citizens Bank.

Branham said the new park would include a walking trail, stage area, picnic tables and playground equipment.

The city of Brodhead has applied for a 50-50 matching state and federal grant.

Rockcastle Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis also spoke to chamber members concerning the importance of the county's five water districts.

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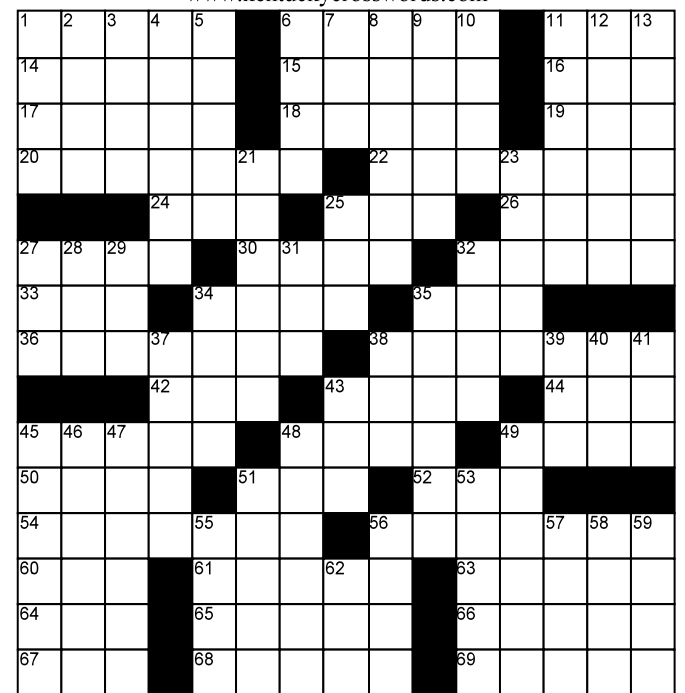

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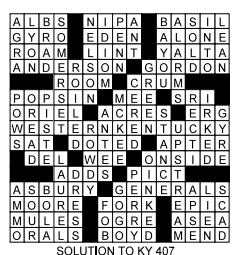

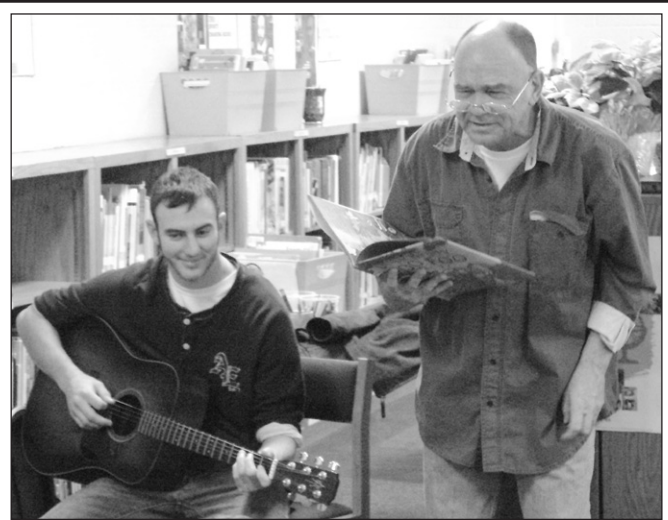

Grants available for adult students

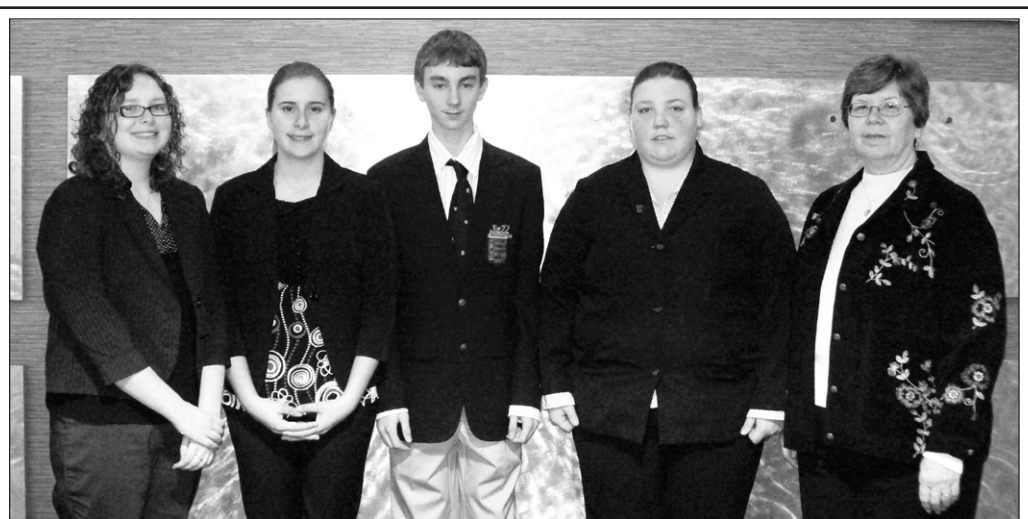
