# **Brodhead man held** on \$50,000 cash bond

During an arraignment for James Clayton Reynolds in Rockcastle District Court on Monday, District Judge Katie Wood did not lower the \$50,000 cash only bond he is being held under.

The 61-year-old has been charged with assault, unlawful imprisonment and wanton endangerment because of a Wednesday night incident, in which he is accused of badly beating his estranged wife.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said when Phyllis Reynolds, 60, returned home from work around 4:20 Wednesday morning, her estranged husband was waiting at her home on Barker Road in the Willailla community of the county.

Reynolds said James Reynolds had hidden his vehicle in the barn and when Phyllis Reynolds went into the house, James Reynolds assaulted her with an umbrella, knocking her semi-conscious.

The County Attorney said Reynolds tied his estranged wife to a chair, struck her several times, causing multiple in-

juries and bleeding and attempted to get her to call her attorney and tell him she was dropping divorce proceedings.

The County Attorney said James Reynolds then forced Phyllis Reynolds to take her clothes off so he could wash the blood off her body.

According to Rockcastle Sheriff Mike Peters, Reynolds then put his estranged wife in his car and drove to David's Tire Center, where he had left a truck and horse trailer.

Peters said when Reynolds got out of the vehicle, his estranged wife jumped behind the wheel and attempted to escape.

Peters said James Reynolds gave chase in his truck and that his estranged wife lost control of the car during the chase and James Reynolds rammed her car with his truck.


Peters said James Reynolds recaputured his estranged wife and they returned to David's Tire Center in the car, where he was going to wait until David's Tire Center opened.

The Sheriff said Reynolds wanted his estranged wife to tell others she was dropping the divorce case against him.

But, Peters said Reynolds realized he had left the lights on and the door open to his truck and he and his estranged wife returned to the scene where he had recaptured her.

Peters said James Reynolds told his estranged wife to drive back to her house at about 35 miles per hour, while he followed her.

"She knew where Deputy Sheriff Stanley Payne lived and she took off to his house, where she went into the yard with the horn blowing and the lights flashing. Diane (Stanley's wife) got the door open very fast and they called the ambulance service who transported Mrs. Reynolds to the local hospital.



**Rockcastle Memories** By David J. Griffin

My Radio Flyer

Each Monday morning when I drive down Furnace Mountain, I see my friend Amon Back's little red wagon sitting by the side of the road loaded with bags of garbage, ready to be picked up and tossed into the garbage truck. Amon is a former Kentucky State Police Officer who was injured on the job and as a result cannot lift much weight. His wagon comes in handy whenever he needs to carry or haul something. Seeing that little red wagon takes me back to my boyhood.

When I was seven years old, my grandfather (Pop) took me into Bryant's Appliance Store and purchased a brand new Radio Flyer wagon for me. I had many memorable days as a child, but that afternoon remains solidly in my mind.

That "little red wagon" was constructed of steel and had wooden stakes on the sides and at the back. On our way back to his car, Pop had me hop into my new wagon, and he pulled me down the sidewalk on Main Street in Mt. Vernon. The Radio Flyer Company began in 1917, when Antonio Pasin purchased some used wood-working equipment and rented a one-room workshop. He began making wagons at night and selling them during the day. The business kept growing, adding additional

employees as necessary. In the 40's, America was at war, and the company was asked to focus all of its manufacturing efforts to produce five-gallon, steel "Blitz Cans" for the war. They were steel containers which were mounted on the back of Army Jeeps, trucks, and tanks, designed to transport five gallons of fuel or water to troops stationed overseas.

After the war, Antiono applied mass-production techniques to wagon-making, making wagons "for every boy and every girl" in America and thereby created what became one of the true icons of American culture. The company is

She will frequently orient her location on the map and will back-track if she discovers that whatever path she's on is getting closer to the snake place.

If she has to miss the monkeys, then so be it, even though she may worry that they are being kept too close to the snakes. She questions the wisdom of keeping snakes and monkeys on the same premises. "What if a big python got

loose and ate a baby monkey," she is prone to wonder?

And I say, "Hey baby what

do you think they feed those suckers anyway? Why do you think they have a zillion monkeys here in the first place? Snakes do have to eat, you know."

She scowls and stares me down. Loretta has no sense of humor when it comes to snakes. Now, I will readily admit

that I'd never keep a snake as a pet even if I was not married to the ultimate snakeophobic, but I'm okay with snakes as long as I know about where they are. However, I once dated a herpetologist back in the seventies and after a couple or three outings, she invited me to have dinner at her apartment. One of those bring the wine deals and she'd do the cooking and then we'd see what else we had in common.

We had a passionate kiss when she answered the door and then I noticed that she had a boa constrictor in a huge glass terrarium in the middle of her living room and it was bigger around than my leg and twice as long as I was tall.

So we were washing dishes after an excellent meal and I inquired as to what she fed old Pedro, the snake to whom I'd been introduced.

And she said, "Rats. Do you want to watch him eat one?" Fool that I am, I agreed and she proceeded to bring in a cage with a white rat about the size of your average beagle. By the time the snake had devoured the rat, romance was the last thing on my mind and my excellent dinner wanted to come back up. She pointed out that my face was whiter than the rat that Pedro had just enjoyed and I don't recall that we went out again after that.

So last Saturday, I was working in my garden. I grow my beans and tomatoes on big round cages made out of fence wire and/or those rolls of steel webbing used to reinforce concrete. In one, still standing from last year, I had piled in a couple dozen heavy plastic bags that had each contained 50 pounds of the composted cow manure I use for fertilizer. I use the empthy bags to keep weeds down in the middle of



Business started 200 years ago could be about to bite the

*dust* Living in a down economy isn't having much effect on Harvey Conner.

He still has a job. The same one he's had for 44 years.

And he has enough money to go out in search of some of the products he has manufactured since he was a teenager.

"The other day, over in Nicholasville, I found a piece I made in the early 80s and only had to give \$1.25 for it," says the 63-year-old Madison County native.

His employer, Bybee Pottery, has been in business in the tiny community of Waco since 1809.

Not much has changed in the 200 years since Webster Cornelison founded the enterprise that is now in its fifth generation of family ownership.

Unlike Harvey, who seems to enjoy talking almost as much as turning out beautiful pieces of pottery, Buzz Cornelison, 60, is a man of few words.

He runs the place now, along with his brother, Jimmy, with occasional help from their sister, Paula Gabbard.

Jimmy also serves as coroner for Madison County, and Buzz was once a member of the Kentucky-based band Exile. As the keyboard player, his talents are highlighted on the group's number one hit from 1978, Kiss You All Over.

He's still keyboarding, only now it's the one attached to his office computer. It looks very much out of place in the twocentury-old, rambling wooden structure that is the workplace for only two other employees besides Conner and family members.

Near the computer hang framed portraits of great-greatgreat grandfather Webster and each succeeding generation of Cornelisons.

The oldest surviving Cornelison is Buzz's dad, Walter, 80, who was a master at running the pottery wheel

two years ago.

Former Kentucky First Lady Phyllis George Brown was instrumental in making Bybee a name with world-wide recognition as part of her promotion of crafts produced in Kentucky.

The product can still be found around the globe, as attested to by the visitors to the unique shop about eight miles east of Richmond just off Ky 52.

"We get people from all over," says Conner, as he shows a visitor the process of adding color to a bowl. "Just this morning, there was a lady in here from London, England."

Visitors who don't mind getting a little dirty from clay dust that coats the floors, walls, and shelves are welcome to tour the entire operation. It is open weekdays only from 8 a.m. until noon and 12:30 until 3 p.m.

A less hectic and, no doubt, cleaner place to buy the merchandise is Little Bit of Bybee, a shop in the Louisville suburb of Middletown operated by a cousin of the family, Ron Stambaugh.

Besides a tour and an opportunity to buy the products at a cheaper price in Waco, visitors can also get a history lesson from employees and from sheets provided free to the public.

They learn that the clay being used is found in ample deposits on a farm about three miles from the shop. It is openpit mined from several feet beneath the rich topsoil.

Documents have been found revealing this is the same clay mined by the first settlers of Kentucky, then taken to nearby Fort Boonesborough to be used for making crude dishes.

The clay, mixed with water, is ground in an old plug mill and stored in an ancient vault where it is kept moist and pliable.

It is weighed on old balances to secure uniformity, then thrown by the potter and shaped into the desired form.

#### <u>May is American Stroke Month</u> A Warning Stroke

Presented by Dr. George W. Griffith Before a person has a stroke, he frequently has some warning signs. If these signs and symptoms are heeded, a stroke can be averted and years of good health added to a person's life.

With a warning (or transient) stroke, the circulation to an



area of the brain is temporarily decreased or obstructed. This results in weakness, numbness, and often difficulty with speech. These transient strokes completely resolve within 24 hours and a person feels fine again. If a person takes preventative measures at this time, he is likely to prevent a much more serious stroke. Common causes of transient strokes are

small clots that travel from the arteries of the neck to plug the arteries of the brain, a drop in blood pressure from dehydration or shock, and temporary clotting off of a small artery in the brain.

If a person has a transient stroke, the cause should be looked for by exam, lab tests, doppler studies of the arteries of the neck, a CT scan of the brain, and even evaluation of the heart to make sure small clots are not caused by an irregular heartbeat. Stroke-like symptoms can also be caused by tumors, migraines, seizures, hypoglycemia or aneurisms, all of which deserve attention.

Treatment is fairly effective and may be as simple as taking one aspirin a day. This cuts the chances of a stroke by up to 50%. If the aspirin alone is ineffective, stronger blood thinners can be used, but they also increase the chance of more severe bleeding problems. Surgery to open obstructed arteries in the neck may be necessary and treatment of medical problems, such as an irregular heart beat or high cholesterol, is important.





The group believes water users have the right to attend ERWA monthly board meetings and will not rest until it achieves this goal.

The group concluded that the ERWA will be more effective if it is open and transparent in all of its activities. It was decided that the advantages of open ERWA meetings include: a non-threatening environment with more respect for concerns of water users, better financial management, and greater fairness in deciding where new water lines are expanded and which homes are added. Open meetings will let water users and taxpayers hear how their money is being spent by the ERWA and decide whether ERWA staff and board members are doing a good job. Everyone knows that well managed organizations are not hampered in conducting their business when their board meetings are open to the public. If open meetings were inhibiting organizations such as the County Fiscal Court or the Board of Education could not operate.

The Real ERWA group formed three committees to pursue its goals. The committees are: petitions, elections, and communications. The next meeting is Sunday, May 31, at 1PM, located at 7704 Climax Road. All water users and members of the public are welcome.

producing the famous toys. My little red wagon was used for a wide assortment of games and chores on our small rural farm, but simply riding it was the greatest of fun. The terrain was such that I could begin at Pop's rye patch at the top of the hill and ride almost to KY 25 at the bottom of our land. At that point, I simply got out, pulled it back uphill, and then headed down again on another ride. Kenneth Hansel and I were also known for towing each other all around the neighborhood in that cool wagon.

Kenneth and I visited the Vaughn family, who lived down the road from my house, quite often. Mr. and Mrs. Vaughn both smoked "corn-cob" pipes with Bull Durham tobacco. The tobacco came in small white sacks with yellow draw-string ties at the top. Mrs. Vaughn kindly saved those bags for me, and Kenneth and I collected them on a regular basis. We filled the bags with sand and pretended they contained gold dust. I remember filling bag after bag with "gold" to haul back to my house. Of course, our precious cargo was carefully placed in the little red wagon. Along the way, Kenneth and I had to fight off both Indians and "outlaws," who were trying to steal our gold. I am happy to report that we were successful in reaching our destination with the prized cargo intact.

When I was not using my wagon to haul things on the farm (like kindling or groceries), it was always parked in my bedroom. While inside, it was used as a toy box to hold all of my valuable possessions.

I recall one rainy afternoon when I got the bright idea to see if the wagon would hold all of my Matchbox cars without having to stack any of them on top of each other. There was just enough room for every single one of my cars and trucks. Somehow, I was pleased with such perfection. wheelbarrow to haul leaves or kindling, out came my wagon so that I could assist him. One afternoon we carried all the leaves from his yard to a spot where he burned trash, and he gave me \$1 for being such a good helper. I was immensely proud of myself and of my wagon.

When I was a little older, I used the wagon to carry coal and kindling into our house on a regular basis. Of course, when I used it for such a messy job, I covered the bottom with cardboard boxes so the coal would not stain the wooden bottom. I kept my wagon very clean and spotless. It was my pride and joy.

I cannot fathom the number of children who have been endowed with years of enjoyment from such wagons – new or old, clean or dirty, red or green. Just ask anyone from my era about their childhood wagon. I guarantee you'll get a story and a little smile to go with it.





Kentucky Farm Buruea office will be closed Thursday, May 7th for training classes





This week, we'll continue to take a look at local history, as remembered by Sammy Ford.

Sammy's namesake was his grandfather, James Samuel Ford. He worked for the Kentucky Utilities Company, and was instrumental in putting the first electric lines through Kentucky in 1925. This was a dangerous job, as it is today, and he was electrocuted while he was at work in Mercer county. This left his wife, Cordelia (or "Cordia", as she was known) Hasty-Ford, a widow at age twenty-five. They had two small children. She managed to get twelve thousand dollars together, and build a home for them.

Cordia Ford was quite the industrious woman, for that era. She sold Raleigh products, kind of a forerunner to Amway. She traveled by train to local towns to sell her products, and was usually gone all day. Later, she remarried, and had three more children.

Sammy shared some of his favorite stories with me that had been handed down through his family, that he remembered from when he was a boy. Some stories leaned toward the humorous side, and others were filled with history and adventure. As we grow up as children, we hear stories passed down through the family, and can now recall them, as they are a part of our childhood. One such story was the big holdup at the Bank of Mount Vernon that happened in 1952 or 1953.

The robbery occurred while Lynn Davis was the sheriff. He, and other individuals, probably his deputies and others, went in pursuit of the robbers when a terrible car accident occurred. The two robbers were killed in the car wreck, as well as some other people driving in another car, who were from the Conway community. The sheriff died from a heart attack, as did another gentleman who was observing the wreckage.

Back in the 1940s, word came to local law enforcement that John Dillinger was in the Mount Vernon area. A stakeout was planned. As it turned out, John Dillinger had hidden himself away for a period of time in the Freedom/Skaggs Creek area. The locals who lived there had no idea of what this outlaw looked like, so he was unknown to them. He had evidently bought food from a family of Whitakers who lived there, and left the area without incident.

Even before then, in the 1930s, there was what Sammy remembered hearing as a child, being referred to as the "big killing" at Brodhead. It had left seven dead. This spree evidently prompted quite a bit of talk and intrigue for years to come, but Sammy thought it best to let the story be claimed by history itself.

Sammy remembered a rather humorous tale involving his father, Robert, having bought an Amish buggy from Dallas Norton, a cousin of mine. Dallas had originally bought it in Indiana before selling it. Robert had hitched two mules, who were accustomed to hard work in the logging business to the buggy. Pulling one little Amish buggy was light work, compared to pulling wagons full of logs. In any case, the mules started to pull full-force, and couldn't be held back. Robert Ford, another gentleman, and the little Amish buggy headed west, out 150, and ended up wrecking in a hole past George Owens' gas station, that was located at the bottom of Sand Springs Road. The last thing the passenger with Robert said was "Hold 'em back!" but Robert said they had "done gone on."

Sammy's maternal grandfather, Charlie Carter, served five terms as county judge, one term as deputy sheriff, and one term as state representative. Sammy still has some of his old papers and memorabilia he has agreed to share with us in the following issue of The Roots of Rockcastle.

USDA Sets Date for Soybean *Request for Referendum* 

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced that it will offer soybean producers the opportunity to request a referendum on the Soybean Promotion and Research Order (Order), as authorized under the Soybean Promotion, Research, and Consumer Information Act (Act).

The act requires the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a Request for Referendum every 5 years after the initial referendum, which was conducted in 1994. The last Request for Referendum was conducted in 2004. Soybean producers who are interested in having a referendum to determine whether to continue the soybean checkoff program are invited to participate.

The Request for Referendum will be conducted at USDA's county Farm Service Agency offices. To be eligible to participate, producers must certify and provide documentation that shows that they produced soybeans and paid an assessment on the soybeans during the period of Jan. 1, 2007, through Dec. 31, 2008.

Beginning May 4, 2009, and continuing through May 29, 2009, producers may obtain a form by mail, fax, or in person from the Farm Service Agency county offices. Forms may also be obtained via the internet at http://www.ams.usda.gov/ lsmarketingprograms during the same time period. Individual producers and other pro-

ducer entities may request a referendum at the county FSA office where their administrative farm records are maintained. For the producer not participating in FSA programs, the opportunity to request a referendum will be provided at the county FSA office where the producer owns or rents land. Completed forms and supporting documentation must be returned to the appropriate county FSA office by fax or in person no later than close of business May 29, 2009; or if returned by mail, must be postmarked by midnight May 29, 2009, and received in the county FSA office by close of business on June 5, 2009.

USDA will conduct a referendum if at least 10 percent of the nation's 589,182 soybean producers support a referendum. Not more than one-fifth of the producers who support having a referendum can be from any one state.

The soybean checkoff program is administered by a 68member producer board and is designed to expand uses of soybeans and soybean products in domestic and foreign markets. The national program is financed by a mandatory assessment of one-half of 1 percent of the net market price of soybeans.

Notice of the Request for Referendum will be published in the March 4, 2009, Federal Register. For more information, contact the Marketing Programs Branch; Livestock and Seed Program, AMS, USDA;


Producers who are eligible for the DCP Program will also be eligible to enroll in the Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program. The enrollment period for the ACRE Program has also been extended to August 14, 2009. Producers may first enroll in the DCP Program, elect to receive advance direct payments and then later modify their enrollment to include the ACRE program or they may wait and elect to enroll in DCP and ACRE at the same time.

"What Is Written"

In Prov.13:3 NKJ we read, "He who guards his mouth preserves his life: but he who opens wide his lips shall have destruction." May we consider the thoughts of this verse of scripture for a few moments. Notice the text tells us that we need to guard our mouths! Our mouths can so easily get out of control if we do not keep a check on it. Allowing young people to do what they are able is important, but parents need to consider their individual child's ability. When it comes to preparing for college, there are times a parent can help teens learn to find the information they need, times to stand by for moral support and times to take care of something yourself if the teen hasn't done it or is not able to do it alone. Much of the career and college exploration process can be done together and can be fun, such as going on a college tour to learn more. The Know How 2 Go campaign (www.knowhow2go.org) suggests capturing college and career ideas on paper with words and pictures then creating a scrapbook of future plans. There are also deadlines and requirements that cannot be changed. It's important that parents and teens both understand that. Post deadlines for college, financial aid and scholarship applications on a common calendar that everyone can look at. To insure your student is taking the correct classes for college admission, suggest he or she meet with a school counselor at least once a year beginning in the 10th grade. If your teen or the counselor requests you attend the meetings, or do something else to help, support your child by doing it. There is no guidebook to parenting with all of the answers easily outlined. Encouraging independence and good decision-making skills are two of the most important gifts you can give your children. 

Sadly, there is no shortage parenting plan of current events to illustrate

Usually, the abuse that is reported to officials is only the "tip of the iceberg" whether it is spouse abuse or abuse of children. There was probably much more to this story. This man had been controlling and abusive for many years and finally went so far as to take the life of his own children.

These are the kinds of cases that keep social workers awake at night. How can society predict which of these abusive, controlling men is capable of killing someone? Not all abusers kill but some do. Any abuse has the potential for becoming fatal and therefore is taken seriously by social workers and the courts.

Because the father killed himself and the children, his wife is the one who is left to deal with the trauma. What must that be like? The pain has to be nearly unbearable because he took all that she had. There is no remaining child on whom she can focus her love. There are only the questions: what if? How could it have been different?

While this man had a history of abuse and control, there was

thing they know their parents disapprove of.

It's a rough time for parents who truly want to do the best for their children but aren't sure how to do that at this new stage. Children need to have some independence so they will learn to make their own decisions. Yet, parents want, and in some cases need, to protect their children as best they can from decisions that can be negatively life altering.

Certified Parent Coach Jennifer Wolf (website http:// singleparents.about.com) says parents should help their teens prepare for life by: teaching basic household chores, like laundry and making meals; following through consistently with consequences so teens learn to accept responsibility for actions; guide teens in safety, especially as related to sex, driving and the Internet; and model how to resolve interpersonal conflicts.

Teacher and parent Sandy Fleming (website http:// www.associatedcontent.com) suggests independence should be built gradually through a child's life. For example, everyone needs to have good decision-making skills. Children begin making decisions when they are young by choosing what to wear or what toy to share.

As the decisions a child makes begin to have more impact, such as which classes to sign up for and which peers to hang out with, parents can help their children see the different consequences in their choices. One class, for example, might require more studying than another. If you don't take that class, will you be able to get into the college of your choice? Will you be at a disadvantage when applying for scholarships? Explore the various possible outcomes with your teen.

Children often don't understand the consequences of actions from mere words, they need to understand with ac-





# **Smith, Hunter win state titles RCHS girls' track team places 4th at state championships**

The RCHS girls' track team finished another impressive season this past weekend at the Class 2A State Track & Field Championships in Louisville. With the addition of several more teams from Class 3A and Class A, the field of teams and competitors was quite possibly the deepest it's ever been in many events. Besides the competition, the teams had to deal with extremely hot temperatures in a meet that lasted over seven hours. Also factoring into the meet was the elimination of preliminary heats, which allows for a level playing field in the finals. This certainly put RCHS and other teams in Region 5 at a distinct disadvantage since their regional championship was ran into a strong head wind,

thereby making times considerably slower going into the state championships. This resulted in many of the state's fastest runners qualifying in slower heats due to their times.

Despite the hot weather and the addition of track powers Louisville Central, Trigg County, and South Oldham to Class 2A, RCHS had a spectacular meet and finished 4th overall. Highland picked up their 2nd straight state title with 62.5 points. Lloyd Memorial was a close 2nd with 61. Central placed 3rd with 53 points, while RCHS was close with 48. South Oldham finished 5th with 42 points and Trigg County and Paducah Tilghman tied for 6th with 37 points. This was the closest in terms of point differential that the

Junior Samantha Smith led RCHS with several outstanding state championship performances and a total of 18 points. After claiming indoor state titles in both long and triple jump earlier this year, Samantha added her first outdoor title in the long jump competition. Samantha easily made the finals after her first three jumps and never trailed in the competition. She won the state title in the event with an awesome leap of 17'2.5".

Senior Sarah McKinney attempted to defend her state title from a year ago in the 100meter hurdles. Sarah ran a blistering race and finished 5th in 16.19 seconds. It took the top four competitors running their personal bests to defeat her.

Samantha next competed for the 100-meter dash state title. Despite being forced to run in the 2nd heat, she blazed her way to a strong 10th place finish in an impressive 13.14 seconds, just missing scoring in the event.

Senior Katy Mattingly's quest for the title came in the first heat of the 100-meter dash. Despite the hot temperatures, she sprinted her way to an impressive 18th place finish with an awesome time of 13.51 seconds.

Sophomore Sara Hammond had the daunting task of competing in the discus competition and the high jump at the same time. The discus venue was nearly a mile away from the track, making it very difficult to compete in both. Sara competed in the first flight of







The regimen we require of our youth is demanding and difficult on the parents and we appreciate their support. I would proudly put our Team up with any in the state," says Judge Katie Wood.

The National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges sponsored the training conference February 2-5 in Louisville. Sessions included Fidelity to the Juvenile Drug Court Model, Reaching and Maintaining Capacity, Working with Populations, Special Sustainability, and Team Transitions. The objective of the training was to give Kentucky Juvenile Drug Court teams the opportunity to examine the national juvenile drug court model and share their thoughts with juvenile drug court teams throughout the United States.

Juvenile Drug Court programs depend on a strong collaboration among a program team, which includes the judge, prosecutor, court designated worker, treatment liaison, case specialist and school personnel.

Other Juvenile Drug Court judges and team members who attended the training conference were from Boone, Christian, Clark, Daviess, Fayette, Franklin, Henderson, Jackson, Jefferson, Kenton, Knox, Laurel, Madison, McCreary, Letcher, Pike, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Shelby, and Whitley counties.

Juvenile Drug Court Drug and alcohol use among young people presents unique challenges to schools, families, communities, law enforcement, and the juvenile court system.

Juvenile Drug Court is designated to meet the needs of young people who are engaging in a destructive lifestyle through using drugs and alcohol. The program provides education, prevention/intervention, accountability, and treatment referrals to young people and their families.

Juvenile Drug Court identifies young people ages 13 to 17 with current or past drug and/ or alcohol charges. They also may have non-related drug charges stemming from their substance abuse. Youth in Pulaski and Rockcastle counties are ordered to complete Drug Court stemming from District Court charges under District Judge Jeffrey Scott Lawless, District Judge Kathryn G. Wood, and from Family Court cases under Judge Walter Maguire.

Juvenile Drug Court is administered through the Department of Family and Juvenile Services at the Administrative Office of the Courts in Frankfort. The AOC is the operational arm of the Kentucky Court of Justice and supports the activities of 3,800 court system employees, including the elected offices of justices, judges and circuit court clerks.

easily cleared the height and finished 14th overall, only two inches away from a 4th place finish.

Next for Sara came the 800meter relay, an event she only recently began participating in. Along with seniors Katy Mattingly and Sarah McKinney, as well as junior Jessica Albright, the team came through with a season's best performance. Great baton exchanges and some fast 200meter splits allowed the girls to finish 13th overall in a stellar 1:53.45

Junior Laura Dollins competed next for RCHS in the

200-meter dash time at state in RCHS history. She came back over to triple jump and had to get her three jumps in before being allowed to catch her breath. Nevertheless, she easily made the finals in the event. Samantha finished with an amazing effort of 34'9" and placed 3rd overall. She was less than 7" away from the state title in the event.

8th grader Michaela Hunter also scored 18 points for RCHS with several impressive performances. She first competed in the long jump competition. With several exceptional jumps she easily made the finals. Michaela placed 5th overall with an awesome leap of 16'2.75".

Next up for Michaela came her attempt at one of the most difficult doubles in track – the 400-meter dash and 300-meter hurdles. In the 400, Michaela overcame a slow start with an incredible come-from-behind finish. She out sprinted all other competitors coming down the final stretch to capture the individual state title in the event with an awesome time of 59.33 seconds.

Sara Hammond also ran a great 400-meter dash state final, leading for the first 200meters. Running with everything she had left, Sara sprinted down the final stretch and finished 6th overall with an awesome time of 1:01.19.

Only minutes later, Michaela had recuperated enough to take on the challenge of the 300 hurdles. She ran a hard-fought race in the second heat, finishing 13th overall in 50.35 seconds.

Sarah McKinney also ran well in the first heat of the 300meter hurdles. She started out in front at the beginning of the race and held her nearly perfect form throughout, finishing 16th overall in an incredible season's best time of 51.13 seconds.

Soon after the hurdles were completed, Michaela competed in triple jump. Despite being exhausted, she qualified for the finals and came through with an exceptional effort of 34' and finished 5th overall.

After the hurdle races, Laura Dollins set her sights on the 800-meter run state final. Qualifying for state out of the region containing the most talented 800 runners in Class 2A, Laura competed in the fast heat. She got the race off to a great start, hanging close to the state's best. With a strong finish on the second lap, Laura finished an incredible 8th overall with a sensational time of 2:30.04.

Shortly thereafter, Laura completed the distance portion of her day with the 3200-meter run state final. Laura got the race off to a good start, but the heat finally took its toll and slowed her progress through eight laps. She still finished an impressive 21st overall in a solid 13:27.77.

Amazingly, after the exhausting 3200-meter run, Laura joined the 1600-meter relay team for the final race of the competition. Jessica Albright, Laura, Bryonna Cromer, and 7th grader Lacey Gastineau ran a superb race, finishing 22nd overall in 4:45.14.

The girls' 4th place team finish added to the programs' impressive run at the state championships over the last nine years. The girls have placed in the top four teams in Class 2A for eight of the past nine seasons at state. That streak includes two state runner-up finishes, two 3rd place finishes, and four 4th place finishes. The only year they were not in the top four they finished 7th.

The girls' also won their 6th straight and 9th overall regional title this year along with their first conference championship since joining the Central Ky. Conference two years ago.

In March, the girls won their 3rd straight Mason-Dixon Games Indoor State title, while the RCMS girls' team also won state. RCMS would later win their first outdoor state title as well.

In the next couple of weeks, RCHS should have some athletes named to the all-state track and field team, along with several who will qualify for academic all-state honors.

The RCHS coaching staff and athletes would like to wish seniors Sarah McKinney and Katy Mattingly well as they graduate and pursue their college careers. Sarah has signed to run track and play volleyball with Union College, while Katy will be attending the University of Kentucky.






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# **RCHS Band plays at 2009 Baccalaureate**

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
