

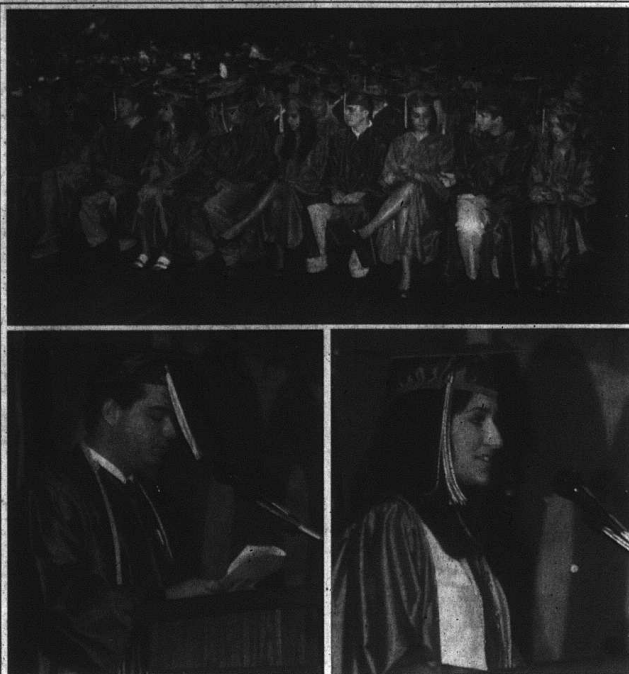

AG opinion says ERWA can close their board meetings

The board meetings of the Eastern Rockcastle Water Association can be closed to the public, according to a Kentucky Attorney General's Opinion issued last Wednesday.

In a six page opinion, issued by Asst. Attorney General Michelle D. Harrison, the ERWA board has been within their rights the last few months when they voted to close their board meetings to the public.

In her opinion, Harrison wrote: "Because Eastern Rockcastle Water Association, Inc. is a private, nontoxic corporation organized under KRS Chapter 273, ERWA cannot properly be characterized as a "public agency" within the meaning of KRS 61.805(2); accordingly, ERWA is not required to comply with provisions of the Open Meetings Act OAG 78.895 is controlling on the facts presented."

The attorney general's opinion, referenced by Harrison, was issued by then Kentucky Attorney General Robert J. Stephens in 1978 and has been the basis of ERWA President David Ballinger's decision to close the board meetings of the association.

Last week's attorney general's opinion was in response to a request by ERWA water user Barbara Castleberry, who, along with others, was denied access to the ERWA board meeting on April 21st.

The board meetings were also closed in May and June, although several water customers protested and, each time, the Rockcastle Sheriff's office had to be called before meetings could take place.

Ballinger said Wednesday that he would continue to ask that board meetings be closed, because it simply made meetings go more smoothly and more business get accomplished.

Ballinger said he was not surprised by the attorney general's opinion, because the matter had been extensively researched by association attorney Jerry Cox and the board had relied on his advice as to whether or not they were allowed to close the meetings.

"I am not surprised by the ruling, when I submitted the request I understood that the non-profit organizational status of the ERWA might likely mean that the Attorney General would rule that the Kentucky laws on open meetings do not apply. However it was reassuring to see the Attorney General's statement that my reliance on the terminology included in the supporting documents "was entirely reasonable," even though it was "not determinative in the case," said

"Although the ruling excludes the ERWA from the requirements of the Kentucky open meetings laws, it does not excuse the ERWA from sound business practices. In addition, ERWA has moral and ethical obligations to behave more responsibly since it was created in large part with taxpayer money and continues to rely on taxpayer funds for its operation. At a time when organizations and businesses are striving for transparency the ERWA is totally opaque," Castleberry noted.

They block any attempts by member customers to see what is happening on such major issues as water quality safety and the financial stability of the Association. They have not published information on their water quality since the 2006 calendar year report was published in the Signal. Their most recent profit and loss statements revealed a loss of more than \$5000 for the month of April compared to a \$4000 profit in March," Castleberry asserted.

President David Ballinger told the Signal the difference in the expenses in income and expenses in March and April was because of end the quarter expenses, including employee withholding taxes and \$1,400 for the audit. "I very board member knows what made that difference, it was explained thoroughly," Ballinger said.

Castleberry went on to say, "but efforts are focused on ensuring that the ERWA is a financially viable water association that provides safe drinking water for its member customers. In spite of their efforts to block our access to information during the recently conducted audit and the Attorney General ruling, we have learned that (1) the auditor identified a material weakness in the ERWA financial records and (2) requested tax forms have never been

Fiscal Court gives approval on Tuesday County budget is \$7,470,048

At a special called meeting Tuesday, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court approved the first reading of a \$7,470,048 budget for fiscal year 2009-10.

The budget must now be submitted to the state and final adoption will be at a June 11th called meeting.

The budget breaks down into available revenue of \$2,470,048 in the general fund,

\$3,136,500 for the road fund, \$1,091,648, jail fund; \$280,500 expected in Local Government Economic Assistance (LGEA); \$257,500 in the 911 fund; \$194,386 CSEPP revenue from the federal government; \$24,000 in the fairground fund and \$2,810 forestry and \$2,245 in LEPC revenue.

Of the \$2,470,048 expected revenue in the general fund, the largest influx will be from the occupational tax levied last year. The county expects to receive \$1.2 million from the payroll tax and net profit tax. The county also expects to receive \$347,500 from the insurance tax but this figure is 75% of the amount received last year. The figure was lowered because the City of Mt. Vernon elected to take their share of the tax on insurance premiums collected on property within their city limits. The city will begin collecting the tax in October, 2009, giving them three quarters of the insurance tax revenue which will be received in

2009-10. The insurance premium tax will come to the county in July, since it is for the last quarter of the 2008-09 fiscal year.

County Treasurer Joe Clontz cautioned the court that this figure is only an estimate since the state insurance commission will have to determine what property is within the Mt. Vernon city limits, which will determine who gets what.

County gets approval for loan for roads

At the special called meeting Tuesday, County Judge Executive Buzz Carlotts told the court that final approval of a loan from KACo, for up to \$2 million had been approved and Greer Bros. should be in the county within the next few days to begin work on county roads.

The county actually expects to receive \$2,295,945 in revenue. The budget adds in an estimated \$300,000 carryover and shows a transfer out of \$125,897 for the final revenue available total of \$2,470,048.

A total of 6.13 inches of rain was recorded at the Cox Funeral Home Weather Station in Mt. Vernon in May.

Discovery Festival set for Saturday

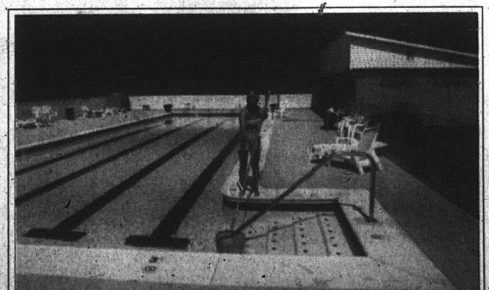

When I told that Big, Fat Lie

I learned a very valuable lesson when I was a fourth grade student in Miss Nancy Helton's class. In those days, a nurse would come to school each year and give us inoculations for a series of diseases. I hated taking "shots" when I was nine years old, so I decided that I would tell the nurse a big, fat lie.

On the day that the nurse arrived (unannounced of course) I made up a story that my mother (Bee) was going to take me to Dr. Griffith for my yearly "booster" vaccinations. Miss Helton graciously told me to go back to my seat and wait until the nurse finished with my class.

As the day passed, I began to regret lying to my teacher and the consequences that would result from my lie. As the old adage states, "One lie leads to another."

I finally decided that I would take a pin and prick my arm so I could show my vaccination to my mother when I got home. I

grimaced and with clenched teeth stuck my upper arm with a pin, making a small hole in my shoulder. I think the pin prick hurt worse than the "shot" given by the nurse.

That evening when I got home, I showed my fake inoculation scar to Bee. She gave me the proper sorrowful look and proceeded to make my favorite meal for dinner. Throughout the night, Bee kept looking at my scar to see how I was doing. Every time she looked at me, I felt more and more guilty.

About 8:30 the phone rang, and I could hear Bee talking to Miss Helton about the vaccinations that had been performed that day at school. I knew I was in bad trouble. At that point, I remembered something my grandmother, Mommie Katie, once told me: "When you tell a lie, it will always catch up with you, and that night it did!"

I heard Bee hang up the phone and then into my room she came. Her first question

Points East

I have to do the soap box thing once in a while as in climb upon it and preach. I've been doing this column for nigh' on 30 years and I think I've earned the right to sermonize on whatever subject teases my imagination from time to time.

And this time, yet again, it just happens to be recycling.

Like most of the rest of rural Kentucky, Garrard County is cursed with an embarrassingly high percentage of the population who figure that if they throw their beer or pop cans alongside the road as they drive about, somebody will come along and clean up after them and make money in the process.

In other words, they figure that by littering, they are doing somebody else a favor while they demonstrate their filth.

My long held position on disposable bottles, cans, grocery bags, candy bar wrappers, fast food take-out containers, disposable diapers, condoms, etc. is that they be taxed, state wide, at the rate of at least 25 cents each. If you have to be a piggy and toss your garbage out

the car window, have at it once you've paid for the right to be a slob. If you want to get your money back, keep your garbage in the floor board of your car or the cab of your truck and swap it back in for cold hard cash when it gets to the point that you can't stand to smell the mess you've made.

I don't figure anybody is going to change his (this is mostly arrogant men, I think) habits for three cents per container but if we made it pricey enough (and I do think 25 cents is cheap to pick up, bag and dispose of a Styrofoam plate left alongside the road by your fatherly slobovian), even the most holier-than-thou, self righteous, quarrelsome slob might, however reluctantly, commence showing some responsibility for basic cleanliness in the place we live. Oh, they will whine for sure, but if they demand we clean up after them, they need to learn what janitorial service is really worth. And maybe they will have some incentive for getting into the business themselves.

But it's not just janitorial. In fact, putting stuff back into use is at least as important as refusing to live in the perpetual garbage dump our porcine population seems to like for granted if not love. Metal products, particularly aluminum cans, can be put back to use at a small fraction of the costs of mining aluminum and making them from scratch. Recycling just ten pounds of newspapers is worth more than a hundred pounds of live tee. Plastic, made from coal and other mined minerals can be used over and over again.

They say my dad was a powerful speaker. A laminated handbill from the 1930s inviting people to a 'shop at home' rally extols my father's talents for delivering a stump speech.

He will tell you of walking, accompanied by a little mule, from Arizona to New York, and spending two hours with Gov. Roosevelt. He will make you laugh and then make you cry. He will also GIVE AWAY SOME MERCHANDISE.

I doubt the Army company was the first thing to come to mind when my Mom heard the word Fifth.

Otherwise, maybe she wouldn't have felt the need to fit to the man who knocked on the door of our little white tenant house in the summer of 1955.

He was owner of the local speedway, a quarter mile dirt track from which I could hear the roar of engines on Saturdays nights and which dust rise above an eerie glow.

Would my Dad be interested in a job as public address announcer, he wanted to know.

"No," was Mom's quick and terse reply.

"The last thing we need is your dad using a loud speaker. There's just no tellin' what he might say."

I have no personal recollections of Dad's speaking abilities, other than the time he tried to sell me to the high bidder.

He sat my six-year-old but atop a water-filled Coca-Cola cooler in a rural Kentucky grocery store and asked who would give top dollar for the cute little boy.

The rhythm of the auctioneer that made my heart flutter, but I guess he was only kidding.

All the overall-wearing men gathered around the Warren Morning stove just laughed. Between sprints of Red Man into a heavily stained cold bucket.

I wasn't embarrassed by what he did. Maybe I was too scared to see the destructive nature of alcohol?

To tell you the truth, I had recalled ever being embarrassed by Dad's drinking problem. If indeed, he had one.

Maybe it was because he let me kick the foam off his Oetzi's 92, or the way he seemed to help him enhance nursery rhymes.

My favorite: Hey diddle diddle, the cat and the fiddle, the cow jumped over the moon. The little dog laughed and scratched his ear, and the dish ran away with the spoon.

I didn't repeat any of Dad's lyrics when I started first grade at the two-room Camp Ground Graded School in the fall of 1955.

I knew I had a good thing going when Mrs. Crockett asked each class member to read out loud and continue until I found a word we didn't know or could not pronounce.

Alice & Jerry was a breeze after having mastered comics passed down from three older brothers.

I beamed with pride after reading the entire book.

Wanting to build on my success in the classroom, I recall feeling lots of peer pressure at recess as I sat on the front steps with five or six classmates.

One by one they began bragging about how great their dads were in the classroom. I recall not thinking I really heard of their stories; but I'm sure they involved catching big fish, or showing off acts of strength.

I was too busy trying to decide that a man old enough to be their great grandfather (he was 63 when I was born) could do better than their dads.

Finally, I had it. "My Dad can drink more beer than all your dads put together," I exclaimed.

We didn't have a telephone at home, nor do I recall there being one at the school.

So how did my mother know that I had said when I got home that afternoon, I have never known.

Mom never struck one of her children, but I think I would have preferred a sound whipping over the lecture delivered that day.

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Lightning Is Dangerous

Summer is the time of year when electrical storms are common but it is easy to forget that lightning is a real hazard. Actually it causes more deaths per year than any other weather phenomenon. About 300 people die each year and twice that many are struck and survive.

The most important thing to do is avoid the lightning. The best way is to seek shelter in a building or vehicle during storms. Many people seek shelter from the rain under trees and are struck. This accounts for about a quarter of the deaths each year.

Avoid other tall or metallic objects such as flag poles, fishing rods, wire fences, or rail. It is unsafe to be in boats, on machinery, cycles, golf carts, or other open vehicles.

About the only warning sign you may get is having your hair stand on end, which is static electricity building up. This is a sign that may mean a lightning strike is imminent.

If you do get caught out in the open, you should seek a low spot, such as in a valley or gully (if it's relatively dry). If you are in the open and can not find a low spot, it is best to kneel down and put your hands on your knees. If you are in the woods, seek a low spot or a dense growth of small trees.

People in a crowd should spread out so not everyone is injured if there is a strike nearby.

If someone is struck by lightning, CPR should be started. Doing mouth-to-mouth resuscitation is most important since a person's breathing remains paralyzed longer than his heart is stopped in these cases. Call 911 and continue CPR until help arrives.

I have been a member of the ERWA for about eleven years. I served on the ERWA Board for eight years. I know that the ERWA is committed to providing a reliable source of high quality water to the largest number of customers possible.

Everyone on the board, in management, and employees have worked diligently for all these years to do just that.

The ERWA under the able management of Randy Cory has maintained the highest standards of diligence and integrity in carrying out its mission. The ERWA and particularly Mr. Cory are held in high regard by the numerous state agencies which oversee the op-

eration of water companies. The company has gone more than nine years without a single violation from the state.

A recent audit on the ERWA showed that the company had built, with honesty and integrity an exceptional water association. The auditor rated the ERWA higher than most well run companies.

Unfortunately, a small and vocal minority of ERWA members has taken it on themselves to critique the actions of the ERWA Board, management and employees. They call themselves "The Real ERWA."

I will not attempt to define their motivation. They have used articles in the newspaper to imply that the company is not doing well, and not doing the exceptionally good job of supplying reliable, safe water to the approximately two thousand customers served. They have cost the company large sums of money by demanding that the ERWA staff supply them with documents relating to the op-

Although they have not succeeded in preventing the board, management and employees of the ERWA from continuing to offer outstanding service to the citizens of Rockcastle County, it serves, their actions do not further, the goals of the well being of the ERWA.

As everyone knows, these buses are not allowed to backup on a main road so either you move for them or you are at a standstill. We have blind curves with nowhere to go if you meet cars or buses. There are roads in this county that have been widened and new blacktop that don't have 13 of the homes that our road does. On a three mile stretch of road, we have about 75 to 80 homes with a new subdivision being built.

Now, I would love for the judge, or someone, to tell us there is not a need for a new road. The county can bring a 5 gallon bucket of blacktop and fill a few holes once a year but that does not help the safety issues of this road.

I realize our road is not the only road in the county this way and there are probably some that are even worse. But, if you're like ours, that means you don't have a judge or magistrate or family member of them living on your road.

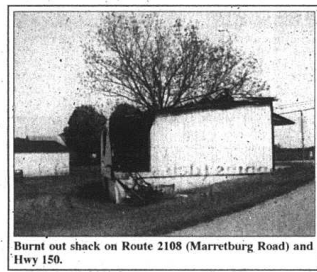



Folks at Believers' House of Prayer feel very blessed

From a store-front building on Main Street in Brodhead to a cozy little country church in Renfro Valley, the folks at Believers House of Prayer feel very blessed. They would like to share their story with you.

In July, 1991, Brother Horace Gordon and his wife, Lois, held the first prayer meeting in Brodhead at the home of Nannie York Johnson, who was very ill with cancer. After several meetings in her home, Nannie encouraged Brother Gordon to start a church in Brodhead. Being an ordained minister of the First Church of God, and having sung at many churches in this area with his wife and pastored several churches in Boyle, Lincoln, and Marion counties, and having

hosted a radio program on WPKV in Renfro Valley on two separate occasions, Brother Gordon pastored the church—a rented building on Main St.—until health issues forced his departure in 1995. Though Mrs. Johnson had become too ill to attend services and passed away on September 12, 1991, her enthusiasm helped foster an additional calling for the little group.

Beginning with mid-week services, the church, and initially calling itself the Brodhead First Church of God, a Sunday evening service was added. January 12, 1992, they conducted their first Sunday morning service. Being a new church, it took some time to get folks coming on a regular ba-

sis. With the decline of Brother Gordon's health, in 1995 Brother Bill Davis, a church member, was invited to become co-pastor. Brother Davis accepted and became pastor after Brother Gordon's departure. Following the change in leadership, the church continued as non-denominational and adopted the name Believers House of Prayer.

Almost from the start, they had a vision for a building of their own. After raising money from a bake sale, at a Memorial Day Parade in Brodhead, the church started a building fund in June, 1992, with money left over from the purchase of a vacuum cleaner. The fund grew, sometimes slowly and sometimes fast, but the church held on to their vision of building someday.

Over the years, many people came and went, but only a faithful few came to stay. The church seemed to be at a standstill. When the opportunity came for them to hold services at a little log church at Brush Arbor in Renfro Valley, they readily accepted. Several hundred dollars from the building fund was spent to buy pews and install insulation in the cabin. On August 23, 1998, they had their first service there with many great services to follow. A lot of the folks who came in were tourists, so they met people from several states as well as many from the local communities. Making many friends they would never have met otherwise, the church was still not to see Brush Arbor as its final destination.

In January, 1999, the congregation began having church services in the homes of some of the members, also conducting Wednesday night services at Rainbow Respite Center in Renfro Valley. It did indeed, seem that Renfro Valley was the area to which God kept calling them. All the while the congregation kept "wandering in the wilderness," they continued to pray for a permanent location. With a sizeable building fund by this time, they began the search for land—a place to call "home." Attending an auction in the Fuzzy Duck area of Brodhead, Brother Davis was highest bidder on a lot there but

lost it when the property was combined and sold together with other lots. This was not to be "home" either.

The subsequent availability of property on Old Dowell Farm Road saw church members getting together to view land which included a mobile home they could use for services. They prayed over it and asked the Lord's will be done. God's answer was, "No. I have something better for you." The adjoining property to that with the mobile home was the place God would finally allow them to call "home." The property was purchased—debt-free—in 1999.

After the purchase of the property, they began having services at the Mt. Vernon Community Center. Thanks to Ms. Vi Ellis, they were allowed to meet in her building for over a year rent-free. It was at this time they came to the knowledge of the seven-day Sabbath truth and the relevance of abiding-by all ten of the Ten Commandments in the present day. As Brother Bill was often heard declaring on subsequent numerous occasions, "Unlike Wal Mart, God does not offer a ten-per cent discount" when it comes to acknowledging and abiding by God's Moral Law, written in stone with His own finger. Though church members have come from many faith backgrounds, those from the Seventh-Day Adventist and former World-Wide Church of God find a particularly comforting fit. Since God has His truth (to some degree) in all churches, most all who've come through the doors of the church have discovered a sincere desire for a closer walk with the God of Creation and the Lord of the Sabbath.

After a time of seeming to stand still again, as far as physical progress, the Believers House of Prayer took a big "step of faith" in 1999 when they began construction on the church building. God blessed them with many wonderful workers, some charging a little and many donating both time and talent. God sent folks to meet every need. After much hard work and many long hours, they were finally able to have their first service on October 4, 2000. What a blessing that was!

Other than the sanctuary, the church had only one small room, two bathrooms and a foyer. The small room was used as a classroom and fellowship room but was very crowded. One day, Mrs. Janice Davis announced to the church that she felt they needed to build a fellowship hall, but only as the funds became available. After much prayer, in the spring of 2003, they broke ground again. Gradually, by July, 2006, they were ready for the finishing

touches on the sheetrock, and in August, the floors were covered and lights installed. By October, water and sewage were completed. In September, 2008, the cabinets, countertops, sink, and range top were installed. The fellowship hall is nearing completion and is such a great blessing. It is used as a classroom for children's Sabbath School, a place for Friday night Bible study, as well as a place to share delicious meals and warm fellowship.

In June, 2008, the county road leading to the church from US 25 was blacktopped from its previous gravel covered state, thanks to Jan Stevens, their magistrate. This, another answer to prayer, allowed for ease of entrance to and exit from the church in its valley home and the hill leading up to US 25.

On February 6, 2009, the church had much to celebrate. They were able to make the last mortgage payment about a year

and a half ahead of schedule. Being a small congregation, they realize that only with God's help could this have been possible. Every financial need has been supplied every time. Not only has the church been able to pay their bills, but they have, on numerous occasions, been able to meet many needs of others.

Still having a lot of visions for the church—church-organized cable broadcasts, a black-top parking lot, a roof over the front porch, a picnic shelter, an outbuilding, and other material things—they feel the greatest work they need to do is get the truth of God's Word out to their community and surrounding areas. Now that the physical church has been built, it's time to build up the spiritual church and seek true unity. As John, Chapter 17, verse 21 says, "That they all may be one, as

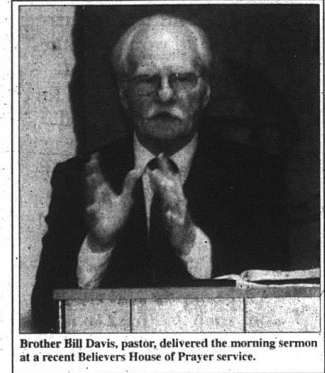



- Promoted community awareness through a "Wear Red Day" that included pro-

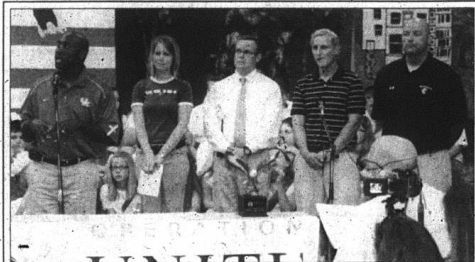
clamations by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

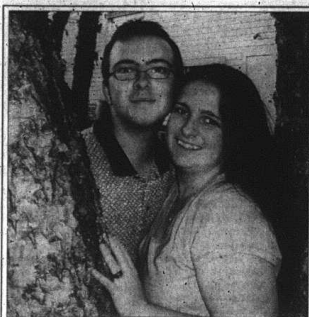

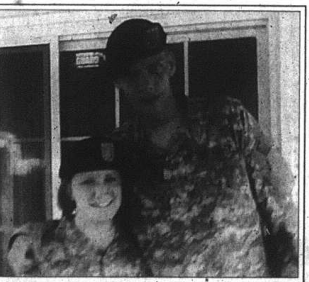

Committee meeting
The Rockcastle County Farm Service Committee (COC) will hold its monthly meeting Thursday, June 4, 2009 beginning at 8:00 a.m. The meeting will be held at the FSA office.

The COC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help FSA at the local level by deciding the kind of program their county will have and how they will operate. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws and applying their judgment and knowledge and knowledge to make decisions.

Eight Counties Eligible for FSA Emergency Loans

Farmers in Eight Kentucky counties are eligible for Federal disaster assistance, including low interest emergency (EM) loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) provided eligibility required are met.

On May 21, 2009 Administrator Caruso declared a disaster declaration N985 for Madison County, Kentucky due to physical losses caused by a tornado which occurred on May 8, 2009.

As a result of the declaration, seven other Kentucky counties were named as contiguous counties where eligible family farmer may qualify for FSA EM loan assistance.

Those counties are: Clark, Estill, Fayette, Garrard, Jackson, Jessamine and Rockcastle. EM loan applications for physical and production losses will be received through January 21, 2010, an applications pending on that date may be processed and completed.

Farmers interested in applying for assistance should contact their local FSA county of-

rice:
2009 Direct and Counter-Cyclical Payment (DCP)
Did you receive a DCP payment in 2008? Have you signed up for the 2009 payment?

Producers are urged to enroll in the 2009 Direct and County-cyclical Payment Program for farms with base acres by the deadline which has been extended to August 14, 2009. No late-filed applications will be accepted.

Producers who are eligible for the DCP Program will also be eligible to enroll in the Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program. The enrollment period for the ACRE Program has also been extended to August 14, 2009. Producers may first enroll in the DCP Program, elect to receive advance direct payments and then later modify their enrollment to include the ACRE Program or they may wait and elect to enroll in DCP and ACRE at the same time.

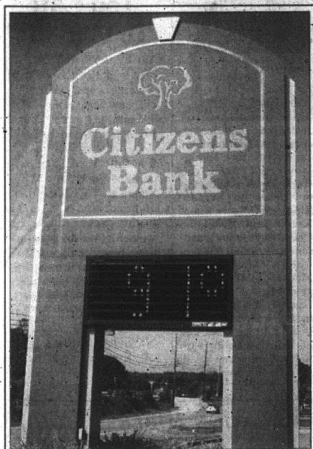

The bank clock at Citizens Bank on Hwy. 150 showed a temperature of 91 on Monday afternoon, officially kicking off the summer season in the county. Although the clock had 91, the official recorded temperature at the Cox Funeral Home Weather Station was 85, which was the highest recorded temperature of the year, until the mercury reached 86 on Tuesday.

The transfer out of \$125,897 from the general fund is for the jail which expects to need that amount to meet expenses in 2009-10.

The jail expects to receive \$961,251 in revenue mostly from housing state prisoners (\$753,550) and the state jail bed allotment (\$75,679) and, with an estimated \$5,000 carryover and the \$125,897 transfer in from the general fund, their total available revenue will be \$1,091,648.

County Judge Executive Buzz Carlotis pointed out to the magistrates that other counties, comparable in size, have to put as much as \$1,000,000 into their jail fund from their general fund. Jailer James Miller added that his 17 total employees is the least for any jail the county's size in the state and that his budget includes a \$110,000 loan payment on the facility, plus he pays all his employees benefits - including matching social security, health and retirement benefits, and insurance costs, while the court picks up this expense for the sheriff's office and partially for the county clerk's office from their general fund.

Revenue in the road fund for 2009-10 is inflated because it reflects proceeds from a KACO loan, of up to \$2 million which will be used to upgrade roads in the county. The road department expects to receive \$855,000 from the state's county road aid program - up from \$750,000 last year and \$210,000 from their share of truck license receipts - down from \$230,000 this year.

On the appropriations side of the budget, the general fund's two biggest allocations are \$480,000 for economic development program support and \$260,753 for reserve for transfers.

Carlotis explained to the magistrates that when the occupational tax was enacted, 40% was allocated, by ordinance, for job creation and that comes to \$480,000. This amount will be allotted to the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority and, from that, they will repay \$187,000 a year on the \$2.5 million KACO loan which was used for infrastructure needed at Business Park South. The balance will be used as needed to work for more job creation in the county.

The RCIDA will also be responsible for collecting the monthly leave payments from Source Corp on the building and paying Community Trust Bank directly on the \$2.7 million loan to construct the building.

The \$366,753 allocated for transfers can also be used for job creation, if needed, Carlotis said. He also told the magistrates that since nothing was set aside from the occupational tax for the road department that, the magistrates could use these funds for road projects if they desire.

Other allocations from the occupational tax monies include: **Infrastructure Service.** The program support for the service was raised from \$38,000 a year to \$60,000. In addition the court gave the service \$30,000 recently from the occupational tax funds to help with the purchase of a new ambulance. **Sheriff's Department.** The court approved \$30,000 (includ-

ing benefits) so Sheriff Mike Foster can hire an additional full-time road deputy. The county also pays the sheriff's employment, retirement, social security, health insurance, from the general fund.

County Parks: A new line item in the budget provides \$96,000 this next fiscal year for program support for a new county park system. Carlotis told the court he would like to see several "Quail Parks in the county."

Fire Departments: The county already provides \$53,000 for gas, parts, insurance, radio dispatch communication equipment, etc. for the six fire departments in the county and a new \$75,000 line item was included in this year's budget, from the occupational tax revenue, for the departments.

Part of the \$75,000 will be spent at Western Rockcastle Fire Department which will get a substantial face lift for their building. The cost of the project has not been determined. Carlotis said.

Livingston Fire & Rescue has asked for funds to insulate the ceiling of their fire house, a concrete porch and roof for the rear of the building, an exhaust system for the kitchen, gutting for the building and an overhang and cover for the front of the building, at an estimated total cost of \$13,000.

Bridle Ridge Vol. Fire Department has asked for stainless steel hood and exhaust fan installed in the deep fry cooking area of their kitchen at an estimated \$2,500 to \$3,500 cost. The department also asked that their parking area be resurfaced.

Mt. Vernon Fire & Rescue asked for a new tanker to replace their 1986 International which has 220,000 miles out.

Pongo Fire Department asked for backstop around their building.

To date, Broadhead Fire Department has not made a request to the court for any projects.

In a called meeting Thurs., May 28th, the court opened bids for a new public restroom at the Broadhead Fairgrounds.

The restroom will contain six commodes, three urinals, three lavatories, three floor drains and a water heater.

The bids were for labor for the project only and Rodney's Plumbing from Somerset was the apparent low bidder for installation of the plumbing at \$3,400. Prewitt Building and Remodeling of Mt. Vernon sub-

mitted the only bid for construction of the building at \$12,848.50 and Morgan Electric submitted the low bid for electrical work of \$980. Of the esti-

mated \$35,000 cost, the fairgrounds will pay \$15,000 and the county will pay the additional \$20,000 from occupational tax funds.

Carlotis said that work would begin on the Burnt Ridge Road and then move to other areas. The judge said that Lambert Road would get worked but that only 18 of the 50 segments, needed to be signed by landowners, had been signed and the road could not be widened as planned until all the signatures were acquired. "We'll just have to work where we can," Carlotis told the court.

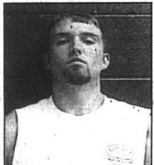

filed, 3) there was a transfer of a large amount of funds by staff without authorization, and 4) ERWA has improperly characterized itself as a public agency in applications for public funds.

We will continue to seek access to the information we need and deserve as member customers of the ERWA. We encourage more association members to become involved in working to gain access to board meetings and to actively participate in the selection of board members. If current board members or officers do not support open meetings, they should be replaced."

"We are making efforts to implement every recommendation the auditor made and because we try to comply with every requirement placed on us by state agencies, we were directed by, and complied with, the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority as to how to fill out our application forms when applying for state and federal money. Our audit showed that the ERWA district and that those projects would be announced very soon.

"The majority of this board is doing everything they can to provide quality water at a reasonable price to our customers," he added.

Although it will be closed, the next-board meeting of the ERWA is Tuesday, June 16th at 10 a.m. in the Livingston Homecoming Committee Room adjacent to Livingston City Hall.

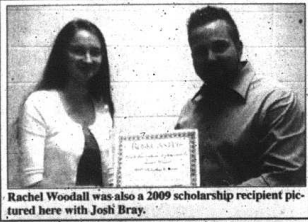

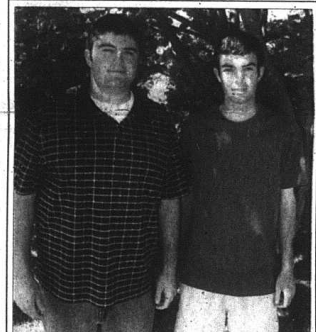
"Agency representatives will be available to talk to participants about health promotion and disease prevention," Purcell said.

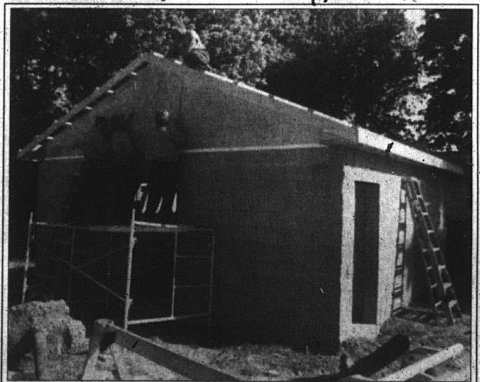

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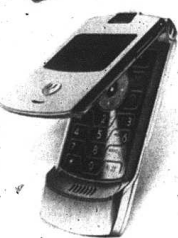
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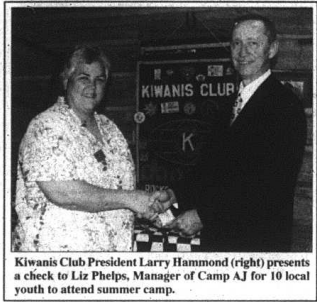
Kiwanis Club sending kids to summer camp

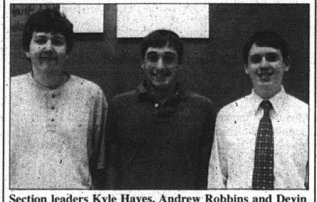
