Fiscal Court gives approval on Tuesday

# **County budget is \$7,470,048**

At a special called meeting Tuesday, the Rockeastle Fiscal Court approved the first eading of a \$77,470,048 budget for fiscal year 2009-10.

The budget must now be submitted to the state and final adoption will be at a June 11th called meeting.

The budget breaks down into available revenue of \$2,470,048 in the general fund.

Of the \$2,470,048 expected revenue in the general fund, the largest influx will be from the occupational tax leviced last year. The county expects to receive \$1.2 million from the payroll tax and net profit tax. The county also expects to receive \$347,800 from the insurance tax but this figure is 75% of the amount received Jax year. The figure was lowered because the City of the Amount received Jax year. The figure was lowered because the City of Mr. Vernon elected to take their share of the tax on insurancel premalums col treatment. tax on insurance premiums col-lected on property within their city limits. The city will begin collecting the tax in October, 2009, giving them three quar-ters of the insurance tax rev-enue which will be received in

2009-10. The insurance premium tax will come to the county in July, since it is for the last quarter of the 2008-09 fiscal year. County Treasurer Joe Clontz cautioned the court that this figure is only an estimate since the state insurance commission will have to determine what property is within the Mt. Vermon city limits, which will determine who gets what.

#### County gets approval for loan for roads

At the special called meet-ing Tuesday, County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis told Executive Buzz Carloftis told the court that final approval of a loan from KACo, for up to \$2 million had been approved and Greer Bros, should be in the county within the next few days to begin work on county roads.

### AG opinion says ERWA can close their board meetings

Ballinger said Wednesday that he would continue to ask that board meetings be closed, because it simply made meet-ings go more smoothly and more business get accom-

Ballinger said he was not surprised by the attorney general's opinion, because the matter had been extensively researched by association attor-ney Jerry Cox and the board-had relied on his advice as to whether or not they were al-lowed to close the meetings.

"I am not surprised by the ruling, when I submitted the request I understood that the non-profit organizational status of the ERWA might likely mean that the Attorney General would rule that the Kentucky laws on open meetings do no apply. However it was reas apply. However it was reas-suring to see the Attorney Gen-eral statement that my reliance on the terminology included in the supporting documents "was entirely reasonable," even though it was "not determina-tive in the case," said

"Although the ruling ex-cludes the ERWA from the re-quirements of the Kenttleky open meetings laws, it does not excuse the ERWA from sound business practices In addition, ERWA has moral and ethical obligations to behave more responsibly since it was created in large part with taxpayer money and continues to rely on money and continues to rely on taxpayer funds for its operation. Avoid other tall or metallic objects such as flag poles, fishing rods, wire fences, or rails. It is unsafe to be in boats, on machinery, cycles, golf carts, or other, on machinery, cycles, golf carts, or other, and the only warning sign you may get is having your hair stand on end, which is static electricity building up. This is a sign that may mean a lightning strike is imminent. If you do get caught out in the open, you should seek a low spot, such as in a valley or gully (if it's relatively dry). If you are in the open and can not find a low spot, it is best to kneel down and put your hands on your knees. If you are in the woods, seek a low spot or a dense growth of small trees. People in a crowd should spread out so not everyone is injured if there is a strike nearby.

If someone is struck by lightning, CPR should be started. Doing mouth-to-mouth resuscitation is most important since a person's freathing remains paralyzed longer than his heart is stopped in these cases. Call 911 and continue CPR until help arrives.

Summer is the time of year when electrical storms are common but it is easy to forget that lightning is a real hazard.
Actually it causes more deaths per year than any other weather phenomenon. About 300 people die each year and twice that

estruck and survive.

or vehicle during storms. Many people
seek shelter from the rain under trees and
are struck. This accounts for about a quar-

ter of the deaths each year.



## Folks at Believers' House of Prayer feel very blessed

From a store-front building on Main Street in Brodhead to a cozy little country church in Renfro Valley, the folks at Be-tievers House of Prayer feel very blessed. They would like to share their story with your

In July, 1991, Brother Horace Gordon and his wife, Lois, held the first prayer meeting in Brodhead at the home of Namie York Johnson, who was very ill with cancer. After several meetings in her home, Namie encouraged Brother Gordon to start a church in Brodhead Being an ordained minister of the First Church of God, and having sung at many churches in this area with his wife and pastored several churches in Boyle, Lincoln, and Marton counties, and having

hosted a radio program on WRVK in Renfro Valley on two separate occasions. Brother Gordon pastored, the church—a retited building on Main St.—until health issues forced his departure in 1995. Though Mrs. Johnson had become too ill to attend services and passed away on September 12, 1991, her enthusiasm helped foster an additional calling for the little group. Beginning with the services and the services and the services are the services of th

sis. With the decline of Brother Gordon's health, in 1995 Brother Bill Davis, a church member, was invited to be-come co-pastor. Brother Davis come co-pastor. Brother Davis accepted and became pastor after Brother Gordon's depar-ture. Following the change in leadership, the church contin-ued as non-denominational and adopted, the name Believers

Almost from the start, they had a vision for a building of their own. After raising money from a bake sale, at a Memo-rial Day Parade in Brodhead, the church started a building fund in June, 1992, with money left over from the purchase of a vaccuum cleaner. The fund grew, sometimes slowly and sometimes fast, but the church 'held on to their vision of build

Over the years, many people came and went, but only a faithful few came to stay. The church seemed to be at a sta still. When the opportunity came for them to hold services att a little log church at Brush Arbor in Renfro Valley, they readily accepted. Several hun-dred dollars from the building dred dollars from the building fund was spent to buy pews and install insulation in the cabin? On August 23, 1998, they had their first service there with many great services to follow. A lot of the folks who came in

many great services to follow. Al of of the folls who came in were tourists, so they met people from several states as well as many from the local communities. Making many friends they would fiever have met otherwise, the church was still not to see Brush Arbor as its final destination.

In January, 1999, the congregation began having church services in the homes of some of the members, also conducting Wednesday night services at Rainbow Respite Center in Renfro Valley as the area to which God kept calling them. All the while the congregation kept "wandering in the wildemess, they continued to pray for a permanent location, with a sizeable building fund by this time; they began the search for India— aplace to call "home." Attending an auction in the Fuzzy Duck area of Brodhead, Brother Davis was highest bidder on a lot there but

lost it when the property was combined and sold together with other lots. This was not to be "home" either. The subsequent availability

of property on Old Dowell Farm Road saw church memland which included a mobile home they could use for services. They prayed over it and asked the Lord's will be done. God's answer was, "No. I have something better for you." The adjoining property to that with the mobile home was the place God would finally allow them to call "home." The property was purchased--debt-free--in

After the purchase of the property, they began having services at the Mt. Vernon ommunity Center. Thanks to Ms. Vi Ellis, they were allowed to meet in her building for over to meet in her building for over a year rent-free. It was at this time they came to the knowl-edge of the seventh-day Sab-bath truth and the relevance of abiding-by all ten of the Ten Commandments in the present day. As Brother Din ...... heard declaring on subsequent occasions, "Unlike day. As Brother Bill was often numerous occasions, "Unlike Wal Mart, God does not offer a ten-per cent discount" when it comes to acknowledging and abiding by God's Moral Law, written in stone with His own finger. and warm fellowship.


