He was arrested upon his re-lease from the hospital and charged with murder, operating

Cuc'as, who will be arraigned on Thursday (today,) is being held on a \$100,000 bond. Asst Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy. Bartley said Cuevas, from Metico, is also being held on invelated charges from other counties and that he cannot speak English.

Family members said Mrs. Lovell to Somerset for a shop-ping trip when the accident occured.



"Aching all over" is a difficult symptom for both the patient and the doctor. It can be caused by a variety of illnesses,

Medicines may be usefu of decrease the pain and imgrove the sleep pattern. Trigger points can be injected, and mlassage, therapy may be helpful.

Medical screenings are a great tool for early diagnosis and prevention of discases, but not all screenings are necessarily needed by everyone. It is important for you and your doctor to determine which screenings are most which screenings are most

which screenings are most beneficial for you. Commercial , screening companies have approached businesses and organizations across the state about being host sites for-community screening days. While the convenience and affordability of these services may be at-tractive to some, these types of screenings present several concerns that you should be aware of before you get screened. Community businesses and Organizations may have been

organizations may have been targeted by these companies because of the trust and respect they have in a particular com-munity. Many times, they will

agree to host screenings because they are unaware of typical screening protocol and want to help others. Screening companies may also offer them a portion of the profits for hosting a screening. The Kentucky Department for Public Health does not recommend commencial screening processes outside of a medical facility or without orders from a doctor Doctors are aware of your medical history wand family history - two important factors in determining if you need to be screened for occupant sizes. certain diseases. Some screen-ings should only be done for of us that meet certain criteria such as age, race, sex or have high risk factors. You may not meet any of these.

Many times commercial

may not meet any of these. Many times commercial screening companies will screen for everything, regardless of whether you need it. Some of their screenings have high occurrences of "false positives" or incorrect readings. This could cause you to make unnecessary follow-inp visits for more testing. This additional testing may be much more invasive. In the end, it could cause you a lot of needless stress and anxiety about, your health as well as being costly and time consuming. Be aware that commercial screening gompanies may ask for you to pay the entire amount of the screening up front, and they will bill your insurance companies may refuse to pay for the screenings because they are not medically necessary for you or ordered by your dotter. Always check with

sary for you or ordered by your doctor. Always check with your insurance company before participating in any screening.

If you are concerned about your health, seek medical advice from your doctor. You may also want to review The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Agency for Health Care Research and Quality screening recommendations for chronic diseases. 2) She can spend time trying to understand herself and
working to change herself.
This can happen through reading or keeping a journal of her
thoughts and feelings. She
may also be helped by seeing a

counselor who can help her understand why she has made certain choices in her life. She may benefit from participating in a group with other victims and learning from their wis-dom. Domestic violence shel-ters provide these kinds of op-portunities.

3) She can work to improve her life by going back to school, making new firends or joining groups that interest her. She can take classes in parenting or other topics that would help her in her daily life.

4) She can stop focusing on a relationship and focus on herself. As she works on herself and becomes mores self-confident, she becomes less vulnerable to the abusers of this world.


