Landscaping, finances main topics at Fiscal Court meeting

A matter that consumed much of last Tuesday's regular fiscal court meeting received more attention at a special meeting of the court last Friday.

On Tuesday, the cost of landscaping at Business Park South was questioned by Magistrates Bill McKinney and Jan Stevens, particularly the \$48,500 cost of getting the project to the bidding stage.

The project has been on the court's agenda for a

couple of months, ever since the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority agreed to enter into a contract, subject to approval of the fiscal court, with James B. Evans and Associates to develop a plan for the 100 acre park. Evans' \$48,500 fee would come in three phases -- programming and planning (\$17,500), preparing construction documents (\$19,500) and oversight of bid negotiations and the construction project

(\$11,500).

McKinney's concern was the \$48,500 cost, then the over \$200,000 projected for the landscaping itself.

"We can use local people a lot cheaper," McKinney said. Carloftis agreed with McKinney to the extent that work release prisoners could be used to set out most of the landscaping but added "we need an overall plan from

Vernon-The Mt. Rockcastle County Tourist Commission held an informal meeting at the Rockcastle County courthouse last Friday morning to discuss funding options for the proposed \$6.2 million Rockcastle tourism/conference center or the 'Castle." The project is currently in the design phase and a first draft rendering was unveiled at the meeting. The city of Mt. Vernon recently obtained \$750,000 in funding for the tourist commission to purchase 24 acres along I-75 in Renfro Valley, which overlooks Lake

Linville and the Renfro Valley Entertainment Complex.

Susan Laws, CEO of the local tourist commission, said at the meeting that while the tourist commission will conthe proposed tourist center, they are also working hard to find funding from all sources for the construction phase of the project.

Sgt. Loudermilk has fought in **Desert Storm and Iraq War**

42-year-old Mt. Vernon resident Ryan Loudermilk is one of the few, proud, Marines.

Loudermilk, who joined the United States Marine Corp in 1986 has the rank of Gunnery Sgt. and has served in two wars.

Loudermilk's Unit, which was part of the 7th Marine Infranty, was one of the first to enter Iraq during Desert Storm and in 2002 his reserve unit was back in Iraq, attached to the 101st Airborne.

Loudermilk said last week that he was indeed proud to be a Marine and thought it was very important that we, especially young people, realize the sacrifice that so many Americans have made to protect the freedoms enjoyed in the United States.

With a big smile on his face, Loudermilk said when he enlisted at the London Recruiting Station on his 20th birthday there were no lies.

"The recruiter told me that Marines would be cold, wet, shot at, lonely and tired, really tired, - he didn't lie," Loudermilk said.

Loudermilk, who graduated from RCHS in 1984, said he did not regret the decision to join the Marines and was

proud of the work his units did during the two wars he fought in.

Five arrested during local District Court proceedings this week

County Rockcastle Sheriff's deputies arrested four people on Monday and one on Wednesday after they showed up for court under the influence of either drugs or alcohol.

According to court records, Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds and District Judge Katie Wood agreed on Monday and Wednesday that each of the defendants who showed up for court on Monday and Wednesday should be put in jail for contempt of court because of their condition.

Another person waiting in the hallway on Monday was also put in jail.

And on Wednesday, another person was also jailed during district court for being under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Jailed this week by Judge Wood were Garry L. Denny, 47, who had to appear in court on charges of operating a motor vehicle, under the influence, third offense.

According to Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds, Denny was arrested after he showed up at court "high." Reynolds said Denny was evidently high on prescription drugs.

His son, Shawn, 24, who was waiting in the hall, was also arrested by Deputy Sheriff Barry Adams, and charged with being under the influence.

Shawn Denny pled guilty on Wednesday to the charge and was fined \$100 and costs. His father was still being

Burton did his basic training at Fort Knox, before being transfered to Fort McClellan in Alabama for advanced infrantry training.


In July of 1968 Burton arrived in Vietnam at the Chu Lai Air Force Base, which was located at Da Nang.

soundtrack of my life "Rock Around The Clock" was barely heard above the crowd of wild teenagers in 1955 as we watched the movie Blackboard Jungle at the Vernon Theatre. For many, the song became the anthem of the '50's youth, and it is widely considered to be the song that, more than any other, brought rock and roll into mainstream culture in America.

Rock and Roll is the

I had not even reached my teenage years when I witnessed this phenomenon. I had no idea how this new music would affect my life over the next 50 plus years. "Rock Around the Clock" generated much controversy in the press of the time and uproar among the youth of the day. That song, along with Allen Freed's Clevelandbased radio show, gave the name to this kind of music – Rock And Roll.

There have been countless times when the music of my youth plays in my mind of remembrance. One such example was a fall Saturday afternoon when my grandfather (Pop) and I were strolling in the woods behind his house. I, of course, was listening to my AM transistor radio when Bobby Darin began to sing "Mack the Knife."

Oh, the shark, babe, has such teeth, dear

And it shows them pearly white

Just a jackknife has old MacHeath, babe

And he keeps it, ah, out of sight...

And someone's sneaking 'round the corner

Could that someone be Mack the Knife?

Pop asked, "What in the world is he singing about? That sounds like garbage to me!" He had no idea that the song in question was moving quickly toward the top of the Rock and Roll Top 40 charts. He and most of his age group could not understand our fasVincent's "Be-Bop-A-Lula." Well, be-bop-a-lula, she's my baby

Be-bop-a-lula, I don't mean maybe...

Well, she's the girl in the red blue jeans

She's the queen of all the teens She's the one that I know She's the one that loves me so

That song was on the first album that I ever purchased. My friend Bud Cox and I wore that record out letting it play over and over on my first stereo record player and – with a speaker that extended to the other side of the room! In those days the separation of music and voices was such a novelty. We would say to each other, "Listen to the guitar in this speaker!" That year was 1956.

I suppose the most memorial Rock and Roll event to me as a young man was the death of Buddy Holly on February 3, 1959. He has been described as "the single most influential creative force in early Rock and Roll." In February of 1957, his single "That'll Be the Day" became the number-one hit of the year. I knew every word of the lyrics. I walked around the house singing,

Well, that'll be the day, when you say goodbye


Yes, that'll be the day, when you make me cry

You say you're gonna leave, you know it's a lie

Cause that'll be the day when I die

My grandmother (Mommie Katie) was a very staunch Christian and taught Bible classes at Mt. Vernon Baptist Church. One day she heard me singing that song and said, "David Joe, you should not sing about dying. You know that is not right!" Of course, I never again sang that song in her presence.

In 1958 Elvis Presley released a tune about a newly developed fad that was sweeping the nation – the practice of "going steady." Each one knew where the other one was at all times. There were also tokens of the relationship – a school letter sweater or a ring. His song,

Although organization has been around since 1929, few people are aware of Kentucky Mountain Club

The Kentucky Mountain Club may be nearly as old as the hills, but it's also one of the state's unintended best kept secrets.

Type the group's name into an internet search engine and you're likely to find listings for a Lexington saddle club.

Eliza Rogers, who will quickly let you know she is "Ninety-one years of age, honey, not ninety-one years old," finds some irony in that. A member of the club for nearly 60 years, the Lexington resident once known as "Pistol-Packin' Mama" when she had to walk a seven-mile round-trip to her teaching job at Hell-For-Certain, says "snobby horse people" were one of the main reasons for the founding of the club in Lexington in 1929. A group of 40 representatives from nine different mountain counties in eastern Kentucky came together to start the organization, whose primary purpose was social, educational, and benevolent. Their motto was "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills." The mountain folks with their unique accents and country ways were no doubt causing Lexington's elite to raise their eyebrows as the hill people made their way into the Bluegrass in search of jobs during the Great Depression.

They felt a need to ban together after getting a chilly reception from the locals, according to Rogers.

"There was no doubt the affluent Lexington horsey set didn't want people of our kind in their clubs," she says.

But the mountain people were holding one ace in the hole.

d Nearly all the bankers in Lexington were from the hills,

It published its own newspaper, the Kentucky Colonel. The following is a portion of the November 26, 1897 issue submitted to the book, "The L&N Railroad at Livingston and Surrounding Areas" by Dorotha Jean Shoemaker. *Excerpts from The Kentucky*

Colonel Livingston, KY November 26, 1897

J.E. Cox, bridge inspector for the L&N and one of the cleverest officials, as well, was in town the first of the Tom Farley, night yardmaster for the L&N, has placed his name on our list and here's hoping that he may get ten dollars worth of enjoyment out of the paper every year.

Capt. John Smith has sold to W. M. Fields a lot near the L&N railroad line for \$500. He has also sold him a row of lots just back of the school house and on the new street that is to be opened.

This year, railroad property in the state is assessed at \$42,864,554. This is \$5,565,322 less than last year and \$5,326,029 of bridge

<u>November is COPD Awareness Month</u> Chronic Obstructive Lung Disease Presented by Dr. George Griffith

Many lung diseases have an element of obstruction to air flow leaving the lungs and are grouped into the general category of "obstructive lung disease." Chronic bronchitis, emphysema and asthma are the three main forms of obstructive lung disease. Of these, only

asthma is reversible.

The damage that leads to chronic bronchitis and emphysema is permanent; the progression of the disease, however, can be limited. With proper treatment, the lung damage can be stopped and the efficiency of the remaining lung tissue improved.



Since smoking is the primary cause of obstructive lung disease, stopping smoking is imperative if you hope to save your lungs. Your doctor can give you helpful advice and tips, recommend a smoking cessation program, and prescribe medicines.

An exam and a lung function test will determine how well your lungs are working. A lung function test can pick up lung disease before symptoms develop or wheezing begins. It is also the best way to follow the effectiveness of treatment and the rate of decline of lung function. If the rate of loss per year is greater than normal, more aggressive treatment is needed.

Treatment begins with inhalers that help dilate the airways. Other types of medicines or inhalers that decrease inflammation in the airways may also be prescribed.

Breathing techniques and an exercise program to improve your physical condition is also very important. Oxygen may be needed to decrease shortness of breath with activity. During sleep, oxygen helps to protect against strain on the heart from pulmonary hypertension. A flu shot should be taken each year, and a pneumonia shot should be taken at least once.



and all joined the Kentucky Mountain Club, giving it wide-ranging clout among politicians and other influential people.

In a short time, membership grew from 40 to nearly 500, and by 1954, to 1,500.

The group's growth was well documented in an article in the May 6, 1945, edition of the Lexington Herald-Leader:

"Lexington may be a bigtown in its ways-may be a center of culture and learning and rich tradition and all thatbut if you take the pulse of its people, you'll find its nothing more than an over-sized community of Kentucky mountaineers turned city-slicker.

"Just as few of New York City's seven million were born in the big city, few of Lexington's 50,000 were born here, relatively speaking.

"Most of them, and certainly most of the business and professional leaders, came from humble homes in the hill country of eastern Kentucky.

"And since that is true, it seems only fitting that the Kentucky Mountain Club, composed of men and women from mountain counties in the state, should be the largest club in Lexington"

As a person who often served as chairman of the program committee, Rogers recalls dances and banquets at the old Phoenix and Lafayette hotels that attracted hundreds of members, dancing the night away to the sounds of bands like Tommy Dorsey and Harry James. The group's social gatherings have been attended by all Kentucky governors since the early 1930s, and all have been made life members. One of the organization's most note-worthy accomplishments was getting the tuberculosis sanitarium built at London, helping curtail a disease that was running rampant in the mountains. Following the 1937 flood that nearly destroyed many mountain settlements, club members rushed in to offer aid with money, clothing and food, and labor to rebuild washed-out bridges.

favorite cole crop. Kale and mustard flourishing in gardens right beside the road,

Brummet's Orchard was the destination. There, about 6 miles or so from downtown Crab Orchard out on 39 below the frost line, is where Francis and Rovena Brummet have long cultivated an orchard of some 1,700 trees. Peaches in season come July, Pears in mid September and Apples almost year round. Potatoes grown there on the farm, and are sold unwashed, untreated and just the way you like them if they have any left.

I've never asked the Brummets how old they are. But I do know that they celebrated their 64th Wedding Anniversary back in April and that's close enough. So when I go see them, it 's sort of like visiting Mom and Dad because they treat me like a son and I feel warm all over. And I feel guilty that I'm not there far more often.

And so we filled baskets full of fruit at a pittance of the price you'd pay at any produce store and headed back home and Loretta said to me, "We have to get the Brummets something nice for Christmas" and I asked, "What do you have in mind?"

In 1953, Edith Lindeman and Carl Stutz wrote a song called "Little things mean a lot." Kitty Kallen recorded that song, and it became very popular. In 1954, her recording reached number one on the U.S. Billboard Chart, and other recordings by other artists did very well.

Over the years, I have thought many times about the significance of the simple words in that popular song title, for they have real meaning. Recently, those words took on new meaning for me when I, for a moment, focused attention on a small item that is proudly and prominently displayed on my desk. Indeed, that item, a paperweight made of glass that contains a picture of a building in our nation's capital, is little; it is only three inches in diameter. That paperweight, produced in 2005, commemorates a special anniversary of the organization whose headquarters are located in the building.

I do not know what the intrinsic value of that small item is.

Although it would be easy to do so, I have no interest in checking to see what it might be. If perchance, it was put up for auction at a sale, it might not receive a single bid unless someone had a special interest in the building and the organization it represents.

But beyond the intrinsic value of that little paperweight, it has great sentimental value, for it means a lot to me. I cherish it, and I proudly display it on my desk for anyone to see. For me, its value lies in the fact that a friend, before a special audience, formally presented it to me, and as a part of that solemn presentation, he spoke some very kind and appreciative words that I will forever remember.

While some may become engrossed with the big things of life, there are many little things that do mean a lot. As Eva M. Hinckley wrote, these little things are "the every-day-encountered things...that make life worth the fight.'



the meeting, presented several funding options and told those present that the project is eligible for grant funding at the state and federal level.

But, Speaks also cautioned those in attendance that it could take several years to complete the projects through the grant process.

Because the project could have a major economic impact on the region, he also suggested that locally the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and the city of Mt. Vernon consider a loan package to speed up the construction process.

Bob Mitchell, District Administrator for U.S. Congressman Hal Rogers, told the group that the Congressman was totally behind the project but, given the current state of the economy and the politics in Washington, there would be no way the Congressman would be able to come up with more than \$1 million in earmark funding. He went on to say that Rogers felt that construction of the Castle

would benefit the entire southeastern region of Kentucky.

Mitchell also suggested that those involved in the project lobby State Representative Danny Ford and State Senator Ed Worley for state funds.

Mitchell also said he was proud of the community for the progress that had been made on the project.

Once completed, the facility, is expected to have a \$4 million economic impact.

Rockcastle Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis expressed his support for the project and Mt. Vernon Mayor Clarice Kirby said the city had already shown their support for the project by providing funding for purchase of the property.

To date, the county has not provided any money for the Castle project but Carloftis said there was money set aside from the county's occupational tax to help with the promotion of tourism in the county and he would relay all of the information on the project to the Fiscal Court.

professionals that will make our park a showplace of industrial parks in the state."

During the meeting, Carloftis also explained to the magistrates that the cost to the county would be little, if anything. "We will have money left from a \$1.3 million grant from the transportation cabinet and, if we don't use the money, it will have to be returned to the state and given to some other county."

Carloftis was backed up Friday at the special called meeting when RCIDA president Corey Craig met with the court to further explain financing of the project.

Craig told the court that three grants were received by IDA for necessary infrastructure work at the park -- one for \$384,000 from the Cabinet for Economic Development which was used primarily to build an access road from B&H Tool to the SourceCorp building, another for \$600,000 which was a 70/30 match, mainly for construction of

water and sewer lines. Craig said that bids on this project, originally estimated to come in at about \$431,300 had come in much lower at \$277,616 and the remainder of the funds had been allocated for relocating utility poles, curbing, signs and to take utilities from the cul-de-sac around behind SourceCorp to two other lots. The third grant of \$1.3 million, from the State Transportation Cabinet, which the state received from federal stimulus funds, is a "very flexible grant," Craig said.

Primarily the grant will be used for widening and adding a turn lane on 150, the entrance from 150 to the new access road and blacktopping of the road to B&H Tool.

From this grant, Craig said, is where the IDA expects to have the necessary funds for the landscaping project. Craig also told the court that unless all the \$1.3 million is used within a 12 month period of its receipt, the money will have to returned to the state. "It is up to the IDA and the fiscal court to decide to what extent we want to do this landscaping project," Craig told the court. He also reiterated that nothing has been done contractually with Evans & Asso.

However, the first phase of the contract was agreed to by the court at their Tuesday meeting and Craig said that phases two and three would only be needed if it was decided to do the entire park right now. Magistrate John Holbrook pointed out that nothing further can be done on the project until Phase I is completed.

Stevens noted that he didn't see anything wrong with having a landscape blueprint drawn up and Magistrate Ralph Allen agreed noting "we have spent over \$5,000,000 out there and, while we don't want to waste money but we also don't want to cut corners. The park needs to look good."

However, McKinney said he felt that the "middle man"

was a waste of time and that an architect was really not needed that a landscaper could be hired and told by the court what landscaping needed to be done. But, bowing to the inevitable that Evans & Asso. had been hired for at least the first phase of the project, McKinney then reminded Craig that the court wanted input into the conceptual plan, stressing that very low-maintenance plants and shrubbery would be best. Craig agreed to the input and asked that some court members be directly involved, along with IDA members, in meeting with Evans & Asso. to give them an idea of what the plan should involved. Carloftis then named McKinney, Holbrook and Allen as representatives of the court to the project.

In other action at their meeting Tuesday, Carloftis told the magistrates that the Free Trash and Bulk Goods Drop Off Day, conducted Saturday, November 7th, was a great success. Carloftis said that 264 individuals (some dropping off trash multitimes) and that 10 tons of scrap metal was collected.

At a request of a resident on the road, the speed limit on Carter Ridge was reduced to 20 mph by the court; Caroline Collins was named to the library board, replacing Rebecca Isaacs who resigned; Jerry Cox was reappointed to the Rockcastle Board of Health; approved payment of \$2,500 as half the cost to update the 911 map, for book layout and design from information collected by Norma Reams (to be paid from the general fund) for updates to 911 maps; approved \$10,000 to Western Rockcastle Water district for water lines and fittings and these funds will be reimbursed to the county when Western applies for reimbursement from grant funds and approved payment of \$2,350 for travel and training for the sheriff's department from funds previously allocated to defray the salary cost of another deputy and which have not been used to date.

The court also approved \$5,000 to pay half the cost of mounting and testing a new pump for a fire truck belonging to Western Rockcastle Fire Department. The court also voted to pay 90% of Pongo Fire Department's utilities but discussed revisiting their earlier agreement to pay 90% of all the fire department's utility bills (except Mt. Vernon and Brodhead where the city government pays the utilities).

McKinney noted that the court may have erred when making the original policy because the blanket 90% reimbursement doesn't give the department any "incentive to conserve." Phone bills for the department have been coming in very high and the court decided to revisit the policy before January of 2010 to define what utilities are covered and the actual amount to be reimbursed.



Former Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Rick Brummett, 45, of Mt. Vernon, has also filed for the office held by his former boss, Sheriff Mike Peters. Brummett recently resigned his position as Deputy Sheriff.

Brummett is a third generation Deputy Sheriff. He served as a deputy in Laurel County from 1993-1997 and

the Rockcastle Sheriff's office from 2003-2009. Brummett was a sergeant and supervisor for court security personnel during his time as a Rockcastle deputy, and has also served in many other capacities while at the Sheriff's office. gineers Battallion, which was attached to the 21st Army Combat Infantry, was quickly shipped off to an Outpost, named Boone Hill 35-Fat City, a name the troops gave the outpost.

That is where Burton would spend most of his time in Vietnam.

Burton said the outpost had 13 bunkers and was a frequent target of Viet Cong snipers.

In May of 1969 the Viet Cong overran the outpost and several of Burton's fellow soldiers died. "It was the longest night of my life," Burton said last week.

"The next morning we took care of business, but it is something that I really don't ever talk about or want to talk about," he said.

During his service in the war, Burton carried an M-16, an M-79 and a Grenade Launcher and he was an assistant machine gunner. At one point he also had to carry the radio for his unit during a battle, after a fellow soldier was injured.

Burton left Vietnam in July of 1969 and returned to Rockcastle County.

However he left with a disease that wouldn't be found for two months.

In late September of 1969 Burton fell ill. Dr. Jack Lewis, a local physician at the time, diagnosed Burton with Malaria. Burton went to the VA Hospital in Lexington where he would spend the next 45 days. "Dr. Lewis probably saved my life. I had no idea that I had contracted the disease in Vietnam because when I was discharged I felt fine," he said.

When Burton returned to Rockcastle County, where his father, Paul Burton Sr., was preaching at Bible Baptist Church, he bought a gas station in Burr and ran it for about a year. Burton then decided to take a job as a fireman at the Bluegrass Army Depot in Richmond and worked there for the next 24 years.

The same year he went to work at the Depot, he met and married Linda Elder of Quail. They currently make their home near Roundstone.

Paul and Linda have two adult children, Shannon Bur-

operate today. The United State's involvement in the Vietnam War lasted from 1957-73. 47,424 Americans died in the war. Six of those soldiers were from Rockcastle County.

sweeping and marking two large mind fields between Baghdad and Kuwait City and, in the Iraq War, Loudermilk would only say that his unit saw plenty of action.

His unit lost three soldiers in Desert Storm and two in the Iraq War.

The Gunnery Sgt. said it was the things most people take for granted that soldiers did without during both wars he fought in.

Those included ice, showers, beds or contact with family members. Loudermilk said his unit would go for months without any contact with family members and at times the temperature in the desert would reach 132 degrees.

Loudermilk said it was routine for Marines to stretch ponchos to catch rainwater so they could use the rainwater to bathe.

"It was no picnic in either war, but we knew what was expected us and we did it without question" Loudermilk said.

Loudermilk, who was on active duty for 11 years, served in the reserves until 2005 and said he was going back to the reserves to help with the transition of Marines from being a full-time soldier to a civilian.

Loudermilk, who said he takes the Corps three values, "honor, courage and committment," very seriously, said it was no easy task to make the transition but that he was looking forward to helping his fellow Marines. "I guess I would have to be classified as a Marine for life," he

said.

Sgt. Loudermilk has also been heavily involved in the local Toys for Tots program for the past 13 years, helping youngsters in the county have a better Christmas. The Marine Corps Reserve partners with other local officials and buisinesses each year to provide the Toy give-a-way.


In 1994, Loudermilk, met Kelli Hubbard of Pikeville, who was leasing him and other Marines a home in Lexington.







"The theme for the college was 'Data Driven Decisions," said Mason County Circuit Court Clerk Kirk Tolle, who is president of the Kentucky Association of Circuit Court Clerks. "The college focused on how circuit court clerks can improve efficiency and customer service through a better understanding of technology, database management, legislative changes and court processes.'

Chief Justice of Kentucky John D. Minton Jr. and AOC Director Laurie K. Dudgeon addressed the circuit court clerks and the seven Supreme Court justices participated in a roundtable discussion. In addition, state Sen. Robert Stivers, chair of the Senate Judiciary Committee, and state Rep. John Tilley, chair of the House Judiciary Committee, provided a legislative update.

The college offered sessions on legislative tools, accuracy in case management, driver licensing, court interpreting services, domestic violence protective orders and property bonds. Monica Johnson, acting director for Trust For Life, gave an update on the Kentucky Drive for Life Organ Donation Campaign. The Trust For Life program is sponsored by the KACCC to promote organ and tissue donation through driver licensing.

The AOC Division of Judicial Branch Education provides training conferences for circuit court clerks, who are responsible for managing the records of Kentucky's Circuit and District courts. Circuit court clerks have offices in all 120 Kentucky counties and are elected officials who serve six-year terms. The AOC supports the activities of approximately 3,800 Kentucky Court of Justice employees, including the elected justices, judges and circuit court clerks.

All applications must be printed on paper, completed, and mailed to The Center for Rural Development at 2292 South Highway 27, Suite 300, Somerset, Ky. 42501. Applications for both programs must be postmarked by Jan. 31, 2010.

Rogers Scholars and ELI focus on developing business and entrepreneurial skills, and encourage participants to ultimately use those skills in positions of leadership in Southern and Eastern Kentucky.

Rogers Scholars is an intensive one-week summer session for rising high school juniors in The Center's primary 42-county service area. The program emphasizes the development of technology skills and builds in participants a sense of leadership, an entrepreneurial spirit, and a commitment to rural Kentucky.

Graduates of Rogers Scholars are eligible to apply

for college scholarships from 13 participating Kentucky colleges and universities.

High school freshmen, sophomores, and juniors with a specific interest in business and entrepreneurship can apply for a one-week summer session of ELI. The program promotes creativity and teamwork, and building business and leadership skills.

Members of ELI's firstplace business concept team are eligible to receive a Presidential Scholarship to Eastern Kentucky University in Richmond, Ky. The winning team also will be recognized at the 2010 Excellence in Entrepreneurship Awards (EIEA) program scheduled for next fall at The Center in Somerset.


Recycling trailers available throughout the county
