Nolan is also accused of taking two guns in the rob-



# Girls "Rocket" to State Tourney

It took a major gut-check on Saturday night but the Rockcastle Girls' Basketball Team was equal to the challenge, pulling off the 48-40 win over regional foe Lincoln County on Saturday night at Lincoln County in the 12th regional finals.

14 rebounds by junior center Sara Hammond was a tremendous difference in the game, ice-in-her-veins free throw shooting by Angie Lawrence in the final two minutes of the game sealing the win, steady consistency in the face of a slamming Lincoln defense by senior Jackie Alexander, and the spark provided off the bench by freshman Michaela Hunter was the boost the Rockets needed to bring home the first place trophy.

After two opening baskets by Alexander and one by Hammond, the Lady Patriots jumped out to a 10-6 lead before Hammond got a free throw, Lawrence a basket and Hunter a three pointer to give the Rockets their first quarter 12-10 edge.

Another anomaly of the game was that there was only one foul called against Lincoln in the first quarter and, only three in the second - two on Lincoln and Rockcastle's first, coming with 47 seconds left in the half.

The Rockets extended their lead in the second period, behind two baskets each by Hammond and Hunter to take a 20-14 lead to the dressing room, the last score set up when Hunter knocked the ball loose, Hammond picked it up and threw to Hunter for the lay-up.

The third quarter was a different story. The Rockets went to the 3:45 mark before adding to their half time lead on two of three free throws by Kristen Abney to tie the score at 22 all. Lincoln's senior center Kendra Brown had gone to work under the basket to put Lincoln up 22-20 and she added two more baskets to

at the end of the third quar-

The fourth quarter was scary at first with Lincoln extending their lead to 35-29 calling for a time-out by Coach Chrysti Noble with 6:14 left in the game. The Rockets came out of the time out and Hammond scored on an offensive rebound then put in two free throws to bring her team to within two at 35-33. Lincoln added another basket but Alexander scored and Angie Lawrence got a three to put the Rockets up 38-37 with 3:01 left in the game.

Lincoln took the lead one more time at 39-38 but Hunter answered with a three and a free throw, making it 42-39. Lincoln got their last point of the game on a free throw and Lawrence then put up the last six points, all within 22 seconds, at the freethrow line, in one and one situations, to ice the championship win for her team.

Hammond led the scoring with 13 points, besides getting 14 rebounds and blocking a shot. Jackie Alexander, Angie Lawrence and Michaela Hunter all scored 11 points and Abney rounded out the scoring for the Rockets with 2 points.

The Rockets were defeated last year by Lincoln in the semi-finals and then Casey defeated Lincoln in the finals. The Rockets defeated Lincoln this year in the regular season 63-47 when they were without the services of their starting point guard.

Alexander, Hammond and Lawrence were all named to the regional all-tournament team and, last week, Alexander was accorded 12th Region Player of the Year honors.

# Points East

Logging and strip and surface mining have long since erased the timbered swag there on the north side of the mountain where Pap once had a "sugar camp" high on the hill in the head of Blair Branch just around the slope from bee-tree gap where you could short cut through the hills between Rock House and Smoot Ccreek without having to hoof another dozen miles.

Before he died in 1955, the forest land and all its trees were sacred and not a tree from the old growth forest was taken unless he needed lumber for a special project and, even then, he only culled out trees, one at a time, that were diseased or had been hit, especially hard, by fire or lightning.

A few dozen big sugar maples were scattered here and there throughout 60 acres of woods on the high side of the mountain. Mom used to

tell us that she could not remember a time when the sugar camp did not seem to need some repair every spring and she was born in 1914. She was sure the furnace was built before 1900 because she had sales receipts showing that Pap had sold or traded sugar for other goods in the 1890s

The sugar camp consisted of an open shed, say 10 feet wide and 12 feet long, roofed with white oak shingles to ward off falling weather. The shed covered a rock-walled burning pit/furnace some three feet deep and wide and perhaps ten feet long on top of which was mounted a stir off pan of similar dimensions and it was erected on one of the reasonably flat places on the mountainside.

I can remember Uncle Stevie Craft cutting elder berry branches, poking out the

### Putting a Stop to Diarrhea

Presented by Dr. Callie Shaffer

Diarrhea is very common. People frequently get the stomach flu, food poisoning or other illnesses that cause diarrhea.

Most cases are self-limited and not very serious. Their main risks come from dehydration and loss of potassium.



Dehydration is present when a person's body weight drops by 3-5%. When it drops 8-10%, it is very serious and needs intravenous replacement. Using a person's weight is one of the easiest ways to measure the level of dehydration.

The fluid lost with diarrhea can usually be replaced by drinking more fluids. Sports drinks and special formulations for small children help replace both the fluids and electrolytes, but nearly any type of fluid can be consumed-diluted juices, soft drinks or plain water. Milk should be avoided, however, since it is difficult to digest and may prolong the diarrhea.

Medicines can help limit diarrhea. One of the most effective medicines, called loperamide, is available without prescription. This is quite safe to use as long as the diarrhea is not caused by a parasite or invasive bacteria. However, if the diarrhea persists, abdominal pain increases, your have a fever, or if there is blood in the stool you should see your doctor promptly and not take loperamide.

Rarely are prescription medicines used to control diarrhea, and they generally carry greater risks and side effects, including accidental overdoses.

Medicines cannot work well unless a person also uses dietary discretion. At times of diarrhea, it is wise to avoid milk, greasy foods and excessively sweet foods. Foods that are easy to digest are plain rice, potatoes, toast, crackers and bananas.

# Rockcastle Memories

From Mommie Katie's kitchen to Krispy Kreme

Last week was my birthday, and my wife decided to take me to one of our favorite vacation spots in Tennessee for a few days of rest and relaxation. For the past ten years or so, we have been going to the same condominium in Pigeon Forge. It almost seems like we are home, even if we are away, if you know what I mean. Everything is comfortable to us there because we know the area, do not have to ask for directions, and some of our favorite restaurants are within a few miles.

On Saturday night we went to one of our choice spots for dinner in Gatlinburg called the Cherokee Grill, and on our return to the condo, we stopped at Krispy Kreme to pick up a dozen prized doughnuts. We usually make this stop instead of having dessert at the restaurant so we can continue to enjoy them all weekend.

Krispy Kreme began serving their secret concoction on July 13, 1937 in Winston-Salem, North Carolina and has expanded its stores all over the United States. It is hard to believe that the company is 93 years old and still growing.

Every time I bite into one of these famous yeast-raised doughnuts, I am reminded of my grandmother (Mommie Katie) and her own recipe for home-made doughnuts. I am not positive just how she made them, but I did watch her very carefully when she got into the mood to deep fry her special treats. She allowed me to sit on a tall kitchen stool and watch her do her magic. I am not a cook so I am not sure why she did some of this, but some of you "real" cooks might be able to explain her process to me.

The first thing Mommie Katie did was to get out all of the ingredients and set them on her kitchen table. This much I remember in great detail because I loved them so! The ingredients included: whole milk, real butter, sugar, salt, fresh eggs, dry yeast, flour, and cooking oil. After selecting these items for her doughnuts, she prepared her large deep black iron skillet using either grease or

Crisco—I am not sure which.

There is one thing she did that I do not understand – she scalded her milk, or at least that is what she called the process. If some of you real cooks know why she did this, please let me know because it is a mystery to me.

One other thing I remember is that she used two and a half eggs. I am not sure if she used the white of the third egg or the yolk. But I distinctly remember watching her separate the third egg and using only part of it. That too is curious to me.

In a large bowl, she poured the scalded milk over the butter, sugar and salt. And then she added the eggs. At this point, after checking the temperature of the concoction, she added the yeast and let the mixture sit for a pre-determined time. Finally, she slowly added the flour and mixed the ingredients until she had formed a soft dough. She let it rise for about 45 minutes.

As the smell of the yeast began to filter through the kitchen, I always wanted to know how long it would be until we had hot doughnuts. I can hear her now, "David Joe, you must be patient – anything good is worth waiting for."

Finally, she placed the dough onto a flour-covered cutting board and rolled it to a desired thickness using a long bottle that she always used as a rolling pin. I have no idea why she did not use an actual rolling pin, but that bottle stands out in my mind so clearly.

Then she cut the individual pieces into doughnut-shaped sections and carefully dropped them into the hot oil in her iron skillet. After about 2-3 minutes, she dipped them out onto a plate covered with a fresh clean towel.

The last step was to make the glaze that she "drizzled" over the warm doughnuts. I am not sure about her recipe for the glaze, but it included confectioners' sugar, water and vanilla extract – in what amounts I have no idea.

Oh, my goodness! How perfectly scrumptious they were with a cold glass of milk. They were my favorite sweet treat that Mommie Katie made in her kitchen. As I said before, the only doughnut that even comes close to hers is the Krispy Kreme brand.

Someone recently asked me how I remember the details of my past so well, and

That Kentucky license

plate on the back of your vehicle was made by a prisoner.
You may have known that already, but are you also

aware there are dozens more

items made by inmates that

are for sale to the public?

Merchandise varies from furniture to clothing, and even includes a pencil drawing titled Calipari & The Gang.

The artwork depicting the University of Kentucky basketball coach and two players sits on an easel just inside the front doors of Kentucky Correctional Industries (KCI) in Frankfort.

The price is \$125.00, but the work program that "helps to fill the days" for inmates is "priceless," according to Nathan Lynch.

He should know.

The 41-year-old Louisville native was charged with murder following a two-vehicle crash that claimed the life of a 50-year-old woman five years ago. The charge was amended to second degree manslaughter.

A recovering alcoholic up for parole in October, he spends most of his time at the Frankfort Career Development Center.

For the past four years, the clean-cut and handsome man who looks more like a Boy Scout than a prison inmate in his tan clothing, has worked as a clerk at KCI.

Manning the front desk, he is usually the first person to greet visitors to the former Lowes building at 1041 Leestown Road.

A long row of numbers beneath the name imprinted on his shirt is the only clue to his being a prisoner.

"I had a woman come in once, take a look at my shirt and say..."You're a criminal,

aren't you," he says.

While not hesitant to share the good and bad in his life, Lynch prefers to share the respect he has for the skills of fellow inmates while showing off the dozens of items on dis-



March is Sexual Assault Awareness Month in Kentucky and provides an opportunity to highlight year-round efforts to aid those affected by sexual violence and work to prevent future sexual assaults. Through local and state events and campaigns, Sexual Assault Awareness Month highlights sexual violence as a preventable problem.

You probably know someone who has been a victim of sexual assault. Maybe it is a family member, a friend, a coworker, a church member. or a store clerk with whom you have made small talk. You might not know this about them; they might not ever tell you. We know that there is a sexual assault committed in the United States every two minutes. We also know that 1 in 3 girls and 1 in 6 boys under the age of eighteen have been the victim of sexual assault. Additionally, 1 in 6 women and 1 in 33 men will be victims of attempted or completed sexual assault at some point in their lives. Many believe that these crimes are committed by people who are strangers to the victims when in fact twothirds of sexual assaults are committed by people who are

known to the victims. When we think of the people who we care about, these numbers are too high. Sexual Assault Awareness Month focuses on educating both victims and the general public that sexual assault is a crime that has long lasting emotional effects, physical effects, economical effects to both the victim and to society, and can be prevented with everyone's involvement. Cumberland River Rape Victim Services is the local rape crisis center and provides crisis counseling, individual counseling, family counsel-

ing, medical and legal advocacy, support groups, and education to schools and community groups.






# "WHAT IS WRITTEN"

We conclude today our series of studies on the beatitudes by looking at the last of the eight. In Matt.5:10-12 we read, "Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for my sake. Rejoice, and be exceeding glad: for great is your reward in heaven: for so persecuted they the prophets which were before you." This last beatitude comes as a result of living and applying the first seven beatitudes in our lives. Men and women who are poor in spirit, having come to the Lord with a broken and contrite heart, who have meekly obeyed the gospel of Jesus Christ, and who are hungering and thirsting after righteousness will be persecuted. Those who are merciful and that seek to be pure in heart, trying to be a peacemaker will cause the ungodly to persecute them. As Paul said in to Timothy 3:12, "Yea, and all that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution." It appears as one studies New Testament, that the majority of persecutions comes from religious people. Consider the life of Jesus and the lives of the apostles: one sees that most persecutions comes from religious people who are in error. We ought not to get discouraged and downhearted about these persecutions, for Jesus tells us that ours is the kingdom of heaven. Jesus said we are blessed and that we should rejoice and be exceeding glad. Glad about what? Glad that we have a great reward in heaven; and that we stand in good company, for so persecuted they the prophets which were before you.




As Sheriff, I will go after money to hire more Deputies by pursuing additional budget, grants, drug forfeiture property and contributions.

The Great Fires That

Changed Mount Vernon The past few years have brought about a craze that is reaching new heights. There is a desire to discover our heritage as never before. Information about our ancestors, where they lived and how they lived has never been more in demand. Historical societies are cropping up, as well, as are ancestry sites on the worldwide web, and organizations specializing in family research.

There were two great fires that changed the face of Mount Vernon forever. There was at one time a Joplin Hotel on the site of the current Cox Hardware Store. The Cox Building was erected in 1907, so therefore the fire occurred prior to that. The fire was said to have started in the basement of the hotel, where a restaurant was located. The hotel had been built by Ashley Owens, and named for Doctor Josiah Joplin.

The fire that caused the most devastation was the fire that destroyed the old courthouse in 1873. The fire was of unknown origin, and was a bit suspicious in nature, making it a source of rumors for decades.

pith inside them and whittling them into spouts to tap the sugar trees. And then following behind him as he took a brace and bit auger and reamed out new holes a few inches into the sides of the trees. The elderberry spouts were tucked into these holes and every bucket or was tub we could lay hands on were placed under the spouts to collect the sap that would pour from them this time of

The sap was collected, many gallons at a time, hastened to the stir off pan and after much care and patience, rendered off into a syrup that would form cakes of maple sugar if it was boiled to perfection and drained into every tea cup on the place. I remember Mom saying that it too ten gallons of sap to get a single cup of sugar.

By the time I was 8 or ten years old, the old camp had been abandoned and we simply brought the sap down off the mountain and boiled it down in a number 2 wash tub behind the home place. Mom and my Aunt Nan stored most of this as syrup instead of letting it turn to sugar but after pap died, they soon decided that the work was way too much for the pay off. It was one of those old habits that didn't take much doing to set aside.

In the meantime, Pap was long buried, the farm had been split between several heirs, and nobody had much reason to consider the woods to be of the same value Pap had seen in preserving it.

All of the marriage, death, land, and any other kind of record was destroyed. This was quite the blow to those searching for documents regarding their family. As a result of the fire, one must rely on federal census records, cemetery records, or records held by such organizations as the Historical Society. Some cemetery records are incom-

To make matters even worse, the 1890 census records were destroyed by fire in Washington D.C. in the early 1900s. The census records prior to 1850 list only the name of the head of the household, and only numbers other individuals living in the household with given age ranges such as "under 5", "5 to 10", etc. The dates of birth begin to appear in the census of 1900. No census records are in the public record after 1930, at the present. I assume it is due to the various privacy acts in effect today. However, the 1940 census will be made public in April, 2012.

And that harvest amounted to several hundred thousand board feet of ash, oak, poplar, maple, beech, hickory, hemlock, linden and other species until the hills were stripped of mature timber.

Since then, mining and gas and oil drilling have rendered the old place unrecognizable. I can't even begin to figure out where the old sugar camp once set and where ginseng grew there on the north slope and I tagged along with Uncle

Our birthright sold for not much more than a bowl of porridge, the same way Pap had parted with the coal he did not know existed.

I realize this column has turned into crying over spilled milk, but when the land and it's natural resources are gone, it's really, really gone and if you have ownership of forest land, please consider turning it over to the Nature Conservancy or some other nonprofit who will assure that it goes and remains wild and

I promise you faithfully, that my Grand Pap would have given everything he owned away to preservation if he'd had an inkling about what was to come after he was planted. And if that had happened, we might still be able to make a small batch of maple sugar there in the head of Blair Branch.



# RCHS girls' track wins 4th straight state championship

The RCHS girls' track team won their 4th straight Class 2A Indoor State Championship title this past weekend in Louisville at the 50th Annual Mason-Dixon Games Indoor State Championships. The girls' defeated Lloyd Memorial, a strong rival from Erlanger, by a score of 69.5

The girls' team has been undefeated during indoor state championship competition since their first indoor state title in 2006. They went on to repeat as champions in 2007. In 2008, the meet was cancelled for the first time in its history due to a foot of

snow falling in the Louisville area. RCHS was the favorite to win that year as well. The girls picked up where they left off in 2009, winning a close meet against Louisville Central, a Class 3A powerhouse that dropped down to Class 2A due to enrollment. Winning the title this year made their 4th in a row, spanning half the decade.

The athletes and spectators were treated to special guest Kevin Young, world record holder in the 400meter hurdles, who was present to award medals to the athletes during the entire





plenty of comments on the new calendar but, in the end, the board approved taking four days of Spring Break, April 2nd, 5th, 6th and 7th as four make-up days and going to school on Saturday, March 27th and on May 29th, which will also be the last day of school as it stands now, if no more days are missed because of bad weather.

School Superintendent Larry Hammond told board members they could come up with a different schedule and "we will make it fly."

If the board had not of approved the new schedule, school would not have been dismissed for this school year until June 7th.

Mrs. Brown told the board that one of the concerns of going into June was the fact that many teachers are scheduled to go to summer school to continue their education and that colleges, mainly EKU, do not change their schedules.

Hammond, Brown and finance officer Richard Bray, also reminded the board that parents could take their children out of school at anytime, if they are willing to sign the proper papers. "It is totally up to mom and dad, if some students do not attend some of the make-up days during Spring Break," Bray said.

Mrs. Brown said principals are required to sign off on any requests made by parents

Board member Mike Burdette, who said that he had already made reservations for his family in Florida for Spring Break as had other families, agreed that the board's decision was a "no win situation."

Board member Anna Goff was the only board member to vote against the calendar committee's recommendation, although Chairman Martin Vanzant and board member Angie Stallsworth, also expressed their displeasure of the new calendar, mainly because of students having to go to school on Saturday. Board member Dr. Tina Hasty said she did not think there was a better option for the school system.

Some board members asked about extended days, but Brown told board members the the State Education Commissioner had made it very clear that extended days were not an option for school districts.

Supt. Hammond also reminded the board that by going into the first week of June the RCHS track team, which will "no doubt" be competing in the state, would also be af-

Education

fected. And he said state law does not allow high school graduations before the last day of school.

For now, graduation will be held at RCHS on Saturday, May 29th, the last day of school.

The board also approved the school calendar for next year.

The first day for students will be on August 5th and, if no school is missed because of bad weather, the last day of school for students would be May 4th.

The calendar committee also did not include a Spring Break for next year, but Mrs. Brown told the board that if the school system did not miss too many days, the calendar committee would ask the board to consider a Spring Break the week of March 14th through 18th.

### **State Budget**

On Tuesday, a Kentucky Congressional House panel approved a \$17.5 million budget, which cut two instructional days for the state's public school systems.

Brown said, if the budget bill was passed into law, the local calendar committee would have to come up with another recommendation for the board to consider for the 2010-11 school calendar. The state currently requires 177 instructional days, which determines the amount of pay for school employees. The budget approved on Tuesday would cut the number of instructional days to 175, which would lower wages for state education workers thus saving the state money.

maximum of \$250,000 for employees' salaries.

In 2009, Houk paid her employees \$174,000 gross and Clontz pointed out that the \$235,000, approved by the court in January, would have allowed \$200,000 gross for salaries, or an average of \$40,000 per employee. Since only \$174,000 was paid in 2009, Clontz said his recommendation for 2010 was for a maximum of \$180,000 gross for employees' salaries plus \$20,000 for matching Social Security and \$15,000 toward employees' retirement for a total of \$215,000. This would allow Houk to pay an average of \$36,000 to each employee.

This immediately brought a defense of Houk from Gene Caldwell, owner of Thoroughtruck at Conway and a Republican candidate for 4th District Magistrate, who said that he didn't think any other entity of government had been scrutinized like Houk's office has and that he thought

she should be commended for spending less than was set for her salaries instead of being criticized. Houk also received support from a Al DeChambeau who gave Houk's office high praise for their efficiency and professionalism and suggested that there should be "a meeting in the middle" (between Houk and the Court).

Michael McGuire, candidate for magistrate in the 5th District, asked the court why they were allowing their "accountant to override what you say." Clontz countered that the matter was only being brought up for discussion and he couldn't override what the court decided.

Houk's annual salary limit for deputies has been a matter of discussion for the court since January of last year when the court first lowered her request for \$250,000 maximum annual salary for employees to \$235,000 and Houk immediately laid-off two employees in her office.

The justification by the court at that time was that Houk's gross salary for her seven employees increased by \$40,000 in 2008, after rising by \$20,000 in 2007. Houk had estimated in her budget for 2008 that she would have approximately \$42,000 to return to the court in excess fees when, in actuality, the excess fee check to the court was for something over \$400. Houk defended this saying she had explained to Carloftis at the time that she had to upgrade computer equipment in her office and the excess fees had to be used to pay for that expenditure. However, that was countered by Carloftis who said that Houk received \$60,000 in supplemental income from the state that had not been figured in her original budget for 2008 and she had used that, plus an additional \$18,000 provided by the court, for the computer update and her excess fees would not have been affected if her salaries had not in-

creased so dramatically.

In answer to the critics at the meeting, Carloftis said he did not understand why the court was being criticized so harshly since they were "obligated to be good stewards of tax money in the county."

On Wednesday, Carloftis noted that the fiscal court provided \$100,047 from the county's general fund to help with expenses in Houk's office and over \$200,000 to the sheriff's office in their 2008-09 fiscal year.

After much more discussion, Magistrate Jan Stevens made a motion to accept Clontz's recommendation and lower Houk's annual maximum salary amount to \$180,000 plus \$35,000 for benefits. The motion was sec-

onded by Magistrate John Holbrook and passed unanimously.

Afterwards, Houk presented her unaudited excess fees report to the court, with the remark that her "under qualified and overpaid deputies" had managed to turn in \$31,923.12 to the court in excess fees for 2009.

In other business, the court received a check from Larry Denny, representing KACo, for \$12,644.20, representing 11% of the premiums paid them by the county for all-lines insurance, as a dividend.

The court also agreed to add 1056 feet on Doe Lane for county road maintenance and 739 feet to Red Bird

### Jail Budget

The court also approved a preliminary budget for the Rockcastle Detention Center, presented by Jailer James

Miller's budget for fiscal year 2010-11 shows total receipts of \$1,178,162 and expenditures of the same

The main income for the jail is \$766,000 estimated to be received for housing state prisoners and \$233,712 in supplemental revenue to the jail from the general fund.

The main expense items include \$435,000 for office/ supervisor staff, \$180,000 for food and \$98,407 for medical services.


# Tiger Pause





The Rockcastle County Government provides that, effective July 1, 2008, the 1.5 % (one & one-half percent) Occupational Tax (Ordinance No. 23) applies to all individuals, employers, and businesses in Rockcastle County.

# The provisions of the ordinance are:

- (1) 1.5% of each individual's gross wages, salaries and commissions earned within Rockcastle County.
- 1.5% of the net profits of every business from activities conducted within Rockcastle County.

# For net profits purposes:

## For Individuals:

(3) Income reported on Schedules C, D, E, F, 4797 and 4835 may be subject to the local occupational tax.

# **For Business Entities:**

(4) Income reported on ALL business returns are subject to the local occupational tax.

Each business becoming subject to the Ordinance must at that time register for Occupational License Tax.

Registration applications may be picked up at the Occupational Tax office or call (606) 256-8374 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday.



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

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

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

# Lady Rockets win 12th regional championship

The loss of 5 seniors and 2 juniors who decided to skip their senior year left open a lot of questions as to how well the 2009-10 Lady Rockets would fare.

Those seniors helped lead the 08-09 team to a first ever #1 ranking in the polls (for three weeks when Rockcastle was ranked #1 in Dave Cantral's rating the state, in the Lexington Herald-Leader).

The loss of valuable team leadership and a bitter one point loss to region rival Lincoln County in the semi-finals of the region tournament ended last year for the Lady Rockets on a sour note.

The 2009-10 Lady Rockets are led by two seniors and a talented group of juniors used to winning.

At Rockcastle County Middle School the class of 2011 led by Kristen Abney, Shanlee Burton, Sara Hammond, Ella McQueary and Angie Lawrence had a record of 71 wins and 3 losses over a three year period.

This group of ladies won a first ever AAU state title as 10 year olds and participated in the national AAU tournament in Orlando, Florida, and they have proven themselves much capable of carrying on a winning tradition at the Rock, a tradition that has continued throughout this season as the Lady Rockets won 27 games and lost only four.

The Lady Rockets won the 12th region title on Saturday night, which was their sixth under head coach Chrysti Noble.

Since guiding the first ever Rockcastle County basketball team to the sweet sixteen in 1997. Noble has established herself as one of the Commonwealth's elite coaches. During the past 14 years her Rockcastle Lady Rockets have won 20+ games 11 times and this year makes 8 in a row. The most wins were in 2003-04 season when the Lady Rockets went 30-4 and the following year that group did something no other team has ever done and will be difficult to repeat, after winning a tournament against three of the top girls programs in the country the 04-05 team was ranked at #24 in a national poll by iHigh.com.

It has been said in sports that "winning begets winning", and of course we're all familiar with that in Kentucky.

This year's team is no exception, they've proven themselves so far, at 27-4, as high as #4 ranking (MaxPrep-Freeman poll) the 2009-10 Lady Rockets are 5-2 against teams in the final top 25 poll and an impressive 10-4 against teams that have appeared at least once in the top 25 throughout the year.

One of the things Coach Noble has done over the years is to schedule tough teams to help prepare her teams for tournament time.

This year's team is 14-3 against teams playing in regional tournament play and 10-2 against teams advancing to the region semi-finals. They have defeated the top ranked team in the 9th (Boone Co), 11th (Scott Co), 12th (Lincoln Co), 13th (Clay Co) 14th (Breathitt Co) and 15th(Sheldon Clark) regions along the way. They are road tested, 18-2 away from Rock Arena, have won two tournaments, the Max Performance Lady Rocket Invitational at Shelby County and most impressive was the winning of the prestigious Gateway Holiday Classic at Montgomery County where they defeated two top 10 teams, Scott County and Boone County and won each game by double dig-

The Lady Rockets started off the season with a home win over region foe Wayne County, a game in which Junior Sara Hammond recorded her 1000th point. She is now approaching 1,500 and will eclipse the 1,000 rebound mark in. her career, a very rare feat for a basketball player on any level. The first road test was at Lincoln County, the pre-season region 12 favorite and the team that knocked the ROCK out of last season's region in the semi-finals. This game gave a glimpse of just how good this team could be as the Lady

Rockets cruised to an easy win at Lincoln, 63-47. Last year's leading scorer, senior Jackie Alexander scored a team high 26 points. Jackie is one of two, maybe three or four Division 1 players on the roster, having signed a letter of intent to play for West Point and the Black Knights.

The other is Hammond, who has already received numerous scholarship offers from such notable schools as Vanderbilt, Louisville, West Virginia, EKU, WKU, and Austin Peay.

The other two potential Division I players include junior Angie Lawrence who plays summer basketball with The Central Kentucky Angels and freshman, Michaela Hunter. Hunter, along with Alexander and Hammond played for legendary Jim Underwood and Blue Chip All-stars and drew a lot of attention this past summer.

The first loss of the season came at Scott County, a game which the Lady Rockets led by 5 at the half. Junior Sara Hammond played a near perfect game, going 9-11 from the field, 9-11 from the line, 27 points and 19 rebounds as coaches from Vanderbilt, UofL and Cincinnatilooked on. It wasn't enough as they Rock lost 66-69. The two toughest losses would soon follow at the hands of district foe Somerset and rival, Casey County. Both were home games and games in which the opponent dictated the pace of the game, Rockcastle lost to Somerset 49-54 (a win that propelled Somerset into the top 25 for a week or two) and after winning back to back tournaments, 6 wins in 10 days, the Lady Rockets dropped a heart breaker to last year's Region 12 champions, Casey County 45-46, as Casey made the winning shot with 1.5 seconds left.

Following that loss the Lady Rockets would go on an 8 game winning streak, with impressive wins over top 20 Clay County, a game that saw head coach Jeff

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

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

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

Waltz of the University of Louisville Lady Cardinals in attendance to see Sara Hammond and All-State Whitney Belle Jackson go head to head. Hammondjust missed a double-double, 13 pts, 9 Rb and the Lady Rockets dominated winning 55-36. Senior Jackie Alexander did have a double-double, scoring 16 pts to go along with 10 boards. The Rock avenged an earlier loss by winning at Casey County 58-50 and finished off the streak with a 77-43 win at home (a game that had to be rescheduled due to inclement weather) over district foe Pulaski County. With the win the Lady Rockets secured a 1st place seed for the 47thDistrict tournament. This year the district is under a new formula for deciding seeds, each team is awarded one point for a home win and two points for a road win, Rockcastle won the district with 7 points over

Casey and Somerset who each had 6 points. In the Pulaski game Hammond had one incredible performance, an unheard of quadruple-double, 17 points, 18 rebounds, 12 blocked shots and 10 steals.

The 4thloss of the season came away at Madison Central. The Lady Indians have been ranked in the top 5 for most of the season and are now 28-1 on the year. Rockcastle could not get untracked, missing some early shots, Sara Hammond got in early foul trouble. The Lady Rockets did fight hard and led by senior Jackie Alexander's 17 points was in the game most of the way, but in the end falling 48-55.

Heading into region play the Lady Rockets are on a 6 game winning streak with quality wins over a very good North Laurel team, a top 25 South Laurel team, 65-41 and perhaps the most complete game of the season at 69-43 win AT Casey County to win the 47thDistrict Tournament title. A game that saw very balanced scor-

ing, great team defense and the kind of intensity that wins champion ships.

The 12thRegion is a very balanced region. Both Lincoln Rockcastle County and Countystand at the top, both are ranked in the top 5 in the final Cantralls' Rating the State poll. However, it looks like the semifinals will have four teams with 20+ wins. Some of the best girls basketball players in the state, Lincoln's Kendra Brown, Jessica Upchurch and Nikki Bustle, Rockcastle's Hammond(averages a double double 15.6 pts, 10.8 rbs a game), Jackie Alexander, Angie Lawrence(top 15 in the state in free throw %); Southwestern's Danay Fothergill(ranks 3rdin scoring in the state.) Mercer County and Lincoln County are led by several seniors which could be an edge.

In the end the game that counts is this Saturday night, March 6th at Lincoln County High School. Should be a good one.

And what an ending it was. The Lady Rockets swept through the 12th region tournament with wins over a vastly improved and young Garrard Countyteam, 63-50. Senior Jackie Alexander led a balanced scoring with 21, and junior Angie Lawrence who has been playing "lights out" since making a halfcout shot against South Laurel in the season finale scored 19.

The Lady Rockets played another young and improving team in Monticello, who had upset Mercer County in the opening round. Both teams like to the up tempo, transition game, however, The Lady Rockets are perhaps the best team in the commonwealth at that sty le of game and jump out to a 17-0 lead on their way to winning with total domination, 78-41. Junior Sara Hammondled another balanced attack with 18 and freshman, Michaela Hunter came off the bench to score 12.

That win along with Lincoln County's win over Southwestern Pulaski set up the game that everyone in the 12thregion had been hoping for, #4 ranked Lincoln County and #5 ranked Rockcastle County. Many people predicted a Lincoln County victory. Lincoln has 6 seniors, playing on their home court, a 19 game winning streak and the retirement of head coach, Don Story...

The Lady Patriots jumped out to an early 10-6 lead, but the Rock stayed poised and thanks to the inspiring play of freshman Michaela Hunter, led 20-14 at the half. Lincoln County responded in the 3rdquarter by scoring the first 8 points to take a 22-20 lead, a lead they would enjoy until Sara Hammond and Michaela Hunter took over in the 4thquarter. Trailing 37-31 with 6 minutes to go, Hammond scored on back-toback offensive rebounds, a put back and two free throws. Then trailing 39-37 The Rock took the lead on a Hunter 3 point goal, 40-39. Junior Angie Lawrence, one of the commonwealth's leading free throw percentage leaders, put the game away by going 6 for 6 at the line.

The Lady Rockets advanced to the sweet sixteen at Diddle Arena by outscoring Lincoln county 19-5 down the stretch. Hammond led a balanced scoring attack with 13, Lawrence, Alexander and Hunter each scored 11 points. With the win, The Lady Rockets are now 9-0 in post season play at Lincoln County. Perhaps we can now rename the gym, ROCK Arena II.

Senior Jackie Alexander, juniors Sara Hammond and Angie Lawrence were named to the all-tournament team. Freshman Michaela Hunter was left off the all-tournament team, but most people would agree that she should have been placed on the all-tournament team.

The Lady Rockets, representing the 12th region, have a good drawing for the sweet sixteen this week at Diddle Arena on the campus of Western Kentucky University

Game time is 7:30(EDST). The ROCK will face off with region one champion Murray, who captured the first region title with an overtime win over rival Calloway County, 45-44.

Murray is an impressive 30-4 on the season and appeared in the All A classic losing in the quarterfinals to Newport Catholic.

Most coaches predict Rockcastle will be a favorite. The Lady Rockets are an impressive 6-1 against teams in this year's state tournament, with wins over Boone County, Scott County, Clay County and Breathitt County.

Tim Estes with WPBK FM in Lincoln county was predicting a Saturday night show down between Rockcastle and Marion County.

If the Lady Rockets could make it to the championship game they should feel really good about their chances. The Lady Rockets faced off this past summer against Marion County in the state high school AAU tournament and led the states #1 ranked team for most of the game by double digits mid way through the 4th quarter before falling by one point on a very questionable foul call.

The Lady Rockets should enjoy a record crowd on Thursday night, because of the late game time start


Head coach Noble said her team would practice hard before leaving for Bowling Green and hoped that they "would be ready to play".


