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The Days Inn at Renfro Valley was robbed for the third time in three years on Tuesday night. Police are looking for a suspect, who is also suspected in a robbery, which occurred early Wednesday morning at a Super 8 Motel in Berea.



Traffic was backed up for quite a time on Friday night after a two car collision on Hwy. 150 in Brodhead. According to state trooper Coby Smith, Deana Hall, 23, of Brodhead and James C. Miller, 22, of Little Clear Creek Road, collided after Miller apparently crossed the center line around 9:30 p.m. Hall was the most seriously injured in the wreck and was transported to the Rockcastle Regional Hospital, after firefighters with the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department had to cut a door off her car. Renfro Days Inn robbed again Tuesday

Mt. Vernon police chief Terry Jackson said on Wednesday that Days Inn in Renfro Valley was robbed at gunpoint around 9:15 Tuesday night.

Jackson said, according to employees, a black man walked into the office of the motel with a handgun and demanded cash.

Jackson said an undetermined amount of cash was taken, but that no one was injured.

The chief said that Mt. Vernon police officer

Jeffery Parker was on the scene in a minute and a half but that the thief had already left the scene in a green Camry.

Jackson said that surveillance cameras at the hotel could possibly be used to identify the robber and that it was likely that a robbery in Berea, at the Super 8 Motel on Wednesday morning, was related. The two departments are working together on the case, Jackson said.

Local man jailed for threatening family members

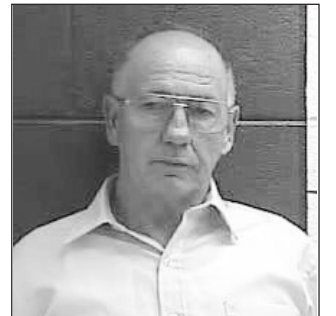
A Rockcastle County man was in district court on Wednesday facing seven charges of intimidating a witness in a legal process.

Kenneth Sturgill, 60, of Sand Hill Road, Livingston, is accused of threatening to kill seven family members, according to records in the Rockcastle Circuit Court Clerk's office.

Sturgill was arrested on Tuesday by Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Shannon Franklin, after a warrant was issued by Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds.

Reynolds said seven members of Sturgill's family signed a warrant for his arrest on Tuesday, after they said he "threatened to kill them all" and if he got

In Harlan murder trial

Local jurors return not guilty verdict

A Rockcastle County jury found a Harlan man not guilty of murder last week, after a four day trial in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

The trial had been moved from Harlan County to Rockcastle because it was ruled that Scott Moore, a retired state trooper, could not get a

fair trial in Harlan County.

The three women and eight man jury deliberated until nearly 2 a.m. before returning the not guilty verdict.

According to court records, the jury returned twice from deliberations with a hung jury, but Harlan County Circuit Judge Russ Alred, a former assistant County Attorney in Rockcastle County, returned jurors to chambers, instructing them to come to a verdict

During the last day of testimony in the murder trial, Moore took the stand in his defense.

Moore, who was also a special deputy for the Harlan County's Sheriff's office, had been charged in the 2007 shooting death of Leslie Cox at a pond in Highsplint in Harlan County.

Cox, of Evarts, died July 3, 2007, at Holston Valley Medical Center in Kingsport, Tenn., from a gunshot wound to his head.

During a confrontation between Cox and Moore, Cox sustained a gunshot wound to his head.

Moore said on the night of the incident, he noticed lights near the pond at Highsplint, and went to check on the situation.

Moore, and witnesses Willie Galloway and Marvin Short who were at

the pond, all testified saying Moore struck Cox once and it accidentally discharged.

Long-time Kentucky resident ready to rip up his roots

When Charlie Crouch noticed huge roots had overtaken an area where a bountiful garden once flourished, it put him to thinking.

A few days later, he invented what he calls a "root ripper," a box with iron bars attached that he fills with rocks and attaches to a lift on the front of his truck.

Problem solved. It's just the latest in a series of common sense accomplishments that have aided the 72-year-old in overcoming a lack of formal education.

A workshop filled with homemade furniture sits behind the beautiful house he and wife Wanda designed and built at Ravenna in 2005.

Each piece is unique and of much higher quality than can usually be found at commercial outlets, according to the self-taught builder.

"When I want to make something, I just sit down and think about it for a few days, then go to building," says the man who dropped out of school after sixth grade.

At age 17, he was working for a building contractor, a task he carried out for two years before deciding to form his own company.

Most of Charlie's handiwork is on display in Lexington, where he spent 37 years as a general contractor working for homebuilders.

He estimates having built more than 400 homes in Fayette County, eventually overseeing the work of three six-man crews.

The Kentucky native took a lot of pride in building quality homes and says he's disturbed by what has become of the homebuilding industry.

"When I look at houses they're building today, it's

obvious they're being thrown together with staples. I'd be ashamed to tell anybody I built something like that," he laments.

After tiring of making frequent trips to Lexington, the self-described homebody opened Charlie's Plumbing & Electric Supply in his hometown in 1990.

After suffering a major heart attack in 1994 and undergoing triple bypass surgery, he decided to sell the business, a decision he says he still regrets.

Never one to be idle for long, he started making furniture in 1996.

Items have ranged from paper towel holders to complete five-piece queen-size bedroom suites selling for \$2,200.

Large cherry magazine racks sell for \$40, more than \$100 less than what racks of similar quality are bringing at Berea craft shows, he notes.

Among the items most in demand are cedar porch swings, with an estimated 100 to 150 sold.

"About four years ago, I had two women pull in here in two SUVs, and they bought every piece of cedar I had."

He points out that people appreciate the fact he uses no nails in building a swing, just glue, biscuit joints, and screws.

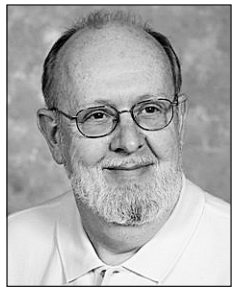
Charlie feels the secret for his success comes from building everything out of dry lumber he and Wanda harvest in the mountains surrounding their home.

Despite using only "word of mouth" advertising, Charlie's handiwork is on display in a very wide area.

"I sat down one day and figured I had stuff in 16 states, from Florida to California."

Rockcastle Memories

Remembering pegged pants and such

A few weeks ago, my sister-in-law, Eva, asked, "David Joe, do you remember those pegged pants?" Immediately my mind took me back to the time at Mt. Vernon High in the late 50's and early 60's when all the boys I knew wore them. We had our jeans tapered just as soon as we purchased them at McBee's Department Store on Main Street.

The memory is so vivid that I even remember the size of the cuff that my mother (Bee) resized my pant legs. Every time I brought home a new pair of Levi's she got out her Singer sewing machine and ripped the stitching out of the legs of my new pants. It was necessary to re-size the entire pant leg so that your pants did not look like balloons at the top compared to the tiny bottom. Each time she began this chore, I reminded her that I wanted the bottom no larger than 13 inches. She was always diligent and reshaped the legs perfectly to my satisfaction.

When the job was complete with my jeans at the desired circumference of 13 inches, it was necessary to take off my Bass Weejuns in order to put my feet through the legs. The style may seem ridiculous now, but it was the craze of the entire teenage nation. From the television screen of the Philadelphia area (where American Bandstand was being telecast to our television sets) to the World of Disney in California, teen boys were wearing pegged trousers, and we wanted to be just like them.

Those were the days when teenage fads slowly crept across the nation, eventually making their way to Lexington and, finally, to Rockcastle County. The clothes and shoes were signatures of a rapidly developing teen culture and, it was important to us to be identified in the same way as other American teens.

In addition to the jeans and Weejuns, there were also the hair styles. At one time I had what was known as a "flat-top" hair cut, but within a few months I could be found with "duck tails" in my hair. When we were freshmen at good old MVHS, one of the fads was to bleach the front part of our hair completely blonde.

I distinctly remember going to the drug store to purchase peroxide and then on to Jesse Cummins' store to get a lemon for that purpose. When I went home that evening and Bee saw what I had done, she almost exploded! "WHAT have you done to your hair?" she wanted to know. Needless to say, she was not impressed, and she let me know exactly how she felt.

The next day at school, Sam and I fit right in with the other boys in our class with

blonde streaks in their hair. If memory serves me right, my school photo was made with my hair in that shape. Bee never came around. To her, it was always that act of "foolishness," as she called it.

However, Bee was pretty cool when it came to my clothes. In those days, I had several pair of jeans and a couple of dress slacks. When Bee did the weekly laundry, she would always hang my clothes on the clothes-line in the back yard; we had no dryer in the house. In order to make my jeans look nicely pressed, she used pant stretchers to form a crease in the legs.

Many of you probably remember those pant stretchers because they really made jeans look funny hanging on the line like that. Pant stretchers were metal frames that you forced through the legs and then pulled them apart to make the wrinkles in the legs disappear. When the jeans dried, the legs looked professionally pressed, and there was a neat crease in the front of each leg.

One photo that I have of several friends and me when we were sophomores shows me with Bass Weejuns, pegged jeans, a short-sleeved shirt with the collar turned up in the back, my hair bleached, and a cigarette in my hand. Actually, most of the guys in the photo looked the same. We were teenagers, and we were proud of our attire. We were simply "cool."

By the time we were seniors in high school, the mini-skirt and bell bottom jeans were becoming all the rage. Most of us did not make that transition until we were away from home or in college - it was a little too funky for our parents. My first pair of bell bottom jeans was purchased when I was a freshman at UK, and I never wore them when I went home to for a weekend visit.

Looking back, I cannot help but note how simple and rather innocent those styles actually were - particularly in light of what I have seen come and go since. I am really happy that I was not a teen when some fashion meant wearing your pants lower than a bent-over plumber. Not only do I find that rather horrifying, I really cannot understand how they manage to keep those britches from hugging their ankles. I think they need a pair of pegged pants.

My Mom considered getting a row or two beans planted, come rain or shine, on Good Friday to be an essential part of the Ester Celebration. It was, in fact, a religious consideration, though I can't recall its foundation. If they had to be planted in mud, so be it. If she was cautioned that a late frost would probably get them she would utter "Oh ye of little Faith", because she had been saving up feed sacks and newspapers to prevent that from happening.

Many a time I've helped her after dark to cover up her early beans and I don't recall her ever losing them. On the other hand we often had so much work in saving it that, in my opinion, they were hardly worth the effort. But I would not have expressed that opinion for fear of being in trouble.

So, if the weather holds I'm going to plant a short row of beans on Friday to go with Oregon Sugar Pod peas, onions, lettuce, spinach, radishes, kale and the like. If it's raining I will not be as obstinate as Mom would have been.

By this time of year she would have tender hull snap peas knee high and we would

already be cutting long beech and ironwood "brash" (brush) for them to grow on. And we would have already been eating the aforementioned greens however sparse and immature the leaves.

She grew at least three big lettuce beds, planted two or so weeks apart at the bases of a few colossal, sandstone boulders that each weighed in the hundreds of tons range that lay there like abstract monuments about the farm.

Her plantings were planned so that we would have greens well into mid summer. As the "big rocks" as we called them, eroded in the rain, the sand and minerals would accumulate around their bases and it could be tilled, bare handed, like prime potting soil. She planted a few onions sets and radishes on the perimeters of these beds and a garden salad, usually laced with bacon bits and scalded with the grease in which it was fried was standard dinner fare seven days a week.

My brothers and many cousins and neighboring kids often played like these huge old stones were forts or

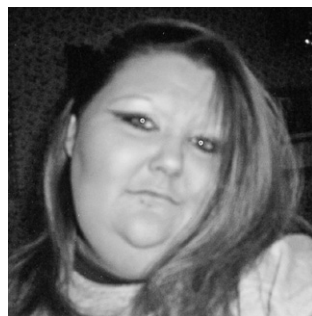

In those days, farm life required constant year-round hard work and with few modern conveniences in the home, the family began talking about moving closer to town. It was the mid-1950's when Bill and Lela Taylor sold the farm where they had lived since their wedding day in 1897 and bought a home on Albright Street in Brodhead. The neatly kept white frame house had the most beautiful pine floors throughout and Hazel kept them shining like a new penny!

Hazel was extremely close to her family and felt a sincere responsibility to care for her Mama and Papa as they grew older. She showed remarkable love and patience for both parents and never once spoke of leaving them in the care of strangers.

Hazel was in her late 30's when she married the love-of-her-life, Theo Nantz. Theo was a kind, hard working, gentle man, who loved and cared for Hazel's parents like they were his own. He was a perfectionist at everything he did, from cooking a meal, to raising crops, working in the grocery store, or his expertise in the building industry.

Bill Taylor was a tall, thin, very strong man who had farmed all his life to provide for his family. When he became seriously ill, Hazel made sure that he had the best care available. When illness finally overtook him, he passed away at the age of 84 with his wife and children at his bedside. He is also buried in the Providence Cemetery along with many previous and later generations of the family.

Theo, Hazel, and her Mama then moved to Lexington where Theo found full-time work. Hazel became a nurse and also worked for the Lexington Herald newspaper. Although never blessed with children of her own, Hazel cared for her widowed Mama like a mother would tend a small child. Lela Taylor was 88 years old when she passed away with a prayer on her lips and her devoted daughter at her side. Hazel was heartbroken at the loss of her Mama, but with Theo to lean on she managed to keep going.

As time passed, Hazel and Theo stayed busy with their jobs and maintaining their beautiful home. But it wasn't long until tragedy struck again when Theo suffered a stroke. Hazel's determination was unstoppable as she remained with him day and night during hospital stays and then tended to his every need at home. From the time that he was first confined to a wheelchair to the last years

that he was bedfast, she was totally devoted to his care. She showered him with love and compassion during his illness for nearly 20 years! Then her world fell apart in December of 1996 when Theo passed away.

She never overcame the grief of losing Theo. But even in all her sorrow she still had her brother Vernon to rely on for help and advice. By then, Hazel and Vernon were the last two surviving siblings of their family. With only two years difference in their age, they played together as children then remained close as adults. Although nearly 100 miles separated their homes, frequent phone conversations kept them in touch. Then in December of 2003, Hazel became the last of the Taylor children to survive when Vernon passed away. She missed him terribly and felt very alone.

The years following Vernon's death were a struggle for Hazel as physical problems and dementia invaded her body and mind. In late 2008 it became clear that she should no longer live alone and after being evaluated by several doctors, she was admitted to the Northpoint Nursing Home in Lexington. Nurses there mentioned that often in the evening, Hazel would go from room to room 'tucking-in' bedridden patients, telling them "good-night and sweet-dreams". Even with a clouded memory she still felt the need to comfort others. Maybe it could be considered a blessing when elderly minds slip away...it's a time when tears are replaced with smiles and sorrowful memories are long forgotten. I'm sure Hazel was ready to go when she closed her eyes on December 19th, with the hope of being reunited with those she loved so dearly.

Dedication to family was definitely part of Hazel's nature but she also learned true compassion by observing the example set by her parents. For many years Bill and Lela Taylor opened their home to several elderly widows who had no way of providing for themselves. And when a

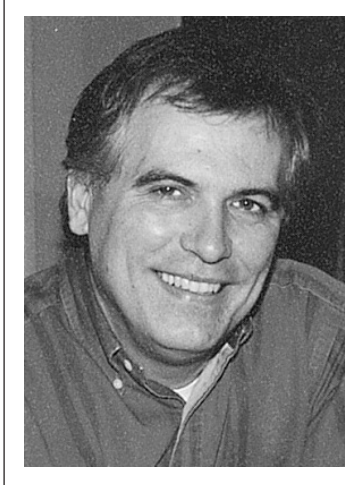

In other words, larger businesses are not accustomed to waiting for infrastructure to be built, and they go to counties that have **INVESTED** in their own future. Rockcastle has now done just that.
- 6) The fiscal court has been able to leverage \$2,100,000.00 (**Two million, one hundred thousand dollars**) in state and federal **GRANT FUNDS** to develop this project.

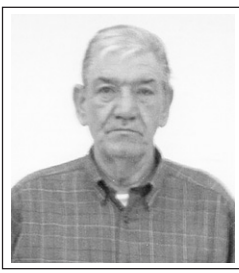

On Thursday, March 18th, Leadership Rockcastle (sponsored by the Rockcastle County Development Board) toured the State Capitol in Frankfort. RTEC provided the transportation for fourteen participants of the 2010 class. First on the days agenda was to attend the Tourism Commission meeting. At that meeting, a bill to expand the Hatfield/McCoy ATV trails to counties adjacent to Virginia and West Virginia was presented to the commission. A representative from the existing Hatfield/McCoy trail explained how ATV trails created great economic development for a small community with a population of 400 in Gilbert, Virginia. They discussed the fact that a model for this trail program has been established in Virginia/West Virginia and offered it to the Kentucky communities involved in the expansion. castles or Navy destroyers and waged many, many battles from the gun ports that nature had carved into them. Often times the "Big Rock" literally in our back yard would be the Alamo and we'd draw straws to see who got to be Jim Bowie, Bill Travis or Davy Crockett. But the more we played, the more sand wore off to fertilize the veggies around the sides.

And, for the record, I'm pretty sure that I shot Santa Anna at least a thousand times and demanded a surrender from his cowardly corps back

in the fifties.

Mom bought first aid salve by the quarts and band aids by the case to patch up knees and elbows of any sailors, soldiers or mercenaries that got shot or wounded after taking a dive out of a gun turret or off the top wall (in the case of The Alamo) and rolled 15 feet down the steep sand rock. But still, in the process of turning away Santa Anta, Rommel, Yamamoto, et.al-we were frequently scratched up there on the big rock and Mom worried about us all the

Apparently she believed that lettuce grew better if it was planted in ashes and it may have.

But we had neighbors who simply tilled in a few coal buckets of chicken manure and seemed to have wonder-

ful crops. Still Mom would mutter and shake her head and contend that certain people were too sorry to burn off a lettuce bed. She, on the other hand, thought it is was great fun and we often roasted wieners, marshmallows or slices of bacon on the embers of the lettuce bed burnings.

In the meantime, all I intend to do is continue to fire up my tiller, but I'd gladly come to your house and haul off a good load of chicken manure if you have any to spare.

What is Meningitis?

Presented by Dr. Kimberly Cornelius

The word meningitis indicates the area of infection, the meninges, which are the membranes surrounding the brain. Meningitis is an infection of these membranes and the fluid which bathes the brain.

Meningitis can be caused by a variety of organisms--bacteria, viruses, protozoa and fungi.

The typical causes in children are various kinds of bacteria. The infections often begin in the ears or lungs and spread through the blood stream to the brain. Fortunately, the hemophilus vaccine has greatly reduced the number of children who acquire meningitis.

In adults, viral infections become the most likely cause of meningitis. Viruses are a common cause of meningitis, but, with a few exceptions, there are no antibiotics to cure these viruses. These viral infections are self-limited and generally do not cause any permanent damage.

The more unusual organisms, such as fungal cells, protozoans or tuberculosis, that cause meningitis often occur secondary to trauma or serious illnesses such as HIV infections or other causes of immune suppression.

Meningitis usually causes a severe headache and stiff neck in addition to the usual symptoms of infection: fever, chills and fatigue.

The diagnosis can only be made by a spinal tap. The organism is identified with stains and cultures to determine which bacteria it is and which antibiotics will be effective against it. Chemistry studies are also done on the spinal fluid to help make the diagnosis.

Meningitis is one of the most severe infections a person can have and it needs to be treated aggressively and as early as possible to prevent brain damage and even death from the infection.



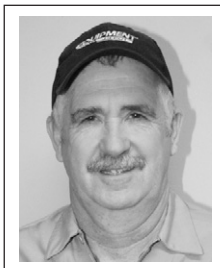

An encouraging word:

A Powerful Message

By Howard Coop



As it began to dawn on the first day of the week, the crowds of people from far and near who had come to Jerusalem for the observance of the Feast of the Passover, made preparation for the return journey homeward. Very early that morning while it was still dark, two women—Mary Magdalene and another person known as "the other Mary"—went to the tomb of Jesus with the traditional spices to anoint his body in accordance with local custom. What they found when they arrived at the tomb left the two women "trembling and bewildered."

As they made their way through the dark, narrow streets of Jerusalem, they pondered a profoundly troubling question: "Who will roll the stone away from the entrance to the tomb?" When they arrived at the tomb, they were surprised; the massive stone placed in front of the tomb to seal it had been rolled away. The tomb in which the body of Jesus had been placed was empty, and the body they had come to anoint was not there. The guards, posted by Roman authorities to secure the tomb, were "like dead men," and suddenly two men dressed "in clothes that gleamed like lightning" appeared and spoke to them in a reassuring way.

A look inside the tomb was revealing. The grave clothes were there, and the linen—some call it a napkin—that had been around Jesus' head

was neatly folded by itself and "separate from the linen," a use of common societal etiquette to give everyone who saw it a powerful message, "I am not finished."

For a moment, Mary Magdalene stood outside the tomb. Overcome with fear and emotion, she cried. But crying was not for long. Someone she took to be the gardener spoke: "Why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?" Then, Jesus said, "Mary."

At once, she knew! Turning to him, she cried out, "Rabboni." For her, the resurrection was real, and Easter has meaning.

"What Is Written"

Last week we looked at the first case of Holy Spirit Baptism in the N.T. the apostles in Acts 2. The only other case is Cornelius and his group. God sent Peter to preach to Cornelius the gospel of Jesus Christ. In vs. 34-43 we read of Peter's speech to this group. Then something very interesting happen as Peter was speaking, notice in, Acts 10:44-45, "While Peter yet spake these words, the Holy Ghost fell on all them which heard the word. And they of the circumcision which believed were astonished, as many as came with Peter, because that on the Gentiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Ghost." As with the apostles, there was no "seeking, praying, anointing, going to the altar, laying on of hands in order to get baptized in the Holy Ghost," God simply poured out the gift of the Holy Spirit. Peter in Acts 11 was "called out on the carpet" about what took place with the Gentiles. Peter rehearses this matter step by step of what took place. Notice in, Ac.11:15-17, "And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell on them, as on us at the beginning. Then remembered I the word of the Lord, how that he said, John indeed baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit. Forasmuch then as God gave them the like gift as he did unto us, who believed on the Lord Jesus Christ; what was I, that I could withstand God?" Observe that Peter calls this a baptism of the Holy Spirit. Notice also, that he has to refer all the way back to Ac.2, of what happened to the apostles on the day of Pentecost to find anything like it. He did not say, "As I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell on them, as on all the churches." Nor did he say, "As I begin to speak, the Holy Spirit fell on them as on us since the beginning," as if this was an everyday occurrence.

Why were Cornelius and his group baptized in the Holy Spirit? In order to prove to the Jews that the Gentiles can be Christians, Ac.11:18. Holy Spirit baptism does not take place today!

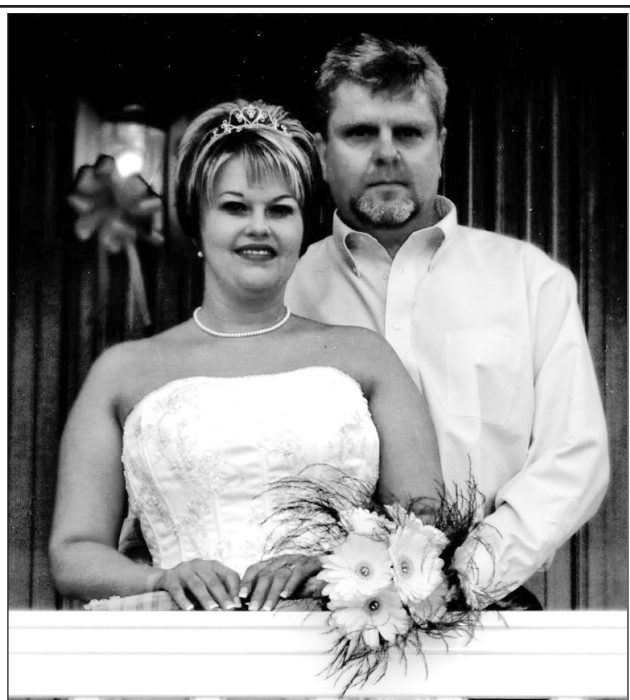

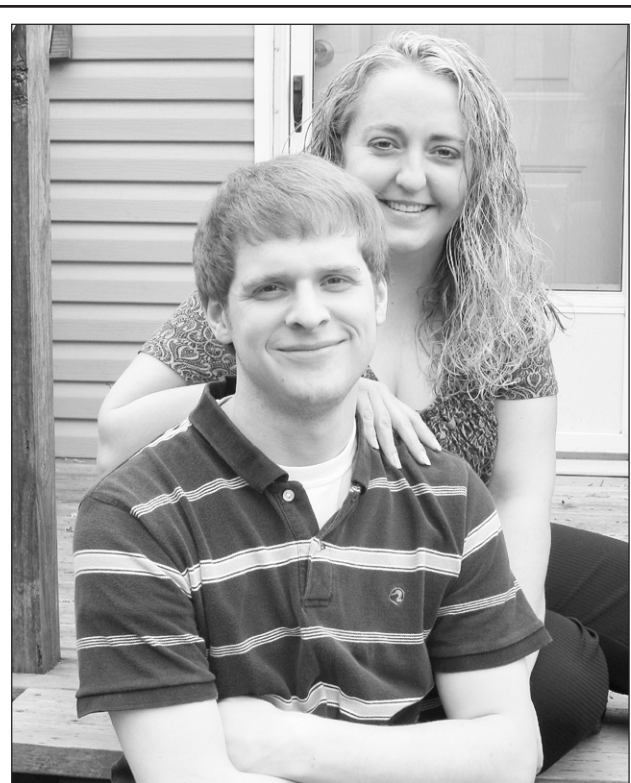

The Roots of Rockcastle

Mary Ida Hunt-Jones was born here in Rockcastle County in 1918, and was raised in a small frame house on what would later become the Harrison and Laura Cook farm. It is located on the Old Brodhead Road, about two miles out of town. This farm now belongs, in part, to my husband Stanley and this small frame house is still standing. Stanley accompanied me on a visit with "Miss Mary" recently and found it to be quite surprising.

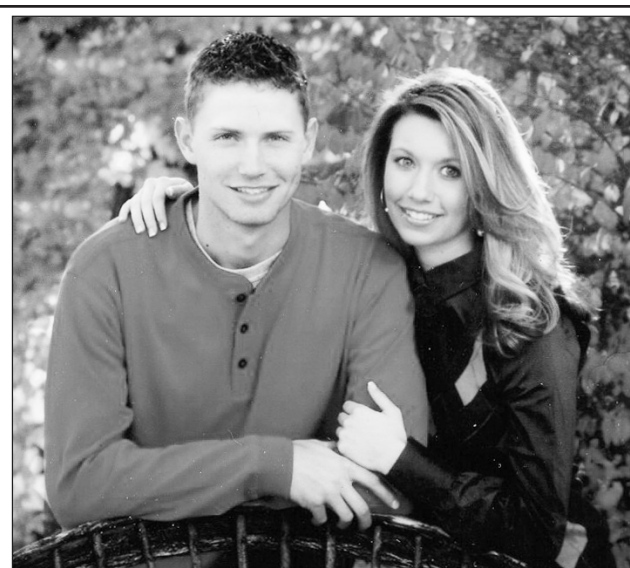
The following are Mary Ida's memories of her growing up here in Rockcastle County. Her parents were Jim and Mary Hunt, and she had four siblings. Mary's first husband was Canney Mullins. The siblings were: Anna Belle, Willis, Sally, and Lula, a half-sister. Sally and Lula were teachers for many years in the county. Willis had been named for his maternal grandfather, Willis Allen. This is where Stanley got a surprise. Willis had a brother, Wyatt, who was Stanley's great-grandfather; so, Mary Ida's grandfather and Stanley's great-grandfather were brothers. Stanley knew that they were related in some manner, but wasn't exactly sure how.

Mary Ida went to school about two miles from her home at the Little Rock School. It was located behind what is currently the Rockcastle Saddle Club. She graduated the eighth grade there, and was very proud to say that she had made straight

A's. After graduating the eighth grade, she attended high school briefly.

Other than going to school and working on the farm, Mary Ida remembers going each week, on Saturdays, to town. The only way to get to town other than walking was on horseback, or in a "jolt wagon". Saturday was the day when most locals went into town to get supplies. The

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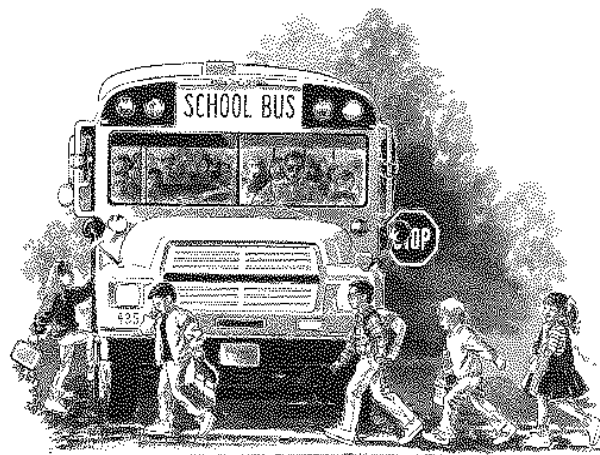

town really thrived that day. Mary Ida married Hewitt Jones, and raised five children. They are: Brenda (who now lives with “Miss Mary”), Barbara (who died of cancer), Michael, Jim and Theresa. Mary Ida ran a variety store in various locations on Main Street for over thirty years. She sold a lot of clothing, what-nots, furniture, or most anything that you could mention. Her children, Brenda and Jim, have followed in her footsteps, and own variety stores on Main Street in Mount Vernon at the present. She has seen her store through “fat and lean years”, and recalled doing quite well, if not in hard times.

In the 1920s and -30s, people from the county began to migrate north in search of jobs. Progress was slow in coming to Rockcastle, but Mary Ida remembers the road being blacktopped for the first time, although she has forgotten the exact year.

Today, Mrs. Mary lives on Main Street in Mount Vernon in a large, two-story, frame house. It stands in sight of one of the stores that she once ran. She still went to the stores with her children until recently, and she still attends auctions with her daughter, Brenda. As a child, she didn't get to attend church often, but now enjoys going almost every Sunday to the Nazarene Church on Town Hill. Although she misses her store, she has a “store-ful” of fond memories about her childhood, and growing up in Rockcastle County.

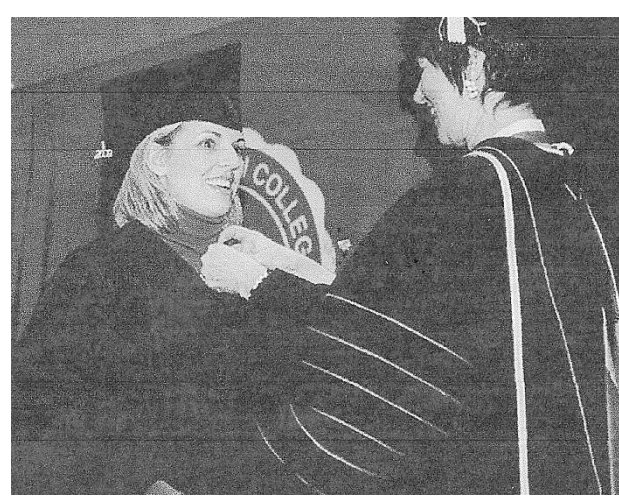

Although she endured losing her husband, parents, all her brothers, sisters, aunts and uncles, several nieces and a nephew – she still saw happiness in life and loved to laugh.

There is no way to tell a life story in just a few paragraphs but it's important in these busy times to pause and recognize those who put the needs of others before their own. Hazel was one of those kind souls.

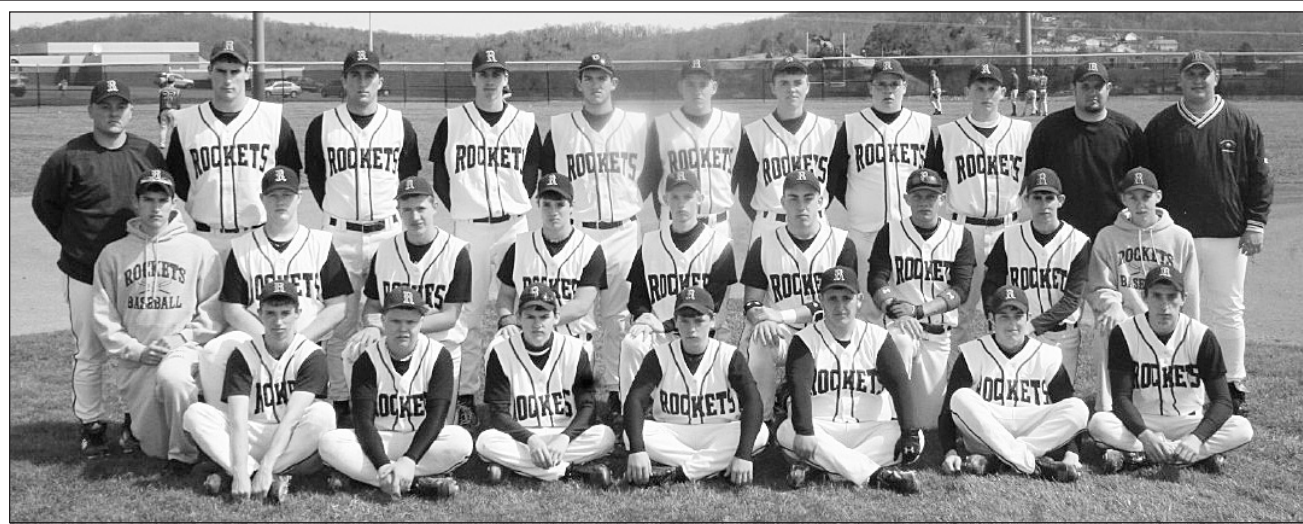

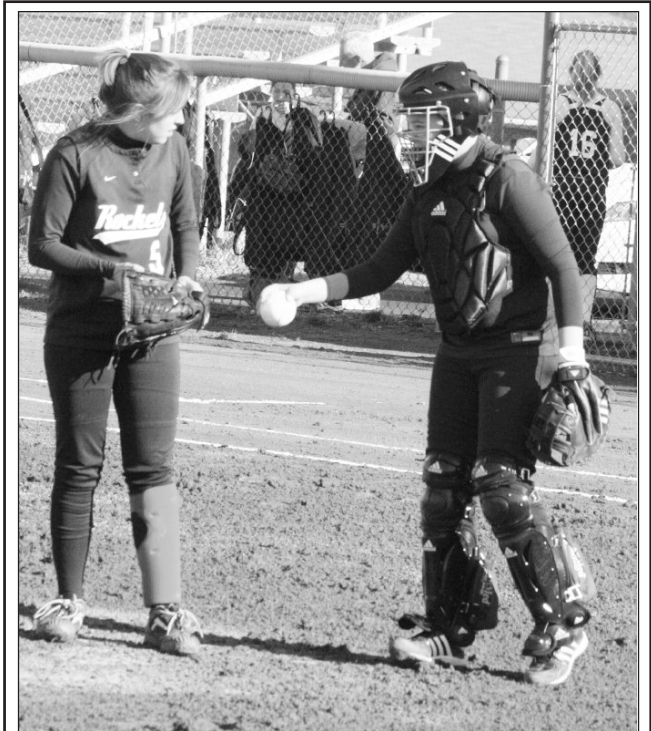

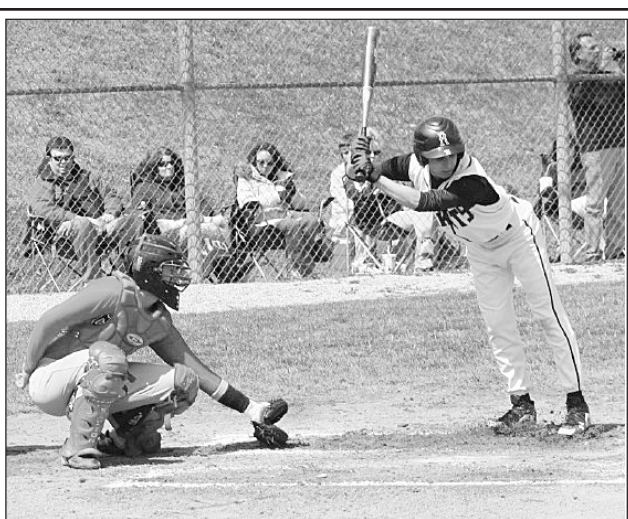

monwealth, Stephen Hughes, a Kentucky State Police firearms specialist, testified saying Moore's SIG 9mm gun could not have discharged from striking Cox.

Hughes said the SIG type of gun had internal and external safeties that prevented the weapon from being accidentally discharged. He said the gun would not discharge from the light striking test he administered and the only way to fire it was for the trigger to be pulled.

The defense attorney for Moore brought into question that if the gun had jammed what the results of the tests would have been. Hughes said the medium and heavy strike tests had not been performed. Hughes said those tests could have damaged the gun. Hughes also said it wouldn't matter if the gun was jammed, it wouldn't alter his test findings.

Numerous people testified during the trial. Some said Moore showed up at the scene with his arm in a sling from shoulder surgery and he wasn't intoxicated, others testified he showed up without the sling and he was intoxicated.

Moore said he hadn't had any beer before he got there, but he said he drank

beer afterwards.

Neither Moore or the Cox family would comment on the outcome.

a mental health petition against him he would "kill them one by one."

In 1998, a Laurel County Circuit Jury sentenced Sturgill to 18 years in prison for the shooting death of his girlfriend, Rebecca Mitchell, in 1996. He was released on parole in 2008.

Sturgill had been out of jail for around two years on parole, when according to court records, he threatened to kill some of his family members on March 11th.

Some of the family members he threatened were sisters, part of a 13 member family of brothers

and sisters.

Rockcastle District Judge Katie Wood set Sturgill's bond at \$100,000 cash or property, which remained the same after a Wednesday arraignment before Judge Wood. Wood appointed Sturgill a public defender and set a preliminary hearing for April 12th.

Rockcastle County Government Division of Occupational Tax Collection

SUBJECT: 1.5% OCCUPATIONAL TAX

The Rockcastle County Government provides that, effective July 1, 2008, the 1.5 % (one & one-half percent) Occupational Tax (Ordinance No. 23) applies to all individuals, employers, and businesses in Rockcastle County.

The provisions of the ordinance are:

- (1) 1.5% of each individual's gross wages, salaries and commissions earned within Rockcastle County.
- (2) 1.5% of the net profits of every business from activities conducted within Rockcastle County.

For net profits purposes:

For Individuals:

- (3) Income reported on Schedules C, D, E, F, 4797 and 4835 may be subject to the local occupational tax.

For Business Entities:

- (4) Income reported on ALL business returns are subject to the local occupational tax.

Each business becoming subject to the Ordinance must at that time register for Occupational License Tax.

Registration applications may be picked up at the Occupational Tax office or call (606) 256-8374 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday.

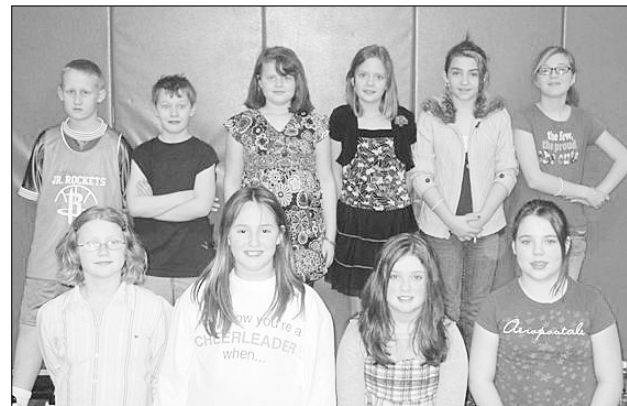

Kentucky's spring turkey season to open April 17th

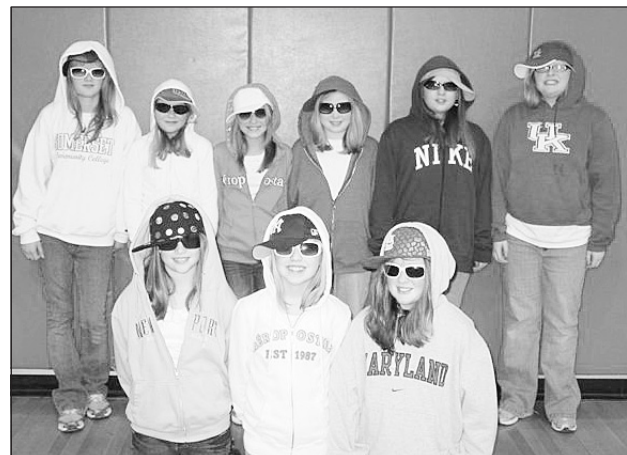
Kentucky's 2010 spring wild turkey hunting season will open statewide Saturday, April 17, and close Sunday, May 9. The youth-only season will be April 3-4.

The Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission, at its August meeting, recommended April's second Saturday as a permanent general season opener, but their proposal has not yet completed the legislative approval process.

The new license year begins March 1 and already

hunters are beginning to plan hunts. Therefore, as in the past, this year's opener will fall on the Saturday closest to April 15.

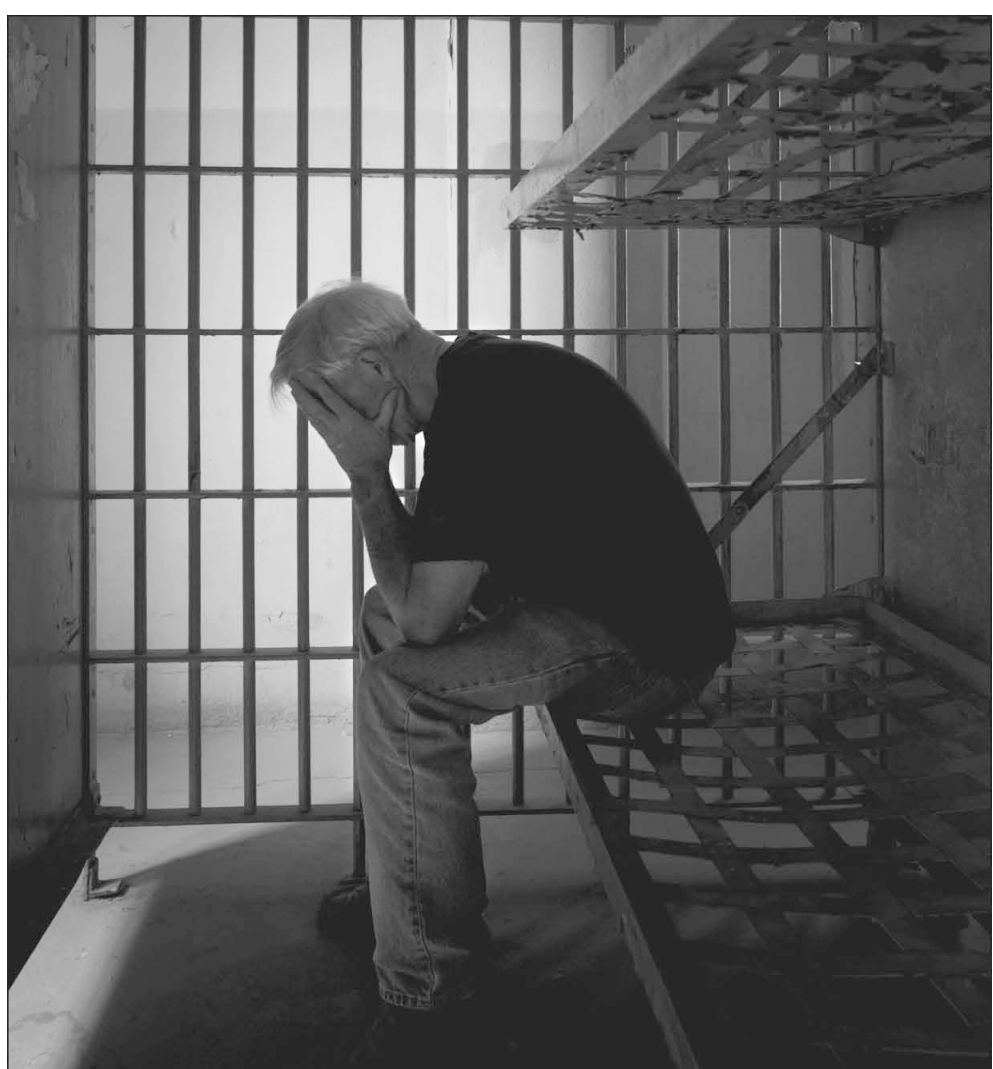

Farmer Incentive to Go Green in 2010

The Governor's Office of Agricultural Policy (GOAP) has announced the availability of applications for the 2010 ARRA On-farm Energy Efficiency & Production Incentives Program. More than \$600,000 is available through this program for 2010. Applications are due to GOAP postmarked no later than March 26, 2010.

Energy bonus incentives are made possible through the Renewable Energy Partnership between the Governors' Office of Agricultural Policy (GOAP) and the Energy and Environment Cabinet's Department for Energy Development and Independence.

The energy stimulus incentive program will provide 25 percent reimbursement of the actual cost of a federally qualified energy saving item, up to \$10,000. Permissible items include, but are not limited to, energy audits, energy efficient farm building components, on-farm energy upgrades and on-farm energy efficiency training. Only ex-

penditures made after Oct. 15, 2009 will be eligible for reimbursement.

All applications received from across the Commonwealth will be reviewed and scored by a committee. Applications meeting the minimum requirements of eligibility will be considered for funding. If the total eligible applications exceed the available funds, the committee will rank the applications using the scoring criteria. Applicants will be notified of their approval.

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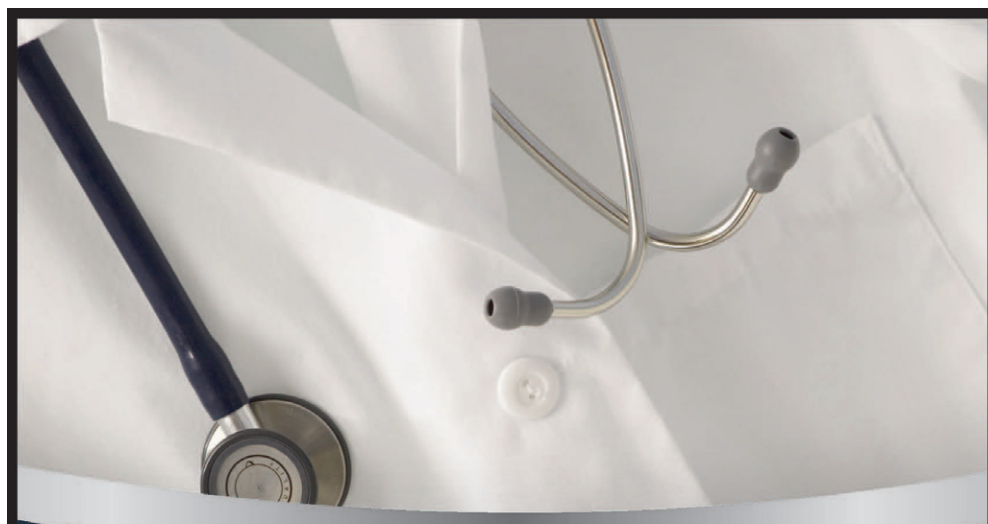
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
