## Nine indicted last Friday

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down nine indictments on Friday for crimes ranging from armed robbery to trading merchandise for drugs.

Rodney Lamont Porter, 39, of Monticello was indicted for a March 30th armed robbery at Days Inn in Mt. Vernon. He was also indicted for possession of a handgun by a convicted felon.

Rockcastle Circuit Judge

Jeff Burdette set Porter's bond at \$150,000 cash or property. He was arrested Monday on Wildcat Mountain Road in Laurel County.

He will be arraigned in Rockcastle Circuit Court on May 14th. Mt. Vernon police chief Terry Jackson presented the case against Porter to the grand jury after he was identified from surveillance cameras at Days Inn.

## Burning ban still in effect

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis issued a 24 hour burning ban for Rockcastle County last week and it remains in effect.

Carloftis said this week the dry conditions in the county warranted the ban.

On Tuesday morning, Livingston firefighters, and members of the U.S. Forestry fire unit, battled a fire near the top of Sand Hill, which Livingston asst. fire chief Russell Barron said was intentionally set on both sides of the road.

Forest Ranger Marvin Stone said 80 acres burned before the fire could be contained. The fires were reported at around 5:30 a.m.

Carloftis said he would announce to the public on WRVK radio and through the Signal when the ban would be lifted.

brought the matter before the court, saying that Jackson County allows ATVs to ride on any county maintained road, including paved ones. However, he said he felt that Rockcastle should open up some unpaved roads, of which segments run through the National Forest, so that riders would have a place to legally ride in the county. National Forest Service employees have been issuing citations in Rockcastle County when they catch riders in the national forest.

Carloftis said that he felt the county was authorized to open up county-maintained roads for ATVs by KRS 189.515. That statute says "(c)...a city or county government may designate, those "public highway" segments of public highways, and adjoining rights-of-way of public highways under its jurisdiction where all-terrain vehicles that are prohibited may be operated."

Carloftis was backed up by Magistrate Ralph Allen who presented the court with a list of six unpaved roads he recommended be opened to four wheelers in the county. Those roads were: White Oak Road, Daughtery Ridge Road, Salmon Hill, Crooked Creek Road, Barnett Valley and Goochland Road. The court originally approved the list but, later in the meeting, had to remove Barnett Valley because it is not a county-maintained road.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds did tell the court that, in his opinion, the forest service could still write the citations under the "supremacy law" i.e., that the forest service would have the final say in the matter. And, 5th District Magistrate candidate Mike McGuire expressed concern that there would be "infringements on private property" by the rid-

## Police find Meth Lab at Days Inn

Police found a meth lab in a room at Days Inn Motel in Mt. Vernon around 1 a.m. Tuesday morning.

According to Mt. Vernon police officer Ed Robinson, the clerk at Days Inn called police around 1 o'clock Tuesday morning about a suspicious vehicle in the parking lot. When Mt. Vernon officer Brian Maupin arrived he found two one step Meth Labs in the room of Robert D. Brummett, 43, of Simpson Road, Crab Orchard.

Brummett was charged with Manufacturing Methamphetamine, first offense, possession of marijuana, cultivation of marijuana over five plants and possession of drug paraphernalia, all felonies. Brummett was also charged with possession of a controlled substance third degree and possession of a controlled substance not in a proper container.

Later on Tuesday, William

## Local woman killed in single car wreck Saturday afternoon

A Rockcastle County woman was killed Saturday afternoon in a single car wreck on Hwy. 618 East in Lincoln County, which occurred around 1:15 p.m.

According to a spokesperson from the Lincoln County Sheriff's office, Brenda Thomason, 62, was traveling from Lincoln County to Rockcastle County when she lost control of her Chevy Impala and hit a tree, crushing in the top of the car.

Lincoln County Deputy Coroner John Profitt said Thomason, who lived at Chestnut Ridge, died instantly from blunt force trauma.

The wreck occurred just one hundred feet from the

### Removing Fish Hooks

When you take a fish hook out of a fish, it seems easy enough, but when it comes to taking one out of your own finger it is entirely different. Each season many people find that there is no way to pull a hook back out once the barb has penetrated the skin.



The common places to catch a hook are in the hands and arms, but it can be almost anywhere, especially areas not protected by clothing or a cap.

Usually the hook will not budge if the barb has penetrated the skin. Even with using a pliers, it is difficult to remove the hook the same way it went in. If simple tricks do not work, a doctor must snip off the eye of the hook

and then use a clamp to advance the hook through the skin at another point rather than trying to withdraw it. This causes the least trauma to the skin.

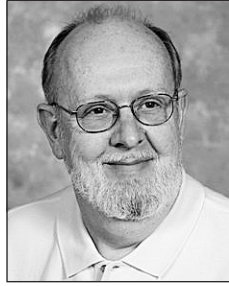
Hooks caught in delicate areas such as the face, eyes, or near nerves or arteries may need to be removed differently to avoid damage to these structures. A surgeon may need to be consulted.

The wound should be cleansed thoroughly with antiseptic soap before and after removing the hook and then dressed with an ointment. A person must be brought up-to-date on tetanus shots, and he should watch closely for infection. Staph infections are the most likely complication under these conditions.

If you get a hook caught in the skin, you should cut the string near the lure, wrap up any other loose hooks with tape or cloth and see your doctor as soon as possible. Avoid using the involved hand or finger. Any unnecessary movement may risk doing further damage to a tendon, nerve, or other structures that might be near the point of the hook.

### Medicine Bottles

I wonder if you remember when each homeowner had to dispense with his own trash instead of just leaving it by the roadside for garbage trucks to haul off weekly? When I was a child living on our small farm in Rockcastle County it was our responsibility to get rid of our own trash. Even in those days (1950's), it was not acceptable for any responsible person to leave trash in any part of the county except taking it to the dump.

My father (Hobe) and my grandfather (Pop) had large steel drums sitting on the back of our property to store trash that was not burnable until it could be transported to the proper site, approximately once a month. Contained in these drums were tin cans, glass bottles, plastic containers, light bulbs, unusable pots and pans, and other assorted items.

Several years after I went away to college in 1962, I was walking around the property and noticed broken glass in the area where the drums had been many years before. Taking a stick, I began to dig around and found many medicine bottles just under the surface of the dirt. It was almost like a history lesson about the illnesses that had been treated by my mother (Bee) and my grandmother (Mommie Katie). Most of the containers were Vicks Salve or Jergen's Lotion bottles, because my mother used both on a very regular basis. As I have said before, Bee treated every cold or flu symptom with Vicks Salve, which she made you consume orally - much to my disdain.

I even plucked a few of the unbroken bottles from the ground and took them home as keepsakes. After washing each with boiling water and soap, I labeled them so I would know where they came from later. Over the years, after getting a degree in biology/chemistry, I started to collect assorted medicine bottles. Some were purchased from yard sales, antique shops, and garage sales. I even got a book explaining the history and prices that each bottle held. One year for Christmas, my mother-in-law gave me a large bitters bottle that I later determined was worth over \$175. That spiked my interest even further.

Approximately 20 years ago, my wife and I purchased property on Furnace Mountain in Powell County. The property, according to the deed, was once owned by the Stratton-Kincaid family many years ago. One of the neighbors at the time, Voyd Lairson, explained to me that he could remember a small house that had been located on the back of the property. The house has long since been demolished and hauled away. The only remnant of the home site is a large collection of jonquils that come up every year and a spot where medicine bottles persistently work their

way to the surface.

When I first noticed the medicine bottles, some whole and most broken, I began to study those were in good shape. I told my wife that we could actually tell lots of things about the family that lived in this spot by the bottles that we found. It seemed interesting to me that the family on Furnace Mountain and our family in Rockcastle County used many of the same home remedies. I found Vicks Salve, Jergen's Lotion, Listerine, and Vaseline, as well as many bottles that I did not recognize.

Several bottles were very interesting. One brown bottle had a label etched on the side saying: Herndon & White Druggists - Richmond, KY. Another was labeled Ely's Cream Balm, and it was also brown in color and only about 2 inches tall. One of my favorites was labeled Dr. Jones Liniment, and it is about 5 inches tall and is light blue. Without an updated book, I am unable to determine if any of these "Powell County bottles" have any real value.

I also found many small blue, brown, and clear bottles that were unlabeled. These are very hard to determine whether they have collectable value because of their unknown source or location of their origin. At any rate, they too seem very interesting to me as I ponder their use by the family who lived here many, many years ago. Is it possible that a member of that family had a remedy that is no longer known or used? Could that cure be used today if the contents of these bottles be determined?

Old medicine bottles have become even more of an interest to me as I get older. How did my parents and grandparents treat illnesses that I did not understand? I often ponder how Mommie Katie treated her arthritis pain, which I now have. Every time I look at one of the unlabeled bottles I wonder if it contained pills, salve, or some balm that was a miracle cure to the user of long ago. Is the company still in business? Is it now labeled differently or even not made any longer? These are some of the questions that I have as I view the bottles sitting on the shelf in an oak cabinet that houses my collection.

Of course, most of these questions are unanswerable, but that doesn't really matter. I enjoy wondering about them and imagining the possibilities.

## The Roots of Rockcastle

The "Lawless River" or can you imagine, "Lawless County"? These were the possible names for the Rockcastle River and Rockcastle County had it not been for Isaac Lindsey. It was named the Lawless River by Dr. Thomas Walker in 1750 and the county may well have followed suit.

Other than Native Americans on fishing and hunting trips, or coming through the area on trading expeditions with tribes to the north, the French and Spanish explorers were some of the first to see what has become Rockcastle County. It is a portion of the Cumberland Plateau which was named in honor of the Duke of Cumberland. He was Prince William, Duke of Cumberland (1721-1765), the younger son of George II of Great Britain.

The Cumberland Plateau was named by Dr. Thomas Walker (1715-1794), a physician and explorer. He attended the College of William and Mary, but never actually received a medical degree. Other than exploring Kentucky, Dr. Walker is thought to have been the first to have trephined bone (removed in a circular pattern) for testing as early as 1757.

Dr. Walker was raised in Virginia, and was the father of two congressmen, John and Francis Walker. He also had

to his credit being the guardian of future president and signer of the Declaration of Independence, Thomas Jefferson, after his father died. He also explored regions of Kentucky along with others in 1750, approximately twenty years before Daniel Boone. Soon, Isaac Lindsey, in 1767, came through the area on a hunting expedition. He and his party observed the plentiful outcroppings of rock formations above the wild river. One such formation, in southern Rockcastle County, just outside of present-day Livingston, evidently particularly reminded him of a castle, and therefore, he called the river "Rockcastle". Eventually, the county bore the name.

The Rockcastle River's source begins in Clay County; the southern portion, and the northernmost portions begin in Jackson County at the Rockcastle-Jackson line. It makes up the border between Pulaski and Laurel Counties before flowing into the Cumberland River.

The Cumberland River, which begins with a small stream in Letcher County, near Flat Gap, Virginia, carries the waters of the Rockcastle over the Cumberland Falls, one of the largest falls in eastern America, and one of the

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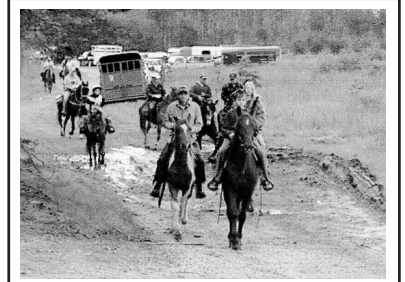

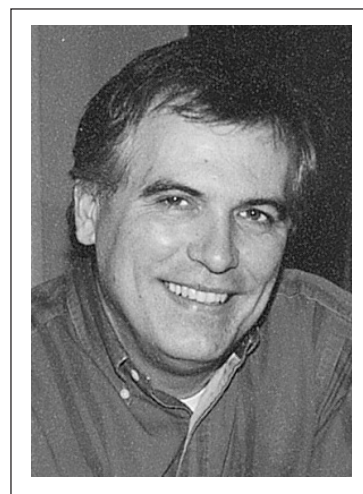

and very proud of this moment in KALF history."

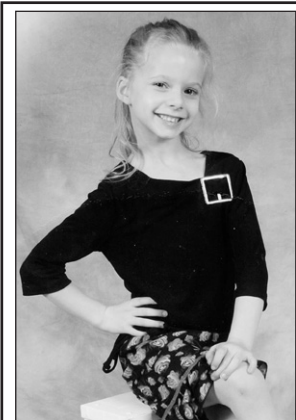

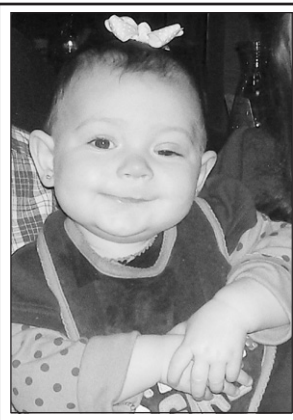

**Crime Information Data Center in Rockcastle County**

*"Information and Good Communications are the Keys to Solving Crimes"*



To solve a crime often requires many bits of information put together and some old fashion detective work. It could be as simple as you telling the Sheriff where your stolen stuff is and just go get it. When the simple method is not available the information we do have must be listed in a fashion it can built upon and understood. Your case information, such as a list of stolen items, date and time taken, location, your suggestions and any other relevant information will be entered in a secure computer data base. This data base of information will be sorted and compiled to show relationships with each other.

Your case number and any other crime tips (color coded by type) will be pin pointed on a huge wall size map of the county to show crime areas needing extra patrol or attention. This data center will let the Deputies know before their patrol starts if they need to be watching for any suspicious activity or people and where their attention needs to be directed.

Until your case is closed it will be reviewed no less then weekly by a team of Deputies. You may also have information added at anytime to help us in our investigation. Phone calls and visits may be made to you, other police agencies and other victims to share or gather additional information. Your name and other personal information will not be shared.

**Feedback and a follow-up to you is a very important part of doing good business. You should expect the courtesy that you are not being ignored or not important.**

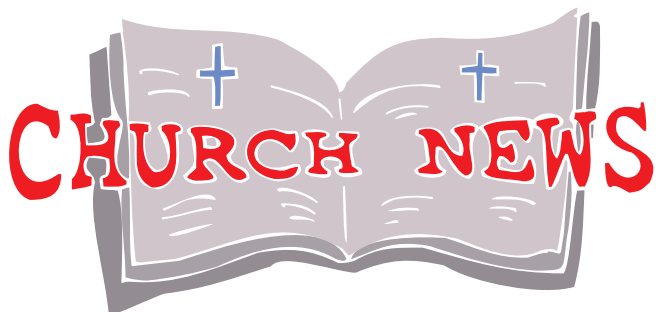

He was an interesting character to know. For about three years, we were members of the same civic club in the community in which I lived. So, through regular association with him at weekly meetings of the club, I got to know him pretty well. One week he would come to the meeting of the club full of zealous enthusiasm. On those occasions, he dominated the conversation, and everyone present, whether they wanted to or not, had to listen to him, for he was the center of attraction. 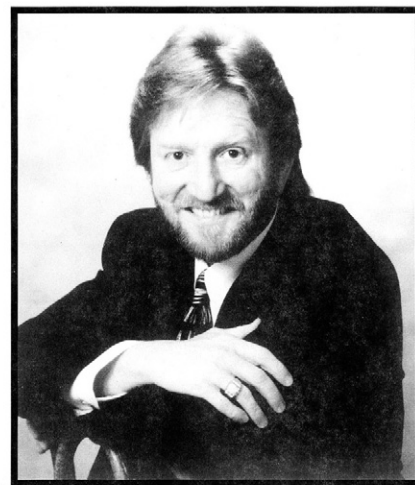

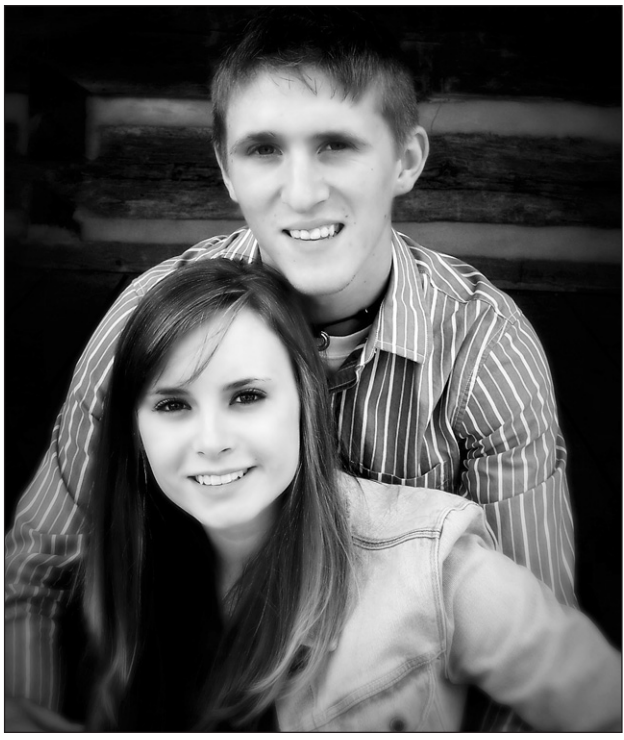

**Census Bureau increases pay for workers in Eastern Kentucky**

In an effort to spur recruitment in the Somerset area, officials with the U.S. Census Bureau have approved a significant pay raise for the region's census takers -- increasing salaries from \$10.75 an hour to \$13.75 an hour.

The Census Bureau is looking to hire more than 10,000 people in Kentucky, about 4,000 of them in the eastern part of the state. Nationwide about 1.4 million people will work in the 2010 Census.

While recruiting in much of the state is over, officials in eastern Kentucky are still looking for qualified candidates.

The Somerset region covers 24 counties: Adair, Bell, Casey, Clay, Clinton, Cumberland, Green, Harlan, Knott, Knox, Laurel, Leslie, Letcher, Lincoln, McCreary, Metcalfe, Monroe, Perry, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell, Taylor, Wayne and Whitley.

Officials there have worked hard to recruit census takers for the door-to-door counts that begin May 1. So

far recruitment levels are at about 78 percent. Officials hope the salary increase will get them to 100 percent within the next two weeks.

The Census Bureau has also obtained waivers from three social benefit programs to make it easier for Kentuckians to work in the 2010 Census. Census employees will not be penalized for income earned in temporary 2010 Census jobs in three programs: Medicaid, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and SNAP Food Stamps. Some exceptions apply to the Medicaid program. Census jobs are temporary and offer flexible schedules, good pay and close-to-home employment. # Rockcastle Early Childhood & Kindergarten REGISTRATION & SCREENING

### Program Options

There are two programs in Rockcastle County that offer free preschool education services to three and four year old children. The program includes: The Rockcastle County Public School Preschool and Kentucky River Foothills Head Start Preschool.

Rockcastle County Schools offers these services through a blended Early Childhood Program that meets both state and federal guidelines.

### What to Bring for Registration

Please bring your child's state birth certificate, social security card, immunization certificate, proof of income and proof of medical coverage (i.e. medical card or insurance card) to register. Call your school with any questions and to make an appointment to register your child.

### Health Requirements

The following health requirements must be met in order to enroll in the early childhood program and kindergarten.

- Physical exam
- Blood pressure and lead screening (*early childhood only*)
- Dental exam
- Vision exam
- Immunizations

### Eligibility

To be eligible for Head Start, your child must be 3 or 4 years old by October 1st and meet one of the following requirements:

1. Meet Federal Income Guidelines
2. Have a disability
3. Be eligible for Public Assistance (SSI, K-TAP, Child Care Subsidy)
4. Meet guidelines for being considered a homeless family
5. Reside in a foster home

To be eligible for Rockcastle County Public Preschool, your child must be 4 years old by October 1st and meet one of the following requirements:

1. Be eligible for Free Lunch
2. Have a disability
3. Three year olds may be eligible with an identified disability
4. Non-qualifying 4 year olds may attend the Early Childhood program as space allows

### What is a disability?

A delay in one or more of the following areas is considered a disability:

1. Speech and language
2. Large and fine motor
3. Cognitive skills
4. Social and emotional
5. Self-help skills

# Tiger Pause

Testing is just around the corner and we need to prepare our students to perform their very best! Here are the top ten tips to success for any test!

**1. Have a Positive Attitude**  
Approach the big test as you'd approach a giant jigsaw puzzle. It might be tough, but you can do it! A positive attitude goes a long way toward success.

**2. Make a Plan**  
The week before the test, ask your teacher what the test is going to cover. Is it from the textbook only? Class notes? Can you use your calculator? If you've been absent, talk to friends about material you may have missed. Make a list of the most important topics to be covered and use that as a guide when you study. Circle items that you know will require extra time. Be sure to plan extra time to study the most challenging topics.

**3. The Night Before**  
Cramming doesn't work. If you've followed a study plan, the night before the test you should do a quick review and get to bed early. Remember, your brain and body need sleep to function well, so don't stay up late!

**4. The Morning of the Test**  
Did you know that you think better when you have a full stomach? So don't skip breakfast the morning of the test. Get to school early and do a ten-minute power study right before the test, so your brain is turned on and tuned up.

**5. Test Time**  
Before the test begins, make sure you have everything you'll need - scratch paper, extra pencils, your calculator (if you're allowed to use it). Read the instructions! You want to make sure you are marking answers correctly.

**6. Manage Your Time**  
Read the question and then

read the answer selections. Re-read the question and then do your best.

**7. I'm Stuck!**  
Those tricky problems can knock you off balance. Don't get worried or frustrated. Re-read the question to make sure you understand it, and then try to solve it the best way you know how. If you're still stuck, circle it and move on. You can come back to it later before time is called. What if you have no idea about the answer? Review your options and make the best guess you can.

**8. Multiple-Choice Questions**

The process of elimination can help you choose the correct answer in a multiple-choice question. Start by crossing off the answers that

couldn't be right. Then spend your time focusing on the possible correct choices before selecting your answer.

**9. Neatness Counts**  
If your 4s look like 9s, it could be a problem. Be sure that your writing is legible and that you erase your mistakes. For machine-scored tests, fill in the spaces carefully.

**10. I'm Done!**  
Not so fast - when you complete the last item on the test, remember that you're not done yet. First, check the clock and go back to review your answers, making sure that you didn't make any careless mistakes (such as putting the right answer in the wrong place or skipping a question). Spend the last remaining minutes going over the hardest problems before you turn in your test.

Follow these test tips, and you'll know you did your best - congratulations!

manufacturing methamphetamine, first offense, possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia in connection with the same case. Officer Robinson said Bullen was not at the scene when the meth lab was found, but that he was an employee at Days Inn and that information provided by witnesses led to Bullens' arrest.

District Judge Scott Lawless set Brummet's bond at \$40,000 cash and Bullen's bond at \$25,000 cash or property.

On Wednesday afternoon both men were still being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center and are due in Rockcastle District Court on June 19th for arraignment.

Officer Robinson said Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff and DEA Drug Task Force Agent Barry Adams and officers with UNITE also worked on the investigation.

County Attorney Billy Reynolds said Wednesday, "He wanted to thank all the agencies in the county for working together in an effort to keep our drug problem under control, particularly in the area of methamphetamine manufacturing."

Wabash, Indiana was pronounced dead at scene.

According to the Kokomo Police Department, a 20-year-old Peru, Indiana woman hit Kirby with her Lincoln Continental as he attempted to cross eight lanes of traffic on foot.

The report said the spot where the collision occurred was not lit and police said Kirby was wearing dark clothing.

The impact of the collision threw Kirby onto the Lincoln's windshield and he was then thrown onto the shoulder on the east side of U.S 31.

The Kokomo coroner said Kirby died from blunt force

trauma to the head. Kirby's sister-in-law Patty Kirby also said Randy Kirby sustained two broken legs in the fatal accident.

The Peru, Indiana woman was not charged in the accident. (A complete obituary appears on page A-3 of this week's Signal).

and team members all celebrating around him, Booher also had Chad Witt on his mind.

Witt was Booher's best friend when he was one of 27 people killed in the Carrollton, Ky., bus crash on May 14, 1988. Booher was one of the 40 survivors and was sitting next to Witt when it happened.

"He's always in my thoughts and prayers about every day," Booher said. "I know he's looking down on me and just celebrating, high-fiving up in heaven. I appreciate that."

Booher had just completed his eighth-grade year at Radcliff Middle School in '88 when the crash occurred. A youth group was returning from Kings Island amusement park near Cincinnati, traveling south on Interstate 71.

Larry Mahoney, who survived, was driving the wrong way on I-71 when his pickup truck struck the bus, causing a fiery wreck. He was sentenced to 16 years in prison after registering a blood-alcohol level of .24 percent. The legal limit at the time was .10 percent.

Booher said he still does speaking engagements on the dangers of drunken driving.

The Homestead Exemption also applies to anyone who is totally disabled. In order to qualify, you must receive disability payments for the entire calendar year and live on the property. You must sign each year before December 31.

ers. “They’ve run through my tobacco patch,” McGuire told the court.

Carloftis noted that with the opening of the roads, there would be certain restrictions on the riders, as detailed under the state law: a valid operator’s license is required; compliance with all applicable traffic regulations; vehicle must have at least one headlight and two tail lights and operation of the vehicle is restricted to daylight hours.

Allen’s motion, seconded by Magistrate William Denny, passed unanimously. Carloftis noted after the motion that if there was a lot of abuse of the privilege, the court could always rescind the motion.

### Rural Secondary Road Program

William Lucas, Section Supervisor for the Department of Highways, was before the court to present the state’s recommendations for the 2010-11 program.

Lucas told the court that the county’s allotment for 2010-11 fiscal year was \$913,576 plus a balance of \$150,662 from the current fiscal year.

According to Lucas’ report, the county has 146.60 miles in the system and routine maintenance costs are set at \$544,000, leaving \$516,376 for improvements.

The state’s recommendation for improvement was for two roads: KY 1912 and KY 2549.

KY 1912 (Climax Road) will be resurfaced from its Jct. with KY 2614 eastward 2.965 to the Jackson County Line.

KY 2549 (White Rock Road - Old 461) will be resurfaced from its junction with US 461 and extending northerly 2.630 miles to the Jct. with U.S. 150.

Several magistrates questioned Lucas about roads in their district, including Jan Stevens who asked about plans for U.S. 25 from Renfro Valley to Berea. The road is in “bad shape” Stevens told Lucas and there have been several bad wrecks on it, including one that killed two girls. Lucas said that the state

was looking into drainage work on the road. Magistrates John Holbrook mentioned the Old Brodhead Road and William Denny the Lower River Road but Lucas didn’t have anything concrete to tell the magistrates about work on those roads.

### Bids Accepted

Bids for the concrete slab for new bleachers at the Brodhead Fairgrounds were opened and Luke Barnett and Johnny Loudermilk were the successful low bidders on the 24x200 slab. Four bids were submitted from a high of \$3,470 to Barnett’s and Loudermilk’s low bid of \$2,400.

Money for the bleachers is coming from a \$94,000 state grant secured by the county.

Bids were also opened for two recycling trailers and Mark’s Welding was the successful low bidder at \$15,690. Only one other bid was received for \$28,810. The money for the trailer will also come from a state grant.

The clean up of eight illegal dump sites in the county brought in four bids but the county was unable to award the contract to the lowest bidder, Carnes Trucking out of Bell County.

Carnes submitted the low bid of \$74,900 but, an examination of the bids revealed that they had failed to include a description of the process and equipment to be used in the clean-up, as required in the bid specifications.

The matter was referred to County Attorney Billy Reynolds who told the court that he did not feel that the bid could be awarded to Carnes since they had failed to include all the necessary documents in their bid and the other three bidders had.

The court awarded the bid to Keeton Excavating out of West Liberty, the next low bidder, for \$86,300.

The state pays for the clean-up and had estimated the project would cost \$138,000, an amount they have already submitted to the fiscal court. The difference will be returned to the state upon completion of the project.

In other business, the court also discussed possibly changing their county order

regarding requiring four occupied dwelling on a road before it could be taken over for county maintenance.

Carloftis asked the court if a business on the road might be counted toward the four needed. After some discussion, no action was taken. County Attorney Billy Reynolds was asked to look at the county’s original order and report back to the court for more discussion.

Former Mt. Vernon Family Dollar Store employees Tammy Elizabeth Cromer, 32, of Christmas Tree Lane, Mt. Vernon and Ella Nicole Cauley, 22, of Disputanta Road were indicted for theft by unlawful taking of property belonging to Family Dollar in the amount of \$500.

Mt. Vernon police officer Ed Robinson said an investigation revealed the two were trading merchandise for drugs provided by Brandon Scott Thomas, 24, and Timmy Brock, 25, both of Mt. Vernon, from December of last year until last month.

Thomas and Brock were also indicted on the same charges as Cromer and Cauley. None of the four have been arrested on the indictment warrants. Judge Burdette set their bonds at \$25,000 cash or property.

Amanda Nicole Bullens, 29, of Orlando was indicted on a charge of first degree robbery for “threatening or using physical force upon Mary Beth Shackles while armed with a knife and while in the course of committing a theft, causing physical injury on January 17th.”

Bullens is being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center under a \$150,000 cash bond and will be arraigned on April 23rd.

Robert Ray O’Rear, 49, of Disputanta Road, was indicted on four counts -- two counts of burglary and two counts of theft by unlawful taking. O’Rear is accused of thefts at Floyd Chasteen’s home in Disputanta in January of last year and at Larry

Cope’s home, also at Disputanta.

Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Shannon Franklin, who presented the cases against O’Rear to the Rockcastle Grand Jury, said O’Rear was also wanted on warrants from Florida and had been extradited to Florida, but that he would be returned to Rockcastle County to face the local charges against him.

Judge Burdette set O’Rear’s Rockcastle bond at \$50,000 cash or property.

Daniel K. Nolan, 23, of McClure Road, was indicted for theft by unlawful taking over \$500. Nolan is accused of taking property belonging to James A. Hursey on March 3rd. He is free on a district court bond and will be arraigned in Rockcastle Circuit Court on June 11th.

Dana Powell, 31, of Brodhead was indicted on failure to pay child support in the amount of \$8,100. Judge Burdette set her bond at \$8,000 full cash which would go to her back child support. Powell has not been arrested on the indictment warrant.

Proffitt said that Thomason may have had a medical condition which led to the the wreck and that excessive speed also may have been a factor because their were no skidmarks on the roadway.

Brindle Ridge fire chief Johnny Bengé said it appeared that Thomason’s vehicle flipped into the tree because there was paint marks from the car as high as eight feet on the tree.

Because the wreck occurred 100 feet inside the Lincoln County line, the Lincoln County Rescue Squad was called to remove Thomason’s body. The rescue squad had to remove the top of the car and the driver’s side door.

Members of the Brindle Ridge Fire Department and members of the Rockcastle Ambulance Service also assisted at the scene.

Thomason was buried Tuesday in the Thomason Cemetery at Chestnut Ridge.

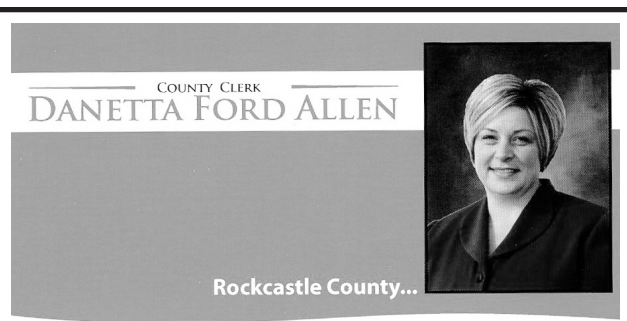

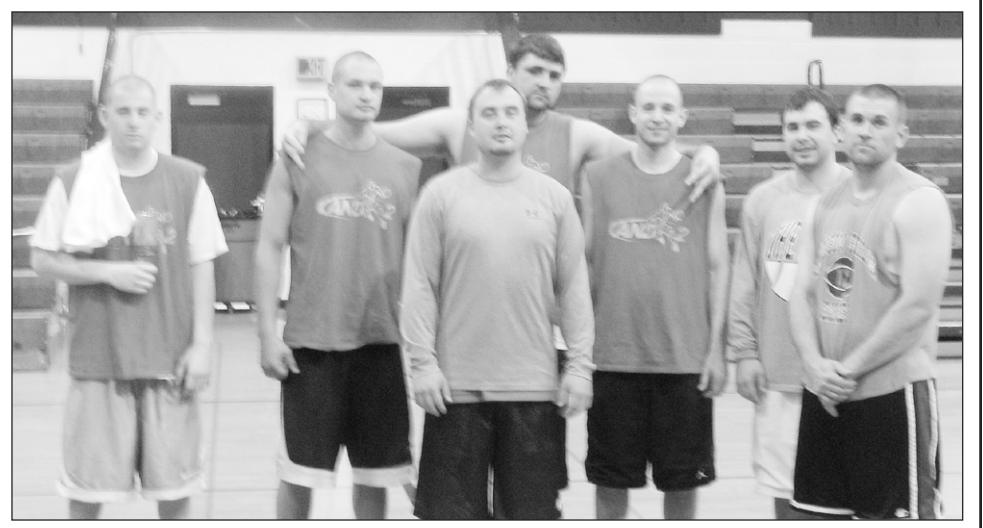

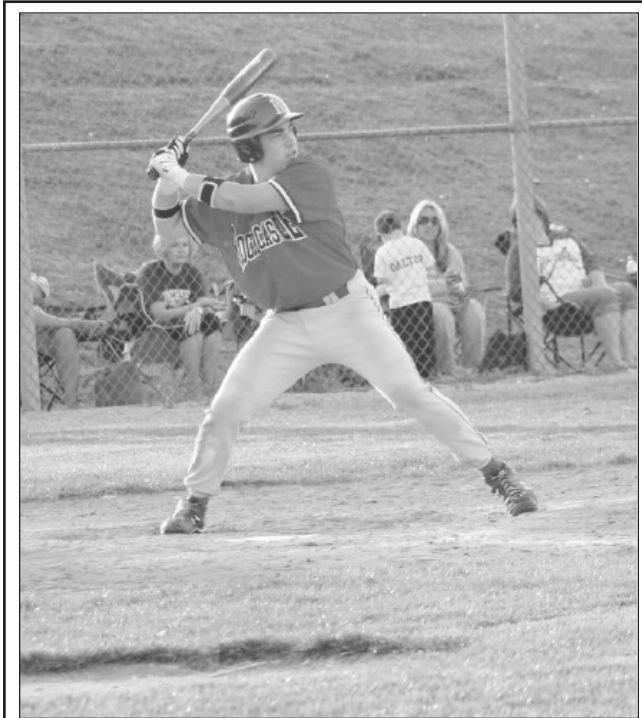

## Heavily pressured turkeys require different tactics

Most turkey hunters won't enjoy a totally secluded spot when the season opens April 17. The small size of Kentucky's average farm and an estimated 90,000 turkey hunters means many of us must hunt in places where a competing hunter may be just a ridge or two away.

If you find yourself in a heavily pressured spot this season, try some of the tactics used by hunters on public lands.

Taylorsville Lake Wildlife Management Foreman Bill Mitchell has been turkey hunting for nearly 40 years and estimates he's taken 80 to 100 birds in that time. A frequent public land hunter himself, he knows how challenging crowded conditions can be.

"The hard part is finding a turkey that's not being called to by someone else," Mitchell said. "That can happen on heavily pressured areas. You're calling to a turkey, and an equal distance in the other direction someone else is calling the same bird."

Birds in high-pressure areas can be educated into wariness when pursued by multiple hunters. This is particularly true on public land.

"Often on public ground, hunters over-call to the birds," said Mitchell. "The birds have heard every call out there. So sometimes it may take an extreme change in tactics to call that bird in."

Traditional techniques include setting up a concealment blind over turkey decoys, or "running and gunning," a popular practice where hunters follow the birds on foot or try to cut them off by intercepting their travel paths. Hunters then use calls to lure in a turkey.

Mitchell throws this conventional turkey hunting wisdom out when high pressure is an issue, however. He tries some totally different techniques instead.

"One change is calling the

turkey while not calling the turkey," Mitchell said. "Turkeys don't just yelp and cluck. There are other sounds they make."

First, Mitchell moves in much closer to the turkey than he normally would. Then, instead of using calls to make the sounds of a turkey's yelps and clucks, he mimics other sounds that turkeys make instead.

"I walk in the leaves," he explained. "Turkeys are bipeds and so are we. Often when they hear us walking, they think it's another turkey. You can also rake in the leaves with your hands, to sound like a turkey feeding."

Sometimes Mitchell carries turkey wing feathers in his vest, pulling them out to make wing beat sounds. "You're making sounds a turkey would expect from another turkey," he said.

If you do pull out your calls, make only quiet, subtle sounds. Most of the sounds hens make in the wild aren't loud yelps. "A sound you don't think the bird can hear at all, he can hear just fine," Mitchell said.

Another technique Mitchell employs in high-pressure areas is hunting in the evening. Most people associate turkey hunting with early mornings and lots of interaction with the birds. But to beat the crowds in pressured areas, Mitchell sometimes tries just the opposite.

"It's an entirely different tactic," he said. "Go to an area where you suspect birds are frequenting, somewhere at the end of a secluded field or a power line right-of-way. From your scouting, you should know where birds are likely to be."

Mitchell advises hunters to set up their decoys and blind, or with their back against a tree, right where they think the birds will come through. Don't expect a lot of gobbling, and don't expect to see a bird in full strut. In the evening, birds are coming in to roost with other turkeys.

"Maybe you won't kill a bird, maybe you'll just see him," Mitchell said. "But you'll know exactly where he'll be for the next morning's hunt. This is a stay until dark tactic. And I mean stay until the turkey is hanging on a limb and it's totally dark."

Mitchell will approach the bird until he can see it in the tree with his binoculars. Then he'll come out the next morning an hour before daylight, early enough that he is set up before it even begins to get light outside. He wants to disturb the turkey as little as possible.

"Get right where you think he's coming down," Mitchell said. "He should be coming down within gun range of your decoy. You want him to fly down right into your lap. It works."

If you're hunting heavily pressured land this spring, learn from a veteran hunter and try something else. Loud calls, morning hunts and getting the birds to come to you are conventional hunting techniques - but sometimes you have to make a change to bring home a bird from heavily pressured land.

## Turkey season opens April 17th

Kentucky's general spring season for wild turkeys opens Saturday, April 17.

Some 90,000 hunters are expected to turkey hunt this spring. The number of 2-year-old gobblers is at record levels, and biologists predict a good season this year. During the recently concluded youth-only turkey weekend, April 3-4, hunters took more than 1,800 gobblers.

Complete details of all current hunting regulations are listed in the spring hunting guide, available wherever hunting licenses are sold or online at fw.ky.gov. Some basics that hunters need to know before going afield include:

- Licenses needed: Adult hunters who live in Kentucky must have a hunting license (\$20) and a spring turkey permit (\$30). Residents hunting on their own farm do not need a license or permit, although they must abide by all state harvest regulations. Seniors 65 and older are eligible for a \$5 license, which includes the license and permit. Hunters under 12 years old do not need a license or permit. Hunters from ages 12-15 must have a youth hunting license and a youth hunting turkey permit. See the spring hunting guide for complete regulations.

- License requirements for non-resident hunters: A license and permit are required for non-resident hunters, even if they own land in the state. Generally, if a hunter has a driver's license from another state, that person is not considered a resident of Ken-

tucky.

- Where to get licenses: Obtainable wherever sporting goods are sold, over the telephone by calling toll-free 1-877-598-2401 or online at fw.ky.gov, the Web site of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

- Spring season dates: April 17 - May 9.

- Turkey zones: Kentucky is open statewide. There are no zones for turkey hunting.

- Hunter education requirements: Hunters born after Jan. 1, 1975, who are required to buy a license and permit, must complete and pass a hunter education course. Listings of course dates and locations are available online at fw.ky.gov. A temporary exemption card also is available online at fw.ky.gov by searching under the keywords "hunter education." No hunter education coursework is required to obtain this card, which costs \$5. Check the spring hunting guide for exceptions and other information.

- Baiting: Prohibited for any wildlife in hunting areas through May 31. Food plots planted for game animals are legal.

- Calling: Hunters may not use a call to mimic the sound of a turkey until the start of the season. Electronic calls are not allowed. Hunters may use a call that mimics an owl or crow prior to the start of the season to locate turkeys.

- Type of turkey that hunters can take: Hunters may

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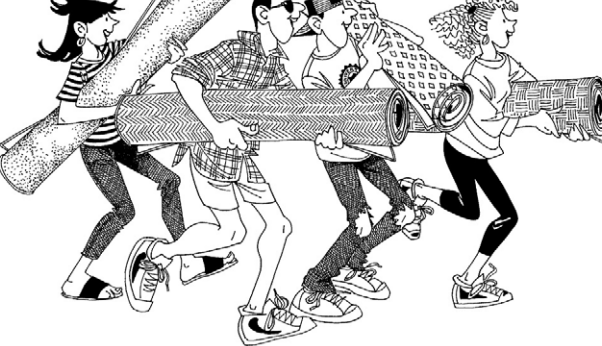

## Who needs a fishing license

A Kentucky farm owner invites his brother, nieces and nephews from the city for an afternoon of fishing at the pond behind his house. The farm owner tells his guests not to worry about a fishing license since they plan to fish on his land.

However, the visitors in fact do need their license.

"If you live in Kentucky and you fish anything other than a private pond on your own land - and you are 16 years of age or older - you must possess a valid fishing license," said Gerry Buynak, assistant director of fisheries for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "Therefore, you must have a valid fishing license to fish private or public waters that you do not own. This includes city or county park lakes, state park lakes, reservoirs, streams, rivers and the lakes in the Fishing in Neighborhoods (FINs) program."

A property owner and spouse do not need to buy a fishing license to fish ponds on land they own as long as they are residents of Kentucky. Neither do their dependent children or tenants on farmlands where they live and work. Guests, however, must possess a valid fishing license, even blood relatives.

Non-residents who own land in Kentucky must have a license to fish on their property. A good rule of thumb: If a person does not have a Kentucky driver's license, they are not considered a resident.

The only other exceptions to possessing a fishing license are anglers under the age of 16, resident military service members on furlough for more than three days, people fishing during Free Fishing

Days in June and those fishing within the boundaries of Mammoth Cave National Park. Those fishing in pay lakes need either a fishing license or a permit issued by the operators of the lake.

Funds generated from the sale of fishing licenses power the annual stocking of more than 4 million fish in rivers and lakes, the restoration of habitat and species, the state's two fish hatcheries, boat ramp construction and maintenance, fishing access on lakes and streams, and fisheries management. No general fund tax dollars are used to fund fish and wildlife activities.

The FINs program, which brings quality fishing to cities through aggressively stocking catchable-sized fish, would not be possible without funds from licenses.

"Without license buyers, we can't do any of these things," Buynak said.

Money from the sale of trout permits also helps fund trout stockings across Kentucky. "If you want to keep trout that you catch from any lake or stream, you must purchase a \$10 trout permit," Buynak said. "You must have a trout permit to fish the Cumberland River below Wolf Creek Dam whether you keep trout or not."

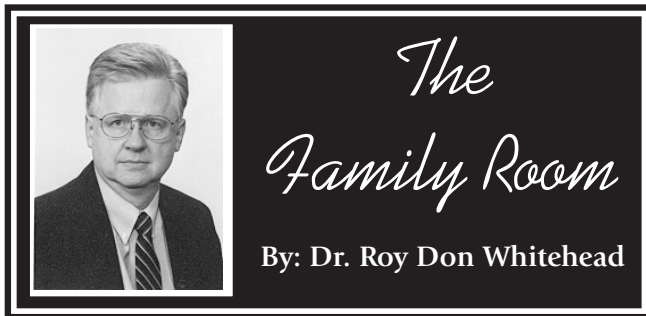
A resident annual fishing license is \$20. A one-day resident fishing license is \$7. An annual non-resident fishing license is \$50. The one-day, non-resident fishing license costs \$10.

Residents certified as disabled and those 65 and older qualify for a \$5 license. "Some seniors who are eligible for the senior/disabled license still pay the whole price because they want to support the department," noted Ron Brooks, director of fisheries for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife.

For complete information about all the fishing regulations in Kentucky, pick up a copy of the fishing guide, available wherever licenses are sold. Regulations are also available online at the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Web site, located at fw.ky.gov. Anglers should remember that the new license year began March 1.

**A Pledge to My Family**  
To the best of my ability, I pledge the following:

1. No one in my family will have to live in abuse. I will do all within my power to ensure that any victim of abuse has the chance to escape from the abuser. Obviously, I cannot control the actions of an adult in my family, but I can offer her support and information about ways to free herself from the abuse. If the victim of abuse is a child, I will do whatever is necessary including cooperating with government agencies to save that child from further abuse.

2. Every member of my family will have enough to eat. The idea that a member of my family, especially a child, should go without food is unthinkable. I will take whatever measures necessary including seeking help from government and private agencies to secure food for my family.

3. Every member of my family will have adequate medical care. This potentially involves a much greater expense than the first two pledges. Adequate care may be as simple as a doctor's visit or as complex as heart surgery costing thousands of dollars. My ability to pay may affect how much I can help a family member, but I will work with whatever agencies necessary to see that every member of my family receives medical treatment when needed.

4. Every member of my family will have access to mental health and substance abuse treatment when necessary. Again, my ability to pay may seriously impact how much I can help in this regard,

but I will do everything I can to get help for a family member who suffers from mental illness or an addiction. If the family member refuses treatment, I will provide support and information to help him come to the realization that he needs help and that help is available.

5. Every member of my family will have access to the education that he or she needs. Education is a key to unlocking personal and financial potential. I will work with schools, colleges, government and private agencies to provide access to education for my family members.

The five points of A Pledge to My Family do not ensure happiness, but they do provide the basics for a happy, productive life. As I pondered the pledge, I began to wrestle with the following question: Who is my family? Is my family made up solely of my wife and children? Does my family include all those who are related to me? In my case this includes a lot of people (my father had ten siblings and my mother, three).

As I pondered further, I wondered why my family should include only my relatives. I also consider my co-workers to be family: does the pledge extend to them? Does my family include all those in my community? In Kentucky? In the United States? In the world?

If I want every member of my family to have enough to eat, how many children does that include? Where do I draw the line that includes some and excludes others? How can I keep my pledge to the members of my family, including those close at hand as well as those on the outer edges of my family circle?

Who is your family and what are your responsibilities to them?

## Federal aid program may help pay for college

The federal government sponsors numerous financial aid programs that may help students and their parents pay for college expenses. Below are brief summaries of the more common federal grant and loan programs. Grants do not have to be repaid, but loans do.

- Academic Competitiveness Grant: These grants provide up to \$750 for college freshmen and \$1,300 for college sophomores. Sophomores must have at least a 3.0 GPA to qualify.
- Federal Pell Grant: Pell Grants provide up to \$5,350 for undergraduates.
- Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant: These grants provide up to \$4,000 per year for undergraduate students who have exceptional financial need.
- SMART Grant: These grants are available to college juniors and seniors in certain areas of science, math and foreign language. SMART grants provide up to \$4,000 a year.
- Federal Perkins Loan. These loans are for students with exceptional financial need. Undergraduates may qualify for up to \$4,000 per year, while qualifying graduate students are eligible for up to \$6,000 per year.
- Federal Stafford Loan. Stafford Loans are available to undergraduate and graduate students. The amount students may borrow depends on their year in school.
- Federal PLUS Loan. Parents of dependent undergraduate students may qualify for PLUS Loans, depending on the parents' credit ratings. The loan amount depends on how much other financial aid the student receives. Graduate students may receive PLUS Loans after all of their Stafford Loan eligibility is exhausted.

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is used to apply for all of these programs. Parents or students seeking a PLUS Loan must also submit a separate application.

Students interested in Stafford and PLUS Loans and parents interested in PLUS Loans should be smart consumers. Lenders may charge different fees and have different repayment incentives. Picking the right lender may save students and parents thousands of dollars in fees and interest payments.

### Money tips for college students

## Protect yourself against identity theft

Identity theft is one of the fastest growing crimes and can affect anyone — including college students. Millions of people are victims of identity theft each year. There are several measures you can take to help protect yourself and your identity.

Never provide personal information such as your Social Security number (SSN), bank account or credit card numbers in response to a phone call, fax, letter or e-mail.

Don't respond to e-mails that claim to be from the Internal Revenue Service. The IRS doesn't contact taxpayers by e-mail.

Friends, family members, roommates and workers in homes make up a large percentage of identity thieves because they have easier access to your confidential information.

Pick up your mail as soon as possible after delivery or use a locked mailbox. Put outgoing mail in a blue Postal Service mailbox, hand it to a mail carrier or take it to the post office. Shred any documents that contain personal or financial information.

Never provide bank, credit card or other sensitive data when visiting a Web site that doesn't explain how your personal information will be protected, including the use of encryption to transmit and store data safely.

If you're using an ATM card or debit card, ensure no one standing nearby can see your personal identification number (PIN).

On your personal computer, install a free or low-cost firewall to stop intruders from gaining remote access to your PC. Download and frequently update security patches offered by your operating system and software vendors to correct weaknesses that a hacker could exploit.

Beware of scams that claim to represent a charity or business. They may offer jobs, rewards or other opportunities. Do not send them cash or checks, provide your SSN or credit card numbers or wire money from a bank account.

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

# Celebrate the 40th Earth Day by going greener

On April 22, 1970, 20 million Americans took to the streets, parks, and auditoriums to demonstrate for a healthy, sustainable environment. The mission was to garner support to save the planet and to raise awareness of the deterioration of our environment. People from all walks of life joined the cause. Supporters were Republicans and Democrats, rich and poor, city slickers and farmers, tycoons and labor leaders.

That first event was a success. It not only led to the creation of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency

and the passage of the Clean Air, Clean Water, and Endangered Species acts, but it spawned an awareness day that continues even today.

On April 22, 2010, Americans will again join in Earth Day -- the only event celebrated simultaneously around the globe by people of all backgrounds, faiths and nationalities.

Four decades later, the movement continues -- only there are many more people to carry the message. Participation has grown to exceed a billion people annually. The mission is no less important than it was in 1970 and is still

a cause that needs all our support and participation. This involvement can start at home.

Making our homes, as well as our schools and businesses, more energy efficient can assist in protecting the environment as well as reduce high-energy bills. Improving energy efficiency is a good first step for homeowners interested in "green" remodeling.

We can also take measures to be more energy efficient in our homes by investing in ENERGY STAR appliances. Beginning on April 22 -- Earth Day -- residents who replace existing appliances with the ENERGY STAR appliances will qualify for rebates. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 appropriated funds to each state to establish and administer the appliance rebate program. Kentucky will have just over \$4 million available and rebates will be distributed on a first-come basis. Applications must be submitted within 14 days of purchase. Information on the required materials is available on [www.kyappliancerebates.com](http://www.kyappliancerebates.com) or by calling 1-877-813-3669. Additional information also is available at <http://www.energy.ky.gov/recovery/rebate/>.

During the 2010 Legislative Session, we took steps to make our schools more environmentally friendly by passing legislation to support and encourage the construction and renovation of school buildings using efficient design concepts. The legislation also establishes a Kentucky efficient school design trust fund and requires the Department of Education to develop and publish guidelines for efficient school design.

Along with looking at more energy-efficient measures for our schools and our homes as we observe the 40th International Earth Day, we can also become more environmentally aware and make a more conscientious effort to

incorporate some "green" into our lifestyles. A few simple changes in our everyday living that can have long-term effects include:

- Save water by decreasing shower time -- or rather take a bath instead.
  - Brush your teeth with the water off.
  - Recycle -- junk mail, cell phones, paper products, plastic bags, and more.
  - Switch from paper and plastic bags to reusable bags and totes.
  - Hang clothes to dry.
  - Opt for direct deposit, online banking, and paperless statements.
  - Start composting (planting scraps from fruits, veggies, and coffee grounds outside).
  - Use recyclable (and refillable) beverage containers that you can fill with filtered water, rather than purchasing disposable water bottles.
  - Unplug all appliances to save energy when you leave the house.
  - Take public transportation or walk, when possible, or car pool.
  - Use dishes not disposable utensils, cups, and plates.
  - Use rechargeable batteries.
  - Donate.
  - Make your next car a hybrid model.
  - Buy items that use less packaging.
  - Purchase locally produced food at farmer's markets and even roadside stands.
  - Purchase fresh fruits and vegetables, instead of jarred, canned, or frozen.
  - Select soy or beeswax candles, instead of paraffin candles.
  - Use healthy and environmentally friendly cosmetics.
  - Plant a tree.
- Eco-friendly behavior is good for the planet, good for our health, good for the ecosystem and the animals, and it will help to preserve our environmental resources. On April 22, I hope you will join me as well as more than a billion other people around the world as we try to bring about awareness and make changes to save our planet.

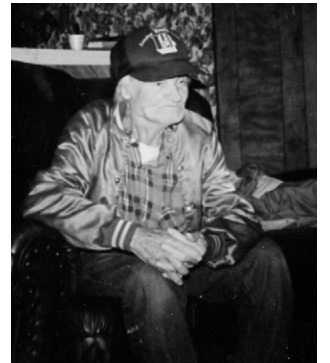

## Toyota to make nice donation to Rockcastle Karst Conservancy

Toyota Motor Manufacturing, Kentucky, Inc. has made a generous donation to the Great Saltpetre Preserve of the Rockcastle Karst Conservancy towards their new Composting Outhouse. Toyota representatives will be presenting a check on April 23, 2010 at 1:30 pm. Please join us at the nature preserve where the new construction is already underway.

Funding for this program from Toyota gives special consideration to education, environment and safety. Great Saltpetre Preserve, in Mt. Vernon, KY, is constructing a Composting Outhouse as the first step to decommission and remove existing pit toilets on the property. This is necessary to reduce the potential for human waste to contaminate the groundwater. This first Composting Outhouse is being constructed along the old road approaching the Great Saltpetre Cave. In this location it will be seen and used by visitors to the Cave and will serve as an educational tool to explain the composting process and educate users about options for managing human wastes, especially in rural areas. It is important to minimize untreated discharge into ground-

water to protect both the caves and the aquifers in the region.

### About Great Saltpetre Preserve

Great Saltpetre Preserve (GSP) is a 306 acre Nature Preserve along Crooked Creek near Mt. Vernon, Kentucky that contains the primary entrance to Great Saltpetre Cave as well as a few other much smaller caves. It has long been a landmark in the community as a primary site for the production of saltpeter between 1801 and 1812. Later between 1941 and 1985 it was operated as a commercial cave and occasionally as a site for the Renfro Valley Barn Dances.

GSP is owned by Rockcastle Karst Conservancy, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization dedicated to the education and preservation of caves and karst in the Rockcastle County, Kentucky region through education, land acquisition and resource management. The Great Saltpetre Preserve is closed to the general public. Nonetheless, the Preserve is open to visitors annually during the weekend after Mother's Day, this year on May 15-16.

## A rural health "Sister Act"

Mt. Vernon's Parsons siblings have turned health care into a Sister Act. But their production is short on drama and long on service to rural Kentucky.

"Never, really," says Angie 33, a physician's assistant, when asked if she or her two siblings - Lindsey, 26, and Amy, 23 - ever fight or argue with one another. "I wouldn't say we've ever even fought," says Lindsey, a dentist at White House Clinic in Richmond. "Not really," reports Amy, a UK dental student.

Neither did any of them apparently have any internal conflict when choosing health care as a career. It doesn't hurt when you come from a medical family. Mom Jeannine is a registered nurse; their father, John, is a dentist. "Health care is just about all I've ever thought about doing," Lindsey said. "It's all I knew."

One of baby sister Amy's earliest memories is playing with her Barbie dolls under her father's desk at his Mt. Vernon office, listening to the sound of his dental hand piece, known to patients as a drill. To this day, "that's kind of a comforting sound," she says. "It reminds us of our father."

Though Amy was pre-med in undergraduate school, she switched to dentistry after a Professional Education Preparation Program (PEPP) experience. She's glad she did. "I have been around den-

tistry my whole life, and I like it."

Though Angie didn't choose dentistry ("I'm a better talker than I am working with my hands"), she soon drilled down to the perfect profession for her, and became the first physician assistant to work full-time in Mt. Vernon, a place where she knew she'd want to be after finishing at the University of Kentucky.

She's consistently reminded that she made the right decision, and not just at Rockcastle Medical Arts, where she practices, but wherever she goes. "I love kids, and I love to treat them. Sometimes I'll see them in town at a store or somewhere, and they'll come up and hug me and tell me they love me." It's one of the most rewarding parts of her job, she says.

Angie completed all of her student rotations in the Southern Area Health Education Center region - from Corbin to Somerset to Mt. Vernon. AHEC also played a role in middle sister Lindsey's rotation experience and in turn her career path. The Southern AHEC staff helped facilitate the process of getting White House Clinic in Berea approved as a rotation site. Lindsey completed her externship there in 2008 and after graduating in 2009, accepted a full-time position with the clinic's Richmond

## PRIDE Spring Cleanup Month

# Spring cleaning is underway in southern and eastern Kentucky

Spring cleaning is underway in southern and eastern Kentucky. During PRIDE Spring Cleanup Month in April, communities are teaming together to pick up litter, remove illegal dumps and dispose of bulky trash.

"Local governments have planned many Spring Cleanup activities, and now residents can take advantage of these chances to get rid of trash responsibly," said PRIDE's Karen Engle. "The timing is perfect. After a long winter, everyone is ready to enjoy our region's great outdoors. Volunteering is fun, and cleaning up makes the scenery nicer for us and our visitors."

Assistance with cleanup costs is available through a partnership between the state Transportation Cabinet and PRIDE — the region's nonprofit group for environmental cleanup and education. A total of \$587,500 in Spring Cleanup funds was awarded to the region's cities and counties, based on their number of road miles.

In 31 counties, litter cleanups are planned during April with Spring Cleanup funds, based on reports to PRIDE. Most are roadside cleanups, but lake and river sweeps also will take place.

One litter pickup event — the Laurel Lake Cleanup — is a joint effort by two counties. On April 24, Laurel County and Whitley County will compete to recruit the most volunteers to pick up trash along the lake, which lies in both counties. The annual event draws hundreds of volunteers.

In 20 counties, there will be free events to drop off large

trash, such as appliances. Four counties will remove illegal dumps.

Pulaski County will host its first-ever "Free Hazardous Waste Day" — the only one in the region during Spring Cleanup Month. County residents can drop off up to 100 pounds of hazardous materials, such as paint, that typically are not accepted at local disposal facilities.

"We have set aside \$20,000 of our Spring Cleanup funds for this event," said Gerald Hines, Pulaski County Solid Waste Coordinator and Recycling Center Director. "Disposing of hazardous wastes is very expensive. For example, properly handling a small propane cylinder costs \$5, and paint disposal is \$0.23 per pound. Cer-

tified professionals must handle hazardous waste, so we hired a contractor to operate this event for us."

PRIDE is a nonprofit organization that promotes "Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment" in 38 counties of southern and eastern Kentucky. It was founded in 1997 by Congressman Hal Rogers and Kentucky Environmental Protection Secretary James Bickford.

PRIDE began sponsoring the region-wide Spring Cleanup in 1998. In addition to funding assistance, PRIDE provides local governments with T-shirts, garbage bags and gloves to distribute to Spring Cleanup volunteers.
