Lovell death

Jose Santiago Cuevas, an illegal immigrant with multiple prior DUI convictions, has pled guilty in the connection to the death of Sheila Lovell, of Mt. Vernon, according to Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery.

Appearing in Circuit Court and before Judge Jeffrey T. Burdette last Friday, Cuevas pled guilty to second-degree manslaughter; first-degree wanton endangerment; and first-degree criminal mischief.

According to Montgomery, on June 21, 2009, on

Hwy. 39 north of Somerset, Cuevas crossed the center line, swerving into Lovell's lane. Cuevas admitted at the scene to consuming up to five beers. The Kentucky State Police lab put Cuevas blood alcohol level at .29, which is 3 times the legal limit.

Montgomery stated that he would recommend 20 years imprisonment for Cuevas' multiply felonies. Judge Burdette set final sentencing for May 13, 2010.

Montgomery noted that Lovell's family had endorsed the plea deal.

The most significant damage was to water lines just west of Brodhead. In the case at west Brodhead, a hill slide took 400 feet of 4 inch water line with it. Employees of Wester Water were busy Monday clearing trees and brush preparing to lay a completly new water line to replace the one destroyed west of Brodhead Sunday night.

Judge/Executive candidates spar at debate/forum

The 2010 Rockcastle County Forum and Debate was held at Rockcastle County High School last Thursday night and provided information to help voters in the county make their decisions for the upcoming May 18th primary.

The debate was broadcast live over WRVK Radio Station and on the local access channel Monday.

The event was sponsored by the Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce, in conjunction with the Rockcastle County High School Y-Club.

Arielle Reese, president of the Chamber of Commerce, welcomed the crowd and the introduction of candidates was made by Bethany Clontz, Y-Club president and Starla Bond, treasurer.

The debate between the two candidates for Rockcastle County Judge/Executive was probably the main draw of the evening for the approximately 300 guests in attendance at the debate.

This part of the program was moderated by Chief Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette.

The format for this part of the debate allowed for 1 1/2 minutes for the original response asked of the candidate, with the order of the questions received being determined by a coin toss at the beginning. After the initial answer, the other candidate was allowed a 30 second response with a 30 second rebuttal then being provided to the candidate the original question was put to.

Each candidate was also allowed a three minute opening and closing statement to

Carloftis told the crowd that when he came into office 17 years ago, he did not have any ideal of the depth of the county's problems. He pointed out that Rockcastle is the least developed county on I-75 and reminded the crowd that 98% of homes in the county now have city water, better roads and a new jail. But, he cautioned, "there is a lot more to do," and the county has to have the revenue to do it. He also said that surrounding counties had been planning for generations on how to improve their county - helped by people from Rockcastle who have had to drive outside Rockcastle to work.

Challenger Claretta Carter Hodges told the crowd that she decided to run for office after paying attention to the 2006-07 audit on which no balances were shown and said she felt that amounted to "sleight-of-hand" by the county. She also noted that the county had to borrow \$500,000 in 2007 for operating costs. She said she was worried about our county and our safety and that was why she decided to run for office.

Economic development in the county, the judge/ executive's and RCIDA's role in it was the subject of the first two questions.

The candidates took opposing views with Mrs. Hodges declaring for economic development being advanced primarily by private interests. Hodges said she would have RCIDA go low tech instead of high tech by contacting companies in New York and New Jersey to

Rockcastle Memories By David J. Griffin

From the well to the bottle

While doing some grocery shopping, I noticed on my list that we needed bottled water. We probably use about 24 bottles a week for just my wife and me. When I was young, it certainly never occurred to me that when I became a senior citizen I would have to purchase water in plastic bottles to drink. When I was just a boy, water from our well was used to quench your thirst - and it was delicious and cool and very re-

During the early days living on our small farm in Rockcastle County, our only source of water was the well in the yard next to our house. The well was dug before I was born, but my brother Al remembers when it was constructed in the late '30's. He says, "Daddy had a man come to our house with a huge drill rig on the back of a truck. They had to bore through limestone to reach water." Al believes the well was approximately 65 feet deep. After reaching water, they had to place a metal casing in the hole to keep the dirt from caving in and contaminating the

The "bucket" that was used to reach the water was about four feet in length and only four inches wide. It was attached to a frame which allowed us to use a pulley with a rope to draw the water from the well. I can remember my mother (Bee) saying that the water was the best in the area and very sweet.

Both Al and I were required to draw water for the needs of our family. At least once per day, we had to fill two porcelain buckets that Bee kept in the kitchen for drinking and cooking. In one of the buckets she kept a dipper for us to pour water into glasses. The other bucket was used for cooking and cleaning in the kitchen.

When we needed to take a bath, water was drawn for that purpose at the time. The water was heated on top of our wood burning stove in the kitchen. Bee kept a large tub hanging on the wall outside the kitchen door to use for bathing. The tub was carried inside when it was bath time and placed near the kitchen wood stove when it was cold outside.

At that time, we had no indoor plumbing, but Bee insisted that Daddy provide a sink in the corner of the kitchen so that she could pour waste water into it instead of having to carry it outdoors. The drain was constructed so that the water would empty in the yard outside the house. I distinctly remember the grass in that area being very green, and it grew extremely fast.

My grandparents also had a house on our farm that they had built long before my parents lived on the property. Pop had dug a well near his house before either Al or I were born. I cannot remember them not having indoor plumbing. I would imagine that Mommie Katie had insisted that Pop install a bathroom for her soon after their purchase of the house and the land. It was never outright acknowledged, but she was the one mostly in control concerning things such as this. Pop just went along and did not complain.

Their well contained iron and would stain buckets a rusty color. It never tasted very good and, even though it was tested regularly, it did not contain harmful contaminates. Mommie usually boiled the water if it was going to be placed in the refrigerator to drink. I doubt if boiling removed any of the iron, but she felt better about it anyway. She usually only used it for cooking and making coffee and tea. Even though they had an indoor toilet, Pop preferred to use the "outhouse" when he felt the need for the potty. He maintained a clean and well equipped outhouse, and he just felt more at home outside.

One of our neighbors was Mrs. Charity Barnes, who lived next to Pop and Mommie down the gravel road. Mrs. Barnes had a well that was sufficient to provide water for her family until construction workers began blasting for the new US 25 highway. At that time, her well became contaminated with oil. When they inserted a bucket into the well, it would be filled with black oil. It had to be capped off.

Mrs. Barnes was elderly when I was a boy. Every day she came to Pop's house to get two buckets of water for her home use. Usually Pop would carry the filled buckets back to her house for her. At some point, my grandparents thought it would be good manners for a healthy young boy to assume this duty. And guess what – I became the

Our great friend and neighbor, Dan Ledford will be 92 years old in July. Dan is like family, having hauled our kids on his school bus from the time they were in kindergarten until they graduated high school. On a clear day you can stand in Dan's back yard, there high on the hill above our valley, and see our house through the trees down here in Lowell Branch, but you can't look up the hill and see his even though we know just where it is.

Dan drove the school bus through our end of the county until he was in his eighties and the school board finally forced him to retire. Problem was (for the Board of Education) that he kept passing rigorous and regular physical examinations including hearing and eyesight, blood pressure and all sorts of other physical and emotional examination tests that folks half his age could not replicate. For several years, after our kids had graduated high school, Dan always made a point of honking the bus horn when he drove by our place in the mornings and afternoons, whether or not we were outside.

After his wife, Laverne, to whom he had been married for more than 60 years, passed away several years ago, it seemed to me that a lot of life also went out of Dan. In fact, he can scarcely mention her name right now without welling up. His grief for her is easily the deepest I have ever witnessed. And their love for each other was a marvel to behold when I visited their home or saw them out together.

For many years Dan would call me up at least once a week late in the evening to share a political joke. He was, and still is, particularly fond of picking on Hillary Clinton. But he was, and still is bi-partisan. Republicans bore the brunt of Dan's one liners as frequently as Democrats. The jokes were often risqué and better left out of your newspaper but most often they made me laugh out

Several years ago Dan jokingly asked me when I was going to write him up in the paper and I told him I was going to wait until he died because he might shoot me if I told the truth. He shook his head and told me that he'd never make the paper because he was sure he'd out live me.

A few years back a bunch of us were in Uncle Tom's restaurant and one of the regulars was quoting scripture to back up an argument. Dan told the fellow that he had it wrong and proceeded to quote the verse, word for word as it appears in the King James Version of The Bible. A






The Roots of Rockcastle by: Tonya J. Cook



The Cook Family Comes Through Cumberland Gap (continued)

Last week, we left off with the Sherman Cook family going back to live in Little Sycamore Valley after spending some time in Georgetown, Kentucky. This story is intended to depict the life and times of a typical rural mountain family a few years prior to 1900 who would retrace their steps back through the Cumberland Gap to Kentucky again.

Sherman and Jane moved into a small house near Sherman's brother, Elbert, called "Elb". It was there where they had their fifth child, Lonnie Elbert Clellan Cook, the author of the "Memories and History of the Cook Family". They finally settled on naming him Elbert Clell. Sherman worked for Elb for a while, then moved down the valley about half a mile to a place that belonged

to William Campbell, and lived there about four or five years. The house sat near Little Sycamore Creek, where Jane set up her wash kettle and battling board, which was a forerunner of the brass or zinc-coated washboard.

The cabin's main room was of log construction, and was sixteen or eighteen feet square, and contained three doors. The fireplace was made of local fieldstone. There was a lean-to kitchen, and a lean-to bedroom. In the rear, there was still another lean-to bedroom. One of the bedrooms contained a trundle bed. Around the house was a fence made of split chestnut or red oak boards about four feet high, and pointed at the top to prevent chickens from flying and landing on the top, and getting over the fence.

In the winter, there was a lot of activity around the hearth. Corn and beans were strung on threads, and hung to dry. It was the season for neighborly gathering, and the enjoyment of each other's company. It gave the young folks a chance to do some courting. Games such as "Thimble-thimble-who's-gotthe-thimble" and a dance similar to a square dance, "Skip To My Lou, My Darling", was enjoyed.

One night, some of the family had been to the community Baptist church, where a protracted meeting was being held, otherwise known as a "revival service", these days. The altar call had been made, when suddenly, from outside the church building a



choir of voices burst forth in song, and seemed to circle around the building. It was a well-known altar call song entitled "He's Calling For Me Now". Some went outside to find no one there.

It was getting harder for Sherman to make a living. Very little work was available to supply the family's needs, and when there was any work, it paid only in the form of bacon, flour, or decreased the debt to the store. One day, in the summer of 1906, Hiram Thacker came for a visit. He and Jane's other brother, George, had bought several acres of wooded land near the Wilderness Trail in the Big Hill country of Rockcastle County. The Big Hill Coal Company had sold them the

virgin timberland for a dollar an acre. Sherman and Jane were asked to move there, and Sherman was to help work the timber. After their fall harvest was gathered in, Sherman and Jane prepared to move again to Kentucky.

This time, when Sherman and Jane traveled to Kentucky, it was by train that picked them up in Tazewell, Tennesee. They changed trains in Cumberland Gap. A recent tragedy was fresh in the minds of the local people; it was the caving in of a trestle over Lonesome Valley, which caused the train to jack-knife, and killed several people. A folk-song had been written about the wreck, and the Cook family looked forward with interest to seeing the site

where it had occurred.

In the early afternoon, Sherman, Jane, and the children arrived in Wildie, near the junction of the Roundstone, Clear Creek, and Renfro waterways, later the site of the famous Renfro Valley Barn Dance. Wildie was a thriving railway center in Rockcastle County. People also received freight in Wildie, and hauled it up the different valleys to the little

Meeting the train at Wildie were Hiram Thacker and his brother-in-law, Pennington. They were married to the sisters, Nora and Mary Owens, daughters of Granville Owens, a store-





May is Osteoporosis Awareness and Prevention Month Getting Enough Calcium

Presented by Dr. Karen Saylor

Today's woman hears plenty about calcium. She needs to eat lots of it--1000 to 1500 mg. a day. Calcium is not only important for the bones, but also is necessary for the teeth, normal clotting mechanisms and for numerous other cellular functions.



How does a woman get enough calcium in her diet? Dairy products are one of the best sources of calcium. Milk, yogurt and hard cheeses are quite high in calcium and one serving provides about a quarter of a woman's daily calcium needs. The milk can also be used in puddings, soups, in baked goods or as ice cream.

For people who have difficulty digesting milk, the lactase enzyme can be added to the milk, or acidophilus milk can be used because the lactose sugar is pre-digested. Yogurt is also well-tolerated in most people with lactose intolerance. It is an excellent source of calcium since it is a concentrated form of milk.

The cheeses highest in calcium are Swiss, Cheddar and American Cheese. Another good source of calcium is fish which are canned with the bones, such as sardines or salmon. Oysters also provide ample amounts of calcium.

Vegetables which are good sources of calcium include collard greens, cooked spinach, mustard greens and broccoli. Most dried fruits and almonds are very good.

The natural sources of calcium are best—always try to get calcium from healthful foods. If you are unable to get enough calcium from your diet, it can also be taken as supplements or as other forms of medicines such as the calcium containing antacids. These are available without a prescription, but check with your doctor to be sure they are right for you.

keeper at the headwaters of Clear Creek. It was after dark when they reached Hiram's place at the head of Clear Creek Valley. They put the Cook family up, with two or three children at the head and at the foot of the bed. After about two or three days, the Cooks headed through the cliffs and over the mountains to a farm Hiram had rented for Sherman and Jane. The farm was only about a half a mile from Climax, and about two hundred yards from the Climax school. The school was a little one-room, boxed structure, and was attended in a July to Christmas school

Sherman eventually rented another farm about a mile from there. Sherman farmed a few acres of corn, made a garden, and worked timber. In 1912, Sherman bid on a US mail route, called "the Star Route", from Climax to Boone's Gap on the L&N Railroad, a distance of eleven miles each way. There were two country post offices, where mail was delivered and picked up each day. Cook-Turner, (Edna Sherman's granddaughter, relates that her mother, Laura, remembers the tales of Sherman playing his dulcimer while on the mail route. He later performed at folk music festivals at Renfro Val-

After a long illness, Jane died on October 14, 1914. She had complications from arthritis that weakened her heart, and she died at the age of 43.

Eventually, Sherman married Delia Griffin, and had several children, including Henry Harrison Cook, who was born in Rockastle County, and who married Laura Allen. Harrison and Laura had four children: Edna, Dale, Larry, and Stanley, which brings us to the present day.







Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps Large Trees for the Large Yard

As you consider a landscaping plan for your home, or perhaps just want a shade tree or two, be sure to keep the plantings balanced according to the size of your home and the lot. For the big home and the big yard, you'll want to plant some big trees. (At least some that will grow to become big trees, even if you wish to economize and buy smaller trees to begin with.)

One acre or more of yard will look even larger with some big trees. Typically, we want a focal point in the landscape. We may wish to frame the house with trees. Perhaps, we just want a big tree for the shade. (Try to resist planting a row of maples or oaks across the front or down the property line, as well as lining the driveway with a row of Bradford pears—these practices accomplish none of the above.)

For the two story (and

taller) home, shrubs and flowers just don't get the job done of making the yard look good, balanced or well-landscaped. A tall narrow tree may be best at the corner of a tall house on a small lot. Design one or more "whopper" or spreading trees into the plan if your yard is lots bigger than the home.

With these points to guide us, what are some large trees we might use? Though there are additional possibilities, I have some pretty and big trees I wish to mention for your consideration.

Maple trees are a mainstay in both rural and urban landscapes. They come in many varieties, still yet, maple trees are over-used and I feel the choices landscapers recommend should be more diverse. Here are some maples for your consideration: red maples (from the tall/narrow "Armstrong" cultivar to the tall/wide/fast growing "Autumn Flame" hybrid), sugar maples, Norway maples and Shantung maples.

Oak trees are generally large trees. From a live oak in the south to a burr oak in zone 6 and northward, you can have monsters a hundred years from planting time. Scarlet oak, red oak, shumard oak, pin oak and willow oak are all good landscape trees in the right situation. White oak and swamp white oak are also excellent giant specimen can-

If you want a stately evergreen tree, consider Deodar cedars. Newer clones of varying sizes have been bred so there are choices for all yards with this lovely evergreen from Asia. The blue Atlas cedar is a native option.

Other evergreens could be southern magnolia, Norway spruce, white pine, Douglas fir—and if you're really patient—the American holly. Blue spruce, Serbian spruce and cryptomeria could also fill the bill.

The dawn redwood is the preferred option (except in swampy locations where a cypress is better) if you want the evergreen look in summer and a leafless tree in winter.

For those who want the yard grasses to grow up to the trunk, consider planting ginkgo, Kentucky coffee tree, sweet gum, catalpa, sycamore or the common hackberry. Ash trees also, but there's a borer epidemic.

Beech, and the magnolia already mentioned, will kill grass under them, as will most pine, spruce and fir trees.

Basswood is a huge American native tree that has become rare in the wild. (It's wood is used for things like strawberry cups and baskets of many kinds as thin pieces of it's wood bend without breaking.) Black (wild) cherry and the horsechestnut are also candidates for the yard where you have the space. Tulip poplar can work well in a big yard—just not

so close that a big limb could break and hit the house.

Think of the shade a tree will create, wind break value, think of it's strength to resist wind and ice storms, can it handle pollution or compacted soils, can it cope with 24/7 lighting (sycamore trees, for instance, have colorful bark and can handle poor soils and air pollution, wet conditions and drought, but perform rather poorly where bright street lights keep them from "sleeping" at night).

Consider things like messiness, fruits, fall color, winter interest and benefits to wildlife. Berries are a blessing to migrating birds, thick evergreen boughs can protect birds, deer, etc., from cold snowy conditions. Peeling or colorful bark or interesting limbs can be an inspirational attribute of a leafless tree.

Big homes deserve some big trees. Surely some of the trees I suggest will enhance and make your place look more lovely, warm and welcoming.





Want a good job? Do well in English classes

wonder "when will I ever use this stuff?'


Even employees who don't sit behind a desk all day must be prepared with good English skills when they enter the workforce. "English classes are designed to train students in critical thinking and comprehension skills," says Joe Robinson, Recruitment Coordinator at Tokico in Berea. "On the job, being able to analyze a problem and come up with a solution are imperative to success."

That's just the beginning of why employers value what students learn in English classes. Robinson, as well as Steve Lawson (Human Resources Manager for NACCO Materials Handling Group in

they must do research to learn. Lawson points out that although there's myriad information available online, it's not all reliable so employees must be able to discern what is useful and what isn't.

Good verbal communications skills are also crucial. Robinson says they come into play as soon as a potential employee contacts the human resources department. "That initial conversation will determine whether or not the company would want to bring them in for a more formal interview," Robinson says. Once invited to an interview, a potential employee must answer questions such as how they respond to stressful situations, what are their strengths and weaknesses, what are their career goals and more.

Although how well someone presents him or herself during the interview is important in getting hired, Robinson says the ability to communicate well becomes even more important on the job. "Being able to communicate with their supervisor about potential quality issues, machinery performance, all the way down to inter-communications with coworkers and support staff is key to ensuring that the company produces quality parts for our customers," he says.

"Across the board each and every employee needs to be able to have effective written communication skills in order to succeed," he says. Although an employee who runs machinery may not do a lot of writing daily, if he or she wants to move up in the company to a leadership or managerial job, then it will be imperative to have the skill to write e-mails, hand-written notes, memos and other docu-

Lawson agrees that writing is important. "Everything is through PowerPoint these days," he says. When employees are asked to give presentations, they will use PowerPoint, which requires good written and verbal skills.

NACCO employees also deal with requests for information. "They generally have a small amount of time to respond effectively. Being able to work quickly will make or break their success and their ability to achieve," Lawson says. Therefore, employees who are confident with their

Learn to be credit smart

Once you start paying bills, you start building a credit score. If you have a history of paying bills late, it will be reported to credit rating agencies and affect the interest rate you pay on credit cards, car loans, apartment deposits and even your insurance. When you get a bill, pay

it on time — every month. A credit score is based on your payment history. Credit scores are used by lenders to help determine if applicants qualify for a credit card, loan, insurance or service. Most credit scores estimate the risk a company incurs by lending money or providing a person with a service — specifically, the likelihood that the person will make payments on time in the next two to three years. Generally, the higher your credit score, the less risk you represent.

Some people think you need a credit card to build a credit score. But if you open your utility accounts in your name instead of your parent's name, you can work toward building a credit score in six months.

A late or missed payment stays on your credit report for seven years, even if the creditor has been paid in full. It is better to start off on the right foot by establishing checking and savings accounts, using your credit cards sparingly and paying all of your bills on

Robinson says employees at Tokico also use reading skills daily. Being able to read and understand instructions, part changes, product changes, etc. are vital to safety and quality, which the company relies on to meet its customers' needs.

Lawson also emphasized the ability to read and comprehend quickly. If someone doesn't have good reading skills, he says, he or she will fall behind and not receive a promotion. "In the world of manufacturing, everything depends on quick turnaround to stay competitive," he says.

"To me, high English skills present a level of competence," Lawson says. If he has concerns about a potential employee's English skills, then he questions their skills in other areas, too. So students who want to impress potential employers can begin by becoming a serious English student.

Working hard in school pays off.





- Meanwhile, make a detailed list of your property damages (photos and receipts helpful).
- The information you give us will be turned over to a state and federal flood assessment team. Those teams will then make the determination as to what can be addressed.

It is very important that anyone with damages report those damages. This is the only way local emergency management can include your property for the assessment team.

If your damages ARE NOT reported by YOU, no report can be made by the County to give to the state and federal assement teams.

The federal and state assessment teams will make the final determination regarding your property damages.

kindle possible interest for coming here since those states are among the highest taxed in the country and "people are leaving there in droves."

Meanwhile, Carloftis came out strongly for RCIDA, calling it an "absolute necessity. Carloftis went on to say, "We must have a seat at the board, on the state level, to attract industry... and that local people must invest in the county to encourage industry to locate in the county."

Mrs. Hodges agreed that it was the job of the RCIDA to bring jobs to the county but she disagreed with the county's allocation of 40% of the occupational tax revenue to the Industrial Development Authority when, she said, the state had only recommended 25% and that the state probably though it was "somewhat foolish." She also said that, if elected, she would reduce the percentage to 25%.

Carloftis rebutted that it was amazing that his detractors never complained about the \$2.1 million that had been spent on roads but only complain when "I am trying to get jobs in the county.'

When asked what their plans were to create an environment that provides more job opportunities for the citizens of Rockcastle County, Mrs. Hodges said one of the first things she would like to see done is for school children to be taught more civics and the constitution in the classroom which would "help us more in the long run" and said she thought Kentucky Highlands Development could be used to acquire more grants and use their expertise in forming entrepreneurship "to help students learn to depend on themselves and not the government." She also mentioned forming a mentoring group in the county to give students exposure to other opportunities in life rather than bad behavior.

Mrs. Hodges called it the recipe for doing things the same way they have been done for many years - depending on someone else to do for us rather than relying on ourselves.

As to how Rockcastle County is perceived in Frankfort and Washington and their plans for maintaining and building upon those relations, Carloftis answer first saying that for the first time, Rockcastle County has decided to make an investment in the county by investing \$2.7 million in the SourceCorp building and \$2.5 million in needed infrastructure at Business Park South. The \$2.7 is being repaid by SourceCorp's lease payments and the bulk of the \$2.5 will be repaid by \$1.7 million in grants from the state.. Mrs. Hodges said she would be interested in good relations with the state but not so much with Washington at this time.

Land use planning was the subject of the next two questions – simply asking the candidates if they were in favor of land use planning when possible in the areas of locations for salvage yards, quarries and landfills.

Mrs. Hodges said she felt that zoning may be of use in the city but she was definitely not in favor of countywide zoning. She added that people were being attracted to the county because they wanted to get away from zoning. "Zoning hinders productivity," Hodges said.

Carloftis again reiterated that zoning had never been brought before the court and never even discussed by them. However, he did say that he felt there should be some protection for private property.

In her rebuttal, Hodges accused Carloftis of not giving the voters a "straight answer" and said if he were re-elected there will be zoning.

Burdette called once more for a definitive answer to the question of for or against planning and zoning and this time, Carloftis said that although he felt there must be some protection for private property he had said several times that he was not for zon-

Hodges, in effect, called him out on the answer, telling the audience that Carloftis had never said before that he was against zoning.

In the same area, the next question dealt with restrictive land use and how the candidates saw the county's future with or without land use plan-

Carloftis called for common sense being used and said you could not allow someone to build a drag strip in the middle of a subdivision, instead you have to have common sense regulations. Ms. Hodges said that Jim Holton had said in a fiscal court meeting that any industry coming into the county would want to know who their neighbors would be and, to her, that would restrict the use of her property but she did agree that county ordinances might be used to control some areas.

Taxation and grants were then discussed with Mrs. Hodges saying that while she did not think the occupational tax could be abolished, the rate could be cut by reducing spending to the one-half cents she said the state recommended originally. "I do think there are other ways to have money in the county ... I am looking forward to cutting the occupational tax rate for sure," Hodges said.

As to grants, Hodges said that grants would have to be obtained at times but she didn't like being in debt and grants would have to be obtained when the county could afford to pay their portion of

any matching grant. On the two issues, of taxation, Carloftis said that if you really want to go back to the 1930s and not move the county forward of have operating funds for the county you would do away with the occupational tax. He also said the state required the county to levy the tax. Carloftis said he was for going after grants and would always be trying to obtain grants especially for water lines, roads, industrial park and recreational facili-

As to whether or not the candidates' plans for the county involve making changes to attract and create job opportunities, better recreational facilities, shopping districts and ball parks for our citizens, Hodges said her plan would be to encourage private enterprise to develop areas for ATVs/4wheelers, waterways, boating, etc. which would return money to the county. However, Carloftis said that private enterprise would be better if helped by local government. He said the county was presently planning for new recreational facilities and helping the horse camps in the county to provide opportunities and

recreation for young people. The question of whether the county should be involved in tourism in the areas of Renfro Valley, Lake Linville and Cedar Rapids, Carloftis said that the county had never been involved in the castle project at Renfro Valley that this was a project of the City of Mt Vernon and the Tourism Board with the cooperation of Rep. Hal Rogers. But he said the court did wish the city and tourism board well on the project.

Hodges said that people in Washington were inclined to push projects on counties and she felt that an attempt would be made ultimately to get the

county involved. Just before the closing remarks by each candidate, the candidates were asked to submit a question to each other to be answered. Mrs. Hodges went first to answer Carloftis' question as to whether or not she though it had been a good idea 12 years ago to spend \$1.2 million dollars to expand the jail, as required by the state.

Hodges said it was probably not a bad idea but she has often noticed that the jail needs funds but would have to see what the cost to the county would be to farm inmates out or building the jail, figuring in the cost of the in-

terest and comparing the two. Carloftis said that the cost to house prisoners in Danville when the jail was being expanded was \$30,000 a month from Rockcastle taxpayers.

Hodges question to Carloftis asked him how much the county was in debt. Carloftis started the answer by saying that when he came into office, the county was \$6 million in debt but there was no money to pay obligations because property taxes had not been raised for 27 years. He also noted that the indebtedness included state obligations and obligations including for the annex which was listed as a county obligation but was paid by the state.

In response, Hodges said the county was \$12 million in debt with payment due each year of \$800,000. On rebuttal, Carloftis denied this saying that the annex, Western Water, Eastern Water, and some fire departments all owed part of this debt and repaid the county monthly for the payment.

In their closing remarks, Hodges went first and told the crowd that this campaign experience had been "wild and wonderful." Hodges said people had been very gracious and she would always "value and be proud of you as citizens." She also pledged to always treat voters as individuals and value their thinking but most of all, she said she wanted to keep the county free that citizens did not need to be forcibly changed. "We don't need debt that will put us in jeopardy," Hodges said.

Carloftis thanked the voters for the trust and confidence that has been placed in him for the past 17 years – making him the 4th longest serving judge in the state. He said that although we owed more now than 17 years ago, the difference was that now there was \$5 in the coffers for every \$1 of debt whereas 17 years ago there was 98c for every dollar. He pointed out that state law does not require a county to provide for fire departments, ambulance service, library or for Little league but he asked, "do you want to live in a community without this?" In his opinion, Carloftis said the last time Rockcastle was progressive was 90 years ago when the Rockcastle Better Roads Society was instrumental in bringing U.S. 25 through the county. "After Rockcastle quit investing in themselves while other counties continued and we helped them do it by driving there to work."

Kentucky in Washington,

All six candidates in the May primary for the 34th District State Senate seat were present. The three Republicans who will face off in the primary are: Jared Carpenter, Dr. Kent Kessler and Barry Metcalf. All three proclaimed themselves a "true conservative" dedicated to working for smaller government. Kessler made his time a little more personal – telling the crowd that they needed to vote for who they thought could win in November. Metcalf, who once held the seat, reminded the crowd that he had a 100% Pro Life voting record and supported the Second Amendment – the right to bear arms.

The three Democrat candidates for the office are: Mike Cope, Landra Lewis and Lee Murphy. Cope said he was running because it was important to elect people to office who were grounded in their values as he is. Lewis advocated investing Kentucky dollars in Kentucky small businesses and Murphy spoke about his heavy involvement in Democrat party affairs and jokingly asked for the support of the "four or five Democrats in the crowd."

Only three Constable candidates - two from the 4th District - were present to speak, along with Delno McClure from the 2nd Dis-

All five incumbent magistrates were on hand, along with nine of their challengers. The incumbents laid out their accomplishments while in office, including blacktopping roads in their district and getting rid of almost all gravel roads and wooden bridges. Challengers who were present were: Mike Cameron,

The four Sheriff's candidates - incumbent Mike Peters and challengers Rick Brummett, Ken Holt and Billy Gene Rash were all present.

Brummett spoke first and emphasized that he would provide 24/7 coverage for the county and would reinstate the DARE program in the school. Ken Holt spoke next declaring his intentions to reinstitute the DARE program and said he would have a dedicated team to focus solely on fighting drugs in the county. Sheriff Peters reminded the crowd of his 18 years in law enforcement, and said had done the best he could with the resources available to him. Ken Billy Gene Rash was the last to speak and said he was aware of corrupt law in the county and in the courthouse he said he would be for the people, regardless of their last name.

Two of the three candidates for Mt. Vernon Mayor spoke. Nathaniel Price was

not present. Don Jones, currently a Mt. Vernon city councilman said he would provide leadership for the council and get rid of the "shadowy, good old boy" system.

Dr. Mike Bryant noted that there was much to do in Mt. Vernon but he felt he was equal to the task. He also said he couldn't wait to tap into the skills, talents and ideas from the citizens of Mt. Vernon.





Doctors discuss Age-Related Macular Degeneration

May is Older American's Month and this month's topic of Dine with the Docs will provide important information about a leading cause of vision loss in Americans 60 years of age and older.

"Age-Related Macular Degeneration" (AMD) is the topic of discussion for the Tuesday, May 11, meeting. The meeting will be held in the Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital Conference Center on the basement level of the East Tower. A specially-discounted dinner will be available in Chatters Café at 5:30 p.m. EDT with the program to follow at 6:30 p.m. EDT. The public is invited to attend.

AMD affects the sharp, central vision necessary for seeing objects clearly, or doing such everyday tasks as reading and driving. In some cases it advances so slowly people notice little change in their vision, however, in others the disease progresses quickly and may lead to loss of vision in both eyes.

If you suffer from age-related macular degeneration, if you have a family history of AMD, or if you would just like to learn more about this disease, this month's program will definitely be of interest to you.

The featured speakers are ophthalmologists Mark Huffman, M. D. and Jacob J. Yunker, M.D. Dr. Huffman will discuss symptoms and diagnosis of age-related macular degeneration as well as risk factors, causes, and the different types of AMD. Dr. Yunker will provide important information on treatments that are currently available, including laser surgery, and will give a glimpse of new research and future treatment options such as stem cell research and retinal implants. A question and answer session will follow the program.

Dr. Huffman graduated Cum Laude from Northern Kentucky University. He received his medical degree from the University of Kentucky College of Medicine. After completing his residency in internal medicine at the University of Cincinnati, he returned to the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center where he did ophthalmology research and completed his residency in ophthalmology.

Dr. Huffman is board-certified by the American Board of Ophthalmology and he has numerous publications, research projects and presentations to his credit. He is in private practice with Huffman and Huffman, PSC, along with his brother, Dr. James Huffman.

Dr. Yunker received his medical degree from the University of Louisville School of Medicine, where he graduated Summa Cum Laude. After completing his internship in internal medicine at the University of Louisville Hospital, Dr. Yunker completed his residency in ophthalmology at the Callahan Eye Foundation Hospital at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. He also completed a fellowship in retina and vitreous surgery at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, Retina Consultants of Alabama, P.C. He is assistant professor, retina and vitreous surgery at the University of Kentucky College of Medicine, Department of Ophthalmology and Visual Sciences. Dr. Yunkers is a Fellow of the American Society of Retina Specialists. He has numerous publications, research projects and presentations to his credit.

Tips on flood damaged vehicles

Attorney General warns against price gouging

Attorney General Jack Conway is putting Kentucky businesses on notice that price-gouging will not be tolerated during times of emergency. Gov. Steve Beshear recently declared a state of emergency in the wake of this weekend's severe thunderstorms that resulted in flooding and widespread damage across the Central and Eastern parts of Kentucky. Additionally, four deaths were also blamed on the severe weather.

"My thoughts and prayers are with the families who lost loved ones as a result of the severe weather," said General Conway. "Be assured, my office stands ready to investigate and prosecute anyone who seeks excessive profits during emergency situations. Those who have fallen victim to this storm should not be victimized again by unscrupulous price-gougers."

The emergency declaration issued by Gov. Beshear triggers several consumer protection measures that will remain in place for 30 days. Among them, it empowers the Attorney General to investigate and prosecute, where appropriate, those who sell gasoline, generators, building supplies, chain saws, hotel rooms and other necessary goods and services at a price grossly in excess of the prices at the time of the emergency declaration unless the sellers costs increased as well.

Attorney General Conway provides the following tips to consumers needing storm repair or clean up services:

•Never pay in advance for repair work or materials. Scam artists often take advance payments from consumers and never return to complete the work. If an advance is needed to purchase materials, offer to purchase the materials yourself;

•Use local, reputable contractors for repairs, if possible. If local contractors bring in out-of-town workers, ask who will be responsible for their work if it is not satisfactory;

•Ask if the contractor is licensed, bonded (if required by the city or county), and insured;

•Check unknown companies out with the Better Business Bureau (Louisville/ Western KY 1-800-388-2222; Lexington/Eastern KY 1-800-866-6668) or call the Consumer Protection Division 1-888-432-9257 to see if information is available about the company;

•Demand a written contract. If possible, get estimates from several contractors:

•Be suspicious of unfamiliar, out-of-state vehicles and

those who offer repair work at unreasonably low prices. Contact local law enforcement about your suspicions.

Mold remediation is also a concern for victims of flooding. Public health concerns associated with water damage include mold mitigation and prevention, carbon monoxide exposure and proper food handling and storage. For more information visit http://tinyurl.com/2bb74ys.

Kentuckians should utilize the following tips if their vehicles have suffered water damage.

•Check your oil. A reading of an oil level that is too high may indicate water in the engine. Do not start or run your car, it could cause severe damage. Contact your insurance company immediately. Comprehensive coverage of a vehicle includes losses other than collision, such as flood, fire, theft, vandalism, falling objects and colliding with animals

•If you have a car loan, notify your lender of the damage

•Act quickly to determine the vehicle's current NADA average prior to the flood damage. Owners will need to know this when dealing with an insurance provider, and perhaps, in dealing with any lender.

•Determine how high the flood water reached on your vehicle. If the water reached the midpoint of the tire, there may be severe damage to electrical systems generally located along the bottom of the floor. Some experts consider the vehicle a total loss if this area is flooded.

Attorney General Monitoring Gas Prices in Wake of Storms

Attorney General Conway and his Office of Consumer Protection are monitoring gas prices in the wake of this weekend's storms.

"My Office of Consumer Protection has already begun receiving calls from consumers complaining about an increase in gas prices and we are monitoring prices for any potential violations," said General Conway. "I encourage anyone with specific information regarding possible price-gouging to email pricecomplaints@ag.ky.gov or call my Consumer Protection Hotline at 888-432-9257."

A price-gouging investigation by General Conway in the wake of the September 2009 windstorm in Kentucky resulted in recoveries of more than \$100,000 involving eight retail stations in seven different Kentucky counties.





Kentucky Afield Outdoors

Planting for Wildlife

With the last frost date fast approaching, now is the time to get started on seasonal plantings for wildlife.

This includes food plots, stands of warm season grasses, legumes, such as clover, and preparing soil for plantings later in the year.

A field of sunflowers, planted for dove hunting in the fall, is one of the most common food plots. You should plant sunflowers no later than the third week in May so fields will begin attracting local birds as the seeds ripen.

"You want ripe, mature flowers by the second or third week of August," said Rocky Pritchert, migratory bird program coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

Hunting for mourning doves in Kentucky traditionally starts Sept. 1.

'We recommend opening up (mowing) about 25 percent of the field by mid-August," said Pritchert. "As opening day approaches, mow additional strips in the sunflower field, to spread seeds on the ground.'

Field preparation in the spring should start with plowing, and then disking the soil until the plant bed is loose. Pritchert highly recommends a soil test to determine whether the field needs fertil-

If you do need to fertilize, 20-10-10 (20 percent nitrogen, 10 percent phosphate and 10 percent potash) is a good choice. Apply it at the rate of 200 to 250 pounds an acre. Apply fertilizer then lightly disk it into the ground about a week before you plant.

Black oil sunflower seed the kind used in birdfeeders is a good choice. The seeds are small, and a 50-pound bag is inexpensive compared to the price of sunflower seed that has a certified germination rate.

Sunflower seed should be planted with a corn planter or drilled into the seed bed to a depth of about 1/2 to 1 inch. Rows can be 20 to 40 inches apart. Broadcast seeding rarely gives the desired results because it is difficult to control weeds between the sun-

flower plants. Doves are particular about the fields they'll visit. "It's important to cultivate between rows, to keep weeds to a minimum," said Pritchert. This gives birds easy access to bare dirt between the rows, where they can dust their bodies and forage for seeds that have fallen to the ground.

Food plots ranging from one to five acres are the recommended size to concentrate deer and wild turkey for viewing or hunting. Plant each plot in a long strip near escape cover, such as woodlands or brush. Corn, left standing, is an excellent winter food source for deer.

Chufa, a bunch grass with a peanut-like tuber, is a favorite food of wild turkeys. It matures in about 100 days, in early fall. Buckwheat is another top crop for turkeys. Birds readily eat the large black seeds produced when this leafy plant matures.

Annual grains, such as winter wheat or rye, make good food and cover for wildlife, especially quail. Ben Robinson, a wildlife biologist with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, recommends a 2to 3-year rotation of plantings. "Say you have three acres of winter wheat, then the next year you would re-plant one acre of wheat, and leave two acres fallow,"

Fallow areas provide shelter for quail chicks. "They can find room to move underneath the cover, and some seeds of native plants will sprout in the area where the soil has been disturbed," Robinson explained.

In pre-settlement days, grasslands covered an estimated 3 million acres in the state. Warm season grasses, such as eastern gamagrass, switchgrass, big bluestem and Indiangrass, provide food and overhead cover for rabbits and quail. Deer also use stands of tall grass for bedding areas.

Site preparation is important. Prior to planting, treat the area with an herbicide if necessary to rid the area of fescue. Warm season grasses, which can reach heights of 5 to 8 feet, actively grow once soil temperatures reach 65 degrees. Plant these grasses in the spring.

"Broadcasting is a good way to sow warm season grass seed," said Robinson. "It creates a sparse, less dense stand of grass, which gives rabbits and quail more room to move."

Established stands of legumes, such as clover, can last for 2 to 3 years and provide a food source that deer, wild turkey and small game will use from early spring until heavy frosts kill back vegetation in the fall.

Clover builds soil nutrients, attracts insects - an excellent food source for young turkeys - provides high-quality forage, and grows tall enough to offer cover for young rabbits.

Clover thrives in welldrained, sunny fields with moderately fertile soils. Since clover grows best in soils with pH levels between 6.0 and 7.0, you may need to add agricultural lime if the soil is too acidic.

Landowners planting in new areas may want to spend additional time conditioning the soil beforehand. Plow in the spring, then periodically disk or cultivate throughout the summer to rid the soil of sod and weeds.

In late August or early September, plant a crop that will become a food source in fall and winter. Turnips or other cold-tolerant greens will attract deer during the late season.

Landowners with 25 acres or more qualify for an on-site visit and management plan when enrolled in the department's Wildlife Habitat Improvement (HIP) Program. Private lands biologists offer the technical guidance free of charge. Landowners participating in this program do not have to open their property to public hunting or use.


