Voters go to the polls Tuesday in hotly-contested election

Hodges waited until the last possible day to file her candidacy papers but has wasted no time since promoting her differences with the present administration, including her claim in a recent debate, that if Carloftis is reelected for his fifth term, the county will have planning and zoning.

A number of other issues divide the two candidates. Carloftis, who said during the debate that he did not support planning and zoning and denies that the court has ever considered implementing it, is a strong advocate of seeking grants to help the county advance their projects while

The make-up day for school missed Monday, May 3rd because of severe flooding, will be this Saturday, May 15th, a decision made at Tuesday night's regular meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education. School will dismiss at 2 p.m. on Saturday.

The last day of school remains Saturday, May 29th.

Prior to the regular meeting, the board heard reports from principals in the district. The report was on different initiatives and programs currently in place.

In other action, the board voted to approve the process for two construction projects -- replacing the roof at Roundstone Elementary and renovating existing rooms in

the Rockcastle Academy for Academic Achievement (alternative school).

The plan must be sent to the Kentucky Department of Education for approval.

Renovation of the former vocational school, which now houses the Rockcastle Academy for Academic Achievement, maintenance storage and technology work place, will give the district the option of adding adult education, as well as higher education classes, to the existing building.

The board also approved a partnership with Pulaski County Schools for the Schools Energy Management Project for the 2010-11 school year.

Court asked to rescind motion on **ATV** roads

It first appeared that Tuesday's regular meeting of the fiscal court would be a routine one but that was before County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis asked if any of the visitors wished to speak.

Gene Philbeck, owner of Red Hill Horse Camp, told the court he wished there had been input asked for in the court's recent decision to open up some roads in the county to ATVs because

"horses and four wheelers don't mix." Philbeck, who said he had \$500,000 and 10 years invested in his business and that the court's action was going to "put me out of business.'

Carloftis responded that it was certainly not the court's intention to put the horse camp out of business. "We only want to protect and build

President Obama declares Rockcastle federal disaster area

U.S. Congressman Hal Rogers (KY-05) announced that President Obama has authorized a federal disaster declaration for 11 counties throughout Kentucky that were devastated by severe flash flooding, tornadoes, mudslides, high rains and water damage beginning on May 1, 2010 and continuing. This is in response to Governor Beshear's initial May 3, 2010 request. Immediately following, the Kentucky congressional delegation sent a bipartisan letter to President Obama in support of the Governor's request.

"I applaud the President for declaring a federal disaster in counties throughout Kentucky, including Rockcastle and Rowan, so that our affected families and communities now have access to federal funds to help with the clean-up from these devastating storms," said Rogers. "The damage from these torrential rains was overwhelming and this declaration will begin the process of cleaning up our schools, homes, and businesses. There are many

The counties being declared a federal disaster area and designated for Public Assistance (available to state and local governments and certain non-profit organizations for repairs/emergency work) include Allen, Hart, Lewis, Logan, Metcalfe, Monroe and Rockcastle Counties. Casey, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Metcalfe, Rockcastle, Rowan, and Woodford Counties are eligible for Individual Assistance (available to individuals and households for certain storm-related services/repairs). Other counties may be included as additional damage assessments are completed. All counties in the Commonwealth are eligible to apply for assistance under the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (available to state and local governments and certain private non-profit organizations for actions taken to prevent or reduce longterm risk to life and property from natural hazards.)

Individuals and local governments claiming a stormrelated loss and seeking assistance from storm damages should contact the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) at (800) 621-3362 or TTY (800) 462-7585 for persons with speech or hearing disabilities. Addi-

In the release, Reynolds said there have been several bullying incidents of late, including ones at Mt. Vernon City Park, Brodhead City Park and in the Rockcastle County School System.

After writing the warrant, Reynolds referred the juveniles involved to the court designated worker.

"I take bullying seriously and I expect all children to have a safe place to play and a safe learning environment." Reynolds said in the release. "Bullying will not be tolerated by me. Should any parent feel their child is a victim of bullying, feel free to contact me directly or call 911," Reynolds also said.


I thought that the questions that were asked were all very appropriate. Several of the questions had to do with economic development and

more specifically the role that the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority (RCIDA) plays in our local economic development efforts. The format of this debate didn't allow the candidates to have notes with them so every answer or comment they gave was from memory. That being said, there were some comments and statements represented as fact regarding the work of the RCIDA that were either partially or altogether incorrect. As the current Chairman of the RCIDA, I would like to take a moment to correct some of these issues.

THE FACTS

It was implied that the South Business Park Project has excessively put the county into debt that it will take many years to pay back. There are two parts to this project. The first part is the construction of the building that is being leased by SOURCECORP. The cost on the site prep and construction costs for this building were \$2,886,982. We borrowed \$2,700,000 from Community Trust Bank for this part. The current balance \$2,538,517. The monthly principle payment on the loan is \$16,071.43 and the monthly lease payment paid

"Hello Baby... Want A Kiss?"

During the time I was attending Mt. Vernon High School, my mother (Bee) and I lived in a tiny house that was located on the small farm owned by both her and her parents (Pop and Mommie Katie). The two houses were situated on either end of the property. After my high school graduation and leaving for the University of Kentucky, Bee decided to move in with Pop and Mommie Katie so that she could take care of them and not have the expense of maintaining her

own home. On weekends when I came home, I noticed that Bee seemed sad and lonely even though she was extremely busy. She had been used to having two active boys around the house and was feeling that "empty nest." It concerned me because she had been totally involved in her children's lives and now she only had her elderly par-

On my ride back to UK, I began to consider how I could provide my mother with some sort of hobby to occupy her spare time. Since there was no interstate road at the time, my trip took me through Richmond, where I noticed a pet store that planted an idea in my head. That week I drove around Lexington looking for just the right pet for my mother. I was absolutely sure Pop would never consider having a dog or cat in his house so I had to be somewhat creative with my selection.

The second pet store that I visited had several birds on display. I asked the manager if he could recommend a pet for a lady my mother's age. His face lit up and he said, "I have just the right pet in mind." He showed me a baby blue parakeet that was approximately six months old. He explained, "We have been working with this bird, and he can already say several words including: Hello, Hello Baby. Want a kiss?, and the word Treat." I was so glad the bird already had some practice speaking. I purchased the bird

and lots of supplies for Bee. In the book that I bought to accompany all the supplies, I learned that parakeets are highly affectionate and intelligent. It included information about how to train them to speak several words. Males can easily acquire a large vocabulary – sometimes up to 100 words. Parakeets love to climb, and I provided Bee with lots of toys, perches, and a cuttle bone to keep its beak in shape. During the past many weeks I have presented my plans on bringing drugs, theft and child abuse under control in Rockcastle County.

Many of these plans do not require any additional money or manpower to implement. To put these plans in action only requires us to go to work.

I understand the frustration of the present Sheriff with receiving 500-600 phone calls per month. My first response to this is: "Where is the plan to reduce these calls"?

As with any action plan, if it does not work, we need to re-group and come up with another plan. I will never just give up and let the drug dealers and thieves continue destroying our children, our security and well being.

In addition to these plans we must be pro-active in educating our children about drugs and other substance abuse. Our children are our most valuable resource. They deserve to live in an environment that promotes their fullest potential.

My goal is to have the most affective and professionally run Sheriff's Department in Kentucky. If we do not change what we are doing to counter our growing crime epidemic it will not stay the same, it will get worse.



by the tenant is \$25,395.83 and the lease term is 7 years. The entire lease payment is being applied to the loan each month. Our goal is to have this debt paid off in about 9 1/2 to 10 years. In order to accomplish this goal it will require all of the cash flow received from the tenant and the occupational tax received from the jobs created by the tenant to be applied to the debt each year.

The second part of the project is the acquisition of land, construction of the new access road, construction of all utilities, etc. This part is not completed yet, but in the end is expected to cost \$3,132,457.41. The RCIDA has received three grants for this part of the project totaling \$2,058,000. Keep in mind that you do not have to repay grants. First we received a \$420,000 grant from the Economic Development Administration (EDA). This is a restricted grant to be used for the construction of the utilities, i.e. conduit, water and sewer lines, lights, etc. This grant requires \$180,000 match from the RCIDA. Or in other words this is a 70/30 matching grant meaning that for every dollar spent on this work up to \$600,000 the EDA will reimburse the RCIDA 70% up to \$420,000. The second grant we received was from the Kentucky Cabinet for Economic Development's Access Road Fund in the amount of \$338,000. This money was for the specific purpose of the cost associated with the construction of the access road from Henderson Drive in front of B&H Tool back to the new building. This grant cost the county nothing. The third grant we received was from the Kentucky Department of Transportation in the amount of \$1,300,000. This grant was for the construction of the access road from Henderson Drive to Hwy. 150, the construction of the new turn lanes off of Hwy. 150, conduit for lighting on the highway, etc. This grant cost the county nothing. So, at the end of the project there will be a balance of \$1,261,439.51 that the RCIDA and the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will be obligated to debt service.

To summarize, you have the first part of the project that has a current debt of \$2,538,517 that is being serviced by cash flow from the tenant of the building that hopefully will be paid in full within 10 years. The second part of the project will have an estimated balance of

\$1,261,439.51 that will have to be serviced by cash flows available from the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court. So, in other words you have a \$6,019,439.51 project in which the County will be servicing \$1,261,439 or 21% of the total cost.

Another point that should be addressed regarding this project is the issue of landscaping. It has been stated and implied that the RCIDA has committed to spending an excessive amount of money on landscaping the park. This is not true. While it is true that at some point there will be some landscaping and signage done on the park, nothing has been done to this point. This part of the overall project will have to be advertised for bids just like every other phase has. So, we will not know how much this will cost until we have received and opened bids, which again, has not happened yet.

The second thing I would like to clarify is that the RCIDA does not receive 40% of the occupational tax receipts each year. It is true that the Fiscal Court allocated 40% of the total occupational tax receipts to economic development. They did not allocate 40% to the RCIDA and the Fiscal Court does not give the RCIDA a check equivalent to 40% of the occupational tax revenue each year. The RCIDA must submit a request for any type of funding that they may need and then it is up to the Fiscal Court to approve or deny the request.

Lastly, it was implied that the RCIDA was spending money to have the hay cut at the South Business Park by bidding the work. This is not correct. We will be paid by the winning bidder for the hay. This is an income stream, not an expense.

These are just three of the issues I heard that I felt like needed to be corrected. It is important to the RCIDA that as it pertains to the work we are doing, the public have accurate factual information.

The RCIDA is working very hard to try to create an environment that will be conducive for job creation and retention. This takes time and effort and many tireless hours by many volunteers. The RCIDA welcomes all ideas, input and suggestions that anyone may have. We meet the first Monday of every month on the 3rd floor of the Rockcastle County Courthouse at 11:30am. 
RCHS girls' track team wins four invitationals

The RCHS girls' track team picked up four invitational wins recently against some great competition. The first came at the AA Derby hosted by Casey County. Rockcastle had a great meet and dominated regional rival Boyle County 170 to 141.5 for the win.

In the 100 hurdles, Alyssa Allen tied a season's best time finishing 3rd overall in 18.24 seconds while Jessica Albright finished 5th in 18.41 seconds. In the 300's, Jessica dominated with a season's best time of 50.6 seconds. Alyssa placed 3rd with a personal best time of 52.1 seconds.

In the 100-meter dash, Samantha Smith easily won with a season's best time of 12.91 seconds, while Kira Deatherage placed 5th in 13.85 seconds.

State Representative Danny Ford is unopposed for his 15th term. However, following State Senator Ed Worley's decision not to seek re-election, the field filled quickly with both Republicans and Democrats

on the horse riding trails in the county." The Judge went on to say that the intent of the court's action was to keep 4-wheel riders from being ticketed after they park in Rockcastle County and ride through the national forest into Jackson County which has opened all their county roads to ATVs.

The question of whether or not the roads could be opened to local riders only as brought up but was quickly shot down by County Attorney Billy Reynolds who said it would be illegal. Philbeck said that people from out -of-state had become aware of the court's decision and were coming in to ride here and "they don't spend a penny here, they even bring their own gas." Philbeck's wife, Rosalind added that out-of-state people that had been coming to their horse camp had told them "they wouldn't be back (because of the ATVs)."

Carloftis said that the court noted, when the motion was passed, that if the action created a problem, it would be readdressed and he reiterated that again.

Philbeck then told the court that he was "asking, respectfully, that you rescind this motion today."

Carloftis told the magistrates that he would entertain a motion that the original motion be rescinded but none was forthcoming from the magistrates.

Also on the subject, it was brought up whether or not the ATV had to be licensed and insured. After the meeting, Carloftis looked again at the statute governing the vehicles on public roads and found that the driver must have a valid operators license but had to contact the state attorney general's office as to whether the vehicle itself must be licensed and insured. As of late Tuesday, he had not received an answer.

Carloftis once again laid out the restrictions on operating an ATV on a public road. Besides a valid driver's license, they include: wearing a protective helmet, at least one headlight and two taillights (in use at all times) on the vehicle and operation shall be restricted to daylight

One of the items of business, including Carloftis telling the court that the county's help had been requested for four water projects -- two each for Western Rockcastle Water and Eastern Rockcastle Water. The projects include extending water lines on Mullins Station Road and the Hummel Road and Eastern's projects include extensions on Wolf Creek Road and Green Pond Ridge.

The Mullins Station Road project will involve securing a permit from CSX Railroad that could cost as much as \$10,000, Carloftis said. Some of the other expense to the county will include in-kind labor by county workers.

The Green Pond Ridge project, estimated at a cost \$155,000, and the Hummel Road project will both include pump stations and, Carloftis said, engineering work had been started and the two water associations hoped to secure state funding through Rep. Danny Ford and Sen. Ed Worley.

This information drew a reaction from Gary Mason who told the court that he felt the court should cut off funding for Eastern until they opened their meetings to the public, including their water customers.

However, Carloftis pointed out that the court had no control over Eastern since they were viewed as a private entity. The county can obtain low interest loans for the association when are paid by the county and the county is then reimbursed by Eastern.

County Attorney Billy Reynolds even ventured the opinion that Eastern was not subject to the Open Records Law.

The recent severe flooding in the county was also addressed by Carloftis who told the court that he had declared the county in a State of Emergency which had brought several federal and state teams into the county to begin assessing the damages to pubic

and private property.

Carloftis said that private contractors were being hired to deal with damage to public property and three bills were presented to the court by Carpenter's Custom Bulldozing and included \$5,855 for work on Wolf Creek Road, \$760 on the McCollum Road and \$90 on New Hope Tower Road.

These bills must be paid by the county before they can be reimbursed 88% - 75% by the federal government and 13% by the state.

Carloftis said that four contractors were presently working on damaged public property: Clifford Collins, Goff Excavating, James Carpenter and Gary Mink.

He told the court that he did not know when the county might be declared a disaster area by the state which would make assistance available from the federal government. However, late Tuesday afternoon, Rockcastle was declared a disaster area, one of 11 counties in the state (see separate story on front page).

In other action, the court approved releasing \$2,000, the last of the coal severance funds awarded to the Mt. Vernon Rescue Squad, for the purchase of a boat to be used in water rescues;

Approved a donation of \$500 to the City of Brodhead for their Dix River Festival, and

Approved reimbursement of \$3,008.83 to the Brindle Ridge Fire Department for 90% of their utilities for January, 2009 thru June, 2009.



Flooding creates home safety concerns

The Kentucky Department for Public Health (DPH) is issuing safety guidelines to aid Kentuckians in the wake of large amounts of water runoff and flooding throughout the state. If possible, contact with flood waters should be avoided, as they may contain contaminants that could pose health hazards. Homeowners whose homes sustained water

damage are urged to follow recommendations to limit mold damage and to ensure proper food handling and storage.

Mold fungi can be found indoors and out and can accumulate in homes affected by flood/water damage. Mold grows best in warm, damp

and humid conditions and

spreads by making spores. "Though mold is almost always present in the air, it grows best in damp areas where humidity levels are high," said William Hacker, M.D., DPH commissioner. "The recent heavy rains throughout the state caused significant flooding, and many homes experienced water damage. This is a concern for homeowners not only because of damage to their home, but also because problems due to mold may result

if left untreated.' To recognize the signs of mold, look for discolored walls possibly showing water damage, or green or black spots apparent on walls. Mold also has a musty, earthy smell or a foul stench. Allergy sufferers tend to be most affected by mold exposure.

To decrease exposure and reduce mold in the home, DPH recommends that homeowners keep the humidity level of the home between 40 and 60 percent. The use of an air conditioner or dehumidifier may be used to achieve a lower level of humidity. Always use exhaust fans when showering and cooking. Mold inhibitors for paint are also available from home improvement stores.

When cleaning up small areas affected by mold, use protective glasses or goggles. DPH also recommends wearing rubber boots and waterproof gloves, and washing clothing afterwards. If there is a heavy mold growth area, you may wish to use a basic respirator or suitable mask to prevent breathing the spores.

Other recommendations include:

Ensure that the area is well ventilated before begin-

Remove all previously soaked porous items that have been wet for more than 48 hours and are not able to be cleaned and dried

 Disinfect hard surfaces; a solution may be mixed of 1 cup of household bleach with 1 gallon of water.

Contact a mold remediation consultant for severe mold cases.

In addition to mold concerns, DPH staff also cautions people to keep food safety in mind if they have been affected by power outages. This includes keeping freezers closed to maintain the proper temperature for frozen foods. A full freezer will hold the temperature for approximately 48 hours and for 24

hours if the freezer is half full. Health officials remind Kentuckians that a refrigerator will only hold its temperature for about four hours, meaning food items such as milk, dairy products, meats, eggs and leftovers should be placed in a cooler surrounded by ice if the outage lasts for more than four hours. Dry ice can be used to keep refrigerators cold. If the outage lasts for several days, 50 pounds of dry ice should preserve food in an 18-cubic foot full freezer for two days. (You must be careful when handling dry ice. Never touch dry ice with bare hands or breathe its vapors in an enclosed area. Dry ice is frozen carbon dioxide, a gas.)

"Situations like this emphasize the need for emergency preparedness in the home," said Guy Delius, director of the public health protection and safety division in DPH. "Food that is improperly stored or handled can lead to foodborne illness, which can be debilitating and in some cases life threaten-

If left without power, purchase one or more coolers, ice and a digital, dial or instantread food thermometer, DPH recommends. Public health guidelines also recommend keeping appliance thermometers in the refrigerator and freezer, no matter how long the power has been out. The refrigerator temperature should be 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below; the freezer should be 0 degrees Fahrenheit or lower.

"If you are not sure a particular food is cold enough, take its temperature with a food thermometer," said Delius.

DPH recommends limiting the opening of freezer and refrigerator doors, even if an appliance has been out but returns to function within a couple of hours. If the freezer is not full, DPH strongly advises that poultry and meat items be grouped away from other foods to prevent juices from contaminating other

When the refrigerator and/ or freezer are operating again, follow these guidelines to decide what to do with foods:

Refrigerated foods should be safe as long as power is out for no more than four hours.

- Throw out any perishable food in your refrigerator, such as meat, poultry, lunchmeats, fish, dairy products, eggs and any prepared or cooked foods that have been above 40 degrees Fahrenheit for two hours. Bacteria can multiply to unsafe levels under these conditions.

- Fresh fruits and vegetables are safe as long as they are still firm, and there is no evidence of mold or sliminess.

If an appliance thermometer was kept in the freezer, read the temperature when power comes back on. If the appliance thermometer stored in the freezer reads 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below, the food is safe and may be re-

- If a thermometer has not been kept in the freezer, check each package of food to determine the safety.

If the food still contains ice crystals or is 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below, it is safe to refreeze.

- Raw meats, poultry, cheese, juices, breads and pastries can be refrozen without losing too much food

- Prepared food, fish, vegetables and fruits in the freezer can be refrozen safely, but food quality may suffer.

'Remember, you can't rely on appearance or odor of the food to determine if it's safe," said Hacker. "Food that has thawed or was held above 40 degrees Fahrenheit for more than two hours should be thrown out because bacteria may multiply to unsafe

levels." To remove spills and freshen the freezer and refrigerator, DPH recommends washing with a solution of two tablespoons of baking soda dissolved in one quart of warm water. To absorb any lingering odors, place an open box or dish of baking soda in

the appliance. People should also be aware of potential risks from walking or working in flood waters. Contact with flood waters is not a risk for tetanus by itself. However, in special circumstances, people exposed to flood waters may be recommended to receive a tetanus vaccination. Unclean flood waters can pose a risk for tetanus to those who have open wounds that come into direct contact with such waters. While most people in this situation will have already been vaccinated against tetanus, a booster vaccination is recommended for those who with open wounds who have not been vaccinated in the past five years and are working in flood waters. More frequent boosters are not indicated and have been reported to result in an increased incidence and severity of local adverse reactions. For questions about whether tetanus vaccination is recommended, contact your regular health care provider or your local health department.

Mold in your home

What are molds and where are they found?

Molds are fungi that can be found both indoors and out. They are found almost everywhere in the environment, and can grow all year long. They grow best in warm, damp, and humid conditions, and spread by making spores. These spores may survive harsh environmental conditions which normally do not support mold growth.

In the home, mold is almost always present in the air. It will grow best in damp areas where humidity levels are high, such as in bathrooms or basements. Molds are very common in the home, and while there are perhaps thousands of species of mold, most of the common indoor molds include Cladosporium, Penicillium, Alternaria, and Aspergillus.

How can I recognize mold?

Moldy walls and ceilings may be discolored, or show signs of water damage. Green or black spots may also appear on the walls. Mold also has a musty, earthy smell, or a foul stench.

How are people affected, and what can be done to decrease exposure?

Allergy sufferers are those who are usually affected the most by mold exposure. Symptoms usually include nasal congestion, itchy or watery eyes, wheezing, or skin irritation. More severe reactions may include fever or shortness of breath. Those who have medical concerns regarding mold exposure are urged to contact health care provider.

To decrease exposure, and reduce mold in the home, it is best to keep the humidity level of the home between 40% and 60%. The use of an air conditioner or dehumidifier may be used to achieve a lower level of humidity. Always use exhaust fans when showering and cooking. Mold inhibitors for paint are also available from home improvement stores. These are additives which when mixed with the paint, will stunt the growth of mold on walls.

How can I test for mold in my home?

It is generally unnecessary for concerned homeowners to test their homes for mold. Determining the species of mold present will not assist with the health risk assessment. It should, however, be promptly removed. For those who still wish to have their homes tested, a mold test kit can usually be purchased at a home improvement store, or the homeowner may opt to have a consultant do testing for them.

How can I clean up mold in my home?

With a small area of mold infestation, most homeowners may clean up the mold problem themselves. It is important to take protective steps, however. Protect the eyes with glasses or goggles. Wear rubber boots and waterproof gloves and wear outer clothing that can be washed afterwards.

Ensure that the area is well ventilated before beginning.

Remove all previously soaked porous items which have been wet for more than 48 hours and are not able to be cleaned and dried. This includes carpet and carpet padding, upholstery, wallpaper, drywall, floor and ceiling tiles, insulation, clothing, paper, wood or food. Hard surfaces may be cleaned by damp wipe using soap and water.

For more severe cases, or with severe mold infestation, the homeowner may want to consider contacting a mold remediation consultant. A listing is provided with this informational packet. Always be sure when hiring a consultant to check references of previous work.

How do I keep the mold from coming back?

The key to mold pevention is moisture control. For flooding damage, ensure that the home is properly cleaned and dried out by using the aforementioned steps. For small spots, make sure to remove the source of moisture. Mold cannot grow without a source of water. By removing the water source, the homeowner can ensure that the mold growth will not return. If mold growth persists, the homeowner may want to contact a mold remediation professional for further advice. Moisture can also be hidden in the home, and this may be the source of the problem.

What is "toxic mold"? The term "toxic mold" is not correct. Certain molds may produce toxins which are referred to as mycotoxins, but the molds themselves are not toxic. The bottom line with mold contamination is that all mold should be removed from the home, regardless of what type it is. Any mold may have the potential to cause negative health effects if left unchecked.







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Yards to Paradise

There exists quite an array of sounds that are thought of as therapeutic; and topping the list are the sounds of water-be it ocean waves crashing on the shoreline or a waterfall that trickles or roars or a babbling water brookand the sounds coming from songbirds. Other sounds people find uplifting and soothing include wind chimes, wind in the tree tops, even wind whistling in the winter.

A crackling campfire or a flickering flame in a fireplace, firepit or chimenea produces a "warm cozy" feel, is mesmerizing to look upon, and many find the sounds very soothing.

Leaving sights and smell for another time, let's discuss ways to incorporate therapeutic sounds into our lives, homes and landscapes.

There are, of course, tapes, CD's, computer software of everything from "white noise" to tropical waterfalls with songbirds singing to Eastern healing music such as available at New Earth Records. Relaxation and relief of tensions from overly busy, stressed daily lives is truly healthful in a society that seems completely insane sometimes. Classical, Celtic, Irish and Calypso music are found by many to be relaxing sounds also. Even AC units and fans can mask disturbing nosies and be considered relax-

at the moment.

Some folks are blessed to live by the ocean where they can open a window to the roar of ocean waves. Some can hear a charming mountain stream with waterfalls from their cabin. For some, just a fire in a fireplace is enough to unwind by at the end of a long workday.

The sounds of running water, followed by bird songs and the crackle of a fire are considered universally to be sounds for therapeutic regeneration.

If you don't live in the perfect setting and recorded music doesn't quite "cut it", what options might you have in order to obtain these comforting sounds?

Perhaps you will want to invest in a quality man made waterfall for some spot in your yard (or even indoors). Sounds from nature can be attracted to the yard by waterfeatures. Perhaps owls, larks, robins, frogs, crickets, katydids, to name a few.

Maybe you have a fireplace, but if not, perhaps a firepit outside or a chimenea will suffice. Or consider adding a fireplace.

Seeing playful flames and hearing the pop and crackle, smelling the wood smoke, getting that "snuggly feeling" to cuddle with a loved one—these certainly can be relaxing moments.

Wind produces therapeutic sounds. It rustles in the leaves, sings through the boughs of pine and other evergreen trees, and plays tunes on the wind chimes. Adding some evergreen trees or acquiring

chime can enhance the wind-powered soothing sounds at your place.

As a child, I recall nothing sounded nicer to go to sleep by than rain on the tin roof. Again, water can be so soothing.


Bring more songbirds to your yard by putting out bird feeders, bird houses, bird baths or running streams. Trees such as holly and dogwoods and crabapples hold lunch for a feathered friend. Milkweed, coneflowers and thistles may entice a goldfinch. Pine cones may attract a number of birds in addition to giving them a secure resting spot in the pine tree.

So, whether you find waterfalls, crackling embers, blowing breezes, or the music of cute songbirds gives you relief from stress-you can make fairly easy alterations to your yard and home to provide them. My take is it is a good investment and adds tranquility to one's
