Grand Jury indicts eight

Eight indictments were returned by a Rockcastle Grand Jury on Friday, May 14th, three for flagrant non-support.

Three persons were named in one indictment for theft by unlawful taking and criminal trespassing.

Named in that indictment were: Daniel Keith Howell, 51, of Lexington; Darrell E. Doan, 54, of Poplar Street Ext. in Mt. Vernon and Kimberly D. Slusher, 30, of Towhee Lane, Livingston.

The indictments stemmed from the theft of property, in March of this year, from Ricky Bullock with a value of over \$500.

All three men's bonds were set at \$25,000 cash/property.

Scott A. Goforth, 38, of South Wilderness Road, Mt. Vernon was indicted for possession of a controlled substance (metham-

phetamine), first degree/second offense and tampering with physical evidence.

Goforth is free on the same bond as was set for him in district court.

Hand-gun charges brought a two-count indictment against Kenneth W. Sturgill of Gap Road, Livingston. Sturgill for two counts of possession of a handgun by a convicted felon.

Sturgill's bond was also set at \$25,000 cash/property.

The three indictments handed down for flagrant non-support involved:

Matthew Scott Browning, 32, of Slate Ridge Road, Lily for failing to provide for minor child/children in the amount of \$16,173;

Marty Wayne Harris, 39, of Marler Hollow

Animal removal assistance approved

The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board, chaired by Gov. Steve Beshear, approved \$2,250 at their monthly meeting in support of a Deceased Farm Animal Removal Program in Rockcastle County. The Rockcastle County Conservation District submitted a proposal to the Rockcastle County Agricultural Development Council and the Kentucky Agricultural Development Board.

The Deceased Farm Animal Removal Program was established as an interim measure to facilitate the coordination of environmentally sound and cost effective disposal of deceased livestock for Kentucky's producers. Funds through this program will assist with the expenses of an acceptable disposal program, such as contracting for removal, incineration, composting

Of course, Rick was our son, father, brother and husband and his son, Aaron, gave the Eulogy at his father's funeral last Saturday. It conveyed all our feeling for Rick, but especially those of his son's and daughter's and we wanted to share it with our readers:

Memorial to Rick Anderkin, editor of the Mount Vernon (Ky.) Signal By his son, Aaron Anderkin, May, 2010.

I stand before you today realizing that these next few minutes are without a doubt the most important I will spend in my life. From a personal perspective, I face the challenge of honoring the man that shaped everything I am and will continue to be. I face the challenge of honoring the man who was not only a wonderful father to my sister and I, but also our best friend.

But my father should be proud to know that what makes this task even more daunting is that his influence traveled far beyond the confines of his family and into the lives of so many people who would also consider him their best friend.

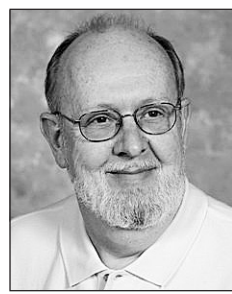
And before I get any further, I want to get one thing out of the way. All of us that knew Dad, who really knew Dad, have no concerns or worries about where he spends today – and that is because we knew his heart. I

cannot think of any one person who carried around as much compassion as my father. His thoughtful nature was inherent to who he was, and I have no reservations that he was just as thoughtful in his relationship with the Lord.

I'm not going to deny that Dad faced a terrible disease, a disease that brought demons for him to confront every second of his day. What I will deny is that the disease won out because it did not! And I say this because it didn't dictate the man that he was. What I have the great honor of doing today is reflecting on just what kind of man he was.

We can all give a testimony that would ultimately help us put into words the man that he was. But, allow me to sum it up from a son's perspective. He was a Dad, a brother, a husband, a son, and a friend – but he was so much more than that. Working as the Editor of the Signal, Dad had the opportunity to interact with a lot of people from a number of circles and different backgrounds. He was

Rockcastle Memories

Main Street – A Look Back

Bud Cox and I were recently driving around Mt. Vernon reminiscing about our teenage years and making note of how different Main Street looks now compared to how it looked in the 1950's. Bud suggested that I “take a look back” in this column, detailing how the street appeared when we were riding around in my 1958 Chevrolet. The idea appealed to me; so the following is my recollection of the businesses in those memorable days.

If we begin with the corner of Main and Richmond Streets, the first building on the right was the large, white frame home of Floyd and Daisy Miller. Daisy was the manager of the Vernon Theatre, which was just a couple of buildings down Main from their home. Between their home and the Theatre was a small café called Mary Knight's Restaurant.

The Vernon Theatre was a favorite teen hangout in the 50's. It was possible to purchase a ticket for 9 cents, a piece of chocolate fudge for a penny, and a bag of popcorn for 5 cents. In other words, the ticket, candy, and popcorn totalled a whopping 15 cents. Many of us also brought a fountain Coke from the drug-store across the street. (It is hard to believe the prices of that day. If you had 50 cents or a dollar, you were “in the money.”)

Near the theater was a small building which housed the Bank of Mt. Vernon. My grandfather (Pop) was a close friend of N. M. Smock who served as the Bank President at the time.

Next to the bank was the Ideal Café, which was owned and operated by Conard Parrett. I always had a soft spot in my heart for this restaurant because when my brother Al was young (before my time), my dad and my mother (Bee) ran the café. I remember Bee talking about the extraordinary prices they had on food. She said that a vegetable plate sold for a quarter.

The next building in line was nothing more than a tiny room, which my father used as a taxi stand for several years. This building later became Bailey's Jewelry Store. Bill Bailey sold me my first watch when I was about 12 years old. He allowed me to pay for it by small, time payments.

Adjacent to Bailey's was McBee and Adams Dry Goods Store. This is where we purchased our Levi jeans, Bass shoes, and assorted other clothing. I will never forget the aroma of this store. It always smelled like new wood and seemed very fresh. I loved to shop for new clothes at McBee's.

Next door was Winstead's Hardware Store. I can remember my dad browsing the tool

section there. I was small, and he allowed me to assist with his daily chores.

After shopping for tools, Daddy sometimes let me visit Perciful's 5 & 10 Store. The aisles were filled with toys, games, and books that a small boy would enjoy. Occasionally, he would take out 50 cents and let me purchase a toy or a book to occupy my time as he drove around town taking care of his business.

One of my favorite stores on Main Street was Cummins Grocery. It was owned and operated by my uncle and aunt. Uncle Jesse allowed people to charge their groceries, and he would even deliver what they bought to their houses. When I was old enough to drive, he gave me a job delivering groceries throughout the county. I drove his 1955 Chevrolet station wagon, filled to the brim with orders that people came in and purchased or even ordered by telephone. I absolutely loved that job.

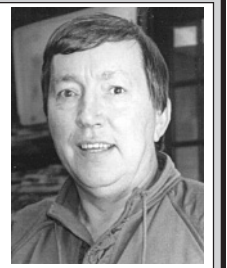
The next business was called the Hotel Restaurant and was owned by Gaines Winstead. The food was always good, and the place was a gathering spot for local business owners on Main Street – in addition to many loafers. One of the back tables was considered the “table of knowledge.” My Dad took me on a regular basis to eat in the local café.

Adjacent to the restaurant was the Mt. Vernon Hotel. Daddy was the manager of the hotel and lived in a small apartment on the second floor. I often spent weekends with him there. There was a night bell in the lobby, and Daddy often had to get up in the middle of the night in order to rent rooms to individuals who were passing through

The birds have hushed and disappeared and a wiser person myself would most likely have beaten down the door to get back inside but it's dry where I am standing back against the wall in the middle of my front porch and there are few things that I love more about nature than watching a good thunderstorm progress.

By now the lightning and thunder are a steady roll and I see a big brown dog yelping and running on full throttle come tearing up Charlie Brown Road. He bounds the rock wall and comes tearing through my yard, leaps on the porch and literally crashes against my legs where he shivers before giving a huge shake and drenching me. Every time a bolt of lightning flashes, he whines and leans against me.

I've never seen the dog before or at least I have not noticed him in the neighborhood. It would be hard to

He moved to Mt. Vernon in January of 1966 with his parents and sister, Jamie, and, with tongue in cheek would remark in later years, that he began working at the *Signal* a few months later. A graduate of Rockcastle County High School, Rick was an avid golfer and sports fan at all levels, especially his beloved Rockets and Wildcats. He was a former director of the Kentucky Press Association and a member of the First Christian Church in Mt. Vernon.

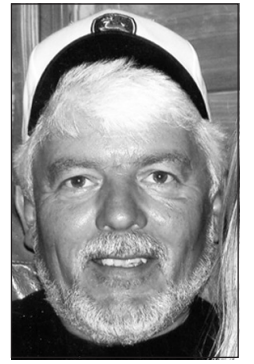

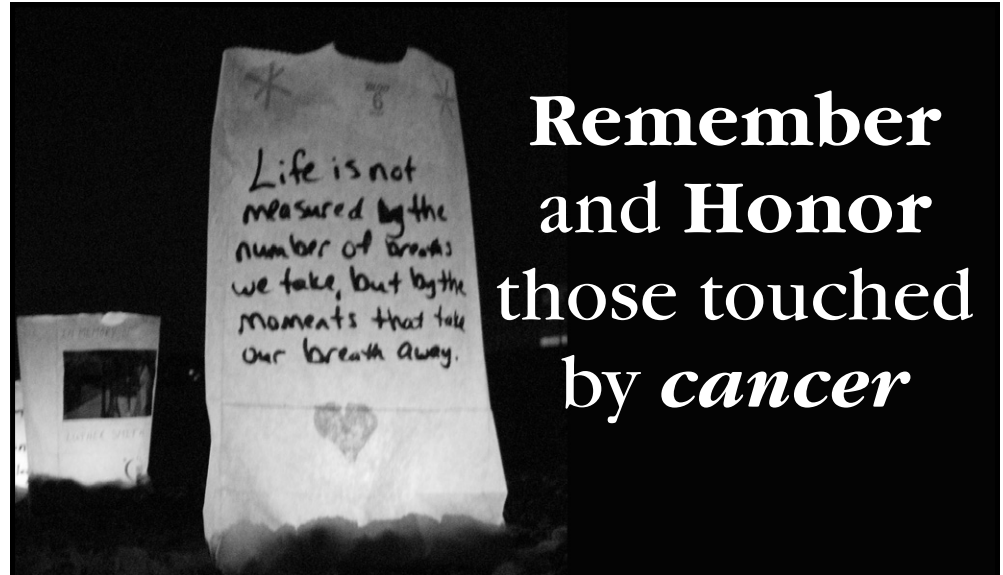

Horse rider upset...

Dear Editor:
I read with interest the article last week on opening White Oak and Horse Lick to ATV's. I am wondering why the Fiscal Court decided to do this at this time without public input. These two roads were the only two roads dedicated to horses and hikers in the county, including Jackson County.

Gene Philbeck was right in his observation that ATV's and horses do not mix. But

saying that, the local ATV riders have a respect for the horse people and have never had a problem of which I am aware. Although these roads were restricted to horses, the local ATV riders used them without problem to the horse, because they showed this respect for one another. Most of the local ATV riders either have horses of their own or have been around them most of their lives and understand the reactions between the two. The local ATV riders have used these trails along with the horse people for as long as I have been riding these roads. I have yet to meet an ATV rider locally that, when we met they did not pull off and shut down their engine or wait until we wave them on before we pass one another. Most of the time we will sit and exchange greetings as they are either acquaintances or neighbors.

The problem by opening these roads publicly, we will now be encountering people who are not aware of the horses reactions to ATV and/or dirt bikes. The horses re-

action is one of panic and to run. This puts the horse and rider in a dangerous position. I was always under the impression that the ATV and dirt bikes would stay in the S-Tree area of Jackson Co. This worked out fine and we have had no problem of which I am aware. We knew that if we crossed into Jackson Co. we would encounter these vehicles and must be extra cautious. For this reason, I would never take novice riders or young children into Jackson Co. to ride. For those unfamiliar with horses, some ATV riders think the best thing to do is to get past them as quickly as possible, which creates an unsafe situation.

There is room in this area for both ATV and horse people, but we do need a place dedicated to horses and hikers only. By having opened up these roads there are now no dedicated roads to horses in Rockcastle County. By opening up roads, such as Daugherty Road, you give ATV and dirt bikers access to

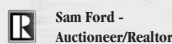

More facts about RCIDA actions...

Dear Editor,
RCIDA chairman Corey Craig's latest guest column (May 13 MVS) omitted sev-

eral notable RCIDA actions. RCIDA redistributed \$175,000 tax dollars in 2006, an 84% 6-year increase, to buy the Northside Inn property (DB 210-689) and tear it down, after it sold for \$95,000 in 2000 (DB 182-63). An adjacent house sold for \$42,000 in 2005 (DB 204-629), before RCIDA redistributed \$77,000 tax dollars in 2006, an 83% increase, only to have it burnt before demolition.

The purchases for this \$252,000 dollar empty lot are representative of other RCIDA purchases I've seen, including the roughly \$225,000 Jones Building (property and outside repaired).

This leads me to several suggestions.

RCIDA should hire someone who is a better horse trader. My cousin could convince you he was doing you a favor by taking your excess gold off your hands. RCIDA needs someone like this.

RCIDA should hide the fact that a deep pocketed government agency feels it needs a particular property. The industrial park property was bought and sold 3 times in 3 days, with the price increasing each time.

RCIDA should exercise flexibility when buying property. Numerous properties are currently for sale near

Northside Inn. RCIDA should stick to industry. The Jones building is not industrial and the only tenant I've heard suggested for it is more government bureaucracy.

RCIDA should cut landscaping to 0.

RCIDA should appreciate that higher taxes for their various purchases hurt other businesses. Carter's Market, Rockcastle Auto Parts, Inspired Image, Movie Warehouse, Waffle House, Somerset Oil and Hiatt's are but some of the recently closed businesses.

RCIDA should recognize that state grants are "free" to county bureaucracy, but not to state taxpayers.

I salute RCIDA for trying with the industrial park, but do not see good stewardship.

Finally the fiscal court should more closely oversee RCIDA.

Unfortunately when I asked Judge Carloftis about the above prices he told me that prices go up over time. They do, but not 84% in 6 years and 83% in one year.

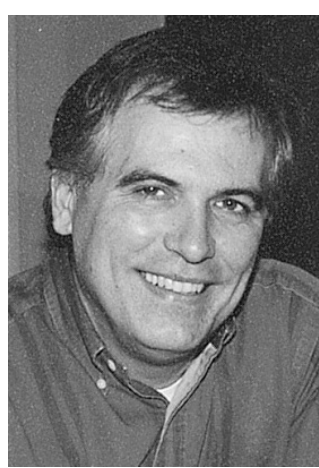

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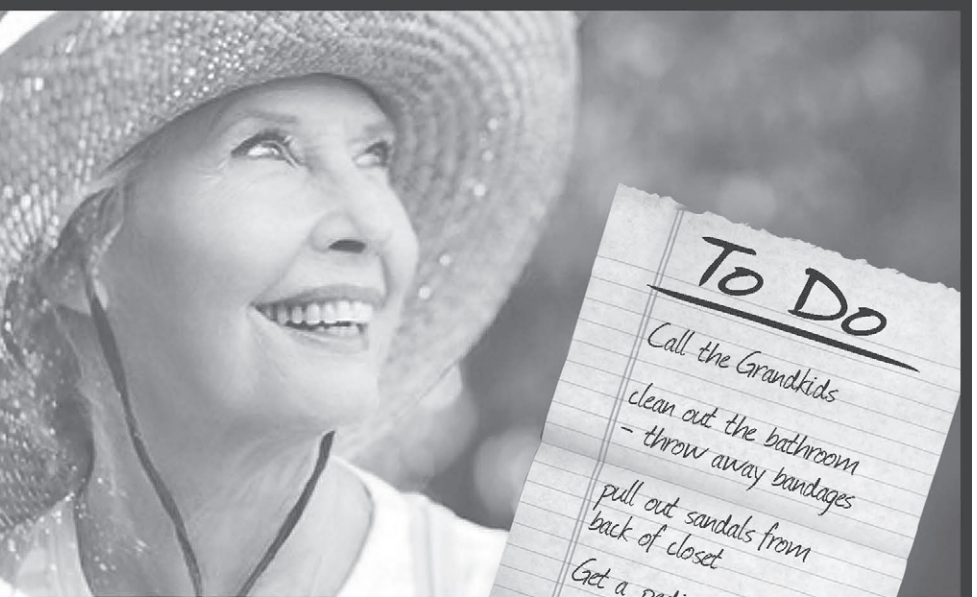

a man who had this unexplainable way of leaving footprints on the hearts of most everyone he encountered. His business was all about people, and his life was all about people. I believe those footprints came from his ability to connect with those people, to let them know he really cared about them. And, as most of you know, as your relationship with Dad grew, the footprints just got deeper and deeper because he demonstrated loyalty to you. It is because of this, today we all carry heavy hearts.

And I wanted to talk about these footprints, these heavy hearts, because they are the reason we grieve. And I'm going to approach this for a second, taking the opportunity to grieve because that's the only way we can ever begin to gain closure in our loss of this fine man.

I grieve and I hurt for my grandmother, for Vonda, for Megan and for all of his siblings. I hurt for all of his friends, those he had from childhood to the more recent ones. I hurt for the inner-circle. As Judge Burdette said, I hurt for a community that he personally changed with barrels of ink, a camera, and a can-do attitude. But more than anything, I selfishly hurt for myself.

I hurt for me because I no longer will get to call him 4 times a day to talk about local politics or UK basketball. I hurt because I'll never get to give him a hard time about beating him in golf, even though we both shot scores we should be ashamed of. I hurt because I'm going to miss seeing the way he looked at my little sister glowing with pride because he knew he had really raised a “Daddy's Little Girl.” I hurt because I'm never going to get yelled at again for my

voice mail being full when he had an urgent message to leave. “Son, you are supposed to be a professional now, and you can't even delete your voicemails?” he would say.

I hurt for his friends that will miss seeing his infamous smirk that always followed a sarcastic remark that sometimes made you want to hit him, and sometimes made you want to hug him. Regardless of your reaction, at the end of the day, we all loved him because he was “Rick” and he cared about people.

But, in addition to grieving, I think Dad would want us to highlight what made us smile about him, and not only what makes us cry today.

It makes me smile to hear Paige say that growing up, she always thought she was “the Bomb” because Rick Anderkin was her big brother. The fact of the matter is we all thought we were “the Bomb” when we were around him because he found a way to make us think so.

It makes me smile to know that he was a man that absolutely could not stand the thought of someone being mad at him. Dad was always very straightforward and candid in his opinions and ran the risk of offending his friends from time to time. When he did offend you and you got mad at him, he would do everything in his power to make sure you weren't mad anymore. If there's one thing he couldn't stand, it was the thought of you being permanently mad at him.

I will smile every time I see my aunts and my grandmother. He would tell you that he basically raised his five younger sisters, much to Granny's dismay. While nobody can take credit for raising them except my grandparents, he left a lasting mark on each of them and the evidence of those marks will always allow me to smile.

I smile when I think of him putting his arm around Travis and saying, “There's my little

brother.” Gosh Travis, he loved you and the relationship you had with him is similar to mine, and that's why I consider you my brother.

I will smile every time I think of Megan spiking a volleyball right in a girl's face, usually for the tenth time that night. I smile because I picture the Rick Anderkin smirk of pride right after it happened that she so often brought to his face.

I will smile when I think about the fact that Dad just had to take Vonda to Disney World last year because he thought absolutely nobody should go through life without going to Disney World. While he used the excuse of taking Vonda, he was such a kid at heart that I know it was actually his wanting to spend time at Magic Kingdom that took us there.

I smile when I think of how much he enjoyed his time with the “inner circle,” when I think of he and Jim Clontz almost dropping me in the lake at the age of four after I'd flown out of a golf cart because they were driving way too fast around a curve. I smile when I think of he and Steve Owens bantering back and forth for hours and hours about nothing in particular, it was just their warped way of showing affection. Although I must admit, that often gave me a headache instead of a smile.

I will smile when I hear his friends tell stories about how in their time of need, he was the first one there for them. He was always the man to hold the puke pan for you, take you to a doctor's appointment, be the first one to bring you a couple of bags of groceries when you'd just lost a loved one. Those stories will always make smile.

Next to the Hotel was the Post Office. Many people had post office boxes for their mail delivery. With no rural box, my grandfather (Pop) came daily to pick up his mail. I think Pop liked the idea of coming to town every day since it gave him the opportunity to visit with his friends.

The Boston Store was located beside the Post Office. It was operated by Noreen Milen. She specialized in clothes and shoes, mostly for ladies. The building was small, and I can remember how narrow the aisles were and how crowded it was inside.

Clyde Barnett operated the small grocery store next door. One of his specialties was offering a great supply of fresh meat, which was cut on the spot in the back room of the store.

On the corner, Oscar and Gertrude Helton owned and operated Helton's 5 & 10 Store. She was my father's sister, and I often spent time browsing the toy aisles looking for a nifty toy. Uncle Oscar usually gave me a discount because I was his nephew. I also purchased comic books there on a regular basis.

The remaining businesses on this side of the street included: the Courthouse, the Jail, Fred Baker's house, Frank Dee's Motel, and the Greyhound Bus Station, which was located across the street from the cemetery.

Each of these places of business played a part in my life's experiences (and for many others from the era as well). Next week I will catalog the other side of Main Street. If I have omitted any business, or if you would like to comment, please let me know.



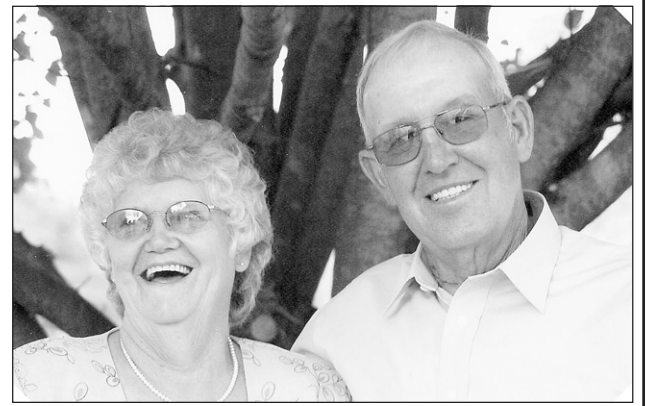
Deadline approaching for Stewardship program

Rockcastle County landowners still have time to sign up for the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) at their local Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) office but the deadline for getting signed up for the second CSP ranking period is quickly approaching. According to NRCS District Conservationist Chuck Gibson, now is the time for landowners and producers who have considered applying for CSP to get signed up and submit documentation.

USDA has announced the national cutoff date for CSP is June 11, which requires landowners submit applications quickly. "If you've heard about the new CSP and talked with other local producers or read about others involved with it, now is the time to roll up your sleeves and get your conservation operation on the list of those recognized for a quality conservation commitment," explains Gibson. "It's important that you get your application and paperwork

submitted so you can be part of the 2010 CSP ranking period and funding cycle." According to Gibson, the clock is ticking for program sign-up this fiscal year. USDA just announced the final cutoff date, which gives producers a brief window of opportunity to get signed up for the CSP signup in 2010. Tom Perrin, Kentucky State Conservationist (STC) confirms NRCS teams across the state are ready to work with producers and start the process. "If you're already an NRCS cooperator and are in the system, just meet with local field office staff. Let them know you're ready for CSP." Ag producers or landowners who are new to NRCS or USDA will need to schedule an appointment and complete the application process and get the ball rolling.


CSP is a voluntary program that encourages producers to maintain existing conservation activities and adopt additional practices on their operations. The program is popular for producers who go the extra mile with conservation and sustainable operations—whether they've accomplished goals on their own, with other conservation partners, or through USDA and NRCS programs. "CSP is the perfect program because it recognizes ag producers and landowners who do the right things and it moves them forward as they add new resource protection practices on their land," Gibson adds. While CSP applications are accepted on a continuous basis, only applications received by the national cutoff date of June 11 will be considered for funding in fiscal year 2010. For more information about CSP, including eligibility requirements, visit your county USDA Service Center in Mt. Vernon today.

RCMS girls compete in State Championships

RCMS girls' track wins Conference Championship

The RCMS girls' track and field team competed in the Central Ky. Conference Championships this past Monday. RCMS won the conference title last year and looked to defend it with a small group of competitors including only six high schoolers.

RCMS easily defended its conference title, dominating the competition and defeating runner-up Danville by a score of 109-74. Boyle County was 3rd with 71 points. Woodford County was 4th with 69 points and Henry Clay and West Jessamine tied for 5th with 66 points

each. Several RCMS competitors had performances placing in the top ten.

Samantha Smith won the meet MVP award for her outstanding overall meet performance in which she led all scorers with 34 points. Her incredible performance couldn't have come at a better time, since the jumps coach from the University of Kentucky cancelled practice for the afternoon and traveled down to watch her compete.

In long jump, Samantha dominated the competition, win-

ning the conference title with an awesome leap of 17'5.5". She also finished 2nd in triple jump with a superb effort of 35'5", missing the conference record in the event by only an inch. Amazingly, her season's best state-leading mark of 38'5" is nearly three feet better than the CKC record. Samantha also finished 2nd in the 100-meter dash with an incredible

time of 12.99 seconds and 2nd in the 200-meter dash with an exceptional season's best time of 26.54 seconds.

On May 15, Samantha jumped 17'9.5" shattering the previous meet record at the Paul Laurence Dunbar Invitational in Lexington while leading RCMS to a 6th place team finish. Her jump was also the top in all three state classes this season.

Michaela Hunter won the most outstanding individual performance award for her CKC record-breaking win in the triple jump competition in which she leaped 35'11.5". Michaela dominated the 400-meter dash, winning the conference title with a terrific effort of 59.27 seconds. In the 200-meter dash, she won with an awesome effort of 26.04 seconds, again capturing the conference crown in the event.

The girls' 3200-meter relay team of Laura Dollins, Rachel Cain, Alyssa Cox, and Jessica Albright ran an awesome new season's best time of 10:38.19 and placed 4th overall. The team's time ranks them 8th in Class 2A.

Alyssa Allen finished 7th in the 100-meter hurdles with a great time of 18.35 seconds.

Laura Dollins placed 2nd in the 1600-meter run with an excellent effort of 5:41.39, while

Rachel Cain finished 8th in a solid 6:12.56. Laura's most impressive race came with in the 800-meter run where she shattered her career personal best time with an amazing new mark of 2:27.39 and a 5th place finish. Her performance also places her 5th in Class 2A in the event. Alyssa Cox placed 9th with a great time of 2:44.58.

Jessica Albright placed 6th in the 300-meter hurdles with a great time of 51.97 seconds.

The 1600-meter relay team of Jessica Albright, Laura Dollins, Kira Deatherage, and Lacey Gastineau ran an awesome race and finished 3rd overall in a season's best time of 4:26.18.

Amy Johnson continued to impress in the throwing events. She placed 2nd in discus with an impressive throw of 94'. She also finished 2nd in shot put with a great throw of 30'6".

The RCMS girls' team will compete in the Class 2A Region 5 Championships this Saturday at Knox Central High School at 10:00 am. RCMS has won six straight regional championship titles and nine overall. They'll be looking for regional title number ten and will also be attempting to qualify as many athletes as possible for the Class 2A State Track & Field Championships on Thursday, June 3 at the University of Louisville.

The RCMS girls' track team sought to defend its outdoor state title from 2009 along with their indoor state title in 2010. Nearly 120 teams from across the state of Kentucky competed as well as over 1800 athletes in one of the most competitive state meets to date. The RCMS girls' finished 13th overall with 21 points and several outstanding individual and relay team performances, including several in the top twenty.

The RCMS girls' 3200-meter relay team got the meet off to a great start with a 12th place finish overall in a season's best time of 11:20.73. Team members included 7th graders Rachel Cain, Kristin Brown, Alyssa Cox, and 6th grader Amber Collins.

Next came the 100-meter hurdles. 8th grader Alyssa Allen had a brilliant performance, finishing 3rd overall with an exceptional time of 17.69 seconds. Alyssa also ran extremely well in the 300-meter hurdles, placing 6th overall in 52.04 seconds.

7th grader Kira Deatherage ran very well in the 100-meter dash, finishing 23rd overall in

14.18 seconds. Kira also finished 23rd in the 200-meter dash with a great effort of 29.35 seconds.

The 800-meter relay team of 7th grader Tanika Chasteen and 8th graders Holly Bradley, Kelsey Bullock, and Lacey Gastineau finished 17th overall with a great team effort of 2:00.6. The girls also ran a spectacular race in the 400-meter relay finishing in 18th place overall with a time of 57.07. Both times were season bests for the RCMS girls' team.

Rachel Cain came through with a career personal best in the 1600-meter run. She placed 20th overall with a very impressive time of 6:04.16.

Alyssa Cox ran very well in the 800-meter run, finishing in 32nd place overall with a nice time of 2:49.37.

Amber Collins ran a great race in her first-ever 3200-meter run. Amber placed 22nd overall in 14:17.52.

Lacey Gastineau finished in the top twenty in the 400-meter dash with a superb 17th place finish in 1:07.17.

The girls' 1600-meter relay team of Tanika Chasteen, Alyssa Allen, Kira Deatherage, and Lacey Gastineau recorded a top ten finish. The team placed 9th overall with a sensational race and a season's best time of 4:38.37.

RCMS also had many impressive performances in the field event competitions which are always a strong area for the team.

Kira Deatherage led the way with a state runner-up finish in the long jump competition. Kira leaped an incredible personal best 15'7.75" to capture 2nd.

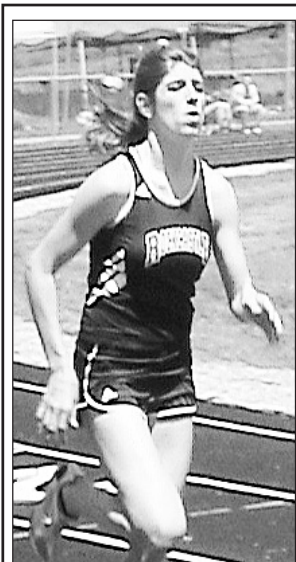

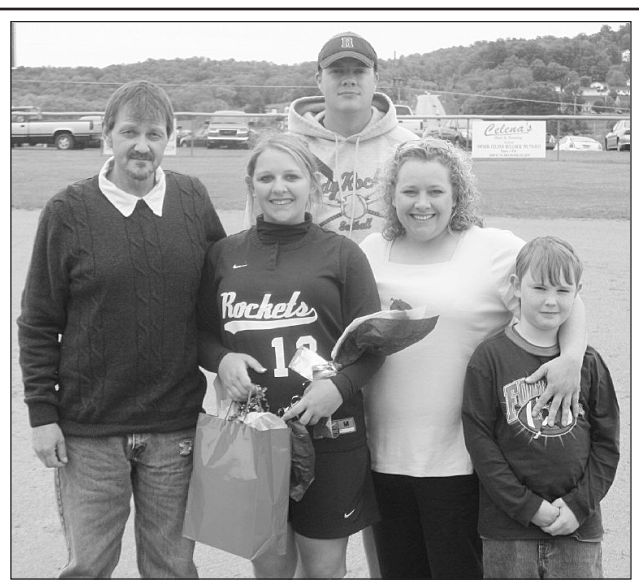

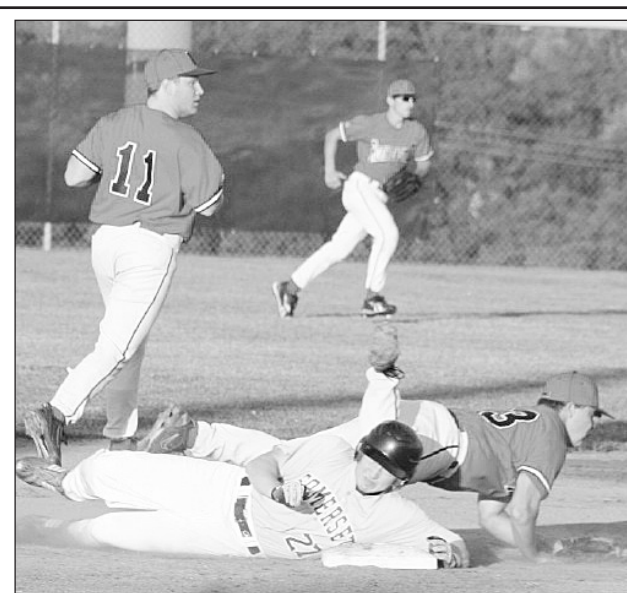

The Mt. Vernon-Rockcastle County Tourism, together with Kentucky Chautauqua, will present *Abraham Lincoln: "I, too, am a Kentuckian"* at 1 p.m. Saturday, June 5th at the Bittersweet Cabin Village in Renfro Valley.

Born on a farm, in what is now LaRue County, Abraham Lincoln (1809-1865) spent his early years in the Commonwealth. When he was 7, his family moved to Indiana and later Illinois. But as his native brilliance and burning political ambition carried him to the presidency and greatness - a panel of historians recently chose him as the most influential American who ever lived - Lincoln always had connections with his native state.

In his law office in Springfield, Ill., he had a partner, William "Billy" Herndon, who hailed from Greensburg. His best friend in Springfield

was Joshua Speed from Louisville. His wife, Mary, was from Lexington, a daughter of the prominent Todd family. And his political role model, a friend of the Todd family, was the Kentucky statesman, Henry Clay. During the Civil War, Lincoln was unpopular in Kentucky but, when he said, "I, too, am a Kentuckian," no one could dispute it.

Though he never came close to winning Kentucky in a presidential election, and was reviled by some of the state's most outspoken residents, Lincoln always regarded Kentucky with affection. And he never lost sight of its strategic importance in the Civil War. "I think to lose Kentucky," he said, "is the same as to lose the whole game. Kentucky gone we cannot hold Missouri, nor I think Maryland." Lincoln read Kentucky newspapers, knew the thinking of opinion leaders, and was sensitive to the state's strong attachment to the institution of slavery. Despite imposing a sometimes harsh military rule, he was able to keep Kentucky in the union, but few Kentuckians thanked him for it until after he was dead.

Jim Sayre of Lawrenceburg portrays Abraham Lincoln for Kentucky Chautauqua. A retired transportation manager, sayre has been studying and portraying the great president for several decades.

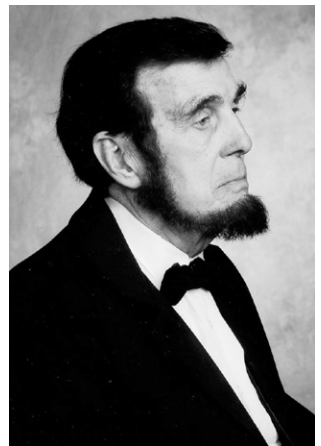

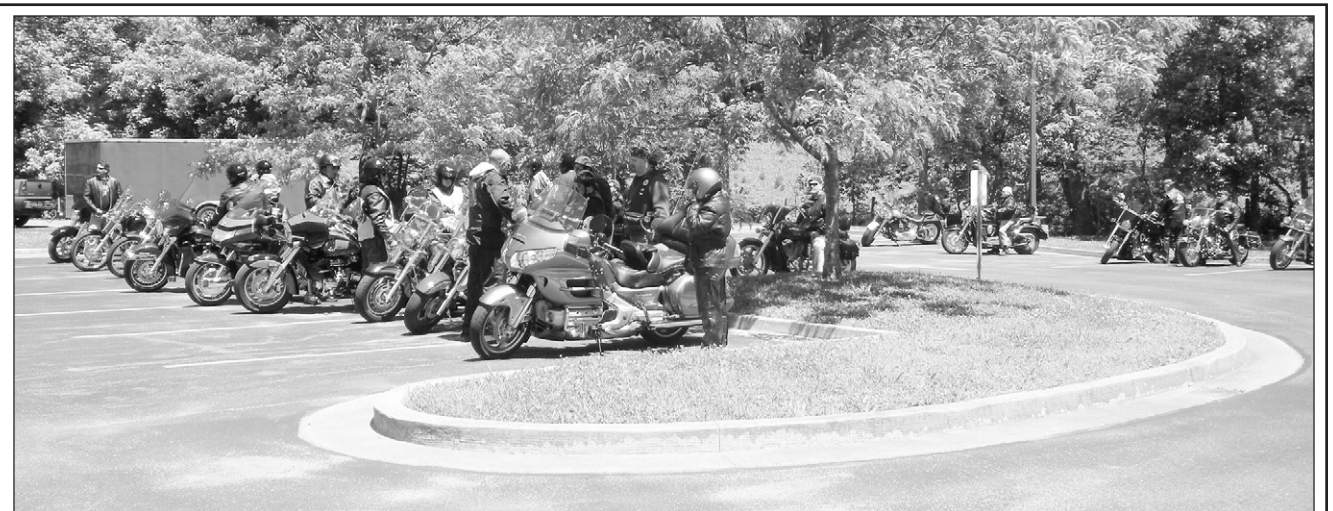
Applications now being accepted for CAP-FM

USDA's Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) is now accepting applications from woodland owners interested in having a conservation activity plan for forest management (CAP-FM) developed for their lands. Owners of woodland that have never had a forest management plan developed, or have a plan needing revision (older than 5 years), are applying for the Conservation Activity Plan for Forest Management through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP).

The forest management plans will be prepared by a private consulting forester who has met the certification as a technical service provider. The consulting forester will work directly with the woodland owner to prepare the plan and supply all necessary documents to the local NRCS District Conservationist. The plan will include recommendations of practices that are needed to address the identified resource concerns such as forest stand improvement, for-

est trails and landings, tree and shrub establishment, etc. These recommended practices may then be incorporated into future EQIP applications. Approved applications will receive payment for completed practices that meet with NRCS standards and specifications.

Applications for the Conservation Activity Plan for Forest Management can be made at your local USDA NRCS office. EQIP applications can be made at any time. However, the cutoff for 2010 funding to have a Conservation Activity Plan for Forest Management developed, will be June 4, 2010. All applications received by that date will be evaluated for eligibility. A special EQIP funding pool has been established for woodland owners. Approved applicants are offered the opportunity to enter into a contract and will receive payment after submitting the forest management plan to NRCS. The participant will then reimburse the private consulting forester for their services in preparing the plan. Plans must be submitted within one year of contract obligation.

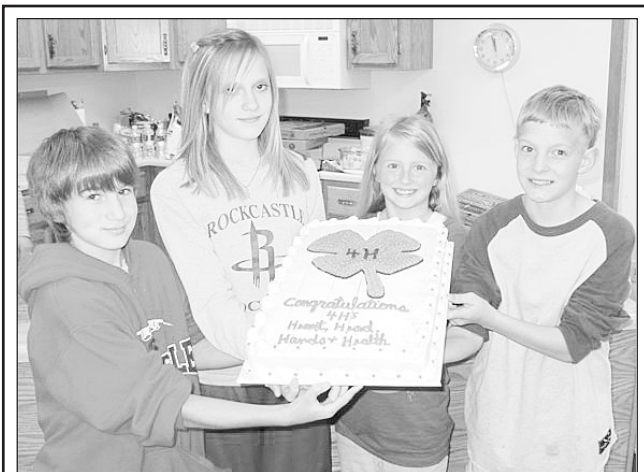

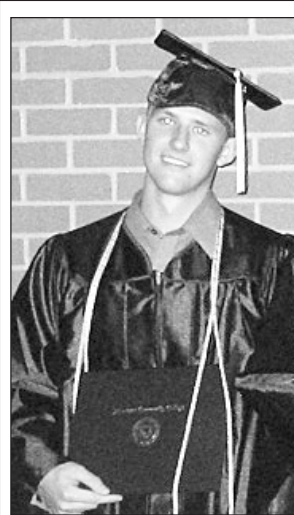

This report is designed to inform the public about the quality of water and services provided on a daily basis. Our commitment is to provide our customers with a safe, clean, and reliable supply of drinking water. We want to assure that we will continue to monitor, improve, and protect the water system and deliver a high quality product. Water is the most indispensable product in every home and we ask everyone to be conservative and help us in our efforts to protect the water source and the water system.

Our water is purchased from Mt. Vernon Water Works, that is located at Renfro Valley, Kentucky. Our supplier treats surface water from Lake Linville. The source water assessment has been performed to identify land uses which may impact the water supply. This assessment indicates that the susceptibility of the Mt. Vernon water supply to contamination is generally moderate. Contaminants present in source water may include microbial contamination, pesticides, and herbicides, organic chemical contaminants, and radioactive contaminants. The primary source of contamination are agriculture, onsite septic systems, and roadways. Activities and land uses upstream of this water can pose potential risks to your drinking water. The complete source water assessment can be reviewed at Mt. Vernon Water Works. The Brodhead Water Works routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State Laws. The table enclosed is results of our Monitoring for the period of January 1 through December 31, 2009, it can be obtained at Brodhead City Hall, 7 West Main Street, Brodhead, Kentucky.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects may be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and may pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include: Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, (sewage plants, septic systems, livestock operations, or wildlife). Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, (naturally occurring or from stormwater runoff, wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming). Pesticides and herbicides, (stormwater runoff, agriculture or residential uses). Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, (by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, or from gas stations, stormwater runoff, or septic systems). Radioactive contaminants, (naturally occurring or from oil and gas production or mining activities).

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water to provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some or all of these definitions may be found in this report:

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - the level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Below Detection Levels (BDL) - laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.

Not Applicable (N/A) - does not apply.

Parts per million (ppm) - or milligrams per liter, (mg/l). One part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) - or micrograms per liter, (µg/L). One part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Parts per trillion (ppt) - one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.

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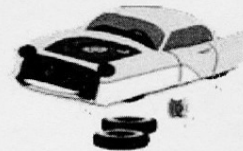

ACRE/DCP Enrollment Deadline Approaching

John W. McCauley, State Executive Director of USDA's Kentucky Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds producers that June 1, 2010, is the deadline for the 2010 Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program or the traditional Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP). This is a mandatory deadline for all participants and USDA will not accept any late-file applications.

McCauley explained that, "It is critical for producers to begin the enrollment process as soon as possible." Over 41,300 farms were enrolled in DCP/ACRE Program during 2009. "To date, approximately less than 25% have been enrolled in 2010 DCP/ACRE Programs. At the current rate of enrollment, a significant number of farms eligible for 2010 DCP/ACRE will not be enrolled by the June 1, 2010, deadline."

All signatures of producers receiving a share in DCP/ACRE payments are required by the June 1, 2010, deadline. It is important producers con-

tact their local office to set up appointments well before the June 1, 2010, deadline.

Reminder: May 31 is the final date to certify Small Grain (Wheat for grain) planted coverage.

Tree Assistance Program

The Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008, Pub. L. 110-234, as amended by

Pub. L. 110-398 and Pub. L. 111-005 authorizes TAP. TAP provides financial assistance to qualifying orchardists and nursery tree growers to replant or rehabilitate eligible trees, bushes, and vines that were lost by natural disasters occurring on or after January 1, 2008, and before October 1, 2011.

To qualify for TAP, orchardists and nursery tree growers must: suffer qualifying tree, bush, and vine losses in excess of 15 percent mortality (after adjustment for normal mortality) from an eligible natural disaster for the individual stand have owned the eligible trees, bushes, and vines when the natural disaster occurred; however, eligible growers are not required to own the land on which eli-

gible trees, bushes, and vines are planted replace eligible trees, bushes, vines within 12 months from the date the application is approved.

Orchardists and nursery tree growers may apply to receive TAP benefits beginning May 10, 2010, for losses suffered during calendar years 2008 and 2009, and for losses suffered during January 1, 2010, to May 7, 2010.

The following table provides the final dates to submit a TAP application and supporting documentation.

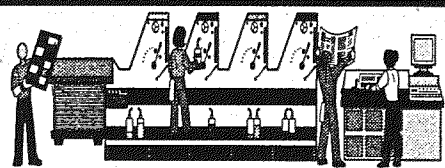
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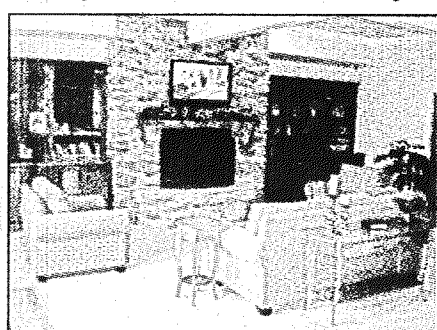

Berea residents protest proposed zoning change

If brought before the council and approved, the zone change likely would result in duplexes and four-plexes being built in the neighborhood, instead of single family homes, according to Randy Stone, Berea city administrator.

BEREA — Angry residents filled the Berea City Council meeting recently to protest a proposed zone change.

About 50 to 60 residents were upset about an ordinance recommended to the city council by the Berea Planning and Zoning Commission, said Randy Stone, Berea city administrator.

The ordinance, which was approved at the planning and zoning commission's April 27 meeting, would change 404 through 410 Brown Street of the Roselawn Subdivision from R-1 (Single Family) to R-3 (Multi-Family).

Although the ordinance was not on the city council's agenda, it dominated the meeting and eight to 10 residents spoke publicly against it,

Stone said.

"They would rather not have the multi-family residences," he said. "They don't want the zone change."

If brought before the council and approved, the zone change likely would result in duplexes and four-plexes being built in the neighborhood, instead of single family homes, Stone said.

An zone-change ordinance has not yet been put on any upcoming council agendas.

"I'm sure there will be an ordinance that will come before the council," Stone said "It was recommended by planning and zoning, but the council hasn't had the opportunity to examine the records themselves."

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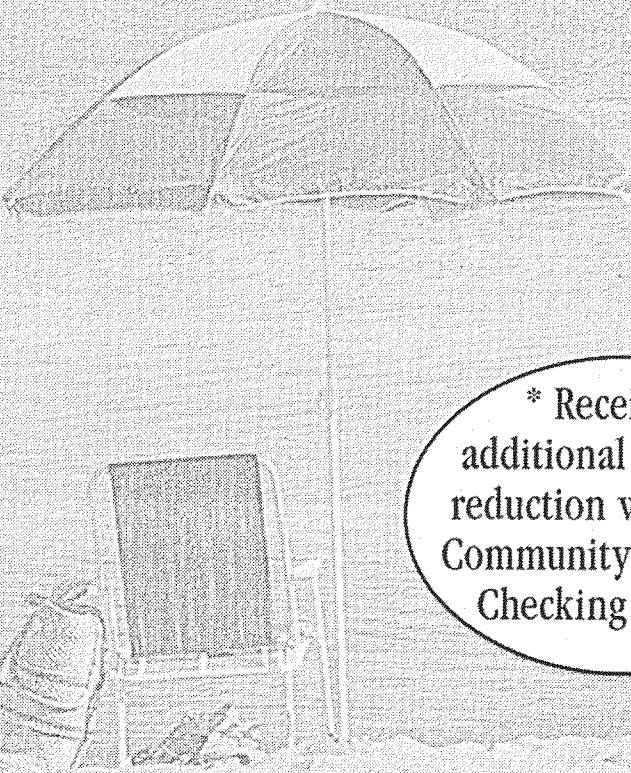
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
