Bishop says he "will run" for County Judge/ **Executive**

Former Magistrate Doug Bishop indicated to the Signal on Wednesday that he intends to run against incumbent County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis in the November General Election.

According to records at County Clerk Norma Houk's office, Bishop has filed all of the necessary paperwork to run an Indpendent.

To be eligible, Bishop had to file a statement of intention with the Clerk's office by April 1st, and did so on March 19th. He has to officially file as a candidate by August 10th, the same deadline placed on those wishing to enter city council races.

Also, Michael McGuire, who challenged incumbent Ralph Allen in the Spring for the Fifth District Magistrate seat, indicated that he is considering filing as a write-in candidate.

In the May Primary election, Allen and McGuire both wound up with 289 votes with Allen winning by virtue of the absentee vote, 22 to 10.

Write-in candidates have until October 22nd at 4 p.m. to file for the November election.

One of the most annoying things about living in a relatively secluded but easily accessible place, such as Charlie Brown Road here in Garrard County and on which I live, is that is that people who grow tired of their domestic animals find it convenient to drop them off on us.

The kittens that were so cute, the puppies that looked so cool to the kids, grow up fast and suddenly become aggravations that need serious veterinarian attention. The kitten that cuddled and purred when he or she was tiny turns into a cat with a "don't even try to touch me" disposition and sharpens its claws on couches, curtains and carpets. The puppy who playfully yapped and licked the kids' hands when he or she (the pup) was six weeks old turns into an adolescent dog that weighs 40 pounds or more and chews on chair legs or a favorite pair of shoes anytime the owner is not looking.

"These look like kind and gentle people in this neighborhood and I'm sure they really need a new cat or dog", the droppers-off must say to themselves and so, they sneak onto Charlie Brown Road or onto Old Railroad Grade in the dead of night, push the pup or kitten out of the car and lay rubber as they speed away so fast the former pet can't catch them.



I promise you that a kitten or a cat or even juvenile dog, unused to self protection in noe. However, at this time, I






would like to focus on the lesser known Dix River.

Unlike the Rockcastle River that begins in Jackson County, the Dix River begins in Rockcastle County. According to Wikipedia, the river begins in western Rockcastle County between Mount Vernon and Brodhead. It flows in a northwesterly direction, passes north of Stanford and east of Danville. The waters of the Dix River are retained by a dam of the same name in the Danville area to form Herrington Lake, the source of water for

Herrington Lake was created in 1925 by the Kentucky Utilities company, and was to supply hydroelectric power to the surrounding counties of Boyle, Mercer, and Garrard. As it turns out, it is the deepest lake in Kentucky at two hundred forty nine feet, at the deepest portion. It is so deep that is has never frozen over, except in 1936 and 1978. It is home to several species of fish, and provides recreation and tourism. The dam, at the time of the lake's creation,

after we finished what Mom had for us to do." That was another thing - we usually had chores to perform before being turned loose.

Bud and I listed several of the games that we played on a regular basis, including kick-the-can, King of the Hill, sandlot baseball, flag football, basketball, and flashlight tag. The game we both remember being played most often was kick-the-can. While Buddy and his crew were playing in his yard, my friends were doing the same on old US 25 in front of Jim Winstead's house.

The group playing at the funeral home usually included: Bud and Jerry Cox, Ronnie Winstead, Bennie Chaney, Charles Bennett Farris, Jim Cox, Charles Burke, and Lawrence Bales. Most of them were in the 11-14 year-old age range. Buddy summed up the end of those evenings when he recalled, "The games concluded when some of the parents yelled to say, 'It is time to come in now!'

In order for others to understand how much fun we had, let me explain the rules for playing kick-the-can. Basically, the game is a form of hide-and-seek, requiring one member to be chosen as the "it" person. Everyone gathered in a circle around the can, and the person who was "it" hid his eyes and counted to 100 while everyone else ran away and hid. Then the person who was "it" sought out the others; he did not need to touch the others, only to see them. They then had to come to the can and sit on the ground while "it" went back to find the others.

Where this game became interesting was while the "it" was off looking for the others, one of the players who was still free could sneak up

"Actually it was 10 months and three days," says Ohr, referring to the birth of twins Andrew Joseph and Amelia Ryan.

"They are amazing," says the first-time dad. "They crawled for the first time the other night, right into the kitchen.

Ohr and wife Andrea, both natives of eastern Kentucky. may be new to parenthood, but some of his earliest steps were taken on a golf course.

He didn't have much choice, being the product of a family highly skilled in ath-

His grandfather and father lettered at the University of Kentucky in baseball, and an aunt in golf.

All family and friends can be expected to be playing close attention August 12-15 when Keith competes for the 2010 PGA Championship at Whistling Straits in Kohler, Wisconsin.

The event will be televised nationally on CBS.

The 2008 and 2009 Kentucky Professional Player of the Year, Ohr earned the right to compete in the prestigious event by firing a final round 75 and finishing in a tie for 9th at the 2010 PGA Professional National Championship at French Lick Resort in Indiana late last month.

Only the top 20 finishers

advance on to the PGA Championship.

He had competed in the same tournament twice before, coming up short of advancing on to the big stage in 2006 and 2007.

Ohr majored in sports administration and spent his first summer out of college working at Gibson Bay Golf Course in Richmond.





was the largest earth-filled dam ever to be made, and was considered an engineering

Construction on the dam began in 1923. The top of the dam is 287 feet above the river bed; that's one hundred fifty feet higher than Niagra Falls. At its base, the dam is seven hundred fifty feet and one thousand eighty seven feet across the Dix River Gorge between Mercer and Garrard counties. Kentucky Utilities owns the land beneath the lake. The dam is a much needed asset in controlling flood water, too As you can see, it is quite a feat in itself to be able to contain the water of Rockcastle's Dix

The Dix River, after leaving the Herrington Lake, flows about another two miles where it meets the Kentucky River at High Bridge, about twenty miles southwest of Lexington.

In the gardening communities of generations past and to some degree today, the Dix River was and is, a factor in irrigation of crops along the largely agricultural route. The earliest of settlers may have camped along its banks and even used its current for transportation in canoes.

However, today, as a part of the Aquatic Habitat Enhancement Project, in 1991, a fish ladder was constructed near the dam. Its aim was to protect and increase the trout population of the river. The hydroelectric plant located at the Dix Dam can produce more than 1/5 of Kentucky's total capacity.

I've always been interested as to how small rivers, such as the Dix, reach the ocean. In the case of the Dix, it flows into the Kentucky River, which flows into the Ohio River, which is the largest contributor by volume to the Mississippi River that as we all know empties into the Gulf of Mexico, a portion of the Atlantic Ocean. Just to think it all began here in the hills of Rockcastle County.

and "kick the can," allowing everyone to go hide again. The game was over when "it" found all players without allowing the can to be kicked. As one can imagine, it was tremendously difficult to locate every player - so it was not unknown for "it" to became so exasperated that he went home, and thus ended the game.

The players who participated in the game on old US 25 included: Kenneth Hansel, Earl Benton Cromer, Paul Hansel, Billy "Bat" Ramsey, Paul Carter, and me. There were others who played some of the time, but these were regulars. There were woods adjacent to our playing site, and it was quite difficult to find players who ventured into the woods to hide.

I will never forget one incident that happened to me while playing this absorbing game. I was selected to be "it." and several of the players had been caught when Paul Hansel came running toward the can to free them. Paul kicked the coffee can, which then struck me squarely on the nose! I had never had, nor have I had since, a broken bone. But that can managed to break my nose, and I was bleeding like a "stuck pig" as I ran toward my house to seek medical attention.

One of my best friends at the time was Kenneth Hansel, and he ran after me to explain to my mother (Bee) what had happened. He told her, "David Joe left a trail of blood from Mr. Winstead's yard all the way home!" I suppose that was at least a quarter of a mile in length.

Bee immediately loaded me into the family car with a towel over my face and hauled me to see Dr. Griffith. After his examination, he said, "David Joe's nose is broken. I will have to place cotton inside and it should be left

for a day or so." He gave Bee some pain pills and instructed her to take me home. Thank goodness that is the only broken bone I have ever suffered.

There was another game that we played as children in my grandfather's (Pop) yard flashlight tag. This game too was a form of hide-andseek with the only difference being the "it" person only had to shine the light on the person hiding. What kid doesn't love carrying a flashlight? And if it can be incorporated into a night-time yard game, who would not love to participate? Being played in the dark added an air of mystery to the game. In my neighborhood, some of the girls even liked to play. I can remember Bonnie Winstead and Brenda Carter joining the guys as we stalked our prey in the night in Pop's big yard.

To keep from being bored, the kids in my neighborhood played every game we had ever heard of, and then some we made up. I love a quote by a recent-but-anonymous source, "Today, children tend to get more screen time and less scream time!"

It is really a shame that children of today do not know the pleasure of such afternoons and evenings, enjoying the great outdoors like we did. They don't know what they are missing. As I recall those good times with all of my childhood buddies, I note once again how blessed those of our generation have been. We had so much fun!





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What is an Allergy?

The body has defenses against virtually everything. Sometimes, however, the body chooses the wrong defenses to handle certain proteins, such as the pollens and molds, that come in contact with the nasal passages, eyes, skin and

In the case of allergies, the wrong antibody, called IgE

antibody, is produced. The IgE antibody attaches to certain cells in the skin, nose, lungs and eyes. These cells are called mast cells, and they contain the substances that cause the symptoms of allergies.

When the proteins of pollen or mold spores come in contact with the IgE antibody, a reaction takes place in the mast cell which releases histamine and several other very potent substances. These chemicals

cause a runny nose, sneezing and watery, itchy eyes--all the symptoms of allergies.

Certain proteins, such as molds and ragweed or grass pollens, can very easily induce allergies because of their size and chemical makeup. Larger proteins usually do not induce allergies.

Heredity also plays a big role in who will develop allergies. A person has a greater chance of allergies if close relatives have had hay fever, asthma or eczema. Allergies are very common. About 15% of Americans have some form of allergies.

Checking the blood level of the IgE antibody can be useful in evaluating allergies. A high level will assure your doctor that allergy testing is worthwhile, while a low level makes it less likely that allergies are the cause of your symptoms and other treatments may be tried first.

Medicines can help many people, and allergy shots can help most people by inducing the body to develop the right

defenses.

a small tree and landed next to a home on the road. A 40 mph speed limit was approved for the road.

However, the Poplar Gap Road, in Magistrate Bill McKinney's district, met opposition from McKinney who said he had not had any complaints from residents on the road and felt "it doesn't help anyway." No action was taken.

Two members of the Livingston Homecoming Committee were at the meeting to request a donation for the upcoming Labor Day celebration. Margaret Martin and Cleo Bryant told the court that the homecoming com-

mittee "worked very hard but we need more young people to help." Last year, the court made a \$200 donation and Martin said that Mayor J.C. Griffin had instructed them to request \$2,500 but the court elected to make a \$500 donation, the same they made to Brodhead's Dix River Festival earlier this summer.

The court declined to sign an agreement proffered by Bruce Wagman, an attorney from California who works in the area of animal rights, concerning operation of the animal shelter.

The issue has been ongoing for several months, since Rockcastle Animals in Need (R.A.I.N.) contacted Wagman for help in filing suit against the county over the animal shelter. Wagman, and another attorney in the same field from Louisville, visited

the court and laid out the changes/improvements that needed to be made at the shelter. The court has complied, they say, and are now operating within the state law governing shelters.

The agreement would have involved daily operation of the shelter, with R.A.I.N.'s involvement mentioned several times in the document. In his cover letter with the agreement, Wagman told the court that if the agreement were not signed, that open records requests would be made that would require several days a week for the court to comply with.

However, Magistrate Bill McKinney said he felt that since the Animal Shelter Director David Carpenter submits monthly reports documenting operation of the shelter that these would be sufficient to comply with an open records request. The court did agree to require training for the Carpenter and Dog Warden Buck Farthing.

The question of paying accrued leave time to an employee, employed for less than a year, who was terminated was brought before the court by Jailer James Miller. Miller told the court that it was an "agreeable termination" and he felt the employee was due the accrued leave time.

The county's administrative code covers employees who quit and give two weeks notice but not a terminated employee.

After some discussion, the court decided to pay the employee in question for accrued leave time.

On the meeting's agenda was three more claims from contractors hired to repair damage to roads from the May storms. These claims bring the total for contractors alone to \$319,804.52, not including gravel bills and county employees work.

Carloftis also told the court that most of the cost of repairing three slides in the county, "might" be paid by FEMA and the cost for the three slides, at the lowest price obtained so far, would be \$196,186. The three slides are the biggest one on Maret Cemetery road, one on Buffalo Branch Road and the other on Old Dixie Highway in Mt. Vernon. Two other slides, on Copper Creek Road and part of one on Possum Kingdom Road, were paid for by the soil conservation service. In order for soil conservation to pay for a slide, there must be a stream involved

causing the slide. Magistrate Bill McKinney told the court that "If FEMA is not going to pay, we don't need to award a contract, we may have to do the work in a different manner." However, a motion was made to proceed with the low bid on the projects but not begin work until more information is received from FEMA."

Two other slides will be reimbursed by the soil conservation service, Carloftis said, one on 10 Foot Hole Road and Upper Calloway Branch.

It was also noted during the meeting that the court had not received excess fees for 2009 from County Clerk Norma Houk in the amount of \$31,923.12. County Treasurer Joe Clontz told the court that the excess fees check is normally paid when Houk presents her annual settlement in January. Clontz said he had contacted the Department of Local Government who said the excess fees check was due the court by March 31st of this year.

The state of the county's precarious finances were also discussed. With the pay-outs to contractors for repairing roads damaged in the May storms and ongoing expenses associated with the new industrial park, totaling over \$200,000 on this month's agenda alone, the court is having a hard time paying current obligations. The court also has a \$82,584 payment due August 1st for one half of the county's workers compensation and general liability insurance policy.


But at the head of the class is a big-time player that ranks among the top 30 players nationally - Rockcastle County's Sara Hammond.



Rockcastle eligible to apply for ARC funding support

The Center for Rural Development in Somerset is accepting grant applications from local governments in cities and counties across Southern and Eastern Kentucky-including Rockcastle Countythrough July 19 in the latest cycle of federal funding support from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) for community strategic planning.


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

What is CSEPP?

In 1985, Congress directed the Army to destroy its entire stockpile of chemical weapons in the safest manner possible. Many of these weapons are forty years old or older and were built to deter other countries from using chemical weapons of their own against the United States. While the risk of an accident/incident involving the stored chemical is very small, the increasing age of the weapons increases the risk.

The Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Program (CSEPP) is an outstanding example of partnership among the Department of the Army, Department of Homeland Security, States, Tribal Nations and local jurisdictions. The common goal among these governmental agencies is to develop and enhance the emergency preparedness capabilities in the unlikely event of a chemical accident/incident at the Blue Grass Army Depot.

Ten states, forty-one counties, and one Tribal Nation surrounding the eight U.S. Army stockpile sites participate in CSEPP. The eight states hosting installations with chemical stockpiles are: Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Indiana, Kentucky, Oregon, Utah and Maryland (stockpile eliminated; site closed) Two additional states, Illinois and Washington, also participate in the program because of their borders' proximity to the stockpiles in Indiana and Oregon, respectively. The Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Reservation in Oregon also actively participate in the program. Thirteen counties are in the Immediate Response Zones, the areas closest to where the chemical agents are stored and generally within approximately a ten-mile radius. Twenty-five counties are in Protective Action Zones, beginning at the outer edge of the Immediate Response Zones and extending to a distance of between six and thirty-one miles. The remaining three counties are designated as host counties, which lie outside the Immediate Response Zones and Protective Action Zones.

In Kentucky, Madison County is classified as an Immediate Response Zone (IRZ), Rockcastle, Clark, Estill, Garrard, Jackson and Powell are classified as Protective Action Zones (PAZ), and Fayette, Jessamine and Laurel are classified as Host counties.

CSEPP is administered through the states. Funds are distributed to the states under Cooperative Agreements, based upon a negotiated work plan between the states and Department of Homeland Security Regional Offices. Under the agreements, each state identifies needs, develops proposed projects to meet those needs, requests funds, and disburses those funds at the state level and to local governments. CSEPP focuses on providing the personnel, equipment, and training necessary to establish a response infrastructure that enables emergency managers to quickly alert the public, manage the response, and communicate with the public, the media, and emergency responders. Equally important is public awareness of what to do in the event of an accident/incident.

Since the beginning of the program, CSEPP communities have made significant progress; our communities are included among those best prepared in the nation.



FFA members attend KLTC at Hardinsburg




