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A rockslide in the southbound lanes of I-75 triggered an accident involving five vehicles around 6:00 a.m. last Thursday morning. The most significant accident was of a semi that lost control, crossed the median, flipped and slammed into a rock wall on the northbound side of the interstate. The driver of the semi, from Denton Trucking in McCook, Illinois, escaped serious injury. A load of lumber the semi was hauling was spread across the median and both northbound lanes. Other cars involved in the rockslide reported severe suspension damage and flattened tires. Both southbound and northbound lanes were completely clear by 12:30 Thursday afternoon. Members of the Mt. Vernon Fire Department assisted at the scene.

Five arrested after dispute ends in wreck

Five people were arrested after an altercation that reportedly started in Sand Hill and ended up in Livingston early Tuesday morning,

According to Kentucky State Trooper Jason Vanhook, the arresting officer, it appeared the dispute between two parties in three different vehicles involved twenty or thirty miles of the two parties in transit attempting to force the other off the road.

Michael Hubbard, 30, of London, and Timothy Clines, 32, of Mt. Vernon, were both charged with first degree wanton endangerment and second degree assault while Clines also picked up a charge of first degree criminal mischief. Jay Skinner, 18, of Livingston, was charged with first degree wanton endangerment, and first degree criminal littering.

Both Gary Wayne Caldwell, 27, of Mt. Vernon, and Jessica Newcomb, 29, of Mt Vernon, were charged with fourth degree attempted assault and first degree criminal mischief.

Vanhook said accounts of the incident indicate that Hubbard was in one

vehicle with Clines and Skinner in another, and Caldwell and Newcomb in another. Skinner was allegedly in the back of the truck Clines was driving reportedly throwing everything from gas cans to bicyles at Hubbard's vehicle.

Caldwell and Newcomb are accused of throwing rocks out the window at Hubbard, while following along during the chase.

The dispute started on Calloway Hollow Rd and went from South U.S. 25 to around the Rockcastle River Trading Company, then back North 25 to exit 59. They then got on Interstate 75 south bound and eventually ended up in Livingston.

The chase ended after Hubbard finally wrecked his vehicle. Vanhook said at that point Hubbard approached Cines with a golf club while Clines had a baseball bat in hand. They reportedly swung at each other simultaneously with Clines receiving an open wound to the head and Hubbard being hit in the

Clines was taken to Rockcastle Regional Hospital for treatment of his

When I want a drink of water I usually grab a handful of ice out of the fridge, dump it in a glass, stick the glass under the kitchen faucet and fill it up. The ultimate refreshment on a hot summer day and it's also very economical.

My wife, on the other hand, goes into a panic if there is no commercially bottled water in the house. She sticks bottles inside the door of the refrigerator and monitors them to make sure nobody that else has sneaked a sip. If she inadvertently takes the bottle out and carries it to the table or somewhere else in the house, she angrily accuses everybody else of stealing her water.

Now, let me explain to you how commercially bottled water works. In various locations throughout the land, as we speak, right now, there are companies working round the clock manufacturing millions of plastic bottles per day. Other locations are using injection molders to manufacture the little caps that go on the bottles.

Said bottles and caps are shipped to a central location (bottling company) where any number of hoses are attached to a city water main. The water may or may not be heated or strained before it goes inside the bottle. But the bottles are rapidly filled with water from the public supply that serves your faucet at home. A conglomeration of whirring machines assure that this process is expedient.

The bottled water is then labeled, placed, in lots of 24, on cardboard containers, shrink wrapped, placed on a pallet and loaded on an 18 wheeler. After going through a middleman (wholesaler) or two, the pallet loads of water arrive at your favorite retail outlet. Depending on how much of a sucker you really are, and also on your vanity, this stuff can fetch anywhere

Dust, Mites, and Molds

When people find out that they are allergic to a tiny mite that lives off of human cells, they usually say, "Yuck." Unfortunately, mites are the main allergen in the house dust that causes trouble for many people each fall.

The mites do not live on a person's body. They are very tiny organisms which thrive on the skin cells we shed ev-



ery day. They become most troublesome in the fall of the year for a couple reasons. First, they multiply when it is warm and humid, so summer and fall are when their numbers increase.

Also, starting the furnace and circulating air blows around the dust that has accumulated over the summer months which is full of the mites, as well as molds and other allergens. Their next stop is at our eyes and noses causing the symptoms of al-

lergies. As with mites, molds also will increase when it is warm and humid, so late summer and fall are common times to have trouble with them, as well. Symptoms from molds are variable and can increase and decrease according to the

weather and other factors. The most important thing to do to control mite allergies is to enclose your mattress and pillow with vinyl covers to separate the mites from your nose and airways during sleep. The bedroom is the most important room in the house to keep clean and dust-free. You spend about a third of your

life there. It is important to vacuum and dust frequently, and try to limit dust-catchers such as carpeting, blinds, curtains, knickknacks and racks of clothing. Finally, mites and molds can be reduced by air-conditioning which keeps the house cooler and dryer in the summer months.

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
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Rockcastle Memories

Kentucky's Own "Route 66" Recently I was reading a blog on the Internet and found discussion

about Kentucky's unique highway that divides the state into East and West sections - US 25. Some of that discussion was a comparison of US 25 to the famous "Route 66" that divided the nation from east to west during the '50's and '60's. US 25 played a tremendous role in my early life in Mt. Vernon.

The highway begins at the Kentucky/Ohio border and winds its way south until it branches into US 25 East and US 25 West near Corbin. The westerly route leads to Knoxville, while US 25E twists and turns until it passes underneath Cumberland Gap and reaches the Tennessee border. The entire highway is a road with a long and interesting history; it was officially commissioned in November 1926.

As a child living with my grandparents on a small farm located on old US 25 in the '50's, I was witness to the new road being constructed by blasting through the "cut" between Pine Grove and Mt. Vernon. We could hear the drilling. When a dynamite charge was about to occur, men would come to our house and say, "Everyone needs to get inside because we are going to blast!" Within a few minutes, we would hear the explosion, which was followed by small stones falling all over our yard. It was a disconcerting experience for a small child.

After the new road was completed, traffic on old US 25 was reduced significantly, which was great for me and my friends. All of the youngsters in our neighborhood began to play games on the surface of the old road. We spent many hours playing baseball, basketball, kick-the-can, and various other games on old US 25. We had a basketball goal on the side of the road in front of Winstead's Half Way

When I turned 16 and began to drive, US 25 became my point of interest for the next few years. We teens of that day had a circuit that we drove while scouting out which of our friends were out and about. The route began at the Rockcastle Courthouse and ended at the high school on Richmond Street.

In the late afternoons and evenings, we traveled over that path visually inspecting each automobile to see who was in town. When we spotted one of our friends, we flagged the car down and either got in with them or let them ride with us. We then "cruised" the same route while singing the latest rock and roll songs that were playing on our radios. Sometimes our cars would have eight or ten people inside, each jockeying for a seat by a window. On evenings when we had dates, most of us still traveled the circuit, checking out who else had dates and where they were going. If we were going to the Valley Drive In, the theater was located on US 25, and we returned to our "circle" when the movie was

Sometimes we traveled to Renfro Valley, which is also located on US 25. In the afternoons after school, we drove down to WRVK in the Renfro Barn to have dedications played for our sweethearts, who listened anxiously



The Little Fair That Became a Big Success

When I was a child growing up in neighboring London, there wasn't anything as exciting as our family making the annual pilgrimage to the Brodhead Fair. Even before going to the fair every year, I would hear of stories told by my grandpa, Roscoe Norton, of his childhood memories and the excitement he and his family enjoyed there. He came from a large family, that lived primarily in the Wabd section of the county, with lots of aunts, uncles, and cousins who would use the fair as a family "reunion", so to speak.

My grandpa was born in 1887, only eight years before the fair began in 1895. I'm sure, without a doubt, he and his family attended the very first fair. As the years passed, and he grew, he told stories of him and his brothers and sisters riding their prize-winning Tennessee Walking Horses in the horse show. His mother

and sisters, I'm equally as sure, had their share of canned goods or quilts in the various contests, or his father may have entered some of his many livestock in such con-

Our favorite night to attend the fair was Saturday night, the night of the Grand Championship horse show. We would always sit on the side with the covered bleachers, in case of rain. They were probably built in the fair's infancy.

In my quest to find the history of the fair, I was directed to Bryan Bussell, Shirley Martin, and Jean Gentry who all have contributed to the re-

In the beginning, there was a "fair board" established, and shares were sold for five dollars per share. Frank Robbins was a major player on the board. The board sold the fair to Dr. M. M. Phillips, of Crab Orchard, and partner, W. O.

We were taking away dollars the newspaper could have used to help provide even better coverage to the commu-

Most importantly, a good newspaper serves as a watchdog over government, making sure office holders are held accountable for their actions.

A newspaper is a business, and just like any enterprise, it must be profitable to stay in business.

There are some key differences between newspapers and most other businesses.

Newspaper revenue is partially generated through sales of the paper itself. This is done through subscription and single copy sales.

The major revenue source for newspapers however, is advertising. This takes lots of forms.....classified ads placed by individuals, inserts from major chains such as Lowes or J. C. Penny, but mainly from local businesses.



The church that i was attending when I closed the pantry was supposed to reopen it but never did so I left it and it eventually closed also. On other occasions, we drove north on US 25 to Berea to find entertainment in the form of roller-skating, drive-in restaurants, and even the Berea Theater. Because it was a college town, we felt like we were older and more mature to be associated with the college kids. Once in a while, we even managed to date some of the college coeds. They invited some of us to the college dances, and that was a real "rush" to be included in that crowd.

A few of my friends and I were also known to attend college basketball games there. When my friend Bud Cox became a student at Berea, he invited me to some of their events, and I loved that of course.

US 25 was our center of focus in the late '50's and early '60's. Most of the miles that I put on my '58 Chevrolet were driving up and down that memorable highway. I logged over 100,000 miles in that "black beauty." If it could talk, oh the stories it could spin! Those days were certainly special.

The land where the fair is located was thought to be owned by the Martin family, who had a store in Brodhead. The trees on the land are believed to have been there for the first fair in 1895. Although there is an abundance of trees on the land currently, there was, at one time, even more.

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

This was my first clue that giving advice was not necessarily the best way to approach a counseling situation. While people may be desperately seeking a solution to their woes, this does not mean that they will act on advice from others

Rules of Advice Giving. I share them with you for what they are worth.

1. Do not expect that they will do what you advise. Even if they ask you for advice that does not mean they will act on it, especially if the advice involves sacrifice or pain. We human beings do not like to hurt and will do all we can to avoid it.

2. Give advice only when asked. If they do not ask, then you do not tell. If the problems are theirs, do not make them yours and try to solve them. Most of us have plenty of problems of our own. We would do better to spend our time solving those rather than trying to solve someone else's difficulties.

3. Give advice only sparingly. Advice is cheap. Anyone can offer his or her two cents worth on any subject. Do not add your two cents worth. Wait until you are certain that your advice is worth at least a nickel before you offer it.

4. Do not say, "If I were you I would..." You do not know what you would do if you were in his shoes. If you have not been in a similar situation, you have no clue what

you would do. Even if you have been in a similar situation, you are a different person and would react in your own way.

5. Never say "never." "I would never put up with that," she said. "If my husband did that he would be out on his ear." Two years later when her husband did the same thing, she stayed with him.

6. Do not judge the one who asks for advice. Instead, be understanding.

7. Do not make "should" or "ought" statements. "You shouldn't have done that" is not a helpful thing to say. No one can go back and undo what he has already done. Look to the future without judging the past.

8. Ask questions to help the advice seeker decide what he should do. The best advice is no advice. The best advice is "let me help you figure out your next move." People are more likely to act on conclusions that they draw themselves.



Deadline Nears: FSA Accepting County Committee Nominations

Farm Service Agency (FSA) is now accepting farmer and rancher candidate nominations for local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees. The nomination period continues through August 2, 2010, with elections taking place this fall. Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters November 5th and must be returned to the local FSA office by December 6th.

FSA county committee members make decisions for a variety of agricultural-related programs, including disaster, conservation, emergency and commodity price

Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide, there are about 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. Committees consist of three to eleven members who are elected by eligible producers.

To be eligible to serve on a FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area in which the person is a candi-

Producers may nominate themselves or others, and organizations representing minorities and women may also nominate candidates. Nominations for LAA Number 1, Community A (Western section of Rockcastle County bound by Pulaski, Lincoln and Garrard Counties on Highway 70, Hwy 150, I-75 and Little Hurricane Rd.) must be completed and turned in to the FSA Office no later than August 2, 2010. Individuals may nominate themselves or other eligible candidates by completing form FSA-669A (Nomination Form for County FSA Committee Election Nomination). Form FSA-669A for the 2010 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on August 2, 2010.

SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action.

Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

- 1. Arrive at a bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.
- Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
- Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.
- Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.
- The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating arrangements.
- Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
- Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
- Obey the rules posted on each bus.
- Do not block aisles in any way.
- 10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus. 11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a
- complete stop.
- 12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
- 13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
- 14. Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.
- 15. Report any damages to the bus.
- 16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
- 17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions. 18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal
- announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.
- 19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times:
 - a. Use of profane/foul language.
 - b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus.
 - c. Fighting on the bus.
 - d. Destruction of bus property. e. Defiance of driver's authority.
 - f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.
- 20. <u>Disciplinary Action:</u> Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.

Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal.

Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.

Health Department awarded \$36,000 grant to fight obesity

The Rockcastle County Health Department is one of three health departments in the state that was recently awarded a Healthy Communities Grant. A local Healthy Communities Board, made up of the heads of different government agencies and community stakeholders, is currently conducting meetings to determine how to best spend the funds.

Lynett Renner, Director of Nutrition Services with the Cumberland Valley District Health Department, is leading the board. She said the ultimate goal is clear, "We want our community to be a place where the healthy choice becomes the easy choice."

According to studies, it is estimated that 37% of our

adult population is obese and that up to 26.1% of children aged 2-5 are considered overweight. Renner says Rock-castle County joins the nation in the growing obesity epidemic that increases our risks for developing diabetes, heart disease, and a multitude of other chronic disease and health problems.

Renner says that obesity is a complex problem. "Most all of us know that if you eat too much and that you can gain too much weight. But there are many other factors that play a role in obesity such as economics, environment, heredity, and stress. For example, if my community is not designed to encourage walking, would it be an easy choice to make walking in

town as part of my daily habit? Also, consider access to healthy foods. If a family goes to a restaurant and finds a double cheeseburger on the menu for \$1, yet a healthy choice such as a grilled chicken sandwich is \$4, which choice is the easy choice if the amount of money I can spend is limited? We can contribute to the health problems of our community by not considering how to enhance policies that will increase our access to healthy foods and physical activity."

One of the first steps taken in the decision-making process for the board was a Walkability Survey in Mount Vernon. The survey is endorsed by the Partnership for a Walkable America and the US Department of Transportation

Sidewalks that incorporate walking and bicycling along our roadways is one of the most effective ways or policies that our communities can develop to increase physical activity. Nancy Keber, Rockcastle Health Department, reported, "Our 2-mile walk started at Triangle Park and continued down West Main to Highway 461, Williams St., School St. and ending on Richmond Street. The new sidewalks on Richmond Street were a welcome relief after a pleasant but difficult walk." The walkers found some sidewalks that were broken and buckled that could lead to unsafe footing. There were retaining walls along the sidewalks that were leaning as well as some narrow access due to overgrowth of vegetation, and fast drivers. The group saw that the crosswalk path, painted at Mt. Vernon Elementary has almost faded away, and they have made the recommendation that the crosswalk should be repainted to increase safety for students walking to and from school.

If you are concerned about improving the health of Rockcastle County, the Rockcastle Healthy Communities Board would like to invite you to become involved. The meetings are scheduled for every second Tuesday of the month, 11:30-12:30, at the Rock Fire Steakhouse.

The Rockcastle Healthy Community Project will focus on three action areas: to develop and enhance access to community walking, biking paths and sidewalks to promote active living, to increase access to healthy foods and physical activity, and to implement or encourage policies to reduce exposure to second-hand smoke.

"Health officials are predicting that our children today will not have the life expectancy that is predicted for their parents due to the effects of obesity, lack of physical activity and other lifestyle choices. It is just unacceptable to me," Lynnett shared, " that my kids, OUR kids may not have the same opportunity for a long, healthy, quality life. We have to work together as a community to make changes that will last more than our lifetime."


