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

ACT scores for RCHS juniors up in Reading, while other subjects decline

The assessment that colleges use as a tool to determine a high school student's potential at the post-secondary level are in, and Rockcastle County High School experienced a drop in everything but one subject area.

Kentucky high schools just completed the third year in which all juniors have been required to take the ACT. RCHS showed progress in all subject areas from the first to second year, before falling short of a few state benchmarks this

Each of the four subject areas -- Reading, English, Mathematics, and Science -- have a benchmark score. The results of the assessment report the percentage of students within each school that reach the benchmark. The scores are on a 0-36 scale, with a 36 being a perfect sc ore.

According to studies, students who reach the benchmarked score have a 50% chance of receiving a

B or better in their first credit-bearing college course. They have a 75% chance of achieving a C or

The reading scores have steadily climbed from 23% of RCHS juniors meeting the standard in 2008 to 30% in 2010. The state average in 2010 for students reaching the benchmark of 21 was 35%.

Mathematics is where the school saw the most significant decline. After jumping from 9% in 2008, to an impressive 23% in 2009, scores came back down to 14% in 2010. This is compared to the 22% of students statewide who met the benchmark in Math.

Science also saw a drop in 2010 after what had been a very encouraging 2009 report. RCHS went from 8% in 2008, to 17% in 2009, and then back down to 10% in 2010. 15% of students statewide met the benchmark of 24.

Revolutionary War Patriots Migrate to Rockcastle, Part II

Last week, we explored the history of Revolutionary War patriots in Rockcastle County, looking into the more noteworthy points in certain patriot's lives, and their contributions to the county. This week resumes the history of these patriots, beginning with Thomas Johnson. Before settling in Rockcastle County, he volunteered to go on a tour against the Indians in neighboring Lincoln County.

William Lawrence and his son (no name given) fought in the Revolutionary War, and founded Lawrence Station outside of Danville. His daughter, Rebecca, was the first white child to be born in Danville. Later he. Rebecca. and her sister, Charity, moved to Rockcastle County.

Reuben Pew who settled in Rockcastle County, spent one winter at the much-noted Vallev Forge. He also fought in the Battle of Trenton. It is noted that he was a veteran with a remarkable service record. He settled along Skaggs Creek near Jame Dysart.

Francis Ramsey, Sr., being only fifteen at the time, was a drummer boy in the Revolutionary War. He and his family settled in Rockcastle County prior to 1810.

Mourning Roberts settled in the Scaffold Cane area, and was on hand at a meeting on November 2, 1820, for the purpose of organizing a United Baptist Church at Brush Creek

Jesse Williams is said to have one of the earliest dates of birth on a grave marker in the county: 1750. One of his descendents, D. N. Williams, was said to be an honored citizen of Rockastle County. He left many notes of his early recollections of the county. He is credited with building one of the oldest houses in the county. It was known as the "Old Devault Place", but it was destroyed by fire. The got home from an engage-

Williams family settled in the Wildie area. This noted tombstone is in the Phillips Cemetery, there.

Charles Woodall applied for his war pension at age 100 on November 20, 1832. This will conclude the Revolutionary War research at this time.

I coined my first poem before I was even old enough to write it down but my Mom remembered it well. It went: "Mommy, Mommy come and

There's peaches growing on your switch tree"

And indeed there were peaches hanging, literally in wads, on every limb of the little tree that grew there beside the fence off our back porch in the head of Blair Branch. It had sprouted from seed, which usually means that it should not bear fruit and even if it did, the fruit should not be very tasty.

Nor was it close to another peach tree, a situation that greatly diminished its chances for pollination. Apparently though, Uncle Willie's honey bees were far ranging and they hauled in pollen from other peach trees on their circuit. Two or three years might go by without any evidence of fruit and then would come a season when the switch tree would be loaded. In total defiance of conventional wisdom they were absolutely de-

Mom's switch tree was so named because it also produced an abundance of thin, limber sprouts about 30 or so inches long around its lower trunk. Snapped off and stripped of leaves, these sprouts were Mom's implement of choice when it came time to administer corporal punishment to my brothers and yours truly. Said behavioral modification technique was also known as a "switch-

And sometimes it would work for several hours.

One or two deft swats across the bottom with a keen switch was enough to sully even the most behaving youngster and when I grew up on Blair Branch every Mom on the holler kept at least one handy. Mom tended to have several at the ready. On top of the refrigerator, fireplace mantle, cupboard, windowsills and even on the kitchen table, a switch was ever present and with arm's reach.

Fruit off the switch tree, however sporadic, were processed along with more dependable crops from Pap's old orchard some half a mile up the mountain behind our house. We spent weeks in July and early August peeling peaches that mom canned by the hundreds of quarts. The peels were steamed for hours until the skins floated to the top of the kettle and the juice was turned into peach jelly. If a fruit was wormy and you had to cut around the worm hole so that you came up with clumps instead of slices, said clumps were crushed and stewed into peach preserves then canned in pint Mason

Suffice to say that the entire summers of my youth on Blair Branch revolved around daylight till dark harvesting

Vernon High School, we rode in the direction of Renfro Valley until we came to the old Town Branch Road, near where my friend Paul Daily lived. Over the gravel road we went, not knowing exactly where our destination would

lead us. After what seemed like a very long time, we arrived at the Buck Eye section of the county. I had been in this area with my grandfather so I finally figured where we were at the time. We parked our bikes and rested under a huge oak tree at the side of the When we got back on our

rides and resumed our marathon, we started over a long hill when the chain of Kenneth's bike came off, sending him into the ditch at the side of the road. You can imagine the dilemma we felt at this un-scheduled predicament. I parked my Schwinn Black Phantom and helped him put the chain back on his cycle. Our hands were covered with chain grease, and we were exhausted by this unexpected chain of events. We washed our hands in a creek by the side of the road and boarded our cycles again. We were determined to complete our day-trip.

After some time of riding and pushing our bikes, we arrived at the Hummel section of the county. From there we crossed a metal bridge and finally rode into the Climax-Brushcreek area. Kenneth suggested that we take a break and find a shade tree under which to devour Mommie Katie's lunch. That small sack of sandwiches, fruit, and brownies tasted like a feast. We sat for a long time in order to get our strength back before tackling the rest of our



Giardia Causes Flu Symptoms Presented by Dr. David Brabon

Giardia is a microscopic parasite that can infect the small bowel just beyond the stomach. A person usually acquires this infection by drinking water that is contaminated with the parasite. This is most commonly water from creeks or

other surface water, perhaps when a person is camping.



The water becomes infected when animals which carry the parasite, often beavers or dogs, pass their feces into the streams or ponds. At other times, the parasite is spread from per-

son to person because of poor hygiene. Day care centers are a place where this can be a problem when many chil-

dren are in diapers. Children are more susceptible to the parasites, and they are more likely to spread the infection to others. Younger children also get worse symptoms than

The symptoms begin about 7-10 days after exposure with diarrhea, cramping, bloating and fatigue. Often a person has lost 5-10 pounds before he seeks medical attention.

Some people have mild symptoms and others get no infection at all after exposure. If the infection is not diagnosed, it will usually continue for weeks or months before resolving spontaneously.

The diagnosis can be made by finding giardia organisms or cysts in the stool or in fluid aspirated from the duodenum. There is also a blood test to check for giardia.

Treatment usually clears the infection. If symptoms recur, a second treatment may be necessary, but re-exposure from other family members or a day care center must be considered.

The cold liquid felt good to two hot, tired, and dirty young

Because we were so exhausted, we had to stop and rest occasionally. Finally we could see the Winstead Half-Way House, which was in our neighborhood in the Pine Grove section of the county. The last leg of our daylong trip was downhill, and we literally coasted into Kenneth's yard. His mother was upset that we had been gone for so long but was glad that we had not suffered any problems or injuries on our trip. She told Kenneth to get cleaned up for dinner and I went home.

My mother (Bee) greeted me at the front door with lots of questions about where all we had been on our trip. She

that every child has the opportunity to be successful," Mattingly said.

Mattingly said the ACT preparation is already incorporated into courses. Students see a number of sample problems each year before sitting for the exam.

Students who do not meet the benchmark in a subject area have to take a remedial course before being eligible to take a creditbearing course.

Mattingly says that the high school is trying to take care of the remedial courses during a student's senior year so that they enter college without any setbacks. They currently offer four sections of college math readiness as a remedial course Next year will also be the first year that seniors will be required to take 4 years of math to graduate.

"We have to do more to make sure we are putting our graduating seniors in a position to succeed at the next level. ACT scores are a clear indicator as to whether or not we are doing that," Mattingly said.

And, as in previous years, local churches will come together to sponsor a free pregame tail-gating experience.



found question is not imposed from without; it is one's own, and it comes from the depths of the heart. A statement by Dr. Viktor E. Frankel, the internationally known Viennese psychiatrist who, during World War II, was a prisoner in the notorious German concentration camp at Auschwitz and other concentration camps, impressed me. After observing the devastating troubles that were thrust upon him and his fellow inmates in those infamous camps, Frankel wrote, "...in the final analysis it becomes clear that the sort of person the prisoner became was the result of an inner decision, and not the result of camp influences alone. Fundamentally, therefore, any man can, even under such circumstances, decide what shall become of him-mentally and spiritually."

That troubles will come is a fact of life, and some will be more severe than others. When they come, they may hurt severely, but the individual, by attitude and resolve, determines the final outcome. Depending upon the inner spirit and the determined resolve of the individual, troubles, regardless of severity, may become either destructive or constructive. They can become either stumbling blocks or steppingstones.







Yards to Paradise

"Creating a Landscape Showpiece for \$2,000 in 30 Minutes Only Happens on TV"

To create a work of art in a few days takes much planning and time. It also takes knowhow or expertise.

And it takes sweat and laboring to make it all come into place in a lovely fashion. It also takes enough money to entice someone qualified to take on the project. Only on television can a pretty job be done for cheap as you sit in a comfortable chair in an airconditined room and don't have to do any labor.

As regular readers of this column know, I preach starting with a plan. A good design, one that can be modified over time if need be, but serves well the building of a lovely landscape for the homeowner, and that usually over time. (Most of us can't afford to do everything we want 'right now'.)

Unless you are good at designing yourself, or you are willing to accept a "quickie" design from a garden center employee who will, without fail, design into your landscape only the things they sell where he works, you will want to seek a qualified professional. You may find this out by doing a little checking of references and ascertaining from real customers the strengths and weaknesses of the person you are thinking of hiring. The guy down the street with the lovely landscape may not be the person to ask "who did your landscaping" unless you also find out the price. Finding out that that wonderful design costs five times what you can spend profits nobody. (By the way, expect to pay for good design work. Free estimates may sound like a winner, but the five freebies this week that did not sign up will all have to be covered by you the paying customer. This principal is also biblical, I Tim. 5:18 "the labourer is worthy of his re-

Remember any design should take into account what already exists. A low profile ranch style house does not benefit by the planting of tall trees nearly as much as one with two stories not counting the basement. And, a brick sidewalk up to a log home just may not look good. Surrounding a yellow house by pink-blooming trees and shrubs may not be the most brilliant thing to do. You are looking to create a wellblended landscape that meshes with the home and also is in keeping with the surrounding neighborhood. The cottage garden look may not go over with the homeowners association in a gated community, for example. The well designed home does not deserve a chintzy landscape job.

Embellishments and personal requests may come up in designing the landscape, or they may only come to mind afterwards. You probably ought not have planted that lovely flower in front of the garbage cans or the doghouse. Things that beg for closer inspection to admire will subsequently reveal the things you'd rather were out of sight. That expensive specimen tree that is not properly showcased by also planting neutral-looking greenery or that goldfish pond in the middle of the yard surrounded by lawn and with the hot sun beating down are examples of mis-placed embellishments. These items should be part of the plan, part of creating a lovely whole and complete pretty picture.

I want to say a thing or two about jumping on the "green" bandwagon as we discuss creating a showpiece yard.

It's amazing how many "green" crusaders want to throw out the old and acquire new energy-efficient appliances.

Or, they want to build the trendiest house in the most pristine location they can find (or afford as the case may be). No matter that the electric usage on that new stainless 'fridge will be a little less and it'll look more modern, how green is it really to expend all the energy used to build a new machine when the old one worked 'just fine thank you'? If the energy is calculated to mine the raw materials, process them, manufacture them. transport them to a store and then install them after unpacking them from the box, most "green" appliances actually are wasters of energy. And, just how "green" is it to build a 4,000 square foot mountaintop home, using the latest green technologies, after you buy the \$200,000 lot that has underground utilities already strung to it, when the 2,000 square foot home should be plenty big since the kids have grown up and married? (And if it is not, could you add a room on or build an outdoor kitchen to provide the extra room you wish for?) Enough on this "green" and back to creating paradise in our yards in 30 minutes to two weeks with real greenery, plus hardscapes and embellishments.

Most of us will need to play with the hand we've been dealt. Adding something nice to what we have.

Taking a dull yard and creating some pizzaz. Adding the sunroom, the patio, the new shade trees, and so on.

Just keep in mind, it does not go from ordinary to wow without adequate imputs to make it happen. A half hour, a weekend, a few hundred dollars won't get you much. Not unless you're the tv show producer who makes his money selling the 12 minutes of distracting ads during the 30 minute backyard makeover.

I suppose that'd really make it only an 18 minute backyard makeover, right?

On a personal note, I enjoy attempting to create paradise for someone. Or, bits and pieces of paradise, as they can afford. Yet, there has to be a profit. What plumber or HVAC guy will come out and then go home without leaving you an invoice?

Your landscape professional has to cover all his expenses and have some left over, else why get out of the house and go to work? Everything from gasoline to truck payments to insurance to business licenses, to advertising and telephone bills all have to get paid for from the landscaper's projects. We all want to wisely use our resources and be wowed with the result. Every business has someone that needs to be paid for time spent driving, time spend talking, time spent figuring, as well as time spent acquiring materials and getting them to the job site, plus paid for the actual labor and sweat, plus pay for the time to put things in writing, time to come collect, time to come back and pat you on the back and tell you it's normal when you think maybe you deserve a replacement under warranty for the tree that has two yellow leaves that were green when you finished the job and went home.

They sure paint a wonderful picture with hardscaping and greenery in only 30 minutes on some tv shows, but as you can see a lot more goes into real-world landscape transformations. And the bigger the company, the more people they have doing things like answering the phone who also have to get paid from your project. That's the only way they will be able to continue

doing what they do.

Now, take a city, say they want a new office building. They hire a professional to design and oversee the project. And, even though they want the cheapest bid, sometimes they pick another company with a little costlier estimate. Why? Sometimes it's because they know the good reputation of that company vs the other

Sometimes the cheapest can be more expensive if the work is substandard. Likewise, the person who just got some cards printed and has a new shovel and wheelbarrow may quote for free and give the lowest price, but you'll likely get pretty much what you pay for. Especially when you need to call them again and they're working at a "regular" job now!

As I hope to have enlightened a bit, entertained a bit, and informed some so that you may make a good call when you have reached the point of wanting the help of a landscaper, so also I hope to have made it plain that a lot must happen behind the scenes and is often unnoticed in order to produce paradise for someone in one segment of weekend television.

Cox is a sole practitioner and has been practicing criminal defense law for over 40 years, and is a 1968 graduate of the University of Kentucky School of Law and a 1964 graduate of Berea College.

He is a Life Member of NACDL and served on the Board of Directors from 2000-2006. He has served as Chair of the NACDL Audit Committee and is a member of the Investment Committee and Long Range Planning Committee. He serves on the faculty of the Kentucky Department of Public Advocacy's Trial Practice Institute. He is a member of the American and Kentucky Bar Associations and has served on the KBA's Unauthorized Practice of Law Committee (1993-present, Chair 2007-2010), Criminal Rules Committee (1995-2007), Legislative Committee (1999-2005), Prescription Drug Abuse Task Force (2003) and as Chair of

the Criminal Law Section (1994). He is a member of the Kentucky Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers; received the Presidential Award in 1995 and served as President in 1997. He also served on the Kentucky Criminal Justice Council's Drug Strategy Committee (1999), Public Advocacy Commission (1993-present, Chair 2010-present) and the Kentucky Bar Foundation (President, 2002). Jerry Cox is certified as a

Criminal Specialist by the National Board of Trial Advocacy. In 2004, he served on the NBTA Board of Examiners. In 2002, he was awarded DPA's Nelson Mandela Lifetime Achievement Award for his commitment to criminal defense. In numerous recent years and in 2009, Cox received NACDL's President's Commendation for outstanding service to the goals and objections of the criminal defense bar and for outstanding service in fighting for the rights of all persons. In 2004, he received the President's Special Service Award from the Kentucky Bar Association. Cox has been AV rated by Martindale-Hubbell since 1985 and was recognized in the March 2010 issue of Louisville Magazine as being selected by his peers as a Top Lawyer. Cox has published and lectured extensively on criminal law issues.



As part of the 2010 "American Recovery Act" funding that Daniel Boone communiy Action Agency received, a "Garden Project" was designed to serve low income families in Rockcastle, Clay, Jackson and Laurel couties.

The project engaged individuals and families intheir own environments and communities, while educating them on healthy living.

In Rockcastle County, the funding provided 25 individuals and families with a \$50 voucher to be used for seeds, plants and fertilizer, and a case of Mason jars. DBCAA coordinated classes with he Rockcastle Co. Extension Office to develop creative skills in sustainable rural living, gardening, health and nutrition, canning and preservation. The need in this area is great, as the cost of seeds, plants, fertilizer and other necessary utensils rise with inflation. This project helped families to supplement their food supply by growing and preserving produce themselves. The projec also encouraged falmilies to produce nutritious foods while reducing their monthly food budgets.

Some of the families took their produce to the Farmers' Market to sell for a profit. This profit, in turn, benefited the families in other areas of their life. During the process, Tamara Cox and Holly Barnett, employees of DBCAA, followed up with the families doing "before and after pictures of their gardens.

James and Pauline Gibbons won the "2010 Gardenr of the Year" award. The Gibbons have over two acres in garden, including orchards. They are avid gardeners and, so far, have put up over 49 quarts of beans, 40 quarts of tomatoes, frozen corn, corn relish, potatoes, squash, pumpkin, broccoli, cauliflower, peppers and sauerkraut, just to mention a few. Rockcastle farmers elgible for FSA **Emergency Loans**

Farmers in 19 counties are eligible for Federal disaster assistance, including low interest emergency (EM) loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) provided eligibility requirements are met.

On August 12, 2010, President Obama amended the disaster declaration M1925 to include three Kentucky counties as disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by severe storms, flooding and mudslides that occurred from July 17, 2010, through July 30, 2010. Those counties are:

Madison, Mason, and Rowan. As a result of the amendment, 16 Kentucky counties were named as contiguous counties where eligible family farmers may qualify for FSA EM loan assistance pursuant to Section 321(a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act. Those counties are: Bath, bracken, Carter, Clark, Elliott, Estill, Fayette, Fleming, Garrard, Jackson, Jessamine, Lewis, Menifee, Morgan, Robertson, and Rockcastle Counties.

EM loan applications for physical and production losses will be received through April 12, 2011, and applications pending on that date may be processed and completed.

Farmers interested in applying for assistance should contact their local FSA county office.





Conservation Reserve Program Sign-up Deadline: General sign-up for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) will end on Friday, August 27, 2010.

CRP (Conservation Reserve Program) is a voluntary program that assists farmers, ranchers and other agricultural producers to use their environmentally sensitive land for conservation benefits. Producers enrolling in CRP (Conservation Reserve Program) plant long-term, resource-conserving covers in exchange for rental payments, cost-share and technical assistance. CRP (Conservation Reserve Program) protects millions of acres of America's topsoil from erosion and is designed to improve the nation's natural resources base.

Participants voluntarily remove environmentally sensitive land from agricultural production by entering into long-term contracts for 10 to 15 years. In exchange, participants receive annual rental payments and a payment of up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing conservation

tion Reserve Program) offers using an Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) for environmental benefits to be gained from enrolling the land in CRP (Conservation Reserve Program). The EBI (Environmental Benefits Index) consists of five environmental factors: wildlife, water, soil, air and enduring benefits and cost. L.R. was beaten and nearly killed by her husband in Mexico. Once when he learned she was pregnant, he poured gas on her and tried to set her on fire. On several occasions she went to the police who sent her back home or warned him that she had come to them. She went to a judge who offered to

help her -- in exchange for sex.

She escaped to the United States and applied for asylum. Asylum has traditionally been granted only to people who were being persecuted by their government for their religion, race or political affiliation. Now two decisions by the Office of Homeland Security have broadened the scope of asylum to protect women who have been victims of genital mutilation or domestic violence.

The other victim, Rody Alvarado, has been fighting her case in US courts for 14 years. She had been abused by the father of her children when she lived in Guatemala. Last December when these new guidelines for the granting of asylum to domestic violence victims became established, Ms. Alvarado was granted asylum.

Not everyone sees this as a good thing. Some experts worry that this will open the doors to a flood of women claiming to be domestic violence victims. These experts want to see immigration restricted even further rather than making more people eligible. Defenders of victims say that

each case is very fact-specific and certain facts must be proven before asylum can be granted. They do not foresee this leading to a huge increase in victims filing for asylum.

Domestic violence victims in countries other than the United States face tremendous obstacles when they seek help. Victims in the United States have more rights and more resources than women in other countries. A former special prosecutor for crimes against women in Mexico filed a brief in support of L.R.'s case. She said, "Mexico remains a country in which women have limited, if nonexistent, means to escape violence in relationships." The prosecutor filed the brief to back up L.R.'s statement that she could not expect any help from the Mexican po-

While domestic violence victims can expect more help in the United States, there are still major gaps in the safety net for victims and children. Kentucky's newly enacted Amanda's Law makes it possible in a limited number of cases for the judge to order the perpetrator of the violence to wear an ankle bracelet so his whereabouts can be known at all times. This is one tool that victims can use to protect themselves. There are many other tools that are necessary to keep

victims safe.
Family Life Abuse Center envisions an informed and involved community that does

not tolerate abuse and is committed to ending the cycle of domestic violence. One shelter or fifteen shelters cannot stop family violence. It takes a community that rises up in protest and says, "We will not tolerate the continued abuse of our women and children."

If you need help because of an abusive relationship, call Family Life Abuse Center at 800-755-5348. When you call, someone will listen.

Rockets running game will make for a competitive 2010 season

Scott Parkey's Rockcastle touchdowns last year, the mark County team will enter the 2010-2011 season coming off the school's first losing season in 24 years.

However, the optimistic third year head coach will tell you that he was just a few plays away from eight wins. And, more pointedly, that the lackluster performance of a year ago isn't mentioned and is irrelevant to the team's success this campaign.

Since taking over for the long-tenured Tom Larkey, Parkey has had no trouble moving the football. And with the return of one of the most productive rushers in school history, this season should be no different.

Junior Clark Rowe will enter the year only 2,082 yards behind the all-time career rushing record held by Marty Reagan (99-02). Considering Rowe posted 2,107 and 26

certainly is attainable.

"Division 1 football is not out of the realm of possibility for Clark. He is fast, strong, and he has a great work ethic," Parkey said.

The 5'10, 195 lb. Rowe will run behind a fairly experienced offensive line as three starters return. Junior Ben Lake will enter his third year at right tackle, while junior Kenton Adams, at center, and senior Dylan Thacker, at left guard, are also returning starters.

Junior Nick Thomason saw limited action last year, but does have some experience at left tackle. Sophomore Boone Saylor will get the starting nod at right guard.

Anchoring the fullback position will be senior John L. Saylor. Saylor has proven to be a very reliable rusher, especially by statistical standards. He posted 712 yards and 6 touchdowns a year ago, all of which originated between the tackles. "For a fullback, those numbers were exceptional," Parkey said.

Junior Jaden Brock will take over for Dustin Bishop at quarterback, who started for three consecutive years. According to Parkey, Brock's ability to open things up with the play-action pass will be critical to the effectiveness of the running game.


"We have to run the ball as much as we can. However, we have to be able to throw playactions and screens to really be at our best," Parkey said.

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ROCK will face number of formidable challenges on 2010 schedule

The Rockcastle County football schedule will again pose serious challenges for Scott Parkey's Rockets as the season progresses.

Of the seven losses the Rockets had last year, they will face the teams who handed them six of those again in 2010-2011.

They will open the season against the Danville Admirals August 28th at & p.m.on Danville's home field at the Bob Allen Pigskin Classic. Just like the Rockets, Danville experienced their first losing season in years during the 2009-2010 campaign. However, also like the Rockets, they return a much more experienced squad. 
The Rockets will travel to the season rolls around.

A wise music director plays to his strengths and minimizes his weaknesses much the same as a football coach strategizes based on his offensive and defensive potentials.




"It is so easy to adopt bad habits at an early age that are difficult

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


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
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VISITORS 'BIG BUSINESS' FOR BEREA ECONOMY

Banking on tourism

BEREA - The tourism and travel industry here contributed \$52 million to the economy in 2009, according to a study released recently by the city council.

The study was performed by Certec Inc., a consulting firm company based in Lexington. Certec representative Jim Carr presented the council with a summary of the 16-page report.


"Tourism is indeed big business in Berea," Carr said. "Tourism spending occurred with many businesses throughout the community. A healthy tourism industry provides Berea residents with a better quality of life.

The research findings presented in this report show the importance of tourism to the local econo-

Tourism generates state, local and federal tax revenues. These taxes included property, business, restaurant and lodging room taxes.

Berea tourism expenditures resulted in the collection of nearly \$10.8 million in tax revenues in 2009, according to the study. Of this amount, \$4.4 million went to the state, \$5.1 million went to the federal government and \$1.3 million stayed in Berea.

A license plate survey done in the parking lots of

local restaurants showed that 60 percent of those eating at Berea restaurants were out-of-county residents, while 39 percent of the spending was from Madison County residents.

Additional data was collected from businesses by using a mail survey. That survey reflected the amount of goods sold during 2009 and how many people visited those various attractions, Carr said.

"Berea's economic impact of tourism is a function of the number of visitors to the community and how much they spend while there," he said.

According to study results, spending on food and beverages accounted for 38 percent of the \$52 million contribution; transportation constituted 16 percent; shopping and attractions collected 13 percent and 11 percent respectively; lodging accounted for more than 12 percent and souvenirs nearly 10 percent.

"Many hold the idea that it all goes to the service and retain sectors to support only low-wage jobs," the study reads. "In reality, the economic benefits to the Berea area are far more widespread. It helps support dozens of local businesses that do not directly serve the community's tourists."

The impacts can be seen in several sectors including banking, insurance, real estate, transportation, pub-

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
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lic utilities, construction, agriculture and manufacturing, the report reads.

In 2009, more than 800 jobs in Berea were because of the expenditures made in the tourism and travel industry.

"Consequently, a healthy tourism industry means additional business for industries throughout the economy," the report states.

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
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
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
