Wedding crasher, armed robber, 15 others indicted by Grand Jury

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury indicted 17 individuals last week, including the woman accused of stealing gifts from a Rockcastle County couple during their wedding reception.

Margaret "Knowles" Campbell, 58, of Winfield, TN led the roster of indict-

ments with one count of second degree robbery.

Brandon Cromer, 21, of Mt. Vernon, was indicted on six counts relating to three separate burglaries within the Mount Vernon city limits.

Rhonda Spivey, 31, of Tabor City, NC, and Anthony Ennis, 38, of Cerro Gordo, NC, were indicted in connection with the armed robbery of a Mt. Vernon woman in the McDonalds parking lot. Both

are still at large.

Jessica R. Carr, 25, of Mt. Vernon, was indicted for Possession of a Controlled Substance, second degree, for possessing Hydrocodone.

Kenneth Wade Graves, 66, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on 8 count of Trafficking in a Controlled Substance involving the sale of Hydrocodone to a confidential informant

Monticello man gets 18 years for March Days Inn robbery

A Monticello man, accused of holding a Days Inn clerk at gunpoint and demanding cash, was convicted on Friday and sentenced immediately thereafter to 18 years by Circuit Judge Jeffrey T. Burdette for the March 30, 2010 robbery.

40 year-old Rodney Porter will be required to serve 85% of the sentence because the conviction of first degree robbery is considered a "violent offense," said Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley.

Bartley, who handled the prosecution, complimented the Mt. Vernon Police Department on "moving quickly on an air-tight case that included video footage of the crime."

Bartley's boss, Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery, commented, "we hope this sends a message to local residents that they can go about their work day feeling safe and secure in their place of employment. We will simply not tolerate these acts of violence."

However, the featured candidates of the evening will be those seeking the office of Mt. Vernon Mayor. According to Chamber President Arielle Reese, Mayor Gary Cromer, Councilman Don Jones and Dr. Mike Bryant have all confirmed

their participation in the event.

Invitations will be extended through the mail to other candidates.

"The reason we decided to do a Mayoral Debate in the General Election is because we feel, in addition to educating the public about positions on issues, we want to educate the public on exactly what these important officials do. We felt good about our attempt to teach about the Fiscal Court in May, and look forward to having the same success with city government in this endeavor," Reese said.

Travis Burton will moderate the debate. Burton is a

Bailey arrested after stealing medicine, cash from alleged victim in broken down vehicle

Arthur Bailey, 32, of Mt. Vernon, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Joe Rush on September 4th, for allegedly stealing medicine and cash from a woman whose car had broken down on the side of the Sally J. Road in Mt. Vernon.

According to the citation issued by Rush, the alleged victim called Rockcastle County 911, and stated that a male subject stole medicine and cash from her vehicle. She said she pulled over after the truck she was driving started having trouble running.

At that point, Bailey allegedly approached the vehicle and asked if she needed help. He then went to the passenger side of the vehicle and reached into the glove box, from which he took Percocet 10s and Loratab 5s along with \$310 cash.

The alleged victim told Rush that after Bailey stole the items, she followed him up Sally J. Road where she located him. However, she said Bailey appeared to have

DBCAA awarded additional funds

Daniel Boone Community Action Agency in Rockcastle County has been awarded a special reallocation from Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds remaining available under Phase AR.

The National Board approved this reallocation of funds to Rockcastle County based upon changes in the unemployment rate between phase AR and Phase 28.

The purpose of this special reallocation is to meet currently existing needs for rent/mortgage and utility costs that have increased due to economic conditions.

County receives another 30% rate hike for health insurance

In the last two years, health insurance premiums for Rockcastle County employees have jumped 60% - 30% last year and 30% this year.

Last year, the county absorbed the \$60,000 cost of the increase, except for employees who opted for the better policy. Currently county employees pay \$36.19 each of the 26 pay periods and \$55 per pay period for the better coverage. This year, the court voted at Tuesday's regular meeting, to again absorb the cost, causing the \$150,000 budgeted for 2010-11 to have to be amended to about \$210,000. The exact amount of the increase will not be known until the open enrollment period ends sometime in October, Joe Clontz, County Treasurer said.

The matter caused quite a bit of discussion among the magistrates and County Judge/Executive Buzz

Carloftis. Carloftis told the court that the agent for the group policy said that for every \$1,000 that is paid in premiums by the county and employees, Anthem Blue Cross-Blue Shield paid out \$1,500 last year.

Carloftis also said that with that ratio none of the other three health insurance providers in the state would give the county a quote for the group plan and that Anthem Blue Cross-Blue Shield was only bidding because they have no choice, since they have been the provider in years past.

The decision for the county to absorb all of the increase was based on having lost "good" employees in the past because of not providing health care coverage and the fact that county employees have not received a pay in-

The Roots of Rockcastle

What Shaped Early America and Influenced Our Local Settlers, Part II

Last week, we were exploring the events that were shaping the lives of our ancestors as they lived along the eastern coast of the United States, or perhaps had not left Europe yet. At first, you would wonder why these events would effect out lives today, but it was events such as these that made our ancestors react the way they did, and probably had an impact concerning their moving to places such as south central Kentucky; places that one day would become Rockcastle County.

Of course, by 1780, the American Revolutionary War is still raging. We are at war with Britain, and Britain is at war with France and Spain. While these three wars are ongoing, Britain declares war on the Netherlands. As you can see, our forefathers were entrenched in war, whether they had already come to the Colonies, or still in one of the conflicts in one of the other countries.

With any war, it brings about its own set of unfortunate circumstances. Women were left behind to raise the children and hold together the home as best they could. Britain was undoubtedly suffering a financial crisis, due to the burden of the various wars.

In the spring of 1780, on a Friday, May the nineteenth at two PM, there was a mysterious "sign": total and complete darkness covered the entire New England area and the eastern portion of Canada. A total eclipse of the sun would be a logical explanation, but according to the "experts", this was not the case.

Woooo...scary to think about, even today. The prior Friday, British forces had captured Charleston, South Carolina.

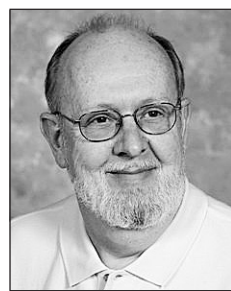
One of the most noted figures of the Revolution was Benedict Arnold, who tried to sell West Point to the British. His co-conspirator, Major John Andre with the British, was captured with the plans hidden in his stocking, exposing Arnold as well. Andre was hung a few days later in October of 1780. Benedict Arnold escaped to Britain, and lived until 1801.

However, prior to his death, Benedict Arnold in 1781 was fighting for the British and led a raid on Richmond, Virginia, and burned the town. I've found in my personal research in genealogy, that this was a common practice in the Revolutionary and Civil Wars. Unfortunately, in these fires, old records and various documentation were destroyed in the courthouses. Sometimes churches were spared. These churches contained old records of marriages, births, and deaths or there would be no record of our ancestors, in some cases. The burning of these towns was another hardship for our forefathers, who either had to rebuild the town, or move on in hopes of a better future.

Meanwhile, slavery was a common practice. On November 29, 1871, a slave ship dumped the entire living cargo overboard in an attempt to claim the insurance. During this era, some human lives were considered worthless, no more than a brute beast fit for only work.

In March of 1781, the Continental Congress adopted the

Rockcastle Memories

A most unusual tree fort
Climbing trees and building tree forts—as young boys, most of us loved to play in the woods for such adventures. But there was one summer when we improvised and built our fort in a most unusual place: on top of my grandfather's (Pop) outhouse! Before you begin to consider shudder at such an arrangement, a brief explanation is necessary.

Following the Great Depression, many outhouses were constructed for the benefit of rural families by a program called The Work Projects Administration. The WPA was created by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt in order to create jobs after the stock market crash of 1929. (Pop used to say in jest, "WPA means we piddle around").

Those outhouses were extremely well constructed with concrete floors, sturdy walls, and well-built roofs. The privy at Pop's house was located on the side of his property near a gravel road that led to his garage and was in a place that gave us some privacy.

It was while Bee and I were living with Pop and Mommie Katie that my friends and I decided that the top of the outhouse would be a good place for us to build a fort.

We figured that, with such a sturdy rooftop, we could design a great temporary "clubhouse" so we could hide from our friends and also could see what was going on in the yard. The privy was located in the middle of three large locust trees, and the summer foliage offered lots of privacy.

Our design was pretty simple (remember, we were very young). We stretched a rope from one tree to the others and then hung blankets for the walls. We even nailed some wooden boards to one of the trees to serve as a ladder to get to the top of our secret hide-out.

Tree forts were great escapes for lying back, listening to the wind in the tree tops, and for watching wildlife in the area. The first day that we completed the final stages of our new project, we were sitting and looking around the tree tops when we spotted a bird nest filled with

young birds.

For days on end we carefully watched as robins feeding their young. Because we were so close, it was a real education for boys who were only 7 or 8 years of age. The mother robin would bring whole earthworms to the nest and feed each baby a portion of the worm. We got a good laugh listening to the babies as they screeched for another piece.

There were several boys who lived in our neighborhood, and we decided that we would make our fort into a clubhouse with social gatherings for "members only." We settled on the requirements for membership and came up with the following list:

- Boys only (of course!)
- One member would serve as the Captain
- Dues would be 5 cents per week for each member
- We had to vote to see how the money was to be spent

- We also had a password to gain entrance to the fort—the secret word was "Robin."

Since the tree house was in a rather obscure location, we brought in a small, wooden, ammo box to hold our secret possessions so we would not have to carry them up the ladder each time we visited our fort. The box was kept locked, and the Captain was the holder of the key. Inside were a notepad and pencil, a pair of binoculars, a whistle, and a pocket knife. These were very important items to be in a tree house for boys of our age. My grandmother (Mommie Katie) donated a large, slightly torn umbrella for us to use when it rained. We hung that umbrella on one of the tree limbs in case of emergencies.

One thing I can remember distinctly was my dog sitting at the base of the ladder nailed to the locust tree. His name was Frisky, and he could not understand why he was not allowed to enter our fort. Each day Frisky romped with us in the yard having as much fun as we were, only to be left alone at the bottom of the ladder when we climbed into our "secret hideout." After he died, I often thought of him sitting on the ground wishing he could join us on top of the privy.

One day, my friend Kenneth Hansel suggested that we gather as many extension cords as we could find and equip our fort with electricity. We all thought it was a great idea, so off to our respective homes we ran. If memory serves me right, we had to stretch 10 or 12 cords across the yard and up the tree to have lights at night. Can you imagine our neighbors seeing a lamp on top of Pop's outhouse when it got dark in the evening? I can hear them now, "What would possess

High school sports legend
Lowell Flanary set records
that are not likely to be broken

When he was hired to teach in Estill County, few people were aware Lowell Flanary had a record.

Two of them, in fact. While playing football for the Lynch Bulldogs, he became the first high school player in Kentucky to earn All-State honors three times...at three different positions. His record still stands.

He also holds the record for the longest punt on old Stoll Field in Lexington, even if he didn't realize it at the time.

"The paper reported I kicked it 62 yards, plus the roll," says the retired teacher and coach, who was also named to the "Little All-American" team in high school.

Life has been a series of "firsts" for the 66-year-old son of a Harlan County coal miner, who credits "running" up and down those mountains for giving him superior physical agility as a youngster.

He started playing varsity football while in seventh grade on a team led by legendary coach Ed Miracle.

During his high school career, Flanary would play in five state championships and lead his team to victory in three after becoming a starter in eighth grade.

Whether playing at full back, end or half back, the 5-11 195 pounder was the best player on his team and among the best to ever come out of the mountains, according to press clippings saved by his

mother.

Later, Lynch would retire his No. 84 jersey.

The first person in his family to attend college, the star athlete had offers from such national powerhouses as Oklahoma State and BYU, but chose to stay closer to home, playing for Roy Kidd at Eastern.

He also credits his determination on the field to the fact he wanted to escape working in the coal mines and the black lung disease that led to his father's death.

"That's why I played football, to get out of that," he says.

Flanary's senior season at Eastern, and any chance at playing professionally, was interrupted when he was discovered to have a heart murmur.

He says he was "pouring concrete" for the new football stadium at Eastern in 1970 when his bride, Lucy, asked him to accompany her on a job interview with Estill County schools.

Both were hired after he agreed to help establish a football program at Estill High. He gathered helmets from a surplus store in Frankfort and accepted a generous offer of pads from Coach Kidd. Uniforms were provided by the school system.

Despite the lack of wins in his two seasons at the helm, he fondly recalls the high caliber of players on his Engineer teams.

"I had good, tough boys. Hard-nosed and not afraid of anybody," he says.

Before retiring in the late 1990s, he spent many years

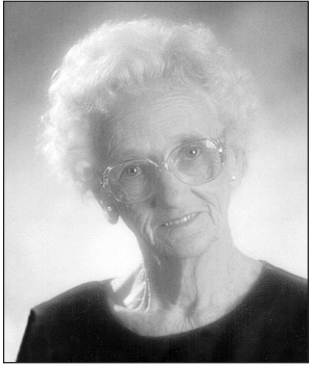

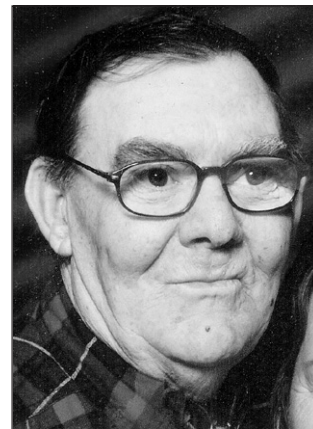

Finally, on Friday, October 19, 1781, the British surrendered to George Washington and Jean-Baptiste de Vimeur at Yorktown, Virginia, ending the Revolutionary War. By this time, the French had taken an active part in the conflict, aiding the colonists. However, there was one more battle: the battle of Blue Lick, almost ten months after the surrender at Yorktown. The peace treaty was signed between the colonists and Britain in Paris on Saturday, November 30, 1782. 1782 and

We were totally entertained and happily content until we heard Mommie Katie yelling, "David Joe, it is time to come in now!" As soon as we heard that call, we gathered our personal belongings and down the ladder we went.

The only other detail that I can recollect about our fort is almost a cliché concerning young boys and their clubhouses—it was a sign nailed to the tree above the ladder which said "Do Not Enter – Members Only!" For a long time, that sign remained attached to the tree, even after we took down the ladder and stopped using the outhouse as a fort.

And that, my friends, is how you put a "fort" on top of a privy.

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Family meals - think 5

Family and Consumer Sciences

The Norman Rockwell painting of the family sitting around the dinner table seems to have been relegated to bygone days. The busier we get, the harder it is to have a family meal.

According to a recent study conducted by Columbia University, some of the benefits are better school success, instilling family values and dealing with weight concerns.

The study also found that teens who had family dinners more than 5 times per week were two times less likely to have smoked cigarettes – and one and a half times less likely to have used alcohol. Young people who reported eating dinner with their family 5 or more times per week were much more likely to report receiving either all A's or mostly A's and B's in school.

It is too easy for children to turn to packaged snacks rather than sit down to a nutritious meal. The high-calorie snacks offer little in nutrition.

Five times a week try to make it a point to gather your family together for meal. It could be breakfast, lunch or dinner. You will be glad you did. Make this a time to get to know each other. Instead of getting the "fine" answer about school, you could get some real information.

Eliminate distractions. Turn off all electronics for this short

get together - no cell phones, no answering ringing telephones, no distracting televisions, no texting, no videos. Concentrate on each other.

Other fives to consider are 1,500-2,000 calories a day, 5 fruits and vegetables a day, and 5 elements for a balanced meal.

Use smaller 7 to 8 inch plates. Save your larger 10 to 12 inch plates for holidays and birthdays. Reserve half the plate for vegetables, a quarter for starches (bread or potatoes), and a quarter for protein. A fourth element is a serving of fruit.

Number 5 is milk, the best beverage at meal time. This calcium-rich drink is necessary for strong bones and teeth. Limit sugary drinks that are high in calories and low in nutrition.

There's no need to force children to eat everything on their plate because it won't take long to know what your children like the best. You can serve their favorites. Introduce them to new vegetables once in a while so they will have a variety to choose from.

At snack time, a small plate of raw vegetables like carrots, celery, broccoli and cauliflower sitting on the table might encourage your children to grab these as they leave the table rather than the packaged salty snacks.

Not only will you be feeding their bodies (and yours) with nutritious meals, but you will also give them a forum to talk, laugh, joke and voice concerns. You will know what is going on with your children, and you won't even have to ask.

Focusing on family, making time for each other, meeting nutritional needs and getting away from distractions can make life richer and healthier both for your children and you. Use the family meal as a powerful tool that your family can count on.

The Rockcastle County Extension Office offers many nutritionally sound recipes and more suggestions for family time together. If you are needing to loose weight, maintain weight loss and eat more healthy, consider attending "The Biggest Loser"

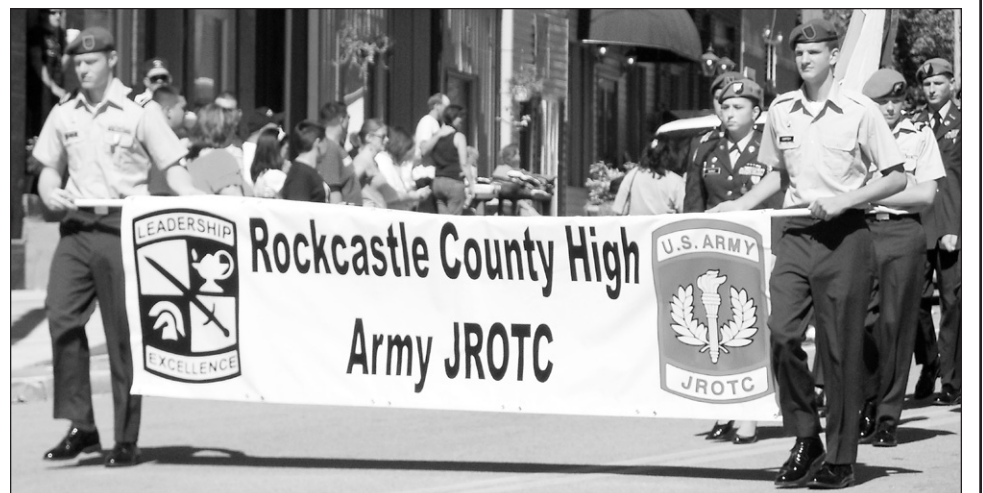

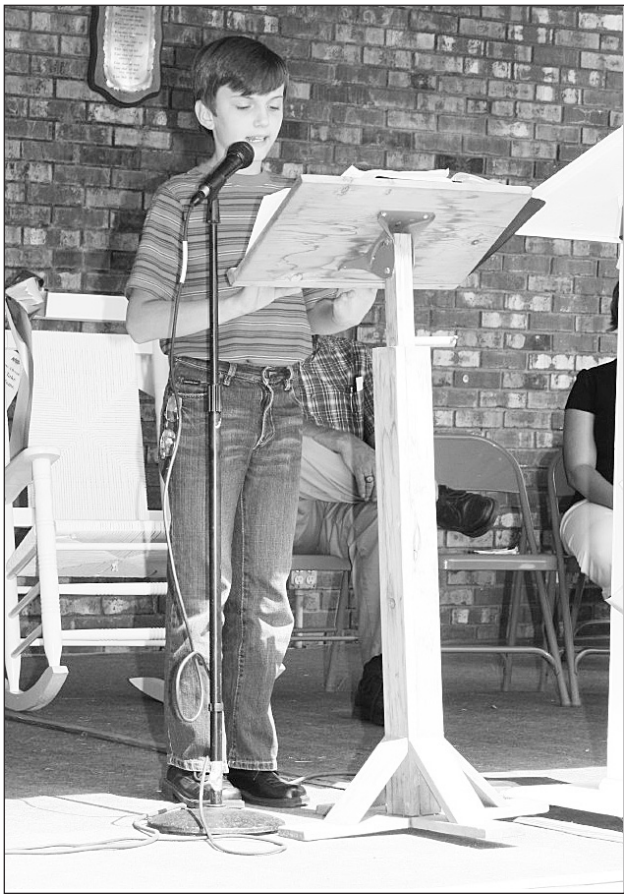

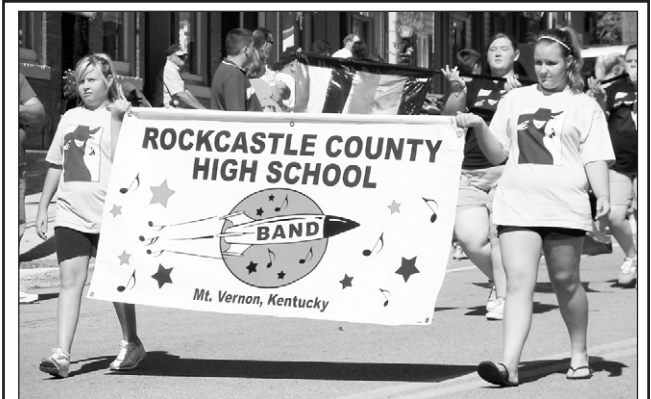

If you're looking for free entertainment Thursday, September 23 at 7:00 p.m., come to the Brodhead Fairgrounds and watch Horse Whisperer Paul Daily train a horse that's never been ridden. Co-sponsored by the Rockcastle Baptist Association, the horse demonstration is in light of the World Equestrian Games at the Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington, September 25-October 10.

Father of two, Paul Daily is a horse trainer and the founder of Wild Horse Ministries.

Since February 22, 1997, Daily has held demonstrations to explain the "Round Pen of Life" to his audience—pointing out similarities between man's relationship with God and a horse's relationship with his trainer. In his first three years of demonstrations, Daily presented his training techniques before almost 15,000

people in Louisiana and Texas. In May 2000, he became a full-time horse trainer for the Lord, traveling the country to present the demonstrations.

His techniques employed in training horses have often earned him the label "horse whisperer. crease for the past two years. Also, Carloftis noted, that if the increase were passed on to employees, several might drop out, endangering the group plan entirely. The county presently covers 44 employees, including two Constables who pay the full cost of their coverage, out of a work force of 78.

Wednesday, Carloftis told the *Signal* that he had spoken with a health insurance representative who said the county might consider a “wellness and illness prevention” option which should cut the county’s obligation substantially. The judge said he would pursue more information on this option.

Bids Opened

Three bids for the replacement of two bridges in the county were opened at the meeting.

The projects are the bridge over Gauley Branch on Piney Branch Road and, on Cass Road, the bridge over a branch of Little Dix River.

Bidders were asked for replacement costs of the bridges and the width and length varied in the bids. Carloftis said the bids were now all be sent to the Transportation Cabinet in Frankfort for review.

The county originally thought they would be reimbursed by the state 80% of the cost, up to \$85,000, for each bridge but Carloftis said Tuesday that he had been told the reimbursement would only be 80% of \$85,000 total for both bridges.

Broadband Discussion

Diane Walker of the Disputanta area was before the court asking for their help in getting Broadband internet service in her area. Mrs. Walker told the court that even though Windstream received stimulus funds to provide the service, they have 10 years to do so and are instead using the funds to upgrade their service in areas where they have competition. “I have tried to get service through Dish Network but can’t because Dish has a deal with Windstream,” Walker told the court. She also reported the same problem with Verizon, to whom she offered land for a tower.

Walker said besides not even being able to get dial-up internet service in her area, she also cannot get cell phone service.

Carloftis told the court that the county cannot make application for funds to provide the service since the county does not own the utilities. Some counties in Kentucky do such as Williamstown who owns all their utilities, Corbin who owns their phone/cable service and Jackson and Owsley counties who have independent telephone companies and they have all received funds to provide broadband service to their customers.

Mrs. Walker, who has run the gamut of contacting ev-

eryone who might conceivably be able to bring pressure to bear on Windstream, asked the court to please contact Windstream concerning the problem. Carloftis responded that the court would and Regina Crawford, the county’s new Economic Development Director who was at the meeting, promised to work on the problem.

WEG presentation

Libby Hammons, chairperson of the WEG Committee made a presentation to the court about plans to entice visitors to the World Equestrian Games to the county.

Mrs. Hammons said that a Welcome Center has been set up in the former Car Quest building to display arts and crafts from local artisans. There is information available for sights of interest, such as the Red Hill Horse Camp, the National Appaloosa event scheduled there, the horse show at Brodhead, Livingston’s Musical Nights, the Pumpkin Festival at Sigmon Farm and the Bittersweet Festival in Mt. Vernon and the kayaking and canoeing available on Rockcastle River at Livingston.

Visitors to the center will be given gift bags, adored with a horse head, with Climax Water, Dolly Sodd candy, John Holbrook key chains, etc. for out-of-state and international visitors, Hammons said and there has been a billboard installed on I-75, south of Mt. Vernon, with the cost being provided by the City of Mt. Vernon, and a banner will be put on U.S. 25 in Renfro Valley directing visitors to the Welcome Center.

Hammons asked the court for some financial help, saying the committee has been working with a budget of \$8,000 and that \$5,000 has been raised to date.

Carloftis commended Hammons for the “wonderful thing you are doing” and said the county had never seen so much energy and enthusiasm being put forth. Hammons gave a great deal of the credit for the committee’s accomplishments to Troy Hansel of Heritage Fabrics calling him the “backbone of all the hard work needing done.”

The court did not discuss any financial assistance after Mrs. Hammons’ presentation.

They did, however, approve a \$2,500 donation to the Little League Football program.

The court also approved expending \$6,605.62 for one half of the costs of paving a parking lot below the courthouse owned by the city. Magistrate Billy McKinney told the court that the area was used heavily by visitors to the courthouse and had 28 cars in it on Monday when court was in session.

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In response to Mrs. Hodges’ Uninformed Comments in last week’s Signal:

The financial statement published in the August 19th *Signal* was the Fiscal Court’s financial statement for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2010. The summary of the total revenues and total appropriations of each Fund balanced to the penny with the bank reconciliation portion of the report. The Fiscal Court’s financial records are audited each year by the State Auditor’s office or an independent accounting firm assigned by the State Auditor’s office.

As of June 30, 2010, the principle amount owed by the County was \$8,898,845. Of this amount, the County is paying on \$5,749,639. The remaining debt of \$3,149,206 is being paid by the Administrative Office of the Courts, Western Rockcastle Water Association, the Rockcastle Ambulance Service, local Fire Departments and the RCIDA. In addition, of the remaining “county” obligations, a large portion will be paid off by the state and federal government through reimbursements.

All financial records of the County are open to the public and are on record. All records are audited by the state to satisfy state laws and accuracy.

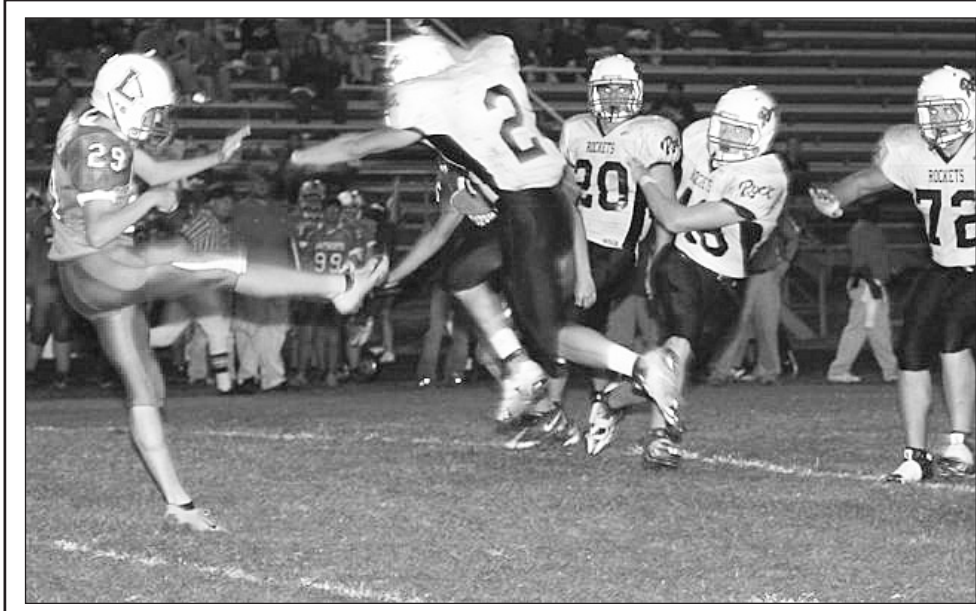

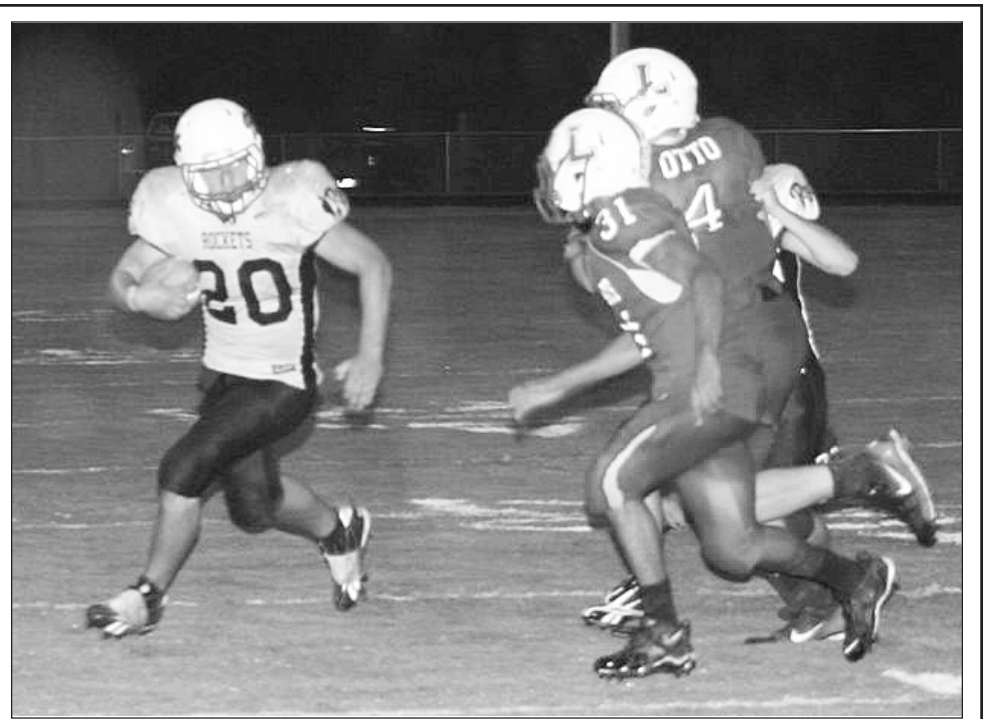

Rockets score on last drive to take home 32-27 win over Lincoln Co.

Rockcastle County moved to 2-1 in their 2010 campaign on Friday night, after overcoming a Lincoln County fourth quarter comeback by scoring a go-ahead touchdown with only 23 seconds on the clock.

Despite dominating the statistical categories and producing almost 400 yards of total offense, the Rockets almost let the game slip away, due to crucial turnovers.

The Rockets held a 26-7 lead in the third quarter and looked to be putting Lincoln County away. However, Coach Scott Parkey's squad then proceeded to fumble the football six times in just over eight minutes that initiated a Lincoln County charge. The first score in the Lincoln County rally came after junior running back Clark Rowe coughed up the football and that allowed a 14 yard touchdown return by Patriot linebacker Vinny Morris.

The Rockets next series ended when a Rocket snap sailed over the head of the

punter. Lincoln County recovered on the Rocket 22 and, on the next play after a 5 yard penalty on the Rockets, they scampered 17 yards for a score that put them within six points at 26-20.

The Patriots eventually took a 27-26 lead after a 28 yard score that came after a fumbled snap by the Rockets put Lincoln at the Rockets 28 yard line.

But, the Rockets had the last word after a 17-play, 62 yard drive that resulted in a Clarke Rowe five yard touchdown run on fourth down with only 23 seconds remaining.

The drive was quite eventful for the Rockets, who had two touchdown runs taken away because of penalties. Another pivotal point of the drive was a successful fourth down conversion on a 13 yard run by junior Zach Reams that got Rockcastle County to the Patriots 10-yard line.

However, the action wasn't over after Rockcastle's closing drive. Lincoln County

covered a squib kick on their own 34. On the next play, the Patriots completed a nine yard pass to get them to the 43. Junior defensive end Nick Thomason sacked the Lincoln County quarterback for a 5 yard loss on the next play. The last play of the game was a Lincoln County desperation pass that resulted in a reception at the Rocket 28 yard line where the Lincoln County receiver fell to the ground and time ran out.

Rowe turned in a stellar running performance for the second week in a row. His 240 yards, 3 touchdown showing in Stanford was so impressive, in fact, that it earned him WYMT Mountain Player of the Week honors. He also had two interceptions, one of which he returned 43 yards for a touchdown.

Head Coach Scott Parkey had mixed emotions after his team's 32-26 victory on Friday night. "Obviously, our inability to take care of the football let Lincoln County back in the game. Those mistakes are inexcusable. However, I couldn't be more pleased with the resilience our guys showed in responding on the last drive," Parkey said.

He was also very compli-

mentary of his defense who held Lincoln County to under 200 yards of total offense to go along with three interceptions. "They did the best they could considering the poor field positions they had to deal with," Parkey said.

In addition to Rowe's rushing statistics, junior tailback Chris Luna also picked up 36 yards on five attempts. Senior fullback John L. Saylor gained 35 yards between the tackles on seven attempts.

In addition to Rowe's three scores, quarterback Jadon Brock also had a rushing touchdown on a one yard sneak into the end zone. Through the air, Brock was three of five for 41 yards. He threw one interception.

Saylor led the way on defense from his linebacker position with seven tackles. Rowe had six tackles and a blocked punt to go along with the two interceptions. Junior B.B. Bradley had six tackles. Juniors Nick Thomason got five tackles and had two sacks. His brother, Steven, also had five tackles and posted one sack. Junior Kenton Adams got three tack-

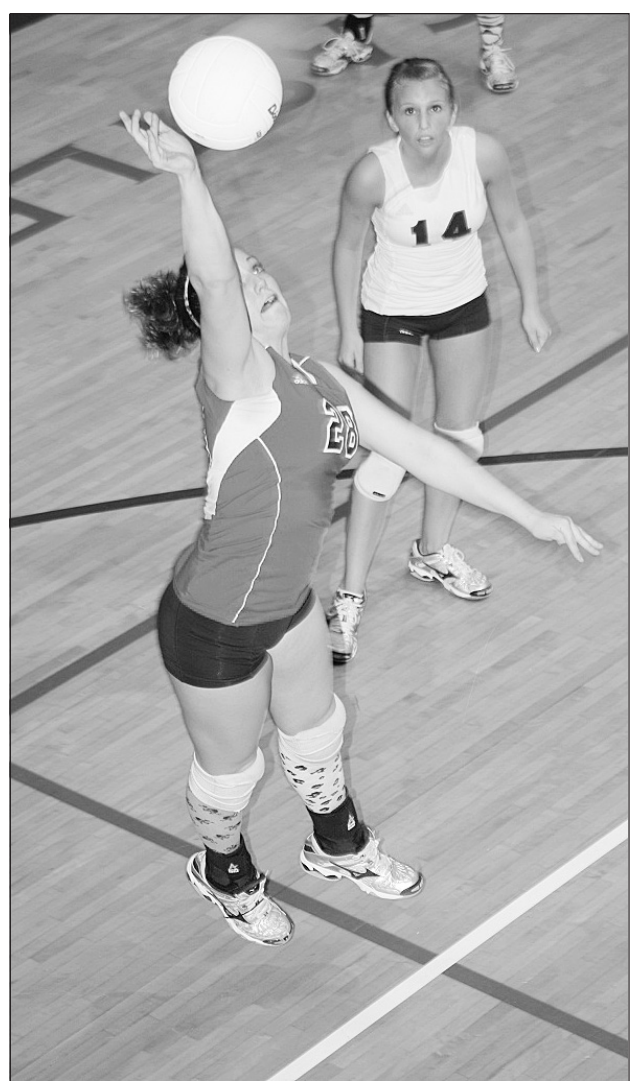
Senior setter Kara Canterbury and senior middle hitter Morgan Hunt took home all-tournament honors.

The Lady Rockets also beat Somerset on Tuesday night, 25-7, 25-11. That win took them to an astounding 20-2 record on the season.



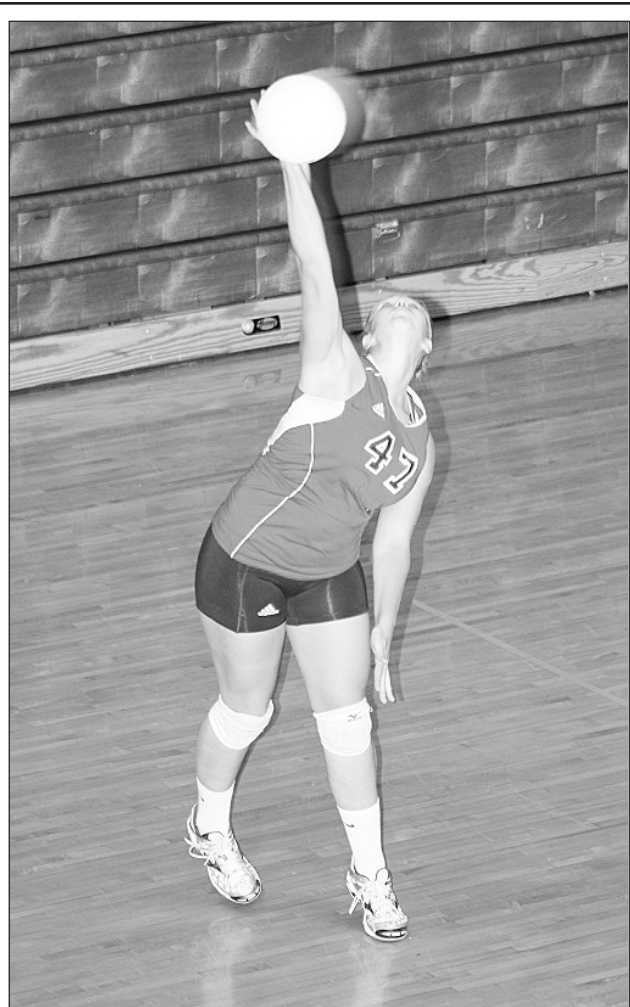

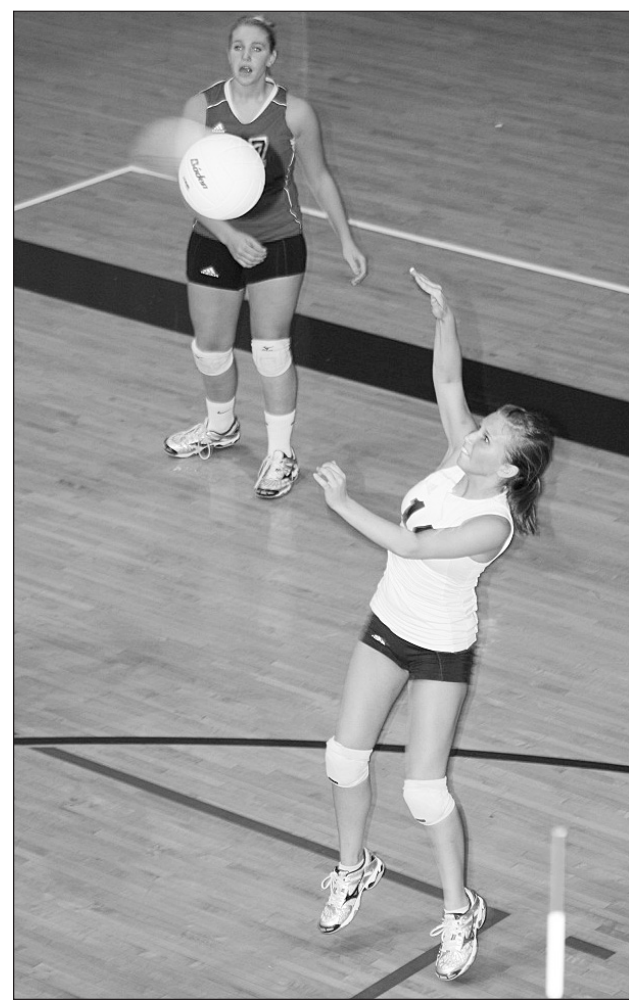

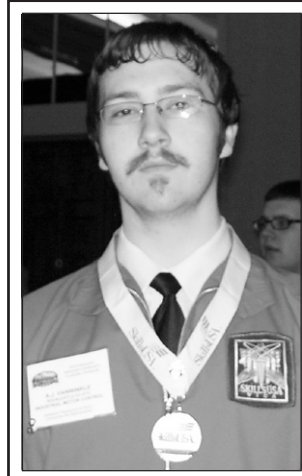

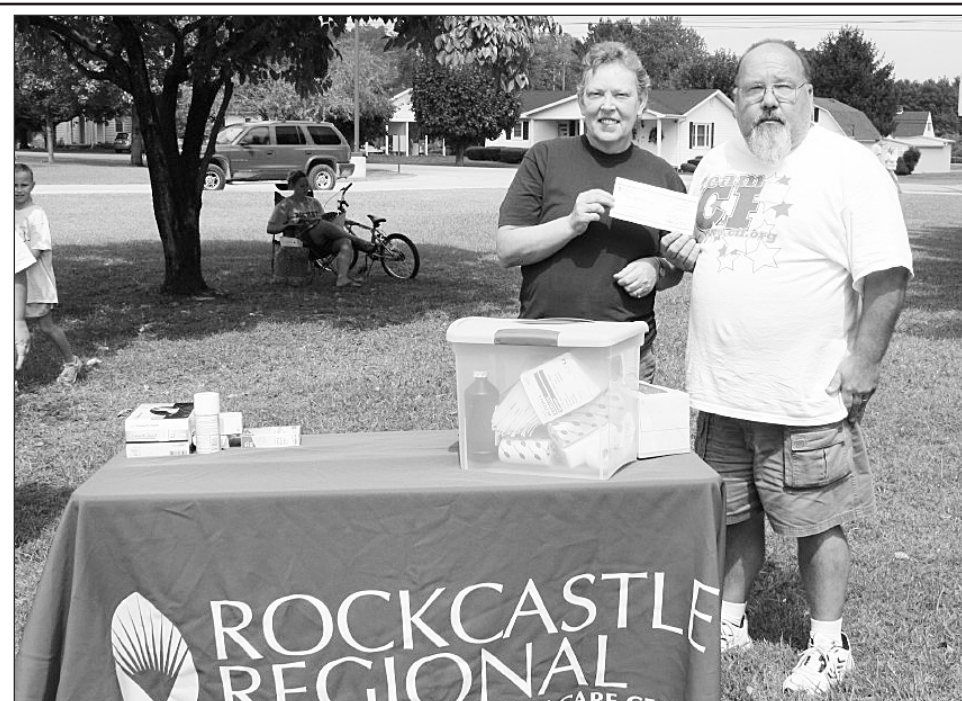

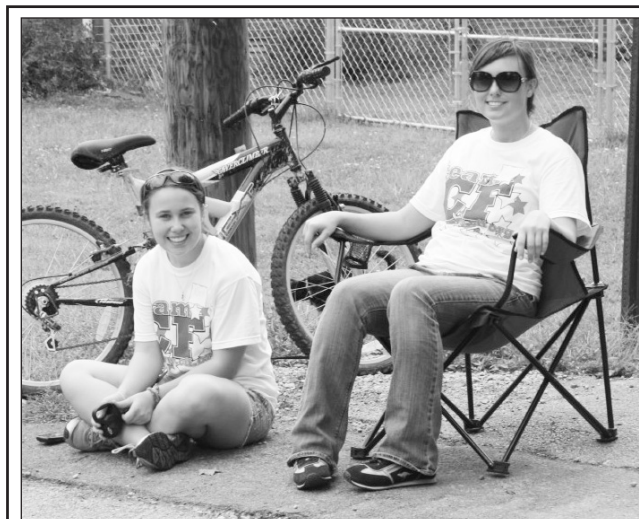

**CITY OF BRODHEAD
ORDINANCE # 0707-01
NUISANCE ABATEMENT & ENFORCEMENT PROVISIONS**

WHEREAS, the City of Brodhead, Kentucky is establishing procedures to abate nuisances within the city limits of Brodhead, Kentucky, and enforcement provisions established for nuisances.

WHEREAS, the City seeks to require the abatement of such nuisances and make enforcement provisions,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF BRODHEAD AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I

DEFINITIONS:

For the purpose of this ordinance the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

DWELLING- Any part of any building or its premises used or formerly used as a place of residence or habitation or for sleeping by any person.

STRUCTURE- Any house, garage, building, outbuilding, mobile home, shelter, building partially constructed or building partially demolished due to any reason including natural disaster or fire.

NUISANCE- Public nuisance. "Nuisance" shall mean a problem structure as defined herein and any condition or use of public or private property or premises, or of building exteriors which substantially annoy, injure or endanger the comfort, health, repose or safety of the public or which is detrimental to the property of others, or which causes or tends to cause substantial diminution in the value of other property in the neighborhood in which such premises are located, or which creates a stench or odor noxious and offensive to those in the neighborhood or passers-by on the public streets or ways or which attract rodent and vermin infestation or the risk thereof.

UNFIT FOR HUMAN HABITATION- Dangerous or detrimental to life or health because of: want of repair; defects in the drainage, plumbing, lighting, ventilation, or construction; infection with contagious disease, or the existence on the premises of any unsanitary condition likely to cause sickness among occupants of the dwelling.

UNFIT FOR FURTHER USE - In a dangerous condition; having defects or missing parts; or in such a condition generally as to be unfit for further use for its intended or practical purpose.

SECTION II

DUTY OF MAINTENANCE OF PRIVATE PROPERTY

No person owning, leasing, occupying or having charge of any property or premises shall maintain or keep any nuisance thereon, nor shall any such person keep or maintain such property or premises in a manner causing substantial diminution in the value of the other property in the neighborhood in which such property or premises are located. For the purposes of the Section, it shall not be essential that the nuisance be created or contributed to by the owner, occupant or persons having control or management of the property or premises, but merely that the nuisance be created or contributed to by licensees, invitees guests or other persons for whose conduct the owner or operator is responsible, or by persons for whose conduct the owner or operator is responsible, but by the exercise of reasonable care ought to have become aware.

DUTY OF MAINTENANCE OF STREETS, SIDEWALKS, DRAINAGE AREAS AND PUBLIC WAYS.

No person shall place, throw, deposit or allow to accumulate or grow or cause to be erected or placed on any street, alley, sidewalk, gutter, storm sewer, public or private drainage ditch or drainage structure or any other public right-of-way, easement or property public property, any rubbish, garbage, construction or demolition debris, landscaping debris, furniture, signs, large rocks or boulders, fences, post, stakes, weeds, inoperative motor vehicle, junk or scrap metal as herein above declared to be a public nuisance, or any other obstruction or encroachment of any nature, except for premises authorized by the City for such purposes. The presence of such liquids or substances in or upon any street, alley, sidewalk, gutter, storm sewer, public or private drainage ditch or any public right of way or easement or property shall constitute a nuisance and is a violation of this subchapter. Every person owning, occupying or having control or management of any building or lot in the City shall also keep the sidewalk adjacent to such building or lot open and free from all ice, snow and other obstructions, barriers and impediments of every description. In addition to any other remedies in the Chapter, any materials in violation of this Section found on City streets, sidewalks, public ways, public or private drainage areas and other public property may be removed immediately by the City with or without notice to the property owner.

SECTION III

COMMON LAW AND STATUTORY NUISANCES In addition to what is declared in the ordinance to be a public nuisance, those offenses which are known to the common law and statutes of Kentucky as public nuisances may be treated as such and be proceeded against it is provided in this chapter or in accordance with any other provision of law.

SECTION IV

CERTAIN CONDITIONS DECLARED A NUISANCE

It shall be unlawful for the owner, occupant, or person having control or management of any land within the city to permit a public nuisance to develop thereon. The following conditions are declared to be public nuisances:

- (A) Dwellings unfit for human habitation. The erection, use or maintenance of a dwelling which is unfit for human habitation.
- (B) Dangerous dwellings and buildings adjoining streets. Any building, house, or structure so out of repair and dilapidated that it will if the condition is allowed to continue, endanger the life, limb, or property of, or cause hurt, damage, or injury to persons or property using or being upon the streets or public way of the city adjoining the premises, by reason of the collapse of the building, house, or structure or by the falling of parts thereof or of objects therefrom.
- (C) Dangerous trees or stacks adjoining street. Any tree, stack, or other object standing in such a condition that it will, if the condition is allowed to continue, endanger the life, limb or property of, or cause hurt, damage, or injury to persons or property upon the public streets or public ways adjacent thereto, by the falling thereof or of parts thereof.
- (D) Dilapidated buildings. Any building, house, or structure which is so out of repair and dilapidated that it constitutes a fire hazard liable to catch on fire or communicate fire, or which due to lack of adequate maintenance or neglect, endangers the public health, welfare, or safety, or materially interferes with the peaceful enjoyment by owners or occupants of adjacent property or attracts and propagates vermin, rodents, or insects or the risk thereof.
- (E) Accumulation of rubbish. An accumulation on any premises of filth, refuse, trash, garbage, or other waste material which endangers the public health, welfare, or safety, or materially interferes with the peaceful enjoyment by owners or occupants of adjacent property because of the danger if its catching or communicating fire, its attracting and propagating vermin, rodents, or insects, or its blowing of rubbish into any street, sidewalk, or property of another.
- (F) Noxious odors or smoke. Emission into the surrounding atmosphere of odor, dust, smoke, or other matter which renders ordinary use of physical occupation of other property in the vicinity uncomfortable or impossible.
- (G) Noise. Emission of noise which is noxious enough to destroy the enjoyment of dwellings or other uses of property in the vicinity by interfering with the ordinary comforts of human existence.
- (H) Storage of explosive material. The storage of combustible or explosive material which creates a safety hazard to other property or persons in the vicinity.
- (I) Weeds. The existence of thistles, burdock, jimson weeds, ragweed, milkweeds, poison ivy, poison oak, iron weeds, and all other noxious weeds and rank vegetation in excess of a height of twelve (12) inches.
- (J) Open wells. The maintenance of any open, uncovered, or insecurely

covered cistern, cellar, well, pit, excavation, or vault situated upon private premises in any open or unfenced lot or place.

- (K) Trees and shrubbery obstructing the streets and sidewalks. The growing and maintenance of trees with less than fourteen (14) feet clearance over street or less than eight (8) feet over sidewalks, or the growing and maintenance of shrubbery in excess of three (3) feet in height within the radius of twenty (20) feet from the point where the curb line intersects the curb line of another street. No shrub shall be planted between the curb line and the property line of any street within the radius of twenty (20) feet from the point where the curb line of any street intersects with the curb line of another street.
- (L) Keeping of animals. The keeping of cattle or poultry within fifty (50) feet of a dwelling other than the dwelling of the owner of the animals, or failure to keep the animal's pen, yard, lot, or other enclosure in a sanitary condition and free from preventable offensive odors. The keeping of domesticated animals, including but not limited to dogs and cats, which threaten the public safety, health and welfare of the citizenry or which cause an unsanitary condition or noxious odor.
- (M) Junk; scrap metal; motor vehicles. The storage of motor vehicles in an inoperative condition, motor vehicles unfit for further use, automobile parts, or scrap metal within the city limits except on premises authorized by the city for such purposes.

SECTION V

ABATEMENT PROCEDURE

(A) It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police or other authorized city official as designated by the legislative body to serve or cause to be served a notice upon the owner or occupant of any premises on which there is kept or maintained any nuisance in violation of the provisions of this ordinance and to demand the abatement of the nuisance within ten (10) days or other time specified by the City unless the nuisance constitutes and immediate danger to the health and well-being of the community. If such danger is present, the nuisance shall be abated within twenty-four (24) hours of the notice. Notice shall be served upon persons by certified mail, BUT if the whereabouts of the person(s) is unknown and cannot be ascertained by the Chief of Police or designated officer after exercising due diligence then the Chief of Police or designated officer shall make an affidavit to that effect and the serving of notice may be made by publication in a newspaper of general circulation for two consecutive publications. A copy of the notice shall be posted in a conspicuous place on the premises affected by the notice and it shall be recorded in the office of the County Clerk.

(B) If the person so served does not abate the nuisance within ten (10) days or within the time specified by the City, the City may proceed to abate the nuisance or the City may employ independent contractors to

abate the nuisance. The person or persons employed to abate the nuisance shall have full right of access to the property with such personnel, machinery and equipment as are necessary to abate the nuisance. The City shall keep a record of the costs incurred to abate the nuisance and said costs shall be charged to and paid by the owner and/or occupant.

- (C) Charges for nuisance abatement shall be a lien on the premises. Nuisance abatement charges shall include, labor, equipment usage, fuel and oil, attorneys' fees, unpaid fines, filing fees, publications costs, court costs, and all other fees and charges whenever incurred by the city for the abatement of the nuisance, enforcement of the lien and foreclosure on the property. Whenever a bill for charges remains unpaid for seven (7) days after it has been rendered, the City clerk may file with the County Clerk a statement of lien claim. This statement shall contain a legal description of the premises, the expenses and costs incurred, the date the nuisance was abated and a notice that the city claims a lien for this amount. Notice of the lien claim shall be mailed to the owners of the premises if his/her address is known. However, failure to record the lien claim or to mail the notice or the failure of the owner to receive the notice shall not affect the right to foreclose the lien for charges as provided in division (D) below.
- (D) Property subject to a lien for unpaid nuisance abatement charges shall be sold for nonpayment and the proceeds of the sale shall be applied to pay nuisance abatement charges and attorney's fees after deducting costs. This foreclosure shall be in equity in the name of the city.
- (E) The City Attorney is authorized and directed to institute such proceedings, in the name of the city, in any court having jurisdiction over the matter, against any property for which the bill has remained unpaid seven (7) days after it has been rendered.

NUISANCE CREATED BY OTHERS

For the purpose of this ordinance, it shall not be essential that the nuisance be created or contributed to by the owner, occupants, or person having control or management of the premises, but merely that nuisance be created or contributed by licensees, invitees, guest, or other persons for whose conduct the owner or operator is responsible, but by the exercise of reasonable care ought to have become aware of.

PENALTY

Whoever violates any provisions of this chapter shall be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each offense. Each day's continued violation shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION VI

Any and all other Nuisance ordinances preceding this ordinance by the City of Brodhead shall be null and void.

This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon the second reading and publication.

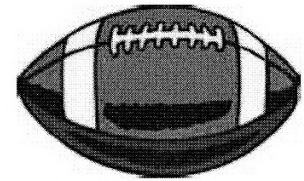

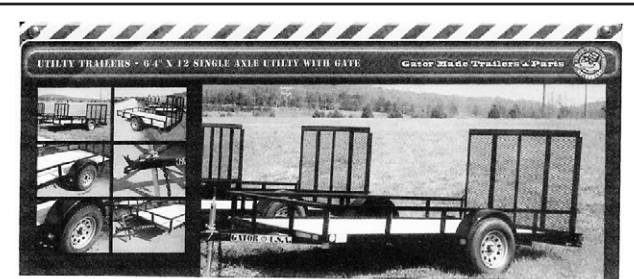

6. The purchaser shall have possession of the real property upon compliance with the terms of the sale.
7. In the event that the plaintiff is the successful bidder and the sale price does not exceed the amount of the plaintiff's judgment, no deposit or bond shall be required.
8. The successful bidder shall at bidder's own expense carry fire and extended insurance coverage on said improvements from the date of sale until the purchase price is paid in full with a loss payable clause to the Rockcastle Master Commissioner.
9. The sale shall be made subject to all easements, set back lines, restrictions or covenants of record or otherwise and shall be sold "as is".
